



Remember, when the bugs or insects appear on your crop, you need insecticides; then delay getting the remedy and sprayers may cost you ten times the cost of your purchase.

How to Send an Order You will find in the front of this book an order sheet, perforated for tearing out; also an addressed do not write anything on the sheet except items wanted and what pertains to the order. Write on separate sheet when asking for prices or information, this will avoid the possibility of being overlooked; also insure quick attention to information asked.

Please be careful to sign your name, post office, county, and state on each order and letter sent us. Each year we receive orders without name or address of senders.

Terms All orders, to secure prompt shipment, should be accompanied with the cash. We can only send to well rated merchants, or parties well known to us, without the cash with order. When remittance falls short of amount of goods ordered, it is our custom to reduce the quantity sent, instead of delaying order by writing.

How to Send Money By Post Office or Express Money Order, Bank Check, or Draft, Cash by Registered Letter. We accept clean postage stamps for small amounts the same as cash.

C. O. D. Orders must be accompanied by a remittance equal to one-fourth the amount of the order; this insures the express or freight charges in case the goods are not taken when they arrive at destination.

Brussels Sprouts

Sow seed in a bed during June or July. When large enough to move transplant in open ground 18 ins. apart in the row. The cultivation and handling is in every way similar to that given cabbage. It matures in about 125 days.

The "Sprouts" resemble miniature cabbage, growing closely on the stalk on the plant. The leaves should be broken down in the fall to give the little heads more room to grow. They should be treated in all respects like Winter cabbage or kale. **Pkt. 10c**; oz. 20c; ½ lb. 65c; lb. \$2.50.

Broccoli

Requires a longer season than either cabbage or cauli-flower to develop. The same cultivation as suggested for cauliflower should be given to Broccoli. Sow seed early in May; transplant in June. Growth and habit like cauli-flower but 1ar more hardy. Well adapted to Carolina conditions.

- ITALIAN GREEN SPROUTING. An imported strain that may be sown from June 1st until October 1st. In habits and culture it is similar to cauliflower and forms a good sized center head with from four to six heads which can be cut later. When cooked it has a delicious flavor. In the spring it sends up sprouts, which are cut and bunched for market. Try some without fail; it is a good yielder and of excellent quality. Culture—Same as for turnips. 

Stitute production For the earliest crop, plant just as soon as the weather gets warm—in this section, about March 20th. To have a succession, plant every two weeks throughout the Summer until the middle of August, or, farther south, as late as September 20th. For field culture, plant in rows 2½ to 3 feet, 3 inches hetween the Beans, cover-ing about 2 inches. In small gardens the rows may be only 2 feet apart. Cultivate often until they hlossom, not afterward, and never when the vines are wet. To prevent anthracnose, blight, mildew, rust and leaf-spot, alsc to control Mexican Bean Beetles, spray and dust early and frequently with Bordeaux Mixture, Calcium Arsenate, Arsenate of Lead, Calcium Fluosilicate, etc. Will mature in 42 to 70 days.

Will mature in 70 to 90 days.

Lima Beans are sensitive to cold and should not be planted until all danger of frost is past. Require a rich, light, preferably sandly soil, which helps to mature the "Limas" quickly. Select a rich soil or use old, well-rotted manure. Plant in hills $2\frac{1}{2}$ to $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart each way and 5 to 6 seeds in a hill, or in rows 2 to 3 feet apart, 4 to 6 inches between the plants in the row and 2 inches deep. Draw the soil up along the plants, but do not work among the Beans when wet, as this induces rust.

Pole or Cornfield Beans



Wyatt's Ideal Stringless Pole Beans.

These are much stronger growers than Bush Beans and require good, strong stakes. They give a much greater yield than the Bush Beans, but being more tender should never be planted before the last of April in this section.

Use poles about 8 feet long and set formly 4 feet apart each way. Plant 5 to 8 Beans in a hill, $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches deep. When well started, thin to four plants in a hill. They are sometimes planted in the hills of field corn.

- BURGER'S STRINGLESS GREEN-POD. In some sections this is called White-Seeded Kentucky Wonder. Uniformly straight, 6 to 8 inches in length, rich green, and very meaty; entirely stringless. The white beans are fine for winter use.
- CUT SHORT CORNFIELD. Very popular for planting in corn. Pods fleshy and of good quality.
- HORTICULTURAL or SPECKLED CRANBERRY. Medium early; excellent both as snap and shell Bean.
- KENTUCKY WONDER or OLD HOME-**STEAD.** Green pod. The old reliable Green Pod Pole Beau. The most widely and universally planted of all the pole va-rieties. The pods are fleshy, saddle-backed green, 7 to 10 inches long and stringless, when young Kent nicked they have when young. Kept picked, they bear throughout the season.

KENTUCKY WONDER WAX. Pods are beautiful golden yellow, and so fleshy that often the thickness surpasses the width.

