RICKARD LEFT FOR RENO THIS MORNING

Goldfield Offers a Big Sum for Fight—Johnson and Jeffries Packing Up.

The Times leased wire special dispatches to-day from San Francisco report that there is a great amount of uncertainty in both the Johnson and Jeffries camps, and that Reno, Nevada, is almost on the map. Rickard left for Reno this morning. He will while there meet a delegation of Goldfield enthusiasts who are prepared to guarantee a seat sale of \$200,000 if the promoter will take the fight to the gold town of the Sage-Bush State. At the Seal Rocks yesterday and this morning the big black man went ahead with his training as if nothing unusual had occurred, but he is ready to leave at a moment's notice or to stay on and complete his preparation there, whichever way the local battle will result. At Rowandennan, Jeffries is nursing arouch. There is a spirit of uncertainty there. The manager of the Jeffries camp, it was transpires, has an agreement with the undefeated that he and his trainers do not leave Rowandennan until July 2nd, and this morning the manager was reported to be commencing preparations for a suit against the Jeffries camp—this suit is to leave the camp before the stipulated time. Jeffries' exhibition yesterday afternoon was an unsatisfactory affair. He went into his work half-heartedly, and it is plain the Governor's action has upset the big man.

The evidence of the prosecution having been given, Mr. Courtenay, for the accused, obtained a remand until this afternoon to bring witnesses to prove an alibi, the accused claiming he could not have stolen the ring at the time stated in the charge.

NEW STEAMER GOING NORTH

VENTURE TO MAKE INITIAL VOYAGE

Purely Victoria Firm Launching Out Into Purely Passenger Business

The new steamer Venture leaves tonight for northern British Columbia ports on her initial run, calling at Campbell River, Alert Bay, Rivers Inlet, Bella Coola, Skeena River points, Prince Rupert, Naas and Stewart. She looks all spick and span after being overhauled and when she pulls out tonight will be one of the finest coasting boats afloat. A number of passengers are booked to leave this port, and it is expected that when she leaves Vancouver to-morrow night she will be full right up.

The placing of the new Venture on the run by the Boscowitz Steamship Company, marks a new era in the shipping trade of that firm. For a number of years they have been serving the coasting towns of northern British Columbia, giving a splendid service, but they have catered more to the freight business than to the strictly passenger trade. Now they have changed that course of procedure. The Vado, the largest freight carrier of the fleet, will still cater, particularly to that business, but the Venture is more strictly a passenger steamer. She will compare very favorably in the matter of accommodation with anything on the coast and as she makes Victoria her home port there is an especial interest taken in her here.

The Boscowitz Company is wholly a Victoria concern. The investment in the Victoria money invested in the steamers, and all dividends paid are distributed locally. This should especially commend itself to Victorians. They should be more than proud to see one of the home industries flourish as this one is doing.

RAISING DRY DOCK.

Washington, D. C., June 20.—It is stated at the navy department to-day that the dry dock Dewey, which sank at Olongapo several weeks ago, will be floated again before the end of this week. Rapid progress was made by the men engaged in raising the Dewey. As soon as the drydock is afloat an effort will be made to ascertain what caused it to sink. Reasons advanced are numerous, including the statement of American army officers at Manila that the Japanese in the islands were responsible for the wreck.

**The Evening Chit-Chat**

"He knew not what to say, and so he swore," runs the quotation.

Do you know, there are times when it seems to me that would not be as bad as the course most of take when we don't know what to say?

We are all at ease. We are self-conscious. We are foolishly scared of a pause. We know not what to say, and so we ramble on, and like as not say something we will be heartily sorry for or much ashamed of when we come to think it over afterwards.

The most stupid, the most inane, the most unfortunate things I have said in the course of my life have always been under just these conditions.

I have felt that I must say something and I have stumbled wildly on into egotistical and inane and misleading remarks that I have often regretted bitterly for very long afterwards.

Anyone will admit that he regrets the thing he said three times as often as the thing he left unsaid. Why, then, don't we take a lesson from that, and when we have nothing very desirable to say, shut our mouths and say it.

What not in your case substitute, for "He knew not what to say, and so he said something foolish." "He knew not what to say and so he said nothing?"

