SAN DIEGO, September 12 .- Edward M. Walsh of Oaklan! and Theodore B. Lyman of St. Helena, Cal., both privates in the U. S. Signal corps, were killed this morning in one of the most sensational aviation accidents in the history of the American army. ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE REGULATING THE USE OF ALL THAT PORTION OF IARYLAND AVENUE WITHIN THE CITY OF GLENDALE LY. NG NORTH OF THE NORTH INE OF FIFTH STREET, ALSO ALL THAT PORTION OF KEN-WOOD STREET WITHIN THE CITY OF GLENDALE LYING NORTH OF THE NORTH LINE OF COLORADO STREET.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, to drive or cause to be driven, any truck, dray, wagon, oil wagon, truck wagon or other vehicle, regularly employed in carrying goods or merchandise, or any wagon or vehicle carrywithin the City of Glendale lying north of the north line of Fifth Street; provided, however, that this ordinance shall not apply to the use to; nor to the use of sprinkling tanks.

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MORGAN'S TAXI SERVICE

PUBLIC UTILITIES AND THE WAR

A. W. Leonard, president and manager of the Puget Sound Light, Traction and Power Co. of Seattle, brings out some points of great importance to the public on war policy of public utilities, as follows:

The problem is to keep pace with increasing industrial activity caused by the war on one hand, and material shrinkage of capital available for development of plants on the other.

The \$7,000,000 which the people are asked to provide through taxes and purchase of war bonds during 1917 exceeds the total amount set aside by the nation annually for investment purposes.

These savings which ordinarily are set apart to further the development of industry and public improvements and betterment of utility plants will be needed to carry on the war.

The period of the war will be one of tremendous industrial activity with enormous increase in manufacture of war supplies and ammunition, with artificially enlarged demand for labor at higher wages than ever before.