LAZY WIFE. A late productive sort having medium green pods 6 inches in length, broad, flat, stringless, fleshy, brittle and of excellent quality. Dry beans, round and white

SCARLET RUNNER. Ornamental, bright red flowers. Good snap Bean. Pkt. 100; lb. 40c; 2 lbs. 70c; 10 lbs. \$2.80, prepaid.

STRIPED CREASEBACK SCOTIA or NANCY DAVIS. Plants large; compact; vigorous grower; pods about 7 inches long, almost straight or slightly bent backward at the end; round, well filled and of good quality.



When a supply has not been secured in the Fall, sow in coldframes in December, or in a gentle hotbed the last of January. Give plenty of air at proper times, in order to harden the plants, and transplant in the open ground as soon as the weather permits. For a Summer crop, sowing may be made from March until the middle of May. For Winter Cabbage, sow Flat Dutch, Drumhead and Savoy from middle of May to last of July, transplanting when large enough; late Cabbage should be set 3 feet apart and not less than 18 inches in the row. It is useless to attempt the cultivation of this crop without deep and thorough plowing or spading and an abundance of rich, well decomposed manure or suit-able substitutes. Plenty of room should be given plants, at least two feet each way. They need a light and well watered soil, rich in nitrogen. Frequent applications of nitrate of scda or some other nitrogenous fertilizer will work wonders. An early crop of Cucumbers can be had each year by starting the seed in pots, boxes, or on a piece of sod so they can be readily transplanted without checking the growth. For outside planting, the ground should be prepared and put in good condition and the seed should be planted about the latter part of March or the first part of April with suc-cessive plantings throughout the season. The seeds should not be planted more than an cessive plantings throughout the season. The seeds should not be planted more than an lnch deep and in hills slightly raised above the ground, about 4 feet apart each way. We also recommend planting about two or three times as much seed as you would for any other crop and then thin out or pull out the plants, as the insects attack the vines which are the weakest leaving about three or four strong vines to each hill. When large enough and weather is settled (April-May-June), set the plants out in highly manured or fertilized soil in $3\frac{1}{2}$ foot rows, 3 feet between the plants. There are few places where some variety of flower seeds cannot be sown, and certainly, where there is any space at all, one should have flowers. For the heginners, we would suggest such kinds as Alyssum, Asters, Calliopsis, Centaurea, Cosmos, Nasturtiums, Dianthus, Poppies, Verbenas, and Zinnias.

Verbenas, and Zinnias. Ligh, rich loam is most suitable for flowers. The soil should be finely pulverized and high'y fer'ilized with Sheep or Poultry Manure, Bone Meal, Lime, Vigoro or Baughro for hest re-sults. This is of paramount importance if one wishes to grow them successfully. They, in common with all other seeds, should he sown thinly and the soil pressed firmly over them when covered. Water frequently. A good plan is, sow the seeds in rows about 8 inches apart, her transp'ant to the permanent garden later. Popples and Nasturtiums should he planted where they are to remain, as they do not trans-plant eacily

plant easily.

ANNUALS are these flowers that attain their full growth, bloom and die the first year. Among these are Asters, Palson, Comes, Zinnias, Mignonette, Sweet Peas, Nasturtiums, Merning Gleries and other brilliant and fragrant serts.

BIENNIALS produced from seed generally flower the second year and then die, the life of the platt being two seasons. Foxgleves and Campanulas are true biennials.

Campanulas are true biennials. **PERENNIALS** usually do not flewer the first year, but live over until the second season and them bloom. They continue for many years after. These sorts constitute the "Hardy Flowers," such as H dlyhocks, Sweet William, Columbine, C reconsts, etc. **HARDY, HALF-HARDY, and TENDER**, are common terms applied to Annuals. All hardy Annuals can be sewn at same time peas and radishes are usually sewn in the vegetable garden. Itali-hardy Annuals may be sewn at corn planting time, or when there is little danger of frest. Tender Annuals sheld not be sewn urti' the ground is warm and the weather is settled, usually in May.

CANNAS

No lawn or park seems complete without its tropical leaves and its mammoth flower-spikes that are a mass of bloom from July until frost. The bed should be spaded to a depth of at least a foot and an abundance of well-decomposed manure worked in, and the roots set 4 or 5 inches under the surface. The "blazing" effects for which Cannas are so famous are best secured by the use in masses, with the roots set not more than 2 feet apart—dwarf kinds being set even more closely. All Cannas love water, and in dry seasons blooming will be much more profuse and constant if the soil be kept always moist. In the South, planting may be done as early as the last of February, but if early bloom is wanted, the best way is to start them in pots under protection, transplanting to the open ground when danger of frost has passed. Applications of Plant Food during the growing season help to produce more and better flowers. produce more and better flowers.
