ONFERENCE TULES OF

Adopted in 1869, and Re-enacted in 1873.

The Conference shall meet at 8½ o'clock A. M., and adjourn at 12 M., but may

1. The Conference shall meet at 8½ o'clock A. M., and adjourn at 12 M., but may alter the time of meeting and adjourning at its discretion.

2. The President shall take the chair precisely at the time to which the Conference stood adjourned, and cause the same to be opened by reading the Scriptures, singing and prayer, and shall have the journals of the preceding day read and approved.

3. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference: but in case of an appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

4. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference, but any member may decline serving on more than one committee at the same time.

5. All motions and resolutions introduced by any member shall be reduced to writing, if the President. Secretary, or any member of the Conference requests it.

6. When a motion, resolution or report presented is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference, but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, at any time before action or amendment.

7. No new motion or resolution shall be made before the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following should intervene, which motion shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, viz: Indefinite postponement, lying on the table, reference to a committee, postponement to any given time, or amendment.

8. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President, to call him to order when he departs from the question, uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems the speaker out of order, or any other member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

9. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President.

10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, or more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

11. When any motion or resolution shall have passed, it shall be in order for any member who voted in the affirmative to move a reconsideration.

member who voted in the affirmative to move a reconsideration.

12. No member shall absent himself from the services of Conference without leave,

12. No member shall absent himself from the services of Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time such question is put by the President, except by leave of Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

14. Every member who shall be within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, excuse him.

15. No motion shall be considered unless seconded.

16. The Secretary shall keep a journal of the proceedings of Conference, and when approved, shall record them in a book provided for that purpose. He shall take charge of the journal and other papers of the Conference, and preserve them with care; suffer no person to take a copy of any paper during the interval of Conference, except with the consent of the Conference; and shall forward the journal and papers to the next Annual Conference.

17. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, and shall be decided without debate.

18. No preacher shall bring any charge against any member of this Conference until he has first given him information of the same, either by letter or otherwise, ten days in advance, if practicable, so that the accused may have an opportunity for defense.

19. When any brother intends to object to the passage of another's character, it shall be his duty to hand the name of the person against whom objections are to be made to the President of the Conference, who shall pass the name by, to be investigated in secret session, at such time as the Conference may direct.

FIRST DAY.

YPSILANTI, MICH., WEDNESDAY, September 3, 1873.

THE EIGHTEENTH SESSION OF THE DETROIT ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH began in the First Methodist Episcopal church in Ypsilanti, Michigan, at 9 o'clock, on the morning of Wednesday, September 3, 1873.

Bishop Isaac W. Wiley presided.

The President read the second chapter of the Second Epistle to Timothy; the seven hundred and seventh hymn was sung, and Bishop Wiley led in prayer. After the two hundred and nineteenth hymn was also sung, Samuel Clements led in prayer.

This being the first presidency by Bishop Wiley over the Detroit Conference, he made some felicitous remarks by way of personal introduction.

Arthur Edwards, Secretary of the session of 1872, called the roll. All who in the following list are not marked absent or otherwise, were present.

A motion by J. Levington to appoint a committee of five on Secret Societies was laid on the table.

W. W. Washburn was appointed to serve as treasurer of the Conference Missionary Society until the arrival of the treasurer of the same.

The Committee of Eight on Conference Claims was instructed to estimate the claims of Conference beneficiaries for the ensuing year, and the presiding elders were requested to apportion said estimate to the several districts for collection.

Nelson Green was appointed by the President to serve on the committee to examine candidates for admission on trial, in place of H. O. Parker.

Documents relating to Sunday Schools, Tracts, Freedmen's Cause, and Garrett Biblical Institute, were respectively referred to committees on those subjects; the Biblical Institute paper going, however, to the Committee on Education.

The Rules of Order governing the session of 1872 were reenacted to govern this session of 1873.

The bar of the Conference was fixed on the line between the pulpit side of the windows third in order from the pulpit.

Arthur Edwards and J. M. Arnold were appointed a committee to publish the Minutes of the present session, and said committee was instructed to print twenty-five hundred copies of the same.

The consideration of the Eighth Disciplinary Question was taken up. The character of Curtis Mosher was examined and passed, and his relation was continued. The characters of Stephen L. Ramsdell, Samuel Kitzmiller and Alva B. Wood were examined and passed, and they were made effective.

The Ninth Disciplinary Question was considered. The character of Marcenas B. Wiltsey was examined and passed, and he was made effective. The characters of Addison C. Shaw, J. E. Parker, Lyman H. Dean, Robert Triggs, Andrew Bell, John Gray,

E. B. Prindle, John Pugh, Jacob Dobbins, Samuel Bibbins, and Ira W. Donelson were examined and passed, and their relations continued.

When the name of D. B. Tracy was called, it was moved that he be made effective. This motion was laid on the table. It was then moved that D. B. Tracy be requested to locate; whereupon it was moved, as a substitute, that his case be postponed until he arrives at the seat of the Conference. The substitute to postpone was laid on the table. Another substitute, to the effect that the case of D. B. Tracy be postponed until Friday morning, was laid on the table by a count vote of forty-four to thirty-nine (44 to 39). The motion requesting D. B. Tracy to locate was then indefinitely postponed by a count vote of fifty-three to forty-nine (53 to 49).

Rev. Benjamin Day, of Newark Conference, Rev. G. M. Tuthill, District Superintendent for the American Bible Society, and F. E. Parish, of the Western Book Concern, were introduced to the Conference.

The Conference adjourned, notices were given, the doxology was sung, and the Conference was dismissed with the benediction pronounced by W. E. Bigelow.

SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, September 4, 1873.

The session began at $8\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock A. M., Bishop Wiley in the chair. The opening religious services were conducted by William Donnelly.

The Journal of the first day's session was read and approved. Thomas Stalker received leave of absence, and Jesse Kilpatrick was appointed to serve in his place on the Committee of Eight on Conference Claims.

Leave of absence was granted to J. C. Wortley.

J. M. Phillips, an Agent of the New York Book Concern, was introduced to the Conference.

The consideration of the Ninth Disciplinary Question was resumed. The characters of Ebenezer Steele, George Wilson, Sylvester Calkins, Erastus R. Hascall, Rufus C. Crane, George Taylor, Lewis Mitchell, William Mahon, Erastus Klumph, William Benson, Luther Lee, Thomas Seeleye, Peter O. Johnson, F. A. A collection of eighty-four dollars and twenty-four cents for Bro. Van Norman's benefit was taken up in open session. The money was given into the custody of Robert Bird, with instructions to convey it to Bro. Van Norman, with expressions of the sympathy of his brethren.

J. F. Davidson, John S. Joslin and D. Whitely were appointed a committee on Church Extension.

Wm. Donnelly was appointed to receive money for the Sunday School Fund of the Board of Education.

Notice of charges and specifications against John Levington was given.

It was moved that these charges be referred to a committee of fifteen for trial. A substitute for the motion to so refer, that the charges be tried in open session, was offered, debated, and, later, withdrawn.

A motion that the charges be referred to the Presiding Elder of Detroit district for investigation in the interval of Conference, was lost by a count vote of forty-eight to sixty-four (48 to 64). A substitute offered for all then before the house, that the case be referred for examination to a committee, according to paragraph three hundred and twenty-three of the Discipline, was moved and adopted.

It was then ordered that the committee consist of fifteen, and that said committee be appointed by the presiding bishop.

Notice was given of an appeal by Isaac Crawford, a local elder, from a decision of Saginaw District Conference. The case with accompanying papers was referred to a committee of nine, and John Kelley was appointed to serve as counsel in behalf of the Church.

