## Charles Haines Named Assistant Provost

Charles W. Haines, Fairport, has been appointed assistant provost at Rochester Institute of Technology, Dr. Todd Bullard provost and vice president for academic affairs, announced this week.

Dr. Haines, 34, head of the mathematics department and an associate professor in mathematics, has been at RIT for two and one-half years. Prior to that he was on the faculty of Clarkson College of Technology in Potsdam.



Dr. Bullard said Haines' new position will involve a "range of administrative duties," but will have particular emphasis on "forward planning with special focus on academic affairs...(requiring) the development of planning models adequate to permit forecasting of resource commitments and needs, and a continuing update of the existing master plan." He said Haines will assume many of the responsibilities formerly handled by the Vice President for Instructional Development and Planning.

In addition, Dr. Bullard said, Haines will provide leadership in curriculum development, preparation of a systems approach to information gathering and distribution, and general assistance to the provost in accomplishment of special projects.

Dr. Haines holds an M.S. and a Ph.D. in applied mathematics from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, and an A.B. from Earlham College in Richmond, Ind.

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# Skating Show Planned In November

Champion skaters and members of the Genesee Figure Skating Club will grace the newly remodeled ice rink at the Rochester War Memorial during "Memories in Music" at 2 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 18.

Sponsored by the Genesee Figure Skating Club and sanctioned by the United States Figure Skating Association (USFSA), the annual skating event benefits RIT, the Olympic Fund and the USFSA Memorial Fund.

Guest stars who will perform include Gordon McKellen, U.S. National Men's Champion and Olympic and World Competitor; Johnny Johns, U.S. National Dance Champion and World Competitor, performing with his dance partner, Mary Karen Campbell. Johns will also be skating a pair number with his new pair partner, Melissa Militano, who was U.S. National Pair Champion and World Competitor last year with her brother Mark (now retired).

Other performers will be Dorothy Hamill, U.S. Silver Medalist, runner-up to Janet Lynn and World Competitor; and Jane Pankey and Richard Horne, World Roller Dance Champions, Bronze Medalists in U.S. Championships and Eastern Dance Champions.

In addition to skating by the guest stars, there will be eight productions with about 150 members of the Genesee Figure Skating Club.

Featured in the club's productions will be F. Ritter Shumway of Brighton, with his dance partner Harlene Lee of Henrietta; Dee Oseroff of Brighton, who will be dancing with Jeff Platzler of Fort Wayne, Ind.; Scott Gregory of Skaneateles, who will perform a solo and a dance with Michelle Cerami of Erie, Pa.

Richard Callaghan and Dale Lynne, professionals at the Skating Club, will also be performing.

The theme of the club's production will be "Then and Now." It will be broken down into themes from the various decades of this century: 20s, Charleston; 30s, Shirley Temple for the Juniors and Marathon Dance for the Seniors; 40s, Glenn Miller; 50s, Elvis Presley; 60s, Beatles, and 70s, today. In addition, there will be a Western number, "49 ers."

Norma Leone of Pittsford and Roma Arazy of Pittsford are producers of the show for the third consecutive year.

Tickets for the once-only performance will be \$3, \$4, and \$5. They will be on

## Talisman To Hold First Amateur Film Festival

Amateur filmmakers within a 100-mile radius of Rochester are invited to enter their films in RIT's first annual amateur film festival.

The festival will be held in January, 1974, by RIT's Talisman Film Festival, the student-sponsored annual film series. An exact date will be set later this year.

Talisman Director Steve Miller said the festival is designed to fill a local need for an amateur film festival that provides "more than just an evening of polite viewing."

He said the RIT festival is designed to offer the public a chance to see the amateur films, "and thus give the films recognition beyond other directors."

The rules of the contest are: 16mm films only; color or black and white; 2-hour maximum length; sound films must be magnetic or optical; all entries must be received by January 10, 1974.

First prize for a sound film is \$250; second prize is \$150. First prize for a silent film is \$125; second prize is \$75.
