

- 1. During the month of October 1969, the 9th Engineer Battalion, FMF, under the command of Lieutenant Colonel E. K. MAXWELL continued its primary mission of maintenance, upgrading, and asphaltic paving of Republic of Vietnam #1, from Chu Lai (BT520044) north to the Song Cau Lau River (BT081546). Engineer Support to the Americal Division, USA, and Free World Forces continued to require significant engineer effort.
- 2. Company A located at Hill 10 (BT199389) continued to maintain and prepare Route #1 from BT208376 to BT144456 in upgrading prior to paving, and from BT330209 to BT145458 for maintenance and repair; a distance of 19.5 miles.
- 3. Company B (-) located at Chu Lai with elements supporting the Provisional Land Clearing Company located at Gaza Strip (NE of Duc Pho) was engaged in support of Free World Forces in the Americal TAOR. In addition, Company B is responsible for maintenance and repair of Republic of Vietnam Route will from Chu Lai, (BT5200lt), to Tam Ny, (BT330209), a distance of 16.5 miles.
- 4. Company C (-) located at Chu Lai is engaged in support of Free World Forces in that area. The 3d Platoon Task Element at Tam Ky (BT290230) is responsible for minesweep of the Republic of Vietnam Route #1 from Tam Ky to Bridge 33, (BT237326), a distance of 7 miles.
- 5. Company D located at Landing Zone Baldy (Hill 63) (BT136448), continued maintenance and repair of Republic of Vietnam Route #1 from Huong Xuan (BT144456); north to the Song Cau Lau (BT081546), a distance of 8 miles. In addition, Company D is tasked with construction in support of Free World Forces in that area. Company D is tasked with maintenance of Route 535 from BT024345 to BT144456, a distance of 17 miles.
- 6. During the month of October, Repair and Maintenance of Republic of Vietnam Route #1 was broken down into three main areas of responsibility; Chu Lai to Tam Ky, Tam Ky to Huong Xuan; and Huong Xuan to Song Cau Lau. The 9th Engineer Battalion, FMF, is also responsible for the maintenance of Route 535 from Huong Xuan to Landing Zone Ross (BT025345).
- 7. During the month of October main construction emphasis was directed to maintaining 30 miles of asphaltic concrete and parallel shoulders when excessive fall monsoon rains flooded critical sections of QL-1. In addition, route 535 was maintained for all weather tactical traffic within the 7th Marine Regimental area of operations. Motor Transport elements supported by Company A, B, C, D, elements of Company C, 1st Engineer Battalion and 1st Shore Party Battalion expended 3,115 man days and 14,596 equipment hours in hauling 14,312 cubic yards of mineral products.

Headquarters Company spread 24,100 gallons of peneprime on shoulders of QL-1 from Chu Lai to Tam Ky to prevent erosion. Headquarters Company was also engaged in repair of QL-1 from Chu Lai to Tam Ky.

- 8. During the reporting period the 9th Engineer Battalion, FMF, conducted land clearing operations in two seperate locations within the Americal Division, USA, TAOR. Participating units were: Elements of the 39th Engineer Battalion, USA; headquarters Company, Service Company, Company B of the 9th Engineer Battalion, FMF, USMC; elements of the 7th Engineer Battalion, USMC; elements of the 26th Engineer Battalion, USA; elements of the 196th Infantry Brigade, USA, (Security); "F" Troop, 17th Cavalry, USA, (Security); and two Vietnamese Regional Force Companies. Elements of the 11th Infantry Brigade, USA, also provided security.
- a. 1 4 October 1969: Land clearing operations were conducted in BS grids 4575, 4576, 4476, 4376, 5174, 5224, 5275, 5374, 5375, 5474, 5574, 5575, 5675, 5775, west of Quang Ngai.
  - (1) 3,160 lineal yards trench destroyed.
  - (2) 400 acres cleared
  - (3) 120 bunkers destroyed
  - (4) Ordnance discovered and destroyed:
    - (a) 8 40mm rounds.
    - (b) 7 105mm rounds.

b. 12 - 31 October 1969: Land clearing operations were held in the Gaza Strip Area around Hill 43 (BS5377 and BS8045), north of Duc Pho.

- (3) 18,320 lineal yards trench cleared.
- (4) 68 punji traps destroyed.
- (5) 40 fighting holes destroyed.

- (7) The Command Post was assaulted three times by LOB bombs, received small arms fire twice and security forces received sniper fire on two occasions.



