ABSTRACT OF FUR LAWS, 1944-45

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The tabulations in this leaflet of the open seasons for 1944-45 on fur animal and the summaries of the provisions of State and Provincial laws concerning possession, sale, shipment, export, and licenses have been prepared primarily to aid Federal officials in conducting investigations under the Lacey Act and enforcing its provisions and to answer inquiries of State game officials, trappers, and other interested persons. Every effort has been made to have the summaries correct, but the trapping seasons in many States and Provinces being subject to change by order or regulations of the respective conservation authorities, it would be well for trappers and others concerned to apply direct to the proper agency for the latest information on State and Provincial laws, orders, and regulations before engaging in trapping or other activities involving fur animals or parts thereof.

THE FEDERAL LACEY ACT

An act of Congress of May 25, 1900 (31 Stat. 187), as amended, known as the Lacey Act, provides, among other things, that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, or association to deliver or knowingly receive for shipment, transportation, or carriage, or to ship, transport, or carry, by any means whatever from any State, Territory, or the District of Columbia to, into, or through any other State, Territory, or the District of Columbia, or to a foreign country, any wild animal, or the dead body or part thereof, imported from any foreign country contrary to any law of the United States, or captured, killed, taken, purchased, sold, or possessed contrary to any such law, or captured, killed, taken, shipped, transported, carried, purchased, sold, or possessed contrary to the law of any State, Territory, or the District of Columbia, or foreign country or State, Province or other subdivision thereof in which it was captured, killed, taken, purchased, sold, or possessed, or in which it was delivered or knowingly received for shipment, transportation, or carriage, or from which it was shipped, transported, or carried or to transport, bring, or convey by any means whatever, from any foreign country into the United States any wild animal, or the dead body or part thereof, captured, killed, taken, shipped, transported, or carried contrary to the law of the foreign country, or State, Province, or other subdivision thereof, in which it was captured, killed, taken, delivered, or knowingly received for shipment, transportation, or carriage, or from which it was shipped, transported, or carried. The act further provides that no person, firm, corporation, or association purchasing or receiving any wild animal, or the dead body or part thereof, imported from any foreign country or shipped, transported, or carried in interstate commerce, shall make any false record or render any account that is false in reference thereto.

An amendment of June 15, 1935 (49 Stat. 380), confers upon employees of The Department of the Interior authorized to enforce the act (in accordance with Reorganization Plan No. 2, transferring certain functions from the Department of Agriculture), power to arrest any person committing a violation of any provision of the act in his presence or view, and also, under warrant, authority to search for and seize any wild animals or the dead bodies or parts thereof shipped, transported, or carried in violation of the act.

An amendment of June 19, 1939 (53 Stat. 840), provides that all packages or containers, except those from foreign countries, in which the furs, hides, or skin of wild animals are shipped, transported, or carried shall be plainly and clearly marked or labeled on the outside thereof with the names and addresses of the shipper and the consignee.

Possession and sale.--Possession of furs, skins, or pelts by trapper, fur buyer, or dealer longer than 20 days after the close of the season is illegal, unless permission to keep furs longer has been granted by the Department of Conservation before the expiration of the 20-day period. No restrictions on sale of skins legally taken and on which State tax has been paid.

Shipment and export.--No restrictions on skins legally taken and on which State tax has been paid.

Licenses.--Resident, \$2.50. A nonresident is not permitted to trap. Fur buyer or trader must obtain a license based on gross sales of the preceding year, the minimum cost of license being \$25.

Note.—None of the fur animals named above may be taken at any time in any national park, monument, or posted national forest area, nor in the Shoemaker Bay, Haines, Salchaket, Curry Game Refuge, Eyak Lake, Mitkof Island, Mt. Hayes-Blair Lakes Refuge, and Afognak Island areas described in the regulations nor in other areas specifically closed therein.

No open season on any fur animal in fur district 3 north and east of the Kupreanof Straits-Afognak Islands group.

