THE VETO OF THE MAYOR On such of the city ordinances or resolutions which he considers partial or unjust, or not likely to effect equitably and securely the objects p 6posed, was conceded to him by the act of 18th February 1305, incorporating the city of New Orleans.

Among other sections, it is there enacted that "The said council shall have power to make and pass all bylaws and ordinances for the better government of the affairs of said corporation; for regulating the police, and p.eserving the peace and good order of the city ;-but all or uinances and by-laws after having passed said counci shall be transmitted to the Mayor for his consideration: and if he shall approve, sign and return the same to the said council, such by-aw and ordinance shall have the force of a law. But if the said Mayor shall disapprove of the said by-law or ordinance, he shall (within five days) return the same to the council-with his objections in writing: and if two-thirds of the members then pres a in the said council shall agree to the law-notwithstanding such objection-then, but not otherwise, the said by law or ordinance shall have the force of a law.

To inquire into the frequency of the Mayor's exercising h's veto power, will be but to inquire into the acts and resolutions of the council so vetoed. This might indeed be useful; as few of such vetes are negatived, when the members of the council have had more time to deliberate candidly as well as calmly on some of their own acts.

If any evils can arise from the voto power, the charter affords an easy remedy to the council. If the Mayor is wrong in returning unapproved any necessary ordinance. are not two-thirds of the council honest and firm enough to persist? But if they think it better not to persist, do they not tacitly and avowedly approve of the vote?

If gentlemen will reflect for a moment, they will percei the necessity and stility of the exercise of the mayor's veo, while one city conneil composed of a few members continues to form the municipal legislature. Is it possible or yr shable full and free deliberation can be given to an act at one reading in one body?

The charter states expressly that the mayor shall take into consideration, in the legislative sense of the term, all laws of the city. If he approves of them they are then valid; but if not, they undergo a second deliberation in the council. The vote of the mayor is not therefore used for his own aggrandizement; but for the welfare and security of the public-and for the advantage of all it must be used. ul the organization of the municipal government is radically

The city of London had elected radicals; but O'Connell seems likely to be defeated in Ireland by the conservatives. The elections are in general said to be favorable to the Wellington ministry.
