Feed Grains: By 52 yeas to 26 nays (motion to reconsider tabled), Senate passed with amendment H.R. 4510, to provide a special program for feed grains for 1961, after substituting for its text the amended language of S. 993, companion bill, on which actions had previously been taken as follows:

Adopted: Committee amendment (in nature of a substitute) as amended by Cooper amendment giving producers the election of making an additional reduction of corn and grain sorghum acreage and of certain nonconserving crops; and Dirksen amendment providing for a report to Congress within 90 days after enactment showing results to that point; and

Rejected: Dirksen amendment to add proviso that Commodity Credit Corporation shall not sell any feed grain for which price support is made available hereunder at less than 25 percent above current support price therefor; and Miller amendment to make grain and sorghum producers eligible for price support so long as they reduce total acreage of feed grains by 70 percent.

S. 993, companion bill, was indefinitely postponed.

Senate insisted on its amendment, asked for a conference with House, and appointed as conferees Senators Ellender, Johnston, Holland, Talmadge, Aiken, Young of North Dakota, and Hickenlooper.







Adopted: By 51 years to 38 nays (motion to reconsider tabled), providing that if a person is entitled to unemployment compensation and is also qualified to receive a pension under an employer contributory retirement plan he may not draw both but may elect the larger (not applicable to disability or veterans' pensions); two committee amendments (1) requiring the furnishing to Secretary of Labor of personal data on individuals found to be entitled to unemployment compensation, and (2) temporarily raising ceiling on grants to States for administration of program from \$350 million to \$425 million for fiscal years ending June 30, 1961, and June 30, 1962; and by 45 yeas to 42 nays (motion to reconsider tabled), Williams amendment to put the program on a pay-as-you-go basis; and

Rejected: By 42 yeas to 44 nays (motion to reconsider tabled), a series of committee amendments, including provisions that the additional tax on wages apply to those paid in calendar years 1961 and 1962 instead of 1962 and 1963, and that if the additional tax exceeds amount of temporary benefits in a State, the excess, after repaying Federal Government, will be credited to the State's account in the unemployment trust fund.

TEMPORARY UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION

Conferees, in executive session, agreed to file a conference report on the differences between the Senate- and House-passed versions of H.R. 4806, proposed Temporary Extended Unemployment Compensation Act of 1961. Agreements of the conferees are as follows: I. Taxes

The conferees accepted the House provision relating to taxes, i.e., the 4 percent points will apply to the years 1962 and 1963. (The Senate version moved them forward to 1961 and 1962.)

2. Retirement and pension disgualification:

The Senate amendment on this subject was modified as follows:

(a) There will be no reduction in TEUC for social security benefits.

(b) There will be a reduction in the case of other retirement systems and annuities if the unemployment compensation payments are based on the same wages that the retirement payments and annuities are based on to the extent of the retirement pension or annuity. However, there will be no reduction if unemployment compensation payments are based on earnings from another employer (that is, earnings independent of those which generated the retirement pension or annuity). There would be no reduction for veterans' disability and compensation payments.

3. Ceiling on administrative expenses:

It was agreed that the ceiling for fiscal year 1961 would be \$385 million and fiscal 1962, \$415 million. The Senate had raised the ceiling to \$425 million for these 2 years. (The ceiling under present law is \$350 million.)

4. Conferees accepted the Senate amendment calling for the Secretary of Labor to collect certain information on receipts of temporary unemployment compensation.



Rejected: By 31 yeas to 50 nays, Bridges amendment to eliminate language that would restore \$1,017,610,000 of capital impairment, Commodity Credit Corporation; and by 29 nays to 53 yeas, Bridges amendment to eliminate language that would provide \$1.353 billion for sale of surplus agricultural commodities for foreign currencies.





Prior to passage a recommital motion designed to replace the text of the bill with the provisions of H.R. 5943 (the Widnall substitute), had been rejected by a record vote of 125 yeas to 292 nays. The Widnall substitute (H.R. 5943) had been rejected while in the Committee of the Whole House on the State of the Union by a teller vote of 139 yeas to 242 nays.

Before the committee substitute amendment was adopted it was amended to authorize vocational training for certain seasonal agricultural workers. Adopted an amendment to require the Secretary of Commerce to study and report to Congress of the impact on the economy where Government installations are deactivated in areas where at least 6-percent unemployment exists.

Also adopted an amendment to limit to 5 instead of 15 the number of supergrade positions authorized by the bill.

Also adopted several perfecting amendments.

Reorganization Act Extension: By a voice vote the House passed and cleared for the President S. 153, to further amend the Reorganization Act of 1949, as amended, so that such act will apply to reorganization plans transmitted to the Congress at any time before June 1, 1963.

MINIMUM WAGE, AND NOMINATION

Committee on Labor and Public Welfare: Committee, in executive session, ordered favorably reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute H.R. 3935, proposed amendments to the Fair Labor Standards Act. As approved by the committee, the bill would (1) extend minimum wage coverage to approximately 4.1 million workers, the majority of whom are in the retail trades and services, (2) adopt the \$1.25 minimum wage, which amount would be reached in 28 months for presently covered workers, and in 40 months for newly covered workers, the latter of whom would be given overtime protection, reaching the 40-hour maximum workweek in 52 months (until these points are reached \$1.15 minimum wage would be in effect), and (3) adopt the so-called "inflow" test, which means that retail and service enterprises would be covered by the bill, only if they met the following test: (a) the employer must be engaged in commerce or the production of goods for

commerce, (b) the employer must receive \$250,000 worth of goods, for resale, which have moved across State lines (so-called "inflow" test), and (c) the employer must have an annual gross volume of sales of not less than \$1 million, exclusive of excise taxes at the retail level. The committee also approved the nomination of Gerald A. Brown, to be a member of the National Labor Relations Board, and the filing of an interim report of the Subcommittee on Migratory Labor, pursuant to S. Res. 267, the 86th Congress, 2d session (with minority views).
