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
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PREFACE

With Germany and Japan brought to defeat, Canada is already well into the problems of post war reorganization, as the first peacetime Edition of the Parliamentary Guide in six years goes to press.

It was an eventful year which we look back upon since the last issue of the Guide appeared. A world which has seen many changes. The tragic death of Franklin Delano Roosevelt has robbed the world of one of the leaders of the "Big Three". The defeat of the party of Winston Churchill in England and the rise of Clement Atlee and his Labor Government to power, has removed another. Of the trio only Stalin of Russia remains in power.

In Canada too, the year has seen many changes. The Liberal Government has faced the people and has been returned to office. Provincial elections saw a coalition government for the Province of British Columbia and the same type of united government for Manitoba. In Ontario George Drew has brought his Progressive Conservatives to victory and in Nova Scotia the Liberal Government faced the polls and was returned with strengthened majorities. Hon. Angus L. Macdonald, former minister of defence for Naval Services, returned to Nova Scotia to again lead his party as premier of his native province.

Hon. Clement Atlee paid an official visit to Canada as the year drew to a close and addressed both Houses of Parliament.

Since the publication of the last Edition the Hon. J. A. MacDonald, member of the Senate, died on June 11th. Also on June 20th, the Hon. Thomas Miller, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Saskatchewan, died.

The death of my late father, Lt. Col. A. L. Normandin, editor for the past twenty years of the Parliamentary Guide, occurred during the year. A veteran of the First Great War, he had been on active service since the outbreak of the conflict which has just ended. He died on Active Service. He saw the end of hostilities but was robbed of the privilege of taking part in the problems of the peace in which he had for years taken the keenest interest.

THE DOMINION OF CANADA

The territories which now constitute the Dominion of Canada came under the British flag at various times, some by settlement and others by conquest or cession. Nova Scotia (Acadia) was discovered by the Cabots, in the service of King Henry VII., in 1497. The part of Canada now forming the Province of Quebec was discovered by Jacques Cartier, in the service of King Francis I of France, in 1534. The colony of Halifax was founded in 1749. By the treaty of Utrecht (1713) Acadia and the Hudson Bay Territory (Hudson Bay was discovered by Henry Hudson in 1610) were acknowledged to be British Territory. The Hudson Bay company's charter, conferring right of government over the territory now known as the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and the North-West Territories, was granted in 1670. The old French Colony of Canada was surrendered by the capitulation of Montreal, signed September 8, 1760 and along with the Prince Edward Island, and part of the present Province of New Brunswick, formally ceded to Great Britain by France under the Treaty of Paris, signed Feb. 10, 1763.

Vancouver Island was acknowledged to be British by the Oregon Boundary Treaty of 1846, and British Columbia was occupied in 1858.

As originally constituted, the Dominion of Canada was composed of the provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick. They were united under the provisions of an Act of the Imperial Parliament (30 Victoria, Chapter III) passed in 1867, and commonly cited as "The British North America Act, 1867," although its full official designation originally was:—"An Act for the Union of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the government thereof, and for purposes connected therewith." This Act received the Royal assent March 29th, 1867, and came into effect by virtue of Royal Proclamation July 1st, 1867. This Act expressly provides that the Constitution of the Dominion shall be "similar in principle to that of the United Kingdom" (1st clause), so that the executive authority shall be vested in the Sovereign of Great Britain and Ireland, and carried on in her name by a Governor-General and Council "to aid and advise in the government of Canada, to be styled the Queen's Privy Council for Canada." (Clauses 9, 10 and 11). Provision was made in the Act for the Admission of British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, The North-West Territories, and Newfoundland into the Dominion (Clause 146). Newfoundland alone has not availed itself of such provision. In 1869 the extensive region known under the various designations of "Rupert's Land," "the Hudson Bay Territory," and "the North-West Territory," was added to the Dominion by purchase from the Hudson Bay Company. The Province of Manitoba was set apart out of a portion of it (32-33 Victoria, Chap. 3), and admitted into the Confederation July 15, 1870.

July 20, 1871, the Province of British Columbia, and July 1, 1873, the Province of Prince Edward Island, respectively entered the confederation.

June 25, 1886, the Royal assent was given to "An Act respecting the representation in the Parliament of Canada of Territories which for the time being form part of the Dominion of Canada, but are not included in any Province," commonly cited as "The British North America Act, 1886," (49-50 Victoria, Chapter XXXV).

This Act provides that the Parliament of Canada may, from time to time, make provisions for the representation in the Senate and

House of Commons of Canada, or in either of them, of any Territories which, for the time being, form part of the Dominion of Canada, but are not included in any Province thereof.

The Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan were formed from the provisional districts of Alberta, Athabaska, Assinibola and Saskatchewan (4-5 Edward VII. Chap. 3 and 42), and were admitted to the Union as Provinces on September 1st, 1905.

During the first session of the 12th Parliament a bill was passed extending the areas of Manitoba, Ontario, and Quebec north-ward by adding to those provinces portions of the North-West Territory.

THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA

The present Canadian system of government which was established under the British North America Act of 1867, is a Federal Union, the first of the kind in the British Empire. It comprises a general or central government controlling matters essential to the development, the permanency and the unity of the Dominion as a whole, and also a number of provincial governments having the control and management of certain clearly defined local matters naturally and conveniently falling within their jurisdiction. These several governments are administered in strict accordance with the principles of British parliamentary government.

The executive Power of the Government of the Dominion of Canada, as also the chief command of the military and naval forces, is vested in the King, represented by the Governor-General, appointed by His Majesty the King and advised by a Cabinet chosen from members of the King's Privy Council for Canada, and consisting of ministers holding departmental offices, besides, often, one or more ministers without portfolios. The government holds office as long as it has the confidence of the popular branch of Parliament.

It is not necessary that all the members of the Cabinet be members of the Senate or the House of Commons as long as the Cabinet, as a whole, has the confidence of the popular branch of Parliament.

According to the B. N. A. Act, 1867, Sec. 55, where a Bill passed by the Houses of Parliament is presented to the Governor-General for the Queen's assent, he shall declare, according to his discretion, but subject to the provisions of the mentioned Act and to Her Majesty's instruction, either that he assents thereto in the Queen's name, or that he withholds the Queen's assent, or that he reserves the Bill for the signification of the Queen's pleasure.

Disallowance of Bill—The present constitutional position is that the power of disallowance can no longer be exercised in relation to Dominion Legislation.

As to the reservation of bills, said reservation could take place only upon the advice of His Majesty's Government in the Dominion of Canada as it would not be in accordance with constitutional practice for advice to be tendered to His Majesty by His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom against the views of the Government of the Dominion concerned.

ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT

Up to May 7, 1901, it was provided by Royal Letters Patent that the "powers granted His Excellency may in the case of his death, incapacity or absence, be given to the Lieutenant-Governor for the time being of Canada, or in his absence to such person as Her Majesty might, by warrant, appoint to be Administrator, or in the absence of such Lieutenant-Governor or Administrator to the Senior Military Officer for the time being in command of Her Majesty's regular Forces in the Dominion".