Notice of charges and specifications against S. P. Warner, for

maladministration, was given, and a committee of nine was ordered to try the case.

The time of the session was extended.

John Kelley was relieved from service as a Conference steward, nd W. Hagadorne was appointed to serve in his place.

The consideration of the Tenth Disciplinary Question was resumed, and the character of Seth Reed was examined and passed.

The President announced the following as the Committee of Fifteen to inquire into the charges against John Levington: William Taylor, chairman; Wm. X. Ninde, H. Hodskiss, Thomas Stalker, S. E. J. S. Smart was appointed to represent the Church as counsel in the case against John Levington.

J. R. Cordon was appointed to serve as a Conference steward, in place of R. S. Pardington.

The President appointed the following Committee of Nine to try the appeal by Isaac Crawford: B. S. Taylor, chairman; Jesse Kilpatrick, L. C. York, F. W. Warren, W. B. Holt, W. H. Benton, Geo. M. Lyon, George Stowe, J. B. Russell, and J. A. McIlwaine.

The President also appointed the following Committee of Nine to try the charges of maladministration against S. P. Warner: A. F. Bourns, I. N. Elwood, A. R. Hazen, S. B. Kimmell, J. H. McIntosh, S. L. Ramsdell, W. P. Maywood, J. Venning, and J. B. Goss.

J. A. McIlwaine was excused from service as a Conference steward, and J. W. Crippen was appointed to serve in his place.

S. L. Ramsdell was appointed to receive money and statements relating to the David Preston Fund for Albion College.

The Conference adjourned, notices were given, and the benediction was pronounced by E. H. Pilcher.

THIRD DAY.

The session began at $8\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock A.M., Bishop Wiley in the chair. The opening religious services were conducted by John Wesley.

The Journal of the second day's session was read and approved. A report from the Trustees of Albion College was received and referred to the Committee on Education.

John Russell was excused from attendance upon the session.

J. H. McClure was granted a location at his own request.

The Tenth Disciplinary Question was resumed, and the characters of J. S. Smart, T. J. Joslin, B. S. Taylor, J. T. Hankinson, John Wesley, J. R. Cordon, A. B. Clough, J. O. Bancroft, A. J. Bigelow, S. The character of Hiram Hood was examined and passed, and he was placed on the superannuate list.

The characters of T. C. Gardner, A. F. Bourns, G. M. Lyon, M. J. Scott, A. R. Bartlett, A. W. Harding, J. W. Holt, E. E. Pearman, T. C. Higgins, S. P. Lee, J. H. McIntosh, T. G. Potter, W. P. Maywood, W. Donnelly, A. Shepard, B. H. Hedger, R. McConnell, G. R. Davis, J. M. Gordon, E. W. Frazee, L. Barnes, J. Frazer, E. Barry, F. E. York, T. G. Omans, C. L. Church and Peter Marksman were examined and passed.

The Fourth Disciplinary Question was considered. After replying affirmatively to the prescribed disciplinary questions, and after an appropriate address by Bishop Wiley, John M. Truscott, a deacon, was admitted into full connection. Daniel R. Shier was admitted into full connection and elected to deacon's orders. Richard Hudson Jr., a deacon, was admitted into full connection. Charles Locke, an elder, was continued on trial.

D. B. Millar was admitted into full connection and elected to deacon's orders. Edward Foster, a deacon, was admitted into full connection. Daniel Hall was continued on trial. J. M. Johnson was admitted into full connection and elected to deacon's orders. Geo. Deacon, a deacon, was admitted into full connection. Daniel J. Odell was admitted into full connection, and elected to deacon's orders. James E. Whalen was continued on trial.

Richard Hudson was placed upon the supernumerary list by reason of impaired health.

The vote by which Samuel Kitzmiller was made effective, September 3, was re-considered, and he was continued on the supernumerary list.

Rev. Elon Foster, of New York Conference, Aschel Chase, a lay delegate from Saginaw district, Rev. H. A. Barker, of the

Free-Will Baptist church in Ypsilanti, Mich., and David Preston, were introduced to the Conference.

The committee to try the charges of maladministration against S. P. Warner, reported as follows:

The committee in the case of S. P. Warner would report their decision and action in the form of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That we find that specification first is sustained, and that the specification sustains the charge of maladministration.

Resolved, 2. That in our opinion the maladministration arose entirely from an oversight on the part of Bro. Warner, in omitting to sign his name to certain documents.

Resolved, 3. That we recommend that Bro. Warner's character pass.

The report was adopted.

A. B. Bartlett and T. G. Potter were appointed as assistant counsel in behalf of the Church, in the case of the appeal by Isaac Crawford.

Richard Kerr was placed upon the supernumerary list.

The Sixth Disciplinary Question was considered. The characters of James H. Kilpatrick, Horace Palmer, John M. Van Every and J. L. Walker were examined and passed, and they were continued as deacons of the second class.

When the name of Charles C. Lee was called, his withdrawal from the Church was announced. His parchments as an ordained deacon were returned to the Conference, and the Secretary was ordered to enter the name as withdrawn.

The Secretary nominated A. W. Wilson and A. B. Wood as assistant secretaries, and they were duly confirmed as such.

L. C. York was relieved from service on the Appeal Court in the case of Isaac Crawford, and E. Bibbins was appointed to serve in his place.

The Conference adjourned, notices were given, and the benediction was pronounced by J. W. Holt.

FOURTH DAY.

Saturday, September 6, 1873.

The session opened at the appointed hour, Bishop Wiley in the chair. The opening religious services were conducted by James F. Davidson. The Journal of the third day's session was read, amended, and approved.

The presiding Bishop was by vote requested to appoint J. M. Arnold Sunday School Agent, and John Russell Temperance Agent.

The vote by which Marcenus B. Wiltsey was made effective, September 3, was reconsidered, and he was continued on the superannuate list.

The Seventh Disciplinary Question was considered. David Casler, Henry H. Smith, W. Edson Dunning, John Hamilton, Alvah B. Wood, Philip Wright, John G. Sparling, S. B. Kimmell, James A. Dunlap, Edward Steer, James Riley and Francis E. Pearce were examined and passed, and they were elected to elder's orders.

Bishop Ames, at this point, entered the conference-room, and was respectfully received by the Conference, standing.

C. C. Olds, of Michigan Conference, and E. O. Haven, corresponding secretary of the Board of Education, were introduced. The latter addressed the Conference on the subject of his labors.

T. J. Joslin, John McEldowney, and L. R. Fiske were appointed a committee to act in conjunction with the Board of Education in appropriating moneys collected within the Conference, for the Children's fund of the Board of Education.

The Fourth Disciplinary Question was resumed, and Thomas H. Baskerville, who had previously been examined according to Discipline, and whose character was examined and passed, was admitted into full connection and elected to deacon's orders.

The Nineteenth Question was considered. Edwin P. Peirce, being duly recommended by Detroit District Conference, John S. Priestley by Adrian District Conference, James Ellis by Flint District Conference, William Allington by the Quarterly Conference of Speaker Circuit, Nathan N. Clark by the Quarterly Conference of Forester, Alexander J. Holmes by the Quarterly Conference of Marion Circuit, and Frederick Porter by the Quarterly Conference of Phænix and Alloway Circuit, were elected to deacon's orders.

The committee in the case of the appeal by Isaac Crawford, made the following report:

MINUTES OF THE TRIAL OF THE APPEAL OF ISAAC CRAWFORD FROM THE DECISION OF THE SAGINAW DISTRICT CONFERENCE, HELD AT SAGINAW CITY, Aug. 21, 1873.

