CONSTITUTION FOR EGYPT PROMISED

The British Government Also Promises Local Self-Government to Malta

London, Nov. 20.—A constitution for Egypt and local self-government for Malta, both of which were announced yesterday, are designed to meet the unrest in those countries, which have been demanding the application to themselves of the theories of self-determination and the rights of smaller nationalities.

The extreme Egyptian Nationalists have raised the banner of complete independence, like the Sinn Fein, and Cairo messages yesterday said the Cabinet had resigned as an answer to Field Marshal Allenby's statement of the British plans.

One of the Egyptian complaints has been that Great Britain has published its intention to maintain a protectorate, but has kept the Egyptians in the dark regarding what is meant by a protectorate and how it is to be carried out. Great Britain's action in preventing an Egyptian Nationalist Delegation from going to the Paris Conference to present grievances has been another cause for complaint.

Too Busy.

The Government's justification against the charges of neglecting Egypt has been the enormous load of other matters on its hands.

The Milner Commission, which is to investigate the cause of unrest in Egypt, has not yet started, and the natives threaten to boycott it and refuse to give information.

Malta was in a state of tumult for several weeks during the summer, but there were no casualties, and little news of the movement, there has reached the United Kingdom. Small attention has been paid to other events.

Another report in The Times states that a group of the Burmese, with the support of former British-Burman officials, have begun an agitation to have Burma included in the new measures of self-government which the Montagu scheme will give India.

The statement by Field-Marshal Allenby referred to above was issued in Cairo nearly a week ago, the next being as follows:

"The policy of Great Britain in Egypt is to preserve the autonomy of the country under British protection and develop a system of self-government under an Egyptian ruler. The object of Great Britain is to defend Egypt against all external dangers of interference by any foreign power and at the same time establish a constitutional system in which, under

TEN PERSONS WERE KILLED IN CAIRO

120 Injured During Riots; Three Police Stations Set on Fire

Cairo, Nov. 18.—Via London, Nov. 20.—Ten persons were killed and 120 injured, ninety of whom suffered gunshot wounds, in a riotous demonstration which continued here all day to-day. The disorder was the most serious since the disturbances last March and April.

Three police stations were set on fire by mobs, which liberated prisoners and paraded the streets carrying wounded rioters.

Vladivostok, Nov. 18.—The 68,000 rifles which an American detachment was conveying by train from Vladivostok to Admiral Kolchak's forces at Irkutsk, went through intact to that city despite the demand of General Semenov, the Cossack commander in Central Siberia, that 15,000 of the rifles be handed over to him en route.

BOLSHEVIKI BUSY NOW IN TURKISTAN AND AFGHANISTAN

London, Nov. 20.—The British authorities have received disturbing reports of Bolsheviki activities in Turkistan and Afghanistan. Tashkent, capital of the general government of Russian Turkistan, is the centre for classes of instruction, where Bolsheviki emissaries are trained and taught various languages before undertaking missions farther east.

CANADA AND SOLDIERS.

Montreal, Nov. 20.—"I am simply astounded at what is being done in this country for the returned soldiers."

This was the verdict of Hon. Robert Hunter, of Queensland, Australia, a member of the Hughes Cabinet, who is in charge of the land settlement and re-establishment work in that country.

Mr. Hunter is in Canada studying its system of dealing with returned soldiers' problems.

BELGIAN SOCIALISTS.

Brussels, Nov. 20.—Support to all democratic elements in Parliament by the Labor Party for the realization of constitutional revision and the inauguration of a democratic programme was pledged in resolutions passed by a large majority at a Socialist meeting here yesterday. The resolutions suggested that the programme be considered before a new Cabinet is chosen, and the Social Congress which will meet November 29 will decide on this question.

WAR ON SWINDLERS STARTS IN NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 20.—Assistant District-Attorney Dooling announced yesterday afternoon the opening of a campaign to rid New York's financial district of a gang of alleged swindlers. Joseph and Solomon Sugarman, lawyers, were arrested upon Dooling's orders for grand larceny for presenting an alleged fraudulent draft for \$3,500 on Frank Barton, Ltd., of Toronto, at the Italian Discount & Trust Company here September 28 and immediately drawing \$4,800 against it.

"The hub of a gigantic swindle is in the financial district here," said Mr. Dooling. "It has spokes that radiate in every direction. We expect to unearth the whole scheme and break up the swindlers."

The Sugarman were arraigned in the Tombs court and held in \$5,000 bonds each for examination Friday.

