Explanation of the Articles of the Calendar.

These pages are calculated for Toronto and Quebec, and for ordinary purposes will serve with sufficient accuracy for every city in Canada.

MOON'S PHASES.—This Table gives the times for the two meridians when the moon passes the geocentric longitude of 0°, 90°, 180° and 270° east of the sun. It gives also the times of her greatest and least distance from the earth.

TWILIGHT.—In this table are given the times at which twilight begins in the morning and ends in the evening, &c. the times when the sun's centre is 18° below the horizon.

GREATEST ELONGATION OF THE POLE STAR.—This column gives the greatest azimuth of the Pole Star east or west from the meridian as observed at a place in latitude 45°. When the greatest elongation corresponding to any other latitude is required, the number given in the column should be corrected by means of the following table.

The 1st correction for the degrees of latitude is to be subtracted from the greatest elongation given in the calendar or added to it, according as the degrees of latitude are less or greater than 45°.

The 2nd correction, which is always additive, is found by multiplying the number given in the third line of the table by the number of minutes in the latitude.

THE PLANETS.—The times of rising and setting of the five chief planets are calculated for Toronto, and are corrected for refraction. The times of culmination, although computed for the meridian of Toronto, will serve approximately for the whole of Canada. The meridian zenith distances, being designed merely to aid in finding the planets, have been given only to the nearest tenth of a degree, as seen from the latitude of Toronto.

When the planetary day is shorter than the mean solar day, and commences soon after the midnight of the preceding day, the planet will sometimes arrive a second time on the meridian before the expiration of the actual civil day. From analogous causes a planet will sometimes rise twice or set twice in the same civil day. When two culminations occur in the same day, or two risings or settings, the times of both are registered.

The times of the SUN'S RISING AND SETTING are given for the upper limb, and are corrected for refraction both for Toronto and Quebec.

The MOON'S RISING is given from full to change, and her setting from change to full.

The MOON'S MERIDIAN ZENITH DISTANCES are given to the nearest tenth of a degree for Toronto. They are corrected for parallax or refraction.

The column SUN ON MERIDIAN gives the time that a watch should shew when the shadow of a sun dial is on the noon mark.

DECLINATION OF THE SUN AT APPARENT NOON.—This column gives the sun's declination at the instant he passes the meridian of Toronto.

MOON'S AGE.—This column shews to the nearest tenth of a day the Moon's age at Toronto Noon.

The column, MOON ON THE MERIDIAN, gives the mean time at which the moon's centre passes the meridian of Toronto.

The column, UPPER TRANSIT OF POLE STAR shews for every day the mean time at which the Pole Star makes its upper transit across the meridian of Toronto. It passes in the morning from April 9th to October 8th, and in the evening the rest of the year.

The five last columns, although computed for Toronto, will serve with sufficient accuracy for the whole of Canada.

The time at which the lower transit of the Pole Star occurs may be found by adding 11 h. 58 m. 2 s. to the time of preceding upper transit.

From the time of the upper transit of the polestar may be found the time of its greatest western or eastern elongation, by adding or subtracting the constants given in the annexed Table.

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From the times of the upper transit of the Pole Star may be derived, with the aid of the following table, the times of culmination, and of the rising and setting of the principal fixed stars that appear above the horizon of Toronto.

Star Table.

To ascertain when any star found in the following table will be on the meridian, add the number in the left-hand column of figures to the preceding meridian transit of the pole star given in the calendar. To find the time of rising of a star, subtract the number opposite to it in the right-hand column of figures from the time of its meridian passage. For the setting of a star, add the same number to the time of its meridian passage. Those stars marked (.....) revolve in a circle of perpetual apparition, and do not rise or set at Toronto, or at places to the north of Toronto.

Eclipse.

In the year 1862 there will be three Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

- I.—A total Eclipse of the Moon, June 11, 1862, visible in Canada.
- II.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, June 20, invisible in Canada.
- III.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, November 21, invisible in Canada.
- IV.—A total Eclipse of the Moon, Dec. 5, visible in Canada.
- V.—Partial Eclipse of the Sun, Dec. 20, invisible in Canada.

I.—TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE MOON, June 11.

The first contact with the shadow occurs at 67° from the northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the East, and the last contact at 70° towards the West; in each case for direct image.

Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter = 1) 1·104.

The last contact with the Penumbra will occur after the Moon has set; and at Quebec the time of last contact with the shadow will coincide very nearly with the time at which the Moon will set.

II.—PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, JUNE 26.

This Eclipse will be visible at the Cape of Good Hope, in the eastern coasts of Australia, and in parts of the intermediate Oceans.

III.—PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, November 21.

This Eclipse is only visible in a small portion of the Southern Ocean, above the parallel of 60°.

IV.—TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE MOON, December 5.

The first contact with the shadow occurs at 102° from the northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the east and the last contact 104° towards the west.

Magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's diameter = 1) 1.400.

ABSTRACT OF METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS, Made at the Magnetical Observatory, Toronto.

For the year of our Lord 1860; compiled from Reports, &c., published in the Canadian Journal.

Temperature.—The mean temperature of the year 1860 was 44.92, a number exceeding by 0.20 the average of 21 years. This small excess was due to the mildness generally of the Spring and Autumn, since the means of both the Summer and Winter months were mostly below the average.

The range of the year, the mean of the monthly ranges, and the mean of the daily ranges, were respectively 96.55, 45.993, and 71.24; which, compared with 108.911, 48.908, and 16.241, the corresponding numbers for the period 1853-60, indicate a general moderation in the fluctuations of temperature.

The warmest day was July 19, with a mean of 75.90, and the coldest, Dec. 14, when the mean was 1.908. The extremes of temperature for the year (88.50 and -8.95) occurred on July 19 & Feb. 1. The former was 2.94 below, and the latter 3.92 above, the averages of the yearly maxima and minima.

There were 32 days in which the mean of the day differed from the normal by 1.29 and upwards. Of these none occurred in the summer months, but were distributed through the rest of the year in a tolerably regular progression, their frequency increasing with a decreasing temperature, and reaching a maximum in February. In grouping together the four years terminating with 1860, a well-marked double progression becomes apparent with a second or inferior maximum in June. If regard be had, not to the number of abnormal daily means but to the amount of abnormal variation of each observation, without reference to any arbitrary limit, it will be found that the aggregate of these variations in the several months derived from a series of six years conform to a double progression, similar to that above described, the principal maximum of mean abnormal variation 10.21 occurring in February; the two minima, 5.21 and 4.93, in May and August; and the second maximum, 5.97, in June, the mean for the whole year being 4.97.

Barometer.—The mean height of the barometer for the year differed from the average of the past thirteen years by -.0276 inches, an usually large difference as compared with other years. The mean of the monthly differences from their respective averages, and without regard to sign, was small, being only .0449 inches against .0509 inches, the corresponding number for the period 1855-60.

The extremes of pressure were within narrow limits as regards their amount, and were separated by an interval of only 138 hours, the maximum, 30.267 inches, having occurred on December 14, at 5 P.M., and the minimum, 28.838 inches, on December 20, at 11 A.M.

The days of excessive abnormal variation, in which the mean pressure of the day differed by .200 inches, and up-

wards from the normal, were 115, a number somewhat larger than usual. The law of their distribution among the months is not so well marked as in the case of temperature, but their greater frequency in the winter than the summer months is sufficiently obvious, being 19 in 5 in December and August of 1860, and on the aggregate of four years, 50 in December and 17 in August. Whether the aggregate amounts of the abnormal variations in all the observations in each month be compared, as will be found to prevail in the distribution resemble very closely in its general character that just stated.

Humidity.—The mean humidity of the year was which is rather in excess of that of the preceding year. Its distribution among the several months was more than usually equable.

Clouds.—The extent of sky clouded, in accordance with the experience of former years, amounted to three-fifths of the hemisphere on the average of the year. July & Aug. were the clearest months, and Dec. the most clouded.

Wind.—The resultant direction of the wind was N.W. (almost identical with that of 1859), and the resultant velocity 3.32 miles. The mean velocity was 8.55 miles which shows a still further increase in the velocity of preceding year. The day of greatest wind was March 1 when the velocity averaged 28.83 miles; and the calmest day was February 4, when the mean velocity was 0.055 miles per hour. The greatest velocity recorded in whole hour was 40.6 miles, from 8 P.M. to 9 P.M. on Feb. 1.

The most windy hours on the average of the year were from 1 P.M. to 2 P.M., and from 2 P.M. to 3 P.M., with a velocity in each case of 11.17 miles; and the calmest hour from 1 A.M. to 2 A.M., when the mean velocity was 6.91 miles.

Rain and Snow.—The depth of rain was 23.434 inches or nearly 10 inches less than in 1859, a deficiency having occurred in every month but February, July and August. The amount of snow (45.6 inches) was also below the average to the extent of 15.3 inches, and the rain and the snow combined fell short of the average by 8.589 inches. While the quantity of rain and snow was deficient, the number of days on which rain fell was about 8 per cent. the number of days of snow 2 per cent., and the number of rain or snow about 5 per cent. greater than the average of the past six years.

