





### AUTHOR'S NOTE.



HE compiler of this volume, who is a descendant of the Hazard family, has not endeavored to make a scientific, formal or final historical work, but simply a collection, more or less complete, of genealogical data in relation to the Hazard family. Such sketches of individuals have been inserted as the writer has been able herself to compile, or readily to obtain from sources of information open to everyone. The fac-similes and portraits have been, as is often the case

in books of this class, secured where it was possible to secure them, without always bearing a strict relation to the importance of the individual represented. In many cases where it would have been desirable, owing to the eminence of the person in question, to have given them greater distinction by this means or by a very full biographical sketch, it has not always been possible to do so; while, in other cases, less known members of the family have obtained a fuller treatment, owing to sources of information more readily available. Of the defects of the volume the author herself is more fully aware than the reader can be; but she is also more cognizant of the many difficulties which have prevented the perfection which she wished to obtain.

¶ It only remains to express gratitude above all to one whose kindness has caused this work to be printed; but whose characteristic refusal to allow her name to be mentioned as



# THE HAZARD FAMILY OF RHODE ISLAND

## First Generation



THOMAS HAZARD, the progenitor of the Hazard family in the United States of America, was born in 1610; he died in 1680; he married, 1st, Martha —, who died in 1669. He married, 2d, Martha, widow of Thomas Sheriff; she died in 1691. His name is first found in Boston, Massachusetts, in 1635. In 1638, March 25, he was admitted freeman of Boston. Two years later he was admitted freeman of Portsmouth, Rhode

Island. In 1639, April 28, he and eight others signed the following contract, preparatory to the settlement of Newport, Rhode Island: "It is agreed by us whose hands are underwritten to propagate a plantation in the midst of the island or elsewhere, and to engage ourselves to bear equal charge, answerable to our strength and estates, in common, and that our determination shall be by major voice of judge and elders, the judge to have a double voice." The founders and first officers of the town of Newport were William Coddington, Judge; Nicholas Easton, John Coggeshall, William Brenton, John Clarke, Jeremy Clarke, Thomas Hazard, and Henry Bull, Elders; William Dyre, Clerk. In 1639, June 5, he was named one of four proportioners of land in Newport, any three of whom might proportion it; "the company laying it forth to have 4d. an acre for every acre laid." September 2, 1639, he was admitted freeman of Newport, and in 1640, March 12, he was appointed a member of the General Court of Elections. In 1665, he was for a short time in Newtown, Long Island. In his will, proved 1680, his wife Martha, whom he calls his "beloved yokefellow," is sole executrix, and he gives her "all movable and immovable estate, as housing,

housing, goods, cattle, and chattels, etc." To his son Robert he gives 15. To his daughters, Hannah Wilcox and Martha Potter, wife of Ichabod Potter, 15.

There is a long line of descendants from this daughter Martha, and Ichabod Potter, with frequent intermarriages in the Hazard family. In the early history of the family it was almost an exception to find a Hazard who did not marry a cousin, and it is a curious fact that the lines in which these marriages were the most frequent, were often marked by the strongest men and women, both men-

tally and physically.

These few meagre facts are about all that can be found at the present day of the founder of the Hazard family in America. But Thomas R. Hazard, in his Recollections of Olden Times, has given an account of the family that goes back, even beyond the name; its European founder being the Duke de Charante, living about 1060, on the borders of Switzerland. From the Duke de Charante he has given an interesting account of the changes in the name, until towards the close of the eighteenth century, when it was, and still continues to be, written Hazard. Willis R. Hazard, a descendant of Jonathan Hazard of Newtown, Long Island (according to whose opinion Jonathan was a son of Thomas Hazard, but by other authorities a nephew), has given us the chief characteristics of the family; and although his account was intended for the descendants of Ionathan of Newtown, it is equally applicable to the Rhode Island family. He says: "The Hazards are a strongly marked race, handing down and retaining certain peculiarities from generation to generation. One is, a peculiar decision of character, a certain amount of pride, and a pronounced independence, coupled with a slight reserve. Physically they are strongly marked. Generally speaking, they are of good stature and vigorous frames with rather a square head, high forehead, brown hair, blue eyes, straight or aquiline nose, and with will shown by a firmly set jaw. Their complexion is fair, a little inclined to florid."

Few families in Khode Island have a brighter record than the Hazard family, where, if greatness is not always found, sobriety, honesty, and integrity make even the humblest lives worth studying; and when one finds, as is often the case, a retiring, unpretentious modesty combined with greatness, he must be pardoned for his enthusiastic admiration for the old family tree, that still sends out vigorous shoots after more than two hundred years of growth in America.

ROBERT HAZARD 2 (Thomas, 1), was born 1635; he died 1710. In 1665 he was admitted freeman of Portsmouth, Rhode Island. From this time until 1698 his name often appears in the Colonial records as chosen to fill some important position. In 1658, he sold John Roome, of Portsmouth, all his interest in Conanicut and Dutch Island. In 1667, the Court at Plymouth ordered, in

reference to a controversy between the English and Indians about bounds in Dartmouth, that in case Robert Hazard, of Rhode Island, could be procured, he should run the lines, etc. In 1670, he was juryman. In 1671, he bought five hundred acres of land in Kingstown, of the Pettaquamscutt purchasers. In 1676, he and three others of Portsmouth were a committee ordered by the Assembly to appoint their own men as keepers of Indians above twelve years of age. The Indians were to have "a sufficient place of security." Any master offending was to pay a fine of £5. In 1676, Robert Hazard was on a committee to procure boats for the colony's defence "for the present, and there were to be four boats with five or six men in each." At the same date he and three others were empowered to take exact account of all the inhabitants on the island, "English, negroes and Indians, and make a list of the same, and also to take exact account how all persons are provided with corn, guns, powder, shot and lead." A barrel of powder was put in charge of himself and three others, and two great guns in the yard of the late William Brenton, were to be impressed into the country's service and carried to Portsmouth, and placed, one "in the Ferry Neck and one near the house of John Borden." Robert Hazard and three others were to see that the guns were set on carriages and fitted for service. In 1676, also, he was appointed as commissioner to take care of and order the several watches and wards on the island, and appoint the places. In 1687, he was taxed 11s. 7d. in Kings-

Not long after this date, he built his house in Kingstown, which was still standing in the early part of the present century. It was on the site where now stands the house owned and occupied by the daughters of William Watson, Esq<sup>n</sup>, in the village of Mooresfield. The old house was very large, — possibly the largest in the town, not only at that time but for many years after. A well authenticated story is told of Dr. William Shaw, who, being called in to attend a

sick person in the house, drove into the back yard, and entered the house by the kitchen door. When he went out, he asked if the family always walked from the front door to the rear of the house, or did they have some conveyance? The ell was longer than the main body of the house, and in this ell was a capacious chimney. Inside the chimney were two stone seats, where, tradition says, the little slave children were wont to sit; the heat from the big oak-logs being no bad sub-

stitute for the hot sands of Africa.

In 1695, Robert Hazard gave to his son George the larger part of his Pettaquamscutt purchase. The deed runs: "I, Robert Hazard, late of Portsmouth, now of Kingstown, alias Rochester, for the natural affection that I have unto my son George, . . . . have given to him all my whole right and interest in or to the farm I live on now, by virtue of a deed from the whole Company of Purchasers, as may appear by a deed given under their hand. Said farm contains five hundred acres of land, more or less, bounded as in my original deed from aforesaid purchasers. Only I, said Robert Hazard, do reserve one hundred and twenty acres, and my now dwelling-house." The boundaries mention a big rock in the boundary line, about ten feet high. This rock is still to be seen in a substantial stone wall, and gave rise to the familiar name of his grandson Robert, who was called "Roc" Robert. This was also his signature, Robert Roc [his mark] Hazard. In 1710, a short time before his death, Robert sold the remaining part of this farm, with "my manor house where I now live," to his son Robert (for £300, current money), who, in 1718, gave it by will to his son Robert, after his mother's death; making three Roberts who had successively owned and occupied the old house. The last, upon the death of his mother in 1730, sold to his uncle George the remaining part of the farm. He in his turn gave the whole farm to his son, Col. Thomas Hazard, by will, in 1743. Col. Thomas, in 1748, sold it to John Rose. And thus, after sixty years, the old homestead passed out of the possession of the Hazard family.

Previous to the deed of gift to his son George, Robert had, in 1692, given to his son Stephen "all rights and interests in land belonging to Point Judith Neck, being ye seventh part of ye same, excepting one hundred acres and Little

Neck, so called, next Boston Neck."

In 1695, he also gave his son Jeremiah two hundred acres of land in Tiverton; and that his eldest son Thomas had land given to him by his father, is proved by the fact that in his will he says, "land that came to me by inheritance from my father, Robert Hazard." By these deeds it would seem that Robert

Hazard owned more than one thousand acres of land.

Robert married Mary Brownell, daughter of Thomas and Anne Brownell. She was born in 1639, and died in 1739, being exactly one hundred years of age. In an old copy of the Boston Gazette, dated Feb. 12, 1739, is found the following notice: "Newport, Feb. 9. Mrs. Mary Hazard, widow of Mr. Robert Hazard, of South Kingston, and Grand Mother to the deceased George Hazard, Esq., late Deputy Governor of Rhode Island, departed this life the

28th day of January last, in the Hundredth Year of her age, who was decently interr'd the Wednesday following. She had 500 Children, Grand Children, and Great Grand Children, and left behind her now living two hundred and five of the aforesaid number. She was accounted a very useful Gentlewoman both to the Poor and Rich on many accounts, and particularly amongst Sick Persons for her Skill & Judgement, which she did Gratis."

§ 3. ELIZABETH HAZARD, 2 (Thomas, 1). She married George Lawton, of Portsmouth, Rhode Island. He was admitted an inhabitant of the island of Aquidneck in 1638. On April 30, 1639, he and twenty others signed the following compact: "We whose names are underwritten do acknowledge ourselves the legal subjects of his majesty King Charles, and in his name do hereby bind ourselves into a civil body politicke, unto his laws according to matters of justice." In 1648, he was a member of the Court of Trials. In 1665, '72, '75, '76, '79, '80, he was Deputy. August 31, 1671, there was a meeting at his house of the Town Council, and Council of War of the two towns was ordered by the Assembly to be held on September 5th, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, "there and then to consider of some ways and means for securing the inhabitants and their estates in these times of imminent danger." Twenty horsemen (ten from each town), completely armed, were to attend at same time and place for the defence of said council there sitting, treachery of the Indians being feared.

In 1676, April 4, it was voted by the Assembly: "That in these troublesome times and straits in this colony, the Assembly, desiring to have the advice and concurrence of the most judicious inhabitants, if it may be had for the good of the whole, do desire at their next sitting the company and counsel of sixteen persons,3 among them George Lawton."

On May 2, 1676, he and John Easton were desired to go to Providence, with all convenient speed, to determine whether garrisons shall be kept there at charge of colony, a petition having been sent to the Assembly from that place concerning their distressed condition in these present times of wars with the Indians. In 1678 (October 30), there was ordered by the Assembly a meeting to be held at his house 13th of January next, to adjudge and audit all accounts between towns of Newport and Portsmouth, relating to late Indian wars.

On January 30, 1690, he and five other assistants, with the Deputy Governor, wrote a letter to their Majesties William and Mary, congratulating them on their accession to the crown, and informing them that since the deposition of Governor Andros, the former government under the Charter had been resumed, and mentioning also the seizure of Andros in Rhode Island, and his return to Massachusetts on demand of the latter colony.

Lawton died October 5, 1693, and was buried in his orchard in Portsmouth.

They were married 1658. In 1658, Jan. 30, he had a deed of thirty-four acres from Thomas Hazard as dower with his wife. May 18, 1669, his name was in the list of inhabitants of Westerly. In 1670 he was complained of, with his partakers, by John Richards, Treasurer of Harvard College, for unjustly possessing five hundred acres in the Pequot country, on the east side of Pawcatuck River, within the bounds of Stonington.

THOMAS HAZARD, 3 (Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in 1669; he died in 1746. He seems to have taken little interest in town or Colonial affairs, for the records preserve a deep silence, when asked to give some items for a sketch of his life. The old books of land evidence, however, show his name more often than that of any other of the old planters, as a purchaser of

large tracts of land, — not bought of the Indians for wampum or glass beads, but of the original purchasers, at good prices. Possibly the price £700, paid in 1698, for nine hundred acres, would have been considered a fair valuation one hundred and fifty years afterwards, before this neighborhood had become a fashionable resort in summer.

One can but speculate as to the nature of the business that enabled Thomas Hazard to invest so often, large sums in land. There could have been no sufficient home market for the products of his large plantations, where all men were planters; or for the increase of his stock of horses and cattle; but he may have been a large exporter. If Diedrich Knickerbocker, that veracious historian, can be trusted, the Narragansett pacers were even then in great demand. It may be that he built the ships in which he exported his farm produce and horses. The ships, if sold in England, with a deck-load of ship timber "for the King's navy," would have been a rich source of gain. There was certainly, previous to 1746, a ship-yard, "Great Pier" and ware-houses, on the farm that he gave by deed, in 1739, to his son Jonathan. This farm, situated on Boston Neck is now known as the Governor Brown farm and John J. Watson farm; and possibly the pier stood where the Watson pier now is. About 1746, or some time previous, Jonathan Hazard sold to his brother George one-half of the pier and one-half of the ware-houses and ship-yard.

In 1684, Thomas Hazard was admitted freeman from Portsmouth; after this date his name appears only twice in the Colonial Records, viz.: in 1696 as freeman from Kingstown, and in 1717, as appellant in a law-suit. Previous to 1698, he made his first purchase of land in Narragansett, buying of Samuel Sewall nine hundred acres for £700, being the "land lately occupied by Robert Hannah." In 1710 he also bought of Samuel Sewall three hundred acres for £500, also five acres of salt marsh and eighty acres near the "great pond." In 1703, and in

1708, he bought two parcels of land from Benedict Arnold, one containing one hundred and sixty acres and the other twenty-six acres. This last purchase was what is called Little Neck Farm, and was afterwards given to his son George. In 1727 he bought of Samuel Vial six hundred and sixty acres in Boston Neck, and in 1738, eight hundred acres of Francis Brinley, adjoining the above purchase. Besides these lands, he at different times bought small pieces of land varying from ten rods to twenty-five acres, in different parts of the town. The whole amount of his land, including land that he mentions in a deed as "coming to me by inheritance," amounted to something less than four thousand acres.

The greater part of his land, he, according to the custom of the day, gave to his sons before his death; and as each son attained his majority he was given, "for natural affection," and, as sometimes was added, "valuable consideration," a farm of several hundred acres. On most of these farms thus given away were dwelling houses, out-buildings, and orchards. In his will he mentions no land, with the exception of three hundred and sixteen acres that he gave to his grandson and Fones Hazard, son of his deceased son, Stephen. The inventory of his personal estate shows no list of cattle and slaves, as is shown in the inventories of the estates of his brothers, all of whom, except Jeremiah, the youngest, he outlived. The inventory shows about £3,785. A few hundred pounds went to his daughters and granddaughters, and the rest to his son Robert, who was named residuary legatee. The manor-house and homestead farm also, not having been given away, became Robert's. In the early part of the present century the old house was still standing, not far from that now owned and occupied by Thomas G. Hazard, a lineal descendant of Thomas Hazard, [3].

Thomas Hazard divided his Boston Neck land by deeds to his sons thus, be-

ginning north: -

Benjamin, three hundred and thirty acres [now called the Jencks farm]; Jonathan, three hundred acres [Governor Brown farm], and two hundred and nine acres [John J. Watson farm]; Robert, two hundred acres [the Updike farm]; George, two hundred acres [Thomas G. Hazard farm], and two hundred and nine acres [Thomas M. Potter farm].

He married, it is supposed, Susannah Nichols; she died before him.

39. MARY HAZARD, born Oct. 3, 1683; married, 1st, John Robinson, son of Rowland Robinson and Mary; married, 2d, Peter Easton, son of James Easton.

40. HANNAH HAZARD, born April 11, 1685; married Nicholas Easton, son of James Easton. 41. SARAH HAZARD, born July 5, 1687; married Stephen Easton, son of James Easton.

42. ROBERT HAZARD, born May 23, 1689; married Sarah Borden, daughter of Richard and Innocent Borden.

43. THOMAS HAZARD, born May 11, 1691; died before his father. Tradition says that he married a member of the Easton family.

§ 7. GEORGE HAZARD, 3 (Robert, 2, Thomas, 1), died in 1743. He was admitted freeman of the Colony in 1696. In 1701, '02, '06, '07, '09, '13, he was Deputy; in 1703 and 1704, Assistant. May 6, 1713, he was appointed by the Assembly one of a committee to make the public road leading through the Colony from "Pawtucket River to Pawcatuck River more straight and fair and passable." In 1719 he was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel of Militia for the main land.2 and was ever afterward called Colonel George Hazard. He became a large landholder like his brother Thomas. In 1695 his father gave him by deed three hundred and fifty acres, being a part of the original purchase; and after the death of his mother, in 1739, he bought of his nephew, Robert Hazard, the remaining part of the farm with the manor-house. Thomas R. Hazard, in his Recollections of Olden Times, has mistaken the graves of George Hazard and of his father and mother, upon this farm, for those of "Stout" Jeffrey Hazard and his family. But Jeffrey calls his farm in Exeter, that he gave to his son Jeremiah, "my homestead farm." Colonel George Hazard kept up a very large establishment until his death in 1743, when he must have been over eighty years of age. In the inventory of his personal estate, there are seventeen slaves. There were thirty or forty head of cattle, one hunded and fifty sheep, and other animals. On the homestead farm are still to be seen long lines of stone wall built by slaves; the work was so well done that the wall still stands firm and straight, after two hundred years of frosts and changing seasons.

In 1719 (April 29), Colonel George Hazard and Henry Gardiner gave to Thomas Culverwell, "late of Norrage, Connecticut, but now of Kingstown," for love and good will, "more especially for ye promoting of ye woolen manufacturing, which may be for my benefit and the public good," etc., a tract of land, "being a little part of my now dwelling place, and is bounded as follows: East and North on the Saucatucket river, South and West on said George Hazard." Henry Gardiner gave to Culverwell full powers to make a dam over said river upon his land, "said dam being for the promoting of a fulling mill and ye fulling of cloth." That this dam was built, and also a mill, which, perhaps, was operated, is proved by the fact that two years later, September 29, 1721, Culverwell gave a quit-claim to George Hazard for this land, "with all houses, mills, and all improvements thereon made and done." The boundaries place this mill at what is now known as Lawton's saw-mill, about half a mile north of Rodman's mill at Mooresfield. This must have been almost the first mill in South Kingstown, as it antedates the

old mill at Peacedale by nearly half a century.

In 1721, George Hazard gave to his son Caleb one hundred and fifty acres, "with all houses and outhouses, &c., . . . in a place called the Back Side of the

Ponds." His will, proved in 1743, gives to his son Colonel Thomas Hazard "the homestead farm where I now live, with all housings, goods, chattels, and credit, and he to have profits till 1747 of northern part of Back Side farm, and profits of land given to grandsons Robert and Caleb, sons of my son Caleb, till said Caleb is twenty-one, my son Caleb having had his share of my estate before his death."

To his son Oliver was given three hundred acres of land in North Kingstown, this being in addition to other land given him by deed. Land in Point Judith, including the Foddering Place, with islands in the pond, had been given to his son Governor George Hazard, who died before his father. Colonel Thomas Hazard was made residuary legatee.

Mr. Hazard's slaves were named Jack, Jane, Cæsar, Ming, Prish, Betty, Jenny, Joe, Paro, Harry, Will, Jacob, John, Cuff, and infants Dinah and Moll. As the old slaves seem to be more or less identified with the old plantations and the old

masters, it does not seem out of place to mention them here.

George Hazard married Penelope, daughter of Caleb and Abigail (Wilbur) Arnold, and granddaughter of Governor Benedict Arnold. She was born August 3, 1669, and died in 1742.

§ 8. STEPHEN HAZARD, 3 (Robert, 2; Thomas, 1). The date of his birth is not known; he died September 29, 1727. He was an active and enterprising spirit in the affairs of the Colony. A large landholder, he early in the century saw the possibilities for water-power in North Kingstown, and bought large tracts of land so situated as to control the power, near Bissell's (now Hamilton) Mills. It is possible that he built the mill, that was after his death owned by his son Thomas. He was admitted freeman in the Colony in 1696, but previously to this date (in 1687), he was taxed 15. in Kingstown. In 1702, '06, '08, '09,' 15, he was Deputy; in 1707, '08,' 19, '20, '21, '22, he was Assistant. In 1707 he was appointed Justice of the Peace for Kingstown: this office gave him the title of Judge, by which he is known by his descendants. In 1715 he was allowed 185. by the Assembly for running the line between Eldred's purchase and Hall's purchase.<sup>2</sup>

On January 14, 1692, his father Robert gave him by deed "all my rights in Point Judith Neck, in Pettaquamscutt Purchase, being one seventh part of the land,

except one hundred acres, and the Little Neck, so called, next Boston Neck." There was, as far as can be determined at this date, about three hundred acres of this land. In 1710 he bought of Samuel Clarke, one hundred acres for £150. On July 9, 1713, Francis Brinley, "for the sum of £200 in silver, at eight shillings the ounce, to me paid by Stephen Hazard," sells one moiety, or half-part

of a tract of land, containing one hundred acres.

In his will, written September 19, 1727, proved October 9, 1727, he gave his sons Stephen and Robert three hundred acres of his Point Judith land to be equally divided between them. To his son Samuel, two hundred acres in North Kingstown, and a part of Mumford Island—now called Great Island. To his son Thomas, three hundred acres in North Kingstown, the remaining part of Mumford Island. The inventory of his personal estate amounted to about £3000. He had two hundred and twenty-five head of cattle and twenty-two horses. This will mentions silver buttons, silver shoe-buckles, a tankard and spoons.

Stephen Hazard married Elizabeth, daughter of Rouse and Mary Helme. She died in 1727, before her husband.

His will, proved November 10, 1718, gave to his son Jeffrey, called "Stout" Jeffrey, three hundred acres of land, which he called "the farm where I now live." It was probably in Exeter, then a part of Kingstown, as Jeffrey gave by deed to his son Jeremiah this farm, calling it "my homestead farm." To his son Thomas he gave two hundred acres in Kingstown, and one hundred and sixty-five acres in Westerly. To his son Robert, he gave the old manor-house, and one hundred and twenty acres, given to him by his father; but Robert was not to have possession of the house, and twenty acres, until after his grandmother's death. To each of his daughters he gave, when of age, £100. The inventory of his personal estate mentions three hundred and twenty-six head of cattle; his "cattle" including seventeen horses, six mares, five colts, four yearlings, riding beasts, &c.

The ten acres were conveyed by deed for the first time, by the heirs of Wilbur Hazard to Hazard Burlingame, a few years

ago. It is now owned by his heirs, he being a descendant in the female line of Ieremiah Hazard.

generation he was a large landholder, although not large in proportion to the landholders of the preceding generation, whose estates numbered thousands, instead of hundreds of acres. A part of his land was given to him before his father's death, but the greater portion he obtained by purchase. In 1721, he was given by his father, one hundred and fifty acres on Tower Hill. This is the farm now owned and occupied by William Nichols. It was afterwards given by Robert to his son Thomas, called "College Tom." The old Mansion House (built perhaps by Robert), was still standing a few years ago. In 1739, he received from his father by deed, two hundred acres of his Boston Neck land. This Robert gave to his sons Richard and Jonathan, by will, having previously given them by deed when of age, as the custom then was, twenty acres. This land was not given as a means of support, but as a qualification for them to become freemen, or voters. His "mansion house," which was on the farm, now owned by Thomas G. Hazard, was given to his son Ionathan by will; also to Ionathan and Richard was given a farm of three hundred acres, near Worden's Pond, -land inherited from his father as residuary legatee. His father bought this land in 1710, of Samuel

One hundred and thirty years have passed since the death of Robert Hazard. Perhaps his will shows us as much of his character, as can be traced at this late day. It shows us a man who left nothing to chance, and who attended to all minute details, and used an even-handed justice in the equal distribution of his worldly goods. The will bears date March 11, 1762. . . . "Being sick and weak in body but of a sound mind and in perfect memory, &c. Item, I give to my beloved wife Sarah, my Mulatto woman called Lydia, also four cows, such as she shall choose, to be kept yearly and every year, for and during the summer season, by my two son's Jonathan and Richard, and ye winter season by my son Thomas Hazard, yearly and every year, also a black mare called her mare, also sixty pounds of sheep wool to be delivered to her yearly and every year, twenty pounds by my son Thomas Hazard, and twenty pounds by my son Jonathan Hazard, and twenty pounds by my son Richard Hazard, also one equal share of my Puter, Brass, Iron, and wooden vessels; also two of my feather beds, with furniture belonging to them, such as she shall choose; also one room in my Mansion House, such as she shall choose, together with a privilege in the Kitchen, Cellar, Cheese House and well; also ten bushels of apples yearly and and every year, to be choosen by her in ye Fall of ye year out of ye orchard adjoining my Mansion House; also three barrels of cider to be provided her yearly and every year by my son Richard Hazard; also one of my largest silver spoons, one salt spoon, also three silver spoons marked, I. B., and R. B., S. H., I. R. B. and two other spoons, as she shall choose; also three hundred weight of good Pork to be provided for her yearly and every year, one hundred weight by my son Thomas, one by my son Jonathan, and one by my son Richard; also two hundred weight of good Beef to be provided in the same manner; also twenty bushels of Indian corn, . . . also two hundred weight of Flower; also the use of the improvement

of my garden annually; also the keeping of her mare; also sixty pounds in bills

of credit old Tenor to her paid yearly by my son Thomas."

Also the use of my Mulatto man Newport; also one equal half of my tables, and chairs, also my cupboard, desks, chests, one equal part of them all. All above

bequests to be in Lieu of her Right of Dower, and power of thirds.

Item; I give to my daughter Sarah, one equal half part of my Puter, Brass, Iron, and Wooden Vessels, also one silver spoon, one of ye largest spoons, and five other spoons, to be chosen by her after her mother's choice, also two feather beds with furniture, to be chosen by her after her mother's choice, also one bay mare coming four years old (to be kept by Richard); also one half part of my tables, chairs, etc., also my negro woman Bell or Isabel; also privilege of living in my Mansion House with her mother until her marriage day; also a thousand pounds in Bills of Credit of ve old Tenor, to be levied out of my movable estate; also of my cupboards, desks and chests, ye one-half part of them.

Item; I give to my daughter Mary Champlin five hundred pounds; one silver

salt spoon, and one of my largest spoons, and five other silver spoons.

Item; I give to my son Thomas Hazard a tract of land containing one hundred fifty acres . . . also one other tract of land with dwelling house thereon, bounded &c.; ... also all right in Sege Island, also one-third part of my right in Susquebannah Purchase, so called, he paying one-third part of the charges that may arise in securing the same, also one-third right in Pine and Cedar swamp.

Item; I give to son Jonathan a tract of land with my Mansion House and the buildings &c., . . . also tract of land lying west of Wordens Pond, . . . also one-third

right in Susquehannah Purchase, and in Pine and Cedar swamp.

Item; I give to son Richard a tract of land with dwelling-house, bounded East on twenty acres given him by deed, &c., . . . also one-half part of land at ye westward of Wordens Pond &c., ... also one-third part of Susquebannah Purchase, and one-third part in *Pine* and *Cedar* swamp.

Item; son Jonathan, my mulatto man Newport, after his mother has done with

him, also mulatto boy called Dick.

Item; ... to wife Sarah, negro child Phyllis.

Item; ... to daughter Sarab, negro child Phebe."

Robert Hazard married Sarah, daughter of Richard and Innocent Borden. She was born July 31, 1694.

§ 44. STEPHEN HAZARD, 4 (Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1) was born June 13, 1693; he died December 24, 1718. He married Margaret, daughter of John and Lydia (Smith) Fones. In his will he leaves "all my estate both real and personal, to my beloved wife Margaret." She married in 1727, soon after the death of her young husband, Joseph Holmes. On a farm in North Kingstown, now the property of Warren Arnold, there is, a few rods south-east of the house, the family burial place of John Fones, containing twenty or thirty graves. On the east side of this ground there is a large rock, about fifteen feet broad, rising three or four feet above the ground with a perpendicular smooth side to the west, against which are the feet of the graves, each boxed to the height of about sixteen inches on the surface by common wall and flag-stones, not cemented. At the head of each there is a black slate stone about eighteen inches high, scrolled around the sides, and with the usual oval top with head and wings. The first grave at the right hand reads, "Here lies buried Stephen Hazard who died December ye 24, 1718; aged 25 years."

The second reads, "Here lies buried Susannah daughter of Stephen and Mar-

garet Hazard. Died, June 8, 1717; aged 2 years and 24 days."

For nearly two hundred years has the young husband and father rested beside his little daughter, under the shadow of the great rock, in the burial ground of his father-in-law, but no wife sleeps beside him.

§ 46. GEORGE HAZARD, 4 (Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born January 18, 1699; he died 1746. His will bears date October 11, 1746, about a month previous to the date of his father's will. On July 28, 1721, his father gave him by deed fifty acres, and in 1738 he gave him by deed four hundred and nine acres, being what is known as the Thomas G. Hazard and Thomas M. Potter farms. George, by his will, gave two hundred and nine acres on the Point to his son, Enoch Hazard, whose children sold in 1797 to Jeremiah Niles Potter, and which he in turn sold in 1798 to Elisha R. Potter.

There are many men of note that claim George Hazard as a direct ancestor, and judging from his descendants he must have been a man with a curious combination of pride and sensitiveness. Strong men do not spring from weakness. The qualities that made the Honorable Benjamin Hazard of Newport one of the best lawyers of his day, where were they not inherited? The physique and strength of his great-grandson, Sylvester R. Hazard of Newport, could not have come from a dwarf in stature. An eye-witness says that he once saw Sylvester Hazard place himself under a medium-sized horse, and lifting it from the ground, he car-

ried

ried it across the street. If one looks for gentle traits, they are found in the gracious courtesy of manner and the purity of life of his great-grandson, Dr. Rowland Hazard of Newport. These are speculations and history read backward, but it is history indeed, if one can judge him by the long line of honorable men and women who are his descendants.

He married, November 17, 1721, Mary, daughter of Enoch and Mary (Sweet) Place. She was born October 16, 1697.

§ 47. BENJAMIN HAZARD, 4 (Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born November 2, 1702; he died in 1768. In 1738 he was given by his father three hundred and thirty acres in Boston Neck. He sold this land in 1750 to Daniel Jencks, and it is now known as the Jencks farm. Unlike his brothers, he did not increase his inheritance, and was not a large landholder. He died intestate, and probably insolvent, for after his death his daughter Hannah petitioned the town council to appoint George Hazard of Newport administrator of her father's estate, he being his largest creditor.

