

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

FOREWORD

Most of the material for this genealogy was collected by the late FRANK EDSON⁸ SHEDD (John Brooks⁷, Reuben⁶, Reuben⁵, Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Daniel², Daniel¹), who was born in Sharon, N. H., 18 July 1856, graduated from Dartmouth College in 1880, for thirty years was connected with Lockwood, Greene and Company, mill architects and engineers of Boston, Mass., and died in Dorchester, Mass., 22 Sept. 1916. A full biography and appreciation of Mr. Shedd appear on page 603 of this volume.

While in college Mr. Shedd became interested in his ancestry and soon afterwards resolved to compile a complete genealogy of all the descendants of his emigrant ancestor Daniel¹ Shed who came from England and settled in Braintree, Mass., as early as 1643. About 1885 Mr. Shedd started this great undertaking, and for the remaining thirty years of his life pursued it with enthusiasm, devoting to it much of his time not required by his business. He secured his material and records mainly by a voluminous correspondence with the living members of the family, examination of printed books having accounts of various branches of it, and research among the records of several towns like Billerica, Groton and Tewksbury and cities like Lowell and Boston where many of the family have resided. All the material he secured was arranged by separate families, of most of which he was able to place the ancestral lines with certainty, and his work was characterized by the most admirable carefulness and accuracy. By his will Mr. Shedd directed that three typed copies of his manuscript be made by his secretary, Miss Bertha M. McCaul (who had long been familiar with the work), two of the copies to be presented for the purpose of publication to the Shedd Family Association organized by him in 1911; and this typing of a difficult manuscript was performed by Miss McCaul in a thorough and accurate manner.

Mr. Shedd's manuscript, while a large and very fine collection of material acquired during thirty years, had not been put by him into a systematized and finished form at all suitable for publication; and as his work extended through so many years, the various lines were brought down to various periods of time between 1885 and 1915. Therefore, the Shedd Family Association in November 1919 engaged the editor to re-arrange and re-write Mr. Shedd's material into a uniform, systematized manuscript for the press and also to bring down all the various lines, as far as possible, to 1920, and to add to Mr. Shedd's material additional obtainable

matter to make the work as complete as feasible. So the editor sent blanks to all known present descendants born of the name to get their records and histories down to 1920; the Shedd vital records of all Massachusetts from 1640 to 1910, of all New Hampshire from 1650 to 1918, and of all Vermont from 1775 to 1860 were secured; all Shedd entries in the United States Census of 1790 were abstracted; and the records of all the Shedds in King Philip's War (1675-77), the French and Indian Wars (1690-1760), the Revolution (1775-1783), the War of 1812-15, the Civil War (1861-65), the Spanish War (1898) and the World War (1917-1919) were also obtained. The editor also made special researches which proved the parentages of Oliver⁴ Shead of Sheffield, Mass. (b. 1736), John⁵ Shed of Hillsboro, N. H. (b. 1756), Col. Oliver⁶ Shead of Eastport, Me. (b. 1777), and Reuben⁶ Shad of Salem, Mass. (b.1769), progenitors of extensive branches, but whose ancestries Mr. Frank Edson Shedd had not been able to determine with certainty. The editor has increased by about twenty-five per cent the known descendants of Daniel¹ Shed, born of the name, beyond those secured by Mr. Frank Edson Shedd.

Before 1800 most of the family spelled the name Shed, although a few used the forms Shead and Shade; but during the last century the form Shedd came into vogue and is now used by nine-tenths of the family, although a few members still cling to Shed, Shead or Shade. In the Genealogy each individual appears with the family name in the spelling apparently preferred and used by him.

The present descendants of Daniel¹ Shed have generally supposed him to have been the ancestor of nearly all the present Shedds in America; but this idea is erroneous. The United States Census of 1790 shows a total of two hundred and ninety-five persons listed under Shed, etc., in New England and New York State, all descendants of Daniel¹ Shed; but the same census shows in the other states a total of one hundred and ninety persons listed under Shed, etc., none of whom descended from Daniel¹ Shed, but were derived from other emigrants from England, Scotland, Ireland and Germany; so in 1790 only about sixty per cent of the Sheds in the United States were descended from Daniel¹ Shed. During the nineteenth century there were numerous other Shedd emigrants to America; so while over eighty per cent of the Shedds now (1920) in the northern, central and western states probably descend from Daniel¹ Shed, it is likely that not much over half of the persons of the name now in the whole country descend from him.

PREFACE

About 1880 the author sought to learn something about his own great-grandfather who had been, tradition said, a revolutionary soldier. In satisfying this curiosity he found others of the family equally anxious to learn about *their* ancestors and thus his researches went on, gathering records where many had sowed and few or none had ever reaped, until they assumed considerable volume.

The family register thus begun and prosecuted and herein presented contains little that will interest the world at large from either an historical or literary view, yet it is hoped it will prove of some service to those who, bound by ties of a common ancestry, have their relationships thus brought together for the first time. It is not a history of famous men nor of high dignitaries in Church or State. Many men seek to honor themselves in that certain ones of their name have been great soldiers, jurists, preachers,— of whose rank they speak with pride. Our forefathers were plain men whose true record is that of honest yeomen, earning their daily bread by the sweat of their brows, clearing up a new country and making homes for their families; pledging their lives for these rights, even through long wars, and once their rights secured returning as sturdily to their customary avocations.