The minutes of the Court below were presented and read.

A motion was made to entertain the appeal.

After discussion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That because of the informality and imperfection in the record brought be fore us in the appeal of Isaac Crawford from the action of the Saginaw District Conference, the appeal cannot be entertained, and we hereby remand the case back for a new trial..

The Court of Inquiry appointed to investigate the matter of charges against John Levington, September 4, made the following report, accompanied by the following papers:

The committee to whom was referred the papers in the case of John Levington, submit:

We have examined the charge and specifications, and recommend the adoption of the following:

WHEREAS, John Levington was at the last Annual Conference passed to the superannuated list because of mental unfitness for the work of our ministry; and, WHEREAS, the present charge and specifications are in a line of thought for which we believe he is not fully responsible; therefore,

Resolved, That the case be dismissed, and his character passed.

MINUTES OF THE MEETINGS OF THE COMMITTEE TO WHICH WAS REFERED THE CHARGE AGAINST JOHN LEVINGTON.

The committee to which was referred the above named case, met at $2\frac{1}{2}$ P. M., on Thursday, September 4, in the M. E. church, and adjourned to the lecture-room of the Presbyterian church for the work assigned them. The roll was called, and the following members of the committee were present: William Taylor, chairman also Wm. X. Ninde, H. Hodskiss, S. E. Warren, Wm. Fox, R. S. Pardington, F. E. York, C. W. Austin, John McEldowney, J. O. Bancroft, A. J. Richards, E. H. Brockway, A. J. Bigelow, J. Hamilton and J. Frazer. T. Stalker was absent by reason of absence from the city. J. S. Smart was also present as counsel for the Church. The meeting was opened with prayer by Wm. Fox, and J. McEldowney was appointed secretary. The charge and specifications were read, and are as follows:

"To the Detroit Annual Conference in Session at Ypsilanti, "September 4, 1873:

"We, the undersigned, members of the M. E. church at Sheldon and Brighton, Detroit Conference, do hereby prefer the following charge and specifications against Rev. John Levington.

CHARGE—EVIL SPEAKING.

"Specification 1. In saying, in substance, in the Methodist Free Press a newspaper published at Rockford, Ill., of which he is the leading editor, in Vol. I., No. 16, January 9, 1873, that a paper was offered to the last Detroit Conference, and accepted by that body, which contained three daring falsehoods, and placed him in a superannuated relation.

"Specification 2. In saying in the above article in said Methodist Free Press, substantially, that the authors of that paper designed to kill him, as much as any assassin ever designed to kill his victim.

"Specification 3. In saying in the same article published as aforesaid in said Methodist Free Press, that 'Rev. L. C. York signed a paper containing such slanderous falsehoods as will hardly be paralleled; that he, York, then denied signing it; then admitted that he did sign it, and denied that he ever denied; and finally pretended that he had another paper in his possession.'

"Specification 4. In saying in the said Methodist Free Press, Vol. I., No. 8, November 14, 1872, substantially, that those who raised the money to pay the salary of Rev. Joseph Sutton, on Denton and Sheldon circuit, at the Sheldon appointment, at the close of his pastoral term in 1872, found it necessary to resort to falsehood in order to succeed.

"Specification 5. In saying in the same article in said Methodist Free Press that the exposure of the falsehood above referred to was anticipated, and that a plan was laid to cover it up.

"Specification 6. In saying in same article that 'the Lodgemen among the trustees who closed it (the church) against him, did not build and do not support it.'

(Signed,)

"C. W. Sines, Denton and Sheldon Circuit." Wm. H. Naylor, Brighton Circuit."

The accused, J. Levington, not being present, the committee adjourned to meet at the call of the chairman.

FRIDAY, September 5, 1873-2 o'clock p. m.

The committee on the case of John Levington met as per adjournment, by call of the chairman, in the lecture-room of the Presbyterian church, Wm. Taylor, chairman, in the chair. The roll was called and the members all reported present except A. J. Richards.

Mr. Levington arose to take exception to the composition of the committee, objecting to seven of its members. The Chair decided the exception could not be taken, as the committee was appointed by the Conference, and on appeal of J. Levington the decision of the Chair was sustained.

To the charge J. Levington answered "Not guilty."

J. S. Smart, counsel for the Church, introduced a paper denominated the *Methodist Free Press*, Vol. I., No. 16, January 9, 1873, containing an article headed "From the Front," which J. Levington admitted to have been written by him.

Specification 1. Testimony was introduced from the above paper in which is found these words: "It will be remembered that at the last session of the Detroit Conference a paper was offered to that body for acceptance, and it was accepted. That paper contained three daring falsehoods concerning John Levington, and placed him in a superannuated relation.

Specification 2. The counsel, J. S. Smart, introduced the same paper above named, and from the same article adduced the words, "The fact is, the author of that paper designed to kill John Levington as much as any assassin ever designed to kill his victim."

Specification 3. The counsel for Church on third specification introduced the same paper above named, and from the same article "From the Front" these words: "It is only necessary to say that there was but one paper got up at the Conference; that paper is published with York's name signed to it, and it contains such slanderous falsehoods as will hardly be paralleled. Such is the paper that York says he helped to get up in Levington's favor. Such is the paper he signed, then denied signing it, then admitted that he did sign it, and then denied that he ever denied, and finally pretended that he had another paper in his possession."

Specification 4. The counsel introduced a newspaper with the title above given, the Methodist Free Press, Vol. I., No. 8, dated November 14, 1872, containing another article headed "From the Front," J. Levington admitting the writing of this article. From the article the counsel introduced the words: "They (explained by Levington to mean the people of Sheldon charge) were then raising the balance of the pastor's salary, or rather trying to raise it, and to succeed it was found necessary to deny that he was a Mason; but the trick did not succeed, for Barker did not pay the Knight Templar. As further illustration of method of the craft, I call attention to the fact that the exposure of falsehood was anticipated, and the above plan was laid in the course of day to cover it up."

Specification 5 was withdrawn by leave.

Specification 6. The paper last named was introduced, and from it the following paragraph in testimony on specification 6. "It should be observed that the men who desired me to lecture in the church are the men who built and still support it; and the Lodge men who closed it

against them did not build it and do not support it."

The counsel then introduced the articles from the above named papers entitled "From the Front," as a whole, viz., articles found in Vol. I., No. 16, January 9, 1873, and Vol. I., No. 8, November 14, 1872, of the *Methodist Free Press*, and of which John Levington is one of the chief editors. The counsel further introduced a paper published in Chicago, Ill., called *The Christian Cynosure*, Vol. V., No. 12, January 31, 1873, as testimony in proof of the charge.

To the introduction of this paper and of any editorial therefrom as testimony in this case, Mr. Levington asked leave to enter his protest

and objection.

The counsel cited witnesses and called L. C. York, who to questions

submitted, answered thus:

I am pastor of the M. E. church in Brighton. Succeeded Bro. John Levington on that charge. The *Methodist Free Press* is circulated quite extensively over Brighton charge. Levington visited the charge during the year. I know from his published statement that he procured quite a number of subscribers the past year in addition to the number taken when I went there.

Charles W. Sines called and questioned, answered: I am a member of the M. E. church at Sheldon. Am steward. Have been member about twenty-four years. I know the trustees who closed the church against Bro. Levington. If I am rightly informed there is but one man among

them who is a Mason. There were five present at the meeting that closed the church. Four voted for closing and one for opening. Two of the four I know contributed to the building of the church. I was treasurer, and have the names. They had contributed, all four of them, toward the support of the church. The *Methodist Free Press* is circulated somewhat extensively. I am assistant postmaster, and think there were thirteen papers passed through the office. I am also trustee, and was present at the meeting above named.