July was the most rainy month in respect to the amount of rain, and May in respect to its frequency. Even snow is taken into account and reckoned as rain, July maintains its predominance in the amount of precipitation, but the max. of frequency is then transferred to December.

The heaviest fall of rain was 1.265 inches on December 19, and the heaviest fall of snow 9 inches on February 15.

Thunderstorms.—Of the 81 thunderstorms recorded, the earliest took place on February 22, and the latest on Oct. 15. The storm of August 24 was one of great violence.

Auroras.—Of 68 auroras, the most brilliant occurred March 26, 27, and September 6 & 15.

OMET, MONTREAL.—It would be quite impossible for us to give any general calculations or tables in reference to comet. We may state that the Comet which visited our Earth during the early part of July last past appears to have been a stranger. Mr Breen states, "from observations made by Mr. Buckingham and myself I have deduced the following elements of the Comet: Perihelion passage, June 11, 6759; longitude of perihelion, 249 degrees 15 min. sec.; longitude of ascending node, 278 deg. 59 min. 321 sec.; inclination = 85 deg. 38 min. 57 sec.; log. least distance 0.9147624. Motion direct. This proves that it is not the expected comet of Charles V." Mr. Hind expresses an opinion that it is not only possible, but even probable, that in the course of Sunday, June 30, the earth passed such the tail of the comet at a distance of perhaps two-thirds of its length from the nucleus. A few years since Sabinet expressed his opinion before the French Academy of Sciences that we might pass through the mass of a tail without being aware of it. The length of the tail of this comet was upwards of 80 degrees, and the rate at which it moved through the heavens was over two and a half millions of miles in the twenty-four hours.

ESTIC, NORWICH.—Apogee ($\alpha\pi\sigma$, from, and $\gamma\eta$, the earth). That point in the orbit of a planet which is at the greatest distance from the earth. The ancients regarded the earth as fixed in the centre of the system, and therefore reckoned to the sun with the planets, an apogee; but the moderns, considering the sun as the centre, use the terms perihelion and aphelion to denote the least and greatest distance of the planets from that orb. The sun's apogee, before it is strictness the earth's aphelion. Apogee is properly applicable to the moon. Perigee is the reverse of apogee being that point of the moon's orbit which is nearest to the earth: and when the moon has arrived at this point she is said to be in her perigee. Perigee from $\pi\epsilon\rho\iota$, about, and $\gamma\eta$, the earth.

Asks why a clock goes slower at the equator than in a higher latitude? It depends on the force of gravity. Greater the force the time of vibration of a pendulum is less, consequently quicker the clock. Now for the force of gravity diminishes from the equator to the poles, therefore at the equator a clock will go slower than in a higher lat.

COTTON.

The year now closed promises to mark an important epoch in the history of the COTTON TRADE. In Canada, by an effort to introduce the manufacture of cotton goods as a commercial enterprise, and as the means of employing her surplus urban population. In England, by the efforts of her manufacturers to develop new sources whence they may draw supplies of the raw material. By their determination to occupy a position of comparative Independence as to the fluctuations of the cotton crop; in the Southern States, whether produced by political or other causes. But especially by the violent disruption of the American Union, brought about by issues that mainly affect the cultivation of the Cotton Plant, and by the imposition of duties for the avowed purpose of protecting the northern manufacturer at the expense of the consumer.

A brief notice of the rise and progress of an interest so intimately connected with and in no small degree influencing such important events in the march of time, may properly occupy a few pages of the CANADIAN ALMANAC.

It is not our purpose to trace the history of Cotton. Spinning back to the heroic ages, nor to cite HERODOTUS as witness to the quality of the cotton fabrics of India. Those of our readers who explore classical authors, or who are given to historical research, may find how the cotemporaries of STRABO practiced the art of printing calicoes; and PLINY will describe to them the *gossypium* plant, from whose "woolly down was made the beautiful robes which the priests of Egypt delighted to wear." MARCO POLO will tell in quaint phrases what progress the manufacture of cotton goods had made in his day, in the far off Empire of CATHAY; and in the "precepts of Eben el Awan" may be read all that was known to the Arabs of the culture and use of the plant whose products now figure so largely in our commercial statistics.

* Gossypium—Cotton, a genus of plants, of the class M. nadelphia, order polyandria, Linn. The American species is termed G. hirsutum, the short-staple, or upland cotton.

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Our business shall be with the Cotton Trade of the present generation; to relate in brief terms the steps by which it has grown to its present gigantic proportions—to nearly a third of the commercial enterprise of that great empire whose commerce envelops the globe.

Among the many wonderful developments of industrial enterprise, the growth of the Cotton manufacture in BRITAIN is beyond comparison the most remarkable. In the first year of the present century the Cotton goods exported from the United Kingdom were valued at £355,000 sterling. In 1860 their value was declared to be £2,013,482 sterling; and those taken for home consumption were estimated to be worth £40,000,000.

But great as is the contrast between the Cotton exports of the first year of the present century and the value of the Cotton fabrics exported and taken for home consumption in 1860, the figures fail to convey anything like an adequate idea of the wonderful strides that have been made in the productive powers of British industry, skill and enterprise. Valued at the prices obtained prior to 1815, the cotton goods now annually produced in Britain would be worth upwards of four hundred and fifty millions pounds sterling. At the former period, the average value of a yard of manufactured cotton was 17½d., now it is only 3½d.;—or is this all,—the article produced at the latter price is greatly superior in texture, appearance, and in durability, to the more costly fabrics manufactured prior to the inventions of Hargreaves, Compton, Arkwright, and others, to whose ingenuity England is indebted for one of the most important of her commercial interests, and the world for putting within reach of the poor-st labourer, luxuries that century earlier could hardly be obtained by the wealthiest noble.

If such figures inadequately represent the annual productive value of the factories of Great Britain, at what capital sum shall we rate the brain labour of those men who have perfected the machinery wherewith such results have been achieved? If England's commercial supremacy is the chief element of her greatness and glory; if commerce is the best missionary of civilization, certain it is that the inventors of those wonderfully productive agents are entitled to a conspicuous niche among the benefactors of the human race and contributors to their country's greatness.

Having in mind the essential maxim of that excellent patron, Mrs. Glass, we shall grow our cotton before we plant it. To this end—as an acre of land, with the best management, will only yield 100 lbs. of the cleaned wool, we must have annually under crop, to meet the current consumption of Europe and America, not less than 9,000,000 acres; and, to ensure a proper rotation, not less than fifty seven millions of acres of land are required for the production of the 1871 millions of lbs. of cotton wool that feed the spindles of the European and American manufactories. It is probable that an equal quantity is necessary for the Asiatic and African looms, therefore it is fortunate that the "*gossypium*" is indigenous to so large a portion of the earth's surface, and that it has been capable of naturalization in latitudes extending thirty-five degrees on each side of the equator. It has been cultivated in Italy, in Sicily, and in the south of France. Egypt and Brazil supply large quantities of a superior quality, and recently it has been cultivated in Australia and at the Cape.

Notwithstanding the wide range over which the cultivation of this plant may be extended, embracing the most important colonies of Britain, it is a singular fact that the attention of British capitalists has not until recently been directed to the promotion of its cultivation, and the vast interests involved in the manufacture of its products have been almost entirely dependent on the American plantations;—so much so that, in 1856, it was boasted by a writer in a New Orleans periodical, that "of the four millions of bales annually consumed, three and a half millions were produced in the Southern States of the Union."

Since, and indeed for some time previous to the "secession" of the Cotton States, the attention of the British manufacturers has been thoroughly aroused to the danger of their position, and it is almost certain that the world's now being made will stimulate the production of cotton to an extent that will give as wide a range of markets for the purchase of raw material as there now is for the sale of manufactured goods. There is no valid reason why they should be short of this desirable result, for it has been abundantly demonstrated that labour is most abundant in those countries where the soil and climate is most suitable for the culture of cotton, and only

requires the enterprise and organization of the Anglo-Saxon to fructify it to the work.

The first impulse has been towards India. When the Russian war seriously interfered with the supply of hemp, India supplied its place with "Jute" and "Saxa." When British forests were found insufficient to supply the dock-yards with timber, India gave them "Teak." And now, when the folly and presumption of man threatens to interfere with the accustomed supply of cotton, India is looked to for the means to fill the threatened gap. Nor will she fail. In that vast region, embraced by the Indus and the Himalaya Mountains, and bounded by the Indian Ocean and the Bay of Bengal, there exists a population closely approximating upon 200,000,000, fully two-thirds of whom are subjects of the British Crown; these, from a period anterior to historic record, have been clothed in cotton. The total quantity of cotton grown in India, according to Dr. Watson, amounts to upwards of 2,400,000,000 lbs. per annum, and demand for its culture certainly not less than 24,000,000 of acres.

