TRUSTEES' REPORT.

The Trustees of the Peabody Institute herein present their annual report to the citizens of the town.

The figures given in detail, both by the Treasurer of the Trustees and the Treasurer of the Lyceum and Library Committee, and the reports of the Committee and its sub-committees, together with the report of the Librarian of the Eben Dale Sutton Reference Library, present such a complete history of the affairs of the Institute during the year that they leave practically nothing to be said by the Trustees.

The absence of the usual report from the Librarian of the Peabody Library, is accounted for by the recent serious accident which has befallen him—in which he has the sincere sympathy of the Trustees—and the data which he had collected are embodied in the report of the the Library Committee. A large increase in the circulation of books over the preceding year is noted by the Committee.

The finances of the Institute are in a satisfactory condition, and the various funds amount, in the aggregate to \$200,614.74.

One noteworthy improvement made during the year is the wiring and lighting of the Lecture Hall by electricity. This has been accomplished at small expense, and the results are exceedingly satisfactory.

The saving in the expense of lighting the Library and Reading Room has already paid for the cost of introducing electricity into that part of the building, and in addition to this the comfort of patrons has been much enhanced.

The Librarian, assistant Librarians, and the Janitor deserve mention for faithful services rendered.

Additions for the year,

The per centage of fiction is somewhat higher than that of previous years but there are good reasons for this increase. Many attractive historical stories have been purchased which have been extremely popular among the juveniles and even with those of mature years. It has also been noticed that members of clubs and reading classes have been studying the entire works of many authors, instead of a favorite volume or so, as has been the custom, while in other respects the size of the popular novel has sensibly decreased and a book easily handled and quickly read has come into fashion.

Besides it is no sign of intellectual degeneracy to read and like a good novel. The best thoughts of today are embodied in the works of fiction. All the questions of social ethics, of human destiny, the gravest problems of life's philosophy are herein discussed with a power, depth and earnestness that command the most thoughtful readers, while enhancing the merits of the story.

The gross, materialistic novel has had its day, never to return, but so long as our complex social conditions be the theme of the story teller, so long will the story be read. The interest in such problems is not a whim, but a necessity, imposed by the conditions under which we live. For that reason, when an author of note announces a new book, it is known and heralded in advance throughout the length and breadth of the two continents.

Those who are conversant with library work are aware how the demand for such books constantly increases and how the class of intelligent readers grows larger every year. The best evidence of this, is in the fact that while many copies of certain books have been purchased they are constantly circulated, the borrowers still awaiting their return to the shelves.

It would be well for patrons of the library to bear this in mind when applying for a new and popular book. There are many others on the same errand, and when unsuccessful in the first attempt, the reason, and the only reason, is here given. The library officials are very careful in the exercise of the privileges to which their positions might entitle them, and punctilious about

keeping books over time. The world is more of a reading world; it knows better what it wants, thanks to the library.

During the summer the librarian notified the committee that a large number of volumes were insecurely shelved, and had from their bulky proportions and increasing numbers outgrown their position in the library room. After due deliberation the committee decided to have them moved to the basement where excellent quarters were prepared for them. The movement was successfully performed under the direction of the librarian and chairman of the committee, and over 1200 volumes, chiefly official documents and government reports, are now in the basement in a well lighted room, conveniently shelved, still retaining their positions in the finding lists. Only one volume has been asked for since the removal, which in a measure demonstrates the wisdom of the change.

The reading room has been a satisfactory department in the work of the library. The number of readers during the year, evenings and Sundays was 7202, which is 300 more than last year. If those who came afternoons were enumerated, these figures would be nearly doubled. At the annual meeting of the Lyceum and Library committee in April, it was thought advisable

that a special committee should be appointed who should exercise special supervision over the Reading room. The magazines and serials were carefully examined by this committee in order to determine the measure of usefulness which they bore to the readers. As a result, several periodicals which were of no material advantage were discontinued and new ones of greater interest replaced them. Among the latter are the Bookman and Book Buyer, which cannot fail to meet the awakened interest in books and literature which pervades our community.

A careful consideration of the subject in its entirety will warrant the statement that the library has enjoyed a year of progress and success.

TO THE CHAIRMAN OF THE LYCEUM AND LIBRARY COMMITEB.

The Lyceum Committee respectfully submit their report for the season of 1897-98.

The Lyceum course for this season, consisted of nine lectures, on diversified topics, patriotic, instructive and entertaining. The interest manifested in them by the public was gratifying to the committee; the attendance in some instances exceeding the seating capacity of the hall.

The appropriation for the Lyceum this year, was less than it has been for many years; being only about one-third of the amount expended for a lecture course a few years ago.

However, this seems to be the only place in the Institute management, in which curtailment can be introduced without seriously impairing the work of the Institution. And from the present outlook, it seems more than probable, that the Lyceum is destined to feel the stringency of reduced appropriations much more seriously than it has the present year.

And this should, perhaps, be a matter for reflection for those who advocate taxing the revenues of an Institution, that is accomplishing work of such inestimable value for all the inhabitants of the town.

Your committee have endeavored to the best of their ability, to provide a course of lectures that would prove interesting and acceptable to the public, and also be in keeping with the dignity of an Institution, in which every citizen of Peabody has a just pride.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE EBEN DALE SUTTON REFERENCE LIBRARY.

TO THE LYCEUM AND LIBRARY COMMITTEE:

The report of the librarian of the Eben Dale Sutton Reference Library for the past year shows the addition of fifty-nine bound volumes, two hundred and thirty-five numbers of unbound serials, and that twelve volumes of serials have been bound. As the list of additions will show, a large proportion of the accessions have been books treating of Americana, thus following out the policy established by last year's committee. Among the most interesting books added are, "The Architecture, Furniture, and Interiors of Maryland and Virginia during the eighteenth century;" "Colonial Architecture, and Colonial Furniture and Interiors;" the two latter refer chiefly to examples of New England architecture, Essex county being especially prominent. Several volumes on modern architecture have also been added. The magazines have this year for the first time been placed on the tables for the convenience of the public. All the old serials have been continued and the "Bibliotheca Sacra" and "The Essex Antiquarian" added.

The binding of many of the older volumes in the library are in poor condition, and this year the committee had twenty-nine volumes repaired, and would suggest that the work be continued till all the books are in good condition.

The card catalogue, mentioned in the last report, was completed early in the year and has proved itself to be of great assistance to all using the library, and well worth all it cost.

But the most gratifying feature of the year is the increased number of consultations, 740, as compared with those of the preceding year, 368. The increase has been very general, nearly every department showing a gain.