Though not a large farmer, he was an important man in the affairs of the Colony, and filled many positions with credit. In 1722 he was admitted freeman from South Kingstown; in 1744, '45, '46, '47, '48, he was Assistant. In 1745, "It was resolved and voted that Benjamin Hazard, Peter Bours, and Daniel Updike, Esq"., be, and they are hereby appointed a committee to take into consideration the last petition of the Massachusetts agent to the Right Honourable, the Lords of the Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, respecting the controversy about the boundaries between the said Province of Massachusetts and this Colony, and make such remarks, and form such instructions thereon as they shall think necessary, and present the same to his Honour the Governor, in order to be sent to the agent by the first opportunity, and lay a copy thereof before this Assembly at their next session." In 1749 he was on a committee appointed to burn the old tenor notes as fast as received, twenty thousand pounds of the new tenor being reckoned as eighty thousand of the old tenor.

He married, September 13, 1739, Mehitable, daughter of Abraham and Patience

Redwood; she was born in Salem, Massachusetts, September 16, 1722, and died June 18, 1761, aged 39.

§ 48. JONATHAN HAZARD, 4 (Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born October 7, 1704; he died 1746. His will was recorded October 9. In 1739, his father gave to him by deed two hundred acres in Boston Neck. This land he ordered, in his will, to be sold to pay his debts. Thomas, his son, called "Virginia Tom," sold it to Stephen Champlin. In 1785 it was divided among Champlin's heirs, and was afterwards owned by Walter Watson, who gave it to his daughter Abigail. Walter Watson's wife was a granddaughter of Jonathan Hazard, and a daughter of "Virginia Tom" Hazard, so that this was family property. It is now known as the Updike farm, — the Updikes being descended from the Hazards and Bowdoins through the Watsons. Somewhat earlier than 1739, Thomas Hazard gave, by deed, three hundred and thirty acres to Jonathan. This land his son Thomas sold to Stephen Champlin, and it was afterwards owned by Deputy Governor George Brown; now known as the Brown farm. A few years before his death, Jonathan conveyed to his brother George Hazard, a small part of the Watson farm, "with half the pier, half the warehouse, and half the boats and landing." This places a pier on the farm long before it was known as Watson's pier; the deed also mentions "one-half the shipyard," which makes Jonathan one of the earliest shipbuilders in the town. In 1742, Jonathan Hazard was Deputy; this is the only time that his name is found in the Colonial Records, with the exception that in 1728 he was admitted freeman from South

§ 49. ABIGAIL HAZARD, 4 (George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born March 9, 1690; she married Ebenezer Niles, son of Nathaniel and Sarah (Sands) Niles; he was born December 3, 1683. After her death he married Sarah Kenyon. He was brother to the Rev. Samuel Niles and Nathaniel Niles, and, with the last, owned several hundred acres in and about the village of Wakefield including a grist-mill and saw-mill. In a deed of land from his father, he was given permission to raise the dam to a certain stone, or to a certain mark on said stone. The picturesque old house in Wakefield now known as Dalecarlia was built by his brother, Nathaniel Niles, who died in 1766; so this makes the house certainly from a century and a quarter to a century and a half old.

§ 51. CALEB HAZARD 4, (George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born November 24, 1697; he died January 15, 1726. His father gave to him by deed one hundred and fifty acres, "land that I bought of George Whitman, bounded South on land of said Whitman, West on highway, North on land of William Congdon, East on Point Judith Ponds." This was the farm now owned by Elisha F. Watson. It was on this farm that Caleb was buried. If one can judge by the size of his grave, physically he could have been no exception to the Hazards of that day. He married, November 19, 1719, Abigail, daughter of William Gardiner. After his death his widow married, March 2, 1727, Deputy-Governor William Robinson, and was the mother of six of his children.

§ 52. GEORGE HAZARD, 4 (George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born October 9, 1700; he died in 1738; his will was recorded May 22, 1738. He was admitted freeman of the Colony in 1721. In 1729 he was Deputy, and so continued six years. In 1733 he was Speaker of the House of Representatives, and in 1734 was elected Deputy Governor of the Colony, and was re-elected four years in succession, dying in office in 1738. In 1733 he bought of his father, for one thousand pounds, the farm then (and still) called "The Foddering Place." About this time he built the old house, taken down about twenty years ago by Joseph Peace Hazard. The old house, like all houses of the wealthy planters of that day, was very large, being fifty feet on the front, having a fan-light over the entrance door, above which was a large arched window which gave light to the hall. This hall was square

square, with handsome oak staircase and balustrade. In the south end of the house was the parlor, a very large room, in one corner of which was the buffet, with the quaintly carved, scrolled back and top, that seems to have been a feature common to the houses of any pretension in Colonial days. The house was two stories high in front, but the roof ran down to the first story in the rear, a style still to be seen in some of the old houses that have been allowed to stand as monuments to the old builders. By his will,

George gave this house, with all outbuildings and George Stagun Sep Google an "Island called Ram Island," to his son George

Hazard, who was Mayor of Newport.

He married Sarah, daughter of James and Mary (Whipple) Carder. She was born May 14, 1705, and died 1738, after her husband.

§ 53. THOMAS HAZARD, 4 (George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born March 30, 1704, and died about 1787. He was Deputy in 1745, '48, '52, '53, '55, '56; in 1757 he was Assistant; in 1745 he was appointed Major, and in 1748, Colonel, by which title he is best known by his descendants. In 1725, he being then twenty-one years of age, his father, Colonel George Hazard, conveyed to him a "certain tract of land, being by estimation ten acres, be it more or less . . . with all Housings, Mills, Presses, Shears, and other things which may tend or belong to the Cloathing trade." This property was the fulling mill established by his father, Colonel George Hazard, in 1722-3, near what is now known as Moorsfield, at a place called Lawton's saw-mill. The land was a part of the homestead farm of Robert (2) Hazard. This whole farm of three hundred acres was given to Colonel Thomas by will, in 1743, and by him sold to John Rose in 1748. The residence of Colonel Thomas is not precisely known, although he was certainly living in Boston Neck in 1752, when his daughter Sarah was married to her second cousin, George Hazard, son of George, and grandson of Thomas (3)

A certain unity of opinion, and tradition, all seem to point to the fact that he was a man of ability; and that he was well educated is proved by the formal, facile hand-writing seen in his family Bible, and in the few autograph documents which escaped the destroying touch of time, and have been handed down to his descendants. descendants. He was both proud and gentle, and never violated a confidence. Surely one can be pardoned for giving credence to some of these old traditions, when the fact is recognized that many of these traits have been reproduced in some of his descendants.

Thomas Hazard married, December 11, 1729, Alice, daughter of Teddiman and Sarah (Sands) Hull; she Thomas Hazard. died 1737.

§ 54. OLIVER HAZARD, 4 (George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born September 13, 1710; died April 14, 1792. It is somewhat difficult to place the residence of Oliver Hazard, but probably he lived and died in South Kingstown. In 1734 he was admitted freeman of the Colony from that town, and in 1743 he had a valuable estate given to him by his father's will. A part of this land was trusteed, Colonel Thomas Hazard having the guardianship. He was also to have a part of the rents until 1747, but in 1744 he released the land to Oliver, doing so "in consideration of the love I have for my brother." In 1744 his nephews, William and Caleb, sons of Caleb, sold to him all the rights they had in their grandfather's estate. At the last date he was called Oliver Hazard of North Kingstown. His daughter Elizabeth was born in South Kingstown in 1737, and his daughter Mercy, grandmother of Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry, was born in North Kingstown in 1740.

He married, December 9, 1736, Elizabeth Raymond of North Parish, New London. This made him the grandfather of those remarkable men, Qliver Hazard and Matthew Calbraith Perry, and, through them, the ancestor of a long line of brave soldiers, both on land and sea. It would be interesting to know something of the family of Elizabeth Raymond, for, before the Civil War, the name Hazard was rarely found in army or navy lists, and it may be that the "fighting blood" was taken from the Raymonds. It was first developed in the Perry family in Christopher Raymond Perry, grandson of Oliver Hazard.

§ 56. HANNAH HAZARD, 4 (Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas 1), was born April 20, 1697; she married Joseph Mumford. He was born September 17, 1691, 1691, and was the son of Thomas and Abigail Mumford. His mother, Abigail, was murdered in May, 1707, by a slave, whom tradition says she had caused to be whipped for some misdemeanor. The slave's body was found on the shore of Little Compton. The Assembly ordered that his head and legs and arms should be cut from his body and hung up in some public place, and his body be burned to ashes, that it may be "something of a terror to others from perpetrating of the like barbarity in the future."

Joseph Mumford was admitted freeman of the Colony in 1722; in 1736, is found the following act: "Whereas, Joseph Mumford, of South Kingstown, in Kings County, yeoman, by petition, did set forth to this Assembly, that he, some time past, was at a great charge in building the pier at Point Judith in South Kingstown, aforesaid, which has been of great service to the country; but by the late storm the said pier was very much damaged, and has cost the petitioner considerable to repair the same, and the petitioner having received three or four cords of timber, which was designed for Block Island pier, prayed that the same might be allowed him towards repairing his said pier."

"Upon consideration whereof, it is voted and ordered, that the said three or four cords of timber received by said Joseph Mumford be allowed to him for repairing his said pier, without any account to be rendered for the same." This places the pier at Narragansett as being the first pier in the town, as there is no account of another until a few years later, at Boston Neck. Both were built by mem-

bers of the Hazard family.

§57. SUSANNAH HAZARD, 4 (Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born April 23, 1697, and died 1756; she married Samuel Perry (son of Samuel, son of Edward Perry). In 1722 he was admitted freeman of the Colony from Charlestown. In 1735 he was on a committee appointed by the General Assembly to consider the feasibility of turning the Pawcatuck river into the largest salt pond in Westerly 2 in order to keep the breach open, thus providing a harbor. Point Judith was then the nearest place for water communication with Newport and Providence for the inhabitants of Charlestown.3 The report was not favorable, and the project was dropped, to be taken up in 1892 by the United States Government, and a harbor provided for ships as well as for the people of Charlestown. The first project concerned the salt pond in Charlestown, and the second the salt pond in South Kingstown. In 1740, '41, '42, '46, Samuel Perry was Deputy for Charlestown, also in 1740 he was one of the trustees to George Ninegret, the Indian Sachem. In 1744 "it was voted and resolved, that Joseph Whipple, Esqr., Deputy Governor Stephen Hopkins, Esqr., Messrs. Stephen Brownell, Robert Hazard, Job Randall, and Samuel Perry be, and they are hereby, appointed a committee to determine what is rata-

ble estate, and prepare a bill for the same, and present it to the next session of this Assembly." He died previous to 1763.

§ 58. STEPHEN HAZARD, 4 (Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born November 29, 1700; he died in 1746. His will was proved, July, 1746. His home was in Point Judith, on the farm now owned by the heirs of Carder H. Clark. His father gave him this farm by will, calling it "the farm where I now live, one hundred and fifty acres, also fifty acres of homestead farm, bounded South on Jeffrey Champlin, West on George Hazard, North on land in occupation of William Robinson, East on remaining part of said farm, he paying to the Colony what said farm is mortgaged for." In 1735 he was appointed Justice of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas.2 This position gave him the title of Judge, by which he has always been distinguished from the other Stephen Hazard of his generation. He married, January 9, 1723, Mary, daughter of John and Mary (Hazard) Robinson. She was his second cousin; she was born September 30, 1705, and died 1780.

§ 59. ROBERT HAZARD, 4 (Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born September 12, 1702; he died 1751. In 1722 he was admitted freeman of the Colony, in 1734 he was Deputy from South Kingstown; this position he held until 1749; in the following year he was chosen Deputy Governor, and died while holding this office, his last term being May, 1751. That he was a prominent man in the affairs of the Colony, active and able, and faithful in the discharge of his duties, is shown by the fact that from his thirty-second year until his death he is always found performing the duties attendant upon his position,

making and sustaining the laws of the Colony.

His home was on Point Judith, on land given to him by his father's will, and was a part of the homestead farm. He married Esther, daughter of Joseph and Esther (Gallup) Stanton. Updike, in his History of the Narragansett Church, says: "Esther, the widow of Governor Hazard, was an extraordinary woman, portly and masculine." She was styled Queen Esther, and when mounted on her high-spirited Narragansett pacer, proudly travelling through the Narragansett country, the people would almost pay her homage. To offend her required more than ordinary courage. In manner she was affable and courteous, but when irritated her sternness would compel obedience. In a lawsuit, the title to a considerable part of the patrimony of her children was jeopardized. That no omission should endanger a favorable result of the suit, she attended the trial in person, and, from courtesy, she was permitted to sit on the bench near the judges. On a motion to the Court by Mr. Honeyman, who was the attorney for the adverse party, she, by a quick and sarcastic reply to a severe remark of his, excited the laughter of the Court, bar and audience, to the complete discomfiture of the old barrister. The claim of the adversary was defeated, and Queen Esther became quite a heroine in the courts of law. The rights of an infant offspring were safe in the hands of such a mother." Unfortunately, the nature of this celebrated retort, being more witty and strong than delicate, forbids its repetition. That it was well deserved, and called forth by the attack, seems to have been understood by the court and bar, which evidently exulted in the discomfiture of the worthy Honeyman.

§ 60. SAMUEL HAZARD, 4 (Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born July 28, 1705. He was admitted freeman of the Colony, from South Kingstown, in 1728; by his father's will he was given two hundred acres in North Kingstown, and also a part of Mumford Island, in Point Judith (now called Great Island). In the division of the slaves he was given "Short Joe" and the negro woman Megg. His home was for a time in North Kingstown, where he and his brother Thomas, in 1729, established a fulling-mill, on the present site of, or near Ham-

ilton Mills. In 1736 he sold his part to Samuel Bissell.' It is probable that about this time he removed to Newport, for in 1750 he and his wife Abigail, of Newport, sold to George Hazard, of Newport, their right in Mumford Island. Children

§ 61. THOMAS HAZARD, 4 (Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born July 28, 1707. He was admitted freeman in 1730. By his father's will he was given three hundred acres in North Kingstown, and a part of Mumford Island, in Point Judith Pond. The three hundred acres in North Kingstown were on the south side of the road that leads from Bissell's Mills (and is a part of that which is now known as the Hiscox home farm), and so on west to the country or Post Road. In 1729, Samuel Slocum, father-in-law to Thomas Hazard, sold to him, in company with his brother, Samuel Hazard, fourteen acres east of his home lot, with fulling mills and houses. In 1741 Thomas sold his interest to Daniel Fontain. At the sale there was conveyed fourteen acres of land with "mills, houses, fulling mill, tenter, brass and iron press plates, iron bars and a blacksmith shop." The whole farm was sold in 1772 to Gervase Elam, and was confiscated in 1775 by the State, Elam being a royalist and accused of giving assistance to the enemy. About 1741 Thomas Hazard seems to have moved to South Kingstown, for his children by his second wife were born there, and their births recorded in that town. In 1748 he was paid £3 13s. from the estate of Benjamin Waite, who was a tenant on his three-hundred-acre farm in North Kingstown. He married, February 22, 1727, Hannah, daughter of Honble Samuel Slocum. He had a child by this marriage, "Short" Stephen Hazard, and perhaps other children. The North Kingstown records are so badly injured by fire that it is impossible to verify this. His wife Hannah died January 24, 1737. He married, second, in May, 1738, Hannah Updike.

He is called "youngest son" in his father's will, and was left by the will one hundred acres of land, "south of homestead already bequeathed, being land I purchased of Joseph Hull, Jr.; also the tract of land called Maple Swamp; and with son Edward, a tract of land lying partly on Wood River, of two hundred and seventy-nine acres to be divided equally between them." He lived in South

Kingstown until March 1, 1731-2, when he was admitted freeman of Westerly, possibly that part of Westerly now Charlestown. He subsequently returned to South Kingstown, and took oath there May 6, 1735.

§ 82. JEFFREY HAZARD, 4 (Robert, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born September 29, 1696; he died in 1767. In 1718 his father gave him by will three hundred acres in Point Judith, with the Mansion House, "where I now live." Ieffrey was to bring up the younger children, all of them then being under age. In 1722 he bought of James Kenyon three hundred acres in Exeter, then in North Kingstown, as Exeter was not set off from that town until 1743. This land was bounded north on the estate of Benedict Arnold, west on dividing line of Pettaquamscut purchase, and south by land in possession of Jedediah Irish, east by undivided land, or on Cedar Swamp. By deed of gift dated 1751, he gave this land, calling it "my homestead farm," to his eldest son Jeremiah. One authority says that "Stout Jeffrey" lived in Boston Neck, on what is now known as the Governor Brown Farm. If this is a fact, then he must have been a tenant, and not owner of the farm, as this farm was, and had been since 1730, or earlier, in possession of Thomas Hazard (3), and his direct descendants. In 1746, Jonathan, son of Thomas, gave it to his son "Virginia Tom" Hazard; in 1760 his first wife was buried there. However, the residence or non-residence of "Stout Jeffrey," on this farm, does not in any way affect the truthfulness of the tradition that he did show the slaves how to make a stone wall, by lifting a blue stone, weighing by the scales sixteen hundred and twenty pounds, to its place on the foundation. There is another legend equally marvellous and equally well vouched-for in proof of the great strength of the man. The second legend relates that he once had an encounter with a man of great strength, who had come from a long distance to meet the Narragansett giant. When the man dismounted from his horse and stated his errand, Jeffrey picked him up and tossed him over the wall (it should have been the same wall that he had helped to build), and then threw the horse over to keep his master company. Notwithstanding his splendid vitality he died comparatively young, from the effect of a slight cold, taken while attending to his duties as Councilman. He was Deputy from Kingstown almost uninterruptedly from 1735 until 1758. There are a few descendants of "Stout Jeffrey" in the town at the present day,

and, with scarcely an exception, the men are six feet or more in height, well developed and proportioned. Doctor Thomas A. Hazard of Kingston, and his brother Jeremiah of Jamestown, were men who did no discredit to their sturdy ancestor. There is living in New York State, a great-grandson over eighty years of age, who weighs over two hundred and fifty pounds, and is still hale and hearty. Jeffrey Hazard married Mary ——; unfortunately there is no record of this marriage, or of her maiden name. It would be interesting to know from which of the old Narragansett families his descendants draw their good blood.

§ 152. MARTHA POTTER, 4 (John Potter, 3; Martha Hazard, 2; Thomas, 1), was born December 20, 1692; she died November, 1725. She married first - Allen: she married a second time, about 1718, Deputy-Governor William Robinson, son of Rowland and Mary (Allen) Robinson. William Robinson was born in the year 1603 and died in 1751. He was given by his father's will three hundred acres in Kingstown and three hundred acres in Westerly, and at his mother's death "all housings, mills and lands that were hers." To this estate he added largely by purchase, giving to his sons by will at his death one thousand three hundred and eighty-five acres. This was in addition to the farms given to them by deed at their majority. His South Kingstown farm extended from Point Judith to Narragansett Pier and thence to Sugar-Loaf Hill in Wakefield, a distance of several miles. When visiting the various points on his farm, superintending the work of his slaves, he always rode one of his Narragansett pacers. These horses he bred in large numbers. They were rather small in size, their peculiar merit consisting in an extremely easy gait. One could ride all day without feeling great fatigue. They were very fleet, and readily took the water when it was necessary to swim across a ford. These fords were apt to change after a great storm, especially in the Pettaquamscutt River, and a slave was usually sent on ahead, after one of these storms, to find the new ford for his mistress. But if a slave was not at hand and the mistress unwilling to wait, her trusty pacer would swim across

Governor William Robinson's public life covered a space of twenty-four years, and during this time he was always actively engaged in business of the Colony. He was Deputy in 1724, '25, '26, '27, '28, '34, '35, '36, '41, '48. In 1735, '36, '41, '42 he was Speaker of the House. In 1745, '46, '47, '48 he was Deputy Governor. The inventory of his estate is interesting, as showing not only the amount of his wealth, but the extent of his farming, and even the size of his house. The rooms were: great-room, great-room bedroom, dining-room, dining-room bedroom, store bedroom, northeast bedroom, kitchen, closet, store closet, cheese room, milk room, &c. All these were on the first floor, with corresponding sleeping rooms above. The large open attic, was the place for the looms, wheels, reels, &c., for converting the white fleece of his sheep and lambs into clothing for his family. His estate was inventoried at £21,573 5s. 5d. A pair of silver knee-buckles are now in the possession of his great-great-grandson, Benjamin F. Robinson of Wakefield. His silver "in the buffet in the great room" was inventoried at £374 8s. He possessed twenty slaves.

One of these slaves, called Abigail, was the daughter of that Abigail owned by Rowland Robinson, who grieved so bitterly for her son left behind in Africa, that her master sent her back to her native land to find the boy and bring him to her master's house, and to a state of bondage. The old man provided carefully for her comfortable sustenance on the voyage, giving the Captain a list of the things that he was to provide; these included cups and saucers, plates, knives and forks, with a certain amount of bread and meat and other necessaries, one bed with

furniture

furniture for the outward voyage, and two beds and furniture for the home voyage. Of course Rowland Robinson's friends and neighbors all laughed at his credulity in trusting his faithful slave, but as he had a crusty temper he was saved from an outward show of their amusement, for it was a bold man who offended him. A man that had such faith in human nature must have safely been trusted.

A short time before he left England for America, he quarrelled with one of his brothers; some ten or fifteen years afterwards a son of this brother came to seek his fortune in New England, and, of course, went to his uncle's house. The uncle refused to see him, but gave him the best room in the house, and detailed a servant to the young man's own service. He staid several months, and then his uncle bought for him an estate in Virginia, built a house, furnished it, and sent him, with the slave he had given to him, to take possession of the new home. It is to be hoped that the nephew had as fine a sense of honor as the slave, who returned with her boy, and served her master faithfully to the end.

Many years after Rhode Island had freed her slaves and provided for the old, weak, and feeble, a descendant of this Abigail, Bristol by name, worked for James Robinson, grandson of Governor William. One day, in mid-winter, the old man had been busy all day unloading a sloop. It was quite dark when the last load was brought home. Mr. Robinson met him and said, "Thee is late, Bristol, but never mind, the days will soon be longer." "'Fore God, massa," said

Bristol, "I hope the days will never be any longer."

As Rowland Robinson is the ancestor of many of the Hazard family, he has been given a place in these records.

- § 194. THOMAS HAZARD, 5, called "College Tom" (Robert, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born September 15, 1720; died in 1798. In 1742 he was admitted freeman of the Colony from South Kingstown. In 1748 he was Clerk of the Council. After 1742 his name appears several times in the Colonial Records, not as a member of the General Assembly, but as a petitioner on various matters that seemed to demand reform.
- In 1769, "Thomas Steere, Ephraim Congdon, William Redwood, Joseph Congdon and Thomas Hazard, son of Robert, in behalf, and by appointment of the Quarterly Meeting of Friends, held at Portsmouth, on Rhode Island, in October last, preferred a petition to this Assembly, and, for the reason therein assigned, prayed this Assembly to pass an act to prevent the selling of liquors, and the playing at games, &c., on the days and near the place where the General Meeting of Friends is annually held for religious worship; and the said petition being duly considered, "It is voted and resolved, that the same be, and hereby is granted, and the bill presented with said petition, pass into an act of this Assembly." In 1764, he, with about fifty others, among them being the most prominent

men in the Colony, petitioned the General Assembly to grant them full powers to "found, endow, order, and govern a College or University within this

Colony."

The petition was granted, and Thomas Hazard, with ten others, were declared the "first and present Fellows and Fellowship, to whom the President, when hereafter elected (who shall be of the denomination called Baptist, or antipaedo Baptists), shall be joined to complete their number."

This college, then founded under the name of Rhode Island College, afterwards

was changed in name, and is now known as Brown University.

Thomas Hazard entered Yale University, and for this reason was called "College Tom," a name by which he is distinguished from the other Thomas Hazards of his generation; he was not graduated from Yale, owing to the fact (as stated by Updike) "that he had become so thoroughly indoctrinated in the faith of the Quakers, that he became conscientious respecting collegiate honors, and left the institution before the regular period of conferring degrees." From the same authority is quoted, "Mr. Hazard was comely in person, large in stature, . . . and of great physical strength. He was a preacher of the Society of Friends for forty years before his death, and tradition speaks of him as a strong and forcible, argumentative speaker. He was deservedly popular in his denomination, and was the first in his society that advocated the abolition of negro slavery. He travelled much as a public Friend, preaching emancipation among his brethren."

In 1783, it was voted by the General Assembly "that the draft of an act authorizing the manumission of slaves, presented to this Assembly by the committee appointed to consider the petition of a committee of the people called Quakers, be referred to the third day of the next Session for further consideration," etc. Thomas Hazard was one of the signers of this petition, which was the opening

wedge to the emancipation Act passed February, 1784.2

Pleasant landmarks in the history of these prominent men of the olden time, are the houses they occupied. To know that one is walking over the fields their feet have so often trod, or to stand on their own hearth-stone, gives one a feeling of reality and close connection with the dead, but not buried, past. Thomas Hazard's home was on Tower Hill, on the farm now owned and occupied by William Nichols; his homestead, or manor-house, as it was called in old deeds and wills, was standing a few years ago. Some authorities say that Hazard was buried on this farm. Others say that he was buried in the yard of the Quaker Meeting-House; but wherever buried, his spirit haunts the old home around which linger vestiges of his personality. It is not difficult for the imagination to see the beautiful wife (for the women of the Robinson family were noted for their beauty) standing at the gate to watch her husband mount his horse and ride away on one of his frequent journeys. On one of these occasions a relative, who was visiting the Hazards, accompanied Mrs. Hazard to the gate. After

"Cousin Hazard" had mounted his horse and ridden over the brow of the hill well out of sight, she turned to enter the house. "Wait awhile," said Mrs. Hazard, "my husband will return, for he has forgotten something;" and presently was heard the clatter of the steel-shod hoofs of the returning horse. Without a word spoken, the rider, as he reached the gate, bent down and kissed the upturned face of the waiting wife. This incident occurred late in life, and is all the more touching for the reason, that it stands in proof of that steadfast love which naturally combines with "the steadfast convictions," that we are told controlled his life. He married, on March 27, 1742, Elizabeth,

daughter of Governor William and Martha (Potter)
Robinson; she was born on June 16, 1724; she died on
February 5, 1804. She was a great-granddaughter of
Thomas Hazard, the first in America, and consequently

was third cousin to her husband.

The record of the children of Thomas Hazard was taken from a little book entitled Extracts from the Journal of Sarah Howland, published in 1890, by Howland Pell of New York.

This is the farm now known as the Nathan G. Hazard farm. John, son of Benjamin, was called Wickham John, because a part of his inheritance came to him through his grandmother Wickham, or Wickom, as it is spelled in the deeds. Benjamin Hazard married Mary ——.

His father, by will, gave to him "a lot of land lying in Boston Neck, in South Kingstown, at the Pier, with half the Pier, half the warehouses and half the boats and landing, according as it is set forth and described in a deed of sale from my brother Jonathan Hazard, deceased, to myself, bearing date, &c., . . . and my negro man Olford. I also give and bequeath unto my son Simeon, the sum of three hundred pounds, current money of New

New England, with all my silver, except what was given to Enoch Hazard and Thomas Hazard by their grandmother, Mary Wickom, deceased." The deed referred to above, "from my brother Jonathan," mentions "the great shipyard." The Pier is what is now known as Watson's Pier. This deed and will goes to prove that this line of the Hazard family were not only large farmers and exporters of the products of their plantations, but also shipbuilders. This would account for the great prosperity of Thomas Hazard, the third in descent, and the large amount of ready money, in "good silver Spanish dollars," that he invested in land at a time when money was extremely scarce. Mr. Weeden in his account of the early shipbuilding in New England, says that many of the staunch American ships were sent to England and sold with their cargoes, often consisting of shiptimber and tall masts for the King's navy. "They knew by experience that a present of huge masts was the surest approach to the favor and bounty of their sovereign." Perhaps Thomas Hazard was one of those men who walked through their woodland, to mark the tall, straight trees, "For the King." Simeon Hazard married, in February 6, 1744, Abigail Mumford.

He inherited from his father a farm, now known as the Thomas Potter farm, in Boston Neck. This farm contained two hundred and nine acres. The south part of it was sold in 1797, by his children, to Jeremiah Niles Potter, who in 1798 sold it to Elisha R. Potter. Enoch Hazard was a prominent man in the town. In 1777 he was one of a committee to procure blankets for the army; in the same year he was on a committee to receive the stock belonging to the farm "lately improved by Silas Niles." In 1779, to "inspect the conduct of the tenants of the farms leased by the State." In the same year he was to take possession of the "fat" cattle on the farm in Point Judith, in occupation of William Gorton, to be sold for rents due the State. He married Mary, daughter of John and Mary (Perry) Potter. She died January 23, 1781.

His father gave to him by will "the remaining part of my homestead farm in Boston Neck, in South Kingstown, containing two hundred acres, bounded Easterly on the sea, Southerly on the two hundred and nine acre lot given to Enoch Hazard, Westerly on Pettyquamscut river, and Northerly on land of Robert Hazard. I also give to my son Thomas all my deer, the clock in the great room, and a round table, and a great glass in the great room, to him, his heirs and assigns, when he shall arrive to the age of twenty-one years." He was but eight years old when his father died. This farm given to Thomas is now known as the Thomas G. Hazard farm, being owned and occupied by Thomas G. Hazard. After the death of Thomas Hazard, his son, George P. Hazard, bought out the rights of the other heirs, and gave it by will to his nephew, the present owner. Of all the several thousand acres bought in Boston Neck by Thomas Hazard, this farm is the only land that has never passed out of the direct line of inheritance. As it

was given to George Hazard some time before his father's death, in 1746, it is possible, and probable, that he built the fine old house still standing, and occupied by the present owner. As far as one can judge from tradition and scanty documentary evidence, this line of the family has also retained, in a greater measure than other lines, the strongly marked characteristics peculiar to the earlier Hazard family. Through all this line one can trace a strong sense of justice, as shown in the equal distribution of property, and the care of the orphans of the family, and can perceive a pride of ancestry in many of the descendants at the present day, and an independence of spirit that unwillingly brooks opposition, and as unwillingly submits to an injustice.

Thomas Hazard's public life seems to have been confined to a few years' service in the General Assembly. He was called Thomas G. Hazard to distinguish him from others of the same name. It was equivalent to calling him Thomas, son of George. His name was entered on the town records without the G.; also his

father in his will does not use the G.

There is a well supported tradition in the family, that Thomas Hazard's estate, being in some way jeopardized, his sister Mary, who was eleven years older than her brother, went into court herself to attend to his interests. It is also said that this same Molly made several journeys to Philadelphia on horseback.

He married Mary, daughter of Jonathan and Ruth (Coggeshall) Easton; she was his second cousin. She was born May 20, 1743, and died November 26,

1794.

§ 214. THOMAS HAZARD, 5, "Nailor Tom" (Benjamin, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born January 23, 1756; he died in Westerly, Rhode Island, September 28, 1845. He was the second son of his father of this name, for the Portsmouth records show that a Thomas, son of Benjamin Hazard, was born December 25, 1742. After his marriage, — before which he had led rather

rather an unsettled life, — he lived in the old house which was taken down about 1850 to give place to a more modern structure. This house was built by Robert Knowles, grandfather of Thomas Hazard's wife. He used to say that the mansion was one of the two oldest houses in the town. It was a quaint old structure, and evidently built for protection as well as shelter, as was shown by the strong wooden shutters and double doors inside. When Hazard was an old man he

lost the possession of his home by the trickery of a trusted friend.