Upon the date mentioned a dormant Commn. passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet appointing the Chief Justice for the time being of the Supreme Court of Canada, or in the case of the

death, incapacity, removal or absence from Canada of the Chief Justice, the Senior Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, to be Administrator of the Government of the Dominion in the event of the death, incapacity, removal or absence of the Governor-General.

The Royal Letters Patent of June 15, 1905, which provided for the change in the designation of His Excellency's office from that of "Governor-General in and over the Dominion of Canada" to that of "Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Dominion of Canada", contained the same provision as to the Administrator as the dormant Commission, and that instrument, being thus rendered superfluous, was withdrawn and cancelled.

The Administrator is vested with all the powers and authorities granted to the Governor-General by letters patent or otherwise. (See Supreme Court of Canada.)

THE PARLIAMENT OF CANADA

The British North America Act, 1867, provides:—

“There shall be one Parliament for Canada, consisting of the Queen, an Upper House styled the Senate, and the House of Commons”. (Clause 17.)

“There shall be a Session of the Parliament of Canada once at least in every year, so that twelve months shall not intervene between the last Sitting of the Parliament in one Session and its first Sitting in the next Session”. (Clause 20.)

“The Governor-General shall, from time to time, in the Queen's name, by instrument under the Great Seal of Canada, summon and call together the House of Commons.” (Clause 38.)

The Parliament and Government of Canada (Sec. 132 B.N.A. Act), possesses all powers necessary or proper for performing the Obligations of Canada or of any Province thereof, as Part of the British Empire, towards Foreign Countries, arising under Treaties between the Empire and such Foreign Countries.

Either the English or the French language may be used by any person in the Debates of the Houses of the Parliament of Canada and of the Houses of the Legislation of Quebec, and both these languages are used in the respective records and Journals of those Houses; and either of those languages may be used by any person or in any Pleading or Process or in issuing from any Court of Canada established under the B.N.A. Act and in or from all or any of the Courts of Quebec.

As the Dom. of Canada possesses a system of federal government, her legislative powers are limited to certain subjects of Dominion or National import, set forth in Section 9 of the British North America Act of 1867, as follows:—

“91. It shall be lawful for the Queen, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate and House of Commons, to make laws for the Peace, Order and Good Government of Canada, in relation to all matters not coming within the Classes of Subjects by this Act assigned exclusively to the Legislatures of the Provinces, and for greater certainty but not as to restrict the Generality of the foregoing Terms of the Section, it is hereby declared that (notwithstanding anything in this Act) the exclusive Legislative Authority of the Parliament of Canada extends to all Matters coming within the Classes of Subjects next hereinafter enumerated, that is to say:—

- “ 1. The Public Debt and Property.
- “ 2. The Regulation of Trade and Commerce.
- “ 3. The Raising of Money by any Mode or System of Taxation.
- “ 4. The Borrowing of Money on the Public Credit.
- “ 5. Postal Service.
- “ 6. The Census and Statistics.
- “ 7. Militia, Military and Naval Service and Defence.
- “ 8. The fixing of and providing for the Salaries and Allowances of Civil and other Officers of the Government of Canada.
- “ 9. Beacons, Buoys, Lighthouses and Sable Island.
- “ 10. Navigation and Shipping.
- “ 11. Quarantine and the Establishment and Maintenance of Marine Hospitals.
- “ 12. Sea Coast and Inland Fisheries.
- “ 13. Ferries between a Province and any British or Foreign Countries, or between two Provinces.
- “ 14. Currency and Coinage.
- “ 15. Banking, Incorporation of Banks and the Issue of Paper Money.
- “ 16. Savings Banks.
- “ 17. Weights and Measures

- "18. Bills of Exchange and Promisory Notes.
- "19. Interest.
- "20. Legal Tender
- "21. Bankruptcy and Insolvency.
- "22. Patents of Invention and Discovery.
- "23. Copyrights.
- "24. Indians and Land reserved for the Indians.
- "25. Naturalization and Allens.
- "26. Marriage and Divorce.
- "27. The Criminal Law, except the Constitution of the Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction, but including the Procedure in Criminal Matters.
- "28. The Establishment, Maintenance and Management of Penitentiaries.

NOTICE FOR PRIVATE BILLS

EXTRACTS FROM RULES OF THE SENATE

All applications to Parliament for Private Bills, of any nature whatsoever, shall be advertised by a Notice published in the *Canada Gazette*. Such notice shall clearly and distinctly state the nature and objects of the application, and shall be signed by or on behalf of the applicants, with the address of the party signing the same; and, when the application is for an Act of Incorporation, the name of the proposed company shall be stated in the Notice.

A company for the construction of any works which in their construction or operation might specially affect a particular locality, or for obtaining any exclusive rights or privileges, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of others,—In a leading newspaper in the particular locality or localities which may be affected by the proposed Act.

And, if the works of any Company (incorporated or to be incorporated) are to be declared to be for the general advantage of Canada, such intention shall be specifically mentioned in the notice; and the applicants shall cause a copy of such notice to be sent by registered letter to the clerk of each county council and of each municipal corporation which may be specially affected by the construction or operation of such works, and also to the Secretary of the Province in which such works are, or may be located, so as to reach those officers not less than five weeks before the consideration of the petition by the Committee of Standing Orders; and a statutory declaration establishing the fact of such mailing shall be sent to the Clerk of the Senate.

All such notices, whether inserted in the *Canada Gazette* or in a newspaper, shall be published at least once a week for a period of five consecutive weeks; and, when published in the Province of Quebec and Manitoba, shall be in both the English and French languages; and marked copies of each issue of all newspapers containing any such notice shall be sent to the Clerk of the Senate, endorsed "Private Bill Notice," or a statutory declaration as to due publication may be sent in lieu thereof.

THE SENATE OF CANADA

According to the British North America Act, 1867, the Senate as originally constituted was to consist of 72 members; 24 for the Province of Ontario, 24 for Quebec and 24 for the Maritime Provinces (Nova Scotia and New Brunswick). Qualifications were laid down as follows:—Must be a British subject; must be thirty years of age; must be possessed of real property, free of all incumbrances, to the value of \$4,000; must be a resident of the province for which he is appointed. Senators are appointed by the Governor-General in Council and, subject to certain conditions, hold their appointments for life. A Senator may by writing resign his seat. His place becomes vacant (1) if for two consecutive sessions of Parliament he fails to attend; (2) if he becomes a subject or citizen of a foreign power; (3) if he becomes a bankrupt or defaulter; (4) if he is attainted of felony or convicted of felony or crime; (5) if he ceases to be qualified in respect of property. The Governor-General in Council appoints the Speaker of the Senate, the Clerk and the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod. The debates and proceedings of the Senate are governed by Rules and Orders modelled to a considerable extent after those of the House of Lords and differing very considerably from those of the House of Commons. Thus honourable gentlemen, rising to speak, address themselves to the "Honourable Gentlemen," composing the House, and not to "Mr. Speaker," as in the House of Commons.

