



This little school has been very well handled during the year.

The number of scholars living near this school has been quite variable for the past few years. Part of the time in 1888 there were but three. At time of writing this report there are twelve that ought to be in attendance when there is a school at this house. One farm, however, where there are three scholars, is posted for sale.\* If this farm remains unsold, a summer school here will *probably* have nine or ten scholars, but if the farm is sold there may not be more than six or seven summer scholars. The past year 14 different scholars have lived in the district, but the school register shows an average attendance of only  $8\frac{1}{2}$ .

In order to maintain a winter term of school there needs to be: first, a reasonable number of scholars;

second, good winter roads; third, extensive repairs on the school-house at a cost of several hundred dollars. With all these uncertainties and with a possible change in our school laws, at the next session of the legislature, it is a question for the town whether or not to remodel the house this year. With favorable weather it is feasible to open a spring school April 7th and hold a term of 13 weeks, and open a fall school August 25th, continuing the same 13 or 14 weeks to Thanksgiving, or even two or three weeks later, with an open season.

The whole number of different scholars registered in town during the year is 192; the average number belonging to the schools at any one time is 134, with an average daily attendance of 117. Two scholars from Adron Winship's attended the brick school-house in Mason during the winter, the tuition for which attendance has been satisfactorily adjusted.

Scholars neither absent nor tardy for one term: Charles Cowdrey, Minnie Blood, Fannie Blood, Eva Blodgett, Hattie Robbins, Mary Munsey, Winifred Taft, Emma Bourgault, Charlie Douglas, Robert Douglas, Irving Hodgman, Fred Pierce, Eddie Lynch, Edith Nutting, Edith Douglas, Lillie Wilson, Mary Batchelder, Merton Sanborn, Elmer Russell, Ernest Russell—one tenth of the whole number of enrolled pupils.

Scholars neither absent nor tardy for two terms: Nettie Lynch, Annie Ames, Willie Doonan, Emma Ames, Nora Brusnihan, Jennie Blodgett, Adrian Hall, Nina Doonan, Frank Doonan, George Doonan, Bertie Doonan—one seventeenth of the enrolled pupils.

Scholars neither absent nor tardy for three terms: Myrtie Heald, Beatrice Taft, Ida Ames, Celia Belanger—one fiftieth of the whole number. Lillie Ames has not been absent or tardy for three years.

Josie Conley has a perfect attendance record for

eight years.

We recommend that the usual sum of \$1,200 be raised for the support of schools for the ensuing year.