QUESTION BY LEVINGTON. Are there members of secret societies living in that locality who are Masons besides the one spoken of in that meeting? The question was objected to, and the objection overruled. There are men who are reported to be Masons. I do not know that the Masons were opposed to opening the church for lecture. One man, whom I afterward learned to be a Mason, said he would be glad to hear the lecture.

QUESTION BY SMART. Are you or are you not a Mason? I am not.

Charles Andrews called and questioned, answered: I reside at Sheldon. Am member of the M. E. Church. I am steward and trustee; have been for between seven and eight years. I was present when the trustees voted not to open the church for J. Levington. It was near the close of the conference year in 1872. I am not a Mason. There was only one that I know of in that meeting who has been reported to be a Mason. The rest I believe were not. I aided in building the church. I aided in supporting the church at that time. I know there are some numbers of the Methodist Free Press taken in that community. I do not know how many.

Answered to Questions by Levington. I voted not to open the church at that time. Did lodge men generally help build that church? I cannot answer. Do lodge men generally support that church now? Some of them do. Would they support it, do you think, if the pastor were not a Mason, and opposed to Masonry? Objected to.

Wm. Artley called and questioned, answered: I reside at Sheldon. Am member of the M. E. Church. I have been about five years. I was present when the trustees refused to open the church for Levington lectures. I am class-leader and trustee. I voted against opening the church. I am a Mason. I supported the church at that time. I helped to build it. I know there was no other Mason at that meeting.

QUESTION BY LEVINGTON ANSWERED: I contributed toward the building of that church.

C. W. Sines again called and questioned, answered: I am acquainted with Charles Andrews and Wm. Artley. I did not know whether these two contributed to build the church. The other two I do know helped to build it.

The counsel for the Church having concluded, Mr. Levington proposed to introduce testimony proving the truth of the articles published in the copies of the *Methodist Free Press* above named.

The Chair decided that proof on this point is not admissible.

Mr. Levington wished to enter his protest against the decision of the Chair, in rejecting witnesses on the above point.

The Minutes of the committee were called for, read, corrected, and approved as above.

On motion of Bro. Bancroft, it was directed that the proceedings be reported to the Conference, signed by the Chairman and Secretary, and submitted as the testimony in the case.

A motion was made to adopt the resolution reported by the Committee of Inquiry. Pending debate, the time of the session was extended.

The Conference adjourned at ten minutes past noon. Notices were given, and the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Ames.

FIFTH DAY.

Monday, September 8, 1873.

The Conference met at the usual hour, Bishop Wiley in the chair.

C. M. Anderson conducted the opening religious services.

The Journal of the fourth day's session was read and approved. Bishop Wiley presented the following certificates of ordinations:

I hereby certify that I ordained the following persons as deacons in the M. E. Church: Daniel R. Shier, D. B. Millar, John M. Johnson, Daniel J. Odell, Thomas H. Baskerville, Edwin P. Peirce, John S. Priestley, James Ellis, Wm. Allington, Nathan N. Clark, Alexander J. Holmes, Frederick Porter.

The character of Robert Bird, a supernumerary, was examined and passed, and he placed upon the effective list.

The consideration of the Ninth Disciplinary Question was resumed, and the character of D. Burnham Tracy was examined and passed, and he was continued in his superannuate relation.

The report of the Committee of Inquiry in the case of John Levington, pending at the hour of adjournment on Saturday, Sept. 6, was called up. A motion offered as a substitute, that John Levington be made effective, was laid on the table. The previous question on the report of the Committee of Inquiry was ordered. Pending the vote, the following amendments were moved, to-wit: in the second member of the preamble, strike out all the words between the words "specifications" and "which," and insert the words, "pertain to questions concerning;" also to insert in the same sentence, after the word "responsible," the words, "for his course;" so that the second member of the preamble as amended shall read:

Whereas, The present charge and specifications pertain to questions concerning which we believe he is not fully responsible for his course.

The report as amended was adopted. John Levington was then continued on the superannuate list.

Rev. Geo. P. Tyndall, Rev. Mr. Boyden, and Rev. Mr. Hall, pastors, respectively, of the Presbyterian, the Baptist, and the African Methodist Episcopal churches in Ypsilanti, were introduced to the Conference. The first made remarks expressive of the fraternity of the Presbyterian Synod of Michigan, and the second of that of the Baptist Church. Rev. H. O. Sheldon, and Rev. D. Rutledge, agent of the Freedmen's Aid Society, were also introduced.

The following communication was read and referred to a committee of three.

TO THE DETROIT ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE M. E. CHURCH, AT YPSILANTI, MICH.:

Dear Brethren:—In the name of the Master, and in behalf of the Congregational churches of Michigan, we, the members, a committee appointed for the purpose at our last annual meeting, earnestly petition your body to unite with us in endeavoring to secure some plan of interdenominational co-operation in reference to the organization of feeble churches in our state.

In the past, it is well known, that each denomination has labored for its own interest, with too little regard for the interests of others, or for the common good. One result of this is, that in newer settlements especially, churches are multiplied more with reference to "isms" than for the spread of the gospel.

Brethren, let us never forget the commission of the great Master under which we all labor. What strife, what dissension, and what bitterness often arise because we forget that the work of God is one! Who, we ask, would think of planting in the name of *Christianity* three or four starvling churches in every little mush-room town all over the land? Would this be Christian economy? And yet, is not this in part the work which the different evangelical denominations are doing? Could there be some

fraternal co-operation between these different denominations in reference to the matter, we believe that money, contributed for Christian purposes, might be more wisely expended, a better spirit would exist between us, a more healthy growth of religion would be secured, and our great Head would be more honored; and therefore we ask your aid in this good work.

This question has come to the surface in many annual meetings during the past year. All seem to lament the present order of things as contrary to Christian charity, Christian economy, and Christian progress. All seem to be inquiring in reference to it—" Who will show us any good?"

What we need most of all, as it appears to us, is to be saved from one another. Each denomination ought to be made secure from every other. It is hard to contend against our enemies without contending against our friends. It is evident that no one denomination can alone secure the desired result. There must be co-operation if anything is accomplished. Now, dear brethren, we ask your wisdom, your prayers, and your help. As denominations, have we not all sinned in this regard? And would not some co-operative plan by which we could help, rather than hinder, each other in the work of the gospel, be a work meet for repentance? If our endeavor meets with your approval, we respectfully ask the appointment of a committee by your body to confer with us, and committees of other evangelical bodies, in reference to some plan of operation which may be reported back for the action of the respective bodies which are represented.

The Committee to Nominate Committees for 1874 were instructed to nominate seven elders as "Triers of Appeals," required by paragraph three hundred and fifty-three of the Discipline.

The Twenty-third Disciplinary Question was considered. Adrian, Romeo, Birmingham and Flint were nominated, respectively, as the seat of the session of 1874. Romeo was chosen as the seat of our next session.

J. A. McIlwaine and J. S. Smart were excused from attendance upon the remaining sessions of the Conference of 1873.

The Committee on Temperance made their report, which was adopted. [See Reports A.]

The Committee on Tract Cause made a report, which was adopted. [See Reports B.]

The communication from a committee of Congregationalists previously read at this session was referred to the following persons as the committee already ordered: L. R. Fiske, J. H. McCarty and O. Whitmore.