The "B." in Mr. Hazard's name was added, as so many other middle names were added, as a distinctive sign. He was also called "Nailor Tom," from one of his many occupations. He had a great fund of anecdote, and was an entertaining conversationalist. He was highly esteemed in his native town, and held numerous places of trust. For two years he was a Senator, and was elected by one hundred majority. He was a member of the Society of Friends, and appropriately to his belief was often a peacemaker and arbiter of differences. He impressed his personality strongly upon his associates. His features were sharply defined, so that people now living can describe him even to-day with singular fidelity to nature.

"Nailor Tom's" diary, or Blue Book, was highly esteemed by his townsmen, and was considered authority upon the matters noted. It is said that Mr. Wilkins Updike, the well-known lawyer and historian of Narragansett, used to say that he had rather see the Devil come into the court-room than "Nailor Tom" with his book. "Shepherd Tom" writes that the people of South Kingstown used to swear by "Nailor Tom's" book. Glancing through this famous book casually, its jottings would seem to be scanty and commonplace, but to one who reads carefully there are valuable data, and little incidents that give an insight into the

manner of living and social condition of the people of the time.

Thomas Hazard was a most ingenious man, with a strong bias for invention. In the blacksmith shop that stood within a few rods of his house, he made many quaint and curious articles, — a self-acting rat-trap being amongst the number,

so constructed that the captive rat set the trap for his successor.

Thomas Hazard was a great politician. Though not seeking office for himself, he was an indefatigable worker for his friends. He was not a demonstrative man. An anecdote told by an eye-witness is illustrative of his character and his manner of speech. He was once called as a witness in a lawsuit between James Robinson and Rowland Hazard, the question being as to the raising the mill-dam in Wakefield, which threw back-water on the wheel in Peacedale. When Thomas B. Hazard was called upon for his evidence, he commenced by quaintly remarking, "I had a goose once." This was met by a burst of laughter; when quiet was restored, he repeated the remark, only to be met by repeated laughter on the part of Mr. Robinson. When this had subsided, he said with the same even, quiet voice with which he had made the first statement, "Friend Robinson, if thee will have a little patience I think that the goose will hatch something for thee." And it did hatch a defeat for "Friend Robinson." For this historical

goose

goose had for years made her nest and raised her brood on a point of land that made out into the pond, but after the raising of the dam, she had not been able to find a dry spot for her nest, nor in fact was the point above water. In connection with this the story continues: Thomas R. Hazard, son of Rowland, was at that time paying his addresses to the beautiful and accomplished daughter of Mr. Robinson; after the decision had been given and damages awarded and paid, Thomas R. Hazard sought to renew his visits at "Cousin Robinson's." His first remark, made possibly under some natural embarrassment, was most unfortunate; for he said, "Well, Cousin Robinson,

thee has lost thy case;" "Yes," was the dry ans-

wer, "and thee has lost thy bride."

Sho. B. Howard Thomas Hazard married, October 2, 1783,

Hannah Knowles, the daughter of Joseph and Bathsheba (Seager) Knowles.

§ 215. THOMAS HAZARD, 5, "Virginia Tom" (Jonathan, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born February 22, 1727; he died April 27, 1804. His father gave to him three hundred acres in Boston Neck, now known as the Governor Brown farm, but it is probable that he did not live there for any length of time. He was too ambitious to be long content with the simple, uneventful life of a farmer; building ships to carry the products of his farms to distant markets, had little attraction for a man who could build fast-sailing privateers at his own shipyard, to chase the enemies of the King, and recover from them their illgotten gains. A cargo of rum to be exchanged for molasses had not as pleasant a savour, and was not as profitable as the sweet-smelling spices, fragant teas, or other luxuries that his ships brought back from their long voyages.

There are no records to prove that he ever became a large landholder in the Narragansett country. His Boston Neck farm he did retain, certainly until 1760, when his first wife was buried there. When a part of this farm was sold a few years ago, descendants of Thomas and this wife reverently moved the mouldering remains to the Boston Neck burying-ground of Wilkins Updike, whose wife (a daughter of Walter Watson) was a granddaughter of "Virginia Tom." Soon after Thomas Hazard's marriage he went to Newport, where he became a successful merchant, making a large fortune. His son, William Hazard, stated before the Loyalist Commissioners, in 1833, that his father had an estate of £20,000 confiscated in the United States. He was, like the greater number of the Hazard family of his generation, strongly conservative, and adhered to the cause of the King during the struggle for independence. It is not known that he took an active active part in actual warfare, but he was obliged to leave his family, and flee to New York, then in possession of the British. His property was confiscated; he being the only member of the family who suffered in this way.' The others who were attainted, after a little discipline and a few months' absence from home, made

their peace with the Colony, and were restored to their civil rights.

"Virginia Tom" was of too strong a build and too dominant a nature to yield his firm convictions to a matter of security to his person and estate. Even after the war was over, and he was offered free pardon and restoration of his property, he refused to accept either, at the price of submission. However, the Colony was most kind and gentle to her high-spirited children, and restored all his estate to his wife and children after the close of the war. His adopted mother proved herself but a step-mother, for of all the thousand acres of land granted to him in Ile S. Jean, now Prince Edward Island, but a small part, if any, came into his possession. A great-grandson says: "As far as can be ascertained at present, he never profited by any grants of land in this Island, made to him as a loyalist." Very little is known of his life after he went to Prince Edward Island, in 1786: shortly after his arrival there he is found filling some minor public offices; also at an election in 1787, he was returned as a member of the House of Assembly on both opposing lists. He was peculiar in being the only person having that honor. A great-grandson who furnishes this information adds, "I think that election was set aside as void. I have not yet ascertained whether or not he ever sat in the House."

There is no record of office-holding while an inhabitant of the Colony of Rhode Island. His name first occurs in the Colonial Records in 1760, when he and Henry Wall of North Kingstown petitioned the General Assembly, "and represented that they, at their own costs and charges, equipped a private ship of war, against His Majesty's enemies, under the command of Captain Abel Michiner; that the said ship, in her cruise, took a vessel belonging to the subjects of the French king, who are now prisoners of war, in Newport aforesaid, and supported at the sole expense of the petitioners; whereupon they prayed that they be permitted to fit out and send a vessel with a flag of truce,

to carry the aforesaid eleven Frenchmen to the West Indies, and there deliver them unto the commander

in chief of such port or place, as they shall send to." This petition was granted, "provided that they cause so many English prisoners to be brought back into Newport as the vessel will carry; provided, also, that the vessel to be sent, be under the same regulations and restrictions with others going to the colonies, ports, or harbors of the enemy, with a flag of truce." 4

Thomas Hazard married, about 1746, Mary Preeson, or Preston, Bowdoin,

daughter of Peter Bowdoin of Virginia.

Pierre Baudouin, "who came to America in 1686, was one of the Baudouin

family of La Rochelle, one of the most important and ancient" of that city. Its different branches were known by names taken from the numerous "seigneuries" which they possessed. They were descended from Pierre Baudouin, Ecuver, Sieur de la Laigue, who married the daughter of Jean Bureau, mayor of La Rochelle, in 1448. The Baudouins were among the first disciples of the Reformed faith. Several of them distinguished themselves by services to the Protestant cause. In consequence of the severities practiced toward the Protestants, Pierre Baudouin left France and took refuge in the city of Dublin. Later he was induced to come to America, and settle in Maine, where he received a grant of land. He came to Boston in 1690, with his two sons, Jean and James. Jean, the elder, afterwards removed to Virginia, where his descendants may still be found. It was his granddaughter, Mary Preeson Bowdoin, who married Thomas Hazard. James Bowdoin, Governor of Massachusetts, was descended from Pierre, through James Bowdoin. It is from this branch of the Bowdoin family that Bowdoin College takes its name, as well as the square and street of that name in Boston. Mary Preeson (or Preston) Bowdoin Hazard died, in Rhode Island, April 17, 1760. The inscription on her gravestone reads, "She was a loving and kind wife." It is from this marriage that the Watsons, Updikes, and other Narragansett families are descended.

Thomas Hazard married, secondly, Eunice, daughter of William and Mary (Sheldon) Rhodes, and great-granddaughter of Roger Williams. She was born December 12, 1741, and died January 22, 1809. From this marriage the Has-

zards now living in Prince Edward Island are descended.

§ 221. JONATHAN HAZARD, 5, "Beau Jonathan" (Jonathan, 4; Thomas 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born probably about 1744, as he was the last child mentioned in his father's will; he died some time after 1824, for he married a second wife after he was eighty years old. He was called "Beau Jonathan" because of his fondness for dress and his courtly manners. Updike, in his History of the Narragansett Church, has so well given a sketch of his life, that we

quote it entire.

"Ionathan Hazard took an early and decided stand in favor of liberty in the Revolutionary struggle. In 1776 he appeared in the General Assembly as a representative from Charlestown, and was elected paymaster of the Continental Battalion in 1777, and joined the army in New Jersey. In 1778 he was re-elected a member of the General Assembly, and constituted one of the Council of War. He continued a member of the House most of the time during the Revolution. In 1787 he was elected by the people a delegate to the Confederated Congress. In 1788 he was re-elected, and attended the old Congress as a delegate from this State. Mr. Hazard was a politician of great tact and talent, and one of the most efficient leaders of the Paper Money party, in 1786, and their ablest debater in the General Assembly. He beat down the opposition raised by the Hard Money, or mercantile party. He feelingly depicted the lowering distress of the times produced by the avaricious course of the mercantile party. He represented that, prompted by exorbitant profits, they had shipped to England, our late enemy, all the remaining specie that could be obtained, to supply the country with fabrics which the war had exhausted; that the patriotism of the mercantile party was swallowed up by the lust of profit, and that the interest of money, by these selfish and avaricious speculations, had risen to twenty per cent per annum, and in some cases to four per cent per month; and that the paper money emission was the only measure of State policy to prevent civil commotion. He argued, likewise, in favor of the safety of the emission: that it was guaranteed by land security; that it was to be loaned on bond and mortgage of twice the value of the amount borrowed, to be estimated by a committee under oath; that it was an emission

emission widely different from that of the States, being founded on real estate, and that as long as real estate remained, the money must retain its value, and that no bank could be more secure. That the public were alarmed without rea-

son, and that the opposition were governed by avarice and prejudice.

"Mr. Hazard was the leader of the same party under the name of Anti-Federalists, and a fiery opponent of the adoption of the Federal Constitution. As a delegate to the Convention assembled at South Kingstown, in March, 1790, to take into consideration the adoption of that instrument, he successfully resisted the measure, and upon an informal vote, it was ascertained that there was a majority of seventeen against its adoption. Upon this event, the popular party chaired Mr. Hazard, their leader. The friends of the Constitution, however, obtained an adjournment to meet at Newport in the May following. In the meantime, all the influence and wealth of the State were brought to bear upon the members of the Convention, and whether Mr. Hazard was actually influenced by other means than conviction, cannot be ascertained; but his opposition became neutralized, and the Constitution was adopted by a bare majority of one (some say two, but the original paper upon which the yeas and nays were taken gives only the majority of one). The defection of Mr. Hazard, upon a question of this magnitude, and in relation to which his party confided in his integrity, shook the confidence of the public and his party, and he fell in the popular estimation, and never regained his former elevated position. He was subsequently a representative in the General Assembly, but his influence was so greatly impaired by his defection in the Convention, that he never could re-establish himself in the good opinion of his party or the people.

"Mr. Hazard was well formed, sturdy in body and mind, with a fine phrenological development of the head. He was a natural orator, with a ready command of language, subtle and ingenious in debate. He successfully contended against Marchant, Bradford, and Welcome Arnold, in the debates of the House at that period. He was for a long time the idol of the country interests, manager of the State, leader of the Legislature, in fact, the political dictator in Rhode Island; but his course in the Constitutional Convention was the cause of his

political ruin. . . .

"The late Hon. Elisha R. Potter, and the late Benjamin Hazard, who knew Mr. Hazard in the zenith of his political influence, always spoke of him as a man of

great natural power and sagacity." "

Mr. Hazard had a different opinion upon the causes of his fall, and must be allowed to speak for himself, as he does in a letter to his friend and kinsman, Thomas B. Hazard, which has been preserved by the descendants of the latter. The letter is given herewith:—

Dear Kinsman:

JAMESTOWN, June ye 18.

I have thought of your disappointment in not being appointed Judge. You may be assured it is for your advantage that you are not chosen. It would have led you further into political

matters, than you are, and you have already, as well as myself, gone too far on that road. It is a pleasing thing while every thing moves with success and we are flying away before the wind and the tide of prosperity, and every one that meets you will greet you with submission and reverence; but let it only be in the power of these very men that you have served most, to sacrifice you to their own advantage, and you will find there is not one in a thousand but would embrace the opportunity. I speak from experience. The people that I have taken the most pains to serve have sacrificed me, as far as lay in their power. That is nothing new, it was ever so, and ever will be so. It is the greatest misfortune that is resident to man, that lack of resolution, stability, and integrity. Look back and read the history of the world, and you will find the greatest, and some of the best men in the world, have been brought to the block by traitorous companions. I hope you will profit by this little disappointment, and avoid thereby a greater mischief. All these disappointments are bitter, and of course disagreeable, but as they are suffered for our good, we ought to bear them with that manly fortitude that becomes great minds. I have been principal actor in three State revolutions, and if I was to show you the history you would not believe it until you paused, for I have been thrice sacrificed, once in the year 1790 and twice since, and although the authors have no thought that I am possessed of the means and instruments, I have them. I have not only the men's names, but the rooms in the houses where it was agreed upon. Two were in the dead scenes of the night. Notwithstanding I have ever been the slave of my friends, I find when they think there is a prospect of selling an old friend for a new one, they embrace the opportunity. Look back on time, and point out the man that has been deep in politics in this State, and you will find he died poor, if not in actual distress, and at the close of life I imagine miserable. Reflect on this and write me an answer.

Mr. Hazard moved to Verona, New York, late in life, and purchased a valuable estate there. He became a prominent man in his adopted State and town, and was much respected. He retained his elegance of manner even to his last days, marrying for the third time after he was eighty years old. He married, first, Patience, daughter of "Stout" Jeffrey Hazard; she was his second cousin; she died in South Kingstown, March 19, 1809, at the home of Dr. George Hazard, aged sixty-six years. He married, secondly, Hannah Brown; his third wife was Marian, daughter of Moses Gage. She survived him many years, and married, as third wife, James Parker.

§ 226. ROBERT HAZARD, 5 (Caleb, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born May 1, 1723. He died February, 1771. He studied medicine in Boston, with his uncle Dr. Sylvester Gardiner, and was perhaps the best educated physician in his own town at that time. His practice extended to the neighboring towns of Charlestown and Hopkinton. A halo of romance has always lingered about the name of Dr. Robert Hazard, and yet the reason for this would be difficult to define. That he attended the "unfortunate Hannah Robinson" in her last illness (two years after his own death, according to Thomas R. Hazard's account) may have added somewhat to this interest. His will gives one an insight into his character, and the inventory of his estate seems to place him almost within sight and touch of the present generation. The rooms of his dwelling-house are all mentioned, with the furniture belonging to each room, — in the parlor eight or ten chairs, tables, and the tea-table with its fine old china. In each of the sleeping rooms must be placed the "candle-stand," since called "light-stands," the chests, and the chest of drawers. In each room were andirons, shovel and tongs; and in the kitchen and apothecary shop was added a "slice." The "school-room chamber" shows that his children were educated at home. In the great open attic were the looms, wheels large and small, reels, combs, &c. On the farm was the apothecary shop, fulling-mill with presses, shears, plates, &c., to finish the cloth woven in the house; in the storehouse was a barrel of logwood, and a side of leather for the use of the itinerant shoemaker, who wandered about the country making the year's supply of shoes for the family. Robert Hazard's home farm was what is now known as the Elisha Watson farm; a few years ago the old house stood just as Dr. Robert Hazard left it.

His will was carefully worded, nothing being left to chance; even the interests of "my youngest son Francis," then but a baby of two years, were guarded with a jealous care. The little stream now known as "Brown's Brook" undoubtedly furnished the power for a fulling-mill, the foundations of which are still to be seen near the head-water or spring, on the Brown land. Dr. Robert was buried on his farm near the grave of his father, possibly with his wife beside him. But

his children all lie in distant places.

He married Elizabeth, daughter of Deputy Governor Robert Hazard. The S. Paul's Church' record says: "On the third Sunday of April, 1752, being the 19th day of said month, Robert Hazard, commonly called Doctor Hazard, was married to Elizabeth Hazard, daughter of Robert Hazard, of Point Judith, deceased, at the house of her mother, Esther Hazard, and Colonel Joseph Hazard, her son, by the Reverend Doctor MacSparran." Also from the same record: "On the 12th of February, 1771, Doctor Robert Hazard was buried, having had a long and lingering illness. A considerable assembly present, and a funeral sermon preached, and on Sunday, the 24th, I preached at the house of mourning of the late Doctor Hazard, on mortality — a large congregation present. The Honourable James Honeyman was present, who came from Little Rest, where the Court had been sitting the whole week."

§ 230. GEORGE HAZARD, 5 (Governor George, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born, according to the South Kingstown records, on June 15, 1724; but his tombstone in Newport is reported as inscribed June 13, 1721, which is undoubtedly an error. There is nothing more bewildering to an earnest searcher after truth than a gravestone record, for it is an exception if one finds it agreeing with town and church records. George Hazard was admitted freeman in 1745. Early in life he settled in Newport, and was a merchant there. In 1750 he was baptized in the church at Newport, and, as early as 1756, his name appears in the Colonial records as filling some important offices. He was almost constantly a member of the General Assembly. In 1764, he was one of a committee on paper money; in 1766, he was Chief-Justice of the Court of Common Pleas; later he resigned this position, and was chosen Mayor of the City of Newport, under its first city charter. He was one of the incorporators of the Rhode Island College, now Brown University; also one of the trustees. In 1766 he was one of a committee appointed to prepare an humble address of thanks to His Majesty for giving his royal assent to the bill for repealing the Stamp Act. He died in Newport, April 11, 1797, and was buried in the Common Ground. The inscription on his tombstone reads: -

Mayor George Hazard, as he is called by his descendants and by others, married, November 24, 1745, Martha, daughter of George and Abigail (Church) Wanton. She and her mother Abigail are mentioned in her great-uncle Jahleel Brenton's will, and received valuable legacies of land in South Kingstown, Newport, and Boston. She died in March, 1763. He married, second, on July 28, 1769, Jane Tweedy.

§ 231. ABIGAIL HAZARD, 5 (Governor George, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born March 12, 1726. She married, February 27, 1753, Reverend Peter Bours; he died February 24, 1762. She married, second, February

27, 1763, Reverend Samuel Fayerweather.

"The Reverend Peter Bours, A.M., was Rector of S. Michael's Church in Marblehead, from 1753 to 1762. He was the son of Peter Bours, Esq<sup>r</sup>, a member of the Council of the Government of Rhode Island. He graduated Bachelor of Arts at Harvard College in 1747, where he also afterwards received the Master's degree. For some time, before he proceeded to England for holy orders, he was employed in reading the service and sermons in several destitute churches with universal approbation, "both for his abilities and morals." His labors in the parish of S. Michael's were commenced in July, 1753, and appear to have been eminently successful. A contemporary describes him as a man of an excellent temper, good learning, and great piety, whose good character gained more to the Church of England than all who had preceded him. During the short period of his ministry in Marblehead (less than nine years), he baptized four hundred and fiftysix infants and adults. By the purity of his doctrine, his amiable manners, and his blameless life, he conciliated the enemies of the Church, and his congregation was much increased."

A late rector of S. Michaels adds: "I have met with none who can speak of him from their own remembrance of his person. There is no parishioner of mine who received his edifying ministrations; but a traditionary veneration preserves his memory fresh among us; and we are happy in having an excellent portrait of him from the hand of Blackburn. Mr. Bours is represented as sitting, and in his clerical robes. The figure is full, though not large; and the face, which is fair, has an expression of quite uncommon serenity and sweetness... This excellent and amiable gentleman died, after a very short illness, February 24, 1762, at the early age of thirty-six. Above his mortal remains, which were buried in the graveyard contiguous to S. Michael's Church, a monument was erected which bears the follow-

ing epitaph: —

Persuasion draws, Example leads the mind: Their double force compels, when meetly joined."<sup>2</sup>

"After the death of Mr. Bours, his widow wedded, February 27, 1763, Reverend Samuel Faverweather. They were married in Newport by the Reverend Marmaduke Browne, and the record adds: 'And on that day (an exceeding cold day), Mr. Fayerweather preached on the occasion from these words to a large auditory: "Do all to the glory of God." Mr. Samuel Faverweather was the son of Thomas Fayerweather, of Boston. He was graduated from Harvard College in 1743; was ordained a Congregational minister, and settled over the second Congregational Church in Newport, in 1754. The Reverend Doctor Stiles was his successor. Mr. Fayerweather was ordained a Presbyter in the Episcopal Church, in 1756, in England. The degree of Master of Arts was conferred on him by the University of Oxford in the same year. Mr. Fayerweather died in 1781, aged about sixty-one." An extract from his will reads: "'I give all my library and books to King's (now Columbia) College, New York, and ten pounds sterling, and my large picture of myself. And my desire is, that the corporation may suffer said picture to be hung up in the library room of said College forever. Also my silver framed square picture of myself, to my sister Hannah Winthrope of Cambridge. My wife's picture of herself, to her niece, the wife of John Channing. My oval picture of myself, framed with silver, to my nephew, John Winthrope, of Boston, merchant." "The executor of his will, Mathew Robinson, Esquire, received Mr. Faverweather's effects, and being aged and infirm, neglected the injunctions of the testator. He died ten years afterwards at an advanced age, and insolvent, and the pictures bequeathed by the Reverend Mr. Faverweather were sold at auction as Mr. Robinson's property, there being no legatee, or friends in this quarter to claim them. The large picture, by Copley, in his academical honors at Oxford, is now (1847) in my house, the others were in this town some years since. His library was also sold, and is now lost, except a few volumes in possession of the Church in Narragansett. The Reverend Mr. Fayerweather, while rector, baptized forty-five persons." 2

§ 234. CARDER HAZARD, 5 (Governor George, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born August 11, 1734; he died November 24, 1792. State and Colonial records give us something of the character of Carder Hazard, but it is from old papers, letters and family traditions, that we learn to know the grace of his private life. In the records we find his name in 1757, as admitted freeman of the Colony from South Kingstown; from that time until 1787, when he was chosen Chief Justice, there is scarcely a year during which he is not found filling some position of trust in the Colony as assistant, deputy, or judge; it is by his title of Judge that he is best known by his descendants. With justice, Carder Hazard could have written after his name, "Gentleman," a title often found in old deeds and wills; but he, more in keeping with the modesty of his character, writes "Yeoman." In all the relations of his domestic life he was exceedingly gentle and lovable. In personal appearance he was tall and well formed, fair in

complexion, and (tradition says) an uncommonly handsome man. His sons inherited his beauty; one son, William, was wont to say jokingly, when reproached by his gentle mother for his dislike for manual labor, "My beauty must make my fortune, mother." Whether it was his beauty or merit is not known, but he did find a wife and a fair one in one of the Southern States, with an estate and fortune. Carder Hazard's life as a country gentleman gave him few opportunities for intercourse with his intellectual superiors, but in his frequent visits to "Town," as Newport was called in old times, in his official capacity and as a guest of his brother, Mayor George Hazard, he met many gifted men. In this intercourse, when subjects were broached with which he was not familiar, having the true spirit of the family, he rarely ever asked a question, but, following the advice of S. Paul to women, kept silent. Other members of the Hazard family left larger fortunes and more land to be divided amongst their children, but none of them left a name of sweeter savor.

His death was caused by a fall from a chair, upon which he had mounted in order to take a book from the top of the bookcase. He was at the house of his son,

Doctor George Hazard, at the time, and died there.

An obituary notice, published in the Providence Gazette, December 1, 1792, ex-

presses the public sentiment of one hundred years ago: —

"Last Sunday departed this life, at South Kingstown, in the 59th year of his age, Honorable Carder Hazard, Esq., one of the Judges of the Superior Court of this State. In political life he exhibited the honest citizen and upright judge; subject to laws, he reverenced them, and invested with power, he executed it without intrigue, and without a view of self interest.

In social Life the Goodness of his Heart and Simplicity of his Manners were peculiarly agreeable — but Death has closed his labours! and the Pity of that Death has evidenced the Innocence of his Life. With that of the Public, his par-

ticular Friends have united their own Sorrow."

Judge Carder Hazard married first, September 23, 1756, Alice, daughter of Robert and Thankful (Ball) Hull. She was born September 26, 1739, and died July 1, 1760, in the 21st year of her age. The inscription on her monument reads: "In Memory of | Alice, the wife of Carder Hazard | who died | July 1st, 1760, in the 21st year of her age. | She was a kind wife, a tender parent, and worthy friend."

He married, second, March 5, 1761, Alice Hazard, daughter of Colonel Thomas Hazard. They were married by the Reverend Samuel Fayerweather, who was afterwards Hazard's brother-in-law. History speaks of her as a fitting helpmeet to her husband. When she felt her stay on earth was short, she confided the care of her little twin daughters to her stepson, saying, "I only ask you to be just as kind to them as I have been to you." She died January 13, 1793.

§ 236. PENELOPE HAZARD, 5 (Colonel Thomas, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born February 11, 1730-1. She married November 18, 1750, Judge William Potter, son of Colonel John and Mercy (Robinson) Potter. The records of the S. Paul's Church, Narragansett, read: "Nov. 18, 1750, Sunday, the banns being first duly asked, at St. Paul's, Dr. MacSparran married William Potter, youngest son of Colonel John Potter, to Penelope Hazard, eldest daughter of Colonel Thomas Hazard, both of South Kingstown, at Colonel Thomas Hazard's house." William Potter was great-grandson of Martha Hazard and Ichabod Potter; therefore there was a distant relationship between his wife and himself. Judge William Potter was born January 21, 1722. He was a member of the General Assembly from 1761 until 1776, when he was appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas. When the General Assembly voted to raise an army of observation, he, together with the Governor, Joseph Wanton, and two others, made a protest against the measure. "We, the subscribers, professing true allegiance to His Majesty King George the Third, beg leave to dissent from the vote of the House of Magistrates, for enlisting, raising and embodying an army of observation, of fifteen hundred men, to repel any insult or violence that may be offered to the inhabitants, and also, if it be necessary for the safety and preservation of any of the Colonies, to march them out of this Colony, to join and co-operate with the forces of the neighboring Colonies.

"Because we are of the opinion that such a measure will be attended with the most fatal consequences to our charter privileges, involve the country in all the horrors of a civil war, and, as we conceive, is an open violation of the oath of

allegiance

allegiance which we have severally taken, upon our admission into the respective offices we now hold in the Colony.

JOSEPH WANTON, THOMAS WICKES, DARIUS SESSIONS, WILLIAM POTTER.

In the Upper House, Providence, April 25, 1775."1

This protest was the beginning of the end of Governor Wanton's public life. It cost him his position as Governor; but Judge Potter, finding the measure so obnoxious to his friends and the public in general, presented a second memorial to the Assembly at the June session, as follows:—

To the Honourable General Assembly, of the Colony of Rhode Island, at the session to be holden in East Greenwich, on the second Monday in June, A.D.

1775.

I, William Potter, of South Kingstown, in the county of Kings County, in the

Colony aforesaid, humbly show: -

That at a session of the General Assembly, held at Providence, on the 22d day of April last, an act was passed for raising, with all expedition and dispatch, fifteen hundred men, as an army of observation to repel any insult or violence that

might be offered to the inhabitants.

And also if necessary for the safety and preservation of the colonies, to march out of this Colony, and join and co-operate with the forces of the neighbouring Colonies, against which act, I, as one of the upper house of Assembly, together with Joseph Wanton, Esq<sup>r</sup>., then Governor, Darius Sessions, Esq<sup>r</sup>., the then Deputy Governor, and Thomas Wicks, Esq<sup>r</sup>., then also one of the Upper House, did enter my protest, which hath given much uneasiness to the good people of this Colony. To remove which, so far as respects myself, and as far as in me lieth, I beg leave to observe—

That a rough draught was drawn up, and delivered to a person to be corrected, which protest, as the same now stands, appears to me to be of a different import from my meaning at the time, and which, through the hurry attending the business before the House, was not so properly attended to as it might have been,

and in that haste signed.

It is true, I was against the passing of the said act at the time, as I conceived the trade, and particularly the town of Newport, would be greatly distressed, which a little longer time might prevent, and because it was known that the very respectable Assembly of the Colony of Connecticut would soon sit, of whose wise deliberations we might avail ourselves. These were the true reasons of my conduct, however the contrary may appear from the protest signed.

No man hath ever been more deeply impressed with the calamities to which America is reduced, by a most corrupt administration, than myself. No man hath more exerted himself in private and public life to relieve ourselves from our oppression; and no man hath held himself more ready to sacrifice his life and fortune in the arduous struggle now making throughout America, for the preserva-

tion of our rights and liberties, and in these sentiments I am determined to live and die.

Sorry I am, if any of the good people of this Colony should have conceived otherwise of me, and I greatly lament that the unguarded expression in the protest should give cause therefore. Should I from thence lose the confidence, just hopes and expectations of my countrymen, of my future conduct in the arduous American struggles, it might create an uneasiness of mind, for which nothing can ever

compensate.

But should this public declaration ease the minds of my friends and the friends of liberty, and convince them of my readiness to embark, to conflict with them in every difficulty, and against every opposition, until our glorious cause shall be established upon most firm and permanent basis, it will be a consideration that will afford the highest satisfaction that human nature is capable of enjoying." This explanation proving satisfactory, the Assembly voted that it should be accepted, and William Potter be reinstated in the favor of the Assembly. At the same session he was re-elected Chief-Justice of the Court of Common Pleas in Washington county, and was successively elected until the year 1780, when he

resigned.

"About this time (1780) Judge Potter became an enthusiastic and devoted follower of the celebrated Jemima Wilkinson. For the more comfortable accomodation of herself and her adherents, he built a large addition to his already spacious mansion, containing fourteen rooms and bedrooms with suitable fire-places. Her influence controlled his household, servants and the income of his estates. She made her headquarters here for above six years. Here was the scene of some of her pretended miracles. Susannah Potter, a daughter of the Judge, having deceased, she undertook to raise her to life. On the day of the funeral, a great concourse assembled to witness the miracle. The lid of the coffin was removed, and Jemima knelt in devout and fervent prayer for her restoration. The laws of nature were inflexible. The impious effort was unavailing. She imputed the failure to the old excuse - the want of faith in her followers. . . She induced most of her followers to sell their estates, and invest the proceeds in land in the Genesee country in the State of New York, for a common fund for the benefit of all. Judge Potter was the principal agent for that purpose. In 1784, with her train of deluded proselytes, she departed for her new residence in what in now called Yates County, called by Jemima herself 'New Jerusalem,' 'a land flowing with milk and honey."

