We have to-day given a general insertion to all documents, which has resulted in the omission of much judicious and original matter prepared for the day.

The ship *Poerse*, which left this port last Saturday inst., was wrecked at Cat Key in a violent storm. The ship is a total loss but some hope is expressed that part of the cargo would be saved. The vessel is brought by Capt. Galt of the long Hope, and the Northern Mail was received yesterday. The contents are important.