Great as is the acreage above indicated—nearly three times that of the American cotton fields—it is but small in comparison with the vast extent of British India. The cotton tract in the valley of the Godavary alone is said to be of greater extent than the whole American cotton field. Guzerat under the present demand is expected to send forward, during the current year, not less than three hundred millions of lbs. and this district is not one hundredth part of India. It has been said, on what may be deemed good authority, that more cotton is annually washed in India than is grown in America; and there is no doubt but that, by stimulating the production, not only will the culture be extended over a greater area, but the productive power of the land will be materially increased. If to the completion of the works of irrigation already in progress, and the construction of railways, is added the stimulus of high prices in Liverpool, it seems reasonable to conclude that the supply of cotton from India will rapidly increase.

A recent writer justly observes that, "up to the present, the supply from India has been entirely influenced and overawed by that from America. Omitting years like 1855, when New Orleans cotton was selling at 10½d., and Surats (or East India) at 7½d.; and coming down to later days, when American cotton was selling in Liverpool nearly as low as 4d. and Surats at 3d., we shall see reason to conclude that the development of the power of India to compete with America is in one respect a question of price."

Indian cotton is often delayed for months at the place of its growth by want of transport, during which period it is subject to a deterioration of at least ¼d. per lb. The cost of growing it is estimated at 1½d. per lb., it costs another 1½d. to carry it to Bombay (or other point of export), and the freight to Liverpool adds another 1d. per lb.; hence it cannot be sold in England at less than 4d. per lb.

In 1845, the largest crop ever produced (up to that date) in America was brought to market, and the price of the superior grades fell to a point which compelled the holder of Indian cotton to sell at 3d. per lb. This inflicted an actual loss of 1d. per lb., and purchasers for the European market withdrew their agents from India. As a consequence, the exports during the following year fell to about one half their previous quantity. On the other hand, when, in 1856, the price of American cotton in Liverpool had risen to 6d. per lb., and Indian to 4½d., there was imported in the succeeding year the greatest quantity ever received from India, namely, 250,000,000 lbs.

In 1788 the efforts of the East India Company were first directed to the promotion of the growth of Cotton, and to the improvement of its quality. In the same year was made the first exportation of Indian Cotton to England. In 1814 the exports to England amounted to 4,000,000 of pounds, and they have since increased in the following ratio:—

Next after India we may refer to the gradually increasing production of Cotton in Egypt. Its cultivation was first promoted by Mahmood Pacha, who, as sooner became convinced of the fitness of the soil and climate, than he set about the prosecution of the enterprise with such vigor and sagacity, that within two years he exported nearly six thousand bales of a superior quality to England. In 1858 this quantity had been advanced to 38,248,112 lbs., and in the same year France obtained 7,434,300 lbs. from

the same source. In 1855 the total quantity exported was 55,874,300 pounds, and the home consumption was estimated at from five to six millions of pounds.

England also receives large quantities of cotton wool from Brazil. In 1849 the quantity approximated closely upon 31,000,000 pounds, and though it hardly reached 23,000,000 in 1850, this falling off is attributed to competition with American supplies, and to the fact that in Brazil Cotton can not be successfully cultivated near the coast; the difficulty of transporting it from the interior adds so much to its cost as to render it unprofitable. The Brazilian Government has offered encouragement for the construction of Railways, by guaranteeing interest on the outlay, and they are in process of construction by British capitalists. Their completion will remove the main difficulty to the increase of the Cotton culture, and the exports will unquestionably be largely increased.

India, Egypt and Brazil are not the only resources to which the British manufacturer can resort for his raw Cotton. At the present moment importations of Cotton arrive in Liverpool from five distinct regions of the earth, the United States, India, Egypt, Brazil, and the West Indies. Samples have also been produced from the Western parts of Africa, as well as from Australia and Natal, of excellent staple and general goodness. The quantity as yet obtained is small. But let us call to mind the rapidity with which the American supply has reached its present importance: less than seventy years ago the exports of Cotton from the United States were nil; in 1794 they exported but 5,340 bales of 300 lbs. each, which embraced the entire crop. If such small amounts have expanded to the present enormous production, who shall say that Africa, with its teeming population and genial climate, will not speedily increase its modest contribution of 21 bales in 1850, to an amount which, if not equal to that now sent from America, may yet startle us by rapidity of increase. It appears from the narratives of Clapperton and Launders that Cotton is grown very extensively in all parts of Africa. Dr. Livingstone tells us of vast ranges of country suitable for the cultivation of the plant. In one place, he says, "The markets are well supplied with provisions by great numbers of women, every one of whom is seen spinning cotton with a spindle and distaff, exactly like those which were in use among the ancient Egyptians. * * * The cotton was brought to the market for s'ls., and I bought a pound for a penny. This was the price demanded, and probably double what they ask for each other. We saw the cotton growing luxuriantly all around the market-place from seeds dropped accidentally. It is seen also about the native huts * * * We met on the road natives passing with bundles of cops or spindles full of cotton thread, and these they were carrying to other parts to be woven into cloth." In a country so congenial to the production of the staple, with a population naturally docile, though fond of display, there requires but the opportunity and the knowledge that they can at once exchange the raw material, so easily obtained, for the fabric they so highly prize, to induce them to apply themselves to cultivating and collecting it at such points as may be selected by the European traders for making the exchange.

Summing up the supplies obtained from all quarters we find that England in 1859 received 1,220 millions of pounds of Cotton wool, of which 962 millions went from the United States, and the remaining 258 millions from all other countries; and that in 1860 this enormous quantity had increased to 1,391 millions of pounds.

Such facts, shewing as they do the vast preponderance of the supply obtained from one source over that obtained from all others, have not failed to produce their effect on the public mind of the mother country. We find Mr. J. B. Smith holding the following language in a paper read before the Society of Arts in 1857: "It is much to be desired that our supplies of the raw material for so great a manufacture should be derived from a variety of sources, that we may, so far as possible, be thus protected from the fluctuations in prices incident to good or bad seasons; but, unfortunately, they are chiefly derived from one source. * * * But not only are we exposed to the danger of being limited chiefly to one source of supply, but to a still greater hazard, namely, that this supply is the production of slave labor. It may be that the institution of slavery, although condemned by all civilized nations, may yet exist for ages in the United States; or it may happen that occurrences may any day endanger its continuance. The alarm created by recent symptoms of discontent among the slaves in that country, is evidence that their owners themselves are not without apprehen-

sions of danger; and it is impossible for those interested in the Cotton manufactures of this country to contemplate with unconcern the insecurity on which this vast manufacture rests. This is not a local question—it has become a great national question—and must be forced upon the attention of statesmen of all parties. To me it appears the importance of the subject can scarcely be overated."

With such motives to action, so forcibly expressed by one who had the ear of those most interested four years ago, it is not likely that our manufacturers are so unprepared as our neighbours imagine,—with the necessity of dealing promptly with this great question, so prominently brought home to them by the present disturbances in the United States and the consequent attempt to blockade the cotton ports of the Southern Confederacy,—with so wide a field for action before them,—we may be sure that the commercial enterprise of Britain will not sleep.

It will not be long ere the absurdity of that rooted idea of the Southern planter—we may almost add, of the Northern merchant—that "*cotton is king*," will be fully demonstrated; and they will then awake to the conviction that they are but as the flies on the rim of the wheel, and must struggle for dear life to find customers for their bales in the over-stocked markets of the world. The quarrel which was arrogantly assumed to be the precursor of the downfall of the commercial supremacy of Great Britain, bids fair to be the immediate cause of largely increasing and cheapening the world's supply of the raw material, and of giving a greater impulse to the productive powers of the British looms than any thing that has happened since the inventions of Hargreaves, Arkwright, and Watt.

As with many other branches of manufacture, that of Cotton was driven into England by the tyranny of continental rulers. It first took root in Manchester about the beginning of the 17th century, where it was encouraged by the municipal authorities granting to the political and religious refugees (who brought the art with them) valuable privileges for a nominal consideration, such as the privilege of cutting timber for their looms in the extensive forests owned by the Warden and Fellows of Manchester College. The industrious immigrant was also encouraged by privileges from the Crown. "The provident Elizabeth," says l'Abbé de Smet, "did not confine her views to the relief of her religious partizans, but sought to transfer into her kingdom those prosperous trades of the low countries which adjoining states had looked upon with invidious eyes."

At this time the operative weaver had usually his residence in the country, where, in his garden plot, he eked out his earnings by the cultivation of his small holding. This was a necessity. The uncertainty of procuring a regular supply of material for his loom rendering his legitimate work exceedingly precarious.

The fly shuttle was invented by Kaye of Bury in 1750, and, in 1760, James Hargreaves had perfected important improvements in the carding processes. In 1762, the father of the late Sir Robert Peel erected one of his improved machines at Blackburn, which did not materially differ from those now in use. In 1757, the same James Hargreaves invented the SPINNING JENNY, and after several unsuccessful attempts succeeded in producing a machine with which he could spin eight threads at once. He speedily improved on his first attempt, and constructed a JENNY to run eighty spindles. This may be considered as the leading step in that march of discovery which has improved every branch of the manufacture.

