International Postal Service

- 2. International Postal Services between Japan and all other nations will be operated in accordance with the Universal Postal Union Convention and Agreements and all other international or bilateral postal agreements to which Japan is now, or with approval of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers shall in the future become, a signatory, subject to provisions of references lb(l) to lb(5), inclusive, above, any other directives promulgated by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, applicable Japanese laws and regulations including, but not limited to those governing mail, customs, foreign exchange and foreign trade, and to instructions embodied herein.

- 3. The Japanese Government or any agency thereof is prohibited from corresponding with other governments, persons outside Japan or diplomatic missions and/or representatives in Japan, except as authorized in references 1b(1), (2), (4), and (5) above; and except that:
- a. The Japanese Government and/or agencies thereof are authorized to communicate with all international organizations to which Japan is now, or with approval of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers shall in the future become, a signatory, on administrative and fiscal matters necessary in the operation of such organizations.
- b. The Japanese Government, Ministry of Postal Services, is authorized to communicate with the International Bureau of the Universal Postal Union, foreign postal administrations, shipping companies and air lines on matters necessary in the operation of all postal services covered by international conventions or agreements to which Japan is signatory. Agreements or decisions to expand or contract services within these agreements will be subject to prior approval of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- c. The Philatelic Agency, Ministry of Postal Services, is authorized to communicate with persons abroad on philatelic matters and to export postage stamps, souvenir stamps and stamped paper on receipt of orders and payments therefor.
- d. The Japanese Government and/or agencies thereof are authorized to send and receive manuscripts or publications covering results of scientific research and activity and to correspond with persons outside Japan on matters contained in such manuscripts or publications.
- e. The Japanese Government and/or agencies thereof are authorized to communicate with foreign government patent offices on procedures, administrative matters, laws and regulations concerning copyrights and industrial property registrations, and to send and receive publications related to same.
- 4. The mailing of "relief" or "gift" parcels to Japan only is authorized, in addition to regular parcel post service under international agreements, subject to the following provisions:
  - a. Weight limited to 22 pounds or 10 kilograms.
- b. Contents restricted to assorted non-perishable foods, clothing, clothes-making materials and mailable medicines, in non-commercial quantities, for the personal use of the recipient and his

(See Annex I attached for list of permissible quantities.) c. Indorsements - wrappers of such parcels must be indorsed "Relief Parcel" or "Gift Parcel." d. Customs - parcels complying with the provisions of paragraphs 4a, b and c above will be admitted duty free but will be subject to customs examination and a customs clearance fee. e. Parcels containing assorted food items, not exceeding the weight limit, will not be considered as being in commercial quantities. f. Parcels found to contain clothing or clothes-making materials in commercial quantities will not be permitted entry duty free but will be treated in the same manner as regular parcels, in accordance with applicable international agreements and Japanese laws and regulations. g. Parcels found to contain mailable medicines in commercial quantities will be treated as undeliverable. h. Parcels found to contain gift articles, as distinguished from relief items, such as watches, fountain pens, tobacco products, soap, etc., or any article other than those listed in paragraph 4b above, will be delivered only on payment of applicable customs duties, taxes and/or penalties that may be assessed. Failure of addressees to pay same will cause entire parcel to be treated as undeliverable. i. All parcels must be accompanied by appropriate Customs Declarations, containing full and precise details as to contents. 5. All international mails will be made available for examination, in accordance with instructions issued by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. 6. Except as otherwise authorized by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, settlement of accounts between Japan and other countries, shipping lines and air lines will be in terms of dollars or pounds sterling, subject to provisions of the Foreign Exchange and Foreign Trade Control Law of 1949, Japan. Information of General Application Pertaining to Directive SUBJECT: Number SCAPIN 2110, AG 311.1 (29 Jun 50 )CCS, this Headquarters, 29 Jun 50, subject: International Postal Service

- 1. With reference to subject memorandum, the following is published for the information of all concerned.
- 2. International Postal Services between Japan and all other nations was governed by SCAPIN 1900 which had been amended by 13 subsequent SCAPINS, making it lengthy, complicated and cumbersome. It also contained many specially imposed SCAP restrictions, which were beyond those normally imposed by international postal conventions and agreements.
  - 3. Subject SCAPIN was issued to provide for:
- a. Removal of special restrictions, in accordance with current SCAP policy, and return of international postal services to normalcy, to the greatest extent practicable under present conditions.
- b. Consolidation of international mail regulations in one SCAPIN, in place of fourteen as formerly.
  - 4. The following results have been accomplished:
- a. With minor exceptions, international postal services are practically normal for private persons. Most remaining restrictions are imposed by the world monetary situation over which neither SCAP nor the Japanese have any control.
- b. The Ministry of Postal Services will settle its accounts direct with other nations, shipping companies and airlines, subject to provisions of Japanese laws and international agreements, instead of through the Treasury Trust Fund or SCAP Commercial Account.
- c. Restrictions on communications between the Japanese Government and persons outside Japan, as imposed by SCAPIN 677 and other SCAP directives, have been retained, with the exception of the additional specific authorizations contained in paragraph 3 of subject SCAPIN.
- d. "Gift" or "Relief" parcels a class of service not recognized in international postal conventions and agreements - are still permitted entry into Japan duty free when they conform to certain standards. Otherwise, the receipt and dispatch of parcels will be governed by Japanese laws and international agreements.
