MOST L-G UNIVERSITIES ON ELECTRONIC MAIL

Nearly all State Extension Service directors and nearly half the State Experiment Station directors were on the USDA-land grant university electronic mail network by the end of 1981.

According to information provided by Jerry Paulsen, cooperative systems mail network coordinator, 44 state extension services and 23 state agricultural experiment stations were on the system provided by Dialcom, Inc.

Minnesota, with 57, has the largest number of mailboxes on the system. Missouri has 41 and Pennsylvania has 20.

Other land grant universities have 15 or less mailboxes, with many having only 1 or 2.

Only about 10 of the 281 electronic mailboxes on the system belong to land grant university information offices, according to Paulsen's report.

The electronic cooperative systems mail network was launched by USDA's Science and Education agencies in the spring of 1981 (see INSIDE INFORMATION June 5, 1981).