**UNION CLUB WILL
GIVE BALL FRIDAY**

First Big Social Event Since
1913; 450 Guests Ex-
pected

In the days of social gaiety which preceded the war, the Union Club was the home of many brilliant functions, the members frequently throwing open the door to entertain on a lavish scale. The last of these functions was held in 1913 when Admiral (then Captain) Lionel Halsey, who accompanied the Prince of Wales on his recent visit to this city, was visiting these shores in his ship the New Zealand, and with his officers, was the guest of honor at a ball given by the club members.

After being socially dormant for a period of six years during which many of the members have been overseas or, in case of the older men, engaged in war work, the club is again to renew its activity in this direction, the rejuvenation to be marked with a ball to be held on Friday evening. Invitations have been sent out and it is anticipated that about 450 dancers, representative of the leading social set, will be in attendance at the affair.

Realizing that the music is the main feature at a dance, the committee in charge of the arrangements has secured the services of Professor Heaton and his fourteen-piece orchestra, which later in the evening will be augmented to eighteen pieces, so that devotees of dancing will be assured of excellent music. There will be no interval for supper, but light refreshments will be served throughout the evening. The General Officer Command Military District No. 11 has given permission to officers attending this function to wear uniform, blue dress or khaki with slacks if they so desire.

**SAY ONLY ONE IN
SIX HERE PAY TAXES**

Property Owners to Ask Gov-
ernment For More Equit-
able Distribution

Eighty-five per cent. of the taxes of municipalities are paid by property owners, declared C. T. Cross yesterday afternoon at the meeting in the Belmont House, of property holders to discuss the municipal tax situation, preparatory to the opening to-day of the municipal inquiry at the Parliament Buildings.

"The present financial position of the city cannot continue indefinitely," said Mr. Cross. "At the summer tax sale ninety-five per cent. of the property offered reverted to the city. If this condition goes on the city will soon be the owner of half the land within its limits."

"The Provincial Government will simply have to give relief so that one class of the community does not pay the whole burden of taxation."

He told of the owner of property assessed at \$4,000, which the municipality wanted to buy. The owner said he would sell at the assessed value. But the municipality replied the property was not worth that much, but they would pay a quarter of that price for it.

One Taxpayer in Six.

"Victoria with a population of 50,000 has only 8,000 taxpayers," said F. Landsberg asking for a more equitable distribution of tax burdens.

Charles F. Heaven told of the "herd of speculators" who bought unimproved property and got bit when the boom collapsed and now "they want to soak the people who put up buildings." Mr. Cross pointed out that Victoria had voted against the taxation of improvements and on this guarantee modern buildings had been put up.

Wants One Income Tax.

"Frankly I don't think the Legislature has given the municipalities a fair deal," said M. B. Jackson, K.C., M.P.P., chairman of the Private Bills Committee of the Legislature. "The basis of taxation generally must be broadened. There should be one organization to collect the income taxes and the revenue derived should be distributed between the Dominion, the Province and the municipality on a basis mutually agreed upon. There should be a tax upon profits, as some of our wealthiest citizens don't happen to own property and therefore escape taxation."

Alderman Cameron declared the Provincial Government must be told clearly and frankly that the city must have access to new sources of income.

Says Union is Illegal.

Ex-Judge Harrison after denouncing acts of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities as illegal, asserted things were getting into such a state in Victoria that the city will either have to appoint a receiver or drop its incorporation.

"I have no sympathy with the man who doesn't pay his taxes," said F. A. McDiarmid, solicitor for the Union. "If I had my way, I'd charge twenty-five per cent. instead of the fifteen per cent. in the present penalty clause."