There are also certain other areas, defined in the regulations, in which no fur animals may be trapped.

Bag limit.—Beaver, 10 a season.

Trapping methods.—Any means, except by means, aid, or use of a set gun of any description, a shotgun, artificial light of any kind, steel bear trap, or other trap with jaws having a spread exceeding 9 inches, poison, dog (except for polar bears in fur district 8, and wolves and coyotes in fur districts 5, 6, 7, and 8), fish traps, any trap set within 25 feet of a beaver house of den, or within 100 feet of a fox den, or destruction or disturbance of homes, houses, dens, dams, or runways of such animals.

Possession and sale.—No restrictions on prime skins legally taken, except that beaver skins must be presented to a wildlife agent or other officer authorized by the Alaska Game Commission for sealing within 30 days after close of the open season, and marten skins for sealing at any time prior to October 31, 1944.

Shipment and export.—No restrictions on skins legally taken, but no person who is engaged in fur farming or is a fur dealer shall possess or transport furs without a license. Packages containing furs must be marked to show contents in detail and the names and addresses of consignors and consignees. Shipment of unsealed skins of beavers or martens is prohibited.

Licenses:

Resident.—Trapping, \$3. Trapping license is not required of native Indians or Eskimos, nor of residents under 16 years of age.  
Nonresident.—General hunting, trapping, and game fishing, \$50.  
Fur farm.—\$2.  
Alien.—Special hunting, trapping, and fishing, \$100.  
Fur dealer.—(a) Resident, \$10; or association or copartnership of residents organized under laws of the Territory, \$10 for each individual; (b) nonresident but citizen or national of the United States, or corporation, association, or copartnership composed of citizens or nationals of the United States organized under the laws of the Territory or of a State of the United States, any member of which is a nonresident, \$100; (c) Alien, or corporation, association, or copartnership not organized under laws of the Territory or of a State of the United States, any stockholder or member of which is an alien, \$500; (d) resident and agent in charge of a fur-dealer station under (a), (b), or (c), \$10; (e) nonresident but citizen or national of the United States and an agent in charge of a fur-dealer station under (a), (b), or (c), or nonresident citizen or national itinerant agent of such dealer, \$100; (f) alien and agent in charge of a fur-dealer station under (a), (b), or (c), or alien itinerant agent of such dealer, \$500. No license issued to any agent whose principal has not procured a license under (a), (b), or (c).

Possession and sale.--No restrictions on skins legally taken. Trappers are required to report catch by January 10, and traps must be tagged to show license number.

Shipment and export.--No restrictions on skins legally taken, but packages must be marked with the names and addresses of consignor and consignee and contain a statement of the contents. Parcel-post shipments are prohibited.

Licenses.--Resident, license required but no charge; nonresident, \$25; aliens are not permitted to trap.

ARKANSAS

Open seasons

Beaver, bear, otter . . . . . No open season.  
Bobcat, coyote, wolf . . . . . No closed season.  
Other fur animals, including fox . . . . . Dec. 1-Jan. 31.

Possession and sale.--Possession and sale of pelts taken in the State are prohibited except between December 1 and February 10. Fur buyer is required to obtain a permit to possess or sell pelts during the closed season and to file a report of pelts on hand February 10. He must also report the number and kinds of all furs purchased during the season and from whom each pelt or fur was purchased.

Shipment and export.--No restrictions, except that fur dealers must report shipments within or out of the State.

Licenses.--Resident, using 12 or less traps, \$1.50; using more than 12 traps, \$20. Nonresident, \$50. Fur dealer: resident, \$5; nonresident, \$50.

CALIFORNIA

Open seasons

Beaver (see note), sea otter . . . . . No open season.

Note.--Beavers when damaging levees or canals may be taken under special permit issued by the Fish and Game Commission.

Coyote, opossum, raccoon, ringtail, skunk, wolf . . . . . No closed season.  
Other fur animals . . . . . Nov. 16-Feb. 28

Note.--Trapping license (license year, July 1-June 30) is required for trapping martens, fishers, wolverines, minks; river otters, foxes, or muskrats for profit. Spike or sawtooth traps cannot be used.

