



HOW TO GROW WATER LILIES SUCCESSFULLY

ID you know that water lilies succeed almost equally well in every state in the Union? Few garden plants thrive

the Union? Few garden plants thrive
East or West, North or South in every type of
soil or climate as do these gorgeous blossoms
that everyone may easily grow in their pool.

Water lilies are so easily grown,
even by those who have had no previous experience, that following these
simple directions will make your pool
a most interesting part of your garden. In fact, water lilies are easier
to grow than the commoner garden
plants. The actual care of
the pool may be stated in
a single line. (Keep the
water level fairly constant
and the pool clean.) It is
not necessary to drain the
pool at all during the growing season, simply
adding water to replace evaporation.



Be Sure and Read These Instructions Carefully Before Writing Me.

Winter CARE of the Tub Garden. Empty the water out, then fill the tub full of leaves or straw, covering the tub closely with boards to keep out the rain. Cover all over thoroughly with litter for further protection.

How Far Apart? A pool 4 by 6 feet will accommodate three or four lilies as well as Water Poppies, Water Hawthorne, Arrowheads, Water Hyacinths or equivalent plants. A pool 10 feet in diameter will accommodate six to ten lilies and also a number of other aquatic plants.

Planting. It is well to fill the pool before planting. After planting, the boxes or pails may be easily set in the water. If the boxes are too large to move it is easy to set the plants beneath the water. In planting simply scoop a small hole out and plant the roots horizontally and not upright, with the growing end just flush with the surface. It is not necessary to cover the box with gravel unless there are large goldfish present. Large goldfish are a nuisance as they eat the roots of lilies and keep the water riled and dirty.

Tropical Water Lilies. These should be planted upright as they are shipped as growing, potted plants. Just cover the ball with soil. Do not allow the leaves to wither or the plant will be severly checked. Fill pool before planting.

When to Plant. Hardy water lilies may be planted from February on in the Southern and Pacific Coast States. In the Middle West and East April is early enough. In the Northern States April 15th gives plenty of time. Planting may be continued throughout the late spring and summer with great success. In mild climates Hardy Lilies may be planted almost the year around. Tropical Lilies should not be planted until the weather is settled and warm with an average temperature of 70°. May in warm regions and late May or early June farther north.

Winter Care. Hardy Lilies grow wild in cold northern regions and need no protection other than from direct freezing of the roots. Where the water is deep enough not to freeze below the roots they will come through unharmed. Since dry or to is the worst enemy of stored plants in the winter it is best to leave them in the pool under natural conditions. Cover the pool well with boards then apply a thick covering of leaves or straw and the water will not freeze deeply or crack the cement. This is the ideal way to winter hardy aquatics and gold-fish. If the pool must be drained the lilies should be removed to a cold cellar or placed in a deep trench and well covered, keeping moist at all times. Tropical Lilies are hardy only where oranges may be grown.

MAY I HELP YOU?

While I have tried throughout the catalog to answer every ordinary question concerning the growing of water lilies, I am always glad to help with information on any points not clear. Before writing read over carefully the various informational sections of this catalog and most questions will be found to have been answered at some length. If you have any special problems please feel free to write me and I will do my best to advise you.

Lotus. These are shipped as dormant tubers. When received they look like bananas strung end to end. In unpacking them be careful not to break them. Plant them horizontally or flat (never put them in upright) covering them with one or two inches of soil. The box in which they are planted should be sunk so there is 5 or 6 inches of water over the top. When they become established they may be lowered if necessary into water a foot deep. Use a rich heavy soil for best results. They should not be planted too early in the season if the weather is cold. POOL BUILDING

New Pools The most important thing

is to have the pool about 24 in-

about 24 inches deep.
This will allow for one foot of water and one foot of soil, giving the best average results. However, the plants will thrive luxuriantly where the water is only 6 inches deep or up to 24 inches.

Soil. Any garden loam is all right. They particularly enjoy a heavy loam such as roses thrive in. Do not use leaf mold, swamp muck or sand.


Fertilizers. Cow manure is good. Use one shovelful to four of soil. Commercial fertilizers or sheep manure are particularly recommended. Their use will insure a thrifty, luxuriant growth. Use one pint to each bushel and a half of soil. Mix all fertilizer well with the soil.

Boxes. We recommend the use of boxes. They should be at least 15 inches square and 12 inches deep. Boxes 18 to 24 inches square give better flowers. Make them of pine wood and they will last 20 years. Remember, the larger the box the more and finer the flowers.

