# TREATY MAY BE PUT INTO FORCE IN DECEMBER

## **REVOLUTIONISTS WERE** BEATEN BY KOLCHAK'S MEN IN VLADIVOSTOK

Tried For Two Days to Upset Existing Order of Things But Kolchak's Troops Retained Government Even May Have Control: Allies Did Not Interfere

Vladivostok, Nov. 18.—Delayed.—Revolutionary forces which for two days had attempted to obtain control of this city were completely defeated by Government troops to-day. General Gaida, the revolutionary leader, was wounded and captured and his followers were driven from every point of vantage by Government troops.

Shortly after midnight Government troops moved two three-inch field guns into position on the Svetlandskaia Bridge, by which the main thoroughfare of the city crosses the Siberian Railroad. The bridge is only 500 yards north of the station, the strongest position of the rebels. A little later, troops, reinforced by 100 cades from the naval training school, proceeded to the business centre of the city, while armored cars began arriving at the bridge.

Fire was opened at a clock on the station from the field guns on the Syetlandskaia Bridge. Later the fighting became general with the revolutionists falling back everwhere and finally being driven from the station.

## SHIP IN DISTRESS EAST OF NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 20.—"S. O. S." calls were received here by the coast-guard office this morning from the steamship Roman, bound from New York for Marseilles. Later information received through radio by the Naval Department here was that the steering gear of the Roman had become defective and that the ship was being buffeted by rough seas produced by a high northerly wind.



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#### REFUSES TO RATIFY.

The refusal of the United States Senate to ratify the peace treaty will be deplored by the whole civilized world, and by none more acutely, we are convinced, than by a great majority of the people of the republic. The treaty in many important respects is the product of recommendations and suggestions made by the official spokesmen of the United States in the Paris Conference; it is based largely upon the "fourteen points" set forth by the President, and contains certain fundamental principles explicitly advocated by him long before the Peace Conference, notably the League of Nations covenant. Now, although it has been ratified by all the other Great Powers among the Allies, the Treaty is thrown over by the chief legislative body of the country which played so conspicuous a part in its negotiation and completion.

The principal opposition to the treaty is inspired by political motives. Opponents such as Lodge, Johnson and Borah are more perturbed over the prospects of the next presidential election than over the much more important problem of world reconstruction. By bringing about the rejection of the treaty they believe they are discrediting the President and through the President the Democratic Party. This is not to say that all opposition to the treaty in the Senate is political, for it is opposed by some prominent Senators on conviction and principle, but the leaders of the lize with a return to party Government. Property Owners to Ask Government For More Equitable Distribution

Eighty-five per cent. of the taxes of municipalities are paid by property owners, declared C. T. Crossyesterday afternoon at the meeting in the Belmont House, of property holders to discuss the municipal tax situation, preparatory to the opening to-day of the municipal inquiry at the Parliament Buildings.

"The present financial position of the city cannot continue indefinitely," said Mr. Cross. "At the summer tax sale ninety-five per cent. of the property offered reverted to the city. If this condition goes on the city will soon be the owner of half the land within its limits.

"The Provincial Government will simply have to give relief so that one class of the community does not pay the whole burden of taxation."

Te told of the owner of property assessed at \$4,000, which the municipality wanted to buy. The owner said he would sell at the assessed value. But the municipality replied the property was not worth that much, but they would pay a quarter of that price for it.





# **INVESTIGATION OF** TAKES A NEW TURI

School Board Now Has Four Reports on Matter; Last One Favorable

Investigation of the efficiency of e High School teaching staff took a new turn last night when the School Board received a report on the matter from Inspector Sullivan. This report, according to members of the Board, indicated that everything was satisfactory in the school which has been the storm centre of School Board debate for some months. The document was laid on the table for future consideration and, meanwhile, trustees are still wondering why they should have three different reports on the city's premier educational institution.

It will be recalled that, following last summer, Trustee R. W. Perry was successful in securing an investigation into the efficiency of the High School teachers' staff. This investigation was carried out by Inspector De Long, whose first report, it was later divulged at a stormy session of the Board, was distinctly unfavorably to the teachers. In fact, some of the trustees stated that it hardly gave any teacher a mark of credit.

Inspector De Long later made a

some of the trustees stated that it hardly gave any teacher a mark of credit.

Inspector De Long later made a second report on the same subject, and, according to the trustees, so modified his first critical opinion that the second report amounted to a veritable contradiction of the first. So mystified was the Board over the difference of these reports that it asked the Education Department to have Mr. Sullivan make a further report on the matter. This report was presented last night.

The report, like those of Mr. De Long's, was not read at the Board, but was laid before the trustees. Members of the Board will be able to go into it thoroughly, but they refusced to allow the document to be published, though it came before the Board when it was in regular session. The trustees, however, told the press representatives that the report was distinctly favorable to the school. It was stated further that the report confirmed that made some time ago by Municipal Inspector Paul. As Mr. De Long's first report was acknowledged to be unfavorable to the teachers, apparently Mr. Sullivan's is very different from it. The Board thus has four reports on the matter upon which to base its conclusions. First there is that made by Mr. Paul, Mr. De Long's first very critical report, this second less critical one, and, lastly, Mr. Sullivan's favorable report, which agrees with Mr. Paul's. The Board must make a choice in the matter.

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