Judge Potter's homestead was about a mile north of Kingston Hill, and was known for a great many years as the Old Abbey. He had a very large landed estate which he inherited, and was otherwise wealthy. He "returned in a few years after his emigration, and occupied his homestead, but his circumstances became so embarrassed in consequence of his devotion to this artful woman, that he was soon compelled to mortgage his estate; and finding it impossible to redeem it in its

deteriorated condition, he finally, in 1807, sold the remainder of his interest in it and settled in Genesee. The late Honorable Elisha R. Potter purchased the homestead, but the elegant garden with parterres, borders, shrubbery, summerhouse, fruit-orchard, - his ancient mansion with the high and costly fences, outhouses, and cookery establishment, and the more recent erections for the accommodation and gratification of the priestess of his devotions, were in ruins, and within a few years the whole buildings have been removed, and a small and suitable house for a tenant has been built in its place. . . . The descendants of Judge Potter are numerous in the State of New York. His son Arnold entered Harvard College, and remained there some time, but did not graduate. He was a man of great intelligence and enterprise. He owned a large estate in Middlesex, Yates County, now owned by William H. Potter of Providence. When the town of Middlesex was divided several years ago, the eastern part of it was named Potter, in honor of the memory of Judge Potter. Penelope, daughter of Arnold Potter, married Charles W. Henry, now living at Laporte, Indiana. Edward, son of Judge Potter, married a daughter of Captain Samuel Johnson, of Norwich, Connecticut; and a son, Doctor Francis M. Potter, is now (1847) living at Penn Yan, New York."

§237. HANNAH HAZARD, 5 (Colonel Thomas, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born August 5, 1732. She married, November 21, 1762, Colonel John Wilson, who was born May 11, 1726, and was son of Jeremiah and Mary Wilson, and had a twin brother Jeremiah. In 1761, John Wilson was appointed Major in the Colonial army. The next year he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, and by this title has he usually been known. In the struggle for independence, he adhered to the cause of the Crown. Several of the Wilson family were attainted as Tories, and banished from their homes until the war was over, and, although Colonel John's name is not found with those thus banished, the absence of his name from all army records during the war is an indi-

cation that he did not participate in the struggle.

Colonel John Wilson lived on Tower Hill, in a house built by his grandfather Samuel Wilson. From this grandfather have descended seven generations, some of whom live on Tower Hill to-day, and own a part of the original land bought by Samuel as one of the purchasers of the tract of land known as the Pettaquamscut Purchase. "He built the first house on Tower Hill; this house was forty-two feet by fifty-six, two stories high with a roof of one-third altitude. The only architectural ornament was about the front door, which was constructed after the Ionic order with two large Ionic volutes, which formed the door-cap, and projected a foot and a half from the building. It had besides a modillion cornice. This house was silled three times, the last time in the year 1817. The manner of silling in those days was to frame the sill together, and then place large white-oak knees in the corners, after the manner of ship-carpentry. The house had a brick chimney fourteen feet square at the base, which contained three ovens (one of which was in the cellar) and eleven separate smoke-flues. There was also a boiling spring in the cellar, and a good well of water near each side of the house. The wells are still to be seen. The windows were of diamond-pane glass set in lead. The windows, and perhaps the frame of the house, was made in the mother country. The house was built soon after the Pettaquamscut Purchase, and was not taken down until the year 1823, when another was built very near the site of the old house. It is now the property of Charles Pollock, a great-grandson of Colonel John Wilson.

In the latter part of the eighteenth century Tower Hill was a prosperous place; the situation was incomparable, and nearly all of the wealthy families had representatives established there in younger sons or married daughters. It was the "courtend" of the town. There were fourteen houses, six of them with large gambrelled roofs, which were erected by wealthy and enterprising men who spared no pains to make them attractive. There were also several inns or taverns, as they were then called. A coach passed through the place twice a week from the South Ferry to New London, and returned, carrying passengers and the mails; as many as eight coaches have been known to arrive at the place in one morning. Balls and dances were of frequent occurrence, guests coming from Newport and the neighboring plantations of Boston Neck. Trees stood before each door, and in front of each

house were little gardens filled with blooming shrubs.

During the war of 1812, the Atlantic coast was blockaded by a British fleet from Portland to Cape May, and it was difficult to carry any merchandise through Long Island Sound. Sometimes, however, an old molasses drogher would land a cargo at Stonington, which would be carried by land to Providence and Boston by means of oxen. Frequently there would be thirty ox-teams loaded with molasses on the

road at one time in close proximity to each other, straggling on to the extent of nearly half a mile. The drivers usually stopped over night at the old Brown house, where George and Rowland Brown kept a tavern."

The above account of the Wilson house and the old Tower Hill is taken, by permission, from the papers of Mr. James Wilson, a grandson of Colonel John Wilson,

son. Mr. Wilson is now (1895) approaching his ninetieth year.

Hannah Hazard, and the other daughters of Colonel Thomas Hazard, were well educated and accomplished women for their day, when the women of the family were considered educated if they could read and write. Their accomplishments were spinning and weaving. But Hannah could work in wax, making figures and flowers that were very much admired. Some few of these pieces are treasured by her descendants to this day, while the fingers that wrought them so deftly have long been dust and ashes.

§ 241. OLIVER HAZARD 5 (Oliver 4; George 3; Robert 2; Thomas 1) was born March 30, 1739. He lived in Jamestown, and kept a licensed tavern there. His name is often found in the town records, as Councilman and otherwise. In 1762, he exhibited an account (that was allowed) for £26 165. for seventeen dinners and one punch-bowl, said dinner being for the comfort of certain public men on town-meeting day. He married Patience Greene, widow of Captain Samuel Greene and daughter of Ebenezer and Patience (Gorton) Cook. She died July 9, 1809, aged eighty years.

§ 242. MERCY HAZARD 5 (Oliver 4; George 3; Robert 2; Thomas 1) was born January 21, 1740; she died in 1810; she married, in 1755, Freeman Perry, son of Benjamin and Susannah (Barber) Perry; he was born January 23, 1733, and

died October 15, 1813.

He was a physician and surgeon, also a man active in the public business of the town and Colony, holding from time to time several important positions. In 1780 he was appointed Chief-Justice of the Court of Common Pleas for the County of Washington, which position he held until 1791. Freeman Perry's home was what is now commonly but erroneously, called "Commodore Perry's birthplace," in Matunuck. In 1792, he gave a part of this, his homestead farm, to his son Dr. Joshua Perry, and the next year he gave ten acres of the same farm to his son Christopher Raymond Perry. By will, written in 1810, and proved in 1815, he gave the remaining part of the farm, "with my mansion house where I now live,"

live," to Christopher Raymond Perry. The will also gives to his grandson, George Hazard Perry, "my books on physics and surgery;" to his grandson, Freeman Perry, "my surveying instruments;" to his daughter, Elizabeth Champlin, wife of Stephen, "the beaufet in the great room where I now live, it having formerly belonged to her grandmother, Elizabeth Hazard;" to his grandson, Raymond Perry, "my watch (Richard Trapp, London, Maker, No. 11226"); to his grandson, William Browning Champlin, "the silver spoons that I bought at the vendue of William Rodman, marked S.R.;" and to his granddaughter, Sarah Comstock, silver spoons marked M. H.

§258. STEPHEN HAZARD, 5 (Stephen, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born September 12, 1723; he died August 6, 1800. He inherited a large landed estate in Point Judith. His father was a very rich man, and his grandfather was still more wealthy, for he gave away in legacies at his death over thirty-five thousand pounds, which, reckoned in old tenor (at that date seven pounds to a Spanish dollar), was still a little fortune. This did not include property left to his son Judge Stephen, who was made residuary legatee, and was given besides the "Mansion House and all buildings and farms." This mansion-house descended to "Long Stephen" through his father; the house was on or near the site now occupied by the house of the late Carder Clark, and was provided with furniture imported from the "Old Country." "Long Stephen," as he was called, had also his town residence in Newport, where his family spent the winter. Unfortunately, during the absence of the family, the house, by the carelessness of the slaves left in charge, took fire and was completely destroyed with nearly all of its valuable contents, February 3, 1791; but the few remaining pieces of the ancient furniture that were saved, carefully treasured by descendants, bear witness to the elegance of the whole. Notwithstanding all his inherited wealth, Stephen Hazard died comparatively poor. His son Nichols, administrator on the estate, declared it insolvent, showing his father indebted to him for more than the whole amount of the property. These changes in his condition were caused, his descendants say, by the fact that his estate was confiscated during the war of 1776.

1776. There are no records in proof of this. But he did adhere to the cause of the Crown, and was for a time banished from his home for giving assistance and support to the enemy. He was, with his family, sent, not exactly to Coventry, but to the next town, Scituate, where several of the Point Judith families were dispatched to keep him company. The British paid good gold for fat cattle and provisions, and Point Judith was easy of access, — as easy as the conscience that made loyalty a fair-sounding word, whether it meant loyalty to England or America. However, the stringent measures adopted by the Colony soon brought its truant sons to a better understanding, for in 1779, "Stephen Hazard, Stephen Hazard, Ir., Samuel Hazard, Jeremiah Hazard, son of Robert, and the wife of said Jeremiah, and Christopher Robinson, have prayed this Assembly to be heard upon the charges brought against them," &c.' This petition was heard, granted, and permission given for them to return to their homes, they giving their paroles. Samuel Hazard, Jeremiah Hazard, son of Jeffrey, and Thomas Hazard, son of Jeremiah, were also of this band of martyrs.

Stephen Hazard married, April 29, 1759, Sarah, daughter of Deputy-Governor Jonathan Nichols, and granddaughter of Deputy-Governor Jonathan Nichols, there being two Governors of the name, father and son. She was born in 1739.

There is an uncertainty about the children of Mary and John Potter, for the Potter Genealogy gives the children mentioned below as a sister's, but the will of John Potter, who married her sister, does not mention them. Their grandmother, widow of Stephen Hazard, in her will, dated one year after the death of John Potter, calls these children her grandchildren. There were possibly sons, but there is no record of them.

8 260. ELIZABETH HAZARD, 5 (Stephen, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born July 17, 1729; she married, as second wife, John Potter. There is the usual relationship here between husband and wife, but a little remote, John being a great-grandson of Martha Hazard, daughter of Thomas Hazard, the first in America; Elizabeth his wife being related in the same degree to Thomas Hazard through Robert. John Potter lived in, and may have built, the old house in Matunuck known as the "Governor Potter" place. It is impossible to learn why it should have been called by this name, for there never was a Governor John Potter. Samuel J. Potter, his son, was the only Governor Potter of Rhode Island (and he was Deputy-Governor), and he lived in Point Judith, on what is now known as the George Pearse place. John Potter left a fortune to be divided between his children; he even gave to his daughters eight hundred pounds apiece. — a very unusual proceeding in those days, when fifty pounds and a home in the mansion-house until they were married seemed a plentiful provision. This was not as unjust as one would suppose such a proceeding to be at the present day, for where each man gave his property to his sons he simply provided for other men's daughters, and left it to other men to provide for his. John Potter could well leave a large fortune, for he made money easily by a process known to few, and approved of by fewer. There is a story well authenticated on this point. Nicholas Hazard of Newport, a nephew of John Potter's wife, when a lad, used to often visit his aunt, he being a great favorite with her. The Potters were hospitable people and kept open house for poor relations, as well as for the gentry of the town; during one of Nicholas Hazard's visits, there was a large dinner given to some prominent persons. It so happened that a poor pensioner, who was also a relative, was staying at the house at the time. She was occasionally a little out of her mind, and during a pause in the conversation at dinner she said, "Friend Potter, who made money in the Overing house?" Friend Potter made no reply but began a brisk conversation in order to turn the attention of the guests from the old lady. She however, watched for another pause, and at the first opportunity repeated her question with like success. At last, losing her patience, she gave Mr. Potter a smart slap on the knee, saying, "Friend Potter, I asked thee who made money in the Overing house?" At the end of his patience, he said incautiously, "I don't know, unless it was the devil." "I always said it was the devil," replied the old lady, "but my husband says it was Friend Potter." As the host and his guests were all Quakers, the turn of the conversation may have been somewhat startling to the company.

The old house at Matunuck was a very imposing structure, even in the early part of the present century, but it has been divided and sub-divided, until very little of the original is left. One room is almost all that can be seen, and this was

once a part of the great square hall, panelled from floor to ceiling. A painted panel that was over the mantel in the dining-room, is now carefully treasured by descendants of John Potter; it is said to represent members of Mr. Potter's family painted by some "famous" artist, much more probably by a house-painter, if one can judge by the character of the execution. John Potter died in 1787; his wife died in 1806.

§ 262. JOSEPH HAZARD, 5 (Governor Robert, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born May 21, 1728; he died April 31, 1790. In 1756, when he was but twenty-eight years old, his name first appears in the Colonial records as Deputy from South Kingstown; in 1756 he was again Deputy, and in the same year he was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel of militia for Kings County.

From 1761 until 1777, he was Assistant, with scarcely an interval. In 1770, he, with Stephen Hopkins, formed a committee to examine the complaint of the Collector and Comptroller of the Port of Newport. In 1786 and 1787 he was Associate Judge of the Supreme Court. These few facts gleaned from the Colonial records, support the statements made by Updike, who says: "Colonel Joseph Hazard inherited all the lofty firmness, the unwavering perseverance, and sterling mind of his mother. He was elected to many important offices by the people, and sustained them with honor. Although a determined partisan, he never permitted his political attachments to sway him from the principles of right. His

motto

motto was 'to do right, and let consequences take care of themselves." He was on the bench of the Supreme Court of the State, when the General Assembly enacted the celebrated "Paper Money Laws" of 1786, and was one of the papermoney party. But when the question of the constitutionality of these laws came before the court for decision, in the case of Trevett vs. Weeden, in which cause General Varnum made his great and eloquent effort, this Court stood firm in defence of the cause of law in their country, and declared the Paper-Money Tender Laws unconstitutional and void. Their fiery partisans in the General Assembly ordered the Court to be arraigned before them for a contempt of legislative power, and they were required to give their respective reasons for overthrowing the laws of the Legislature that had created them. This novel procedure in judicial history, Judge Hazard met with firmness; and when called on, unmoved, rose and said: "It gives me pain, that the conduct of the Court seems to have met with the displeasure of the Administration; but their obligations were of too sacred a nature for them to aim at pleasing, but in the line of their duty. It is well known that my sentiments have fully accorded with the general system of the Legislature in emitting the paper-money currency. But I never did, and never will depart from the character of an honest man, to support any measures however agreeable in themselves. If there could have been any prepossession in my mind, it must have been in favor of the act of the General Assembly, but it is not possible to resist the force of conviction. The opinion I gave on the trial was dictated by energy of truth. I thought it right. I still think so. But be it as it may, we derived our understanding from God, and to him alone are we accountable for our judgment." "This," adds Updike, "was an instance where the heroic firmness of a few men saved the reputation of a State."

Joseph Hazard married, September 28, 1760, Hannah, daughter of Deputy-

Soon after the close of the war, he, with his family, removed to Boston, where he engaged in business. In 1767, he was lost on his passage from Stonington to Boston.



§ 270. STANTON HAZARD, 5 (Governor Robert, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born January 8, 1743; he died at Honduras in 1789. His death was caused by a wound from a sword, given by an adversary in a duel, in which he killed his opponent. He was a captain in the British Navy. His interesting portrait (here reproduced), in the dress of a post-captain, is now in the possession

session of a grand-nephew in Westerly, Rhode Island. It was painted in Rome, about 1776. At the beginning of the War for Independence, he offered his services to the Colony; but asking for the same rank as that which he held in the British Navy, and being refused, he remained in the service of the English. Some time afterwards his vessel was captured by a Yankee privateer. The American vessel, having guns of longer range, and being much the faster of the two, was easily able to capture the British vessel. Upon the arrival of the prisoners in Newport, there was some embarrassment amongst the men in authority (all his old friends, and some of them relations), to know what to do with Captain Hazard, as they did not like to place him in confinement. He, however, solved the problem by asking to be sent to Narragansett, on his parole, to the house of his sister, the wife of Doctor Robert Hazard, promising not to leave the garden of the house until he was exchanged. This promise he faithfully kept.

In this connection is the following story: One morning, standing at the gate and seeing a travel-stained sailor going by, he hailed the man, asking if he was hungry, and being answered in the affirmative, Captain Hazard invited him into the house, and gave him a plentiful breakfast. He then asked the man if he had any money, and for answer the sailor turned his pocket inside out. Captain Hazard, putting his hand in his own pocket, took out two silver dollars, and said, "This is all the money I have; I will divide with you." This he did, and, giving the sailor one dollar, he then accompanied him to the gate, and said, "I

can go no farther; my word of honour keeps me inside the gate."

Captain Hazard was rather a dandy in personal habits and dress, wearing fine lace ruffles on his shirt and at his wrists. Like the majority of the fine gentlemen of the day, he took snuff, and carried a gold and tortoise-shell box, and when in the performance of this duty, he always bent his head far forward, in order to prevent the least particle of snuff from soiling his fine ruffles. At one time, during an engagement between his vessel and the enemy, he took out his box, and taking a pinch of snuff, bent his head far forward. At that moment a shot from the enemy's guns passed over his head, and killed a man standing just behind him. This is, possibly, the only instance in history where a pinch of snuff has saved an officer's life or killed a man.

He married, July 3, 1785, Elizabeth Wickham. She died September 22, 1801.

They had but one child, who died in infancy.

§ 271. SAMUEL HAZARD, 5 (Samuel, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born about 1730; he died previous to 1788. He was one of those who, in 1779, were sent out of the Narragansett country for giving aid to the enemy. § 274. STEPHEN HAZARD, 5 (Thomas, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born about 1730. He died October 24, 1804, in North Kingstown. There is no certainty about the dates of his birth, of his marriage, or of the birth of his children, as no records of them can be found. He was called "Short Stephen," being one of the exceptional Hazards that could not boast of his six feet and great strength. His mother, Hannah Slocum, was a very small woman, not over five feet in height, and so slight that her husband could span her waist with his two hands. Stephen Hazard adhered to the cause of the Crown during the war of 1776, and was one of those sent out of the town for giving aid to the enemy. When allowed to return to the town, on his parole, he refused to serve when drafted. It is difficult to place his house, or the place where his children were born. At one time he was the keeper of the lighthouse at Point Judith, and at another he was living in Jamestown. He married, about 1760, Elizabeth, daughter of Daniel and Renewed (Smith) Carpenter.

§ 283. JEREMIAH HAZARD, 5 (Jeffrey, 4; Robert, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born August 13, 1726. He died June 23, 1795. His father gave to him, by deed, three hundred acres in Exeter, and besides this fine farm, the tradition is, that "as his father died without a will, he, by the old English law still in force inherited all the estate, comprising three hundred acres given to Jeffrey by his father, and also a farm called the 'Great Neck' farm, of several hundred acres, besides other land." But the law of 1719 for the settlement of intestate estates when not entailed, would have covered this case; and this disproves the legend with regard to Jeremiah being his father's sole heir.

"Stout Jeffrey," while attending a meeting of the Selectmen of the town, took a sudden and violent cold, from sitting in his wet clothes. Feeling himself very ill he sent for a lawyer to make his will, but the lawyer delayed his visit until the next day, when "Stout Jeffrey," just in his prime, with his splendid physique and great vitality, was dead. This account is given by one of his descendants,

who vouches for the truth of it.

Jeremiah Hazard married Mary, daughter of Robert and Patience (Northup) Hazard, his second cousin. She was born 1726, and died October 22, 1816.

Ann Hutchinson, after the death of her husband William, in 1643, removed to East Chester, New York, where she and seventeen persons of her household were murdered by the Indians. One only, Susannah, escaped, who, after being redeemed, married John Cole, of Boston, in 1651. They soon after settled in the Narragansett country, near what is now Hamilton Mills, formerly called Bissell's Mills.

§ 362. THOMAS HAZARD, 6 (Thomas, 5; Robert, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born November 15, 1758. He died at his home in New York, of apoplexy, July 24, 1828, aged seventy years, and was buried in the Friends' Cemetery. He married, September 6, 1780, Anna, daughter of Thomas and Mary (Borden) Rodman; born June 24, 1762; died June 14, 1845, aged eighty-four. After his marriage (at Leicester, Massachusetts), he went to live at Cranston, Rhode Island, near Providence, where several of his children were born. In 1789, he moved to New Bedford, Massachusetts, and in consequence was called "Bedford Tom." His house, a fine old colonial mansion on the corner of Elm and North Streets, is still standing. He made a large fortune in the whaling business, and took an active part in politics, being postmaster of New Bedford and a State Senator in 1812. He was the first president of the Bedford Bank, which commenced business in 1803.

He moved to New York shortly after the war of 1812, and lived at No. 80 Beekman Street, in a large brick house, near S. George's Church. He was actively engaged in business in New York, but owned interests in several vessels engaged

in the whaling trade. In 1824 he was one of the committee of thirty prominent men appointed at a mass-meeting held April 20, in City Hall, to secure the reappointment of DeWitt Clinton, as Commissioner of the Erie Canal,—one of

the most exciting incidents of the political history of that period.

Anna Rodman, the wife of Thomas Hazard, was born in the Rodman homestead, at Newport, Rhode Island, June 24, 1762. Her father was Thomas Rodman, son of Samuel Rodman and Mary, daughter of Colonel Thomas Willett, of Flushing, Long Island. Samuel Rodman was son of Thomas Rodman and Hannah Clarke, daughter of Governor Walter Clarke. He came to Newport, Rhode Island, in 1675, from the Barbadoes, where his father, John Rodman, owned a plantation. Thomas Rodman was born December 20, 1723-4, and was lost at sea, off Newport, November 16, 1766. He was returning home from England, where he had gone to collect a large amount of money due him, and being rendered helpless by an attack of gout, was the only person unable to save himself. He married, April 5, 1750, Mary, daughter of Abraham Borden and Elizabeth, daughter of Joseph Wanton. Mary Borden, mother of Anna Rodman, was born January 10, 1729, and died at New Bedford, February 19, 1798. Anna Rodman and her sisters were beautiful and accomplished women, in reference to whom the following tradition has been handed down to us: An Englishman of high rank, while drinking tea at Mrs. Rodman's, paid her the graceful compliment of saying, that "Newport was the garden of America, and her three daughters the choicest flowers therein." It must be remembered that before the Revolution, Newport was a large centre of wealth and refinement, and an important seaport. The discomfort occasioned by the Revolutionary war became so great that Mrs. Rodman and her family removed to Leicester, Massachusetts, in 1770, where they remained until peace was declared. Several letters which have been preserved, indicate that the young ladies did not enjoy the change of society, and tradition states that one reason Mrs. Rodman left Newport was, that she was afraid her daughters might marry English officers,—the profession of arms being contrary to the Friends' creed. It may be well to state here that the families were all Friends, and all wore their distinctive dress.

We insert an old love-letter of Thomas Hazard's, as a delightful specimen of old-time courtship: —

" To Miss Anna Rodman

Most divine and incomparable Charmer, Imagining a Lady of your Delicacy could not be agreeably Entertained with things of Earthly nature, I'm resolved to take the Tour of the happy Regions above, present your Ladyship with a small Collection of Gods and Godesses, for your particular Service, and as to Madam Venus you may depend upon't the Jade shall cry heartily through Envy before I have done with her, and confess in spite of her teeth, that there is one Nancy Rodman infinitely more charming than she is; I intend likewise to make Sol pop behind a Cloud, in acknowledgement of your Superior Lustre, and send the Stars packing, as an unnecessary Illumination, the Moon shall tramp off as assumed of her Dullness, and the western Skies shall no more boast of their Colour; in fine, Madam, I intend to perform many

many more noble Exploits, as foon as ever I have projected a Scheme, to convey aloft without any danger of a broken neck.

Young Thomas was certainly badly "hit" about the heart; but his head seemed in no more danger of being broken than his neck. But then one must remember that "Miss Nancy" was really an exceptionally beautiful woman. Thomas

B. Hazard ("Nailor Tom"), was perhaps one of her humble admirers. He often mentions in his diary the fact that he went to Leicester to see "Cousin Rodman"; and one entry reads, "Tommy Hazard and Nancy Rodman were married last week, AMEN." As this is the only time in his diary where "Amen" is used, it would seem to be a sigh of resignation, equivalent to, "The Lord's will be done."

ROWLAND HAZARD, 6 (Thomas, 5; Robert, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born the fourth of the fourth month, second day of the week, about ten o'clock in the forenoon, 1763; he died July 1, 1835. He married, in 1793, Mary Peace, daughter of Isaac Peace. She died June 28, 1852. Peacedale was named in honor of this lady, and there Rowland Hazard early established a manufacturing business. The first carding-machines set in South Kingstown were in operation here, and as early as 1800 the industry was established which has since developed into the Peacedale Manufacturing Company. He also had shipping interests, first at Charleston, South Carolina, and afterward in Narragansett. After the destruction of the Pier there in 1815, Mrs. Hazard writes him she hopes he will not rebuild it, as it has always proved a trouble-

some piece of property, quoting his grandfather, Governor Robinson, as having desired that none of his children would try to maintain it. Late in life he removed to Pleasant Valley, New York, where he died.

### CHILDREN

648. Isaac Peace Hazard, born Oct. 3, 1794, in South Kingstown, Rhode Island, at the house of his grandfather, Thomas Hazard. He was educated at the Friends' School at West-town, near Philadelphia. On leaving school, about 1810, he returned to South Kingstown, and at once began to assist his father in business, passing the greater part of his life at Peacedale. He took a most kindly interest in the welfare of his neighbors there. He was constantly appealed to for advice and assistance, and no one whom he could aid ever applied to him in vain. He possessed the confidence and esteem of all who knew him. He never sought political power or office, but in response to the earnest solicitations of his townsmen, he on six occasions represented the town of South Kingstown in the General Assembly. From the organization of the Peacedale Manufacturing Company, in 1848, he was president of the company, until he retired in 1864. His brother, Revaland G. Hazard, was the treasurer, but the names of the offices do not indicate, with any exactness, the duties which each discharged. They divided the conduct of the business between them. After his retirement from active business, in 1864, he went to live with his sister at Newport. He was never married. He died on the second of March, 1879. He lies buried at Peacedale, in the Oak Dale Cemetery, among scenes with which he was so familiar, and among the people whose welfare he had so much at heart.

652a. Joseph Peace Hazard, born Feb. 17, 1807, in Burlington, New Jersey, from whence his parents removed to Bristol, Pennsylvania, in his thirteenth year, when Peacedale became his home. In 1835, he erected a woolen mill at Peacedale, which was operated for several years, and subsequently leased, after which he abandoned business. Having a taste for travel, Mr. Hazard acquainted himself thoroughly with the land of his birth, and in 1856 made the tour of Europe, spending much time in London and Rome. For many years much of his time was spent abroad, until 1879, when he returned to his native land. Mr. Hazard was among the first to foresee the advantages presented by Narragansett Pier as a popular watering-place, and at an early day furnished means to aid in its development, and promote its growth. He was a considerable holder of land at that point, and in 1846 began the erection of what is known as the "Castle,"—a picturesque structure surmounted by two towers. Mr. Hazard died at the residence of his brother, Rowland G. Hazard, in Peacedale, Rhode Island.<sup>3</sup>



- § 306. BENJAMIN HAZARD, 6 (Thomas G., 5; George, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born September 9, 1774; he died March 10, 1841. He graduated from Brown University in 1792, and was admitted to the bar in 1796. He began the practice of law in Newport, and followed his profession there with honor for the rest of his life. In 1809, he was elected a Representative to the General Assembly, and continued a member of the House until 1840. A contemporary says, "His ability was marked, and his integrity never questioned."
- William Hunter, in a communication to Mr. Wilkins Updike, says: "There is one individual belonging to this numerous, wide-spread and highly respectable race (the Hazard family), who is deserving of particular notice and regard. We refer to the late Honble Benjamin Hazard. . . . The ancient Constitution of Rhode Island, formed out of the provisions of its admirable Charter, was the most democratic, perhaps, that ever existed. It required a semi-annual election of Representatives to the General Assembly. Mr. Hazard was a Representative from the town of Newport in the General Assembly for thirty-one years, and, of course, was subjected to the ordeal of sixty-two popular elections; a singular proof of the enlightened stability of his constituents, of his general high desert, and his peculiar fitness for this important office. This fact, independent of all

others, entitles him to claim rank as a distinguished man, and as it were, demonstrates the possession of those impressive and useful qualities, whose combination renders character at once eminent and enduring. Mr. Hazard's course of reading and study, operating upon a mind of genuine native strength, and confirming and justifying a native sturdiness of will (the germ and guaranty of greatness), gave to all his literary efforts and political proceedings an air and cast of originality. He read and dwelt upon such books as Rabelais, Burton's Anatomy of Melancholy, Hobbes' Leviathan, Swift's Gulliver, Berkeley's Querist, and, latterly, the dramas of Shakespeare and the romances of Sir Walter Scott. In the middle and latter periods of his professional career, he was employed in most of the important law-suits of the day, both in the courts of the State and the United States. In politics, though his agency in the conflicts of parties, if examined in the nicety of details, might betray some seeming inconsistencies, he was in the main true to himself and the system of conservatism. His legislative reports on banks, currency, &c., and on the extension of suffrage, are marked by sterling thought and true and profound principles. In his style, as may have been anticipated from what has been here said, there was nothing gaudy or flashy; he aimed at and hit the mark of a plain, pure, Anglo-Saxon diction." In connection with this charming and honest tribute from Mr. Hazard's old friend, it may be well to add that of an admirer, who, born too late to enjoy his friendship, yet realized his brilliant qualities, said: -

"It was my misfortune to know little of the men who made the Newport Bar celebrated in the early part of this century. Benjamin Hazard I never saw; he died, I think, in 1840; but I have heard so much about him that I seem to have known him well. He was one of those men who, vital in every part, live long in memory and in tradition. There are those now among the living who could do justice to his character; and the late Professor Goddard, in a few well-chosen words, has left a portrait of him which Rhode Island people will not willingly let die. I read every now and then his great report in defense of the suffrage under the old Charter. Like the celebrated paper of Alexander Hamilton in favor of the United States Bank, it is a monument to the patriotism, the ability and the integrity of its author; like that, also, it is a defense of a system which the lapse of time and the change of circumstances rendered an obsolete idea; but it was none the less a system which had the support of able, honest men in a past generation; and it is too early, even now, to pass a final judgment

upon their wisdom and foresight." 2

There are few men of Mr. Hazard's prominence and ability about whom so little has been written and given to the public. We conclude our sketch with the "portrait" from Mr. Goddard's address:—

"Mr. Hazard felt himself at home in the General Assembly. There, and not in our courts or primary assemblies, did he put forth, with the most effect, the un-

common powers with which he was gifted. His talents for debate would have won him no mean rank, even in the highest deliberative body in our country. The tricks of oratory, the artificial embellishments of rhetoric, he seemed to scorn; but if his aim was either to support or defeat a measure, no man was a more skilful master of the language, and of the style of argument required for his purpose. No man more clearly comprehended, and at times more ably defended, the true merits of a public question. No man, too, it should be added, better knew how to perplex his adversaries by subtle objections, or to wither them by caustic sarcasm. Mr. Hazard was fond of reading. In my last interview with him, not many months before his death, he spoke, with great animation and emphasis, of his relish for Shakespeare, Sir Walter Scott, and Dean Swift. His predilection for the latter will not surprise those who recall to memory the celebrity of Swift as a politician, and the wonderful influence which, by the peculiar character and direction of his intellect, he obtained over the popular mind. Mr. Hazard could boast a true Rhode Island lineage, and he was in spirit a genuine Rhode Island man, attached to the old Charter, and to all the institutions which grew up under it. The Report on the Extension of Suffrage, made in the year 1820, is characterized by unusual ability. It is among the very few productions of his pen to which he attached his name, and in style and argument may perhaps be deemed one of the best specimens of his peculiar powers."