Each of the Senators from Quebec is appointed to represent one of 24 divisions corresponding with former electoral divisions of the old Province of Lower Canada. Senators for other provinces are not appointed for any designated divisions, but the practice of assuming distinctive territorial designations prevails. A popular practice of Senators who have formerly sat in the House of Commons is to adopt as their designations the titles of their former constituencies. Several are content to be designated as "from" the city or town in which they reside. Senators must continue to reside in the province from which they are appointed.

The first increase in the membership of the Senate took place in 1871, when Manitoba and British Columbia, upon entering the Confederation, were awarded two and three seats respectively. In 1873 Prince Edward Island, upon entering Confederation, was given four members, the representation of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick being reduced by two senators each. In 1882 Manitoba was given an additional member and in 1892 another. In 1888 the North-West Territories were given two senators. In 1904, in virtue of the Act 3 Edward VII, Chapter 42, the representation of the North-West Territories was increased to four. Upon creation of the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan in 1905, each was allotted 4 seats in the Senate, or eight seats between them.

The Senate as then constituted consisted of 87 members as follows:—Ontario, 24. Quebec, 24; Nova Scotia, 10; New Brunswick, 10; Prince Edward Island, 4; British Columbia, 3; Manitoba, 4; Saskatchewan, 4; Alberta, 4.

During the session of 1914 (3rd session XII Parliament) the government introduced a measure providing for the increase of representation

in the Senate to 96. This measure provided that the detail of representation should be as follows:—Ontario by 24 senators; Quebec, by 24 senators; the Maritime Provinces and Prince Edward Island, by 24 senators, 10 thereof representing Nova Scotia, 10 thereof representing New Brunswick and 4 thereof representing Prince-Edward Island; the western provinces by 24 senators, 6 thereof representing Manitoba, 6 thereof representing British Columbia; 6 thereof representing Saskatchewan and 6 Alberta.

This measure as amended by the Senate came into effect upon the dissolution of the 12th Parliament.

The eligibility of women for appt. to the Senate of Canada was declared by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in 1929, and in Feb. 1930, for the first time in the History of Canada a woman was appointed a Member of the Senate.

INDEMNITY.—For every session of Parliament which extends over a period of sixty five days or more, there shall be payable to every member of the Senate and House of Commons attending at such session, a sessional allowance of four thousand dollars and no more. 1923, c. 68, s.1.

A deduction at the rate of twenty-five dollars per day shall be made from such sessional allowance for every day beyond fifteen on which the member does not attend a sitting of the House of which he is a member, if the House sits on such day. 1923, c. 68, s. 3.

It was provided in this legislation that the Prime Minister need not be burdened with a portfolio and that he receive a salary of \$15,000, the other ministers to receive salaries of \$10,000 each.

Provision was also made for the raising of the salaries of the Speakers of the Senate and House of Commons from \$4,000 to \$6,000 and the salary of the Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons from \$2,000 to \$4,000.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS OF CANADA.

The House of Commons of Canada is elected by the people for five years, unless sooner dissolved by the Governor-General. Members require no property qualifications, but they must be of the age of 21, and British subjects, not disqualified by law. The Speaker is chosen by the House at the opening sitting of the first session of each parliament.

The members are elected by constituencies and voting is by ballot.

The number of members of the House of Commons is regulated by the following clauses of the British North America Act, 1867:—

“51. On the completion of the Census in the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy-One, and of each subsequent decennial Census, the representation of the four Provinces shall be readjusted by such authority, in such manner, and from such time as the Parliament of Canada from time to time provides, subject and according to the following Rules:—

“(1). Quebec shall have the fixed number of Sixty-five members.

“(2). There shall be assigned to each of the other Provinces such a number of members as will bear the same proportion to the number of its population (ascertained at such Census) as the number Sixty-five bears to the number of the population of Quebec (so ascertained).

“(3). In the computation of the number of members for a Province a fractional part not exceeding one-half of the whole number requisite for entitling the Province to a member shall be disregarded; but a fractional part exceeding one-half of that number shall be equivalent to the whole number.

“(4). On any such readjustment the number of members for a Province shall not be reduced unless the proportion which the number of the population of the Province bore to the number of the aggregate population of Canada at the then last preceding readjustment of the number of members for the Province is ascertained at the then latest Census to be diminished by one twentieth part or upwards.

“(5). Such readjustments shall not take effect until the termination of the then existing Parliament.

“52. The number of the members of the House of Commons may from time to time be increased by the Parliament of Canada, providing the proportionate representation of the Province prescribed by this Act is not thereby disturbed.”

At Confederation (1867) the House of Commons consisted of 181 members of which Ontario returned 82, Quebec 65, Nova Scotia, 19; and New Brunswick, 15. During the fourth session of the 1st Parliament the representation was increased to 191, Manitoba (4 members) and British Columbia (6 members) having entered Confederation.

The representation in the 2nd Parliament (July 8, 1872, to Jan. 2, 1874), under the Redistribution Act of 1872, was 200 up to the last sessions, when there was an increase of 6 members owing to the admission of Prince Edward Island to Confederation, Ontario had 88 members; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 21; New Brunswick, 16; Manitoba, 4; British Columbia, 6.

HOUSE OF COMMONS

CONDENSED STANDING ORDERS RESPECTING NOTICES FOR PRIVATE BILLS.

All applications to Parliament for Private Bills shall be advertised by a notice in the *Canada Gazette* (see Standing Order 95 (1)) clearly and distinctly stating the nature and objects of the application and signed by or on behalf of the applicants with the address of the party signing the same. For an Act of incorporation, the name of the proposed company shall be stated. If the works of any company are to be declared to be for the general advantage of Canada the same shall be specifically mentioned in the notice and a copy of such notice shall be sent by registered letter to the clerk of each county or municipality which may be specially affected by such works and also to the secretary of the province in which such works are or may be located; and proof of such service of notice shall be established by statutory declaration.

In addition to the notice in the *Canada Gazette* aforesaid a similar notice shall be published in *some leading newspaper*, as follows:—

1. FOR ACTS OF INCORPORATION—(a) Of a railway or canal company or of a company for the construction of any special works, or for obtaining any special rights and privileges (95, A1); in the principal place in each county or district affected;

(b) Of a telegraph or telephone company (95, A2); in the principal place in each province in which the company intends to operate;

(c) Of banks, insurance, trust, loan or of industrial companies with out any special powers (95, A4); Advertise in the *Canada Gazette* only.

2. FOR AMENDMENTS TO ACTS OF INCORPORATION—(a) For the extension of a line of railway or canal or branches thereto (95, B1); where the head office of the company is located, and in the principal place in each county or district affected.

(b) For the extension of time for construction of works of any kind (95, 2 B2); where the head office of the company is located, and in the principal place in each county or district affected.

(c) For the continuation of a charter or for the enlargement of any of the powers of a company (not involving exclusive rights) (95, B3); where the head office of the company is located or is authorized to be.

(d) For the granting of exclusive rights which in operation would affect the rights of others (95, C); in the locality or localities where rights of others may be specially affected by proposed Act.

