New York, Jan. 28.—The application by Dr. Charles Coulter for an injunction restraining the Supreme court of the Independent Order of Foresters from continuing certain extravagant prac-tices and from interfering by the store otherwise with the plaintiff and his at-terney and witnesses in presenting for the governor, unaver, and strates in prosecuting cer-tain actions brought by him, was to hay denied by Justice Blanchard in the Su-preme count. Coulter also claimed the organization was practically insolvent, and had expended over \$400,000 in col-lecting an income of \$2,500,000 int year. The defendants denied all the allega-tions of mis-management and showed that the order has now 170,000 members in the United States and Canada and a surplus of \$400,000.