If it were practical that there might be some sort of a regulation forbidding the wearing of elaborate clothes to church, it seems to me it would be a mighty good movement for the churches of this country to take up.

But since a regulation would be almost, if not quite, impossible to form and enforce, I wish you—that means the women I write to—would do a little thinking on the subject for yourselves and perhaps put a few private regulations into force.

In the second place, few women can have on their best clothes without thinking about them, and thereby neglecting the service.

In the third place, few women can see other women's best clothes without thinking of them, and thereby neglecting the service.

And in the third place—I put it third for emphasis—not by any means because I think it least important—because if the rich or comfortably well-off women of the church wear their elaborate gowns, contracting as they do with humble garments of some of the poorer women, it brings caste into the church, and if there is any place on earth where caste ought not to be it is certainly in the house of God, where all of us pray of being brothers and sisters.

Of course, I do not think one should dress dowdily for church—only very simply and quietly. There is nothing more saddening to my mind in our religious world than to see a church congregation become a fashion show. If the love of display, the burning interest in "what one shall be clothed," dominate even here, where can we find sanctuary from them?

Think it over, my friends. Make the experiment of wearing one of your simplest gowns next Sunday and see if a sweeter, holier and more peaceful feeling does not come to you as you try to worship your God in the "beauty of holiness" instead of in the splendor of your best clothes.

EFFECT OF SUNLIGHT

Sunlight increases the oxygen carrying capacity of the blood, increases the excretion of carbonic oxide, and the shorter light waves seem to cause a beneficial stimulation in the young of many of the lower and higher animals as shown by better development. The idea is growing that though man's protoplasm can function without the stimulation yet he is better off if he has it and thus reaches his highest vigor and efficiency.

The stimulation of strong sunlight has been frequently mentioned by literary men of genius, for with rare exceptions they have very sensitive nervous tissue in which the results would be most noticeable. Light baths are suggested for sluggish metabolism, an excellent remedy in the case of those of sluggish chemistry who are benefited by the slower heat rays of hot springs, spas, etc.

A doctor reports a cure of tubercular peritonitis in a child of nine by the use of condensed rays of the sun. An Iowa physician is having marked success in treating tuberculosis of the lungs, larynx, etc., with concentrated sun rays and in this method the glass stops most of the ultra violet rays if not all. He shows that the light penetrates the body and kills bacteria or inhibits them so that the increased vitality brought about by forced nutrition and other means disposes of them and healing then occurs. He shows that the light is a stimulant, is absorbed by the cells and causes definite chemical changes.

Sunlight kills bacteria, but we ignorantly fail to reflect it has just as fatal effect on the protoplasm, which composes the human system. Sunlight is producing headache, insomnia, conjunctival irritation, skin diseases, nasopharyngeal disorders, thermic changes, insanity, suicide, neurasthenia, and cardiac feebleness. So those of us who wish to promote health, sanity and long life must raise our parasols on going into the sunlight, hilt the shade of dark houses, take or advise a seat in the shade of the old apple tree.

In answer to a charge of riding a bicycle after dark without a light Mattias Jones, of Battersea, said that her sweet heart, accompanying her on his bicycle, had his arm on her shoulder, and she thought the light on his machine would do for two.