All such notices whether inserted in the *Canada Gazette* or in a newspaper, shall be published at least once a week for a period of four consecutive weeks; and when originating in the Province of Quebec or in the Province of Manitoba shall be published in English in an English newspaper and in French in a French newspaper, and in both languages in the *Canada Gazette*; and if there is no newspaper in a locality where a notice is required to be given, such notice shall be given in the next nearest locality, wherein a newspaper is published; and proof of the due publication of notice shall be established in each case by statutory declaration; and all such declarations shall be sent to the Clerk of the House, endorsed "Private Bill Notice" 95, C.(3).

For further particulars as to notices, fees, form and deposit of bills, etc., address the Clerk of the House of Commons, Ottawa, or see the Standing Orders of the Commons relating to notices of applications for Private Bills as published in the *Canada Gazette*.

D'INTERET PRIVE.**

Toute pétition introductive de bill privé doit être annoncée par avis publié dans la Gazette du Canada (voir l'article 95 (1) du Règlement). Cet avis doit exposer clairement et distinctement la nature et l'objet du bill projeté; il doit être signé par les pétitionnaires ou en leur nom, avec indication de l'adresse des signataires. Si la pétition vise une loi de constitution en corporation, l'avis doit mentionner le nom de la compagnie projetée. Si les travaux d'une compagnie doivent être connus comme étant destinés à profiter au Canada d'une manière générale, l'avis doit énoncer cette intention expressément, et copie de cet avis doit être envoyée par lettre recommandée au secrétaire de chaque comté ou municipalité que la mise en oeuvre de ces ouvrages peut intéresser particulièrement, ainsi qu'au secrétaire de la province où ces mêmes ouvrages sont ou pourront être situés. La preuve de la signification de cet avis s'établit au moyen d'une déclaration statutaire.

Outre l'avis à publier dans la Gazette du Canada tel que susdit, il doit en être publié un semblable dans quelque journal important, comme suit :

1. POUR LES LOIS DE CONSTITUTION EN CORPORATIONS — (a) D'une compagnie de chemin de fer ou de canal, ou d'une compagnie créée en vue de la construction de tous ouvrages spéciaux, ou en vue d'obtenir tous droits ou privilèges particuliers (95, A1); dans le principal endroit du comté ou de la région intéressée;

(b) D'une compagnie de télégraphe ou de téléphone (95, A2); dans le principal endroit de chaque province où la compagnie se propose d'établir son service;

(c) D'établissements bancaires, de compagnies d'assurance, de fiducie ou de prêts ou d'une compagnie industrielle non dotée de pouvoirs particuliers (95, A4); dans la Gazette du Canada seulement.

2. POUR LA MODIFICATION DE LOIS DE CONSTITUTION EN CORPORATIONS — (a) En vue du prolongement d'une ligne de chemin de fer, d'un canal ou d'un embranchement d'une ligne ou d'un canal (95, B1); à l'endroit où se trouve le siège social de la compagnie et dans le principal endroit de chaque comté ou région intéressée.

(b) En vue de la prolongation des délais de construction de travaux de tout genre (95, 2 B2); à l'endroit où est situé le siège social de la compagnie, et dans le principal endroit de chaque comté ou région intéressée.

(c) En vue de la continuation d'une charte ou de l'extension de l'un quelconque des pouvoirs d'une compagnie (quand n'entrent pas en ligne de compte des droits exclusifs), (95, B3); à l'endroit où est établie la compagnie ou à l'endroit où elle est autorisée à s'établir.

(d) En vue d'obtenir des droits exclusifs dont la mise en oeuvre intéresserait les droits d'autrui (95, C); dans la localité ou les localités où les droits d'autrui peuvent être spécialement compromis par la loi projetée.

Tout avis de ce genre, qu'il soit inséré dans la Gazette du Canada ou dans un journal, doit être publié au moins une fois par semaine durant une période de quatre semaines consécutives. Lorsque la pétition prend naissance dans la province de Québec ou dans la province du Manitoba, l'avis en doit être publié en anglais dans un journal anglais et en français dans un journal français, ainsi qu'en anglais et en français dans la Gazette du Canada. S'il n'y a pas de journal dans la localité où il faut annoncer ladite pétition l'avis doit être publié à l'endroit le plus rapproché où est imprimé un journal. La preuve que l'avis en question a été dûment publié s'établit, dans chaque cas, par voie de déclaration statutaire. Toute déclaration de cette nature doit être envoyée au greffier de la Chambre, et elle doit porter l'indication: "Avis de bill privé" 95, C. (3).

Pour plus amples renseignements au sujet des avis, des honoraires, de la forme et de la présentation des bills, etc., s'adresser au greffier de la Chambre des communes, à Ottawa, ou voir les articles du Règlement des Communes relatifs aux avis de pétitions introductives de bills privés, tels que publiés dans la Gazette du Canada.

In the 3rd Parliament (Jan. 2, 1874, to August 17, 1878), and in the 4th Parliament (Aug. 17, 1878, to May 18, 1882) the representation remained as at the dissolution of the 2nd Parliament, viz:—Ontario, 88; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 21; New Brunswick, 16; Manitoba, 4; British Columbia, 6; Prince Edward Island, 6. Total 206.

Representation in the 5th Parliament (May 16, 1882, to Jan. 15, 1887) under the Representation Act of 1887, was increased to 211, the Ontario representation being increased from 88 to 92 and that of Manitoba from 4 to 5.

In the 6th Parliament (Jan. 15, 1887, to Feb. 3, 1891), the representation remained unchanged, except that in 1887 the North-West Territories were granted representation with 4 members, thus making a total representation of 215.

During the 7th Parliament (Feb. 3., 1891, to April 24, 1896) there was no change in the representation.

In the 8th Parliament (April 24, 1896, to Oct. 9, 1900), under the Representation Act of 1892-3, the representation was as follows:—Ontario, 92; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 20; New Brunswick, 14; Manitoba, 7; British Columbia, 6; Prince Edward Island, 5; North-West Territories, 4. Total, 213.

During the 9th Parliament (Oct. 9, 1900, to Sept. 29, 1904), there was but one change in the representation, a seat being added for the Yukon Territory (Chap. 37, 1902). This made 214 members, distributed as follows:—Ontario, 86; Québec, 65; Nova Scotia, 18; New Brunswick, 13; Manitoba, 10; North-West Territories, 10; British Columbia, 7; Prince Edward Island, 4; The Yukon Territory, 1.

The House remained so constituted until the dissolution of the 10th Parliament, September 17th, 1908.

During the first session of the Tenth Parliament of Canada (1905) provision was made for the creation of the new provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta out of part of the North-West Territories, and provision was made for the taking of a census of population in the two new provinces, as also in Manitoba, in the middle year of each decade commencing with 1906. The results of the first quinquennial census made necessary, according to the Saskatchewan and Alberta Acts, a readjustment of the representation of Saskatchewan and Alberta in the House of Commons, and at the session of 1906-07 an amendment was passed to the Representation Act (Chapter 5 of the Revised Statutes 1906) providing that the House of Commons shall consist of two hundred and twenty-one (221) members, as follows: Ontario, 86; Quebec, 65; Saskatchewan, 10, (a gain of 4); British Columbia, 7; Alberta, 7, (a gain of 3); Prince Edward Island, 4; Yukon Territory, 1.