Possession and sale.--No restrictions on skins legally taken.

Shipment and export.--No restrictions on skins legally taken.

Licenses.--Citizen, \$1; alien, \$2. Licensee must submit before July 1 a report of his catch, giving names and addresses of persons to whom pelts were sold or shipped.

COLORADO

Possession and sale.—Skins legally taken may be possessed during the open season and for 15 days thereafter. A permit is required for possession of skins by trapper and dealer after 30 days from close of season. These permits expire on September 1 of the year of issue, but may be renewed upon application before that date. The permit must accompany pelts sold by trapper, whether sold within or out of the State. If the trapper disposes of only part of the pelts covered by the permit, the original permit must accompany the pelts disposed of and an application made for a new permit to cover the remainder.

Shipment and export.—See Possession and sale. Licensed dealers are not required to obtain shipping permits for raw furs, but shipping tags provided by the State Game and Fish Commission must be attached to each bundle shipped, and each bundle must show name, address, and license number of shipper. Licensed trappers must obtain a shipping permit from the Commission for each shipment of furs out of the State. The permit must be attached to each bundle shipped and must show the number of each kind of pelt in the shipment, names of shipper and consignee, and license number of trapper. Licensed dealers must furnish the Commission, on or before June 30, a written report showing number and kinds of skins purchased from trappers and the amount paid.

Licenses.—Resident, \$2; nonresident, \$25. Fur dealer: resident, \$25; nonresident, \$50. The Commission may require licensees to submit such reports as it may deem necessary.

CONNECTICUT

Bag limits.--Rabbits and wild hares, 3 a day, 30 a season; squirrels (gray) 5 a day, 30 a season.

Possession and sale.--Fur dealer's license is required to buy raw furs produced in the State.

Shipment and export.--No restrictions on skins legally taken.

Licenses.--Resident 16 years of age or over: trapping, \$3.35; trapping and hunting, \$5.35; trapping, hunting, and fishing, \$7.35. Resident under 16, \$1.35. Nonresidents are not permitted to trap. Fur dealer: resident \$5; agent of licensed resident, \$2; nonresident, \$7.5.

DELAWARE

Note.--It is illegal to take muskrats in time of flood or freshet, or when they are driven from their dens or homes by flood or freshet, and illegal to take them by the method known as "nailing" or by the use of diving-box traps.

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Possession, sale, shipment, and export.--No restriction on skins legally taken, except that it is illegal to sell or export red foxes or red fox hides.

Licenses.--Resident hunting and trapping, \$1.25; nonresident hunting and trapping, \$15.50; special 5-day license, \$5.50. Fur dealer, \$5, required for purchasing all pelts except muskrat.

FLORIDA

Open seasons

Bear; bobcat, civet cat; fox, opossum, panther, skunk, weasel, wildcat . . . . .	No closed season.

Possession and sale.--Skins legally taken may be possessed bought, and sold during the open season and 30 days thereafter, but fur dealers may handle manufactured furs at any time.

Shipment and export.--Skins legally taken may be shipped and exported during the open season and 30 days thereafter. Packages must show name and address of trapper.

Licenses.--Resident: State-wide, \$25.50; county, \$3.25; county other than that of residence, \$10.50. License is not required of resident Confederate veterans or of other residents 65 years of age or over. Nonresident: State-wide, \$100.50; county, \$25.50. Applicants for licenses must report previous year's catch. Fur dealer: resident, \$100, and \$5 for each agent or traveling buyer; resident local dealer, \$10; nonresident, \$500, and \$100 for each agent or traveling buyer or acting as agent for nonresident buyer. Dealers and buyers must report every two weeks the names of trappers from whom pelts were purchased, their license numbers, and the number and kinds of pelts purchased.

