

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

Merrimac, Mass., Feb. 14, 1893.

We herewith respectfully submit to the citizens of Merrimac the seventeenth annual town report. At the meeting last March Adams street, as laid out by the selectmen of last year, was accepted, but no appropriation was made either for land damage or for grading, consequently it remains in the same condition as when it was laid out. It will cost some \$450 to complete the street, including land damage. Provision should be made at the March meeting to work the street the coming season.

The matter of the acceptance of Forest street as laid out by the selectmen of last year was referred to the present board of selectmen with instructions to report thereon at the "next meeting." We find that the street was not fully laid out, in that no line was established upon the westerly side, from Main street to the northerly side of the ell of the house of E. S. Ricker. Therefore we cannot recommend that it be accepted. It seems to us that the proper method to pursue is for interested parties to make a new application to the selectmen.

We recommend that a committee be appointed to name all the streets in town and to designate each street by placing its name in some appropriate place or places thereon.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF

## THE BOARD OF ENGINEERS

### MERRIMAC FIRE DEPARTMENT.

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Merrimac:

In again making their annual report your Board of Engineers are once more able to congratulate you upon the very small loss by fire that the town has sustained the past year.

The department has been called out but two times during the year, once for a slight blaze upon the roof of the house of A. Lawson, which was discovered in good season and extinguished with but very small damage. The next was for the burning of the ice house belonging to the estate of the late D. M. Tukesbury. The building was old and nearly worthless, but being nearly half full of ice there was a loss of some two hundred dollars, which was fully covered by insurance. Cause, unknown.

There was also burned on the morning of July 4th a small barn owned by I. B. Little located upon Red Oak Hill isolated from any other building and so far from any supply of water that the department was powerless to do any good and was not called out. The loss in this case was also covered by insurance.

We would once more call upon the voters, and more especially those who own real estate in this town, to consider the very large and thickly inhabited tract bounded by Church, Winter and Grove streets and Church avenue that still remains without any sufficient supply of water for the extinguishment of even a small fire, and then by their votes at the next annual town meeting show whether they would protect their neighbor as well as themselves. Bear in mind that a loss by fire is a loss to the town and to each property holder in

it. Therefore keep your fire department in a good healthy condition. This can only be done by furnishing it with the necessities required to work with. There is no class of men more ready to appreciate the favorable action of a town than its firemen, and vice versa.

In this connection let us say that the past liberal policy of this town has given you a fire department that any place of its size may well be proud of, and that every applicant for insurance can make a just demand for low rates, because the risk is a great deal less than with an inferior service. Show your agents what you have and demand your rights, the same as you would in any other business transaction.

Your board report the apparatus all in first-class condition with the exception of a very much needed coat of varnish on three pieces, viz., the hose wagon at the central station, and engine and hose cart at Port. There must be sufficient appropriation to do this the coming year else it will take a very much larger one to repaint.

We have disposed of the old ladder truck and with the proceeds added a pair of extinguishers to the equipment of the new truck, which is one of the best additions that could possibly be made.

## REPORT OF THE

## TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC LIBRARY

### OF THE TOWN OF MERRIMAC.

To the Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen—In presenting the seventeenth annual report of the Merrimac Public Library the Trustees have nothing new or unusual to offer. The work has been carried on in the usual manner, with no changes in its system. The general condition is the same as in preceding years after making due allowance for increasing wear, and there is but one book unaccounted for.

During the year the Library has been opened for the delivery of books 100 times, circulating a total of 10,405 volumes. The average daily delivery has been 104, and the largest number in one day 227. The monthly delivery has been as follows:

In February (1892), 1,122; March, 1,298; April, 1,393; May, 946; June, 775; July, 822; August, 170; September, 512; October, 856; November, 792; December, 924; January (1893) 795.

There have been added to the Library during the year 145 volumes, besides several magazines, received from the following sources: Purchased by the Trustees, 124; presented by Rep sesentatives, 5; by the Commonwealth, 9. Our thanks are due and have been conveyed to the following persons for contributions: Mrs. J. H. Barnes, F. A. Tupper, H. L. Gordon, Hon. J. W. Rusk, Hartford Insurance Co., Executive Committee G. A. R. and several libraries which have kindly exchanged catalogues.

The good work and benefits of a Public Library have been attested by the unabated patronage of our citizens. Any

suggestions from the friends of a well established library are welcome to the management, and the Trustees cordially invite plans for improvement. Those who have any choice as to the selection of new books are requested to hand a list of the same to the Librarian. Desirous of having the work continue as in the past, we solicit the same appropriation for the coming year.



## SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

In compliance with the law the school committee of Merrimac submit their annual report. The term of one member of the school board having expired and the other two resigning at the close of the last school year, it became necessary to elect an entire new board. T. H. Hoyt was elected for three years, Frank C. Delano two, and Bion Green one. The new board organized with Bion Green chairman, and T. H. Hoyt, secretary.