Rev. J. M. Reid, D.D., a corresponding secretary of the

Missionary Society, who was introduced, made an address touching Missionary methods and plans.

The consideration of the Fourth Disciplinary Question was resumed, and the character of James E. Whalen was examined and passed, and he was admitted into full connection and elected to deacon's orders.

The Committee on the Bible Cause made a report, which was adopted. [See Reports C.]

The Committee on Education made a report, which was adopted. [See Reports D.] David Preston and Otis A. Critchett were duly elected, by ballot, trustees of Albion College, as recommended in the report. Arthur Edwards and W. W. Washburn were re-elected trustees of Northwestern University, as similarly recommended.

It was moved to recommend a Michigan State Methodist Convention, to appoint a committee of five to make arrangements for the same. The motion prevailed, and the Michigan Annual Conference was also requested to appoint a committee of arrangements to co-operate with the Detroit Conference Committee just authorized. The motion prevailed, and E. O. Haven, S. Reed, E. H. Pilcher, David Preston and Henry Fish were appointed as the Committee of Arrangements for said convention.

J. M. Phillips addressed the conference respecting the interests of the New York Book Concern.

It was ordered that, when the conference adjourn, it adjourn to meet at three o'clock this afternoon.

Notices were given, the doxology was sung, the benediction was pronounced by J. S. Smart, and the Conference adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Monday, September 8, 1873.

The session began at 3 o'clock pursuant to adjournment, E. O. Haven in the chair, by appointment from Bishop Wiley. A. R. Bartlett conducted the opening religious services.

The Journal of the morning session was read and approved.

The Committee on Periodicals made a report. A motion to lay the second resolution on the table prevailed, and the first resolution with the rest of the report prevailed. [See Reports E.]

A. J. Bigelow, J. H. McCarty and J. Hamilton were appointed a committee to report on the subject of the Ladies and Pastors' Christian Union.

A paper relating to the Use of Tobacco was referred to the Committee on Temperance. This Committee on Temperance reported the following resolutions touching the use of tobacco, which were adopted. [See Reports F.]

Wm. Donnelly was authorized to pay over all funds in his hands collected by him for the Freedmen's Aid Society to J. M. Phillips of the New York Book Concern.

The Committee on the Freedmen's Cause made a report, which was adopted. [See Reports G.]

The Mission Auditing Committee made a report, which was adopted. [See Reports H.]

The Committee on Ministerial Education made a report, which was adopted. [See Reports I.]

The following paper was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society has been recognized by the authorities of the Church and the Methodist press generally, as a legitimate and indespensable auxiliary in the Missionary cause; and

WHEREAS, The growth of this Society in this state is largely due to the efficient labors of the secretary, Miss Rulison; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That we recognize Miss Rulison as a faithful and efficient colaborer in the Gospel, and will welcome her to our charges.

2. That we recommend that she be retained in this agency for the ensuing year.

The Committee on Parsonages made a report, which was adopted. [See Reports J.]

The Committee on Church Extension made a report, which was adopted.

The following resolutions appended to the report were adopted:

Resolved, 1. That, in our opinion, the cause of Church Extension is one of vast importance to the success of the gospel in all our borders—that it is one of the great agencies of the Church.

2. That we will give *careful attention* to this great Christian enterprise, and do what we can to increase its funds and power.

3. That great care should be taken in the distribution of the funds of the society, so that the churches in one locality shall not be robbed to supply the wants of another.

It was ordered that seventy-five dollars be paid out of the Conference Missionary treasury for publication of missionary matter in the minutes, and twenty-five dollars from the Church Extension treasury for publication of church extension matter in the minutes.

The Committee to Nominate Committees for 1874 reported as follows:

SIXTH DAY.

Tuesday, September 9, 1873.

The session opened at nine o'clock A. M., Seth Reed in the chair by appointment from Bishop Wiley.

A. F. Bourns conducted the opening religious services.

Bishop Wiley took the chair just at the close of the opening exercises.

The Journal of the previous session was read and approved.

ON TEMPERANCE.

(Adopted September 8th.)

We here reaffirm our oft-uttered sentiments as a Conference upon the subject of Temperance. Nothing which we have ever said as a Conference do we desire now to retract or modify. Our convictions only deepen with the lapse of time. We believe that intemperance in the use of ardent spirits is not only a great evil, but it is the great evil of this day. We recognize in it the means employed by the devil to hinder the cause of truth and thereby ruin the souls of men, and as such we feel called upon to assail it with every weapon at our command, believing that the success of Christ's kingdom means the overthrow of Satan's. Human slavery could only fetter the body, while the slavery of the appetite binds soul and body in chains of darkness. An edict from king or president could liberate millions of human beings in an hour, while liberation from this worse slavery can only come from long efforts, continued assertion of the will-power, and the grace of God. The grip of the monster is this day on the nation. That grip cannot be broken by human power alone. We must not cease our efforts until it is broken and the nation and the world are free; but in all our efforts we must not trust in our own power and wisdom, but in God, who alone can set the millions free from this form of thralldom as He set free those who in our own country were so recently bound in what seemed perpetual and hopeless slavery. Let us remember that with God all things are possible.

We beg to record our conviction that the word intemperance applies not alone to drunkenness, but to the drinking of ardent spirits in quantities great or small. A man who uses alcoholic beverage, though he may never reel in the gutter, though he may use the lighter and so-called innocent liquors, the beers, the wines, yet inasmuch as these do produce intoxication, and inasmuch as their use creates an appetite which craves the stronger kind, and inasmuch as they are not needed to sustain the animal life, we affirm that any one who uses them other than as a medical remedy, demanded by a condition which science may determine, is intemperate; that temperance in its true signification means total abstinence from all beverages, of every kind whatsoever, which contain the

intoxicating principle. And we wish it to be understood as our sentiment that the Methodist Episcopal Church can have no fellowship with any who make, sell, or drink ardent spirits, by whatever name they are called.

We further state that in our judgment the right to sell intoxicating liquors at retail—a right professedly created by a license law—is a violation of the great law of love which forbids one man to injure another. which works an injury to the body, soul, or property of another is essentially a wrong in itself. That which dethrones the reason and converts man over into a maniae, injures society, is destructive of our homes and all we hold dear; and hence to license one man to ruin another and destroy public peace, is to stab society in its vital part. We do not believe that society will be true to itself until it assumes the position that a sin cannot be licensed and thus sanctioned—until it protects itself against the evil by such prohibitory measures as will only allow of the use of intoxicants in medicine and the arts, where they may have their place along with all We firmly believe that our great railroad corporations have an interest in this question. Railroad companies are dependent upon the patronage of the public, and the public recognizes in these corporations great benefits; but life is precious and should be protected. We believe that, could the facts be fully known, more than one half of all the railroad accidents which startle us by their enormity result from the use of ardent spirits. They who hold in their hands the lives of hundreds and thousands of people are often known to be utterly unqualified by virtue of intemperate habits for such responsible positions. Man is not rational when under the influence of rum. We aver that it is the duty of all railroad companies and other corporations, whether upon land or water, into whose keeping we place our lives, to establish such laws and regulations as shall make it an impossibility for any man who uses alcoholic drink to find employment in their service. We believe that all such corporations owe this to the traveling public, thereby removing one of the chief causes of the accidents which have been so numerous of late - which have sent mourning to so many homes.