Like other benefactors of the human race, Mr. Hargreaves was not destined to reap much advantage from his discoveries. He was hunted from his native place, and settled in Nottingham, where he shortly after died—if not in great poverty, as has been asserted—certainly in very indifferent circumstances.

About the same time, Mr. Arkwright, of Preston in Lancashire, gave his attention to the improvement of spinning machinery. He was brought up to the humble occupation of a barber, but seems to have been endowed with a rare combination of inventive talent, and a capacity for business. His want of mechanical skill was compensated by arduous and perseverance, and he succeeded, after many struggles with adverse circumstances, in perfecting that rare piece of mechanism called at first the *Water Frame*, and subsequently the *Throstle*, which performs of itself the whole process of spinning, leaving to the workman only the duty of supplying it with material and of plying such threads as are accidentally broken.

In partnership with Mr. Strutt, a man of great mechanical ability, Mr. Arkwright erected a mill at Nottingham for spinning yarn with his machinery. In 1771, he re-

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moved to Cromford, where he erected another mill, and there he continued to follow up his first great invention, with many important though subordinate improvements. He was not however to enjoy the fruits of his invention without dispute. Like Hargreaves, he was first persecuted as an innovator; then, when the value of his inventions was demonstrated by the work they produced, his patents were contested, and, had it not been for his business tact, his inventions would have been pirated by the very men who had ridiculed them, and persecuted him.

It is commonly believed—and often appealed to as a fact by the advocates of protection to home manufactures—that the factory system of Great Britain was fostered into existence by protective duties. So far as this branch of no system is concerned, nothing can be more erroneous. It fought its way in the face of adverse laws. No sooner had Arkwright and his partners surmounted the mechanical difficulties that lay in their path than they discovered that they were doomed to ruin, unless they could command sufficient wealth and influence to obtain the repeal of preposterous legislative enactments. It was not until 1774 that Parliament was pleased to recognize the priority of permitting genuine cotton fabrics to be made and sold, and then only under vexatious excise restrictions. The prudent lawgivers had previously considered it a necessary stroke of policy to ensure the consumption of home grown articles by requiring that a certain proportion of every fabric should be composed of *linen yarn*. It required no small degree of energy, and involved very great expenditure of time, to beat down the influence wielded by the defenders of home productions.

About 1792, Samuel Compton learned to spin with one Hargreave's *Jennys*, and, being dissatisfied with the quality of the yarn produced, he set about improving it. His efforts resulted in the *mule*. With his machine—simple, not being a mechanic, he had elaborated under great difficulties—he produced a superior article, which excited the public mind, and he was so beset by the prying curiosity of the country people, that in order to get rid of the vexation he exhibited his invention to those who choose to subscribe a guinea each. In this way he raised about fifty pounds, with which he constructed a superior and larger machine. He took out no patent, but subsequently received £5000 from Parliament.

When Arkwright's patents were cancelled, and the use of his nice preparatory processes became general, the full due of Compton's inventions became known, and the use of the *Mule Jenny* marked an important era in the history of the Cotton Manufacture.

The enormous productiveness of the spinning machinery which never before had been utilized, had the conversion of the man into the woven fabric depended on the hand loom weaver. It needed another important element to complete a series of automatic machinery, and this was supplied by Cartwright, who, in 1784, invented the germ of the *power Loom*. In 1787, he completed his invention and set up a "factory," which, probably by reason of his want business habits, was not successful as a pecuniary investment. Numerous subsequent improvements were made by Bell, Monteth, Horrocks, Sharp, and Roberts, and a host of other inventors, who have improved this machine until it may be said to be perfectly self-acting in its operations.

Having thus briefly glanced at the successive steps by which the inventive genius of the last century supplied the mechanism, we will now, with similar brevity, examine the industrial structure which capital has raised with the aids thus placed within its reach.

About the time Compton completed his invention he raised 14s. sterling per lb. for spinning and preparing 6. 40 yarn, and shortly afterwards he was paid 25s. sterling for No. 60. To show how fine a grist he could spin, I produced yarns as fine as No. 80, for which he obtained 3s. per lb. More perfect mechanism and improved skill enabled the spinners to work still finer grists for lower prices, and, in 1793, only 8d. sterling per lb. was paid for No. 100. Notwithstanding, however, this extraordinary diminution of price, by aid of the improved machinery, superior judgment in the selection of suitable cotton wool, and greater skill in working, the spinners can with less labour earn more money than they did when the prices were high.

Nor is the saving effected by the power loom in weaving much less importance than that due to the spinning machinery. The invention of the fly shuttle by John Kaye, doubled the productive power of the hand loom; and even as compared with the loom in this improved state, the mechanism wherewith a girl is enabled to pro-

duce from three to four hundred yards of four-fifths cloth per week is as great an economical triumph as is the invention of the spinning frames that produce the yarn.

Applying the great saving in the details of the cost of production to the quantities annually worked up, we have the key to the wonderful expansion of this branch of industry, and we are enabled to understand the means whereby the manufacturer is enabled to place within reach of the multitude those fabrics that contribute so much to the civilization with which we are surrounded.

We have alluded to the probable increase in the supply of raw material from regions which hitherto have not contributed at all, or only in a small degree, supplies of cotton to the manufacturer. It is well that these regions are so widely spread, and that they have a capacity to yield bountifully, for manufacturing power has increased, and indeed is still increasing at a rate which has no parallel in the records of industrial enterprise. The quantity of cotton annually consumed by each spindle in the United Kingdom is 3 1/2 lbs.; and it is estimated by those best acquainted with the case, that in the past year the rate of increase in the number of spindles was not less than 45,000 per week, representing an increase in the consumption of cotton, of upwards of 74,000,000 lbs. per annum. As the average consumption of cotton per hand employed has been 2,551 lbs., this increase indicates an annual increase of 31,500 in the factory population of Britain. It is noteworthy that, notwithstanding this extraordinary increase in production, the supply of the manufactured article does not keep pace with the expansion of the markets, the scarcely perceptible reduction in price being entirely due to the steady improvement in the machinery used.

The following Table will give some idea of the periodical increase of this branch of business and of the enormous values involved:—

We may add, that at the present time the total number of spindles employed in the Cotton Manufactures of Britain

is estimated at \$1,000,000, and that the Cotton industry of the rest of the world is estimated to be, collectively, equal to that of the United Kingdom.

The space at our disposal scarcely permits us to glance at the Manufactures of the New England States. They have been stimulated into existence by the protective duties levied by the Federal Government, which in some cases are almost equivalent to a prohibition against foreign goods. Under the protection thus afforded, the number of spindles at work rose from 8,000 in 1804 to 2,754,078 in 1850; while in 1854 their products were valued at \$61,860,184—about £12,000,000 Sterling.

We have the history of the rise and progress of the various branches of Manufacture in the manufacturing districts of Britain to warrant us in the conclusion that priority of selection—other things being equal—exercises an enduring influence in permanently locating a particular branch of industry. We have noticed how Manchester early became the seat of the manufacture of textile fabrics, by reason of the encouragement given by the municipal authorities, and we have seen how that branch of industry has clung to the place of its birth through succeeding generations. Other instances might be cited. Glasgow was the general birth-place of successful Power-loom weaving, and still retains a pre-eminence in that branch. Nottingham was the refuge of the first promoters of the stocking-frames, and of the subsequent inventors of *Bobbin-Net* Lace manufacture, and with the adjacent county of Derby is still the chief seat of those industries. Undoubtedly there were important considerations which influenced selection, and which could not be over-ruled by favours within the gift of localities. When *power* spinning and weaving were first successfully introduced, sites otherwise inconvenient were selected which offered considerable water power. WATT relieved the cotton spinners from the necessity of seeking power at the expense of other advantages. Then the extensive employment of Steam induced the establishment of factories where coal is abundant. The improvements that have been made in the Steam Engine, and the consequent economy of fuel has rendered this consideration even of minor consequence: one ton of coal can now do as much work as three tons did some years ago. Notwithstanding, however, the opposing circumstances here mentioned, the early establishment of any branch of industry in a locality has exercised an important influence. How else shall we account for the eminence of Sheffield in Cutlery, Birmingham in Hardware, Bradford in Worsted, and Leeds in the Cloth trade?

In a country so new and so essentially agricultural as Canada, it is not likely that any large amount of labour applicable to manufacturing purposes will be available, for the simple reason that it may be more profitably employed: hence, it would be folly to attempt the establishment of factories on a large scale and in competition with the abundant labour of the Mother Country. Nevertheless, there is invariably a portion of all town populations that cannot, in the absence of Manufactories, find profitable, or indeed any, employment.