The expenditures on this statement are up to and including Feb. 24th. We have at this time an unexpended balance of \$302.24 and there will be due when this term closes the teachers salaries and janitors salaries for three weeks which will make a small overdraw.

#### COURSE OF STUDY.

The course of study adopted by the committee was printed together with the regulations last year and it was not deemed advisable to print them this year.

#### BOOKS.

This year we have made a thorough inspection of the books, we found a great many of them in very bad condition, in fact, but few could be used. Our arithmetics and readers were so badly in pieces that we deemed it advisable to exchange. The other books are in very bad condition but with the amount of money placed at our disposal we could not exchange or buy new ones enough to replace all those in bad condition.

#### DRAWING.

We found the system of drawing in use in the schools to be far behind that in use in other towns, and we have exchanged, putting in the latest system. In consequence of the exchange in systems many of our teachers were unable to teach it without some assistance. We have employed the assistant in the High school to instruct the teachers in this branch, and in consequence we have been obliged to increase her salary. We think much progress has been made in this branch.

#### APPROPRIATIONS.

We regret very much that the appropriations for school purposes are not large enough to cover the expenses; we think they should be raised to \$8,000 at least. New books are constantly coming into use and we cannot procure the books that will give the best results without an increase in the appropriation. Books of reference are badly needed in all the schools, particularly the High school and we would recommend that a special appropriation of \$100 be made to procure them.

#### REPAIRS.

Last year very few repairs were made on any of the buildings with the exception of painting the Prospect street building and shingling the one at the Center. The building at the Center is badly in need of painting and other repairs.

We would recommend that some other method of heating be applied to the Center building. There were several days

when it was impossible to properly heat some rooms in this building with the present method, and in consequence the schools were closed.

The need of more room at the Center is very much felt. All the available room is now in use and the High school has no room to use as a laboratory. We understand that the High school has some money to expend for the laboratory when the town will furnish some place for that purpose.

#### SUPERINTENDENT.

Last year \$500 was raised for the purpose of employing in connection with other towns a superintendent of schools, but owing to unforeseen difficulties it was not deemed advisable to form the union district this year. There is not the least doubt in our minds that a superintendent of schools is very much needed in our town, but whether a district superintendent is what is needed we are not prepared to say. We think that a superintendent employed by this town alone would give better results, and this could be done with but very little extra cost to the town above that of a district superintendent.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

We believe all our teachers are striving to bring the schools under their charge to a high standard of excellence, and that our schools compare favorably with those of other towns where no superintendent is employed.

## ARTICLES IN THE WARRANT

#### FOR THE

Annual Meeting, Monday, March 6, 1893.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To bring in their votes on one ballot for Town Clerk; three Selectmen, who will be Assessors and Overseers of the Poor; Treasurer; Collector of Taxes; one School Committee for three years; one Trustee of Cemetery for three years; one Commissioner of Sinking Fund for three years; two Trustees of Public Library for three years; three Constables; three Surveyors of Lumber and Measurers of Wood and Bark; three Fence Viewers; three Field Drivers; Auditor of Accounts. Also to bring in their votes upon the same ballot, Yes or No, on the question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" In voting under this article the polls will be opened at nine o'clock and thirty minutes A. M., and may be closed at 2 o'clock P. M.

Article 3. To choose a committee upon appropriations to report at the next annual meeting.

Article 4. To determine what sum of money shall be raised to defray the necessary and usual charges and expenses of the town for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same. To hear the report of the committee upon appropriations chosen at the last annual town meeting.

Article 5. To fix the time for the payment of taxes and see what discount, if any, the town will allow for the prompt payment of taxes. Also to see what interest, if any, the town will charge on taxes remaining unpaid after the time

fixed for the payment thereof. Also to determine the compensation for collecting.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize its Treasurer, under the direction of the Selectmen, to hire money in anticipation of taxes and to pay any indebtedness of the town.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to construct a reservoir for fire purposes on Vendome street or in that vicinity, and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to purchase a safe in which to keep the records of the town, and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 9. To see if the town will make an appropriation to pay Adams street land damage and for the completion of Adams street.

Article 10. To see if the town will accept Forest street as laid out by the Selectmen of last year in accordance with description and plan on file in Town Clerk's office, and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to repair the interior of Sargent Hall and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to sell the Landing schoolhouse and lot of land under and adjacent thereto.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to accept the jury list as revised by the Selectmen.

Article 14. To see if the town will appoint a committee to name the streets of the town and mark each street by placing its name thereon, and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 15. To see what action the town will take regarding the claim of Mrs. Thomas F. Goodwin for damages on account of injuries received by her from a fall on Church street, near the Post Office.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to erect a suitable building on the land belonging to the town in the rear of engine house on School street for the purpose of storing the road machine and other property belonging to the town, and for other town purposes, and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to restrain neat cattle and horse kind from running at large.