By a special clause embodied in this Act, it only took effect upon the dissolution of the 10th Parliament.

During the session of 1914 (3rd session 12th Parl.) a Redistribution Bill was passed, providing for an increase in the number of members of the House of Commons to 235, divided among the provinces as follows:—Ontario, 82; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 16; New Brunswick, 11; Manitoba, 15; British Columbia, 13; Prince Edward Island, 4; Saskatchewan, 16; Alberta, 12; Yukon, 1. Total, 235. The new Act came into effect with the dissolution of the Twelfth Parliament.

During the session of 1923 (2nd of the 14th Parl.) the Government introduced a Redistribution Bill based upon the census of 1921. It was not passed before prorogation and was accordingly re-introduced at the 1924 session and with certain amendments adopted. Under its provisions the Maritime Provinces lose two members; both in Nova Scotia; the Prairie Provinces gain eleven—four going to Alberta, five to Saskatchewan and two to Manitoba. British Columbia gains one. The other provinces remain as at present, as does the representation of Yukon Territory. The net increase in representation for the whole Dominion is, therefore, ten.

The Representation Act, 1933, based on the census of 1931 was passed at the session of 1933 (4th of the 17th Parl.). It reduced the membership of Nova Scotia to 12 and New Brunswick to 10; increasing Alberta to 17, and British Columbia to 16. Other Provinces remaining the same.

The distribution of the seats among the provinces provided for in the Act is as follows:

The functions, powers and prerogatives of the Canadian House of Commons approximate as closely as may be to those possessed by the Lower House of the Parliament of the United Kingdom. Bill for appropriating any part of the Public Revenue, or for imposing any Tax or Impost, must originate in the House of Commons. It is not lawful for the House of Commons to adopt or pass any Vote, Resolution, Address, or Bill for the Appropriation of any Part of the Public Revenue, or of any Tax or Impost, to any Purpose, that has not been first recommended to the House by Message of the Governor-General in the Session in which such Vote, Resolution, Address or Bill is proposed.

In 1887, when the old Northwest Territories were first given representation in the House of Commons, four electoral divisions were created:

(1)—Assiniboia East, adjoining Province of Manitoba; (2) Assiniboia West, next; (3) Alberta, extending to the boundary of British Columbia, and (4) Saskatchewan, in the north. Under the Act of 1903, the two Assiniboias and Saskatchewan were given six seats, namely: Assiniboia East, Assiniboia West, Humboldt, Mackenzie, Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan. These old divisions practically compose the present province of Saskatchewan, which, according to the Act of 1906-07, returns 10 members to the House of Commons, the constituencies being: Assiniboia Battleford, Humboldt, MacKenzie, Moose Jaw, Prince Albert Qu'Appelle, Regina, Saltcoats and Saskatoon.

PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

(Revised, January 4, 1946.)

With the Province of Saskatchewan formed from part of the Northwest Territories by Act of Dominion Parliament, 1905, (first session, 10th Parliament). The two provinces are divided by the meridian of 110, west from Greenwich. They lie between British Columbia on the west, and Manitoba and the Northwest Territories on the east, and between the International boundary at the 49th parallel on the south, and the 60th parallel on the north. From north to south each province extends 760 miles, or as long as from the mouth of the Detroit River to the mouth of the Saguenay in a straight line. The area of the two provinces is 504,190 square miles, which is as large as the united areas of Great Britain, France and Germany, as large as the States of Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota and the two Dakotas combined, and more than twice as large as the six New England States together with New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana. The provisions of the B.N.A. Act 1867, with its several amendments, apply to the new provinces. The public lands became the property of the Province in 1930, under the terms of the Transfer Agreement.

Act creating Province of Alberta came into force Sept. 1, 1905.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

With the territory added to Manitoba in 1912 new constituencies were created, and by the Redistribution Bill of 1914 more extensive changes were made, and a large number of constituencies created. In 1920, Winnipeg was created one electoral area, in which ten members were to be elected by the Proportional Representation system. In 1924, the Alternative Vote system was introduced for all other constituencies of Manitoba.

NEW BRUNSWICK LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

At, and for many years after Confederation, New Brunswick had a Legislative Council as well as a Legislative Assembly. April 16, 1891, an Act (54 Vic., Chap. IX) was passed abolishing the Legislative Council and vesting all its powers in the Lieutenant-Governor and Assembly, thereafter designated the Legislative Assembly. This Act came into force upon the dissolution of 1892. The "Legislatures" are now officially counted from that date only, the present being known as the "Tenth", although including the sessions prior to 1892, it is really the 17th since Confederation.

Elected by popular vote—48 members. Last general election, August 28, 1944. Sessional Indemnity, \$1,000 and travelling expenses; the Speaker \$400 and the Leader of the Opposition, \$1,000 additional.

NOVA SCOTIA LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Consists of 30 members elected by popular vote.

The Redistribution Act of 1932 (Chapter 10) provides for a House of 30 members. Under this Act, one member is returned from the following electoral districts: Cape Breton North, Cape Breton East, Cape Breton South, Cape Breton Centre, Cape Breton West, Halifax East, Halifax West, Halifax South, Halifax Centre, Halifax North; one member is returned by each of the following Counties: Annapolis, Antigonish, Digby, Guysboro, Hants, Inverness, Kings, Queens, Richmond, Shelburne, Yarmouth and Victoria; and two members are returned by each of the following Counties: Colchester, Cumberland, Pictou and Lunenburg.

Members receive sessional indemnity of \$1,500 per session.

The Speaker receives \$800 per annum in addition.

CHANGE OF GOVERNMENT

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THE QUEBEC LEGISLATURE

In accordance with the B.N.A. Act, 1867 (clause 71 and following) the Legislature for the Province of Quebec consists of the Lieutenant-Governor and of two Houses, styled the Legislative Council of Quebec and the Legislative Assembly of Quebec.

The Legislative Councillors are "appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council for life, unless the Legislature of Quebec otherwise provides." The qualifications of the Legislative Councillors are the same as for members of the Senate of Canada and the place of a Legislature Councillor becomes vacant in the cases, "mutatis mutandis", in which the place of Senator becomes vacant.

The Legislative Assembly is composed of members elected by the various electoral divisions into which the province is divided.

The work and authority of the two Houses are divided as in the House of the Dominion Parliament.

QUEBEC LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

(January 5, 1946.)

The Legislative Council consists of 24 members appointed by the Crown (the Provincial Govt. of the day) and the appointment is for life. The speaker is also appointed by the Crown, and broadly, the Council resembles the Canadian Senate in its composition, functions and procedure. "The official table of Titles to be used in Canada" (clause 10) provides that Legislative Councillors appointed after Confederation shall not be entitled to the title of "Honourable", but Councillors appointed previous to that date were allowed to retain it. Sessional indemnity of \$3,000, plus \$300. for travelling expenses. The Speaker receives in addition an allowance of \$5,000.