It was thus that men and the world saw Mr. Hazard, but in his own home, he is best remembered by his tenderness to his wife and children, his courtly manner to the "some-time guest"; his perfect unselfishness. A little-golden haired niece, whom he loved for her sweet voice in singing, remembers "Uncle Hazard's visits to her father's house; when she was taken on his knee and asked to sing, over and over again, "Oft in the stilly night," and promised a guitar, when the little fingers should be strong enough to draw music from its strings. Though silver is now plentifully mingled with the gold of her hair, she still associates the sweet

old song with the memory of "Uncle Hazard."

A plain block of granite, symbolical of the man, and beautiful for its strength

and enduring qualities, marks his grave.

Benjamin Hazard married, October 28, 1807, Harriet Lyman, daughter of Major Daniel Lyman and his wife Mary Wanton, the beautiful daughter of John Wanton. He lived in the Wanton House on Broad Street, now Broadway, and died there, March 10, 1841, aged 67 years.

He married March 13, 1814, Ruth, daughter of James and Ann (Rodman) Carpenter; she was born 1789; died August 7, 1860. He was a peculiar man. He was fond of hunting small game, and always ate the animals that he caught. He used to say that he never found anything that he could not eat, with the exception of crows, and these he did not care for. He was subject to a kind of cataleptic fit. If any one asked him about these fits, he would say, "Oh I can't describe them, but just wait a minute, I will have one for you." After a few minutes he would drop like a log, and go into convulsions, and this singular spasm was genuine and not pretended. It is said that these attacks were caused by a wound from a pistol-shot, on the right side of the head, when he was quite young; for this reason he was called "Pistol-head Tom." When younger, whatever he grasped in his right hand when attacked, he could not release without the aid of New England rum and music, a curious combination. When a young man he enlisted in the United States service, and was sent to Newport. One day he had a quarrel with one of the soldiers, and springing upon him in a paroxysm of rage, seized him by the back of the neck. All known means were used to make him open his hand in vain, although his anger was gone; so he himself called for his usual remedies, and was thus enabled to release his prisoner. It is needless to add that, after this occurrence, he was, by the advice of the surgeon, sent home as unfit for service. Mr. James Wilson, who kindly gave this account, says that he saw him once on Tower Hill

with a handkerchief firmly grasped in his hand, which had not been opened in three days. He had walked to the place to beg Colonel George Brown to open his hand with the above-mentioned remedies. Colonel Brown had a good violin, and was a famous player, and after giving the patient his rum, proceeded to charm away the evil force with his music. When the hand opened, the inside was found

to be of a dark purple, from the long continued pressure.

Mr. Hazard was exceedingly fond of flowers, especially the June pink, a large bed of which, near the door of his house, in its season, shone a bright spot in the surrounding green, sending its fragrance to the water's edge, and even across the stream. Scarlet beans and morning-glories were planted with the garden-beans, and a row of sweet-peas with the garden-peas; and he rarely left his house for a walk to the village, in the summer, without a large bunch of these fragrant flowers in his hand to be given to some "neighbor." Every man was either his "neighbor" or "cousin," for he, being a Quaker, was debarred the use of "Mr." or "Mrs." His home was near the centre of what is now the River Side Cemetery; and even to this day bunches of Napoleon's Dirge, and bits of moss-pink can be found in the early summer springing up near the site of the old house, a fitting memorial of this lover of flowers.

§ 457. PELEG PECKHAM, 6 (Mary Hazard, 5; Governor George, 4; Colonel George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born June 11, 1762. He inherited from his father, Benjamin Peckham, land in Matunuck, on which he built, in 1784, a large house, and a store attached, as the custom then was. The house is standing to-day, a good specimen of the old-time mansion-house, so often mentioned in the wills of the last century. Here Peleg Peckham carried on a small business in connection with his farming, and dispensed to his neighbors the usual assortment of goods found in a country store, not forgetting the indispensable New England rum, without which a house or barn could not be raised, a man buried, or a child born. Near the close of the last or the beginning of the present century, he moved to Rensselaerville, New York, selling his house and farm to Doctor George Hazard, his cousin. Mr. Peckham was a member of the Society of Friends, among whom he held a prominent position. In 1784, "Nailor Tom Hazard" records in his diary that Peleg Peckham brought his mother "here," and adds, "I carried her to meeting behind me on horseback." She was then sixty-two years of age. He married, August 25, 1785, Desire, daughter of John Watson, Jr.

§ 458. EDWARD HAZARD, 6 (Mayor George, 5; Governor George, 4; Colonel George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born about the year 1746. He graduated from either Princeton or Rhode Island College (Brown University). After he left college, he was for a number of years a clerk in the store of Aaron Lopez, in Newport. His father left him the farm now known as the Foddering Place, in South Kingstown; this estate was squandered away in his over-indulgence to an intemperate son. When his estate was gone, he moved from Newport to South Kingstown, and, with his wife and son, lived in the house now owned and occupied by the heirs of the late Nicholas Northup, on the old Kingston road. He brought, with his family, some of the elegant furniture that once adorned his Newport house; also three portraits by Copley, of the Hon. Thomas Cranston, his wife and daughter. Mr. Hazard became so much reduced in circumstances that it was decided to remove him to the Town Asylum; but death kindly gave him a narrow, but more honorable home. After his death, the fine old furniture was sold at public auction, and many pieces are still to be seen in the town, showing what the whole must have been. In some way the portraits escaped, and were left in the house. Many years afterwards, as Doctor Johnson, of Kingston, was returning from an early visit, in passing the house his horse shied, and came very near throwing him from his saddle. As this was a most unwonted proceeding of his staid beast, the Doctor dismounted and sought the cause, and, as he said, he was startled almost as much as his horse had been, to see a stately dame gazing at him from a canvas. The family had set the portrait outside their door, to be washed off by the rain, as there had been a slight summer shower. It was commonly used for a fire-board. Doctor Johnson, on his return home, went to see his old friend, Wilkins Updike, to recount the experience of the morning. Mr. Updike, who knew that such portraits were in existence, sent his daughter Mary to examine these, and prove their identity. The woman of the house was glad to be rid of the troublesome things, and was very willing to accept Miss Updike's offer to relieve her of the care of them. One was found in a chamber, pushed under the bed. As Thomas Cranston Hazard, son of Edward, was at that time living in Voluntown, Connecticut, in great poverty, Mr. Updike went to see him, and telling him what he had done about the portraits, asked him to sell them to him, which he gladly did.

Edward Hazard married, May, 1770, Sarah, daughter of Hon. Thomas Cranston, and great-granddaughter of Governor Samuel Cranston, of Newport, Rhode Island. She died June 6, 1821, aged seventy-two years. He died March 22, 1830.

§ 461. GEORGE W. HAZARD, 6 (Mayor George, 5; Governor George, 4; Colonel George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born March 30, 1758; he died November 6, 1834. He was unlike the old type of the family in characteristics and in physical development. He was scarcely five feet four inches in height, yet extremely agile in movement. He was called "Crazy George," because of his many eccentricities. He used to say: "My father was a money-getting man, he raked the money in, and I can pitchfork it out faster than he raked it in," rather an ignoble ambition. He entered college quite young and was to be educated like his brothers, but hostilities commencing between the Colonies and the Mother Country soon after he had entered, he ran away and joined the army, saying that he much preferred "following the God of War to courting the Muses." It can not be ascertained now which college had the privilege of erasing his name from its books; by one authority it was Princeton, by another Rhode Island College, but one fact that he used often to relate, ought to give the name of the College. A daughter of the President entered on a full college course the same year, and was graduated with honors, possibly not publicly. A man of unquestioned veracity, now living (1893), who was in his early days a shoemaker, relates that one morning Mr. Hazard came into his shop and ordered a pair of boots, "Fine boots," he said, "nothing on the common order, for I wish them to be buried in." He said that they must be finished and delivered on a certain day, as he was to be buried on that day. The man laughingly promised that they should be ready, and entered the order on his books with the stipulated time of delivery. On the day and date, as agreed, the boots were delivered, and "Crazy George" was buried. Perhaps the boots were buried with him, but on this point history is silent. This is one of those curious coincidences that suggests nothing and proves nothing, but is for a moment startling.

He married Martha, daughter of Christopher and Martha (Perry) Babcock. She was a cousin to her husband, but in this case not quite as nearly related as

usual, although the connection was double.

§ 464. CARDER HAZARD, 6 (Mayor George, 5; Governor George, 4; Colonel George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in 1774; he died March 18, 1823. He settled in Norwich, Connecticut, and made a large fortune in business. He died young. His descendants speak of him as a man of fine physique, charming in manner as in person. Some old letters, carefully treasured by his descendants, illustrate somewhat the beauty of his domestic relations. The following was written soon after the death of his wife, to his friends in South Kingstown: -"Some time has elapsed since I lost the only comfort of my life, the very best of wives, far dearer to me than my own life. She was beloved by every one, as was evidenced during her most distressing sickness of several months, which she bore with perfect composure and resignation, and retained her senses to the last moment; for forty-five nights I never removed my clothes, and for months, night and day was out of her room scarcely for a moment; yet with all that I could do, all that physicians could do, all that her numerous friends could do, could not keep her here to me a day longer. She died a week ago to-day, and left me a little son, by name, George Carder.

"As I have not seen the death of my beloved Sally noticed in the papers, I wish to have it done for my numerous friends in Rhode Island. My wife was in her thirty-fourth year, she died November 27, leaving five children. I have enjoyed fourteen years of true love; never, no never was there her equal. My eldest child is twelve years old, and takes charge of my family, a remarkable child."

Mr. Hazard being a handsome man, was much courted, after his wife's death, by marriageable dames. His daughters were afraid that he would give them a stepmother; he however assured them that he would never marry again as long as one of them remained at home as his housekeeper; but he added, "If you all leave me, I will marry again if I am so old and feeble that I am obliged to be carried into church on a cot-bed."

These few facts are gleaned from correspondence with his great-granddaughter. He graduated from Rhode Island College, and commenced his married life in Middletown, Rhode Island, where several of his children were born. It was about 1809 that he moved to Norwich, Connecticut, and passed the remainder of his life in that city. He married, April 4, 1804, Sarah Coggeshall, of Boston; she was called the most beautiful girl of her day. She had wonderful rich-brown hair, which at twenty-eight was as white and shining as silver.

He was a young man as beautiful in person as in mind, with gentle, graceful manners. He was the idol of his sisters. A quaint and old-fashioned obituary notice, evidently from the hand of his old pastor, is here given as a tribute to his goodness: "Died, in this town, on the 5th inst., at the residence of Mrs. A. B. Sherman (his sister), Mr. George Carder Hazard, aged 22, only son of the late Mr. Carder Hazard, of this town. If there is profit or usefulness in comment, or a consolation in sympathy, in no instance can that tribute be more justly due than at present. The long-protracted illness under which the deceased suffered for about four years, is well known; but the extraordinary fortitude and patience, which he has exercised under his sufferings and confinement, is not only worthy of remark, but, for one of his years, of the highest admiration; during the whole of the time, and under all circumstances, he was never known to complain, but gave up his own will with entire faith and confidence and resignation to the will of his Heavenly Father, in full hope and trust in His unbounded wisdom, love, and mercy. The ardent sympathy of his human friends is sufficient evidence of one among many of a peculiar trait of his character, that of treating and speaking well of all, whether present or absent. His kind and generous heart, and gentle, manly deportment, have left a deep impression on the affections of a great number of friends and relations both at home and abroad; and the grief especially of those of the family, from which he has been taken, can be described only by those who have a heart to feel. . . . Much might be said of the manly bearing and excellent qualities of young Hazard, but suffice it to say, in the language of another, 'The grave never closed on a nobler youth than George Carder Hazard,

"" I stay not to gather the lone ones of earth,
I spare not the young in their gay dreams of mirth,
But I sweep them all on to their home in the grave,
I stop not to pity, I stay not to save."

§ 465. NATHANIEL HAZARD, 6 (Mayor George, 5; Governor George, 4; Colonel George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in 1776; he died December 17, 1820. He graduated from Brown University about 1792. In 1818, he was a member of the General Assembly and Speaker of the House. In 1820, he was a Representative in Congress; he died in office, and was buried in the Congressional burying-ground. He was an eloquent speaker, and much admired for this gift by his contemporaries. There is now in existence a programme, printed by the order of the House of Representatives, of the funeral services, which seem to have been observed with great solemnity.

He, like all the sons of Mayor George Hazard by his second wife, was a man of fine physical development and great personal beauty; he had the misfortune in early life to lose one of his hands by the accidental discharge of his gun. The loss was supplied by one very artistically made of cork. This hand he used so skillfully that his wife never knew that the hand he offered her was removable until after her marriage. He married, November 2, 1801, Sarah, daughter of

Judge

Judge Fales, of Taunton, Massachusetts. She was, like all her sisters, beautiful. She was engaged to be married to George DeWolfe, of Bristol, Rhode Island; but, just before the wedding-day, she eloped with Nathaniel Hazard. Singularly enough, two of her children married two of the children of DeWolfe's family.

§ 469. THOMAS HAZARD, 6 (Judge Carder, 5; Governor George, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born December 5, 1761; died November 1, 1834. He was called Thomas C. Hazard, which was equivalent to Thomas, son of Carder; he was also called "Fiddle-head Tom," because of the peculiar shape of his head. He married, first, January 3, 1790, —— Browning; he married, second, January 8, 1812, Eliza, daughter of Thomas Arnold, of Newport. His second wife was a beautiful and accomplished woman, and a great favorite in the society of her native town. Even in middle age she was much admired, especially by the young, who loved to listen to her tales of the gay life led in Newport, and read the notes and love-letters addressed to her by men whose names are historic. Two playing-cards are even now in existence, — one, the two-spot of clubs, bears, written on the back: "Lord Percy asks the favour of Miss Eliza Arnold's company to a Ball at the Crown Coffee House, on Saturday, the 18th of January, being His Majestie's birthday." On the

back of a six-spot of clubs is written: "Lord Howe's compliments to you, and requests the honour of your company to a Ball at the Assembly Rooms on Monday, the 19th Instant."

§ 470. GEORGE HAZARD, 6 (Judge Carder, 5; Governor George, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born April 13, 1763; he died September 29, 1829. After a few years at school in Plainfield, Connecticut, he commenced the study of medicine under Judge Freeman Perry, who was a skilful physician and surgeon, as well as a judge. He afterwards studied with Doctor Jonathan Easton, of Newport, and after a regular course, was graduated at the Medical School in Philadelphia. (These facts have been extracted from his son, Edward Hazard, with some difficulty, being thrown in as slight episodes, during interesting discourses on his favorite theme, Lions, or rather Heroes, and therefore the order of

Doctor Hazard's studies may not be exact; an attempt to bring Mr. Hazard back to the desired subject being answered by, "Will you be quiet and let me talk; I am a hero-worshipper.") Of course this is not intended as a history of Doctor Hazard, but is only given as a memorandum for future reference.

Doctor Hazard married, first, his cousin Sarah, widow of Captain Daniel Gardiner, and daughter of Mayor George Hazard, of Newport. She was several years older than Doctor George, but he remedied this as far as possible, by carefully cutting from his father's family Bible the record of his birth, a heroic and chivalrous act, which should place him among his son's "Heroes." Mrs. Hazard died a few years after her marriage, leaving no children. He married, second, December 25, 1804, Mary Hoxsie. She died March 30, 1806, leaving one daughter. He married, third, May 16, 1807, Jane, daughter of Robert Hull, a remote cousin. Mrs.

Jane Hazard was a remarkable woman in many ways, energetic and capable. She was left with a large family of children, the youngest being but eight years old; her resources were not large, but yet she brought up her family well, and gave them all a good education. Her features were more strong than beautiful, yet her husband when asked, "Whom do you

consider the handsomest woman in the town?" always answered, "Jane Hazard." She was an interesting woman in conversation, even in extreme age: one always felt a little wiser on leaving her than one had been before the meeting. She was a shrewd observer and possessed great tact. She made no enemies, and one was apt to feel better satisfied with himself after a conversation with "Friend Hazard." She was a little proud of her heavy brown hair, that showed but few threads of silver, even at eighty years of age.

of silver, even at eighty years of age.

After her husband's death, she joined the Society of Friends (having always had a strong leaning in that direction), and was a worthy member of the Society. Her son-in-law, Mr. Attmore Robinson, used to tell with delight a story of taxing his mother's patience to its utmost capacity. He drove with her one fine, cool morning to Wickford, a distance of twelve miles, to see an old friend. The drive gave Mrs. Hazard a good appetite, and when dinner was served the "pièce de résistance" proved to be a delicious boiled ham; Mr. Robinson was asked to carve the ham, and, willing to show how well he could carve, he cut the slices so thin that one could easily see through them; Mrs. Hazard was helped as often as she dared to be helped, and as she afterward assured him, left the table hungry. When they were well on their way home, she took him to task, saying, "Attmore, when thee cuts ham for a hungry person, thee must never cut it thin." She was very fond of flowers. Her little garden, of which she was proud, and

of which she took the entire charge, was a mass of color from the early tulip to the late chrysanthemum. She allowed no one to work in her garden but herself,

for fear that some carefully nursed weakling might receive too rough handling. In the early morning, and in the late afternoon, a dark brown patch in the garden, if looked at steadily, would resolve itself into a long cloak and Quaker bonnet, within which was Mrs. Hazard, busily engaged in pulling the weeds from her loved

flowers; nothing that she ever planted, died.

For several years before her death she lived with her daughter, Mrs. Attmore Robinson, and as her grandchildren love to tell, she kept a little twig behind the tall old clock, with which she "tingled" their fingers when disobedient. She was a strict disciplinarian, and often said, "Children must be made to obey or they will end on the gallows"; the word gallows, as she spoke it, was a mystical word of fearful portent to the younger children, and they wondered what sort of a thing this was upon which they were to end their days. Another axiom of hers was, that children must be taught to work: "A man who is ashamed to work with his hands, will never amount to anything" was an often repeated assertion. She died January 18, 1862.

RICHARD WARD HAZARD, 6 (Judge Carder, 5; Governor George, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born November 1, 1770; he died December 2, 1844; he married Mary, daughter of Josephus Peckham. She died September 27, 1869. He was a very worthy man, a farmer, and lived and died on his farm in Matunuck. He was for years an honored member of the Baptist communion, and was always in his seat on Sunday morning, with a pew full of children. Late in life, when the children were stalwart men and healthy pleasant-faced women, the seat was always full, with Mr. Hazard at the head. His usual dress was a blue coat with brass buttons, but in the winter he wore a long brown surtout, with a high collar. This dress gave him a distinctive personality, making him seem like a man left over from another generation, and also (be it added) making him seem the best-dressed man in church. He had a fine face, fair, with blue eyes, — a face to be trusted. He was respected by his townspeople, possibly for negative, rather than positive qualities; but he was a good type of the honest, upright country gentleman.

§ 500. JOSHUA PERRY, 6 (Mercy Hazard, 5; Oliver, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in 1756; he died November, 1802; in 1871 he was appointed surgeon in Colonel Church's battalion. Mr. Perry married, October 17, 1780, Mary, daughter of Benjamin and Mary (Hazard, daughter of Governor George) Peckham. For children, see No. 456.

§ 502. CHRISTOPHER RAYMOND PERRY, 6 (Mercy Hazard, 5; Oliver, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born December 4, 1761; he died June 4, 1818. He served with distinction during the Revolutionary War,

upon armed vessels fitted out in the Colonies.

There is a tradition, well authenticated, that during the war he was sent out on a foraging expedition in his native town, South Kingstown. A very respectable man, by the name of Tucker, resisted the authority of the boy-captain (for he could not have been over seventeen or eighteen years of age at the time), and Perry discharged his gun, killing the man. He was obliged to flee for his life from the enraged relatives of Tucker, and ran his horse to the South Ferry. He was for a great many years after this rather timid about visiting his native

town,—so reads the story; but he married, in 1784, and his first child was born in the town. In June, 1798, he was appointed a Captain in the United States Navy, to command the frigate *General Greene*, and was commissioned a captain March 1, 1799, to rank from the first date. He was discharged under the Peace Establishment Act of April 3, 1801, and was subsequently Collector of

Internal Revenue for Newport, Bristol, etc., in Rhode Island.

In the Rhode Island American, July 31, 1812, is this notice: "Captain Christopher R. Perry is appointed to succeed Captain Bainbridge as Superintendent of the United States Navy Yard, at Charlestown, Massachusetts, the latter being required to take command of the frigate Constellation, now refitting at Washington." He married, August, 1784, Sarah Alexander. She came from Scotland in Captain Christopher Perry's vessel, and the acquaintance thus formed ripened into love and marriage. Soon after the marriage they lived in the house of William Rodman, then but recently built,—a large, commodious house, still standing in the village of Rocky Brook. William Rodman was a bachelor, and lived with them. He was a well-read, well-informed man, and excellent company, exceedingly quick at repartee; but occasionally he was a little merry after dinner, from the effects of good wine. On these somewhat rare occasions, Mrs. Perry would place her hand on Mr. Rodman's arm and say, very gently, "William, I think thee had better go to thy room for a little rest." "William" always went away as meekly as a lamb, with a parting bow to the ladies, and a merry twinkle in his eyes. Christopher Perry's first child, Oliver Hazard Perry, was born in this house.

In 1798, Robert Rodman was married to Elizabth Hazard, and they also lived in their uncle's house where their first child, Samuel, was born, in 1800. When the child was a few days old, Captain Christopher Perry being at the house to see "Cousin Elizabeth," and glancing round the room (the large west chamber),

said, "My son Oliver was born in this room."

In 1793, his father gave Christopher Raymond Perry ten acres of his homestead farm in Matunuck, and at his death the remaining part of the farm, "where I now live." It is possible that the family of Christopher Perry lived with his father several years before he came into possession of the farm in 1813, as Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry always spoke of the place as his early home, and of Judge William Peckham, who lived on the next farm, as his early playmate and companion.

§ 508. JONATHAN NICHOLS HAZARD, 6 (Stephen, 5; Stephen, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born October 18, 1761; he died in 1802; he married, May 12, 1785, Mary, daughter of Sylvester and Alice (Perry) Robinson. She was born in 1763, and died in 1837, and was buried in the old family burying-ground at Point Judith, which was laid out by Governor William Robinson as a final resting-place for himself, his sons, grandsons, and descendants for all time. It was on that part of his farm that he gave to his son William Robinson, who sold it to Sylvester, his brother, in 1770–1. Governor William was possibly the first man buried here, in 1751. Unfortunately, a greatgrandson, moved by a spirit of progress, translated the mouldering bones of his ancestor to a village cemetery, and one by one the bodies of the sons of Governor William have been moved, until only his son John is left, with his young wife beside him. The property has long since passed from the possession of the Robinson family, but the old graveyard, with its substantial stone wall, remains a monument to the provident care of Governor William for his posterity.

§ 525. SAMUEL J. POTTER, 6 (Elizabeth Hazard, 5; Stephen, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born about 1752. One year after his mother's marriage to John Potter, in her will, she calls "son Samuel J. Potter" "eldest son." Samuel J. Potter died in 1804. He was Deputy-Governor of the State from 1790 to 1799, when George Brown was elected Deputy-Governor over him, after a severe and close canvass. "This vote," says Mr. Updike, "drew the lines in this State between the two great political parties of the country; the Federalists, under Mr. Adams, and the Democrats, under Mr. Jefferson." Governor Potter, the Republican, now styled Democratic, candidate, succeeded Mr. Brown in 1800; and in 1801 the State became Republican, and remained so until the war of 1812. Governor Potter continued in office until 1803; he died the following year.

His father gave him a farm in Matunuck; this is what is now known as the John Babcock estate. It was sold to William Peckham, grandfather of Mr. Babcock. In the attic of the house, after it came into Mr. Peckham's possession, were found two portraits, supposed to be those of Governor Potter and his wife; they are now in the possession of Mrs. John Potter Sherman. His father gave him also a farm in Point Judith, where he lived and died. This is the farm now owned and occupied by George Pearse. He married Ann Seager. In his will he called John Seager "brother-in-law." He also mentions seven children

by name. He died September 26, 1804.

THOMAS HAZARD, 7 (Robert, 6; Thomas, 5; Robert, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born January 14, 1782; he married Lydia Rogers. The Christian name of the eldest son of this, the eldest branch of the family, alternated from Thomas to Robert for eight generations. When Robert [6] Hazard married, he carried his wife home to the house of his father, "College

Tom" Hazard, on Tower Hill. "Nailor Tom" Hazard, in his oft-quoted diary, says, on the 13th of December, 1782: "Robert's wife very sick; I went for Granny Stedman." On the 14th he says, "Robert had a son born." A few days later he says, "Robert got a name for his son, last night, from his father." This addition to the family made it necessary for the house to be enlarged, and soon "Robert and I" are at work digging a trench for the addition to "Cousin Hazard's" house. At the close of the Revolutionary War she went to live with her grandmother, Mary Rodman, at Newport, where she remained until she was eight or nine years of age. She was her grandmother's favorite grandchild. It is without doubt due to this early association that she preserved the letters, papers and relics of that period. Though born in the midst of the Revolutionary struggle, scarcely any references are made to the stirring events of that period, either in the letters she has preserved or in the traditions which have been handed down to her descendants; for war was abhorrent to the creed of her family. Her grandmother Rodman, being an invalid in her old age, was unable to attend the receptions given to persons of distinction visiting Newport, and many of them called upon her. Her granddaughter remembers, among them, Washington's visit. Living with her grandmother, she saw a great deal of her mother's sisters, and from the many affectionate references to her in their letters, must have been a favorite with them.

After

After finishing her education at Newport, she joined her parents at New Bedford, where she remained until her marriage, visiting her grandmother Rodman at Newport, her grandfather Hazard at South Kingstown, her sister Mrs. Jacob Barker in New York, and her aunt, Mrs. Samuel R. Fisher, in Philadelphia. She married John H. Howland, November 3, 1803, at the Friends' Meeting House in New Bedford, before a large gathering of friends and relatives. Mrs. Howland had a great love for poetry and objects of art, but being a Friend did not enter much into the social amusements of New York, although, as her Journal would indicate, she was fond of travelling.

In person Mrs. Howland is described as being slightly over the medium height, with dark hair and eyes, resembling her grandmother Rodman, who was considered very beautiful. Mrs. Howland died suddenly, April 29, 1847, and was

buried beside her husband.

John H. Howland, was born at the Round Hills farm, at Dartmouth, near New Bedford, Massachusetts, February 8, 1774. He was the sixth son of Gideon Howland and his wife Sarah, daughter of Captain Thomas and Judith Hicks. He spent his early days on his father's farm, but disliking the life of a farmer, ran away to sea at the age of fourteen, and before many years was in command of a vessel. He made many voyages to the West Indies in his brother Joseph's vessels, and by good management, about the year 1798, was able to begin business on his own account. In 1803 his name appears as a director in the Bedford Bank, of which his father-in-law, Thomas Hazard, Ir., was the first president. He was also one of the first directors of the Marine Insurance Company. He was named John Howland, but as there were so many of that name, about this time he signed himself "John H. Howland," the H. being for Hicks, the name of his mother. He married first, in 1800, Sylvia, daughter of Captain Isaac Howland; she died in 1802, leaving a son who died young; he married Sarah Hazard in 1803, and about 1810 moved to New York, where he soon became prominent as a shipping merchant. His office was at 159 Front street, and his residence on the south-west corner of Broadway and Leonard street. Joseph Grinnell, a nephew of Mr. Howland, was his partner in 1810, the firm name being "Howland and Grinnell." Mr. Grinnell withdrew in 1815, forming a partnership with his cousin, Captain Preserved Fish. Mr. Howland continuing the business as "John Howland and Co." He subsequently admitted his son William to partnership, the firm being known as "John H. Howland & Son." 1

Mr. Howland's summer house, at Bloomingdale, was on a high bluff overlooking the Hudson River (at what is now Eighty-sixth Street and Riverside Drive), with over ninety acres of lawn and gardens. Mr. Howland owned many vessels, among them being the ships "Martha Howland," "Mary Howland," and "William Howland," named after his children. The "Mary Howland" brought over the first English passenger locomotive engine used in this country, on the Mohawk

and Hudson River Railroad.

During the war of 1812, Mr. Howland subscribed for fifty thousand dollars of the war-loan, authorized by the United States Government, to raise funds for defence of the nation. Mr. Howland died highly esteemed by all who knew him, at his home in Eighty-sixth Street, New York, March 13, 1849.

§ 649. THOMAS ROBINSON HAZARD, 7 (Rowland, 6; Thomas, 5; Robert, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in South Kingstown, Rhode Island, January 3, 1797, and died in New York City. When quite a youth, he assisted his father in his mill, but as early as March 29, 1821, he bought of Abigail Rodman, widow of Robert Rodman, ten acres of land in the village of Rocky Brook; and at about the same date, March 25, 1821, he leased from Freeman P. Watson a water-right, with right to erect a dam and flow ten acres of land. The same year he made his reservoir, and built a small wooden mill that contained one set of machinery. The year following, he bought of his father, Rowland Hazard, seventy acres adjoining. He combined farming with his manufacturing business, raising large quantities of sheep; for this reason he was called "Shepherd Tom," a name with which he was much pleased. In 1838 he sold this property, having accumulated what at that time was considered a small fortune, and retired from active business, buying an estate in Newport, where the remaining part of his life was spent.

When over eighty years of age he wrote a book called Recollections of Olden Times. Possibly no book has been more thoroughly read in the South County than this one. The few of his contemporaries that Time had spared read it in order to live over again the golden days of youth, while the rising generation read it as veritable history. This book was followed by the Jonny-Cake Papers, which was equally well read by South County folk, as it contains many characteristic anecdotes mingled with the romance. Mr. Hazard had a fine imagination, and was a good raconteur, — qualities that he inherited, perhaps, from his

Robinson ancestors.

The nature of Mr. Hazard's books is such that he rarely speaks of himself in a serious way; therefore it is to be very greatly regretted that lack of material necessarily renders this sketch incomplete. In Recollections of Olden Times he says: "Thomas R. Hazard, the compiler of these tables, has been an earnest worker in the cause of what is called 'Modern Spiritualism' since the year 1856, and whatever may be his merits or demerits otherwise, he has no higher ambition than that his name should be handed down to the coming generations associated with this fact alone."

In his last illness, a few hours before his death, he said to his brother, Joseph Peace Hazard: "I am afraid that I am better, and am sorry, for I am anxious

to commence the new life in the 'spiritual world.'"

After Mr. Hazard's removal to Newport, "he became very much impressed with the necessity of improved and more humane methods in the care of the insane and poor of Newport. His personal investigation, and the reports he made, brought about a revolution in the State, and a very general reform. He, with his brother, Isaac Peace Hazard, working together, were largely instrumental in securing the establishment of the Butler Hospital for the Insane, which Cyrus Butler liberally endowed. Rowland G. Hazard aided in obtaining necessary

necessary funds, so that the three brothers are connected with the founding of that institution." <sup>1</sup>

In early childhood, he was taken to Bristol, Pennsylvania, to the home of his maternal grandfather, Isaac Peace. He attended school in Burlington, New Jersey (across the Delaware), and in Bristol, and in 1813 was sent to West Town school. Here he remained five years, and developed a strong taste for mathematics, discovering some new modes of demonstration in conic sections. This school gave him a thorough training in the branches it taught, and though he lamented his want of a classical education, yet by reading he early acquired a knowledge of classical history.


