We have seen schools in all parts of the country, but can truthfully say we have never seen any, where there has been a finer spirit of co-operation between teachers and pupils, nor more unselfish devotion on the part of teachers, than in the Narberth schools. When we think of the lasting impressions made on the minds of our children in this formative period in their lives, we should be thankful that they are surrounded by such ennobling influences and examples.

Recognition of the high standing and general excellence of Narberth public schools by educational authorities of the State, is highly gratifying to our citizens. A very recent evidence of this is the election of the president of our Board of Education, Mr. C. Howard McCarter, as vice-president of the Pennsylvania State Educational Association. Mr. McCarter has been one of the delegates to the conventions of the directors' department of this association for the past seven or eight years. His election to the vice-presidency of the association is additional as delegate, and to his broad views on all of the problems that arise in the conduct of our public school system, acquired by many years of experience and careful study of conditions. Another evidence is the recent visit to Narberth of Mr. Kast, a representative of the State Board of Education. The State Board is fully advised of the conditions existing in Narberth, not only as to the high efficiency of its board of directors and faculty. but as to the absolute inadequacy of its plant. Mr. Kast is an architect of wide experience, whose business is to visit school plants in all parts of the State. He not only made a thorough survey of our plant, but studied its location, with reference to the needs of the borough, and interviewed a number of citizens, to obtain some idea as to the causes or the "deadlock" that has prevented necessary increase in accommodations. This visit will doubtless be followed by recommendations to the board. Whatever these recommendations may be, it is hoped our citizens will get together and do something to afford relief to overcrowded children and overworked teachers.