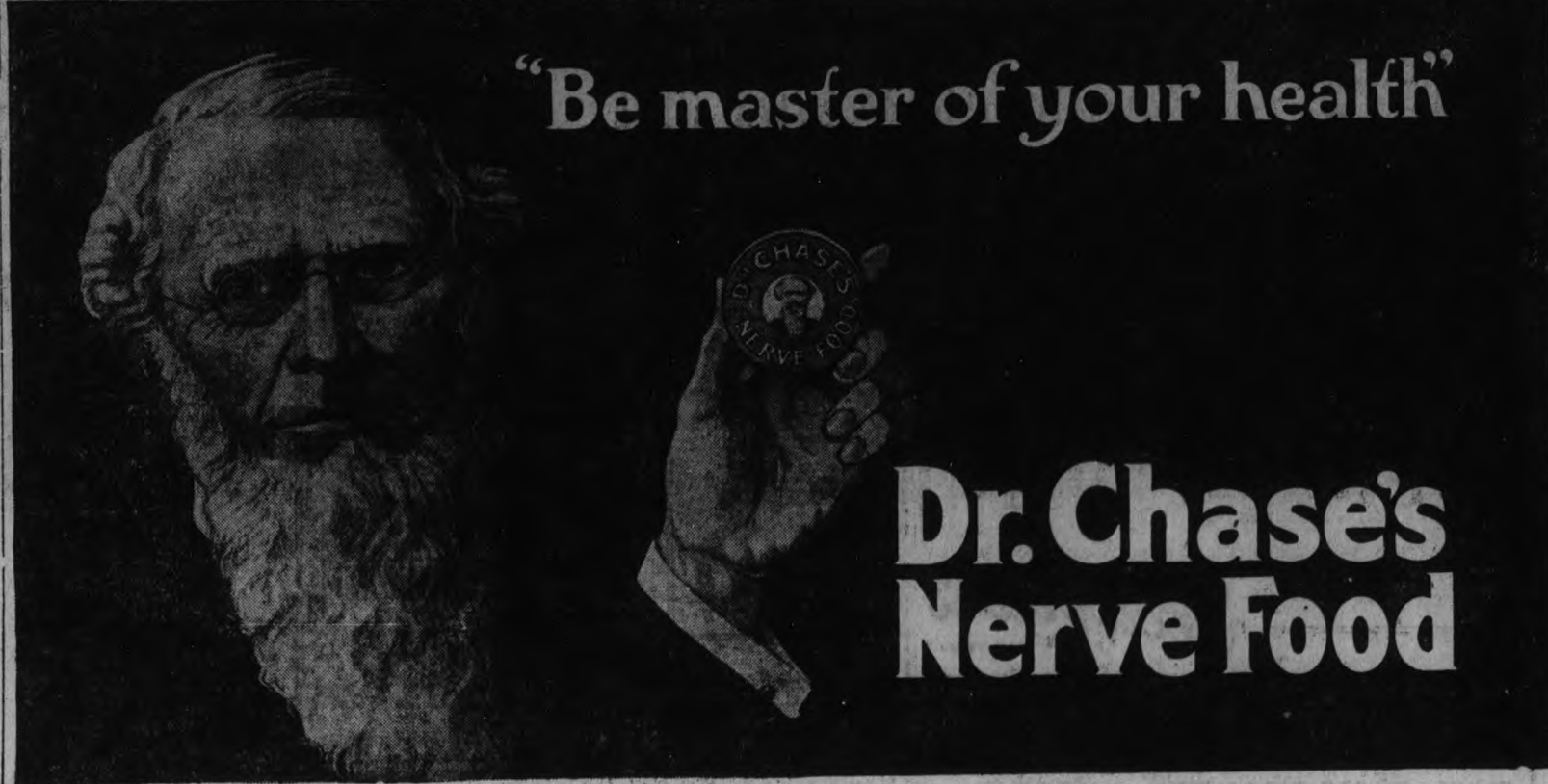

FEAR UNION FUNDS GOING TO O. B. U.

Trades Council to Probe Suspicion Defence Money Is Used for Propaganda

To discover to just what extent funds of the legitimate international labor organization are being siphoned through to the coffers of the One Big Union for the advancement of their propaganda which is opposed to that of the international unions, is to be the object of an investigation by the executive of the Victoria Trades and Labor Council.

A. S. Wells, of Vancouver, of the B. C. section of the Defence Committee for the Winnipeg strike leaders now on trial, sent a letter to the Council last night explaining the plan of raising a "Liberty Bond" issue of \$75,000 for the Winnipeg defence. Under this scheme, Eastern Canada is expected to contribute \$50,000 and the Western Provinces \$25,000. But of this \$25,000, British Columbia is set down for \$20,000.

Christian Silvert, secretary, wanted to know why British Columbia should be allotted \$20,000 out of the \$25,000 for the whole of the Western Provinces.

Opposes Propaganda Money.
E. S. Woodward, president, said he was in favor of supplying money for the defence of the Winnipeg men and for the support of their families while the bread-winner were held in jail. But he wanted to know whether it was proper when these men were allowed out on bail and were traveling through the country propagandizing for the One Big Union that they should carry on this work on funds supplied by international organizations.