### PART III

## 1. Civic Action.

- a. During the month of September 1969, four NEDCAPS were conducted at Long Phu 1 and 2, (BT519032) and Tich Tay, (BT503042). Approximately 165 Vietnamese were treated.
- b. The battalion also continued a cultural exchange between Marines and Vietnamese Boy Scouts at the Catholic Orphanage.
- c. The battalion continued to supply garbage for the Tich Tay
  Pig farm. The Civil Affairs Section is encouraging the Vietnamese People
  to supply their own food for the pigs.
- d. During the reporting period the battalion accomplished support to Ly Tin School with two loads of scrapwood and tin for roofing. Three loads of scrapwood were delivered to the Tich Tay Buddhist School, three loads of scrapwood and forty bags of cement to the school being built at Long Binh Refugee Camp. Two loads of scrapwood were given to Pastor Hue's orphanage for desk and chairs. Twelve swings were made for the schools of Tich Tay and Chu Lai. Fifty bags of cement were given to An Tan for the bridge being built at Long Binh.




# 3. Engineer Operations.

- (1) Company D received approximately 3 to 5 small arms sniper fire at BT163438.



- b. 4 October 1969:
- (1) Company D found 1-60mm round at BT163436. Destroyed in paddy.

- (1) Company A assisted in MEDEVAC of one Vietnamese adult with gunshot wounds at B 199389.
  - d. 7 October 1969:
- (1) Company A assisted in MEDEVAC of one PF with multiple shrapnel wounds at BT199398.
- e. 9 October 1969:
  - (1) Company D found culvert destroyed at BT100518. Road repaired.
- f. f. 10 October 1969:
  - (1) Company D found culvert destroyed at BTO97525. Road repaired.
- (2) Company D found 1-81mm round on shoulder at BT163436. Destroyed in place.
  - g. 11 October 1969:
    - (1) Company D found culvert destroyed at BT097525. Road repaired.
  - h. 12 October 1969:
- (1) Company D, ARVN turned in 2-105mm rounds at BT196528. Destroyed in paddy.
  - i. 15 October 1969:
- (1) Company A assisted in MEDEVAC of four ARVN with multiple gun shot and shrapnel wounds at BT208375.

### n. 21 October 1969:


- (1) Company A assisted in MEDEVAC of one Vietnamese civilian with shrapnel wounds of lower extremeties at BT199389.
- (2) Company A assisted in MEDEVAC of one Vitnamese civilian with wound in abdomen at BT199389.

### o. 22 October 1969:

- (1) Company D personnel ambushed in M-54 cargo truck at ET101512. One USMC KIA, 1 USN KIA, 3 USMC WIA.
- (2) Company D assisted in MEDEVAC of one Vietnamese civilian with shrapnel wounds in back at BT102512.
- (3) Company C personnel found one anti personnel mine at BT219359. Destroyed in place.

### p. 23 October 1969:

- (1) Company D, Vietnamese civilian turned in one 60mm round and one 81mm round at BT217489. Destroyed in paddy.
- (2) Company D found and assisted in MEDEVAC of Vietnamese female with shrapnel wounds at BT102512.



- g. 24 October 1969:
- (1) Company A found 1-11-79 round on shoulder of road at BT200386. Destroyed in place.
  - r. 26 October 1969:
- (1) Company A found 1-M-26 grenade at BT204380. Destroyed in place.
  - s. 28 October 1969:
- (1) Company C found one body reported killed by PF's while placing anti-personnel mine at ET279258.
  - t. 29 October 1969:
- (1) Company A assisted in MEDEVAC of one Vietnamese civilian with shrapnel wounds at BT119385.
- (2) Headquarters Company Bridge Platoon assisted in MEDEVAC of two Vietnamese children wounded while playing with grenade at BT425115.
- 4. Voluntary Informant Program.
- a. During the month of October 1969, Vietnamese civilians turned in the following ordnance to the 9th Engineer Battalion, FFF:
  - (1) 1 60mm round.
  - (2) 1 81mm round.
  - b. Total funds expended for the period: None.
- 5. Patrols. During the month of October 1969, the 9th Engineer Battalion conducted 31 daylight and 31 night reconnaissance patrols consisting of checkpoints and observation posts in ET grids 4903, 4904, 4905, 4906, 5003, 5004, 5005, and 5006 between the hours of 1300 and 0400 with negative results.
- 6. Patrol Training. Puring the month of October 1969, the 9th Engineer Battalion in conjunction with the 1st Combined Action Group, Chu Lai, Rvn, participated with Combined Action Platoons in setting up night ambushes, reconnaissance patrols, and various Civic Action programs.