It is difficult, however, to define what encouragement may prudently be given. It is certain that any protection which enhances the cost of the manufactured article to the consumer, indicates an erroneous policy, being in direct opposition to the reasonable desire of all prudent people to buy in the cheapest market. Where the removal of a temporary disadvantage can be effected by relief from local taxation, or where the disadvantages incident to the education of unskilled labour, which the establishment of a new branch of industry tends to rectify, can be balanced by an immediate and definite contribution of capital, it may redound to the advantage of a locality to promote the introduction of such industries as will absorb its surplus labour, by contributing in a moderate degree such encouragement as may be necessary. Encouragement, however, should be given with caution, and anything like the payment of a bounty or a guarantee of profit to compensate such abiding disadvantages of position as occasion onerous freight charges, excessive cost of fuel, or disadvantages originating in the high price of capital, labour, or supplies of raw material, and which from their nature must necessarily be continuous, ought to be avoided.

It has sometimes been asserted that a manufacturing population is not desirable; that neither the mental nor physical health of the operatives can be satisfactory in the atmosphere of the *Factory*, and especially that the monotonous employment incident to a minute sub-division of labour is not calculated to promote intelligence. Such

assertions arise in mis-apprehension. Manufactories are not necessarily unhealthy. So long ago as 1835 it was shown by an eminent writer that 1, the non-manufacturing counties, Bedford, Bucks, Northampton, and Rutland, the average mortality of females between 10 and 20 (the *Factory* age) years of age was one in 113, while in Lancashire and the West Riding of Yorkshire, the two chief factory counties of England, the mortality between the same ages was only 1 in 177. Since then great improvements have been made in the interest of the factory operatives. Their hours of labour have been reduced; ventilation has been perfected; less numbers are employed within a given space; but, with every convenience for personal cleanliness, are provided in well regulated establishments; while steady employment and remunerative wages enable them to obtain sufficient of the necessaries and many of the luxuries of life. As to their morality, it may be fairly asked whether the blers and disreputable characters that now infest our streets and are trained to vice in our drinking dens would not be more likely to improve than to degenerate, if they could be profitably employed? Whether if the now valid assertion that there is no certain employment for the younger members of the labourer's family were removed, we should not be more likely to see them forced into employment by public opinion? But such arguments are superfluous in the presence of the well ascertained and well vouched fact, that factory populations are as free from vice as agriculturalists. Nor has the remaining exception greater force. It has been well remarked—“By working together, factory labourers have many opportunities, of which those employed in the fields are comparatively destitute, of discussing all manner of topics. Their intellects are sharpened by the collision of opinion. They desire to know what is going on in the world, and by each contributing a small sum they obtain an ample supply of newspapers and other periodical publications, and sometimes form book-clubs that whatever doubt may exist as to its cause, there can be none in regard to the superior information of the work people employed in factories. We do not believe that they were ever less intelligent than farm labourers. But whatever may have been the case formerly, none will venture to affirm that they are so at present, or that they are mere machines without sentiment or reason.”

Before laying down our pen we must briefly refer to one thing which will ever materially affect the establishment of manufactories in every new country, and which no legislation can modify or remove—the value of realized labour—in other words, of Capital. The prices of most manufactured goods, but especially of cotton, depends more on the profits on stock than on the price of labour. It is the abundance of capital that cheapens production as much as the abundance of labour. If capital is worth ten per cent. in Canada, while it is worth only four per cent. in England, *ceteris paribus*, the English capitalist who has £100,000 invested will sell the annual production of his mills for £0,000 less than the Canadian capitalist can afford to sell the produce of £100,000 similarly invested. This lossness of profit may not be considered an advantage to those who own the capital, but the fact must be dealt with as it exists. It is one of the results of the realization of profits which have accumulated in older countries, while here they have yet to be acquired. It should be the aim of those who would promote the acquisition and investment of capital here, to apply its cheapened products to our advantage. To place within our reach the means whereby to live and enjoy life cheaply, while we direct our energies to the most profitable employments. In preparing the products of our forests and in forwarding them to market there is ample room for the employment of capital. The fields reclaimed from the wilderness by the lumberman will absorb the capital and labour of the husbandman. The fisheries, and the construction and navigation of shipping, wherewith to exchange the produce of our soil for the products of the looms and anvils of Europe, will employ our maritime population, many artisans and much capital. The Government that, ignoring these plain principles, would by unwise tariffs encourage a misdirection of capital and industry, must be ill advised in the science of wealth.

Recognizing these principles however, there is yet room for the introduction of certain classes of manufacturing industry. It is undeniable that, in our larger towns and in cities, there is a class that live in enforced idleness. The capitalist who will furnish the means for giving them employment will deserve well of the community, and will most likely reap a substantial reward in the shape of reasonable profits on his outlay.

SOMETHING ABOUT CANADA;

Being Extracts from a Pamphlet issued under the auspices of the Bureau of Agriculture.

The Province of Canada embraces about 350,000 square miles of territory, independently of its North-Western portions, not yet open for settlement; it is consequently more than one-third larger than France, nearly three times as large as Great Britain and Ireland, and more than ten times as large as Prussia. The inhabited or settled portion covers at least 40,000 square miles, and is nearly as large as Denmark, three times as large as Switzerland, a third greater than Scotland, and more than a third the size of Prussia; but such is the rapid progress of settlement, that probably in ten years time the settled parts of Canada will be equal in area to Great Britain or Prussia. Prior to the year 1840, Canada was divided into two distinct provinces, known as Upper and Lower Canada, possessing separate legislative bodies or Parliaments for local government of each. In 1840, these provinces were united, although for some purposes the old territorial divisions still exist. Upper Canada is that part of the now called Provinces which lies to the south and west of the Ottawa; Lower Canada embraces the country to the north and east of that river.

Three hundred miles from the vast outlet of the River Lawrence we pass the mouth of the Saguenay, a deep noble river, navigable for the largest vessels seventy miles from its outlet. Four hundred and ten miles sailing to the ocean, and we reach Quebec, the great emporium of Canada, with a large and increasing foreign commerce. A hundred miles sailing finds us at the limit of the timber, and we now begin in reality to ascend the stream of St. Lawrence. Five hundred and ninety miles brings us to Montreal, near where the Ottawa or Grand River of North mingles its red waters with those of the St. Lawrence, after draining a valley of 80,000 square miles in length to the north-west, and thus commanding the inauspicious treasures of the magnificent forests of a part of Canada more than twice the size of Bavaria, or the Illinois States, and six times the superficial limits of England.

It is at Montreal that these lasting monuments of wisdom, courage and art begin to develop the secret of arduous inland navigation. We have reached the St. Lawrence—seven in number—constructed for the purpose of overcoming the obstacles to continuous navigation presented by the rapids. These canals, of different size and great capacity, fitted for sea-going vessels, enable us to ascend 116 miles of river in actual horizontal space, overcoming a fall of 225 feet above the level of water. Fifty-two miles of sailing, 168 miles above Montreal, and we are in Lake Ontario, 756 miles from the sea and 234 feet above it. Lake Ontario is 180 miles long, 50 to 60 miles wide, and 500 feet deep, and has an area of 600 square miles. Swiftly traversing its expanse, in a probably, of hundreds of other vessels and steamers, reach the outlet of the Welland Canal, through which, in a series of 27 locks, we rise 330 feet to the waters of Lake Erie, 1,041 from the sea, and 564 feet above its level. Our vessel is still on through Lake Erie, until we arrive at Detroit River, 1,280 miles from the sea. We pass by the city of Detroit, in the State of Michigan, through Lake St. Clair and the St. Clair River into Lake Huron, 1,355 miles from the starting point, and 573 feet above the ocean. We now sail on to St. Mary's River, and, passing through our great and gigantic canal, constructed by the people of the United States, enter Lake Superior, with a fresh-water as large as Ireland before us, and enabling us to attain a distance of 2,000 miles from the mouth of the St. Lawrence; or, we may sail southward into Lake Michigan, and at that wonderful creation of the Great West, Chicago, the natural advantages conferred upon Canada by the Lawrence River and the Great Lakes are not merely seen—they are incalculable. Immediate and direct communication with the sea for two thousand miles inland coast, without any reference to the nearly equal extent of coast belonging to the States of the Union, or the alluvial waters which feed the St. Lawrence and the Lakes, being deep into the heart of the country, appears in fact sufficient to mark out Canada for a distinguished role; but when the influence which her vast inland seas exerts upon climate, vegetation, health, and internal commerce, is understood, the character of that future maritime power is foretold, even in the youth of Canadian history, before her enterprise and capabilities have become known and appreciated.

Water power, that mighty engine of industry, is everywhere abundant, and just where it is required, in the midst of magnificent forests of valuable timber, for which an exhaustible market is springing up in the Far West Prairie region of the American Union, as well as in France and England, where, too, a demand is growing (almost too rapidly for the means of supply) for the more valuable kinds of cabinet-work woods, with which Canadian forests abound.

There are now 1,876 miles of Railway in operation in Canada, independent of the Grand Trunk extension to Portland, 104 miles in length, which, though running through the United States, to secure an ocean port in winter, is really a Canadian road. It is worthy of remark that Canada has now more miles of railway open than Ireland or Scotland, or any one of the New England States; more than 100 miles through the Atlantic States of New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland; or the two Carolinas, North and South; and more, in proportion to its population, than any other country in the world. The opening of the Victoria Bridge, and the section between St. Mary's and Detroit, have brought the Grand Trunk into unbroken operation, and it will now be able to transport passengers and goods from the Atlantic to the Mississippi with but one transshipment, and a saving, it is alleged, of five days over all other routes.