"As a matter of fact I believe this O. B. U. propaganda is thus being actually financed by the international unions," said Mr. Woodward. "This and similar information the Victoria Council is entitled to receive before further subscriptions are asked for."

SPORTSMEN FAVOR SCHEME FOR BIG ATHLETIC PARK

Endorse Proposal for Grounds Near the Empress Hotel

NO NOMINATION FOR SPORTING ALDERMAN

The idea of running a candidate for alderman on a sporting ticket failed to receive enough support for nomination to be made at the meeting held at the K. of C. Hut last night. P. C. Payne was asked to take the chair and J. W. Dilworth acted as secretary of the meeting. After the chairman had briefly stated the object of the meeting, George I. Warren expressed the views that he thought sport as a whole would derive more benefit if a list of questions were prepared to present to the candidates to discover what their attitude was with regard to sport. He suggested that a committee be appointed to draw up these questions and after they were presented the sportsmen could determine which candidates would receive their support. After discussion it was decided to act along these lines.

Still Considering.
The chairman declared that this idea had been tried out before, and had been found unsatisfactory. They had had an interview with the Council on the improvement of cricket grounds. The Mayor was among those who put up both his hands but nothing had been done. Alderman Sangster had promised to meet them in regard to the use of the Willows, but they had never been able to get a date possible to both parties. The Parks Committee had been an absolute failure in regard to their support for amateur sport during the last two or three years. Some time ago, he said, he asked Alderman Andros if it would not be possible to have a little grass put on a cricket pitch—a job which would take about sixteen hours. "Alderman Andros said 'Consider it done.' We are still considering, but the grass isn't there."
F. J. O'Brien introduced a motion at this juncture on the suggested sports field on the ground adjoining the Empress Hotel. This ground, Mr. O'Brien stated, would, he thought, go a great way to solving some of the difficulties which amateur sportsmen were met with at the present time. The scheme which had been previously outlined provides for tennis, baseball, rugby, soccer and cricket, and a

track would also be laid down. While Alderman Patrick's scheme is a good one, Mr. O'Brien remarked, he did not think the Council would handle it at the present time as it would mean purchasing property. The idea in view was to have a commission to handle the park composed of the Mayor, one alderman and an executive official of the organization which is taking the matter up financially. The ground could be made ready for soccer in a very short time.

Foundations Willing.
The Foundation organizations, Mr. O'Brien stated, had agreed to put up the money necessary, and he believed that the sportsmen's dealing with the Foundation organizations had been such that they could be assured of a fair deal in regard to the use of the park. Sport organizations that were making money from the receipt of gates would probably be allowed to use the field free of charge. The organization was out to boost amateur sport in the city and was probably the only sport organization in Victoria with enough money to put the scheme through. Grandstands had to be erected and a fence put around the field. There was room for a salt water swimming tank larger than the one in Seattle.

The resolution moved by Mr. O'Brien and carried was as follows: Resolved by representatives of different branches of athletic associations in City of Victoria in meeting assembled.
That a committee be appointed to wait upon the Mayor and the City Council and present a petition to the effect that the city property lying east of Douglas Street, north of Belleville Street, and west of Blanshard Street described on the city maps as 2.54 acres, be set aside for the use of the different athletic bodies of this city free of general taxation for a term of at least twenty years, and
"Be it further resolved that our committee request that the clearing and leveling off of this property be

done by the city engineer's office immediately, and that to be the only expense incurred by the city.

"And be it resolved, that the control and management of the grounds be in the hands of a commission consisting of the mayor, a city alderman selected by the mayor and all of the executive officers of some duly organized and responsible athletic organization that is prepared to carry on the expense of erecting grandstands, fences and other necessary details essential in building a first class athletic field.

"Be it resolved also, that we heartily endorse the attitude of his Worship Mayor Porter and certain aldermen who have given encouragement and aid to efforts to provide these grounds for amateur athletics.

"Be it resolved, that this committee be given full power to act in conjunction with City Council."

A committee was named as follows to approach the Council, and endeavor to obtain action on the project as soon as possible, F. J. O'Brien, P. C. Payne, George I. Warren and Arthur Manson.

Salt Water Baths.

The need for a salt water tank was expounded by G. I. Warren. Victoria was known for its love of aquatics said Mr. Warren, yet as soon as the weather began to get cold they had no place for swimming. A swimming tank would be an asset to the city and an attraction to the visitors which they sought to attract. Messrs. Warren, Finnick, O'Brien, Baker and Aldridt were appointed a committee to press the necessity of the swimming baths.

