INSANE ASYLUM FOR EUROPEANS. (From the Englishman, July 25.) The government has long contemplated the erection in Calestia, of an Insane Asylum for Europeans, on a large and expensive plan, and constructed expressly for the purpose to which it will be devoted i which, as is well known the ouiding at Bhowanipore not used for the reception and cutody of insane Europeans, is not. As we understand that there is a probability of government soon taking action in this matter, we would say a few words of protest such an unwise and unadvisable expanditure of the public money here, at Madras, or at Bombay. So far from the construction of such asylum for Europeans being an act of benevo-lence or philanthropy, the formation of such an institu-tion, and the confinement in it of European insane patients for indefinite periods, or permanonuly, would be tion, and the confinement in it of European insane patients for indefinite periods, or permanently, would be the most injudicious measure that could possibly carried out as regards the afflicted patients themselves, and one of the worst possible purposes to which a large sum of the money could be unwisely devoted. No insane Euro-pean should, on any account whatever, be detained in this country and climate beyond a probationary period, say a year at farthest, after the commencement of his affliction ; and, at the termination of that time, he should be sent home, and allowed the opportunity, or chance—in this country remote, in England proximate —of recovery.
