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### Andover, Massachusetts



S one of the oldest towns in the United States, Andover enjoys universal distinction. Its name has always been coupled with famous historical events, with which every school-boy is familiar.

It was founded in 1646 by Rev. John Woodbridge, to whose efforts were added those of Simon Bradstreet, afterward Governor of Massachusetts. The land was purchased from Cutshumache, Sagamore of the Massachusetts Indians, for the sum of six pounds and a coat.

Andover's famous school, Phillips Academy, was founded in 1770 by Samuel Phillips, and was the first incorporated academy in the country. It has grown steadily from the modest proportions of its earliest days, and today is one of our most popular schools. It has been greatly aided in its growth by the generous benefactions of the Phillips family, to whose efforts can be attributed much of its great success. The late Bishop Phillips Brooks was a direct descendant of this illustrious family. Andover is also proud of its Theological Seminary, and of such men as Prof. Calvin E. Stowe and Prof. Austin Phelps, who have been presidents of this institution. Abbot Academy, the first school for girls in this section of the country, was opened in 1829, through the efforts and bequests of Madam Sarah Abbot.

Simon Bradstreet, well known as magistrate, ambassador, and governor of Massachusetts, was one of the founders and residents of Andover, and his wife, Anne, is famous as the first poetess in America. Their descendants, such men as Oliver Wendell Holmes, Wendell Phillips and R. H. Dana, have also earned wide renown, and Andover can be justly proud of her sons.

There are two more things which alone would make Andover famous. It was here that Harriet Beecher Stowe, authoress of "Uncle Tom's Cabin," made her home for several years, and her house is still known as the "Stowe House." The house still stands, also, in which, in February 1832, Samuel F. Smith, then a student in Andover Theological Seminary, wrote the song that was destined to become our national hymn, "America."






