TRUSTEES' REPORT.

The Trustees of the Peabody Institute herein present their annual report to the citizens of Peabody.

The report of the Lyceum and Library Committee and its sub-committees, together with that of its Treasurer and the Treasurer of the Trustees, give the matters so much in detail that little remains to be said without involving needless repetition.

It is gratifying to note an increase in the circulation of books over the preceding year, of some two thousand volumes, showing that there is no growing lack of appreciation by our citizens, of the exceptional privilege enjoyed by them in having a library of over thirty-three thousand volumes, free to all residents of the town over fourteen years of age.

The lessening rates of interest on investments have led the Trustees, in pursuance of a wise, conservative policy, and from a desire not to encroach heavily upon the income from the Reserve Fund, to somewhat reduce the appropriations for the year now closing. This has been done in such a manner, it is believed, as not to impair the efficiency of any branch of the service, and probably has not been apparent to the general public. Some

improvements—desirable, but not absolutely necessary—must await a more favorable time before being carried out.

The invested funds of the Institute now amount to \$196,837.16.

The Trustees desire to speak in terms of commendation of the services of the Librarian, his Assistants, and the Janitor.

LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

TO THE LYCEUM AND LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

The report of the Peabody Library Committee for the year ending January 30, 1897, is respectfully submitted.

On account of a decreased appropriation for library purposes, the Committee at the very outset of the year felt called upon to exercise unusual care and discrimination in the purchase of books. While it is believed that the Library has in no sense suffered in

the essentials, it is fair to say that at no time have the merits of individual publications been so carefully weighed, nor the character of each book in relation to the Library and the needs of the public, so thoroughly discussed. In some respects this has proved a good discipline to the Committee, and the condition has not been without its compensation. In many cases the merits of important works were discussed in advance of publication, and the cost, beforehand measured with the estimated monthly allowance.

While all the departments have received timely accessions, many have been specially strengthened, and sets hitherto incomplete have been filled out.

The number of books purchased during the year was only seventy-three less than that of the previous year, which is explained by the policy of the Committee—that costly publications should be avoided unless deemed indispensable.

The circulation of the Library for the year is 31,000; an increase of more than 2,000 over the previous one.

This, in the face of many unusual distractions, notably a political campaign of unparalleled intensity and duration, is satisfactory and somewhat surprising. Neither has there been any effort at padding, to increase the number of books distributed,

nor has the practice been adopted of giving to every borrower a book of solid or serious character in addition to a work of fiction.

These figures fail to indicate the amount of research daily going on in the Library, nor do they note the numerous consultations on questions of local and colonial history, general Americana, as well as in science, biography, and the higher walks of literature. There are many visits made, especially to the Reading Room, in the afternoons, which are never enumerated, but which have a bearing and a pertinence entirely in accord with the spirit and objects of the Institute.

The percentage of fiction as compared with what might be called the more solid literary product, is a source of gratification, and is less than that shown by the tables of most public Libraries throughout the country. Then, too, the character of the fiction sought for by the average reader, has steadily ascended in literary excellence, and as a rule, the better the book, the greater the popular demand.

The Reading Room has been well patronized, although the effect of outside attractions obviously have their effect on this department. Still there are patrons whose attendance no allurements seem to diminish, and whose earnestness, and obvious desire for study and improvement give a character and tone to the whole room.

The entire number making use of the Reading Room during the year was 6,868, a very slight decrease from last year.

In conclusion it may be safely said that the Peabody Library is fulfilling its function, and that as a medium of education its influence is growing wider and more potent throughout the community.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE EBEN DALE
SUTTON REFERENCE LIBRARY.

TO THE LYCEUM AND LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

The report of the Librarian of the Eben Dale Sutton Reference Library for the past year shows the addition of twenty-four bound volumes, one hundred and sixty-nine numbers of unbound serials, and that thirty-three volumes of serials have been bound. The number of consultations, 368, is somewhat less than that of last year, and the falling off has been almost wholly in the department of Art, while the departments of History, Natural History, Biography and Botany, show a considerable increase.

The Committee, realizing that the real value of any library depends largely on the readiness with which its contents can be made available, and feeling that the Library had outgrown its present catalogue, decided early in the year to have a card catalogue of the Library prepared. The work on this catalogue is now nearing completion, and when finished it cannot but be of great assistance to those making consultations.

