THE HAGUE, Jan. 21. Second Chamber of the States General-Sitting of the 20th January.

For thirteen years the hope that had been conceived was not disappointed. During the last two years and a half, however, the opposition became stronger. Prosperity and history will have to decide on the means which it employed to attain its object, and on that faction which deceiving the nation, has brought down upon it so many calamities. The troubles which have broke out in other kingdoms will also have their influence when the time shall come to decide whether what has passed in Belgium is to be ascribed to faults committed by the Government, or to an agitation which manifests itself in society in general. And the preference given by the leaders of the faction to a civil war over a seperation of the two parts of the kinglom legally proposed in the States General, will mark the place which these events ought to hold in history.