We have no sympathy whatever with the statement so often made that the cause of temperance is waning. We do feel an ever-increasing sense of horror at the enormity of the evil, which only indicates that the public conscience is more sensitive than formerly on this subject. The rum venders are putting forth their most determined efforts everywhere, because they see clearly how deep and wide-spread is the temperance sentiment. The great American people are moving everywhere against this enemy, and we think the signs of the times indicate very decided progress in the right direction, and we hail the coming of the day when he who sells shall be as much a subject of penalty as he who drinks is now so often an object of pity.

We call upon all our members everywhere to be true to their own church on this subject—a church which has always been in the forefront of this and all other reformatory movements. We call upon all to be true to the welfare of others by the most rigid abstinence themselves. We call upon all our brethren in the ministry everywhere, to lift up their voices in favor of a universal emancipation from this fatal bondage, and to wage a

good warfare until this great enemy of God and man shall be slain; until the foul blot of intemperance shall be wiped from our escutcheon and this dreadful evil shall no more curse the world.

ON TRACT CAUSE.

Your committee is of the opinion that by far too little attention is paid to presenting the interests of the Tract Cause, and the taking of collections in congregations. We find a lamentable deficit, and unwarrantable neglect on the part of the preachers in not reporting at all in relation to it. Out of the one hundred and eighty-two charges, only fifty-three are reported. While we profess to regard this cause as a means of diffusing light and knowledge among the comparatively destitute to which no other agency is so well adapted, we deem it a source of regret that so little attention should be paid to so important an interest. If the "Tract Cause" is of use in our economy, it is an unused power in this conference. We believe a harvest of good might be gathered in this way if we, as pastors, were to properly attend to these collections, so that tracts and cheap publications of sterling worth might be more extensively circulated. We have perfect confidence in the ability of our Secretary and the Board of Managers, and are satisfied with their administration. Therefore,

Resolved, That we deem it the duty of each pastor to present the Tract Cause, and take a collection in each congregation to aid in its support.

[D.] ON EDUCATION.

(Adopted September 8th.)

Your committee are deeply impressed with the importance of the subject submitted for their consideration. We cannot be indifferent to the proper intellectual training of our youth. The great educational forces of the age, so largely influential in shaping the destinies of our people, should receive our most careful attention. While a wrong training is misleading and mischievous, a right culture must ever be wholesome and For the purposes of primary education, we regard our public school system with undiminished favor; and feel it incumbent upon us as Christian citizens to heartily sustain it against the assaults and intrigues of its open or covert foes. While we would by no means favor the introduction of dogmatic religious teaching, we are rigorously opposed to that extreme secular tendency which would banish from the school-room all allusions to the Divine Being and the claims of Christian morality. It becomes us, then, in our capacity of citizens to visit the public schools in our respective communities, examine the text-books, watch the proceedings of boards of education, and in every way prove ourselves the firm and discriminating supporters of popular education as administered by this thoroughly-tested and most efficient system.

It is the interests of higher education, however, which are more especially commended to our consideration as a body. We are in no sense hostile to those institutions which are maintained by the patronage of the state and are under its control, yet we are increasingly convinced of the propriety of sustaining by the heartiest zeal and most efficient measures our denominational colleges. While these are not sectarian in any odious sense, they are nevertheless under our immediate control; the instruction, in its religious bearings, is more pronounced and faithfully supervised, and a more ample provision is made for the spiritual needs of the students. This last is a consideration of the highest moment. Facts show that while revivals of religion are of rare occurrence in connection with state universities, our own institutions are constantly sharing their grateful influence. As a Conference we are especially interested in the growing prosperity of Albion College. A brighter day is evidently dawning upon its fortunes. After a long period of struggling and precarious existence, it seems about to be placed on a solid and enduring foundation. Through the enterprise and persistent zeal of that worthy abettor of every good cause, David Preston, Esq., who has devoted his time, money, and unwearied effort to its attainment, the endowment project will doubtless prove a complete success. We are gratified to know that this munificent addition to the funds of the college is not the gift of a few of our wealthy friends, but represents the generous sympathy of the mass of our people throughout the state. Placed thus upon a secure foundation, we may confidently anticipate that the friends of liberal

cducation among us who are blessed with abundant means will continue to make this institution the object of their benefactions. Let us spare no pains to make this college, which is more immediately under our management and dependent on our bounty, in every particular a first-class institution, not only in the extent and thoroughness of the instruction, but in the completeness and richness of its cabinets, library, and apparatus. From the annual report of the Board of Trustees presented to your body and referred to us, we learn: That the past year has been one of fair prosperity. The number of students has been greater than last year, though for obvious reasons the number in the college classes continues small. The religious interest has been good, the Lord blessing the college in the conversion of precious souls. The senior class are all members of the M. E. Church, several of whom will enter the ministry. A rule was adopted by the Board by which members of the Conference are permitted to receive the degree of any course regularly, provided they pass satisfactory examinations with the college classes.

The Faculty for the coming year are the same as for the year just closed. The property of the college, exclusive of endowment, is worth over all indebtedness \$69,528.87. On the adjournment of the Board, one year ago, the balance against the college was \$4,000.00. This balance has been paid and the expenses of the year met, and the balance against the institution is but little greater than last year, although the expenses were somewhat larger and no collections have been taken during the year for current expenses, the entire field having been resigned to Mr. Preston. Should the People's Sixty-Thousand-Dollar Fund prove a success, as is confidently expected, there will be in the hands of the Endowment Fund Committee, in trust for Albion College, over Two Hundred Thousand Dollars.

As the terms of David Preston, Esq., and Rev. Jno. McEldowney, D.D., trustees elected by this Conference, expire this year, we recommend the re-election of David Preston, and that Hon. Otis A. Critchett be elected to fill the place of Dr. McEldowney.

We also recommend the following persons as a Board of Visitors from this Conference: Rev. John McEldowney, D.D., L. R. Fiske, D.D., Luther Lee, D.D., A. J. Bigelow, A.M., B. S. Taylor, J. C. Wortley, A.M., Prof. Louis McLouth, A.M., E. L. Walters, and Charles Tenwinkle.

Your committee have also noted with much pleasure the substantial and growing prosperity of the Northwestern University at Evanston, Ill. Though not so immediately connected with us as the College at Albion, we are still represented in its Board of Trustees, and deeply interested in its success and usefulness. With its ample resources, happy location, and efficient management, we see no reason why it should not stand foremost among the growing universities of the Great West.

We recommend the re-election of Rev. Arthur Edwards, D.D., and Rev. W. W. Washburn, A.M., as trustees from this Conference.

The Northwestern Christian Advocate, which we recognize as the organ of our denomination first commanding our support and patronage, has increased its list thirty per cent. during the past year—an increase which we hope will be maintained, notwithstanding the damaging effects of the premium picture lately offered its subscribers. We submit as a basis for action, to follow words so plentifully uttered in former reports, the following:

Resolved, That we will use all diligence to increase the circulation thoroughout all our charges of our own denominational periodicals, especially the Methodist Quarterly Review and the Northwestern Christian Advocate.

Resolved, That this Conference request our publishers to furnish our periodicals at the lowest living rates, leaving the premium picture trade to those publishers whose papers need such premiums to secure their sale.—[Laid on the table.]

ON THE USE OF TOBACCO.

[Adopted September 8th.]