THE SASKATCHEWAN LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

A further redistribution of the Electoral Divisions of the Province was provided for under The Legislative Assembly Act, 1938, (Chapter 4, Statutes 1938) whereby the number of Electoral Divisions was decreased from 52 to 49 and the representation reduced from 55 to 52 members (the Cities of Regina, Saskatoon and Moose Jaw still to return two members each). This redistribution came into effect upon the dissolution of the Eighth Legislature.

“Under An Act to provide Representation in the Legislative Assembly for the Members of the Forces serving outside Saskatchewan, passed at the 1944 Session (Chapter 5, Statutes of Saskatchewan, 1944) provision was made for the election of three additional members to represent voters who, at the time of the election therefor, were serving in the following areas:

Area No. 1 — Great Britain or such extended area as may be defined by the Lieutenant Governor in Council in the event of a movement from Great Britain of members of the forces.

Area No. 2 — Countries bordering on the Mediterranean Sea.

Area No. 3 — Canada outside Saskatchewan or in Newfoundland.”

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT: DAWSON

The Yukon was created a separate Territory in June, 1898 by Act of Parliament (The Yukon Act). By amending legislation provision is made for a local Government composed of a Chief Executive, styled Commissioner (since classified Controller), also an Elective Legislative Council of three members with a three year tenure of office. The Controller administers the Government of the Territory under instructions from the Governor General in Council or the Minister of Mines and Resources. The Controller in Council has power to make ordinances dealing with the imposition of local taxes, sale of liquor, preservation of game, establishment of territorial offices, maintenance of prisons and municipal institutions, issue of licenses, incorporation of companies, solemnization of marriage, property and civil rights, administration of justice, and generally all matters of a local nature in the Territory.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT—OTTAWA

The Northwest Territories comprise the territories formerly known as Rupert's Land and the Northwestern Territory, except such portions thereof as form the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta and the Yukon Territory, together with all British territories and possessions in North America and all islands adjacent thereto, not included within any province, except Newfoundland and its dependencies. For administrative purposes the Territories were subdivided into the provisional districts of Mackenzie, Keewatin and Franklin by Order in Council of the 16th March, 1918. The Northwest Territories are governed by the Commissioner, the Deputy Commissioner and five councillors appointed by the Governor General in Council. The Commissioner in Council has power to make ordinances for the Government of the Territories under instructions from the Governor General in Council or the Min. of Mines & Resources, subject to any Act of the Parliament of Canada applying to the Territories, respecting such matters as direct taxation to raise revenue, establishment and tenure of territorial offices, maintenance of municipal institutions, issue of licenses, property and civil rights, administration of justice, education, public health and generally all matters of a local nature.

SUPREME COURT OF CANADA

The Supreme Court of Canada (as also the Exchequer Court) was constituted in 1875 under "The Supreme and Exchequer Court Act" (38 Vic., Chap. 11).

The Supreme Court of Canada has jurisdiction as a general court of appeal in both civil and criminal cases throughout the Dominion of Canada. It is also a Court of Appeal for controverted election cases, appeals from the Exchequer Court, from the Board of Railway Commissioners, as provided in the Railway Act, and under the Bankruptcy and Winding-up Acts. It also has jurisdiction in controversies between the provinces and the Dominion. The Governor in Council may refer important questions of law or fact to the Supreme Court for an opinion upon any matter touching the constitutionality of legislation or any other matter which the Governor in Council sees fit to submit. The Supreme Court may also examine and report upon any private bill or petition for a private bill presented to the Senate or House of Commons under any rules or orders made by the Senate or House of Commons. The judgment of the Court shall, in all cases, be final and conclusive, and no appeal shall be brought from any judgment or order of the Court to any court of appeal established by the Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, by which appeals or petitions to His Majesty in Council may be ordered to be heard, saving any right which His Majesty may be graciously pleased to exercise by virtue of his royal prerogative.

The Supreme Court sits in Ottawa, where the Judges reside and where three sessions annually are held, beginning on the first Tuesday in February, the fourth Tuesday in April and the first Tuesday in October.

The Supreme Court as originally constituted on 8th April, 1875, consisted of a Chief Justice and five Puisne Judges, but in 1927 (17 Geo. V., c. 38) the Act was amended by the substitution of the following section instead of sec. 4 of Chap. 139, R.S.C. 1906 (See R.S.C., 1927, c. 35) viz:—

"IV. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice, to be called the Chief Justice of Canada, and six Puisne Judges, who shall be appointed by the Governor-in-Council by letters patent under the Great Seal".

Section IX, of the said Act was amended by the same Statute of 1927 by adding thereto the following:—

"Provided that each Judge, whether heretofore appointed or hereafter to be appointed, shall cease to hold office upon attaining the age of seventy-five years, or immediately, if he has already attained that age."

Sections VII and VIII of the letters patent passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, dated March 23, 1931, constituting the office of Governor-General and Commander in Chief of the Dominion of Canada, read as follows:—

"VII. And we do hereby declare Our pleasure to be that, in the event of the death, incapacity, removal, or absence of Our said Governor-General out of Our said Dominion, all and every the powers and authorities herein granted to him shall, until Our further pleasure is signified therein, be vested in such person as may be appointed by Us under Our Sign Manual and Signet to be Our Lieutenant-Governor of Our said Dominion or, if there shall be no such person or persons as may be appointed by Us under Our Sign Manual and Signet to administer the Government of the same; and in case there shall be no person or persons within Our said Dominion so appointed by Us, then in Our Chief Justice for the time being of the Supreme Court of Our said Dominion; or, in case of the death, incapacity, removal, or absence out of Our said Dominion of Our said Chief Justice for the time being, then in the Senior Judge for the time being of Our said Supreme Court then residing in Our said Dominion and not being under incapacity.

"Provided always, that the said Senior Judge shall act in the administration of the Government only if and when Our said Chief Justice shall not be present within Our said Dominion and capable of administering the Government.

"Provided further that no such powers or authorities shall vest in such Lieutenant-Governor, or such other person or persons, until he or they shall have taken the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Governor-General of Our said Dominion and in the manner provided by the Instructions accompanying these Our Letters Patent.

"VIII. And we do hereby require and command all Our Officers and Ministers, Civil and Military, and all other, the inhabitants of Our said Dominions, to be obedient, aiding and assisting unto Our said Governor-General; or, in the event of his death, incapacity or absence, to such person or persons as may from time to time, under the provisions of these Our Letters Patent, administer the Government of Our said Dominion."

It was notified in the "London Gazette" of May 21, 1913, that the King had been pleased to approve of the use and recognition throughout His Majesty's Dominion during tenure of office of the title of "Honourable" in the case of the Chief Justice of Canada, the Judges of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts of Canada and some others.

THE EXCHEQUER COURT OF CANADA

(January 7, 1946.)

The Exchequer Court of Canada possesses exclusive original jurisdiction in all cases in which demand is made or relief sought against the Crown... It enforces the law relating to revenue.

The Court sits from time to time by special order in such places as the business of the Court requires. General Sittings of the Court may also be held as ordered by a Judge of which notice is published in the Canada Gazette.

The Exchequer Court of Canada is continued as the Admiralty Court in Canada by (1934) 24-25 Geo. V. c. 31. (Can.)

The President and Puisne Judge of the said Court shall have and exercise throughout Canada the admiralty jurisdiction of the Court.