TORONTO HOCKEY MEN LOSE APPEAL

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—The Supreme Court yesterday dismissed the appeal of the Toronto Hockey Association versus the National Hockey Association and the several hockey clubs of which the latter body is composed.

The National Hockey Association was in 1917 composed of the appellants and the other respondents. In the winter of that year the directors of the National Association met in Montreal, the appellant club not being represented, and passed a resolution providing that the appellants franchise be suspended and sold before June 1, and that its players should be eligible to play with other clubs for the remainder of the season. The courts below held that the action could not succeed, and this appeal was dismissed on conclusion of argument for the appellants.

FLEMING STAGES A REAL COMEBACK

Featherweight Champion on the Aggressive; Baird and Dundee Draw

Montreal, Nov. 20.—Fighting with determination and aggressiveness never previously shown in a local ring, Frankie Fleming, Canadian featherweight champion, defeated Nick Michael, of New York, last night here in a ten-round bout. Fleming's effort was a real comeback. He never let up in his aggressive tactics and forced the fighting with the exception of the opening round, in which Michael outpointed him.

He cut loose in the second and from then on left little doubt as to the outcome of the encounter.

Baird and Dundee.

Seattle, Nov. 20.—Earl Baird came within a split hair of winning a decision over Jimmy Dundee, recognized as the coast's best 125-pounder, at the Elks' Club last night. After the two sturdy millers had fought through a half-dozen clashing rounds in the B. P. O. E. main event, one judge voted Baird, the other draw and Referee Ad Schacht called it even, which was how close the Seattle boy came to winning the verdict over the battler who had to leave California because he could not get anybody else to meet him.

Right Uppercuts.

The bout as a dinger from the first round, and rivalled the Gorman-Dundee go for interest. Dundee used his dancing tactics to good advantage, hopping around the local boy, shooting in left hooks for points. But Baird met every exchange with hard rights, and in the first and fifth rounds staggered the flashy visitor with a series of right uppercuts, which found their mark on Dundee's chin. The Californian continued on the offensive, however, and was battling strong at the finish. The boxers collided near the ropes in the final round, and both sustained cuts over the eye, but neither let the matter worry him. Baird had a clear lead in the ingighting, while the southerner used his left to better advantage at long range. It was a clean battle, and the fans applauded Baird when he refused to take advantage of his opponent when Dundee got tangled up in the ropes. Baird helped the visitor out of the predicament before squaring off and renewed the struggle.

Referee Schacht gave Baird a two-round lead, but thought the bout was close enough to be called a draw, which decision pleased most of the big crowd.

A 45-Round Go.

Bisbee, Ariz., Nov. 20.—The first 45-round fight to be staged in North America in several years will be held at Naco, Sonora, Christmas Day, according to John Twomey, promoter.

ENGLISHMEN ARE TO HONOR DRISCOLL

Within a Few Minutes Over \$8,000 Was Raised For Popular Fighter

When Jim Driscoll in his dressing-room after his defeat by Charles Ledoux at the National Sporting Club the other night, no one who knew that generous-hearted and generous-minded fellow thought for a moment that he was crying for himself, says The London Chronicle, he wept because, through him, boxing had received a severe blow to its prestige. Loser so gallant never goes unrewarded where British sport is properly controlled, and as Driscoll entered into this handicap of years because, swing to over four years of military service and other reasons, his worldly possessions were not so great as they should be, it was the natural thing for the many followers of boxing to start a testimonial for him.

Driscoll spent a long time in France teaching the young members of Britain's citizen army to develop the feistiness and coolness of mind that made our soldiers in France and elsewhere face danger with calmness. That such a man should be lost to the nation because he could not beat the bantam-weight boxing champion of Europe would have been unthinkable, and it was a splendid idea of Mr. J. H. Thomas to commence a movement by which Driscoll could be retained, in order to instill his profound knowledge of the best soldier-building sport into the younger members of the generation.

By Mr. W. E. Barry it was suggested that a national testimonial to Driscoll should be raised, and within a few minutes of the mention of this no less a sum than £1,700 was raised. The testimonial, however, cannot remain a national one; it is bound to become a universal one, for in America no boxer has ever com-

"THE TOUCH OF ABNER"

Good, clean, wholesome novels, unique in plot and abounding in action, adventure, are the productions of H. A. Cody. His early experience as a missionary in the Yukon district supplied him with material which he uses so successfully as the background of his books of Western life. As a clergyman who enters into the activities and daily problems of his community he has, in other stories, helped to show the place of the preacher and the church in the life of the people.