In 1819 Mr. Hazard returned to Rhode Island, and, with his brother, Isaac Peace Hazard, took charge of the manufacturing business at Peacedale, in which their father was engaged. Under the management of the brothers the business largely increased. From 1833 to 1843 Mr. Hazard made yearly visits to the South, and had an opportunity to see the workings of slavery, an institution he abhorred. In New Orleans, through his efforts, many free negroes unjustly detained in the chain-gang were released. His speech on the Fugitive Slave Law, in the Rhode Island Legislature, in 1850, while generous and appreciative of the

slave-owners' position, is a powerful denunciation of the institution.

For several years he represented his town in the General Assembly, always taking a prominent position. During the adjourned session of the General Assembly, in the autumn of 1854, he delivered an address condemning the discriminative rates for freight and passengers charged by the Stonington Railroad Company,—an address that the officials of that corporation regarded as highly offensive. Some time afterwards, in order to test the rights of the Company in granting stop-over privileges on through tickets, he was ejected from one of the Company's trains. This measure excited much indignation, and a set of resolutions was adopted by the Town Council of his native town, in which is to be found the germ of the Interstate Commerce Law of 1886. But it is as a writer that Mr. Hazard is best known. In his books he will live long after the houses he builded and the fortune he accumulated have become matters of tradition.

In 1836 his essay on "Language" appeared, and gained for him the friendship of William Ellery Channing, who said of the book, "I have known a man of vigorous intellect, who had enjoyed few advantages of early education, and whose mind was almost engrossed by the details of an extensive business, but who composed a book of much original thought, in steamboats and on horseback, and while visiting distant customers." This essay was possibly the dearest to Mr. Hazard of all his works. It is written in a less studied, more graceful style than his purely metaphysical works, and contains many charming bits of imagery. As an illustration of the remarkable concentration and dual quality of his mind is given this anecdote: In 1840, or about that time, a gentleman occupied a seat with Mr. Hazard on the train from New York. Not long before the train reached Kingston he took a letter from his pocket, also a pencil, and, while still keeping up the conversation of a purely business nature, occasionally wrote a few words. Just as he was leaving the train, he with a smile tore off the back of the letter and gave it to his friend, who, to his surprise, found a charming little poem addressed to a young girl whom he had seen, the evening before, enter a room with a rosebud between her lips.

A biographical sketch of Mr. Hazard has been written by his granddaughter,

Caroline Hazard, and is prefixed to his collected works.

When he was nine years old, his parents, leaving the old home that had been in the possession of the Hazard family for over one hundred years, made a new home in Newport, Rhode Island, almost in sight of the paternal Hazard and Robinson mansion-houses. Here he received his education. In the war of 1812, being then twenty-one years of age, he promptly responded to the call for soldiers, and served through the war as Captain in the Newport Artillery, and took an active part in the engagement off Sachuest Beach with the British man-of-war, Nimrod. It was he who carried many of the field-pieces from the town to assist in this brief battle. He was one of the few pensioners of the war of 1812. Later he turned his attention to farming, which occupation he followed for thirty years. When about fifty years old, he accepted the office of Overseer of the Poor of the town of Newport, and faithfully performed its duties until about six months previous to his death.

" Who sweeps a room as to Thy laws, Makes that and the action fine."

He also held several other offices under the municipal government. Mr. Hazard was a "tall, strong, good man," so says Mr. Thomas R. Hazard, in his Recollections of Olden Times, and so say many of his contemporaries. He never had a week of illness during his life until within two weeks of his death. He was an industrious, unselfish man, of a kindly, genial nature. He is said to have been a great and rapid talker, and was wont to preface his conversation, with with, "I am a man of few words." There was no limit to his hospitality. He died September 16, 1875, respected and beloved in the community where he lived

so long.

From an obituary notice published in a Newport newspaper the following account is taken: "Dr. Hazard died at his residence in this city, on Friday evening, August 21st, in the eighty-third year of his age. It is sad for us to chronicle the decease of one of our oldest and best citizens, perhaps as thoroughly an old Newporter as any now living, springing as he did from an ancient Rhode Island family, remarkable

for its strong, distinctive characteristics for many generations.

"Dr. Hazard was born at Narragansett, within sight of the beautiful Bay; when about eight years old his parents removed to Newport, bringing him with them. He was an accurate and painstaking boy, known at school for his mathematical skill and elegant penmanship, which he retained almost to the close of his life; he was a pupil of Mr. Frazier, and subsequently of that strict but excellent teacher, Mr. Levi Tower. He delighted to narrate the incidents and scenes of his school-boy life, painting them with all the freshness of early youth. He was, for the times, a good Latin scholar, and had more than usual mechanical ingenuity. He early turned his attention to the study of medicine, and after leaving school entered the office of Dr. William Turner, well remembered by our older citizens as an eminent medical practitioner. He remained with him about four years, when, having completed his studies, he continued to practice with Dr. Turner, and won the confidence of the entire community, and was a favorite of Dr. Turner, and all the physicians of Newport. His most intimate associate and friend was Daniel Turner, distinguished in our naval history as a brave and talented commodore.

"About 1827, Dr. Hazard purchased the apothecary establishment of the late Charles Feke, on the Parade, and the mantle of that charitable and excellent man could have fallen on no more worthy shoulders. About this time he married Anna Collins, daughter of Governor Charles Collins, and removed to the fine old-fashioned

old-fashioned house fronting on the Mall, which his kindly presence brightened to the day of his death. The light of his pleasant wood-fire in winter has smiled through the flower-graced windows upon all the passers-by. Dr. Hazard continued the practice of surgery and medicine in connection with the drug business, and we may safely say has prescribed for more men, women, and children, than any other living physician in the city. His manner was indescribably kind and gracious, his tenderness toward children was unvarying, and his charity and devotion to the suffering poor was without limit. He literally prescribed and gave medicine and attention gratuitously, to thousands who were unable to pay; our older people will recall him in his little office, which was the perfection of neatness and order, devoting himself at almost all hours to his patients, humming an old tune as he prepared his medicines, or beaming with kindly eyes upon some little child.

"He had great love for agriculture, and purchased two fine farms near the town, which he delighted to cultivate and beautify, in what he called his leisure hours. He was athletic, erect and agile, and at seventy years of age could outwalk almost anybody, delighting to allude to the 'Narragansett white-oak' of his bones and

sinews.

"His house was overflowing with hospitality, and we doubt if there was a residence in Newport where more friends were welcomed and entertained.

"He was a man of great modesty and reticence, but of strong convictions of right, and great fixedness of purpose, and healthy conservatism; he abhorred shams,

and detested ill-advised radicalism.

"About twenty years ago he retired from active business and surrendered his drug establishment to his nephew, Rowland Hazard, and Mr. Philip Caswell, and shortly after removed to his country seat, which he called "Bird's Nest," because there the feathered songsters most did congregate, attracted by his kind attentions, and protected and fed by his hand; he used to say that he could recognize them as they came back to their nests year after year. As he grew older and more infirm he returned to his city home, and resided there until he died, surrounded by his many relatives and friends, and comforted and cared for by his faithful and devoted wife, sustained and soothed by a trusting faith which seemed like that of a little child towards a kind father. The morning of the day of his death as he lay upon his bed, calm and patient, the only words he could utter were; 'God is Master of the World'; and unto the hands of that God we commit his spirit."

He was born in Salem, Massachusetts, June 20, 1813, being the second child of Timothy and Mary King (Mason) Brooks. For the first fifteen years of his life he remained in his father's house, attending meanwhile different elementary schools. In 1824, he attended the Latin Grammar-school in Salem, where he completed his preparation for college. In 1828, the youth of fifteen entered Harvard University. Among his classmates were Henry W. Bellows, George Ticknor Curtis, John S. Dwight, John Holmes, Estes Howe, Samuel Osgood, John Parkman, William Silsbee, Henry Wheatland, and Augustus Story. Other college-mates were Charles Sumner, J. Lothrop Motley, and Oliver Wendell Holmes. Young Brooks seems to have engaged in the work of securing a higher education with great seriousness and ardor. The list of his studies and literary appointments is truly formidable for one of his slender strength. In 1832, he entered the Cambridge Divinity School, and graduated with honors in 1835. His first, last, and only pastoral charge was the Unitarian Church in Newport, he being called to this church in 1836; this call he accepted January 1, 1837, and entered upon that ministerial relation which, during the thirty-seven years of its continuance, so abounded in labors for truth, virtue, and piety, and proved such a blessing for the parish and the larger community.

Mr. Brooks wrote voluminously for the reviews and the periodical press of his day. He always entertained an ambition to write an English life of Martin Luther; and the thirty-six lectures on that great spiritual hero and his times, which he read to his people at Newport, were perhaps intended as material for this end. But it was as a poet, gifted by nature with a facile and graceful muse, that Mr. Brooks was best known to the world of American letters. Shining with a mild and genial ray, he became, from choice as well as disposition, the poet of the home-life of his friends, contributing the wealth of his sympathetic imagination and the lyric sweetness of his verse, to voice their joy, or lift their sorrow. His versatility and productiveness were amazing. Literary and theological essays, reviews, historical monographs, odes and hymns for religious, patriotic, and festive occasions, drolleries, children's books, translations from masterpieces of foreign literature, both in prose and verse, occasional verses and

jeux d'esprit, flowed in a steady stream from his busy pen.

Mr. Brooks died in June, 1883, a few days before the seventieth anniversary of his birth; and his pure and amiable spirit ascended to those mansions of light to which he had so often pointed the hopes of his sorrowing friends.

MARGARET LYMAN HAZARD, 7 (Benjamin, 6; Thomas, 5; George, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born April 8, 1817; she married, September 8, 1841, General Isaac Ingalls Stevens, United States Army. Major-General Isaac Ingalls Stevens was born in North Andover, Massachusetts, on the 15th of March, 1818. In 1835, at the age of seventeen, he entered the Military Academy at West Point. Here he distinguished himself, and in 1839 he graduated at the head of his class. He was appointed a second lieutenant in the Corps of Engineers in the United States Army, and promoted to the rank

of first lieutenant, July 1st, 1840.

From August, 1839, to September, 1841, Lieutenant Stevens was employed as an assistant at Fort Adams, Newport, Rhode Island. From September, 1841, to March, 1843, he had charge of the Government works at New Bedford. In March, 1843, he was placed in charge of those at Portland, Maine, and Portsmouth, New Hampshire, and also of Fort Knox, at the narrows of Penobscot river. Of these works he was in charge until December, 1846, when ordered to join General Scott's army at Brazos. He served on the staff of General Scott, from the investment of Vera Cruz to the capture of the City of Mexico. He was at the siege of Vera Cruz and at the battles of Contreras, Cherubusco, Molino del Rey, Chepultepec, and the capture of the City of Mexico. At the San Cosmo gate he was severely wounded. For his gallant conduct in the battles of Contreras and Cherubusco, he was breveted captain, and for his bravery at the battle of Chepultepec, which resulted in the taking of the city, he was breveted major. Having been disabled by his wound, he returned to the United States in January, 1848, and resumed charge of the works in Maine and New Hampshire.

In September, 1849, Major Stevens accepted the position of assistant in charge of the office of the United States Coast Survey, in Washington, and there continued on duty until March, 1853. He was a warm friend of President Pierce, and was by him, soon after his inauguration, appointed governor of the new territory of Washington. As governor of that territory, he was ex-officio superintendent of Indian affairs; and at the same time, having volunteered for the service, he was placed in charge of the exploration and survey of the northern route for a railroad to the Pacific. He determined the entire feasibility of the route for a railroad, and by his surveys established the practicability of navigating the Upper Missouri and Columbia River by steamers. As Indian Superintendent his labors were very successful. From December, 1854, to July, 1855, he negotiated treaties of cession of lands with some twenty-two out of the twenty-five thousand Indians of the territory, and extinguished the Indian title to more than one hundred thousand square miles of territory. His Indian policy was one of great beneficence to the Indians. He guarded their rights most carefully, provided for their civilization, and guaranteed to them homesteads on their assuming the habits

habits and adopting the usages of civilized life. His treaties were confirmed, and his policy adopted by the Government, with the most benign results. At the end of his term of office, he was sent delegate to Congress from the Territory. When Congress adjourned, Governor Stevens proceeded to Washington Territory. On the fall of Fort Sumter he offered carte-blanche to the Government, came in person as soon as possible, accepted the colonelcy of the Seventy-ninth Highlanders, New York Volunteers, and steadily devoted himself to the duties of the field. In September, 1861, in command of a force of eighteen hundred men, he made the reconnoissance of Lewinsville. September 29th, he was made a brigadier-general. In October, he was ordered on the expedition against the coasts of Carolina, Georgia and Florida. On the first day of January, 1862, he attacked, and, with the aid of gun-boats, carried the enemy's batteries in the Coosaw, and, in command at Beaufort, he held possession of the site until ordered to the Stono in June. Placed then in command of a division, he landed on James Island, forming the right wing of the army under General Benham, and, whilst his force was landing, drove in the advance of the enemy, capturing a battery of five guns, and establishing his permanent picket-line. In July, General Stevens with his division was ordered to Virginia, and reported to General Burnside. The following month he was ordered to Fredericksburg, and thence marched up the Rappahannock, and joined Pope's army at Culpepper Court House. At the second battle of Bull Run, he was almost incessantly engaged for two days; his troops suffered terribly, and his own horse was shot dead beneath him. Among the last to leave the field, he was placed in charge of the rear the day after the battle, with a force of two divisions of infantry, a brigade of cavalry, and several batteries of artillery. On the following day, September 1st, 1862, General Stevens, in conjunction with the Second Division (Ninth Corps), was sent to arrest the advance of a force of the enemy, threatening the road to Washington, by which the army was retiring. This force, consisting of Stonewall Jackson's troops, was advancing with great resolution and rapidity, and was already within sight of the road when met by General Stevens. Forming his division into a column of brigades with the greatest rapidity, he charged the enemy with bayonet, knowing full well that the safety of the army depended in their repulse. The enemy, meantime, had taken position behind a fence on the edge of a wood, and opened a deadly volley upon our advancing troops. General Stevens, seeing the head of the column waver and hold back, rushed forward, seized the colors of the seventy-ninth Highlanders from the hands of the wounded color-bearer, and calling on his troops to follow him, led them to a resistless charge which swept back the enemy like chaff and gained the position - a position dearly bought, for, in the very moment of success, he fell pierced through the brain by a rebel bullet. In recognition of his services during the civil war, General Stevens was made a major-general, to date from July, 1862.1

Mr. Hazard resides in Boston Neck, in the old house built by his great-grandfather, George Hazard. This house was probably built in the early part of the eighteenth century; the farm being given to George [4] by his father, Thomas Hazard, who died in 1746. When the house was being built, Thomas advised his son to lower the second story, which was intended to be as high as the first story. He thought that in this way the house would be better able to withstand the strong winds that came blowing in without a break from the broad Atlantic. George being a "wise son," took the advice of his father, and cut down the post of the second story, and the house is still standing to-day. This house with the farm, was given by George to his youngest son Thomas G. Hazard; several pieces of the old furniture, given with the house, are still there, — the old family clock, marking the time as accurately as it did almost two hundred years ago. This farm came to the present owner from his uncle, George Place Hazard, who was called "Barley George," as his father Thomas G. Hazard was called "Gentleman Tom." The present owner of the farm has also his sobriquet, as there are still several Thomas Hazards living. "Gentleman Tom" was, tradition says, a very handsome man, tall and large, with fair, rather ruddy complexion, and blue eyes, - the true Hazard type. His descendants get their dark complexion (and sobriquet) from his wife, who was an Easton, — the Eastons being a dark race. Mr. Hazard is a farmer, improving his family acres, and, like his ancestors, taking a keen interest in the affairs of the town; he has represented the town in the General Assembly on several occasions. In 1875, he was elected Senator.

He

He has been greatly interested in all questions tending to the advancement of the town, especially in schools, both public and private. Mr. Hazard is, in one sense, an ideal farmer, being extremely fond of books, and reading only the best, and he has thus been able to bring his society to him, and in the quiet of his old manor-house hold communion with the best minds of all times. He married, December 8, 1858, Mary King Brooks, a sister of the Reverend Charles Brooks the gentle poet and preacher.

He was born January 8, 1784, at Cocumscussuc, or as it was sometimes called, Smith's Castle, an estate which had belonged to the family since the first settlement of the Narragansett country. This settlement was made by an ancestor, Richard Smith or Smythe of Gloucestershire, a man of some fortune, whose family or relations lived at North Nibley in the Cotswold Hills, a few miles from Berkeley Castle. Richard Smith, on arriving in this country, lived for a few months at Taunton, and then removed to New Amsterdam, where his daughter Catharine married Gysbert op ten Dyck or op Dyck, of an old family at Wesel, in Westphalia, where owing to a sort of hereditary burgomastership, the records of their genealogy are traceable in the records of the town, from father to son since the fifteenth century. Smith subsequently removed to Narragansett, and died there, and the estate acquired by him passed into the hands of the Updikes, and remained in the family for about two hundred years. The town of Wickford was at one time known as Updike's New Town, and is so inscribed in old maps. Mr. Updike came of a race of lawyers, his grandfather having been for twentyfive years Attorney-General of the Colony, and one of the first lawyers of the Colony; and his elder brother enjoying the same office. His father, however, lived a life of leisure. Mr. Updike was educated first at home, afterward at the Academy in Plainfield, Connecticut, which in those days had great vogue as a classical school. After leaving the Academy he studied law in the office of James Lanman, afterward Senator from Connecticut, and later in the offices of the Honorable William Hunter, and the Honorable Asher Robbins and Elisha R. Potter. He was admitted to the Bar in 1808. He married September 23, 1809, and lived at Tower Hill, and later at Cocumscussuc, which his father gave him. Owing to becoming security for his brother Lodowick, he lost this property in 1814; a loss about which he felt so strongly that until the end of his life he avoided passing it, or speaking of it. And the name Lodowick, which had alternated with that of Daniel for many generations, has not since been used in the family. Occupied for many years in politics and the practice of law, and sitting for a long period in the Legislature, he still found time to collect the materials for a volume of sketches of lawyers of an earlier day, which he published in 1842, under the title of Memoirs of the Rhode Island Bar. He also amused his leisure hours by collecting the materials for the history of the Episcopal Church in the Narragansett country, in which for many reasons he was interested. His family had always been Churchmen, and benefactors of S. Paul's parish, in which Cocumscussuc lay. The Rev. James MacSparran an S. P. G. missionary to S. Paul's Church, Wickford, married his aunt, and many of his papers were in his possession; Bishop Berkeley had been the intimate friend of his grandfather, and was a connection of his family, as was also Seabury, Bishop of Connecticut. This and his love for the history of men and families, his knowledge of the older state of society, in which he had been brought up and of which he was a part, enabled him to do this work with real interest, and to do it as perhaps no one else could. The book was issued in 1847 under the title of History of the Episcopal Church in Narragansett. It has long been a bibliographical rarity.

Mr. Updike possessed a large and very curious library which had been the accumulation of generations at Cocumscussuc. It contained some superb editions of the Greek and Latin classics, an enormous quantity of Anglican theological treatises, chiefly aimed against Methodists, Socinians and the Church of Rome, political pamphlets, law books, and a very interesting accumulation of letters and

papers.

papers. The pamphlets and a collection of papers illustrative of the history of the State, forms a special collection in the Public Library in Providence, having

been placed there in his memory by his grandson.

There is, says Mr. Abraham Payne in a paper written at the time of Mr. Updike's death, a portrait of Mr. Updike by Lincoln, excellent both as a picture and as a likeness, when he was in the full maturity of his physical and mental powers. It is a radiant face, suggestive of strength and enjoyment. If it were hung in a gallery of portraits of men who have made a mark in the world, it would at once arrest attention and provoke inquiry about the original. As the picture, so the man. In whatever company Mr. Updike was, he was a centre of attraction, not because he asserted himself, but because he was alive in every part of his nature. He enjoyed himself, and so was a source of joy to all around him. He loved to eat, and drink, and laugh, and work. What was worth seeing he saw, what was worth knowing he knew.

I first saw Mr. Updike in General Carpenter's office, when he came to see his son Walter, then a student at law. It is as true of most men as it is of most women, that they "have no characters" at all. But General Carpenter had one, and so Mr. Updike was his friend. If there was anything either good or bad in a man, Mr. Updike paid attention to him. The common sort of people who conform to established rules, and in themselves are neither one thing or another, he passed by. If there was sufficient originality about a man to enable him now and then to make a fool of himself, Mr. Updike at once took a fancy to him, and proceeded to point out to all bystanders what he had discovered in his friend. This gave his ordinary conversation a tone of banter which made shallow people call him a trifler. But no man was ever more in earnest. The real triflers are your solemn people, who make no distinctions; to whom all things are equally important; who can not discern absurdity and therefore can neither make nor

enjoy fun.

It was about the time of the suffrage movement that I first saw Mr. Updike. This subject presented itself to different minds in a variety of aspects. Mr. Ames said it was a tempest in a teapot. To Mr. Dorr it was an attempt to apply the Declaration of Independence and democratic principles to the government of the State. To Judge Durfee it furnished occasion for uttering, in his modest way, some of the profoundest political philosophy of the time. To Mr. Updike it was an ordinary electioneering rumpus; a mere question whether the "ins" should go out. The old charter was well enough. More people could vote under it than knew how to vote. That was his view of the matter, and so he laughed at the long procession and the roasted ox, and Mr. Dorr's elaborate speeches, until there was a prospect of a fight, and then his wrath was kindled, and he was what Mr. Whipple said every Rhode Island man should be, - a tiger in his den. To Mr. Updike, more than to any other man, we owe a very good judicial system. His judicial reforms were practical, and consisted mainly in diminishing the number of courts and judges. The old Common Pleas with its twenty-five judges,

judges, fast anchored in the affections of local politicians, drifted and disappeared

on the tide of ridicule raised by Mr. Updike.

He did another good work in pushing through the "Married Woman" act. Here he had to encounter a dead-weight of prejudice, and he overcame it. He labored incessantly in the cause of popular education, and his great and valuable services therein have deserved and received ample acknowledgment. This is a good record. But let us come a little nearer to Mr. Updike, for after all what a man is and not what he does is the main thing. He was first of all an orator. He worked, not by moving masses of capital, for he was not rich, nor by running party machinery, for in this he had no skill, but by direct action on the minds and hearts of men by means of speech. No formal orations, but talk; not in mass meetings, but wherever men and women were gathered together,—at dinner tables, in railroad cars, in taverns, in court-houses, and above all in the General Assembly. It is the fashion now to decry mere speakers, and fools have much to say in praise of practical men. For two generations there was no contest in Rhode Island in which the tongue of Mr. Updike could

be safely counted out.

But how did he speak? Since his death there have been friendly notices of him, and some of them say he was not logical. If that means anything, it means that he was not stupid. I think the popular idea of logic is methodical stupidity, and in this sense, Mr. Updike certainly was not logical. Nor did he make much display of argumentative tools. He reasoned very much as lightning moves. He went right at his mark, and left the result to show the force of the blow. In the dreary work of reporting the proceedings of the General Assembly, it has been my duty to hear many excellent speeches, to listen to which was a discipline and a toil. Listening was a necessity when Mr. Updike was talking. You might agree with him or differ from him, but you must listen to him. It is easy to talk about his sarcasm, his ridicule, and this and that, after the usual manner of those who must say something and don't know what to say. It is not easy to reproduce Mr. Updike as he was; like all living things he dies in the process of analysis. You may retain what he was made of, but you have lost him. He was always in earnest. If he urged a measure, it was because he thought it ought to pass. If he abused a man it was because he thought he ought to be abused. If he raised a laugh against a man in debate, it was with the zeal of a man in the discharge of a religious duty. Perhaps there was never on the whole a more favorable exhibition of his powers than in the discussions on the old State debt. He did not think that the farmers ought to be taxed to pay that debt. I do not know whether it ought to have been paid or not. Having made up his mind to oppose its payment, Mr. Updike did not waste his power in answering the learned and logical and historical arguments in its favor. He went right at the practical purpose of making the members of the General Assembly vote against it. He had to deal with the history of the State, with all the leading men he had known. His blows were all hard, some I doubt not fell on innocent shoulders, but they all told. One

reason that he gave why the scrip was valueless was, that a certain man had given some of it away, which he would not have done if it had been worth anything. Another was that one of the holders had a squeaking voice, which he mimicked till the house was in a roar. These things made many people mad, but they told on the final vote. They were low arts perhaps, but they have been used by Thaddeus Stevens and Benton and Palmerston and Charles James Fox and Demosthenes, and all robust men who have wielded at will popular assemblies. Right or

wrong, they killed the old State debt.

A very good member of the General Assembly once moved to translate all the Latin phrases in the statute, so that the common people could understand them. The exquisite folly of such a measure was by no means obvious to the great body of the Assembly. It was quite as likely to pass as not. A good solid argument against it would probably have carried it through. Mr. Updike took the ground that it was of no advantage to have the people understand the laws. They were not afraid of anything which they understood. It was these Latin words that they were afraid of. "Mr. Speaker, there was a man in South Kingstown about twenty years ago, a perfect nuisance, and nobody knew how to get rid of him. One day he was hoeing corn and he saw the sheriff coming with a paper, and he asked what it was. Now if he had told him it was a writ, what would he have cared? but he told him it was a capias ad satisfaciendum, and the man dropped his hoe and ran, and has not been heard of since." Nor has the proposition to translate the Latin words in the statutes. But such sallies of wit do not give a man any permanent influence. A mere joker is almost as tiresome as a man who never jokes at all. Under all this play of his faculties, Mr. Updike had the solid basis of common sense and thorough earnest work towards practical and worthy ends. And these made him a power in the General Assembly for many years.

Mr. Updike had strong convictions, formed from his own observations more than from reading the thoughts of other men. Mr. Whipple thought and read much about Athens. Mr. Atwell was much exercised about the doings of the Barons of Runnymede. For anything that Mr. Updike cared, the human race might have had its origin in South Kingstown. He gave Roger Williams credit for his doctrine of soul-liberty, but he did not like the man, and had a contempt for what he called his notions of equality. Mr. Updike's idea of a well ordered society, was a strong government, supported by the Episcopal Church, with the different classes of society pretty distinct, and each minding its own business. He loved to study individual character. He knew the exact measure of the men

of families.

He loved to be known as a churchman. But he treated the Church as he did his friends. He cherished her substance and made fun of her shams. Who that ever heard can forget his account of the revival which, as he said, "He and Elder White made in South Kingstown," or his explanation to a friend, who was

he came in contact with. He believed in blood, and loved to explore the history

shocked by a professor who played cards and was a little profane - that "Mr. — was a high churchman." He revered all good men and all sacred things, but no amount of solemnity, nor any vestments of any sort could conceal a humbug from him.

He was as zealous a friend of temperance as Neal Dow, and labored in his way in the General Assembly, and among his neighbors, to cure the evil of intemperance. But he made a distinction between temperance and abstinence, which some

of the friends of this cause did not perceive.

He was a nobleman in personal appearance and in the generous humanity of his nature. In the House of Lords, he would have been among his peers. But he did not need titles nor broad acres. Wherever he sat was the head of the table. He was a gentleman, - scrupulously neat in all his habits, and always considerate of the happiness of those around him. He was seized with the illness from which he never fully recovered, some six years since, on the morning of the day when he had invited some friends to dine with him. He insisted that the dinner should go on, and concealed his condition as well as he could, and only after the company had gone was it known how sick he was. To the last he made his daily toilet as carefully as when a young man, and was only confined to his bed for a day or two, and his mind was unclouded to the end.

But I must pause, though the half has not been said which crowds upon the memory. Dr. Wayland said, speaking of the death of Mr. Webster, "The doors of eternity seemed to stand open, and he walked right in." Such, to his friends,

seemed the close of the long life of Mr. Updike.

On the Island becoming a Province of the Dominion of Canada, the Officers then existing were placed on the Island list en bloc, and those who were reappointed under the new order of things commenced their career anew. Gen. Irving was amongst those who then received commissions in the Canadian Militia, being on July 2, 1875, gazetted second Lieutenant in his old company, then known as Battery No. 2, Prince Edward Island Garrison of Artillery. He was promoted to Lieutenant, January 17, 1879; Captain, September 4, 1880; and Major Commanding, March 31, 1882. On April 1, 1885, he was appointed to a position on the District Staff, as Brigade-Major, Military District No. 12. He

was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, Oct. 7, 1887, and on April 14, 1893, was appointed Deputy-Adjutant-General, Commanding Military District No. 9, Province of Nova Scotia. Gen. Irving was President of the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island for several years.

§ 792. JOHN RHODES GARDINER, 7 (Eunice Haszard, 6; Thomas, 5; Jonathan, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born April 24, 1798. When about twenty years of age, Mr. Gardiner visited his relatives in Rhode Island, many of those whom his father and mother left behind, when they went to Prince Edward Island in 1786, being then still living. There he met his first cousin, Mary Gardiner, whom he married on May 29, 1822. Shortly after his marriage, he returned to his native place, North River, Prince Edward Island. After a residence there of three years, he moved to Bedeque. In 1836, he purchased the Gordon Grove property of three hundred and fifty acres, situated in the same settlement. He then became an extensive and prosperous tiller of the soil and remained on the farm until 1866, when he removed to the town of Summerside. There he lived until his death on the 10th of September, 1874. The Summerside Journal noticed his death as follows: "This week we have to record the death of the Honorable John Rhodes Gardiner, of this Town, whose name is familiar to most of our readers. In the course of his eminently successful and useful career, he occupied some of the most prominent and honorable positions in this colony. He was appointed by the Crown a Legislative Councillor for Prince Edward Island in 1860, a position which he held for three years. In 1864 he was High Sheriff for this (Prince) County and President of the Summerside Bank from 1866 to 1869." He was also Justice of the Peace for the County and a Commissioner of small debts for Bedeque, &c. After his marriage with his first wife, Mr. Gardiner made frequent trips to Rhode Island to visit his relatives and friends. His last visit was made in the summer of 1874.

He married, first, May 29, 1822, Mary Gardiner of Rhode Island. She died at Bedeque, Prince Edward Island, February 15, 1830, aged twenty-six years. He married, second, March 9, 1831, Mary Hooper, daughter of Major Hooper, a Loyalist, from New Jersey, United States. She was born September 18, 1802, at

Bedeque, and died January 25, 1890.

Sarah Louisa Haszard Cundall, was the daughter and grand-daughter of devoted New England loyalists. Brought up in her parents' hospitable home, at the be-

ginning

ginning of the present century, she early learned the details of house-keeping, and was equally at home whether entertaining her guests, or ministering to the necessities of her family in sickness or in health. She was a constant attendant

and firm supporter of S. Paul's Church, Charlottetown.