The Governor in Council may, from time to time, constitute any part of Canada an Admiralty District and appoint Judges to preside therein and to be designated as District Judge in Admiralty of the Exchequer Court in and for such Admiralty District.

The Exchequer Court of Canada is also a Prize Court in time of war.

Judges of the Exchequer Court of Canada are entitled to the designation "Honourable". See "Table of Canadian Titles".

INTERNATIONAL JOINT COMMISSION

Provision for this Commission was made in the Treaty of January 11th, 1909, between Great Britain and the United States. In that Treaty the Commission was given very wide powers in the settlement of questions arising along the international boundary affecting the interests of Canadians and Americans. It also authorized the Commission to carry out investigations in questions submitted to it by either Government. The Commission consists of six members, three appointed by the President of the United States and three by the King on the recommendation of the Canadian Government. Duplicate offices are maintained in Ottawa and Washington, each under the control of a Secretary. Since its organization in January, 1912, the Commission has dealt with a large number of cases and carried out very important investigations. It has also published reports in these matters.

OFFICIAL PRECEDENCE

The establishment and the maintenance of tables or scales of official precedence result from the fact that in all nations and communities there are individuals, who, because they have entrusted to them by the nation the performance of certain responsible and honorable official or communal functions, are by common accord, regarded, either for the time being, or permanently, as occupying positions of various degrees of eminence in the social fabric.

In the old patriarchal communities social pre-eminence was naturally accorded to the heads of the tribal families, and precedence throughout the tribes was generally regulated by the seniority of the sons of the patriarchs and the individuals of their families. Of course there were exceptions to this rule, due to the personal ambitions and achievements of individuals.

Since nations have been evolved from the old tribal organizations, an official class of citizens has been developed, comprising those who, besides occupying the usual position of members of the state, have entrusted to them the execution of what have been described as the life functions of the nation; that is such functions as are peculiar to the civic organization in contra-distinction to the general functions exercised and actions performed by individual citizens as independent units. Official service calls in a special degree for a sense of duty to the public trust, and in many cases for a spirit of sacrifice and, if needs be, self effacement. In recognition of these conditions, and often for very practical state reasons, special privileges are granted to certain of the more responsible officials within the spheres appointed for them. So public service has come to be the one outstanding element in determining relative rank in social etiquette—the corner stone of all official tables of social precedence.

“Precedence” has been defined as the priority of place, or superiority in rank, in the conventional system of arrangement under which the more eminent and dignified orders of a community are classified on occasion of public ceremony and in the intercourse of private life.

Public functions of some form or another occur with more or less frequency in every state, and those who serve and represent the people in official capacities are necessarily the principal, often the only, participants. An ordinary sense of decency, not to speak of dignity or that wholesome sense of national pride which exists in all races, demands that such functions be orderly, and that the monopoly of places of honour be placed beyond the accomplishment of the assuming upstart and unworthy elements to the exclusion of those entrusted by the nation with the administration of its affairs and the guardianship of its interests and honour, and thus, in a very special sense, representing it.

It is not alone in countries where monarchical systems of government prevail that precedence is a subject of official regulation, republics finding it indispensable that provision be made for checking the tendency of ambitious and often selfish and unpatriotic individuals and elements to monopolize the highest distinctions and honours and ignore the claims of the devoted and trusted officers and servants of the nation—its recognized official representatives. The famous “protocol” of the French Republic is a case in point.

Throughout the British Empire or Commonwealth of Nations, the "Tables" or "Scales" of Precedence emanate from the Crown, and are issued under authority of the Sovereign. The Crown is "the fountain of honour," and it is its undoubted prerogative to confer on any of its subjects, in any part of its dominions, such titles and distinctions and such rank and place "as to it may seem meet and convenient." Its discretion is limited in those cases only wherein it has been submitted to restraint by Act of Parliament.

There is not, even in the Mother Country, any complete and comprehensive code whereby the scheme of social gradation has been defined and settled, once and for all, on a permanent foundation. The principles and rules at present controlling it have been formulated at different periods and have been derived from various sources.

In the old time, questions of precedence came in the ordinary course of things within the jurisdiction of the Courts of Chivalry in which figured such picturesque officials as lord high constables, earl marshals, kings of arms, heralds, pursuivants, etc. Points of unusual moment were referred to and decided by the sovereign in person, the privy council, or parliament.

Although there were "estates" titles and orders of various degrees in England from earliest historical times the oldest English table of precedence in existence is the "Order of All Estates of Nobles and Gentry" prepared for the coronation of Henry IV in 1399.

In the thirty-first year of King Henry VIII, Parliament, by statutory enactment, took cognizance of Precedence. It then passed the "Act for Placing the Lords," which, although it concerned directly only the Great Officers of States, and referred but incidentally to the places of the Nobility, has since been considered the chief authority for the marshalling of dignities.

This Act was originated, it is important to remember, by the desire of the King, and it is declared, as a preliminary, that "although it appertained altogether to the Royal Prerogative to give such honour, reputation, and placing to his Councillors and others his subjects as should be seeming to the King's most excellent wisdom, the King was nevertheless pleased and contented for an order to be had and taken in his Most High Court of Parliament for the placing of the Great Officers and Lords."

The Statute of Henry VIII was in the nature of a declaratory Act, confirming the ancient and pre-existing Law of Precedence, and, in confirmation of this, it is a matter of historical fact that the advice of Garter King of Arms was taken before the bill was brought in. This Act of King Henry VIII's parliament still remains the only legislative measure in which it has been attempted to deal directly and systematically with any large and important section of the English scale or Table of Precedence. (There are separate tables for Scotland, Ireland, Wales, each Dominion, India and the Crown Colonies.)

Where no act of Parliament applies, precedence is determined by the will of the Sovereign or by what is accepted as ancient "usage and established custom."

Lists that show practice and custom in matters of precedence, such as are seen in the published accounts of assemblies of the estates of the realm such as at solemnities—Coronations, funerals, and

the like, have been invoked in the preparation of the various Tables of precedence at present in force throughout the Empire.

Strict observance of these lists is insisted upon, for the principle underlying the maintenance of these lists is the protection of established right; and the least interference, unless made by Royal or Parliamentary authority, would be destructive of the right of some one entitled to rank on the scale, and not unlikely to dishonour the State in the person of a recognized representative.

It is Men's rank that confers precedence and regulates State Ceremonials. At the King's Courts, where husbands and wives pass His Majesty together, the precedence of the husbands is that which is regarded.

The wives and children of great officers of State and of all of those who derive their places on the scale from official rank, have no consequent precedence.

Foreign Titles of Nobility borne by British subjects afford their holders no precedence whatever in the Mother Country or elsewhere in the Empire, and strictly speaking, a Royal License should be obtained for their use.

Persons entitled to precedence in the United Kingdom, in Foreign Countries, or in any particular Dominion or Colony, are not entitled, as of a right, to the same precedence elsewhere; but in the absence of any special Instruction from the King, the precedence of such persons in the Overseas Dominions and Colonies of the British Commonwealth is determined by the King's Representative (the Governor-General or Governor).