Rev. Hiram Alfred Cody was born in New Brunswick in 1872, ordained to the Anglican priesthood in 1898, missionary and rector in the Yukon district for six years. Since then he has been rector of St. James Church at St. John, New Brunswick.

Mr. Cody's new story, "The Touch of Abner," is a humorous one. Perhaps its style might be compared to the Joseph Lincoln story book, though altogether different. COMPANY IS PREPARED TO CONVERT YARDS HERE FOR BUILDING OF STEEL SHIPS

Bayly Hipkins, of Foundation Company, Says Firm Would Transfer Savannah Plant to Victoria and Start Construction Within Sixty Days

Immediate conversion of its yards here into a modern steel shipbuilding plant will be instituted by the Foundation Company of British Columbia, Ltd., in the event of a contract for steel steamships being awarded the firm by the Canadian Government.

Bayly Hipkins, vice-president and general manager of the Pacific Coast, definitely stated last night that his company was prepared to build steel vessels of any design and tonnage and if awarded a contract would have keels down within sixty days of the signing of the contract.

"We have conclusively proved that we can build any kind of tonnage, not only in Victoria but at many other points on this continent, and I may say that we are ready to go right ahead with the construction of steel vessels here.

"That we have the organization has been clearly demonstrated by the construction and delivery of twenty 2,000-ton wooden steamships for the French Government in fourteen months, which I believe is a record that has not been eclipsed anywhere on the North American continent."

Transfer Savannah Plant. "Should the company be awarded a contract for steel ships, we can, within five weeks of the contract being signed, have delivered on the ground and installed our complete steel shipbuilding plant now located at Savannah, where twenty-eight steel vessels were turned out by the Foundation Company to the order of the French Government."

"The Savannah plant is the property of the Foundation Company and cost \$2,000,000 to install. It represents equipment of the latest pattern for efficiency and production. The plant contains everything which will go towards making the most complete steel shipbuilding yard on the coast.

"The Savannah plant could be dismantled right away and cars of material could be en route within forty-eight hours after notice had been given that it was required."

"The heavier machinery could be shipped here from Savannah by the water route. I am prepared to state that within five weeks of a contract being placed the company could have a modern steel plant in operation here."

"We have put over the wooden shipbuilding contract here satisfactory to the French Government and with our present organization we are in a position to turn out steel vessels quickly."

Wooden Tonnage. "At the same time," said Mr. Hipkins, "we are open to build wooden tonnage as we have the complete equipment here to permit us to commence laying keels at once."

"The ships that have been built in Victoria for the French Government have given entire satisfaction and the local products have been highly commended."

ANOTHER BATCH OF COOLIES FOR EAST

Liners Ixion, Empress of Russia and Monteagle to Take Out Over Six Thousand

Another large contingent of six thousand Chinese coolies has been put ashore at the concentration camp at William Head, from which point the majority will be dispatched next week to China.

With nearly 4,000 coolies aboard the Blue Funnel liner Ixion is expected to get away from William Head on Tuesday for Taing Tau, where the coolies are being disbarked for transportation back to their homes in northern China.

An amusing story is going the rounds concerning the Ixion which reflects the characteristic sagacity of Government officials.

Vancouver Island coal operators, complying with the order requiring a license under the coal embargo, notified Ottawa of the amount of coal required by the Ixion to take her to the Orient. A wire came back asking the registry of the Ixion, her tonnage and reasons for such a large amount of fuel.

There is an unconfirmed report that the reply referred the interrogators to Lloyd's Register of Shipping.

The C. P. O. S. liner Empress of Russia is scheduled to leave next Thursday for the Orient with over 2,000 coolies aboard in addition to her regular first class passengers.

The liner Monteagle is also due to sail next week with coolies.

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NEW ZEALAND HERE TAKING ABOARD COAL

Due to Leave on Monday For South African Ports Via Panama Canal

For the second time since her arrival on the coast the battle cruiser New Zealand is moored in Esquimalt harbor. The big warship reached the Royal Roads last night from Vancouver and at 1.15 o'clock this morning she started on the Esquimalt light and went to a berth alongside the navy yard wharf.

This is the first time the New Zealand has been alongside a dock since she left Australasia. To-day stores are being shipped aboard and to-morrow coaling operations will commence preparatory to the departure of the warship for the Atlantic.