Mr. Cundall was the son of Robert William Cundall and Penelope Bassett. He was born at Richmond, Surrey, England, on the 6th of March, 1805, and went to Prince Edward Island in 1828. In 1830 he resided among his tenants at Park Corner, New London. He removed to Charlottetown in 1835. In May, 1842, he was appointed High Sheriff for Queen's County, and held the position till May, 1847. He then became Head Master in the Central Academy, the chief educational institution in the Province. In 1856 the Bank of Prince Edward Island was established, and Mr. Cundall was chosen manager. Soon after his arrival in Prince Edward Island he was made Justice of the Peace for Queens County, and continued in that capacity till his death. Of strong religious convictions, he was a prominent and useful member of the Church of England. Religion, as it influenced his actions, was a strong principle, bearing fruit in the noble virtues of a manly life.

#### CHILDREN

1444. HENRY JONES CUNDALL, born at Park Corner, New London, P. E. I., January 13, 1833. In 1835 the family removed to Charlottetown. After a careful education he entered, in 1848, the land office of Messrs. Samuel and Edward Cunard, who at that time owned about two hundred and twenty thousand acres in the Island. In March, 1853, he became Land Surveyor of the Cunard Estates. On February 13, 1854, he received from the Surveyor-General a certificate of competency as a Land Surveyor, and was shortly afterwards sworn in as such. In 1850 he joined the Volunteer Militia and became a member of the "Prince of Wales Company," which, with a company of the 62d Regiment of Her Majesty's Troops, formed the Prince's Guard of Honor, on his arrival in the Island, August 9, 1860. On the following day, at the Levee, Government House, he was presented to His Royal Highness. Having considerable business of his own to attend to, he resigned the position which he had held in Messrs. Cunard's Estate Office since October, 1848, and removed to his own office May 27, 1863. (The Cunard Estates were sold to the Government in 1866.) Having continued in the Volunteer Militia Service, he received, March 26, 1867, from the Commander-in-Chief of the Province, his commission as Captain in the First Queens County Regiment of Militia. From 1871 to 1874 he was largely occupied with the survey of the Prince Edward Island (Government) Railway, and in drawing plans, preliminary to the valuation of the land damages. From May, 1872, to July, 1886, he was Chief Observer at Charlottetown (a reporting telegraph and storm-signal station) in connection with the Meteorological Service of the Dominion of Canada. In the years 1875 and 1876, he was employed

in conducting cases before the Commissioners appointed under the "Land Purchase Act, 1875," to value and purchase the lands of all proprietors holding more than five hundred acres in the Island, and in obtaining the amount of the awards from the Provincial Treasurer. About 1877, an offer of the Commissionership of Public Lands was made to him; this he did not accept. On May 22, 1890, he was appointed, by the Administrator of the Government in Council, a member of the Board of Examiners of Candidates for admission to practise as Land Surveyors for the Province. In March, 1893, he was elected President of the "Telephone Company of Prince Edward Island," and was re-elected in March, 1894. He has sat upon many important arbitrations, in the interests of both Government and individuals. Identified with S. Paul's Church (Church of England) and its Sunday School since his

childhood

childhood, he is now (1893) Church Warden of the former and Superintendent of the latter. He has frequently represented his church in the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia, and in 1892 was elected by the latter body a Delegate to both the Provincial and General Synods of Canada.

Accordingly she left her home in Charlottetown for England, August 18, 1877, and after a few months' residence in London, on December 11, 1877, she was admitted as a Postulant to the Clewer Sisterhood of S. John Baptist. At Whitsuntide, 1878, she entered the novitiate, and finally, on July 21, 1880, she made her profession, taking the vows, and was set apart as a professed or full sister by the Bishop of Oxford. She has served in several of the branch houses in England, and is now (1893) "Sister in charge" of a young women's reformatory, S. Mary's Home, Salisbury, England, which position she has filled for some years.

§ 800. MILLICENT CASTLE HASZARD, 7 (William, 6; Thomas, 5; Jonathan, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born at Bellevue, Prince Edward Island, August 10, 1803. She married, January 18, 1827, William Hodges of Cymbria Lodge, Rustico, Prince Edward Island, formerly of Monmouthshire, England. He was Estate Agent, and gentleman farmer, and for some time High Sheriff for Queens County, Justice of the Peace for the same County, and Commissioner for small debts. He died January 26, 1857, and was buried beside his wife, in the old burying-ground, Malpeque Road, Charlottetown. She died at St. John, New Brunswick, where she went for the benefit of her health, on May 8, 1855, in her fifty-second year. Her remains were brought to the Island by her brother Charles Hazard, and laid to rest in the old burying-ground, Malpeque Road.

She was a gentle Christian woman, and blessed with a cheerful disposition, generous to the poor, and hospitable to all. To do a kindness to any afflicted one was to her a pleasure. Forgetting her own weakness, she frequently went beyond her strength in endeavoring to bring consolation and comfort to others.

After a residence in that country of nearly eighteen years, he returned alone to his native land, arriving November 21, 1876. Broken in health, he lived for some time at his old home, near the Harbor's Mouth, and died there, April 18, 1879. His remains lie in the burying ground of the Episcopal Church, Southport.

- § 803. CHARLES HASZARD, 7 (William, 6; Thomas, 5; Jonathan, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born at Bellevue, Prince Edward Island, February 29, 1812; he died June 4, 1862. At the time of his death he was a member of the Legislative Council (the Upper House) of the Province, and for a quarter of a century previously, had been one of the most active magistrates in Queens County. He was also a Commissioner of small debts, and for a term filled the office of High Sheriff of his County. As one of the leading agriculturists of the County for many years, he took an active part in the affairs of the "Royal Agricultural Society," and was at different times its President and Vice-President. Having a natural aptitude and skill in the management of the sick, and success in curing diseases, he for some years practiced medicine, and his premature death was in some measure attributed to his exposing himself both night and day to the inclemency of the weather. Fewmen have departed this life more generally esteemed and regretted. He resided at Bellevue and died there. He is buried in the churchyard of the Episcopal Church, Southport. He married, November 28, 1843, at Eska, Margaret, daughter of Francis Longworth; she died August 29, 1881. CHILDREN

§ 804. HENRY BOWDOIN HASZARD, 7 (William, 6; Thomas, 5; Jonathan, 4; Thomas, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born at Bellevue, Prince Edward ward Island, December 8, 1813; died November 24, 1872. Mr. Haszard, though fully up to the average stature and weight, was in those respects the least of his four brothers. The others stood over six feet in height, and were broad in proportion. From about the year 1841, he for many years carried on business as a merchant in Charlottetown. He was Justice of the Peace for Queens County, a Commissioner for issuing (Government) Treasury Notes, and was for a time Auditor of Public Accounts of the Province. On April 11, 1859, he was appointed Colonial Secretary of the Island. This appointment was confirmed by the Queen, June 2, 1859. At the time of his death he was Surveyor of Shipping for the Province. He was also a prominent promoter of many of the companies and institutions which came into existence between the years 1847 and 1864.

An active and zealous member of the Church of England, he was for many years the efficient warden of S. Paul's Church. He was very desirous that his native Island should have the advantage of a resident Bishop instead of depending on the occasional visits of the Bishop of Nova Scotia. His sudden death at the comparatively early age of fifty-nine years, prevented the carrying out of his plans, and, as he left no successor sufficiently enthusiastic on the subject, the Bishopric

still remains in abevance.

He did a successful business at St. Eleanors for several years, until the finding of gold in Australia held out to the world its alluring prospects of quickly acquired wealth. He then closed his business, and left the Island, September 9, 1852, joining the bark Aurora at Halifax, Nova Scotia, bound for Melbourne, Australia. On the arrival of the ship at her destination, Mr. Haszard went to the gold-fields; but on December 4, 1853, he returned to Prince Edward Island and resumed business at St. Eleanors, and

engaged to some extent in shipbuilding. He filled the following positions for longer or shorter periods; viz.: - Justice of the Peace for Prince County, and a Commissioner of small debts for St. Eleanors: Captain of the Queen's Rifles (volunteers), St. Eleanors; Director of the Summerside Bank and a churchwarden of S. John's Episcopal Church at St. Eleanors. On the death of his brother Henry Haszard, in 1872, he succeeded him as Surveyor of Shipping for the Province, which office he held at his death, which occurred May 8, 1878. Mr. Haszard married, March 20, 1856, Amelia, daughter of the Hon. P. S. McNutt of Darnley, Prince County. She died at Lynwood, April 6, 1860. He married secondly, Iane Davenport, daughter of the late Nathan Davies, of Charlottetown, February 11, 1869.

At the age of fifteen he became clerk in a mercantile house, where he served faithfully for eleven years, with frequent promotions. In 1835, Mr. Hazard established himself in Maumee, Ohio, and for nine years was identified with its fortunes. He entered at once into business as a forwarding and commission merchant, and was successful in establishing a large connection.

Mr. Hazard was not only prominent as a merchant, but as a projector of local improvement, and a public man of large views. In 1845, his enterprises necessitating the change, he moved to Toledo for superior facilities of transportation, but remained there only a year, finally locating himself at Buffalo, where he still resides (1895). During Mr. Hazard's residence at Maumee City, the conveyance of freight was a matter of great difficulty. Not until the Wabash and Eric Canal opened did the local trade have any direct outlet to the East, and even then, some time elapsed before the shippers were persuaded of the facilities of the new

route

route. The first boat loaded with general merchandise, arriving at Maumee City on the completion of the canal was consigned to Mr. Hazard.

During Mr. Hazard's residence in Buffalo, up to his assumption of the important duties of the Bank of Attica, he was as a merchant and member of trade associations, identified with the commercial interests of the place. As early as 1856, and during the extraordinary period of 1861, '62, '63 and '64, he was President of the Board of Trade. In the organization and support of the celebrated One Hundredth New York, known as the "Board of Trade" Regiment, his activity and earnestness, both in his official position, and as an individual patriot, were most prominent.

In 1870, appreciating the completion and dangerous antagonism of the railroad to the Erie Canal, Mr. Hazard with Alonzo Richmond, Esq., prevailed upon the Canal Board to reduce the rates fifty per cent, and thus initiated the more liberal policy which, it is believed, has saved the commerce of that great water-way to the country.

As a writer, Mr. Hazard is nervous and incisive. His "Report on Cereals," made to the Government as one of the Commissioners to the Paris Exposition of 1867, is an exceptionally thorough investigation of the grain producing capacities of different countries. In addition to the Presidency of the Bank of Attica, Mr. Hazard is officially connected with other local institutions. He is a liberal patron of art culture, and was influential in the establishment of the Buffalo Academy of Fine Arts, being its President the second year of its organization.

Soon after the close of the Civil War, Mr. Hazard feeling his health impaired by his long continued labor in the interests of his petted 100th New York Regiment, combined with his enormous and increasing business, commenced a long and extended tour in Europe, and spent several years abroad. On his return to America he resumed his business relations.

While in Europe he studied carefully the system of weather signals then in use in France, and in 1870 he submitted to the "Board of Trade" a report in behalf of the appointment of a Special Committee, looking to the establishment of a system of meteorological observation, in the interest of lake and seaward navigation.

gation. Mr. Hazard married Sarah, daughter of Rev. Archibald Mercer, of New London, Conn., where she was born, April 24, 1815. She was born and reared a daughter of the Church, and to its faith was given her lifelong adherence, to its holy offices and worship her reverent and constant attention. These made her chief support in hours of trial, and also in later years when bodily weakness and infirmity had shaken "this trembling house of clay." With her, death was indeed but "the sweet closing of an eye," and amid the peace and stillness of that nature which she so loved, she slept, July 5, 1866.

Soon after her marriage she became a recognized Minister in the New England Yearly Meeting of the Society of Friends, and during her subsequent life was regarded as one of the most distinguished preachers in that religious sect. Her labors in behalf of the gospel of peace and good-will were not confined to her immediate surroundings, but her sweet and eloquent voice was heard by thousands throughout the hills and valleys of New England. Her gentle but living words in reproval of sin and wrong doing, moved her hearers without distinction of sect or belief. She fulfilled her mission as perfectly as it is in the power of finite beings to accomplish the full measure of their work.

While making preparations for her last ministering visit to distant Friends, she felt a premonition that this would be her last, and made full preparations for her death and burial, taking, it is said, even her burial clothes with her. The warning of the "inward light" proved a true warning, for she died soon after her ar-

rival in Belgrade, Maine, September 9, 1845, aged sixty-five.

§ 902. WILLIAM PECKHAM, 7 (William Peckham, 6; Mary Hazard, 5; Governor George, 4; Colonel George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born November 11, 1781; he died November 7, 1863. His boyhood was passed at home, where he acquired his limited education; he attended school four months. His parents were prominent members of the Society of Friends, and his early religious instructions were on a line with that simple faith, guided by the "light within." He continued "a birth-right member" of that sect until February 2, 1803, when he married Susannah Stanton. She not being a member of the Society, he forfeited his right of membership; but both he and his wife continued to worship with the Society during their lives.

In early life he took a deep interest in public affairs, and observed closely the political aspect of the times. In 1810 he was elected to the State Senate, and from that time until late in life he held many offices of trust. In 1814, during the last war with Great Britain, Governor William Jones gave him a commission as Captain of the second Company of Infantry, of the town of South Kingstown, and he was called out to defend the old sloop Wampum, which was chased and driven ashore on Matunuck beach by a British cruiser. This duty he performed much

to the annoyance of his good peace-loving Quaker friends.

From 1822, to 1827, he was one of the associate Judges of the Court of Common Pleas

Pleas of Washington County, and from 1835 to 1841, he was Chief Justice of the same County. He was also one of the State Bank Commissioners from 1838 to 1841. In 1828-29-30-31-32, he was Sheriff of Washington County, elected by the Legislature, according to the law at that time. About 1839, he was appointed by the State of Rhode Island one of the Commissioners (his associates being the late Judge Elisha R. Potter of South Kingstown, and Judge George D. Cross of Westerly, together with Moses B. Lockwood of Providence) as surveyors, to meet a like Commission from Connecticut, to survey and adjust the boundary line between the two States, which had been in dispute for a number of years. In 1844, he was elected a member of the State Legislature, and was chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, to which were referred the resolutions passed by that honorable body, in opposition to the annexation of Texas. In 1835, he was appointed by Governor William Hoppin, a commissioner "to superintend the organization of the Richmond Bank."

He was strongly opposed to slavery and believed in the free public discussion of that question; hence his house was the refuge of the most radical abolitionists, and he often defended in public their right to the freedom of speech; sometimes at the risk of personal safety, for in those days to harbor or entertain at one's house an abolitionist, subjected the offender to social ostracism and public indignity, even in liberty-loving New England. But Judge Peckham was strictly a "Law and Order," man; he believed in the peaceful, political attainment of good wholesome laws, and their rigid enforcement by public officials supported

by all good citizens.

He was associated politically with such congenial friends as Nathan F. Dixon, Lemuel H. Arnold, Tristam Burgess, Nehemiah R. Knight, Asher Robbins, James F. Simmons, Henry Y. and Robert B. Cranston, and a number of other men who figured conspicuously in Rhode Island's political history at that time. His association with these men strongly confirmed him in that native sturdiness and independence which was a striking characteristic of the representative men of those days. When the change in the organic law of the State, from the Old Charter, granted by Charles II, in 1663, under which Rhode Island came into the Union as a State, and which she continued to recognize as her fundamental law until 1842, was agitated, he was a strong advocate of the change. He also advocated a more equal apportionment of representatives in the Legislature, and a liberal extension of suffrage. He was once indeed a candidate for Governor on the "Free Suffrage" ticket; but when Thomas W. Dorr and the more radical friends of the movement purposed to resort to forcible means to attain the end desired, he promptly notified Mr. Dorr and his adherents that, "while he recognized the necessity of the change for which they contended, and was ready to resort to all peaceful and lawful means to secure it, he was not ready to take arms against the existing government to redress a wrong which he believed could be accomplished under recognized lawful authority." In pursuance of that resolution, when the Governor called for volunteers to support the state authority he appeared

appeared on Market Square in Providence, with five sons, armed and equipped for that service.

Thus for more than half a century, Judge Peckham was known to the people of Rhode Island; known personally and politically to a very large proportion of the people; and acting in a public capacity nearly all his life; and always upright and honorable amid responsibilities and duties.

Soon after, his father removed to Otsego County. He was early sent to Hartwick Seminary in the same county, and in 1825 entered Union College; he graduated in 1827. Mr. Peckham went to Utica on leaving college, and entered the office of Bronson and Beardsley as a law student. He was admitted to the bar in 1830, and opened a law-office in Albany. He was engaged as counsel in a large portion of the cases tried at the circuit, and having for his competitors such men as Samuel Stevens, Marcus T. Reynolds and Henry G. Wheaton, it is evident that it was no easy task to acquire prominence among them. In 1838, when twenty-nine years of age, he was appointed by Gov. Marcy, District Attorney for the city and county of Albany. The duties of this office, he discharged both faithfully and ably. He continued in the office of District Attorney until 1841, when the office was bestowed by Governor Seward on Henry G. Wheaton. In 1845 he was a candidate before the legislature, which then had the appointment, for Attorney-General of the State. He had a formidable opponent in John Van Buren, and after a sharp contest was beaten by a single vote. In the autumn of 1852, he was returned by the city and county of Albany as representative to the Thirty-third Congress of the United States.

On the expiration of his congressional term he resumed the active practice of his profession at Albany, having previously associated with him, as a partner, Lyman Tremain. In the spring of 1859, with health somewhat impaired, he made

a visit

a visit to Europe. On his return he was immediately nominated and soon after elected a Justice of the Supreme Court, by a decided majority over his very able and popular opponent. He brought to the bench excellent qualities. Well read in the law and familiar with the practice of his profession, he dispatched the business of the circuits with rapidity and ability. But more, and most of all, he brought there an ingrained honesty of purpose, — a determination to mete out, without fear or favor, equal and exact justice to all men. At the close of his first judicial term of eight years, Judge Peckham was re-elected without opposition, no candidate being named against him. Before the close of his second term he was elected a member of the Court of Appeals. Thus, after his first elevation to the bench, his life flowed on in a smooth, unbroken current to its sudden close.

Judge Peckham's true individuality, aside from his intellectual life, was exhibited in the warmth and intensity of his affections, and his genius for making himself beloved by all. His friendships were not only strong and enduring, but they were the genuine outgrowth of a generous nature.'

Judge Peckham was lost with his wife, in the steamer Ville de Havre, on the

21st of November, 1873.

He married, first, Isabella, daughter of the Rev. Dr. Lacey, rector of S. Peter's Church, Albany. She died young, leaving two sons. His second wife, Mary Foote, was with him on the Ville de Havre. They had no children.

§ 044. WILLIAM HENRY HAZARD, M.D., 7 (Doctor George, 6; Carder, 5; Governor George, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in South Kingstown, at Matunuck, in the house owned by his father, Doctor George Hazard. This house is still standing, but with the large ell removed, the great barn being replaced by a modern building, the apothecary's shop, the ice-house and other out-buildings that once gave the place the semblance of a small village rather than a private residence, being also taken down. After a few years spent at home and attendance in the public schools, he was sent to Plainfield, Connecticut, for further and better advantages of education. He then attended lectures in Boston under Doctor Warren and Doctor Webster, both well known and prominent physicians — the latter notorious afterward as the murderer of Dr. Parkman. After finishing this course in Boston, Dr. Hazard entered the office of Dr. Daniel Turner, of Newport, remaining there several years. About 1830, he came back to Wakefield and commenced the practice of medicine, continuing there for over fifty years. His success was owing in part to the fact of his quick intuitions and rapid judgment, and partly it may be to the fact, that he gave very little medicine. In 1853 he was brought into immediate contact with Dr. Okie, a wellknown homeopathic physician of Providence. After a careful study of the principles of homeopathy, he adopted its theory with great success.

When about eighty years of age his eyesight failed, and though still in vigorous health and capable of sustaining easily all the demands made upon the strength of a country physician, he gave up his practice; not without regret, however. He often said that he felt his judgments more sure, and his knowledge greater than

ever before.

In his early manhood Dr. Hazard was an enthusiastic politician, although not seeking office for himself, and never accepting a nomination with but one exception, namely in 1838. Elisha R. Potter of Kingston, being dead, it was supposed

that his place in the General Assembly would fall to his son Elisha R. Potter, Jr., whose party built great hopes upon the prestige of his father's name. It was said that there was but one man in the town that could be successfully opposed to him, and that man was Doctor Hazard, and he was persuaded to accept the nomination, and was elected by a small majority. He was re-elected again in the autumn, for at this time the members of the General Assembly of Rhode Island were elected twice a year, but his increasing practice, which he would not sacrifice, prevented him from accepting a nomination again. This did not prevent him from being a strong factor in his party and a great worker, politically, for his friends. He was also a great worker in his profession. His splendid physique was like well-tempered steel, elastic after his most exhausting days of labor. Dr. Hazard was a most hospitable man, Mrs. Hazard being peculiarly fitted by her experience in her father's house, to aid him in making her own house attractive to all guests. There is no house in the town around which such pleasant memories linger of good cheer, and good company. Doctor Hazard had a keen sense of humor, and his large experience in his profession, which brought him in contact with "all sorts and conditions of men," gave him a fund of amusing stories, of which his own hearty appreciation added much to the enjoyment of the listener. A sketch of Doctor Hazard would be incomplete, if his liberality was not mentioned. When his practice was at its maximum it amounted to ten thousand dollars a year, but perhaps more than one-half of this was given away in charity. He never refused to attend a patient no matter how great the patient's poverty; and not only did he give his attention and medicines, but food and clothing were often added. It was no uncommon sight to see his wagon filled with baskets and boxes for the sick heaped up with the products of his farm, for like a true country physician he was also a farmer, and took much pleasure in his fine herd of Jerseys. In his charities he was ably supported by his friend and kinsman, Rowland Gibson Hazard of Peacedale, whose directions were, "don't let your poor sick patients suffer while I have the means to help them." Doctor Hazard was the true type of the country doctor and country gentleman, for his courtesy came from his native kindness of heart, and from the spirit of "noblesse oblige." He married, March 15, 1840, Louisa, daughter of Governor Lemuel Hastings and Sally (Lyman) Arnold. She came from a line of good old families, and was justly proud of her beautiful grandmother, the daughter of John Wanton of Newport, the "toast" of the officers of the Revolution. They had no children.

She married, June 16, 1847, Reverend James Carpenter; he died February 18, 1881. Her brothers often declared that she had never consciously done a wrong to herself or to others; combined with her gentle manner and soft voice, was a keen sense of humor. The quaint stories, recollections of her old home on her father's farm, and her early married life in the old Willett homestead in Boston Neck, were told with a charming grace and thorough appreciation. Always of a delicate constitution, she was for the greater part of her life a confirmed invalid and "mother's room and invalid chair" became the centre round which clustered every thought of the household, and the devotion of her three daughters. A more united, unselfish household it would be difficult to find. "Thine ease, not mine" was the watchword.

Mr. Carpenter at the early age of fifteen went to Providence, Rhode Island, and entered on a business training, remaining there eleven years. His fine moral sense soon developed into a strong religious faith, under the influence of the Rev. John A. Clark, the devoted rector of Grace Church, and he was confirmed at the age of twenty-five. Entering upon his new responsibilities with the quiet faithfulness which characterized him, he ably assisted Mr. Clark in parish work.

His decision to enter the priesthood was made at a sacrifice of the most promising prospects of success in business life. But one of his singular purity of nature could set but small value upon material gains. He pursued his studies at the General Theological Seminary, New York, from 1838 to 1842, providing for his simple wants by his own industry. He was ordained deacon, 1842, at Gardiner, Maine, by the venerable Bishop Griswold, and was ordained priest by Bishop Henshaw, always one of the truest and warmest of his personal friends. His parochial charges as missionary, were in Providence and Cumberland, and those held by him as rector, in Manville and Wakefield, Rhode Island. His sermons were composed with singular zeal and diligence, were systematic in thought, pointed in style, and deeply devout in spirit. As parish priest he was faithful and gentle in his relations with his people. His ministrations in houses of mourning are still cherished in grateful remembrance; and his watchfulness over the young was touchingly illustrated in the revival of old associations at his funeral.

For

For the last thirteen years of his life, his home was in Wakefield. Here he tolowed the congenial occupation of teaching, greatly enjoying the kindly intercourse with his attached pupils.... He had very lately been employed on a "History of Washington County, Rhode Island," which was included in a "History of the New England States," published in Boston. His last public act was on the occasion of the late presidential election, when rallying his last failing strength for an effort of duty, he went to the polls in the care of a young clerical brother, and leaning on the faithful arm of his young companion, cast his vote for the perpetuating of those principles of freedom and nationality to which he had ever been consistently, though unobtrusively devoted. It was evidently at this time that he received some intimation that it was in vain to expect a return of health, for he spoke to his friend in terms similar to those which he afterwards used in his family, to the effect that God's time was the rightful one; and that to have lived as long as He ordained was long enough to satisfy a submissive spirit. There was a touching gentleness of resignation in the greatness of soul thus unconsciously manifested by one who cherished an innocent love of life, and always found something to enjoy, something for which to give thanks, even under hard conditions.

"The Reverend James Helme Carpenter passed to his rest by slow and sensible degrees, and, after a protracted and wearisome illness, meekly and submissively rendered back his spirit to the God who gave him life. He was a man without guile, transparent and simple as a child, always accepting his lot as the ordering of One who knew what was the discipline which he most needed. Mr. Carpenter was a studious and thoughtful man. He did the work that was given him to do, thoroughly and to his best ability; and when his public career was over, he continued to benefit those around him by his pure and unspotted life, and absolute

resignation to the will of God." 2

Esther Bernon Carpenter, the first child that came to bless the parents' home with her presence, was rarely gifted by nature, and highly cultivated by her ardent love for study. She was educated in her father's house, passing a few years only at S. Mary's Hall, in New Jersey. Few children, however, have had the careful training and instruction that she received from her father; at eleven years of age she was reading with him, Shakespeare's plays, enjoying and possibly appreciating them more than many older persons. Leaving school did not mean, for her, giving up study, but on the contrary, a continuance and constant advancement. She was fond of the study of languages, and had a good working knowledge of Latin, German, French and Spanish. With the exception of Latin, which she studied at school and under her father, she was almost entirely self-taught. Her reading was, like her memory, marvellous, and she was thoroughly well informed on all intellectual subjects, and was rarely at fault in a quotation

from the classics or modern poets. For many years she was a contributor to historical papers, newspapers and periodicals, and she published a number of her short stories in a little volume called *South County Neighbors*. Many of these stories embodied the old traditions and quaint recollections of her mother. She died at Wakefield, October 22, 1893, and a tablet to her memory is placed in the Hazard Memorial Hall at Peacedale.

OLIVER HAZARD PERRY, 7 (Christopher Raymond, 6; Mercy Hazard, 5; Oliver, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in the village of Rocky Brook, South Kingstown, August 23, 1785; he died August 23, 1819. He entered the United States Navy as midshipman, April 7, 1799; cruised with his father, a naval officer, in the West Indies, 1799–1800; was engaged in the war against Tripoli 1804–5; became lieutenant, January 15, 1807, and at the outbreak of the War of 1812 was in command of a flotilla of gunboats on the Atlantic coast, when in February, 1813, he was transferred at his own request to serve under Commodore Isaac Chauncey on Lake Ontario.

He took an active part in the attack upon Fort George; was appointed to fit out a squadron upon Lake Erie, which he successfully accomplished at Presque

Isle (now Erie), Pennsylvania; and having equipped nine small vessels, attacked and captured the British fleet near Put-in-Bay, Ohio, Sept. 10, 1813. This action, known as the "battle of Lake Erie," or more commonly as "Perry's Victory, obtained him an immense popularity, partly attributable to the manner in which it was announced by the famous dispatch, "We have met the enemy and they are ours." Congress rewarded him with a vote of thanks, a medal, and the rank of captain. Perry co-operated with Gen. Harrison in his operations at Detroit and at the battle of the Thames, October 5, 1813, and in the following year was employed upon the Potomac and in the defense of Baltimore. He commanded the Java in Decatur's squadron in the Mediterranean, in 1815; was sent to the Spanish Main in command of a squadron, June, 1819; ascended the Orinoco to Angostura in July; was seized with yellow fever, and died at Port Spain, on the island of Trinidad, the day of his arrival there, August 23, 1819. His remains were removed to Newport in a ship of war, by order of Congress, and buried in the cemetery of that city, December 4, 1826, where an imposing obelisk was erected by the State of Rhode Island. In September, 1860, a marble statue of Commodore Perry was erected at Cleveland, Ohio, and on September 10, 1885, a fine bronze statue was unveiled at Newport, Rhode Island.

He married, May 5, 1811, Elizabeth Champlin Mason. There are no descendants in the male line from Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry living to-day.

§ 981. MATHEW CALBRAITH PERRY, 7 (Christopher Raymond, 6; Mercy Hazard, 5; Oliver, 4; George, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in Newport, Rhode Island, April 10, 1794; he died March 4, 1858. He entered the Navy, 1800; was made lieutenant in 1813. In 1819, while cruising, he settled the question of the location of the first occupation of Liberia. In 1821-24, in command of the schooner Shark, he captured several pirates near the West India Islands. In 1833, after a three years' cruise in the Mediterranean, he became the superintendent of a school for gun practice in the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and superintended the application of steam to war vessels. In 1837 he was made captain, and in 1838 went abroad to visit the dock-yards, and inspect the danger signals on the coasts. In 1839-41 he was commandant at the Brooklyn navyyard, afterwards of the African squadron and the Gulf squadron, and gallantly co-operated with the land forces at the battle of Vera Cruz. In 1852-54 he went on an expedition to Japan. He was one of the first public men in this country who looked for the peaceful opening of Japan, and long before he was appointed to command the fleet, March 1852, he had carefully studied the land, the people, and the problem from every side. He arrived off Uraga in the bay of Yeddo, July 7, 1853, and after leaving letters for the Tycoon, sailed away July 17, and returned in February, 1854. On March 8, the formal articles of convention between the United States and Japan were exchanged at Yokohama, on the spot now occupied by the Union Christian Church. Perry's one mistake was in not treating with the true sovereign, the Mikado, from Osaka, instead of with his lieutenant, the Tycoon. Commodore Perry was a cultivated scholar and the Narrative of the Expedition of an American Squadron to the China Seas and Japan, though nominally edited by Dr. Francis L. Hawks, is, in the main, an exact reprint of Perry's diary and autograph narrative. He died in New York.

A superb bronze statue of Commodore M. C. Perry, with four bas-reliefs in bronze illustrating scenes in his public life, by J. Q. A. Ward, stands in Truro Park, Newport, Rhode Island, erected by his son-in-law, August Belmont, of

New York.



His father died when he was but seven years of age, leaving his mother with six small children. Her means for the support of the helpless little family were not large, as a relative had taken advantage of her unprotected condition to defraud her of the patrimony left to her by her grandfather, James Perry. She herself taught school for a time, to help feed her little brood, and her sons were taught serviceable trades. Jonathan, her third son, learned the carpenter's trade. About 1820 he commenced commenced manufacturing coarse woolen goods, in company with Isaac Peace Hazard, at a place called Brushy Brook, in the western part of the town. This enterprise was very successful for a few years. Mr. Hazard then moved to Rocky Brook, and operated Thomas R. Hazard's mills, in that place; here he was successful. Thomas R. Hazard was enabled to retire from business a few years afterwards, with what was at that time considered a fortune.