The principal economic Minerals of Canada are stated by Sir W. E. Logan to be:

METALS AND THEIR ORES.—Magnetite iron ore; limonite (bog ore); titaniferous iron; sulphuret of zinc (blende); sulphuret of lead (galena); copper, native, sulphuret of, vitreous; copper pyrites; argentiferous ditto, and containing gold, silver; silver, with native copper and sulphuret of silver; gold.

NON-METALLIC MINERALS.—Uranium, chromium, cobalt, manganese, iron pyrites, graphite, dolomite, carbonate of magnesia, sulphate of barytes, iron ochres, stellite, lithographic stone, agates, jasper, felspar, amanturite, hyacinth, corundum, amethyst, jet, quartzose, sandstone, rutinite and basalt, gypsum, shell marl, phosphate of lime, millstones, grindstones, whetstones, tripoli.

BUILDING MATERIALS.—Granites, sandstone, calcareous sandstone, limestones, hydraulic limestones, roofing slates, flagging stones, clays, moulding sand, fuller's earth; Marbles—white, black, red, brown, yellow and black, gray and variegated, green.

COMBUSTIBLES.—Peat, petroleum, asphaltum.

FISHERIES. L. C.—Lower Canada possesses, in the River and Gulf of St. Lawrence, an extent of coast 1,000 miles, where the cod, herring, mackerel, salmon and other fisheries are carried on successfully. Whale fishing is also carried on by vessels fitted out from the port of Gaspé. The average season value of whale oil has been about \$27,000. The cod fishing is carried on along the whole shore of Canada; the herring fishing principally at the Magdalen Islands, in the bay of Chaleurs, and on the coast of Labrador; the mackerel fishing at the Magdalen Islands, along the coast of Gaspé, and in the lower part of the River St. Lawrence. There are about seventy salmon fishery rivers in Lower Canada, which the Government are now fostering, with a view to enhance the commerce in this valuable fish. The latest annual catch is 3,750 barrels. The Bay of Chaleurs alone formerly exported 10,000 barrels. The number of boats belonging to Canada, fishing on the Canadian shores, is from 1,200 to 1,500. Nearly 100 Canadian vessels are employed in the fisheries of Canada. The number of fishing vessels from Nova Scotia and the other Lower Provinces, fishing on our shores, is from 250 to 300. The number of fishing vessels from the United States frequenting our shores, principally for the cod and mackerel fishing, is from 200 to 300. Total fish productions in 1800 were valued at \$942,528.

FISHERIES, U. C.—The merchantable fish products derived from the lakes and rivers of Upper Canada, consist chiefly of white fish, salmon, salmon trout, herring, lake trout, speckled trout, sturgeon, pickerel, bass, muscalonge, &c. Superior kinds also abound in the smaller lakes, tributaries and streams. The extensive area, great depth, clear cold water's abundant feeding banks, shoals and spawning grounds of the principal Upper Canadian lakes, render the fish found therein numerous, of good quality, and large size. The annual take of the different species of fish is carefully estimated at \$380,000 in value.

The rise and progress of cities and towns in Canada afford a curious and most instructive illustration of the expansion of the country, the development of its resources, the increase of its wealth, and the activity and energy of its people. Montreal is the largest city in Canada, and contains over 90,000 inhabitants; Quebec ranks next, with 51,000; Toronto third, with nearly 45,000. In 1831, Montreal and Quebec contained a population of about 27,000 each. The history of Toronto foreshadows the history of other towns in Canada. In 1842, a period so recent that most will remember it, Toronto contained 13,000 inhabitants; in 1852, 30,763; and in 1850, 42,000. Toronto is situated on Lake Ontario, and may be considered as the type of a thriving commercial Canadian port on one of the great lakes. London, in Upper Canada, contained, in 1850, 5,124 inhabitants; its population in 1860 exceeded 11,500, having doubled its population in ten years.

Everywhere, postal communication is complete. The most distant hamlet has its post-office, and the number of offices in Canada is now about 1,720. The electric telegraph passes through every town and almost every village in the Province, and the number of miles in operation at this time is 4,040. The approach or arrival of a steamer or sailing vessel at Quebec, is known very nearly at the same moment in every town in the Lower and Upper portions of the Province. All improvements in the arts or sciences, affecting the commercial or industrial interests of her people, are quickly introduced into Canada; and, with numerous elements of adaptation and progress within her reach, she eagerly avails herself of the practice and enterprise of other countries.

The great and unflinching source of this steady growth, this quiet but irresistible onward movement of Canada, has been IMMIGRATION; the infusion of new blood, the adoption of a new and prosperous home by tens of thousands from across the sea and beyond the frontiers; a home which, with all its immunities, privileges and hopes, is offered, requiring no other return than a strong arm, a willing heart, and a confident self-trusting trust in the future, and in the happiness and prosperity of their adopted country.

The Municipal system of Canada is admirably adapted to the exigencies of a young and vigorous country; its success has been complete. In order to comprehend it, it is necessary to state that Upper Canada is divided into counties, forty-two in number; each county is divided into townships; so that, on an average, each township is about ten miles square. The inhabitants of a township elect five Councillors; the Councillors elect out of this number a presiding officer, who is designated the Town Reeve; in the Town Reeves of the different townships form the County Council; this Council elect their presiding officer, who is styled the Warden. The Town Council and County Council are Municipal Corporations, possessing the power to raise money for municipal purposes, such as making public improvements, opening and repairing roads and bridges, &c. Repayment is secured by a tax on all the property in the township or county where the debt is incurred; but no by-law for raising money can be enforced, unless it has been previously submitted to the electors or people. Each Corporation possesses the power of suing, and is liable to be sued; and their by-laws, if illegal, are subject to be annulled by the Superior Courts of the Province, at the instance of any elector.

Each Township Council has the power to provide for the support of Common Schools, under the provisions of the School Law; to construct roads, bridges and water-courses, &c., to appoint path-masters or road-inspectors, &c. The County Councils are charged with the construction and repairs of gaols and court-houses, roads and bridges, houses of correction, and grammar schools, under the provisions of the school-law; to grant moneys by loan to public works tending to the improvement of the country, and to levy taxes for the redemption of the debts incurred subject to the proviso before mentioned, namely, the vote of the people. Villages not having a population over 1,000 are governed by a board of police, and are styled Police Villages; possessing over 1,000 inhabitants they become Incorporated Villages, and are governed by a Council of five, whose Reeve is a member of the County Council, *ex officio*; as soon as a Village acquires a population exceeding three thousand, it becomes a Town governed by a Mayor and Council, and is represented in the County Council by a Town Reeve and Deputy Town Reeve. When the number of inhabitants exceed 10,000 it may be created a city, and is governed by a Mayor, Aldermen and Councilmen. All Town Reeves, Wardens, Mayors, and Aldermen are *ex officio* Justices of the Peace.

In Lower Canada a similar system prevails. That section of the Province is divided into sixty Counties, each which has a county council, composed of the Mayors of the Local Counties within the County. Every Township, Parish, or Village, all called Local Municipalities, elect seven Councillors, who choose one of themselves as presiding officer, styled the Mayor. The Mayors forming a County Council elect also a presiding officer, who is called the Warden. In Lower Canada there are four cities, six towns, and forty-three incorporated villages. Any tract land containing forty houses within any part of it, not exceeding sixty superficial arpents, may be erected into Village Municipality, on the presentation to the County Council of a petition signed by thirty or more qualified resident electors. Whenever the population of an incorporated village amounts to 3,000 souls, it may be proclaimed a town. Cities are erected only by legislative enactment. Every Mayor and Warden is *ex officio* a Justice of the Peace within the limits of the municipality wherein he has been elected or appointed, so long as he continues to act as Mayor or Warden.

The Provincial Normal School of Upper Canada is a highly effective and useful institution for the training of teachers and annually sends forth from 100 to 150 young men and women, who, having been uniformly instructed in the art of conducting a school, and communicating knowledge, are gradually establishing in Upper Canada a system of common school education of great promise.

In 1842 the number of common schools in Upper Canada was 1721, attended by 65,978 children; in 1850 the number of schools was 3,069, attended by 315,812 children, and average time during which the schools were open was four months and six days. Each school section is governed by an elective corporation, styled School Trustees, and is supplied, partly at Government expense, with a small library of selected literature. The number of volumes which have been already distributed for this purpose amounts to 5323.

The Free School system is gaining ground in many parts of Canada, the principle it involves implies the support of common schools, open to all, by a general tax, and the non-exaction of fees. Any school section may adopt it by vote of the majority of its inhabitants. Separate schools for Roman Catholics are sanctioned under certain regulations.

The Grammar schools and Academies are 121 in number with 5,530 pupils. They are intended to form a connective link between the common schools and the universities. Teachers must be graduates of some university; they receive an allowance from Government in addition to their salaries. The amount raised for grammar school purposes in 1850 was \$15,123 sterling.