The New Zealand will take on 2,000 tons of steam coal here and is posted to leave on Monday for the Atlantic via the Panama Canal.

Admiral Viscount Jellicoe, who remained ashore at Vancouver, has already left for the East to confer with the Government heads at Ottawa. Other members of his staff left on the patrol ship Stadacona for Prince Rupert and will go East over the Grand Trunk Pacific. It is expected that the battle cruiser will pick up Admiral Jellicoe at Savannah or Key West and proceed direct to Cape-town, South Africa.

French Want Ships. It was stated last night that the French Government was anxious also to have a number of steel ships, ranging from 3,000 to 10,000 tons each, built in Canada, and to that end the French Government has voted large credits. The price suggested is \$170 a ton.

Three brothers also survive, John, Olaf and August Colling. The death of Mrs. Gonnason, who was well known in this city, will cause deep regret in a large circle of friends.

LOCAL MEN ON FARM LANDS ASSOCIATION

D. B. Johnstone Discusses S.C.R. Embargo Against Realtors

In order to deal with the many demands for information on cheap farm lands in British Columbia made to the Dominion Department of Immigration the B. C. Farm Lands Association was formed on Monday at a meeting held at the Board of Trade Building, Vancouver.

J. Bruce Walker, of the Department of Immigration and Colonization, took an active part in the work of organizing the new association, which is patterned after those in existence in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

In opening the meeting Mr. Walker pointed out that his department in its numerous offices in United States received 2,000 letters each week asking for information regarding the available lands, opportunities and agricultural resources of the four western provinces. It was impossible for the department to deal as intelligently with these prospective settlers as the men intimately acquainted with the different localities of which they desired information. The result had been that farm lands associations had been formed. These are composed of those men who have lands for sale, either as dealers or owners. The department upon receiving requests for information refers them to the provincial associations, which delegates certain of its members to endeavor to effect a sale to the man seeking information.

Elect Officers.

After some discussion it was decided to form an organization. The following were elected: President, E. B. McDiarmid; F. B. Pemberton (Victoria) vice-chairman; executive committee, J. G. Woods (Telkwa), J. T. Robinson (Kamloops), Alfred Carmichael (Victoria), J. H. Campbell (Chilliwack) and H. G. Ross, C. H. Rodgers, W. G. Bender, E. B. Morgan, L. A. Matthews, H. R. Reid, F. L. Muroff and C. N. Eccleston, all of Vancouver.

The meeting, which was attended by about fifty realty men, was representative of the province, some of those present having come from Central British Columbia.

D. B. Johnstone, representing the real estate men of Kamloops district, took occasion to attack the Dominion Government for legislation which prohibited realty brokers from doing business with the soldiers under the S. C. R. Board. He declared that the result was that the veterans were being cheated and the impression had been created that the real estate men of Canada were unreliable. It was a slur which should be removed.

Would Aid Veterans.

It would not be so bad if the veterans were benefiting by the legislation, declared Mr. Johnstone, but he knew personally of instances where veterans had been sold land of such quality that no real estate broker in the community would sell it. Real estate men were experienced in the localities in which they lived, and the soldiers had been deprived of the benefit of their advice in settling on the land. He knew of instances where soldiers had been sold lands by the owners at higher prices than the owners had them listed with the brokers who knew their proper value.

Before the Government passed the legislation barring soldiers from dealing with real estate men in connection with government loans, many sales had been effected, clients had been driven hundreds of miles, and for days, and suitable land had been found for them. Now in many cases the owners of the lands refused to pay the legitimate commissions to which the brokers were entitled, pleading that in doing so they would be evading the law. Real estate men in the Kamloops district had lost thousands of dollars in this way, after having done perfectly legitimate business.

VANCOUVER ISLAND NEWS

Mr. Barrow to Visit.
The Minister of Agriculture, Hon. E. D. Barrow, is scheduled to speak in Courtenay on November 28.

G. W. V. A. Debating Society.
The G. W. V. A. in following its policy of expansion, launched Friday evening, a debating society with Mr. J. R. McKinnell as president and Mr. W. J. Woodward as secretary. The inaugural meeting was held on Monday.

The association is requesting Senator Planta to speak to the men on the gratuity question at an early date.

An at home will shortly be given as a social recognition of the courtesies extended by citizens to soldiers and dependents.