If you have not built your pool this little booklet will be of great help to you. Many pools that have been built by our customers are illustrated which will give you a general idea of the various types. Detail drawings showing how a pool is built as well as instructions on how to mix the concrete, finish the surface, put in drainage pipes and other useful data are included. BOOKLET SENT FOR 5c.

The Irregular Pool. First mark on the ground the exact shape of the pool, then excavate to a depth of 30 inches. The walls cannot be straight up and down but should be about 45° for the cement to stick on. The floor should be flat, not bowl-shaped or it will be hard to place boxes without tipping. Smooth the floor and walls and wet down thoroughly. Reinforcing is desirable for permanent pools, but not absolutely necessary. Use heavy wire fencing, laying it on the ground and lapping the edges. As the concrete is poured pull the fencing up toward the middle. Tamp the concrete thoroughly and smooth off with the back of your shovel. After the concrete has set a day it should be water-proofed by painting it with pure cement mixed with water to the consistency of thin cream. Where heavy freezing is expected a wall 6" thick is recommended but the floor may be much less—two or three inches.

A Water Proof Clay Pool. A pool in clay soil may be made by excavating to 24 inches and tamping and puddling the floor and walls thoroughly. These make inexpensive and perfectly satisfactory pools. Add a layer of rich soil 8" to 12" deep for the lilies to grow in.

Many of our customers write that three weeks after planting they are picking flowers. Our facilities for handling water plants have been developed through long years of experience. Our men have been with us for years and thoroughly understand how to select and pack our products for shipping. Their instructions are to pack no plant that they would not want to receive if they were ordering it. That our plants leave here in perfect condition and arrive in your hands fresh and green is the most important phase of our business. I am personally in charge of our packing room and no trouble is spared to assure you of prompt service.



There are hundreds of different kinds, every one of which can be easily grown in pots by even the veriest tyro, no especial skill being required. They are always shipped as year-old tubers which, when planted sprouted end uppermost quickly come into flower. Remember these very tubers have blossomed profusely all the previous summer and will give rise to 1 to 3 crowns, each of which will flower most freely. In planting cover lightly about a half inch and sink the box in from 6 to 12 inches of water. See that they are not crowded out by the hardy lilies which start into growth before them. They will sprout and come to the surface when the water temperature averages 70°.

To winter them, break off the old tuber as well as any new ones formed and pack in clean, damp sand, storing them in a frost-free cellar.

The seed may be sown outdoors in June or, if sown early, in a pail in a warm, sunny window, planting out in June. Seed should be germinated at a temperature of 70 to 78

Seed should be germinated at a temperature of 70 to 78 degrees.

In choosing a soil use a heavy loam. Do not add either cow manure or leaf mold, as the decaying matter will bubble pan or pot, firming the young plants to damp off. They may be planted in a box, pan or pot, firming the earth down well, scattering the seeds thinly and covering lightly not more than the thickness of the seeds. Fine sand is a good covering. Stand the pot in water till thoroughly soaked, then submerge gently to a depth of 6 inches.

Depth for Planting Water Plants

OME of these plants like water up to 6 " or more deep and are marked thus *. Others like to have their crowns just under about 1" to 2" and are marked †. Some like to have their feet wet but the crowns just above the water and are marked thus ‡. They are all easy to grow, like a rich loam soil and should be planted on ledges built for them or in pots or tubs raised to the proper depth.

UCCULENT plants are found throughout the world generally in regions of limited rainfall. They belong to diverse families of plants, many are members of the Milkweed family, others to the Pineapple family, some to the Lily Families, others to the Spurge, Sunflower, Iceplant, Stonecrops, etc. They all have one thing in common, the ability to store water during dry periods either in their leaves or stems. These parts are succulent (i.e. filled with water) which gives the group the name "Succulents". The principal places where Succulents are found are the dry regions of the Americas and South Africa where they flourish in a myriad of forms from tiny Stone Faces to giant tree Euphorbias. In the deserts of Africa they take the place of Cacti.

MESEMBRIANTHEMUMS

Almost all the members of this strange, greatly modified group are found in the deserts of South Africa. There they populate the dry, rolling veldts or seek refuge among the rocky barren hills. The flowers are all so generally similar that you would never mistake them but the plants themselves vary from tiny button-like Stone Faces to the larger Living Rocks and shrubby Mesembrianthemums. They are the collectors hobby for hundreds of strange kinds are known. They are exceedingly easy to grow and need the same care as Cacti.

★ LIVING ROCK. (Pleiospilos). These strangest of mimicry plants imitate the rocks among which they grow perfectly. All of them have big yellow blossoms 2" to 3" across.