WHEREAS. In the jndgment of the most eminent physiologists of the day, the use of tobacco in any form is injurious to the bodily health, affecting with peculiar severity the nervous system, resulting in a tendency to epilepsy, paralysis and insanity; and

WHEREAS, The use of such narcotic is objectionable on the ground of its filthiness, sometimes rendering the visits of the servant of the Lord Jesus objectionable on the above grounds, though such instances are by no means numerous, and are continually decreasing; and

Whereas. The use of tobacco, by a minister of the gospel especially, is an unwhole-some example to the young men growing up in our communities, rendering them liable to intemperance in its graver form, and while we do not think the use of such narcotic to be a "sin unto death," and express our deep regret that any of our brethren have come under the power of this useless and dangerous habit, and believing that the time is coming when no minister of the Lord Jesus Christ who persists in such habit, by a virtuous and intelligent people will be excused; therefore,

Resolved. That as a Conference we urge upon all our brethren to abstain from the use of tobacco, however long formed the habit of its use may be.

Resolved. That we insist upon all young men coming into this Conference that they state distinctly before the Conference their habits in regard to this subject.

ON FREEDMEN'S CAUSE.

[.1dopted September 8th.]

The inspired words, "freely ye have received, freely give," suggest at once a true rule and the highest incentive to Christian benevolence. As a people we have received more from God than any other nation on earth. Civil and religious liberty are here more free to exert their reciprocal influences in scattering among the masses the blessings of the life that now is and of that which is to come.

Yet for more than eighty years we, as a nation, withheld, in part, from some of our fellow men, for no offense but that of wearing a dark skin, these higher forms of divine beneficence. Sad history! Would the "damning spot" were off our national ermine and our sacerdotal robes! But thanks to Heaven, passing quickly from slaves to freedmen and from freedmen to enfranchised citizens, these four millions now demand a benefaction at our hands; and truly their debtors we are, and Methodism must not fail to pay her full share.

A Christian education is now the pressing need of the colored people of this republic, and to withhold the means of it from them would be to disregard alike the claims of religion, philanthropy, and patriotism. Moreover, as they are now so essential a part of the body politic, it would be almost equally unjust to ourselves and them were we to prove remiss in this duty. Their comparative helplessness, necessary ignorance, and consequent easy exposure to the various forms of social depravity and irreligion, compose a most pathetic appeal for charitable contributions and Christian labor; while their well-known teachableness, together with their potential political and moral relations, render the field occupied by the society seeking their improvement one of more than ordinary promise.

Furthermore, the fact tha tour General Superintendents have recently issued an appeal for prompt and enlarged contributions to this fund, expressing the conviction that "no society in our Church has accomplished greater good with an equal amount of funds, and none has at the present time a more urgent claim upon the liberality and prayers of our people," should have elicited a more generous response from the churches than will be shown by the footing of this report.

Resolved, That as a Conference we commend the establishment of a school, chiefly for the education of ministers and teachers, within the bounds of each annual conference in the Southern States; and that we will, by a timely and earnest presentation of its claims to the people of our respective charges, seek to augment the funds of the "Freedmen's Aid Society" during the ensuing year, by raising the entire amount of \$2,250 apportioned to this Conference; and that the presiding elders are hereby constituted a committee to apportion the above sum among the respective charges.

ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

[Adopted September 8th.]

It was resolved at our last Conference that the money obtained by collections for education at our several charges should be appropriated to the relief of Garrett Biblical Institute. Some of the preachers forwarded their collections directly to the Treasurer of the Institute. Receipts amounting to \$62.50 for funds thus forwarded have been placed in the hands of this committee. We have also received from the several charges \$161.45 in money for this purpose. It appears that the Biblical Institute has nearly recovered from the financial embarrassment caused by the Chicago fire, and will not need further help from this source. It will, however, continue to need our prayers, our sympathy, and our influence in encouraging young men, when practicable, to avail themselves of its educational advantages before entering upon the work of the Christian ministry.

The facilities and helps to young men preparing for the ministry are already considerable, and through the Board of Education and the efficient labors of its Corresponding Secretary, they are continually increasing. Students designing to devote their lives to the work of Christ are not charged for tuition at the Northwestern University; and furnished rooms are provided for them gratuitously in Heck Hall, to the extent of its capacity. The Corresponding Secretary informs us that the Board of Education can now offer help, at the rate of one hundred dollars a year, to a few students who need help. Applications for help will be considered by the Board in the order of their reception. Young men preferring to borrow money, without interest, instead of receiving it as a donation, should so state in their applications.

We insert a few extracts from a circular issued by Dr. E. O. Haven, corresponding secretary of the Board of Education: "All conference

education societies, and other local societies of the kind, are regarded as auxiliaries to the Board of Education, and the secretaries are earnestly requested to furnish the Corresponding Secretary with reports of their proceedings, as we wish to embody an abstract of all such work done within our church in our reports." The following are the proper forms of recommendations for persons desiring help from the Board:

BLANKS FOR STUDENTS' RECOMMENDATIONS.

"We, the undersigned, a committee appointed by the Board of Education to examine and judge of the fitness of applicants for aid among the students of ————, hereby certify that we have inquired into the case of ————, now a student in this institution, and that we find his age to be ————, and that he is in sound health, of good natural powers of intellect and ability to learn, a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church in good and regular standing, and that he is in need of pecuniary aid in prosecuting his studies; and we do therefore recommend his application to the favorable consideration of the Board."

Where no special committee is appointed the president or principal of the institution and the preacher in charge may act as such committee. Students not at any school should procure a certificate like the following:

"The Quarterly Meeting Conference for ______, having made due inquiry respecting ______, who is a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church in this charge, find that he possesses the gifts and graces that promise usefulness in the ministry, and that there is good reason to believe that he is divinely called to the work, and that he needs pecuniary assistance in the prosecution of his studies."

The above certificate should be signed by the presiding elder and the secretary.

It is evident that at present only a very limited number can receive help from the Board; but it is hoped that by faithfully taking the collections for education in all our churches, and observing the second Sabbath in June as Children's day in all our Sunday-schools, a fund will soon be accumulated which will be largely available for this purpose. It is important that none of our ministers neglect this collection. The demand of the times is for an educated ministry, and as a church we must not fail to meet the responsibilities which are upon us.

We recommend the following persons as visitors to the Garrett Biblical Institute: Revs. I. N. Elwood, Thos. Stalker, and A. F. Bourns. Laymen, J. C. Clark and Wm. B. Clay.

ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

[Adopted September 8th.]

Your committee are happy to report that the good cause involved in the Sunday-school work moves steadily on. There is no abatement of interest, nor of appliances, nor of success; but rather an increase of all. With an army of more than one million and a quarter of Sunday-school scholars under the direction of more than one hundred and ninety thousand officers and teachers, the Methodist Episcopal Church of this land is doing a great work for the Master.

Your committee would most earnestly recommend to the members of this Conference, most of whom are pastors of the Church of God, that during the year to come they give even more careful and prayerful attention to the instruction of the children and youth in the Sunday-school. Let them encourage this work by frequent and earnest words from their pulpits, by their presence in the schools, and by their prayers everywhere. We would recommend now as ever the use of the Sunday-School Advocate in our schools. It is a messenger of power as well as of peace. Let our schools be well supplied with copies of this paper.

We very earnestly express our approval of the use of the "Berean Lesson Leaf." Let pastors seek to introduce it wherever it is not now used. Wherever it is used its value is known. It is desirable, also, that teachers especially be supplied with the Teacher's Journal. Let the pastors see to it well that the shelves of the Sunday-school libraries are kept well-filled, if possible. A single book from the library may be of greater service to a scholar in a single week than a teacher is in a whole year. We would most heartily express our appreciation of the services of the Rev. J. M. Arnold in this cause during the past year among us. Whether as preacher, or lecturer, or counselor, or distributor of books, his services have been of great value to the Sunday-school cause; and we would request his reappointment as Sunday-school agent for the coming year. We would further and finally recommend, in accordance with the suggestion of the Secretary of the Sunday-School Union, that Sunday, October 19th, 1873, be observed as a day of special prayer and labor for the success of the Sunday-school cause; and that upon that day a collection be taken in behalf of the Sunday-School Union of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

LADIES' AND PASTORS' CHRISTIAN UNION.

