Bengal is the only 'province' which pays, and as the river system of Bengal converges on Calcutta, it will remain the metropolis in spite of Sir Charles Wood's petty hatred of the only community independent enough to criticize his acts." We can hardly profess to understand the oracular announce-ment about the "consent of the Ganges,"—if Mr. Townsend means that so long as the Ganges flows and the plains of Bengal are fertilized by its waters, Calcutta will remain a greatemporium of commerce though the accidents that make it the Capital of India were removed tomorrow, we quite agree with him, though we do not see the wit, of asking "the consent of the Ganges" to the change? The impregnability of Calcutta is rather too ludicrous a point to consider, and surely-the stuff about Bengal being the only paying province has nothing to do with the question at issue, even if the statement were true, which it is not. We are rather at a loss to know in what way Sir Charles Wood has shown petty hatred of our friends the Ditchers; if this had been said of them towards him, it would have been never the truth. Our Calcutta friends, as regards their criticising the Acts of Sir Charles Wood have certainly shown what is called "independence," but their independence in this line, is rather after the fashion of the Irishman, with his character, when he said he was better without it. The citizens of Calcutta have better claims to our respect than for their criticisms on Sir Charles Wood, which we take leave to say, so far as we are acquainted with them were neither wise nor judicious.

If the seat of Government is to be removed rom Calcutta, it would be difficult to name any place so convenient for Imperial purposes as the neighbourhood of Poona. Any objection made neighbournood of Poona. Any objection made to Calcutta on the score of inconvenience, would apply with tenfold force to Simla, or any other part of the Hills, and the North-West. Delhi and Agra, and even Lahore have been spoken of, probably from the fact that these places at various times have been the seats of powerful Native Governments, but the circumstances with us are entirely different. With the seat of Government in the vicinity of Poona there would be every advantage of comparative nearness to Europe, with facilities for change of climate of a more advantageous character than any other part of India can afford. No change is likely to be made very soon but in the course of two or three years with a tolerably complete development of our leading lines of railway, the change may certainly be made with benefit to our rulers and advantage to the state.

If the native system of growing the cane were adopted. tive system of growing the cane were adopted, the yield might (though I much doubt it) be greater for one year than that of Mr. Wray would give, but then so much would be taken out of the ground that for ten or twelve years after that piece of ground would not be available for ugar-cane, whereas on Mr. Wray's system the sugar-cane need never be off the same piece of ground, and from the canes being much finer the yield I fancy would fully equal that of the native system, any way the difference could be nothing compared to the advantage of having one piece of ground always under one kind of

cultivation and thus rendering improvements for cultivating and irrigating the same so easy.

For cotton I would start with about 100 acres and as Major Anderson has acclimatised, Sea Islands, Egyptian and Persian seeds, and as besides distributed some about the country, there need be no bother about having to do that, and no difficulty should be found in procuring seed for this much ground. A por-tion of ground could be sown with theel or gingelly seed, and after taking your crop of native cereal, which you had grown for home consumption, you could then sow linseed, wheat, &c., &c. In all I think for the first that out of the 640 acres if you manage to get about half under cultivation, and work at it until it pays keeping the rest of the ground I would gradually year by year take in more ground until I had the whole 640 in full cultivation, and if this is properly managed and care taken that all implements from home are pro-perly and strongly made, it would soon pay any one who undertook such a speculation over and

over again.

Cotton Gins should be kept on the estate and when not engaged in cleaning the cotton grown on it, they might be allowed to clean that of your neighbours round about, should any of them feel inclined to have it done charging them no more than they would have to pay if they had it done by the common country churka. I would also recommend that an Hydraulic Press be kept for pressing the cotton grown on the estate, as this would save much in the way of carriage both by land and water, and on the cotton coming to Bombay it would, prior to its being shipped off, be very easy to open a few bales indiscriminately Ther. 80.

Over and above the actual number of cattle required for work three or four spare sets should be kept to allow for replacing any that may fall sick or die, besides this a few pair of young bullocks should be brought and properly fed and broken in as they become of a proper age. We confess that we cannot understand the application of analogies. It seems to us like talking of the application of similarities. And in one breath Lord Cranworth tells us that new circumstances are to be governed by the analogies of former ones, and in the next, that if the new circumstances are not properly governed by former principles legislation must interfere. Are we to understand, then, that principles and analogies are one and the same, or how is it that the word principles has been slipped in where before we had only governing analogies? Analogies are often very deceifful and misleading, while principles should be fixed and sure. The justice or equity that leans on precedent looks for analogies to guide its decisions, but a well settled code deals with principles, and accepts the aid of precedent only in the way of example of its meaning. Macaulay frew up a specimen of a code, with imaginary examples aerving all the purposes of actual decisions. The lawyers ridiculed the simplicity of the plan, which was certainly against the divinity of the goddess that ministers to their profit. And to any proposal of codification there is always the ready, trite objection which Lord Cranworth repeats, that with the multiplication of decaions questions will arise, and the state of French law with its doubts, is instanced. Cleanse the Augean stable, and it will be dirty again, as it is in the nature of stables to be, but it will be incomparably less dirty, and est quodam produce tenus. to make law absolutely certain is as impossible as to attain any other perfection, but nevertheless to diminish its uncertainty would be a great point gained. The Code Napoleon has not banished doubts, but it has served to well that for one question of law in France there are a thousand in England, and litigation of course in proportion.