GEORGIA

Possession and sale.—Prohibited during the closed season. Dealers must make such reports as may be required by the Division of Wildlife, Department of Natural Resources.

Shipment and export.—No restrictions on skins legally taken, except that the trapper must exhibit his license to the transportation agent when making shipments. Express companies must submit a report of fur shipments. Trappers and dealers must declare pelts in possession at the end of the season, and these declared pelts can be shipped at any time.

Licenses.—Resident, \$3; nonresident \$25. Fur dealer: resident \$10, and \$5 for each agent; nonresident, \$200, and \$5 for each resident or traveling agent.

Note.—The Director of the Department of Fish and Game may permit the taking of beavers and muskrats in the closed season when they are damaging irrigation ditches, canals, crops, and other property, but the pelts must be turned over to the Director for sale.

Possession and sale.—Skins legally taken may be possessed and sold at any time. It is illegal to possess without a permit fur animals or hides on which there is no open season.

Shipment and export.—No restrictions on skins legally taken.

Licenses.—Resident, \$5; nonresident, \$25; alien, \$50; fur buyer, \$3.

Possession and sale.—Possession of green hides is permitted during the open season and 20 days thereafter. Every person taking fur animals must make a sworn report each month to the Department of Conservation of all hides of fur animals taken, sold, shipped, or dealt in during November to February, inclusive, not later than the 5th day of the month succeeding that for which report is made. Fur buyers and tanners of green hides of fur animals are required to keep a record showing name, address, and license number of each person, within or without the State, from whom such hides are received, date of receipt, and prices paid, which record shall be open to inspection by officers of the Conservation Department, sheriffs, constables, or other police officer.

Shipment and export.—No restrictions on skins legally taken.

Licenses.—For each 25 traps or fraction thereof—resident, \$2; nonresident, \$10. Fur buyer, resident: wholesaler, \$50; retailer, \$10; traveling, \$10; fur buyer, nonresident, \$50; expiration date, January 31 of each year.

INDIANA

Open seasons

Beaver . . . . . No open season.  
Fox . . . . . No closed season.  
Mink, muskrat, opossum, raccoon, skunk . . . . . 12 noon Nov. 15-Jan. 15.

Limits.—Daily bag and possession limits on raccoon, 2.

Possession and sale.—Fresh skins legally taken may be possessed and disposed of 5 days after close of season. Licensed fur buyers may possess untanned hides taken in the open season 60 days after close of season, and for a longer period if report showing number and kinds of skins and place of storage is made to the Director of Conservation. No other restrictions on skins legally taken.

Shipment and export.—No restriction on skins legally taken, except that shipment must be labeled to show contents, and license must be exhibited to carrier.

Licenses.—Resident, \$1.50; nonresident, \$15.50. Fur buyer: resident, \$10; nonresident, \$25. Nonresident jobber to purchase from licensed buyers, \$10.

IOWA

Open seasons

Badger, civet cat, mink, muskrat, opossum, raccoon, skunk . . . Nov. 10-Jan. 10.  
Beaver, otter . . . . . No open season.

Note.—Beavers may be taken, under special permit, by landholder or his agent in areas where, after investigation, it is found they are doing damage. Pelts of beavers so taken must be tagged, such tag to remain attached until the pelt is processed.

Fox, weasel, wildcat, wolf . . . . . No closed season.

Note.—Open season dates are subject to change by administrative order of the State Conservation Commission.

Possession and sale.—Skins legally taken may be possessed and sold during the open season and 10 days thereafter, or for a longer period under permit of the Conservation Commission. Licensed dealer may possess at any time hides legally acquired. Special permit is required for trappers to ship, transport, or sell to dealers outside the State. Green hides in process of manufacture may be possessed at any time. Dealers or buyers must, within 15 days after close of season, file with the Conservation Commission a sworn inventory of the number and kinds of skins purchased.

Shipment and export.—See Possession and sale. Skins of protected fur animals legally taken may be exported under permit during the open season and the first 10 days of the closed season.
