gross will legislate during the winter concerning the sale or disposal of the public lands. It is also believed that motion will be made to reduce the minimum price from 91 25 to 75 cents. This reduction in the price baid of the public lands is probably preferable to the disposition sought to be made by Mr Clay's land bill of the nett proceeds of the sales at present prices for a series of years. Mr Clay wished to abstract the amount of sales of

the lands from the ether sources of national revenue, and divide it in a pre-rate proportion between the different states. Such a measure we do not consider either just or prudent. The public lands that had formerly been caded by the old states to the general government cannot be retroceded; nor can any public lands be aliented that have become the sum any public lands be ment cannot be retroceded; nor can any public lands be alienated that have become the property of the nation. The profits arising from the sales of such lands are as much an integral part of the national revenue, as the duties arising from imposts; and no spoliation of any branch of the revenue should be permitted. The norbranch of the revenue should be permitted. The nor-thern states have no claims whatever on the public lands south and west of the republic, except by appro-priations specially made for general purposes. By the constitution congress may dispose of the lands as may be judgedmost convenient; but nothing is to prejudice the claims of the United States or 6 any particular state when the sales shall have been made, the preceeds must necessarily and exclusively form part of the national treasury; and of this there can constitutionally be no division among the respective states. Nor would it be expedient even if lawful; for if the revenue be di-lapidated in one of its branches, the funds necessary

We cannot boast of justice having been done to Louisians in the sales of the public lands within this state. Land offices have been opened in all the other states but Louisians has been overlooked. Since 1830 there were sold only 91,553 acres at the minimiss price of 125 cents an acre; and much of the public lands here remain still unsurveyed. There are now 1 million and 5 thousand acres surveyed and unsold/in this state; yet no exertions are made to dispose of them. This is not exactly just to Louisians; for by an act of congress 1811, 5 per cent of the proceeds of all the public lands in the state is to be placed at the disposition of our legislature.

But our local government is resolved not to be inferior in negligence to the national; for we learn that since the time of Haary Johnson's being governor, no application for this percentage has been made—altho the arrears due amount to 114,000 dollars.