Besides a richly endowed Provincial University, supplied with a complete staff of highly competent Professors and Lecturers, there are several other universities and colleges in Upper Canada in connection with different religious denominations. The standard of education adopted by some of the Canadian Universities assimilates as closely as possible to that established in the time-honoured institutions of Great Britain and Ireland, and the ranks of professorial staffs are generally supplied from the same unflinching sources.

In the valleys of some of the largest rivers of Upper Canada, wheat has been grown after wheat for two years; the first crops yielded an average of forty bushels to the acre, but under the thoughtless system of husbandry then pursued, the yield diminished to twelve bushels to the acre, and compelled a change of system, which soon had the effect of restoring the land to its original fertility. The system of exhaustion has effected its own cure, and led to the introduction of a more rational method of cultivating the soil. The average yield of wheat in some townships exceeds 22 bushels to the acre, and where an approach to good farming prevails the yield rises to thirty and of forty bushels to the acre. On new land fifty bushels is very uncommon; and it must not be forgotten that Canadian wheat, grown near the city of Toronto, won a prize at the Paris Exhibition. It may truly be said that soil of what may be termed the agricultural portion of Canada, which comprises four-fifths of the inhabited portion, and a vast area still in the hands of the Government and now open to settlement, is unexploitable; and its deterioration takes place, it is the fault of the farmer, not of the soil. In 1850 the yield of wheat in 1850 considerably exceeded 25,000,000 bushels; and the quality of Canadian wheat is so superior, that the American market buy it for the purpose of mixing with grain grown in the United States, in order to improve the quality of their flour, and in some instances to render it fit for exportation.

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THE ROYAL FAMILY.

HER MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY (ALEXANDRINA)—VICTORIA, the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith. Her Majesty, the only daughter and heir of the late Prince Albert, Duke of Kent, fourth son of King George III., and Victoria-Maria-Louisa (Princess Dowager of Leiningen), Duchess of Kent, and sister of the King of the Belgians. Victoria was born at Kensington Palace, on the 24th day, 1819; baptised on the 24th of June, 1819. ascended the throne on the demise of her uncle King William IV., June, 1837; and was crowned at Westminster, on the June, 1838. Her Majesty was married at St. James's Palace, on the 10th of February, 1840, to Francis-Albert-Augustus-Charles-Emanuel, Duke of Saxe, Prince of Coburg-Gotha, who was born August 26th, 1819.

ISSUE.—Victoria-Adelaide-Mary-Louisa, Princess Royal, b. 21st November, 1840; married 25th January, 1858, at the Chapel Royal, to His Royal Highness Prince-Fruecrick William-Nicolaus-Charles of Prussia.

Albert-Edward, Prince of Wales, b. 9th Nov. 1841. Alice-Maud-Mary, b. 25th April, 1843. Betrothed to His Grand Ducal Highness Prince-Frederick-William-Louis of Hesse-Darmstadt. Clothing—when donations for gratuitous distribution by charitable societies, or for the Army, Navy, or Indian Nations.

Mod-Is or Patterns of all kinds of Invention, Machl cry, or Improvements in the Art—provided the same be not put to actual use.

Military Clothing for H. M. Troops or Militia.

Military Stores, &c., for Provincial Militia, under such restriction and regulations as may be passed by the Governor in Council.

Packages containing Free Goods, and of the description in which such goods are usually imported, shall be free. The following packages shall be free, viz.: Bales; Trusses; Cases covering Casks of Wine or Brandy in Wood; Cases and Casks containing Dry Goods, Hardware and Cutlery; Cases or Casks containing Glassware or Earthenware; Cases containing Bottled Wine or Bottled Spirits, and other Packages in which Goods of the kind contained in them are usually imported, and which do not necessarily or generally accompany such Goods when sold in this Province.

All other Packages containing Goods paying ad valorem duties shall be chargeable with the same duty as the Goods they contain, unless such duty exceeds 30 per cent. In which case the duty on the packages containing them shall be 30 per cent. ad valorem; and Packages containing Goods paying specific duties shall be chargeable with a duty of 20 per cent. ad valorem.

Tools (the) and Implements of Trade of persons arriving in Canada, when accompanied into the Province by the actual settler, and for his own use, not for sale.

All Importations for the use of H.M. Army and Navy, serving in Canada, or for the public uses of the Province.

The following Articles are prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of Fifty Pounds, together with the forfeiture of the Parcel or Package of Goods in which the same may be found:—

LETTER RATES

Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per 1/2 oz., but if posted unpaid such letters are charged 7 cents per 1/2 oz. On Letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 5 cents per 1/2 oz., with optional prepayment.

The rate on Letters to the United Kingdom is, by Canadian Packet,
 Not exceeding 1/2 oz. 12 1/2 cents.

And by Cunard Packet, 17 cents per 1/2 oz., &c. Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling on delivery.
 Letters for British Colonies and Possessions beyond Sea, and Foreign Countries, via England, must be prepaid.

MAILS FOR CANADA FROM ENGLAND.

Two Ocean Steamers carrying mails for Canada leave Liverpool in each week, viz.: a Canadian Packet on every Thursday, via Derry on Friday, sailing to Quebec in summer and Portland in Winter, by which the Postage rate is 6d. stg. per 1/2 oz.; and a Cunard Packet every Saturday, via Cork on Sunday, bringing Mails for Canada, alternately to Boston and New York, by which the Postage rate to Canada is 8d. stg. per 1/2 oz.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction—"By Canadian Packet" or "By British Packet"—and in that case they are kept over or the Packet designated "By Canadian Mail" is not a distinctive superscription; for any Mail for Canada is a Canadian Mail," by whatever Packet forwarded.

REGISTRATION OF LETTERS.

Persons posting Letters containing value, should be careful to require them to be registered and to obtain from the Post Master a Certificate of receipt for registration.

The charge for Registration, in addition to the Postage, is as follows, viz.:

On Letters to any other place in Canada, or British North America 2 cents.
 On Letters for the United States 5 "
 On Letters for the United Kingdom 12 1/2 "
 On Letters for British Colonies or Possessions, sent via England 25 "
 On Letters for France and other Foreign Countries, via England, an amount equal to the postage rate.

Both the postage charge and registration fee must in all cases be prepaid.

Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the misrecital or loss of a Letter; but a Registered Letter can be traced when an Unregistered Letter cannot, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A Registered Letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or other error, may affect an Unregistered Letter.

MISCELLANEOUS CHARGES.

The charge on Parcels by Parcel Post, which does not extend to any place without the Province, is 25 cents per lb. (with 3 cts. additional if Registered.)

One cent per oz., payable in advance by Postage stamp, is the rate on Printed Circulars. Prices Current, Hand Bills and other Printed Matter of a like character, and on Books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charge on Books, &c., by Book Post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 3 oz. in weight, 12 1/2 cents on 1/2 lb. packets, and 12 1/2 cents additional for every additional 1/2 lb. These charges must be prepaid.

POSTAGE STAMPS.
Postage Stamps are provided for sale of the respective values of 1 cent for Newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial Letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12 1/2 cents for Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard Packet.
Letter Envelopes are provided, impressed with medallion stamps, and equivalent to the prepayment of postage to the amount of 5 cents and 10 cents respectively.
The 5 cent envelopes will be sold to the public at the rate of \$5 50 per hundred, or 60 cents per dozen. The price of a single envelope is 6 cents.
The 10 cent envelope will be sold at the rate of \$10 50 per hundred, or \$1 20 per dozen. Single envelopes 11 cts.

PENAL CLAUSES.
The Act contains the following penal clause:—
To inclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a Parcel posted, for the Parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanor.
To inclose a letter or any writing, or to make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to inclose any other thing in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers, (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers,) shall be a misdemeanor.

The leading religions he divides as follows:—Christianity reckons 355,000,000 adherents; Judaism, 5,000,000; the Asiatic religions, 200,000,000; Mohammedanism, 180,000,000; and Polytheism, 200,000,000. Of the Christian population, 170,000,000 belong to the Roman Catholic Church; 80,000,000 to Protestantism; and 76,000,000 to the Greek Church.

Any quantity of Gold is supposed to be divided into 24 parts, called Carats. If pure, it is said to be 24 Carats fine; if there be 22 parts of pure Gold, and 2 parts of alloy, it is said to be 22 Carats fine; this is the standard for gold coin, and is worth \$18 95 per ounce Troy. What is called the new standard, used for watch cases, &c., is 18 Carats fine. The term Carat is also applied to a weight of 3 1/5th grains Troy, used in weighing diamonds; it is divided into four parts called grains; 4 grains Troy are thus equal to 5 grains diamond weight.

AMERICAN AND ENGLISH EXCHANGE.

The American Dollar of Exchange is Silver which contains 386.704 grains pure silver, the equivalent of which is 54 pence sterling, or \$4 44 Mexican Silver to the pound sterling.

Mexican Dollars sent to England (\$4 44) would be the value for value in English Sovereigns.