Jonathan Hazard then bought one of the mills on his own account, which he run until about 1837, when he gave up the manufacturing business; and after one year spent in Newport, he bought one-half of a property in Narragansett Pier. At this time he ran a line of sloops to Providence, Newport and New York. The sloop Wasbington made three trips a week to Providence and Newport; the Point Judith and Pettasquamscutt sailed one each week to New York. These sloops were built and launched at the "Pier," near where the Casino now stands, and were

built by Captain John Saunders.

Mr. Hazard was an exceedingly quick-tempered, but also an exceedingly kind-hearted and sympathetic man. While scolding a miserable drunkard for his improvidence and neglect of his family, he would at the same time busy himself in filling a basket with provisions, and to the last denunciatory word he would add, "Come for more when that is gone." He truly understood the meaning of the word "neighbor." On one occasion, seeing a heavy thunder-storm coming up, and also seeing his neighbor's hay, that was well cured and ready for the barn in danger of injury, and knowing his friend was away from home, Mr. Hazard called some men from his mill, and, taking his teams, went to the field and gathered the hay into the barn. When thanked for this kind deed, he said, "There is nothing to thank me for; am I not thy neighbor?" His wife was a member of the Society of Friends, and thus his changing fortunes did not prevent his children from being all well educated in the Friends' School in Providence.

One who was permitted to know him during the last few years of his life only, says — "His whole appearance was impressive, and stamped upon one's memory an undying picture. As he came into the room where I was sitting, I could but think of one of the old patriarchs. His silvery white hair was worn rather long, as though it was a sin to cut away so much beauty, and his soft white beard, also worn quite long, was as beautiful as his hair. His manner was gentle and courteous, and evidenced the true gentleman, not of the "old school" alone, but of the school that is always old, and always new. He had a keen sense of the humorous, and at dinner entertained his guests with many bright anecdotes; his quiet laugh was infectious. In knowing Mrs. Hazard, one could not be surprised at the long continued affection between them and the mutual confidence in, and appreciation of each other. She was a tiny woman, as upright in her carriage as in her character, and although approaching her four-score years, seemed scarcely three-score, so well preserved was she, not only in her personal appearance, but also in her activity—she tripped about the room as lightly as a girl. Mrs. Hazard was of Huguenot descent, and retained, in a measure, the bright spirit of the old French ancestors. In the house were many valuable relics that were brought from France; beautiful pieces of cut glass and china, rare and old, and several statuettes, all in fine preservation. Mr. Hazard had reproduced the statuettes in beautifully carved rosewood.

He had a great love for, and pride in, his ancestry, and had made a valuable and exhaustive collection of family records of his descent from Deputy Governor Robert, and Doctor Robert Hazard. It is from these records that the material has been taken which makes these two lines possibly the most perfect of this book.



§ 1073. AUGUSTUS GEORGE HAZARD, 7 (Thomas, 6; Stephen, 5; Thomas, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in South Kingstown, April 28, 1802; he died May 7, 1868. His father, Thomas S. Hazard, was a sea-captain, the memory of whose bold and manly character is still treasured on the south shore of Rhode Island; his mother, Silence Hazard, is remembered for strong and generous qualities which marked her among women, and reappeared in her youngest and last surviving of eight children. The family removed in 1808 to Columbia, Connecticut, and the son remained there on the farm until he was fifteen years old.

In 1827, Colonel Hazard, after some adventures in the South, at the age of twenty-five removed to New York and there began the establishment of a commission house; became, by agency and proprietorship, connected with the line of packets sailing between that city and Savannah, a large receiver of southern produce, and the resident purchaser for his own and other commercial houses at the South. Successfully engaged in this large and profitable business, he was overtaken by the unprecedented financial crash of 1837. He passed through that

memorable

memorable epoch not without serious loss, but paying every dollar of indebtedness, principal and interest; with credit not only exempt from harm, but strengthened by the firmness of his integrity, and the gallantry of his conduct.

Colonel Hazard became interested in the manufacture of gunpowder, a business which he subsequently pursued with remarkable results. His exertions in this field of enterprise culminated, in 1843, in his organizing the Hazard Powder Company, a corporation which has become known in all parts of the United States. In 1845, realizing the importance of personal residence in the vicinity of his establishment, he removed to Enfield, Connecticut, where he resided the remainder of his life.

Under his charge and direction the manufactory rose to great proportions. A mill in the town of Canton, another in East Hartford, and a third at Scitico, have been only aids and adjuncts to the main works lying in the secluded and beautiful valley of Fair Lawn, in Enfield: the last mentioned extending along the Scantic River, more than a mile in length, and covering an area of five hundred acres; employing a succession of waterfalls, a motive power of thirty waterwheels and four steam-engines, and a variety of machinery whose magnitude is shown by thirty-six cast-iron rollers of eight tons each, separated but acting in unison. Coming to Enfield with a resolute purpose to excel in his sphere of production, he elevated the reputation of his manufacture to a point not surpassed in this or other countries, as acknowledged especially in the calls for higher grades of powder coming from individuals and governments, of Great Britain as well as of the United States. As an illustration of the great power and unerring exactness which this enterprise attained under his direction, in a single instance during the Crimean war, these works promised to the English Government, at short notice, ten thousand barrels of rifle and cannon powder, every pound of which was approved and accepted by the British Board of Ordnance. Colonel Hazard died May 7, 1868. Cordial were the expressions, both far and near, from individuals and the public press, betokening the general sense of loss. Many thousands, comprising persons from all walks of life, assembled at the funeral. In all the long-drawn valley of the Connecticut, studded with the homes of the cultured and the good, rarely has a man passed away whose death has been so keenly felt, and so widely mourned.

Colonel Hazard married in 1822, Salome Merrill, of West Hartford, Connecticut. She was born September 12, 1802, and died November 16, 1880. Mrs. Hazard was a worthy helpmeet to her husband. She was a woman of strong common sense and correct judgment, and was of a most charitable disposition, full of kindly thought for all about her. Her influence was improving, elevating, and inspiring, and her daily example was a blessed heritage to her children.



Both in personal appearance and in character he was said to resemble his great-grandfather, Samuel Rodman, while he inherited from his mother a strain of the Hazard blood, and with it the will and energy necessary to success. He was born in the house that his great-uncle, William Rodman, built, and in the great west chamber that had been made historic as being also the birthplace of Oliver Hazard Perry, the hero of Lake Erie.

About 1830 he leased the Peacedale mills from Isaac Hazard, and began manufacturing; and in 1835, with Attmore Robinson, he bought the tract of land with the wharf at Narragansett Pier, since called the "Old Pier," where a breakwater was afterwards built. Its builders, like those, as it is said, of the second Eddystone lighthouse, defied Almighty God to overthrow the work; but it was partly destroyed in the first great storm after its completion. During the progress of the work on the breakwater, an accomplished French engineer, on examining it, said that it was built on a wrong principle, and that the dock would fill with sand. Time has proved the truth of this prediction, for children now play on the sands where was once from fifteen to twenty feet of water.

In 1838, Samuel Rodman sold his rights in the "Pier" property, and bought of Thomas R. Hazard "one hundred and twenty-five or thirty" acres in the village of Rocky Brook; and in the same year he built the homestead, where seven of his children were born. There were on the property at the time four small houses, and a small mill containing one or two sets of machinery. In this mill he began the manufacture of woolen goods. During the following year (1839) he bought thirty acres, on a part of which stood the old Rodman mansion-house, and a woolen mill. In 1853 he bought thirty acres more with several houses and a woolen mill and about the same time he added to his own farm the Freeman

Watson farm adjoining it. This farm once belonged to his great-uncle, William Rodman, who in the last century had built the house already mentioned as the one in which Samuel Rodman was born. The small mills on the Rocky Brook estate Mr. Rodman soon replaced by substantial stone buildings, taking all the stone that he used from his own meadows, which were well named "Rocky." His success as a manufacturer was uninterrupted until the war of 1862, and he became one of the richest mill-owners in the State, owning, in addition to the Rocky Brook property, mills in Wakefield and in Newport.

Mr. Rodman represented his town several times in the General Assembly. In 1854, when a nomination was equivalent to an election, he was asked to take the nomination for lieutenant-governor, but he declined it. He was never defeated, with the exception of once, in any election for which he stood as candidate. In 1841 he entered enthusiastically upon the total abstinence reform, and its measure of success in his own and the neighboring villages was largely attributable to his zeal.

For over forty years Samuel Rodman was a member of the Baptist Church, and an honor to his communion. He contributed largely toward the building of the new Baptist house of worship in Wakefield in 1852, and was one of its chief benefactors. He aided, by liberal contributions, in the building of no less than twenty-six other churches; nor did he confine his benevolence to his own denomination.

His character was of great natural energy, yet there were no hard lines in it. He had a certain gentleness of manner, combined with decision, which made him greatly beloved and trusted by all who came in contact with him, especially by his employees, who, during his last illness, came to the house in numbers, begging to be allowed the privilege of watching through the nights with him. No "strike" was ever thought of in his mills. The relations between them were those of mutual confidence. He perceived that the truest method of elevating the laborer was to make him independent, and to this end, by the sale of lands to them at nominal prices, he encouraged his laborers to become landowners.

A friend writing to his widow after his death, said, "Mr. Rodman was the most generous man I ever knew, and I have reason to know how generous. He conferred a favor in such a way that the recipient might well question whether he had received or conferred the obligation."

Samuel Rodman married Mary, daughter of Benjamin and Abigail (Oatley) Peckham, who was a descendant of Deputy-Governor George Hazard. She was the mother of all his children. The influence of her character and teaching was seen clearly in her eldest son, General Isaac Peace Rodman. To her husband she was truly a helpmeet, not only in forming the character of the older children, who came especially under her influence, but as a wise and faithful counsellor in all his business relations. He took no important step without her advice. She was born September 25, 1803, and died February 16, 1853; married July 15, 1821. He married, second, February 15, 1854, Mary Anstis, daughter of Wilkins Updike, Esq., of South Kingstown, also a descendant of the Hazard family.

He was happy in his domestic life, and devoted to his family, for whom he toiled industriously early and late, and for whom his self-sacrificing affection was boundless. Deeply religious, he rested securely in an unswerving, child-like confidence in his Heavenly Father.

He was possessed of a wonderfully retentive memory for subjects which interested him, and he could quote from his favorite books with unerring facility. On matters of personal family history he was very entertaining, and his style of presenting facts carried interest, conviction of the truth and reliability. He was a man universally respected by his fellow-townsmen of Newport, who listened with interest, even when they could not agree with his opinions; for his presentation of a case was clear, persistent and emphatic. In personal appearance he was tall, dignified and impressive, with square, forcible chin, prominent nose, firm mouth and high forehead. Even at eighty years his step was strong and elastic, his form straight and unyielding to the weight of years, his eyesight undimmed, his hearing distinct and unimpaired, his voice strong and clear as that of a young man.

He graduated in 1849, ranking in the first third of the class. In the department of mathematics he gained the first prize for three years, and a second prize the fourth year. He also took the philosophical prize for the best essay in that department.

He has always been active in village and town affairs. In 1854 he organized a Sunday school in the schoolhouse. February 13, 1857, in response to his invitation, thirteen people met at his house, and the Second Congregational Church of South Kingstown was organized. In 1872 he built the present stone church, drawing the plans himself. The large worsted mill was built after his plans in 1872. The weaving shed at a later date, and the picturesque stone bridges about Peacedale are all of his building. One bridge of a single stone arch, with a span of forty feet, is said to be the largest single arch in the State. He was largely instrumental in establishing the Narragansett Library in 1855, and in the organization of the High School—giving the land for the building, and assisting in its maintenance. In the improvement of the village and town he has had an active part. After much study of the distribution of profits and the question of the relation of capital and labor, and after personal inspection of the co-operative establishment of Rochdale, England, and elsewhere, he introduced the system of profit sharing into the Peacedale mills.

Mr. Hazard has always been interested in agriculture and the improvement of breeds of cattle, and is the president of the Washington County Agricultural Society, to which office he was elected at the organization of the society in 1876. Mr. Hazard served the town of South Kingstown as moderator for several years, and the State Legislature as representative in 1863, and as senator in 1867 and 1868. He was the independent candidate for governor in 1875, receiving the plurality of votes, but failed of an election in the Legislature.

Mr. Hazard has been interested in the production of lead, and took charge of Mine La Motte, Missouri, in 1875. His active mind has naturally been awake to all new forms of industry. In 1881 he took steps to introduce the manufacture of soda-ash into this country. Previously nearly the whole supply had been imported. He was instrumental in organizing the Solvay Process Company, of Syracuse, New York, and became its president. The first soda-ash made by the ammonia process in America was produced by this company, January, 1884: Mr. Hazard's large experience and practical wisdom have greatly aided the industry. He married, March 29, 1854, Margaret Ann Rood, of Philadelphia, daughter of Reverend Anson Rood; she died August, 1895.

He was thus among the pioneers of the great warehouse system of that city. A few years later, with William Beard, he became interested in the water front in South Brooklyn, and began the work of planning and constructing the great Erie basin, and the adjoining basins, building piers and warehouses, until at this time there is a wharfage and dockage of several miles where vessels are loaded and unloaded. It is the largest and most comprehensive dock system in the world. Mr. Robinson was ever watchful of the rights of laboring men, and in his business projects much care was taken to pay each laborer liberally for extra service, the result being great faithfulness to the interest of their employer. Mr. Robinson was one of the prominent supporters of the great East River Bridge enterprise, and as a bridge trustee gave intelligent attention to all the details of its progress and management. He honorably filled the position of president of the board of trustees through the most trying period of the work. Successful for himself, kind, helpful, generous to the poor, and useful in the community, his death was universally regretted. His father was a large landholder and merchant, the largest in the town at the time of his death, owning thirteen large farms. At an early age his son was often sent to New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore with cargoes of wool, butter and cheese, returning with dry goods and groceries. He was subjected to the caprice of wind and waves in sailing crafts, often meeting with delays that were dangerous and trying, but sometimes amusing. At the age of twenty-one, he married and settled on a farm in the village of Wakefield. This farm had a frontage of nearly two miles on the post-road, and two-thirds of the large and now flourishing village of Wakefield has grown up on this land.

Mr. Watson was ever ready with his influence and money to promote improvements in his native town. He was interested in education, and gave land for school-houses in Wakefield and the adjoining villages, as well as land for churches of different denominations. He was chosen by the Whig and afterwards by the Republican parties to represent them in the Legislature, both as senator and representative. He purchased several large farms besides those given to him by his father. He owned a farm at Narragansett Pier; and foreseeing the future of the village as a watering-place, he divided it into streets, planted trees, and thus gave to this well-known watering-place its first start. He was interested in the Narragansett Pier Railroad, working with zeal for its completion.

Mr. Watson married, first, December 20, 1829, Susan, daughter of John and Mary Watson; she died May 7, 1834, in her twenty-eighth year. Generous, sympathetic and kind, her hand never wearied in well doing, scattering its bounties into the homes of the poor, and uplifting the fallen. For the last few years of her life she was an invalid, and was obliged to retire from society, but she never allowed her suffering to interfere with her charities. Her love and affection for her children and grandchildren seemed to increase as she neared the close of her life, and was never greater than when "her life, so true, devoted,

patient and loving, closed in peace.

She married, August 29, 1844, Alexander Hamilton Bullock. "He was born in Royalston, Worcester County, Massachusetts, March 2, 1816. He was fitted for college in his native town, and at Leicester Academy. He entered Amherst College in 1832, and graduated in 1836, the second scholar in his class, delivering the salutatory oration at Commencement. After graduating, Mr. Bullock taught school at Royalston, and at Kingston, Rhode Island. He then studied law at Harvard Law School, under Story and Greenleaf. Leaving the law school in 1840, he spent a year in the office of Emory Washburn, at Worcester, and was admitted to the bar in 1841. He soon established a large business as agent of important insurance companies, and withdrew himself altogether from the practice of law. . . March 1, 1842, Mr. Bullock became editor of the National Ægis, a weekly Whig newspaper, published in Worcester. He retained this connection several years. Mr. Bullock represented Worcester in the Massachusetts House of Representatives in 1845, 1847, and 1848, and in the Senate in 1849. He spoke infrequently, and only on important questions, and with careful preparation. His eulogy on John Quincy Adams, in 1848, was especially impressive. . . . He was Mayor of Worcester in 1859. His term of office was rendered memorable in the history of the City Library, of whose board of trustees he was the first president. ... He was appointed Commissioner of Insolvency for the County of Worcester by Governor Clifford in 1853. The jurisdiction of these officers was transferred to the Court of Insolvency by statute of 1856. Mr. Bullock was appointed Judge of that court, for the County of Worcester, in June, 1856, and held the office until 1858. . . . Mr. Bullock was re-elected to the House of Representatives in the fall of 1861. When the Legislature organized in January, 1862, he was elected Speaker, receiving every vote cast. . . . He was elected Speaker again in January, 1863, receiving every vote cast except three for Caleb Cushing. In 1865 Mr. Bullock was elected Governor of the State of Massachusetts, and from that time until his death, on the seventeenth day of January, 1882, he was more or less actively engaged in public service. Hon. George F. Hoar, in closing the account of Mr. Bullock's life, adds: "Mr. Bullock's refined and delicate nature found, as his life advanced, its most congenial atmosphere within the walls of his home, and led him to shrink more and more from the rough strifes of politics. He delighted in days spent in literary pursuits in his library, and in evenings of hospitable welcome to neighbors, friends and strangers. His strong domestic affections found most abundant satisfaction in his own family circle, where

where, says a near neighbor and intimate friend, 'his home life diffused all around it an influence and charm, and, by its high example, elevated the standard of the

domestic and moral life of a whole community.'

"He was stainless, wise, patriotic, fit to be trusted with the administration of great interests, public or private. He was a lover of scholarship. He had the ear of the people during a time of great peril and trial. He never gave it dishonorable counsel, or uttered a word which would debase or degrade it."

Ephraim Ward Bond was born in West Brookfield in 1821. Five years later his father moved to Springfield, and his whole life was practically identified with that place. He entered Amherst College, and graduated at the age of twenty with honours. After leaving Amherst he took a year's course at Yale, and then entered the Harvard Law School, from which he graduated in 1844. In 1845, he began the practice of law in Springfield. Six years later he formed a partnership with the late E. D. Beach, which continued up to 1864, and the firm of Beach and Bond was well known not only in Springfield but throughout the State. Mr. Bond at his death was president of the Springfield Five Cents Savings Bank and the Springfield City Library, and a director of the Pynchon National Bank. He had served as selectman, before Springfield became a city; was largely instrumental in securing a city charter; was subsequently councilman and alderman, and for one term was a member of the Massachusetts House of Representatives.

This in brief, is the record of Mr. Bond's life, but his character and ability have extended in influence for good beyond this bare recitation of facts. He had con-

tributed generously to the charitable and benevolent institutions of the city. Mr. Bond was greatly interested in the Springfield Library, being one of its incorporators and a director from its organization in 1864; also vice-president until 1880, when he was elected president. He gave largely to it. He died Saturday, December 5, 1891.



Mr. Allen was born in 1827, and began his search for fortune when about eighteen, in a subordinate position on a railroad. After several smaller inventions, one of which was a carwheel oil-box, now in practical use, he, after many years of study and experiments, perfected the paper car-wheel, with a steel tire. When he made his first set of wheels, in 1869, it was with difficulty that he got the use of a wood-car for six months to test his invention. The Pullman Palace Car Company gave him his first order, in 1871, and a few months later the Allen Car Wheel Company made seventeen thousand such wheels in one year. Almost the last act of Mr. Allen's life was to sign the papers applying for a patent for a noiseless wheel on electric motors, which is the last in a series of notable inventions which have made the railroads and traveling public indebted to him for safety and comfort. He was the first to invent the steel tire for the car-wheel, and spent several years in Krupp's works in Germany perfecting the model. He had recently devoted himself to improving paper wheels for street-car service, and had a patent on a model, recently introduced, in use, beside the invention completed before his death. In personal appearance Mr. Allen was singularly like James A. Garfield, late President of the United States. He died suddenly, in Cleveland, Ohio, October 7th, 1892.

§ 1952. ISAAC PEACE RODMAN, 8 (Samuel Rodman, 7; Elizabeth Hazard, 6; Stephen, 5; Thomas, 4; Stephen, 3; Robert, 2; Thomas, 1), was born in South Kingstown, Rhode Island, August 18, 1822. He was educated in the public schools of his native town, but early entered the manufacturing business with his father. He had a passionate love for books, combined with a remarkable memory. His leisure hours were for years devoted to study, and thus he was enabled to take his place amongst men of a more liberal education on an equal footing.

After a few years of initiatory labor in his father's mills, he, together with his brother, Rowland G. Rodman, entered into partnership with their father, under

the name of S. Rodman and Sons.

He was for several years President of the Town Council of South Kingstown, and was a Representative for several terms in the General Assembly of Rhode

Island, and also in the Senate of the State.

When President Lincoln called for seventy-five thousand men, at the commencement of the Civil War, he was among the first to respond to the call. He raised a military company composed of his fellow-townsmen for the Second Rhode Island Regiment of Volunteers, and was appointed by Governor Sprague its captain. For his gallant conduct at the battle of Bull Run, Governor Sprague, when the Fourth Rhode Island Regiment was mustered into service, appointed him lieutenant-colonel, and soon after colonel. He distinguished himself by his gallant conduct in the battle of Roanoke, February 8, 1862, and at Newbern, March 15th, 1862. Abbott, in his History of the Civil War, said, in speaking of this battle: "The charge by Colonel Rodman, leading the Fourth Rhode Island Regiment, was one of the most heroic deeds of the day." This gallant charge won a brigadier-general's commission for Colonel Rodman. Yet he always insisted that his regiment deserved more credit for their conduct at the battle of Roanoke Island, in which they took a conspicuous part, than at the battle of Newbern. It was about this time that Mr. Robert Hale Ives, of Providence, asked Governor Sprague to give his son Robert a place on General Rodman's staff. "Do you know what you are asking for?" said the governor; "he is your only son, and to give him this position means certain death, for General Rodman is the bravest man I ever knew, and will lead your son into the very midst of danger. Let me place him on General Burnside's staff, where he will be in comparative safety." Mr. Ives said that his son would take no other position than on General Rodman's staff; and so the brave young man met death, with his brave leader, on the field of Antietam.

After

After the capture of Fort Macon, April 17, 1862, General Rodman contracted typhoid fever, and was obliged to return home, "broken in health, but crowned

with the honors he had won."

He remained at home but a few weeks; before his furlough was ended or his health re-established, General Burnside wrote to him, saying that the army was on the eve of a great battle, urging him to return if possible, as there was great need for commanding officers; and, against the remonstrance of his physician, he hastened back.

At the battle of Antietam, September 17, 1862, he commanded the Third Division of the Ninth Army Corps, and fell, mortally wounded, while leading his division to the charge. "Though feeble in health, and exhausted from five days and nights of arduous service, he kept in the saddle from early dawn till sunset, when he fell, pierced with a minie ball through his left breast. Surgical aid and efforts of friends were unavailing to save his life; his system was exhausted. His patience in suffering was equal to his courage on the battle-field. He died as he lived, a Christian soldier. His physician, who had witnessed many death-bed scenes, said that for calm, conscious, peaceful resignation, he never witnessed its equal. From the time he left home in the spring of 1861 to the hour of his fall, his Bible was his daily companion, and was daily read by him. It was found in his bosom, clotted with his blood." '

Abbott, in closing a notice of General Rodman, says: "At Antietam, while at the head of his division, and performing the part of major-general, a bullet pierced his breast, and he was carried to a house in the rear. There, after a lapse of thirteen days, he died. His remains were buried at his native place, South Kingstown, with the highest honors. He was mourned as one of the purest and best of

men."2

The State of Rhode Island brought back his remains amid demonstrations of mourning, and laid them in state in the Hall of Representatives. His funeral was conducted by the State. The State has also placed his portrait in the Memo-

rial Hall of Brown University, at Providence.

Senator Henry B. Anthony, in a funeral oration, said of him: "Here lies the true type of the patriot soldier. Born and educated to peaceful pursuits, with no thirst for military distinction, with little taste or predilection for military life, he answered the earliest call of his country, and drew his sword in her defense. Entering the service in a subordinate capacity, he rose by merit alone to the high rank in which he fell; and when the fatal shot struck him, the captain of one year ago was in command of a division. His rapid promotion was influenced by no solicitations of his own. He never joined the crowd that thronged the avenues of preferment. Patient, laborious, courageous, wholly devoted to his duties, he filled each place so well that his advancement to the next was a matter of course, and the promotion, which he did not seek, sought him. "He was of the best type of the American citizen; of thorough business training, of high integrity, with an abiding sense of the justice due to all, and influenced by deep religious convictions. In his native village he was by common consent the arbiter of differences, the counsellor and friend of all."

He was buried in the family burying-ground, at South Kingstown, on the fifth of October, 1862.

He married, June 17, 1847, Sally, daughter of Governor Lemuel Hastings and Sally (Lyman) Arnold.

Louisa Rodman was born in the first quarter of the century. Then a village school was as much a place of amusement as study, so that her opportunities for an education were limited; but so great was her love for study and books that she rose above her environment. There were no public libraries in the town until long after her day, but there was hardly a house in the neighborhood which contained a book that she had not read. She was wonderfully well informed upon many subjects; the classics were especially familiar to her.

She was a woman of fascinating personality. Her wit was so pungent and sparkling that it was contagious, and brought out the best there was in her friends; and one left her presence feeling that he himself had been particularly clever. Her quickness at repartee was unsurpassed, and woe to the poor wight who attempted to crush her with sarcasm. He was annihilated in the answering flood with which he was assailed, although most kind and gentle in general, especially to an inferior. This wit was an inheritance from her Rodman ancestors. It was said that old John Rodman, of Barbadoes, before he left his native Ireland, in 1655, had kissed the "Blarney stone," and the wit for which he asked had flowed down the advancing years, to break out here and there in some favored descendants, especially the women. A lady once returned a book that her daughter had borrowed, with the remark, "My daughter is a regular book-worm." Louisa, looking at the soiled, dilapidated book with a regretful glance, said, "That accounts for the condition in which the books I lend to her are returned; she leaves her trace on every page."

She was so bright and full of life, and seemed to love life so dearly, that one was

surprised at her remark, often repeated, that she wished to die young. When asked what she called young, the answer came, "Twenty-eight," and she added, "then every one will regret me." Her wish was granted, for she was twenty-eight in March, 1854, and died in May, 1854. She married, October 4, 1849, Colonel Daniel Chase Hiscox.

At the beginning of the war he was engaged in the manufacturing business, in company with his father and brother, under the name of "S. Rodman and Sons." When the President made his second call for volunteers during the Civil War, Mr. Rodman, following the example of his elder brother, raised a company of men, mostly from his native town. He was appointed by the governor, captain of the company. His first battle was one of the most fearful of the war, and it was his last. Abbott, in writing of this battle of Fredericksburg, says, "Eleven hundred and twenty-eight brave men were dead; nine thousand and five writhing under tortures of wounds; and two thousand and seventy-eight men missing, of whom probably many should have been reported dead." Captain Rodman received a fearful wound in the breast. He was carried to Baltimore, and taken to the house of his sister, where he was carefully nursed back to life. But he never entirely recovered from the effects of his wound. Few men made greater sacrifice in fighting for his country than Captain Rodman. From his youth he was not strong, and could never see fresh blood without fainting. After the bloody carnage that he witnessed at Fredericksburg this weakness was taken from him.

Captain Rodman married, September 24, 1856, Maria Macy, daughter of the Hon. Nathaniel Briggs Durfee, and Harriot Greene, his wife. He now lives in Ashland, Wisconsin.



in business nearly twenty years.

By his death, New York lost a strong, vital and commanding personality in its business circles, and withal a spirit genial, friendly, helpful and kind. During the last twenty years his career as a merchant illustrates the value of concentrated energy, strict personal attention to affairs, and absolute integrity in the rise and growth of a business which, at the time of his death, was the largest of its kind in the country. Mr. Woodward was a man of sanguine spirit, tempered with a keen power of discrimination and an almost unerring judgment, and through the ups and downs of general business for twenty years, the firm of Woodward and Stillman has been synonymous with good management and success. Mr. Woodward took an active part in the organization and advancement of the New York Cotton Association. He was a member of the original committee appointed to draft its by-laws. Later, he served very effectively as member of its building committee, and, upon the completion of the magnificent Cotton Exchange Building, as chairman of the committee of arrangements, he began the ceremonies of its formal dedication "according to the usages of a God-fearing people," by introducing the Right Reverend H. C. Potter, who offered a prayer of blessing. He was a valued member of the Union, Manhattan, Tuxedo, South Side, New York Yacht Clubs, and of Holland Lodge. He was a man of sturdy physique, the apparent embodiment of health, success and happiness, - cheerful, hopeful, confident, and with a delightful dry humor of his own. He enjoyed the respect and confidence of all who knew him, and stood among those honored and distinguished merchants of New York, who, through their own efforts and natural force of character, attained success. His charities were unostentatious, but many and great. He helped many business men in days of trouble, and gave many young men a start in life. His kindness extended to the humblest of his employees, and his benevolence was not bounded by creeds, conditions or circumstances. To the hearts of all who knew him, the news of his death came with a painful shock. He died suddenly in March, 1889.



Previous to the Civil War, General Hazard was engaged in business, but he was one of the first to offer his services to his country. He was commissioned first lieutenant, First Rhode Island Light Artillery, August 8, 1861, and has a long and honorable war record. At Fredericksburg, his battery was ordered into a position of extreme danger. General D. N. Crouch, the major-general commanding, made the following report: -

"Never men fought more gallantly. Never before, I believe, has artillery so far advanced in plain sight, without cover, against an intrenched enemy. The object of the daring enterprise was accomplished. The guns were ultimately withdrawn without the loss of a single piece; and Battery B, First Regiment Rhode Island Artillery, Captain John G. Hazard commanding, was placed upon record."

He adds (December 13, 1862): "While Humphreys was at work, Getty's division of Wilcox's corps was ordered, about three o'clock, to charge on our left, by the unfinished railroad. I could see the men were being dreadfully cut up, al-

though they had not advanced as far as my men. I determined to send a battery upon the plain to shell the line that was doing them so much harm, so I ordered an aide to tell Captain Morgan to send a battery across the canal, and plant it near the Brick House. Morgan came to me and said: 'My God, general, you will lose your guns; a battery cannot live there.' My reply was: 'Then it can die there! I would rather lose my guns than so many of my men; put them in.' Hazard's Battery B, First Regiment Rhode Island Light Artillery was the one to be sacrificed.'

"Without a murmur, Captain Hazard dashed, with his six twelve-pounders, into the street, over the bridge, and getting into action on the left of the road, opened fire with a rapidity which well served my purpose to hearten our men lying down in front, and create in the mind of the enemy the expectation of a new assault, which would draw their fire, and relieve the pressure on the Ninth Corps."

At the latter engagement, the only officers present with Captain Tompkins were Captain Hazard (then first lieutenant), and first lieutenant Charles F. Mason. The battery gained for itself great credit at this battle, holding as it did an advanced and important position under a heavy artillery and infantry fire. On the 1st of October, 1862, he was promoted to the captaincy of Battery H." <sup>2</sup> Captain Hazard married, October 20, 1865, Anne Hartwell.

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
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
