

THE FRUIT SITUATION

Summary

Fruit prices in terminal markets have shown little change from a month ago. Mid-January prices of apples in eastern markets were slightly higher than a month earlier, but prices of California oranges and lemons and Florida strawberries were sharply lower. As compared with a year earlier, apple prices averaged considerably higher while most citrus fruits and strawberries were lower.

Domestic demand for most fruits is expected to be maintained at a higher level this spring than the relatively low level of last year.

Favorable growing conditions have improved production prospects for winter oranges in California and for tangerines in Florida. About 1,200,000 boxes have been added to the December indications for winter oranges, making a total of 50.7 million boxes or 11 percent more than was produced from the 1937 bloom. The January 1 indications for grapefruit and lemons were unchanged from December 1. Because of the large supplies of citrus and relatively low prices this season, systems of minimum "on tree prices" for grapefruit are being established in Texas and Florida. The reported minima are considerably above the prices that growers have been receiving recently.

Cold storage holdings of apples on January 1 totaled 26.3 million bushels, about 18 percent less than a year earlier. The movement out of storage in December was indicated to be one of the largest on record.

Early production of strawberries in Florida this season is indicated to be about 29 percent larger than a year ago which together with sharply increased holdings of frozen strawberries has resulted in sharply lower early season prices in terminal markets than last year.

GENERAL DEMAND CONDITIONS

The Demand and Price Situation Report for January included the following statements concerning demand prospects:

"The domestic demand for farm products apparently continued to increase somewhat in December. Available weekly data, however, indicate that the last part of November marked the temporary end of the sharp increase in industrial production which began last June. During the first half of December the output of industrial products appears to have declined seasonally, and in the last half somewhat more than seasonally. Nevertheless, because of the lower level of activity in early November, the seasonally adjusted average for December will show some increase over the average for the preceding month. Probably all of the measures relating to consumer purchasing power, when they become available for December, will show at least slight increases over November. ...

"In view of ... improved prospects for building construction and automobiles, a marked or sustained reversal of the recovery at this time is not a reasonable prospect, and possible temporary periods of less encouraging nature should be correspondingly discounted as indications of the general trend. While the sharply rising tendencies of industrial activity and consumers' income during the last half of 1938 probably will not continue in 1939, the outlook continues to be for a relatively stable level of economic conditions materially better than the average for 1938. ...

"The foreign situation continues to be unfavorable for United States agriculture, and with a few exceptions the factors influencing the outlook for the next few months do not indicate an imminent reversal."

CITRUS FRUITS

Favorable growing conditions brought about a slight improvement in the prospect for the navel orange crop in California and in the tangerine crop in Florida during December. Based on January 1 condition reports, the winter crange crop in 7 States is indicated at 50,661,000 boxes or slightly more than a million boxes larger than the December 1 indication and 11 percent more than the 1937 crop. If current production prospects materialize, a record high winter crop will be produced this season - a crop nearly 60 percent larger than the 1927-36 average.

Grapefruit production, indicated at 40,696,000 boxes, was unchanged from a month earlier and exceeds last year's crop by about 10,000,000 boxes or 31 percent and the 1927-36 average by 24,000,000 boxes or 143 percent. The increase over last year in the Florida crop, amounting to 6,400,000 boxes, accounts for a large part of the total increase although the Texas crop is indicated to be larger than in 1937-38 by 3,200,000 boxes.

The production of California lemons and Florida limes indicated at 11,097,000 and 95,000 boxes, respectively, was unchanged from a month earlier and remain new high record crops.

Prices of California navel oranges and lemons at auction markets declined sharply in recent weeks as marketings from the 1938 crops attained volume. Prices of Florida oranges showed little change in the general level as did those of both Florida and Texas grapefruit. The large volume of marketable citrus

fruit available this season has depressed market prices for Florida and Texas oranges and grapefruit to record low levels.

Because of the low market prices, a system of minimum prices are being established in Florida and Texas. It is reported that the minimum for all sales in Florida is 32 cents per box, on tree basis. In Texas the minimum is equivalent to 40 cents per box, on tree basis, for white marsh and seeded pinks, and 60 cents for seedless pinks to be marketed as fresh fruits and \$3.50 per ton for canning fruits. These minima are considerably higher than the prevailing prices recently received by growers in these areas.

APPLES

Cold storage holdings of apples on January 1 totaled 25,248,000 bushels compared with 30,815,000 bushels a month earlier and 32,004,000 bushels on January 1, 1938. Total holdings this year are about the same as on January 1, 1935, when about 59 percent of the holdings were comprised of western boxed apples; this year only about 50 percent are western boxes. In spite of the smaller total holdings this season as compared with last year, the movement out of storage in December was greater than in December 1937 and one of the largest for the month on record. The larger movement would indicate that the common storage holdings were very small in December and that the demand for apples has been improving in recent weeks.

Car-lot shipments of apples in recent weeks have held at about the same level as a year earlier although the total movement of 37,789 cars for the season to January 14 is about 5,000 cars under the total movement last season to January 15. Auction prices of western boxed apples in New York City have advanced slightly during the past few weeks while those at Chicago have held fairly stable. The averages in mid-January in both markets were about 40 cents per box higher than a year earlier. Shipping point prices of western apples have advanced rather sharply during recent weeks in contrast to a decline during the same period last season. Prices of eastern apples also have strengthened slightly in New York City, but those of mid-western varieties at Chicago have been fairly stable.

The United States average farm price of apples has risen seasonally since the season's low point was reached in August. In years of relatively small apple crops, the trend of apple prices is usually upward from the low level reached in the fall to the end of the marketing season. (See table 10)

STRAWBERRIES

Early production of strawberries in Florida is indicated at 675,000 crates this season or about 150,000 crates more than was produced in this area last season. Although the beds are reported to be in good condition, rain is needed in most sections. Car-lot shipments to the middle of January have been relatively heavy, totaling 170 cars against only 2 cars to the same data a year earlier. Although demand conditions are somewhat improved over those of a year ago, the relatively large supply available this season has forced market prices to much lower levels. In mid-January, prices averaged 28 cents per quart in terminal markets against 54 cents a year earlier. Prices have declined seasonally in recent weeks from about 74 cents per quart in mid-December.

Unless weather conditions prove unfavorable this season, the prospect is for increased production of strawberries in nearly all areas, as the early reports indicate larger acreages for harvest except in Louisiana

FROZEN FRUITS

Cold storage holdings of frozen fruits on January 1 totaled 124,703,000 pounds, about 10 percent less than a month earlier but about the same as on January 1, 1938. A larger quantity of strawberries than a year earlier about offset smaller quantities of other fruits.
