

Dear Mr. Secretary:

Commander-in-Chief, Armed Forces, Pacific has requested by cable (MC-IN-22942, 28 September 1945) that 34 civilians be secured for the Civil Communications Section of that headquarters. 13 of the personnel requested were of executive caliber and might be well classified as of a scarce category. In addition to the forementioned request a second one was received (MC-IN 59564, 18 November 1945) for an additional six technicians of which one was of executive caliber. The urgency in securing personnel to meet these requirements was such that the Theater felt justified in returning for recruiting purposes a Colonel Auchineless, Signal Corps, a staff officer of GNQ, AFPAC.

Continuing new efforts to secure personnel qualified to meet the Theater's requirements have met with a very limited success. The following listed corporations have been requested by the War Department to recommend or make available personnel to meet the Theater needs:

Our efforts through the above mentioned corporations have not been completely without success. However, so far only eight candidates have been recommended by these companies. The American Telephone and Telegraph Company have supplied half of the recommendations to date but have advised that they were doubtful if additional candidates could be recommended.

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In addition to the above mentioned civilian corporations, the Army Signal Corps, the Office of Chief of Army Communications, the Office of Chief of Air Forces Communications and the Bureau of Personnel of the Envy have been requested to furnish a list of qualified condidates. To date we have received, recommended and ascepted two Army officers and one Naval officer. These offices have further advised that additional personnel with the required qualifications are not available.

In view of the paucity of qualified personnel to meet the Theater's requirements, your concurrence is requested in the proposal that the Mar Department approach the International Telephone and Telegraph Company for assistance in meeting Theater requirements which are critical. This organization has not been communicated with to date because it is understood that present State Department policy prohibits utilization of personnel from this type of firm.

The Federal Communications Commission has indicated that the International Telephone and Telegraph Company would probably be willing and in a position to fill many of the Theater requirements. It is felt that the Theater's urgent needs justify this departure from present policy.

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My dear Mr. Secretary:

Reference is unde to the letter of the Assistant Secretary of State dated 12 May 1945, with regard to the desire of the Department of State to establish an assimilated military ranking for Foreign Service personnel.

It is noted that the purpose of such a ranking would be to meet difficult situations said to have arisen under war-time conditions in connection with the travel, billeting and measing of such personnel, and the extension to them of courtesies and appropriate treatment whenever they are subject to military regulations and priorities. It is noted also that the Department of State finds that Executive Order 3366, dated 2 Merch 1940, as smended on 18 Merch 1940, wherein the relative ranking of officers of Foreign Service and other officers of the United States is prescribed, does not include certain ranks of Foreign Service officers which have been established during the war period.

It is noted further that the chart enclosed with the letter under reference sets forth an assimilated military ranking of the character under discussion, including personnel emitted in the above mentioned Executive Order, which it is proposed to establish by an exchange of letters between the Secretaries of State, War, and Navy.

It appears that there are two aspects of the proposal under consideration, namely, relative rank and assimilated rank, and that these aspects, while closely related, are distinct. Selative rank is understood to be comparative rank as between officers in different services. Assimilated rank is understood to be the implied assumption of a rank in one service by a person not a member of that service. It is apparent from the foregoing that a system of relative ranking must be established prior to the establishment of a system of assimilated ranking.

Insecuch as the precent system of relative ranking is established by Executive Order, it appears that it cannot be modified or expanded without further Executive action. In this connection it is pointed out that, in addition to the new relative ranks proposed, the chart enclosed with the

letter under reference is in certain instances at variance with the relative ranks as now established by the Executive Order.

In the light of the foregoing, it appears that the present proposed system of assimilated renking is not susceptible of establishment by an exchange of letters between the Secretaries of State, Mar, and Havy. The Mavy Department considers moreover that the necessity and desirability of establishing such a system, even assuming that the Executive Order is first modified, are open to question. In this regard, it is pointed out that travel priorities would not be affected by such a system since they are determined by the urgency and importance of the mission rather than by the rank of the traveller. It is pointed out further that where havy measing and billeting facilities and the extension of courtesies are concerned, every attempt is made now to efford courteous consideration and treatment appropriate to the position of the individual concerned with due regard to the exigencies of the local situation. The Mayy Department is not evere that the treatment of foreign carvice personnel on the above been has been unesticfactory. If specific cases of unantiefectory treatment have occurred or should occur in the future, the Department would appreciate information concerning them in order that they may be carefully investigated.

the direumstances that the proposal to establish an assimilated military ranking as set forth in the letter under reference should not receive favorable consideration.

Dear Mr. Holmes:

I have your letter of 12 May 1945 requesting the establishment of "assimilated military ranking" for Foreign Service personnel. You state that Executive Order 5356 of 2 March 1940, as amended, fails to make provision for certain ranks of Foreign Service officers which have been established since the Order was promulgated. You further state that the purpose of your proposal is to meet wartime conditions affecting Foreign Service personnel in connection with "their travel, billeting and messing, extension of courtesies to them and appropriate treatment whenever they are otherwise subject to military regulations and priorities".

The War Department considers that the torms "relative rank" and "assimilated rank" are clearly distinguishable and that their meanings should not be confused. Executive Order 5356 establishes rules of precedence as between Foreign Service and other officers of the United States Government. This, it is understood, is what is meant when the term "assimilated rank" is used in connection with the recognition of quasi-military status for individuals who follow the armed forces without directly belonging thereto, and for the purpose of assuring treatment as prisoners of war in the event of their capture by the enemy. Provision has heretofore been made for the assignment of assimilated rank and for issuance of certificates showing this rank to such Foreign Service and other civilian personnel as may actually accompany or serve with the armed forces of the United States.

It is believed that the failure of Executive Order 83% to include certain ranks of Foreign Service officers that have been established to meet pressing responsibilities during the war period should be overcome by Executive act rather than by interdepartmental action.

I should like to point out that travel priorities are determined under existing procedures on the basis of the urgency of the mission rather than the rank of the individual traveler.

The War Department has consistently held that the matter of Army exchange privileges is a question for determination by the particular theater commander concerned, with due regard to the exigencies of the local cituation. As you know, such privileges have been extended in many instances to Foreign Service personnel and other Government personnel. The question of rank was not involved.

where Army travel facilities are used, every effort is made to extend courteous consideration and treatment appropriate to the position of the individual concerned. Should there be specific cases in which Foreign Service personnel fail to receive appropriate and sourteous treatment from Army authorities in connection with travel, billeting or messing, I hope that you will feel free to advice me fully in regard to the circumstances.

In view of the foregoing considerations, I wish to advise that your proposal for the establishment of assimilated military rank for Fereign Service personnel is not favorably considered by the War Department.

My dear Mr. Secretary:

The Department of State would request the establishment of assimilated military ranking for Foreign Service personnel to meet difficult situations now confronting such personnel. These situations have arisen under wartime conditions in connection with their travel, billeting and messing, extension of courtesies to them and appropriate treatment whenever they are otherwise subject to military regulations and priorities.

The relative ranking of officers of the Foreign Service and other officers of the United States Government is prescribed in Executive Order 8356 dated March 2, 1940, as amended. This Executive Order does not include by specific reference other ranks of Foreign Service officers which have been established to meet pressing responsibilities during the war period.

In the accompanying chart we have endeavored (1) to assimilate the ranks of those officers, and also of Foreign Service clerks, both men and women, many of whom are performing duties commensurate with those of officers, and (2) to develop assimilated military ranking of our Foreign Service personnel.
