CITY GUARE-WARRANT -- In the legislature, improve ments are proposed in the mode of administering the laws and ordinances in this city; but in seeking to orgamize more correctly the courts of justice, it may be well to consider the menial executives of the law. The memhers of the legislature either do not know or do not care about the state of the police or city guard in New Or to this; and seem to commit the subject wholly to the common council and the mayor. The council commit it to the mayor; and the mayor fancies he has too many ditties already to perform, before taking into consideration the condition and conduct of the city guard.

Now it is well known to experienced citizens of th lace that they are continually liable to insults, outrages and arceses from this guard-most of whom are as impertinent and troublesome, as they are ignorant and orthicss. Not very long since, an individual of this and being 'drest in a little brief authority,' entered, and chancel to espy in the crowd-alouf from the disturbfrom cris ceremonic; and with his cutlass almost fractured has shall. This policeman was shielded by authority; and although the gentleman on whom the outrage was perpetrated ranks so high among his fellow citizens, as to have been elected a member of the city council, he has in vain essayed to have condign punishment inflicted on the criminal. The law will give him no remedy; and the man is continued in his office, as lieutenant of the guard-the mayor not wishing to lose such a pugnacious

Yet this same lieutenant lately arrested another gentheman, while quietly standing in the American theatre witnessing the representations; and without license or warrant, forced him to the guardhouse on a verbal accusation; and had him cast into the calaboose for the night, not lose so useful a servant; it would be too bad to give schools. up his dearly beloved HART!

Again we begleave to call the attention of our legislators to the subject of warrants and arrests. Night after night there are scores of unfortunate individuals who are arrested and east into the calaboose, by these harpies, to snow that they have done something; and when the confined are brought before the mayor, he very demurely nods to them, and his satellites cry, 'You may go.' The spectacles presented every morning at the mayor's court of these reiterated villanies, are enough to renu the neart. Vet the mayor never checks these arrests; and the unfortunate individuals confined throughout the night in a hole with scarcely a ray of light or breath of sir, have no the school house; and that all send their children there that

We earnessly entreat the members of the legislature to interpose in so serious a matter—where the lives and liber—not wish to reduce the fund given to the schools in any ties of citizens are outraged thus with impunity. Why not at once pass a law that no person not engaged in actual disturbance should be liable to arrest without a warrant; and port particularly recommended this appropriation; and gave that no person should be imprisoned for more than at least in figures as estimate of the charges. 4 or 6 hours without a regular commitment from a magisfarfeit his office or situation; and he himself be imprisoned or some definite period. THE DEPICIENCY IN THE REVENUE occasioned by abolishing the sale of gambing licenses in this state deserves of source the scrious consideration of our legislature, as to the best mode whereby it can be supplied. We had formerly suggested to our democratic friends in the assembly that they the general welfare of the state, in suppressing all banking houses and banking games; and in supplying the deficient revenue by levying a graduated tax on professions or pursuits, and a somewhat similarly graduated tax on property and persons throughout the state. We said privileged: for those who enjoy the protection of the state, should contribute to its support; and those who contribute to its support should enjoy the proportionate share of its selvantages and privileges. The friends of democracy have nobly obtained the triumph of morality in our legislation; it now remains to see whether they will embrace the opportunity so fortunately tendered them by the deficiency in the revenue to have it supplied by a tax, which will entitle the majority of our citizens to exercise the right of suffrage.

Every plansible mode of evading the concession of general suffrage, seems devised or proposed. Taxes are singularly to be proposed on all passengers arriving in this city by rivers or roads, canals or beyous; altho' such an imposition may be deemed unconstitutional as well as impolitic and offensive. These are like the torced benevulences of the absolute monarchs. They are to be raised for a chantable
