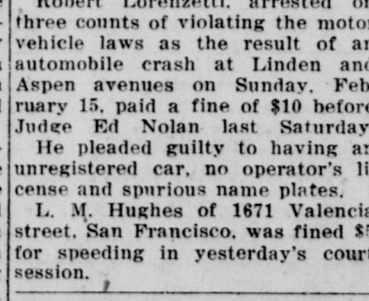
FIRE AT SMELTER DOES LITTLE DAMAGE

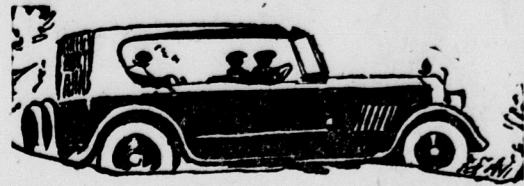

Workmen's Compensation Insurance, Duties of Industrial Accident Commission Explained By Official

In California Safety News The Industrial Accident Commission is composed of three members, each of whom is appointed by the governor.

The duties of the commissioners are also fixed by law, and little latitude is granted by law to any individual commissioner.

The safety department, the personnel of which consists of trained engineers whose duty it is to eliminate all hazards where workmen are employed, assist and advise the commission concerning safety rules, and the adoption of safety devices, inspect places of employment, and report to the commission any violation of the safety rules of the commission.

The State Compensation Insurance fund, as its title indicates, performs all the services that any independent casualty insurance company does.

The compensation department handles all complaints of injured employees. Through this department all disputes arising from compensation are decided.

The jurisdiction of the commission extends only to injuries occurring in the course of and arising out of the employment.

A Noncompensable Accident An employee is performing his usual duties in an oil-filling station; he is in the employ of an oil company, and in charge of the oil station.

and the employee is shot down. The rifle was discharged from a room in a lodging house across the street from the oil station. The direct cause of the injury, it will be noted, did not arise out of the employment; nothing connected with the work injured him, yet it occurred in the course of the employment, but it is not compensable because the injury did not arise out of the employment.

A Compensable Accident Now let us assume another case in which both the elements required under the law will be found to be present. The employee is pumping the oil into the tank of an automobile; there occurs an explosion about the automobile and the employee is injured. It is apparent at once that the injury arose out of the employment, and it occurred, while the employee was performing a duty.

The cases just given you, of course, are main ones. My purpose in so doing is emphasize the difference which exists in cases, and to try to point out to you this very important and all-controlling feature of our compensation law.

Report All Injuries Promptly Much anxiety and worry on the part of employees and extra and unnecessary work now being done by the commission could be avoided if the employees, prior to sustaining injuries, would take the time to acquaint themselves with a law which is of such vital importance to them.

Industrial Accident Commission, 911 Pacific Finance Building, Los Angeles, California. Dear Sirs: I have been laid up now for four weeks and I have not received any compensation.

It is patent on the face of this letter that the writer gave us no information upon which we could act. He failed to tell us the date of his injury. He omitted to give us the name of his employer.

The Basis of Compensation Compensation is fixed according to the amount of wages earned. It starts on the eighth day after cessation of work, not from the date of injury.

come later on. But as a rule, a woman apparently gives more serious thought to situations which are strange to her than a man does. The man knows in a general way that an injured workman is entitled to compensation. Hence he demands what, according to law, is his due.

Temporary Compensation While passing through the first stages of injury in cases of this kind, he will be paid what might be termed temporary compensation. After the wounds have become healed and his condition has reached the permanent stage, minus the loss of an arm or a leg, or other losses, he is then in a position to receive a rating.

Death Benefits The death benefit feature of the compensation law can not be over-estimated. Its importance, from an economic standpoint, is very far-reaching on our body politic. It is an anchor to windward for the widow and children of the employee who is killed while in the performance of a duty.

Safeguarding Dependents Many widows and half-orphan have, by this wise provision of the law, been saved from becoming the victims of designing persons. In many cases the employee, through injury, may be laid up for some length of time, and yet he may sustain no permanent disability.

Temporary Compensation While passing through the first stages of injury in cases of this kind, he will be paid what might be termed temporary compensation. After the wounds have become healed and his condition has reached the permanent stage, minus the loss of an arm or a leg, or other losses, he is then in a position to receive a rating.

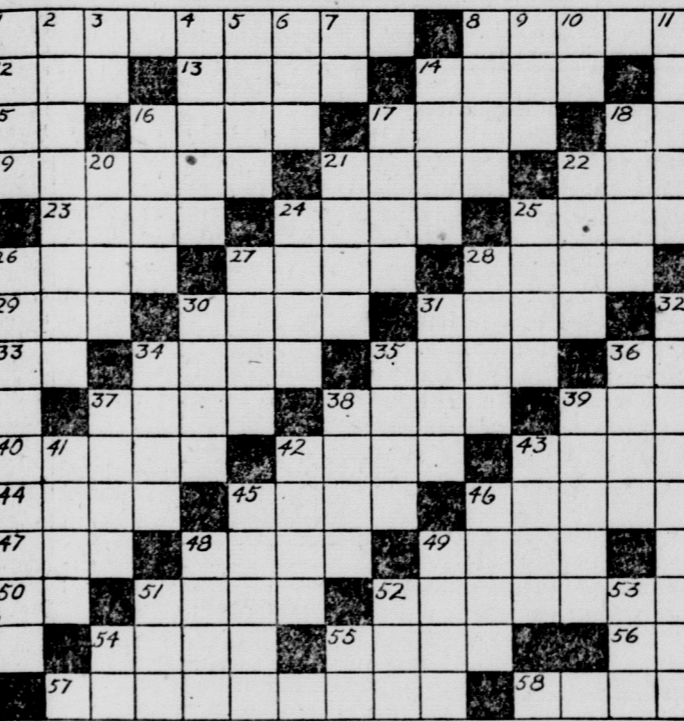

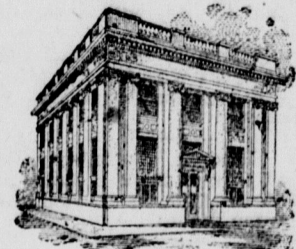

WHO'S WHO in the HIGH SCHOOL

Editorial Note:—This is the second of a series of sixteen articles which will be printed, giving the past achievements and present-day policies of each high school teacher.

HARVEY J. HOLT
Harvey J. Holt, vice-principal and head of the science department of the South San Francisco High School, hails from Missouri. His high school and college training were both taken at the Central Wesleyan College at Warrenton, Mo. Laboratory sciences and physical education interested him early, and he majored in these. His popularity in the local high school is no new achievement for Holt, for he was at one time captain of the varsity basketball team at college, and president of his graduating class.

Having completed his collegiate work, he moved to the neighboring state of Iowa where he taught for two years each in the Charles City High School and the Mason City High School, holding the position of head of the science department in each. During his last year in Iowa, he was president of the State Teachers Science Association.

So efficient was Holt in his line of work, that when the army intelligent tests were made during the war, it was seen fit to place him in the chemical branch of warfare. He served two years in the poison gas research department, Bureau of Mines, Washington, D. C. and received chemical injuries during his military service, for which he was awarded the silver discharge button.

One summer vacation he came west to California, expecting to return in the fall. But while here he chanced upon an opening in the local high school, and intended to remain but a year. That was almost five years ago. It is hoped that the next five years will find him still at his post, developing and materializing the ideas that he has for this community.

Holt is thoroughly imbued with the spirit of his native state—that is, "show me." Not only does he require all his students to "show him" in their studies