TABLE OF PRECEDENCE FOR CANADA

The official Table of Precedence is established by His Majesty the King on the advice of His Government in Canada. The First table of Precedence for the Dominion was prepared at Confederation July 23, 1868. The first important amendment was announced in despatches from the Secretary of State for the Colonies bearing date Nov. 3, 1879 and published in the Statutes of Canada of 1880 (43 Victoria, p. XXII). The next amendment was announced in a despatch dated Downing Street, Dec. 29, 1893, and published in the "Canada Gazette", Jan. 20, 1894. The last noted amendment assigned, on the recommendation of the Dominion Government, precedence to the Controllers of Customs and Inland Revenue, and the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, British Columbia, Prince Edward Island and the North West Territories.

During the administration of Sir Mackenzie Bowell some suggestions for a further revision of the Table of Precedence were made to the Colonial Office, but there was a change of Government before the matter reached a final issue.

December, 1923, a revised Table of Precedence approved by the King, and despatched from the Colonial Office, December 3, 1923, was received by His Excellency the Governor-General and published in the "Canada Gazette" on December 22nd as amended:

20. The Prime Ministers of the Provinces of Canada.

21. The Chief Judges of the Courts of Law and Equity according to seniority and the Judge appointed to perform the duties of Chief Justice at Quebec and Montreal.

22. The Puisne Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada according to seniority.
23. Judges of the Exchequer Court of Canada.
24. The Solicitor General of Canada.
25. Members of the Senate.
26. Puisne Judges of the Courts of Law and Equity according to seniority.

28. The Chief of Staff, National Defence, the Director of Naval Services, and the Director of the Air Force, provided they are of the rank of Major-General or its equivalent or higher rank.

NOTE: (A)—Ambassadors, Foreign Ministers and Foreign Consuls General accredited to Canada, though not provided for in the Table of Precedence, are given a courtesy precedence, the Ambassadors and Ministers following immediately after the Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces, and the Consuls General immediately after the Prime Ministers of the Provinces. The High Commissioner and other Representatives of the British Commonwealth have been granted precedence immediately after the Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada., etc.

(B)—Judges at present on the retired list and Judges at present holding Office but who shall retire after the date of the New Table shall not be affected as to Precedence given to them by the Old Table.

*—Retired Judges were given precedence next after the present Judges of their respective Courts by the Old Table.

†—In respect of federal ceremonies and occasions, members of the Cabinet take precedence after the Prime Minister of Canada and before Lieutenant-Governors. This provision, however, does not apply to such ceremonies and occasions as are of a provincial nature.

In the revised table the designation of places for the Lieutenant Governors of Saskatchewan and Alberta (11 and 12) are new; so are section 21, designating the place of the Prime Minister of Canada; section 14, according places to "The Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, the General Superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada, and the corresponding head of the Baptist Church in Canada"; section 20, providing for the Prime Ministers of the Provinces of Canada; the concluding clause of section 21, providing for the Judge appointed to perform the duties of Chief Justice at Quebec and Montreal; section 28, providing for the Chief of Staff National Defence, the Director of Naval Services and the Director of the Air Force provided they are of the rank of Major-General or its equivalent or higher rank. The Speaker and members of the House of Commons are given relatively higher place than accorded to them in the old list.

An important feature of the revised table is the omission of any reference to Imperial Privy Councillors. Since 1903 it had been the practice, with the sanction of the Governor-General, to accord certain precedence to Imperial Privy Councillors; and the omission of reference to such officers in the revised list has been taken as an indication that the practice mentioned be discontinued, and it has been.

Official rank and position, although conferring special official precedence on the holder of the office as per the Table of Precedence, does not do so any more in Canada than in the Mother Country, upon the holder's wife and children. Thus the wives and children of Privy Councillors, Senators, Judges, members of Parliament, and officers of state, as such, have no special precedence, except such as is accorded to them (and it is always done) as a compliment. Widows of Privy Councillors, Senators, Judges, or public officials, have no claims to complimentary precedence as such, any claim they might have had in that respect lapsing with the demise of their husbands.

Knightly titles or other Imperial titles and appointments do not entitle the holders to any recognition under the Official Table of Precedence for Canada.

This is a fact which is often overlooked by those in charge of semi-official and popular ceremonial events, and gentlemen entitled to precedence in Canada by the official table sanctioned by the Sovereign, often find themselves ignored in favour of others having no claim whatever to precedence in Canada although they may be entitled to recognized places in the Mother Country or other parts of the Empire.

Members of the Royal Family while in Canada take precedence next after the Governor-General, this according to a rule in effect throughout His Majesty's Dominions.

*Retired Judges were given precedence next after the present Judges of their respective Courts by the Old Table.

TABLE OF TITLES TO BE USED IN CANADA

1. The Governor General of Canada to be styled "His Exceelleny" and his wife "Her Exceelleny".
2. The Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces to be styled "His Honour".

By Order-in-Council P.C. 1314, dated 30th June, 1927, Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces of Canada, upon assuming office are entitled to the designation of "Honourable" which they are permitted to retain for life. This order was made to apply also to Lieutenant-Governors in office prior to 1st July, 1927.

3. Privy Councillors of Canada to be styled "Honourable", and for life.
4. The Solicitor General to be styled "Honourable" while in office.
5. Senators of Canada to be styled "Honourable", but only during office and the title not to be continued afterwards.
6. The Speaker of the House of Commons to be styled "Honourable" during tenure of office.
7. The Chief Justice of Canada, the Judges of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts of Canada, and the Chief Justices and Judges of the undermentioned Courts in the several Provinces of Canada :—
 - Ontario.—The Supreme Court of Ontario.
 - Quebec.—The Court of King's Bench, the Superior Court, and the Circuit Court of the District of Montreal.
 - Nova Scotia.—The Supreme Court of Nova Scotia.
 - New Brunswick.—The Supreme Court of New Brunswick.
 - Manitoba.—The Court of King's Bench and the Court of Appeal.
 - British Columbia.—The Court of Appeal and the Supreme Court of British Columbia.
 - Prince Edward Island.—The Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island and the Chancery Court.
 - Saskatchewan.—The Supreme Court of Saskatchewan.
 - Alberta.—The Supreme Court of Alberta.
 to be styled "Honourable" during tenure of office.

8. The Presidents and Speakers of the Legislatures of the Provinces to be styled "Honourable" during tenure of office.
9. Executive Councillors of the Provinces to be styled "Honourable" while in office.
10. Legislative Councillors in the Provinces not in future to have that title, but gentlemen who were Legislative Councillors in the Provinces at the time of the Union (1st July, 1867), to retain their title of "Honourable" for life.

The following to be eligible to be personally recommended by the Governor General for His Majesty's permission to retain the title of "Honourable":—

- (a) Speakers of the Senate and of the House of Commons on retirement after three years of office, not necessarily continuous.
- (b) The above mentioned Chief Justices and Judges on retirement.

By His Excellency Major-General the Right Honourable the Earl of Athlone, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, a Member of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Grand Master of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Victorian Order, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, one of His Majesty's Personal Aides-de-Camp, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada.