Whereas the last General Conference provided for the organization of a Ladies' and Pastors' Christian Union of the M. E. Church, your committee would recommend the following constitution for this Conference:

ARTICLE 1. This association shall be known as the Detroit Conference Association of t he Ladies' and Pastors' Christian Union.

ART. 2. Its object shall be to organize auxiliaries to the Ladies' and Pastors' Christian Union, and to supervise its work throughout the Conference.

ART. 3. All members of the Conference, and all members of the Ladies' and Pastors' Christian Union within its limits, shall be members of this association.

ART. 4. The officers of this association shall be a president, three or more vice-presidents, a recording and a corresponding secretary, who together shall constitute an executive committee.

ART. 5. The duties of these officers shall be those usually devolving upon such officers, with the addition of those of the corresponding secretary, of careful correspondence with the secretaries of auxiliary societies, the doing all in her power to encourage and increase their zeal in the work, and also reporting each meeting to the corresponding secretary of the Parent Society.

ART. 6, The meetings of this association shall be held during the sessions of Conference, at which time reports shall be required of all auxiliaries within the bounds of the Conference.

ON THE SANCTITY OF THE SABBATH.

[Adopted September 9th.]

The increase of Sabbath desecration, especially in our cities, is an alarming feature in the history of American civilization which may well excite alarm in the mind of every lover of his country as well as Christian. It indicates a changing sentiment in the minds of the American people as to the moral obligations to devote a seventh portion of time to rest, to quiet reflection, and to the worship of God. With the great mass of the people the Sabbath is no longer a holy day, but a holiday; it is no more a day of rest, but of pleasure, and of such kind of pleasuretaking as involves more toil for tens of thousands of our citizens than the business of the other days of the week. The reports of the police courts show that there are more arrests for drunkenness on the Sabbath than on other days. Christian congregations are disturbed by the proximity of crowded and noisy saloons, and Christian worshipers are annoyed on their way to and from the house of God by the intemperance and disorder of the streets. The merciful provision of God for the well-being of society is being robbed of its blessedness by the selfishness of men, and combined and persistent efforts are being made to secure the repeal of those wholesome state laws which have hitherto guaranteed to us the rest and quiet of the Sabbath, and given a national sanction to the sanctity of that day which, as a Christian nation, we have regarded as the Lord's.

It becomes a serious question what can be done to arrest these evils which threaten to sap the foundations of our Christian civilization. 1st. As Christian citizens we are entitled to demand legal protection. The most eminent statesmen and jurists have affirmed again and again that this country is a Christian country, and that "Christianity is, and always has been, a part of the common law of the land." Daniel Webster made the following declaration on this subject: "There is nothing we regard

with more certainty than this principle, that Christianity is part of the law of the land-general, tolerant Christianity: Christianity independent of sects and parties: that Christianity to which sword and faggot are unknown: general, tolerant Christianity is the law of the land." And Judge Story, in his "Commentary on the Constitution," says, "It is the special duty of government to foster and cherish Christianity among all its citizens and subjects." The Christianity of America is a "tolerant Christianity." It allows men of all religions-Jews and Greeks, Catholics and Protestants, Buddhists and Mohammedans, to dwell in our borders, to exercise the rights of citizenship, and to conduct their religious worship according to their own convictions of duty. It does not compel any one to keep the Christian Sabbath after our fashion, or worship God in our way. But it does demand that legal sanction shall be given by a Christian state to the Christian Sabbath; that one day in seven every man shall have exemption from toil, and that no human being, as master or as employer, shall stand between a Christian and the law of his God which secures to him a Sabbath for rest, for worship, and for religious instruction. And furthermore, it demands that Christians shall be protected by law from all disturbance and hindrance in the exercise of their rights to worship God according to the dictates of Scripture and conscience. Whatever can by fair interpretation be shown to be a nuisance, a source of disturbance or hindrance to the quiet enjoyment of the Sabbath, he has a right to demand shall be prohibited by law.

2nd. It is incumbent upon us that, both by teaching and example, we do all in our power to awaken and deepen the sense of the sanctity of the Sabbath in the public conscience. We must "call the Sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord and honorable: and honor God by not doing our own work, or finding our own pleasure, or speaking our own words on His holy day." No human legislation can awaken a sense of sacredness, or constrain a becoming reverence for the Sabbath day, so effectually as the education of the family, and the conscientious care of Christians to avoid every violation of the command to "keep holy the Sabbath day." A return even to Puritanical strictness in the practice of Christians, without seeking to enforce our modes of observance by state legislation, would be a blessing to the Church and to the world. Let no secular work be done on the Sabbath that can be avoided by the forethought of the previous day—the "preparation day" of olden times; let Sunday traveling be avoided beyond what is strictly necessary to reach our places of worship; let secular newspapers disappear in our households, and worldly conversation be avoided; and then we shall soon see a higher tone of moral feeling spreading in the community, and above all we shall inherit the bless. ing which God has promised to those who keep His Sabbaths and reverence His sanctuaries. "I will make thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father. This will I do for thee and not forsake thee."

We offer for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we will, by our example and by our public ministrations, seek to elevate public sentiment with regard to the sanctity of the Sabbath, and lead as far as possible the citizens of our commonwealth to "remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy."

Resolved, That we will use all lawful means to secure the enforcement of existing laws against the prevalent desecration of the Sabbath; also, to obtain such legislation as shall guarantee the rights of Sabbath-observing Christians and citizens to worship God in harmony with their convictions of duty without being disturbed by crowded, noisy saloons, public processions, and demoralizing "beer-gardens."

ON MEMOIRS.

[Adopted September 9th.]

REV. SOLOMON S. LITTLEFIELD, a superannuate, died Dec. 3, 1872, in Detroit. Bro. Littlefield was born in Verona, Oneida county, N. Y., April 22, 1829. He came to Michigan when but a lad, with his parents, and settled in the north of Monroe county. Here he was brought to a saving knowledge of the truth, in his fourteenth year, and immediately united with the M. E. Church, of which his parents were honored members. He was licensed and united with the Michigan Conference, which then embraced the whole state, in September, 1862, and was assigned to Medina as junior preacher. The next year he was appointed in charge of Rome circuit. Ever after this, while he was able to do effective work he was in charge. He was a very diligent and faithful minister, a prudent and careful administrator of discipline, and true to all the interests of the church. In August, 1854, he was married to Miss Ophelia A. Baylies, who has proved to be a most worthy companion, and who with three children is left to mourn. His remains were deposited in the family cemetery at Grafton, Monroe county, Mich. Bro. Littlefield was a most worthy man and sound minister, having had a genuine Christian experience. He truly adorned the doctrine of God our Savior, and walked worthy of the vocation wherewith he was called. In patience and faith he possessed his soul. For a number of years past his health was such that he had to be placed on the retired or superannated list. In this relation he did what he could for the Master's cause, having all the while an ardent desire to do good and promote piety. His last sickness was very severe for most of the time. He had been so as to be around and do something in the way of canvassing for books, and the like, until about the 6th of September, when he was prostrated by disease from which he never rallied. But the spirit is free from its suffering body, and has gone to be with his Lord, which is far better than to be here.