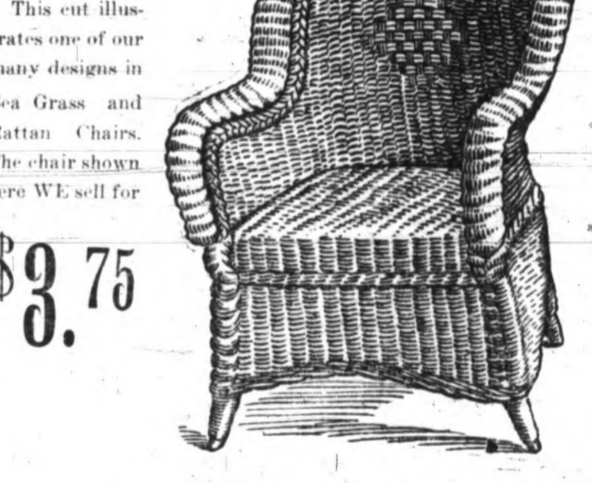

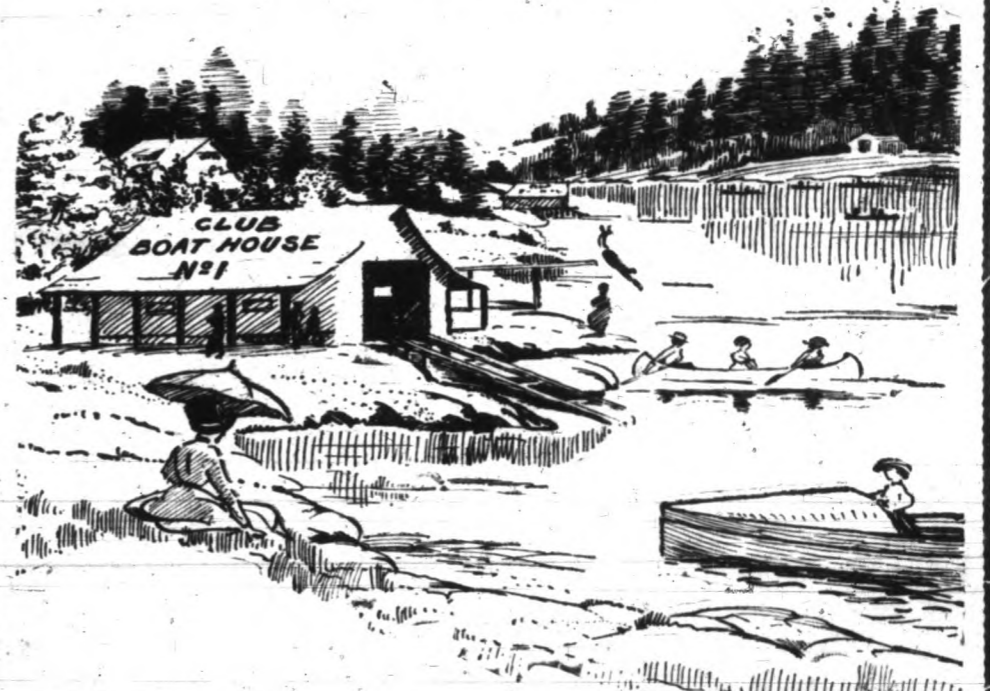

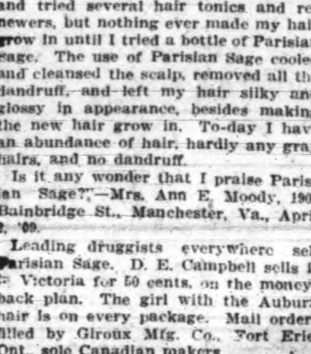

Our sympathies need not be asked in question if we consider the unfortunate antagonists as symbols of a state of society.

Now when we find symbols of society chopping off ears in the heat of theological argument, we are tempted at first blush to shake our heads.

Theology, we say, is a spiritual matter, and the tissue of the brain behind the left ear lobe is a physical matter—and the two must not be mixed with a bowie knife. That was made plain at Gettysburg. On the other hand we must consider that the conflicting symbols were not sparring for a purse—which, as the Governor of California has discovered at the eleventh hour, is not only sinful, but subversive of a chunk of votes.

The matter at issue was evidently one of those great questions of faith that arise in the best regulated clerical circles from time to time and gore the most placid of dilemma-dodgers on the horns of heterodoxy.

It was above logic and beyond the reach of dialectics. It brooked no argument other than assertion, and it carried its own authority superior to law and equity. To shirk it was to be lukewarm, to deny it was anathema, to die in its defence was a duty.

But whether the reverend gentleman who was stabbed fatally in the left ear was a martyr or a heretic we may never know.

Two out of three men may pronounce a dogma and excommunicate the third. Two alone can attain the happy end without a knife.

The rash Kentuckians, each convinced of the other's error, united to convene a quorum. With that strange joy that we all experience in fustian worthy of our carving knives, they risked the slotless sin of supererogation and went at it.