This is the whole mystery of the American Exchange. Although \$4 44 in Mexican Silver Dollars and \$4 84 in American Golden Dollars are presumed to be equivalent values in sterling, the two are not equivalent in commercial currency, there being practically no such thing as Mexican Silver Dollars in circulation. So long therefore as exchange transactions are based upon the fiction of \$4 44 being the equivalent value in American currency of an English sovereign, the value of which in reality is \$4 84. It is necessary to add a premium to the imaginary American standard, to bring the \$4 44 to the true or absolute value.

The trade between America and England is in a state of equilibrium when exchange is 109 per cent., or 9 per cent. premium, which, if added to \$4 44, will give the equivalent number of dollars to be paid per pound sterling.

Courts.

COURT OF ERROR AND APPEAL.—Constituted for the hearing of appeals in civil cases from the Courts of Queen's Bench, Chancery and Common Pleas; and appeals in criminal cases from the Courts of Queen's Bench and Common Pleas. From the judgment of this court, an appeal lies to Her Majesty in Privy Council, in cases over £1,000 or where annual rent, fee, or future rights of any amount, are affected. *Judges*—Hon. Sir John Beverley Robinson, Bart., Chief Justice of Upper Canada; Hon. Wm. Hume Blake, Chancellor of Upper Canada, Hon. William Henry Draper, C.B., Chief Justice of the Common Pleas; Hon. Archibald McLean, Judge of the Queen's Bench; Hon. Jas. C. P. Esten, Vice Chancellor; Hon. Robt. E. Burns, Judge of the Queen's Bench; Hon. John Godfrey Sprague, Vice-Chancellor; Hon. William Boell Richards, Judge of the Common Pleas; Hon. John Hawkins Hagarty, Judge of the Common Pleas. *Clerk*, Alex. Grant.

COURT OF QUEEN'S BENCH.—The jurisdiction of this Court extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal and civil, real, personal and mixed, within Upper Canada, and it may proceed in such, by such process and course as are provided by law, and as shall tend with justice and despatch to determine the same; and may hear and determine all issues of law, and also with the inquest of two-lives good and lawful men (except in cases otherwise provided for) try all issues of fact, and give judgment, an award execution, thereon, and also in matters which relate to the Queen's Revenue (including the condemnation of contraband or smuggled goods) as may be done by Her Majesty's Superior Courts of Law in England. *Chief Justice*—Hon. Sir John Beverley Robinson, Bart.; *Puisne Judges*—Hons. Archibald McLean and Robert Easton Burns. *Clerk of the Crown and Pleas*—Chas. Coxwell Small. *Reporter*—Chris. Robinson. *Clerk in Chambers*—W. B. Howard. *Clerk of the Process*—R. Stanton. *Taxing Officer*—John Small. *Clerk of the Plea Department*—John W. Dempsey. *Clerk of the Debet*—Thos. Coxwell. *Registrar of Crown Bonds, &c.*—E. G. Small. *Clerk of the Vault Department*—Thos. Goldsmith. *Crier and Usher*—And. Fleming.

COURT OF CHANCERY.—This Court has the like jurisdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fraud, accident, trusts, executors, administrators, co-partnerships, accounts, mortgages, awards, dower, infants, idiots, lunatics and their estates, waste, specific performance, discovery, and

to prevent multiplicity of suits, staying proceedings at law prosecuted against equity and good conscience, and may decree the issue, repeal or avoidance of letters patent, and generally the like powers which the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy at law. *Chancellor*—Hon. Wm. Hume Blake. *Vice-Chancellors*—Hons. Jas. Christie Palmer Esten, and John Godfrey Spragge. *Master*—Andw Norton Bar-I. *Taxing Officer*—Geo. Hendryes. *Registrar & Reporter*—Alexander Grant. *Special Executives*—John Hector and William Yvonne Bacon. *Escher*—John Oliver.

COURT OF COMMON PLEAS.—This Court has the same powers and jurisdiction as a Court of Record, as the Court of Queen's Bench. Writs of summons and capias issue alternately from either court. *Chief Justice*—Hon. Wm. Henry Draper, C.B. *Justice Judges*—Hons. William Buell Richards, and John Hawkins Hagarty. *Clerk of the Crown and Pleas*—Lawrence Heyden. *Reporter*—Edward C. Jones. *First Clerk*—Augustus B. Sullivan. *Second Clerk*—S. B. Clark. *Clerk of the Process*—R. Stanton. *Crier and Escher*—Daniel Connell.

PRACTICE COURT AND CHAMBERS.—One of the Common Law Judges holds a Court during each Term, called the "Practice Court," for hearing matters relating to the adding or justifying bail, discharging insolvent debtors, administering oaths, hearing and determining matters on motion, and making rules and orders in causes and business depending in either of said law courts. Chambers are held each day in Common Law and Chancery by one of the Judges of the said courts, for such business relating to suits therein as may be transacted by a single judge out of court. *Clerk*, Wm. B. Heward.

HEIR AND DEVISEE COURT.—Commissioners, the Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other persons as may be appointed by commission under the Great Seal. Their duties are to determine claims to lands in Upper Canada, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favour of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees or assignees. *Sittings at Toronto, first Monday in January and July in each year.* *Clerk of Commissioners*, W. B. Heward.

COUNTY COURTS.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to £100; and to all bill bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, criminal, or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers, to the amount of £50, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

SUBROGATE COURTS.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Subrogate Courts. *Clerk*, C. Fitzgibbon, Toronto.

COURTS OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—Clerk-magistrate, the County Judge in each county, who, with one or more Justices of the Peace, holds a Court of Quarter Sessions in his county four times a year for trials by jury in cases of larceny misdemeanor and other offences.

RECORDERS' COURTS.—In the Cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, Kingston, and Ottawa, the Recorders' Court takes the place of the County Sessions, the Justices of the Counties having no jurisdiction in the Cities—the care of which is confided to the Recorder, Mayor, Aldermen and Police Magistrate of each. Sessions held 2nd Monday in January, 1st Monday in April and July, and 3rd Monday in Nov. *Recorders*—George Duggan, Toronto; Archd. J. McDonald, Kingston; John E. Stark, Hamilton; William Horton, London; J. B. Lewis, Ottawa.

INSOLVENT DEBTORS' COURTS.—The County Judge in each county presides.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £25; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £10; but not to actions for gambling debts, liquors drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel,

slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P. for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each Division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions.

Officers of the Courts.

CLERKS OF ASSIZE.—The Deputy Clerks of the Crown are ex-officio Clerks of Assize and Marshals in their respective counties.

DEPUTY CLERKS OF THE CROWN.—The Clerks of the County Courts will be ex-officio Deputy Clerks of the Crown and Pleas of their several counties as the present incumbents vacate by death or otherwise (see page 71).

DEPUTY REGISTRARS AND MASTERS IN CHANCERY.—These officers are appointed by the Court, for each County, as occasion requires (see page 71).

CLERK OF THE PROCESS.—For sealing and issuing (alternately) all Writs of Summons in the Queen's Bench and Common Pleas—Robert Stanton. The Deputy Clerks of the Crown in the several Counties also, in like manner, issue the writs for their respective counties.

Terms of the Courts.

APPEAL TERMS commence on the second Thursday next after Hilary, Easter and Michaelmas Terms.

LAW TERMS.—Hilary begins first Monday in February, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Easter begins 3rd Monday in May, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Trinity begins Monday next after 21st August, and ends on the Saturday of the ensuing week; Michaelmas begins 3rd Monday in November and ends Saturday of the ensuing week. Long vacation from 1st July to 21st August.

CHANCERY TERMS.—*Examination Terms*—From 1st Tuesday of February to the Saturday after 2nd Tuesday of April; and from 1st Tuesday of September to the Saturday after 1st Tuesday of November. *Hearing Terms*—From 4th Monday in April until Saturday of the following week; and from 3rd Monday in November until Saturday of the following week. The Court also sits every Tuesday (except during the regular vacations) throughout the year, for hearing motions for decrees, motions for or to dissolve special injunctions, and appeals from the reports of the Master or Deputy Masters. Long vacation from the 1st July to 21st August.

COUNTY COURT TERMS commence on the first Monday in Jan., April, July and Oct., and end the following Saturday.

Circuits of the Courts.

LAW CIRCUITS.—The Circuits are held twice a year in each County, between Hilary and Easter Terms, and between Trinity and Michaelmas Terms, except in the County of York, where there are three in each year, commencing on the Thursday next after municipal elections in January, the second Monday in April, and the second Monday in October, in each year. There are six Circuits, as follows, viz:—*The Eastern*: Perth, Cornwall, Ottawa, L'Orignal, Brockville. *Home*: Niagara, Hamilton, Barrie, Owen Sound, Milton, Welland. *Western*: St. Thomas, Sandwich, Sarnia, Chatham, London, Goderich. *Midland*: Whitby, Peterboro', Cobourg, Belleville, Picton, Kingston. *Central*: Simcoe, Brantford, Guelph, Berlin, Stratford, Woods, &c. *Bayona*. *Toronto*: Toronto.