Concert at Ganges.
A concert arranged by E. H. Streiten, secretary of the Islanders' Agricultural Association, was held at the Mahon Hall, Ganges, on Wednesday, November 12, to aid in paying for the extension to the hall and permanent stage which has recently been erected. Mr. Streiten should be congratulated on his successful effort, which was thoroughly enjoyed by a large audience. For the first time electric light was temporarily installed in the hall by Mr. L. Bittan-court, for the Salt Spring Dramatic Club, and proved a great success and improvement on the former mode of lighting.

An Old Dispute.
Men who have just arrived in the Comox district bear out fully the complaint voiced in The B. C. Veteran's Weekly of Oct. 30, says The Comox Argus. They are not veterans and were in fact employed at the canneries but they say they could not help be indignant to see the discrimination practiced between the returned men and the holders of seine licenses who are very largely Japs. While the returned man with his gill license was catching not more than enough fish to buy tobacco the Japs with their seine nets and traps were making fortunes for themselves. The Courtenay branch of the G. W. V. A. recently asked that all seine licenses should be cancelled at the end of the season and the returned men might get a chance at them but nothing further was heard of it.

Will Be Heard Here.
The application of the City of Port Alberni to have the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway company restore the Old Shore road to good traffic condition will be heard by the Board of Railway Commissioners at a session to be held in Victoria on Monday, Nov. 24, R. F. Bandy, city clerk, has been selected to prepare the evidence to be submitted on behalf of the municipality and will go to Victoria to act with the city solicitor, Mr. Lawson, of the firm of Bodwell & Lawson. Among the witnesses for the city will be some of the earliest settlers who have personal knowledge of the conditions under which the road was built and maintained after completion.

Concert To-Night.
An attractive programme is being arranged for the Scotch Concert which is to be held under the auspices of the Women's Association St. Andrew's, in St. Andrew's Hall, Nanaimo, to-night, at 8 o'clock. The services of several leading local artists have been obtained by the committee in charge of the arrangements and the entertainment promises to suit most critical tastes.

Among the contributors so far arranged for are: Sergt. Donald Hyslop, Mrs. Drysdale, Mrs. Patterson, Miss Woodward, the well-known comedian Mr. McAlpine, Mr. Fulton and a party of girls from the High School who will give some unique drills.

Wants Trophy.
The City Clerk of Cumberland has written to the Federal member, H. G. Clements, M. P., as follows: "I am directed by Mayor D. R. McDonald of our city to remind you of a request made by us some time ago for a grant from the Dominion Government of a war trophy, which could be placed in our public park as a permanent memorial of the great war. We are intensely proud of the splendid record which Canadian boys have made for Canada, and are extremely anxious that we should have in our midst some tangible memento of that fearful struggle, which, in time to come, will become at first a memory and then merely history. You will, I am sure, do all in your power to help us in this matter, knowing, as we know, that the boys of Cumberland have done their bit, along with the rest, and hold as proud a record as that of any city in the Dominion."

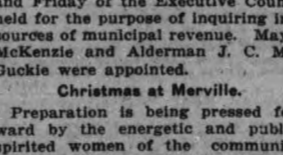

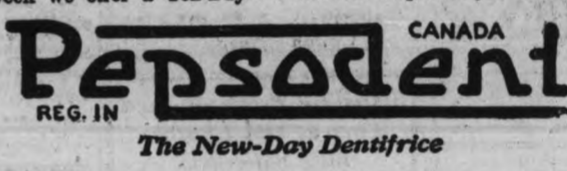

Salt Spring Island.
Recently there passed away one of British Columbia's oldest settlers, Joseph Akerman, at his home, Fulford Harbor, Salt Spring Island. He was eighty-two years of age, a native of Wiltshire, England, and left the old land on November 9, 1855, for Canada. After spending about five years farming in Ontario. He came on to Victoria and settled on Salt Spring Island. On May 14, 1863, he married Martha Clay, who survives him, also Mrs. J. Joseph, George Edward, James, Thomas and William, all of Salt Spring Island, and two daughters, Mrs. William Page, of Salt Spring, and Mrs. William Wallace, of Vancouver, also a sister in England.

The late Mr. Akerman had the distinction of being the second white man to settle on Salt Spring Island, and Mrs. Akerman the first white woman. They cleared out of the virgin forest, several acres of land, increasing the acres as time went on until now the Akerman Ranch is one of the largest farms on the island.

The five sons profited by their father's experience so that to-day all of them are farmers, and are producing much of the produce sold in Victoria.