It has been the policy of the Committee this year to make a speciality of books on early American history. Among the more important works added in this line are, "Christopher Columbus, Facsimile of his own Book of Privileges, 1502;" copy of the "Charter of Massachusetts Bay Colony, 1759;" "Washingtonia;" "The Journal of Capt. Wm. Pote, Jr.;" and three volumes of "The Jesuit Relations and Allied Documents;" the last being the first volumes of a series of about sixty to be published, and is a complete collection of the reports made by the Jesuit missionaries who were the explorers of a large part of the American continent. This work is of special value, as much of the material has never been published, and there being but one copy, of some parts of the work, in existence.

The need of additional drawer room for the more valuable volumes being imperative, twenty-five new drawers were put into the back bookcase. If these additions can be continued for a few years, the needs of the Library will be fully complied with, and the expense so distributed as to be easily met.

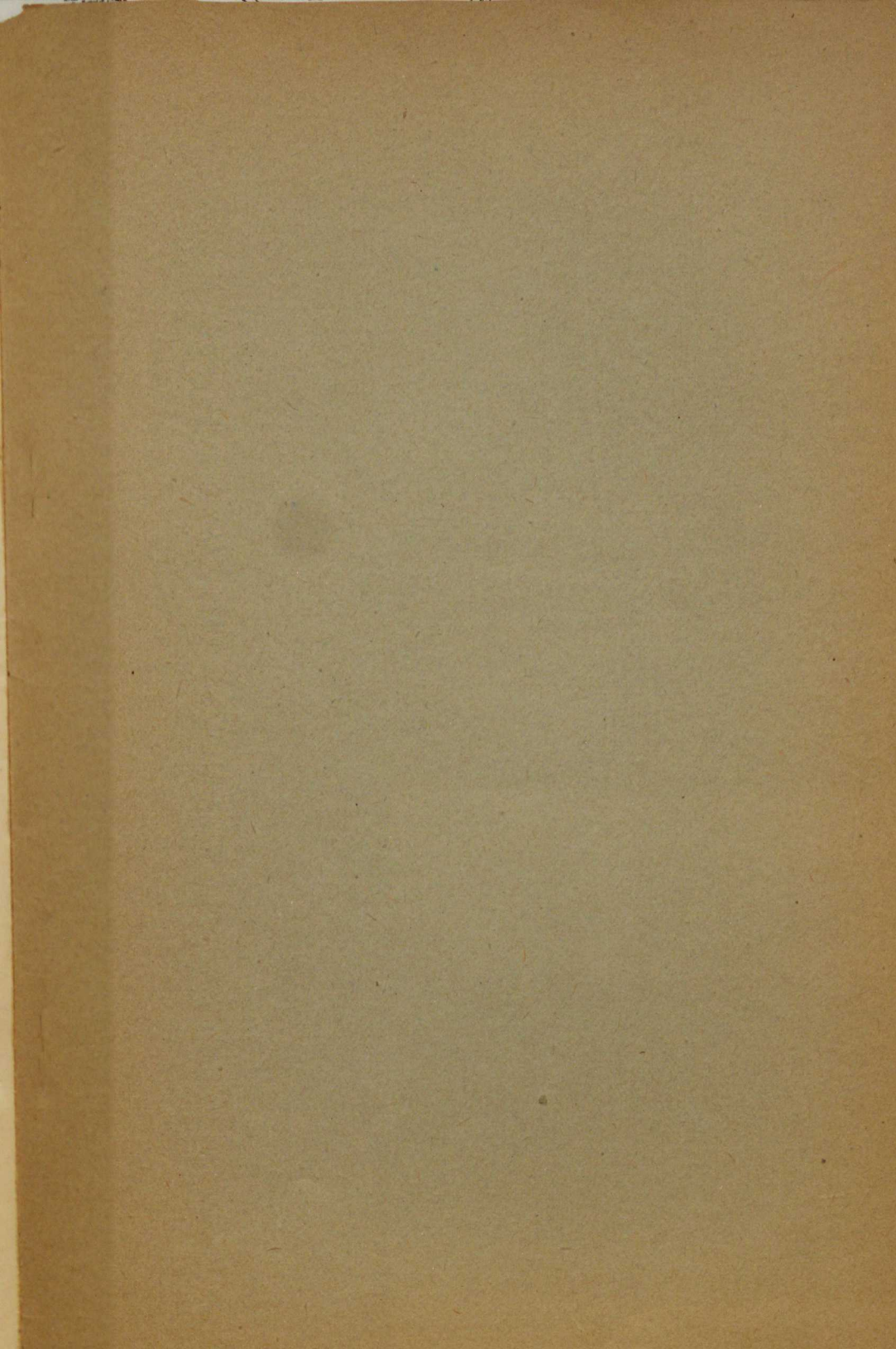