Of such men, — others' ancestors as well as ours, — and their careers, it may not be necessary to write a history. They need it not; the whole country is their memorial; without *them* it would not now exist; it is a worthy and lasting witness. But to collect the names of these men, and women too, from the fast fading pages of many books, here and there, — to say that they did well by all, —

"The best their circumstances allowed,"

and died without aught of fear,— to record such legends of their virtues or their doings as still linger in the memory of the living,— this has been my purpose, so that none who come later need ask in vain,— whence came my parents?

In presenting to my kinsfolk this result of several years' research, it is my pleasure to thank them one and all for their many expressions of interest in the work, and for their uniform kindness in rendering me any aid sought. Though to many it was a new idea that there could be Shedds enough to write a book about, yet nearly all sent me such records as they possessed, and while some delayed answering my letters until two and sometimes more appeals were made, yet it was doubtless not so much from lack of interest as some misunderstanding of the purport of my requests, or under rating their own ability. In only a very few cases have I been refused such information as I sought, though sought, I trust, politely. Of the reasons for those refusals I know not, for what I asked to know was for the good of all without trending upon anything of a personal nature. To all such who could and would not aid me, I can say that they will still find their full record here, in its proper place; if any part prove to be wrong they can blame but themselves, but if the record be correct in details, as I hope, let them remember that no man liveth to himself alone.

It is proper to say here, that while I do not claim all dates or records to be without errors, yet great care has been exercised in this matter, and I trust mistakes will not be found numerous. In some cases several dates for the same event have been found, and in such I have exercised my best judgment to decide which was correct; to guard against perpetuating any errors I shall be glad to explain special cases if they will be pointed out to me and correct them if wrong.

While acknowledging my indebtedness to all who have so kindly helped in this compilation, I cannot in justice neglect expressing special thanks for the many valuable records furnished in their respective branches by Miss Sarah E. Shedd of Sardinia, N. Y., Rev. Henry Shedd of Mount Gilead, Ohio, Mrs. Jane E. (Shedd) Damon of Westminster, Mass., George C. Shedd of Proctorsville, Vt., William H. H. Davis, Esq. of Bolton, N. Y., Mr. George Shedd of South Waterford, Me. and William Barrett Shedd, Esq. of Malden, Mass.

Our gratitude is also due to numerous others not related to our family, including nearly a hundred town officials and registrars, many of whom have gratuitously furnished valuable information, and particularly I would mention the courtesy of the town clerks of Braintree, Billerica and Tewksbury.

In addition to the assistance derived from the many historical works in the city library at Lowell, as well as from careful personal examination of the records of more than a score of towns, churches and probate courts, dating back to the earliest times,— I cannot fail to highly esteem the invaluable aid afforded by the library of the New England Historic Genealogical Society of Boston in pursuing this work.

DIFFERENCE IN TIME

An apparent discrepancy may be found in some dates assigned for events prior to 1752, which may be explained by the difference in time between what is known as "Old Style" and "New Style"

reckoning. Previous to the adoption by Great Britain of the Gregorian Calendar in 1752, the year had different days for beginning in various countries, and even in the same country at different periods.

In England, from the seventh and as late as the thirteenth century, the year began on Christmas Day, or December 25, but in the twelfth century the Anglican Church commenced the year on March 25, or Lady Day, and this was adopted in the fourteenth century by the keepers of the civil records.

This method continued in England and her colonies until 1752 when by the final adoption of the Gregorian Calendar the year was made to commence upon January 1, and to make the legal year correspond more nearly with the natural one, eleven days were stricken out, thus inaugurating the "New Style."

Therefore, when old records mention "the third month" it is to be understood as May, not March, and when an event is mentioned as occurring between January 1 and March 25 and prior to 1752, the year will be double dated, thus 1746/7, meaning the former date by "Old Style" reckoning, the new year not having begun, but the latter year under "New Style" methods.

INTRODUCTION

"But who was his father?"

"It well becometh every man to consider his ancestry and so conduct his life that he bring no shame upon their remembrance."

To be born,— to live,— to die,— has been tersely though somewhat cynically given as the sum of human life. To record correctly these three events, at least, in the life of each one who has borne the surname Shedd in this country was the purpose of the research, the result of which is herein presented.

Because little attempt had hitherto been made by any one to trace the genealogy of the family, it is no evidence of a want of interest in the subject or a lack of that veneration for one's progenitors which seems inherent in the human breast. Some may have thought that because our family boasted no royal connections and prided itself upon no traditions of high official positions, no cause existed for tracing its ancestral lineage, but such is far from a proper sequence. To many who have desired more information than they possessed no occasion ever offered for securing it, or else early separation from the sources of such information cut them off with but scant knowledge of even near relatives and blighted all hope of learning the history of earlier ancestors.

The oft quoted though generally unfounded tradition in most families of three brothers coming hither for a home has a variation in this family, inasmuch as one aged member quotes an old aunt as authority for a report she had heard in youth that of the Shedds two brothers started for these shores but one of them died on the passage, and the aunt always deemed it a pity that his example had not been followed by the brother. Had her judgment been rendered into fact this labor of compilation had been saved.

Though it be true that our forefathers have not supped at royal tables nor been "much honored" with kings' baubles for serving petty commissions, yet their lives were none the less honorable and respected. Even in this country, where royalty held but a limited existence, their rough hands and faces, their heavy boots and their homespun striped frocks may have barred out many of the settlers of the land from the bewigged and powdered circle about the governor's court; yet all these were none the less honorable insignia of men toiling for daily bread and a free home. This attained, living content, they reared their children to lives of usefulness and thus laid the foundations for institutions of which they or their associates never dreamed, and the natural outgrowth of such lives is now the nation's priceless wealth.

Among this notable host of builders was numbered our first American ancestor, DANIEL¹ SHED of Braintree, Mass., before 1643, the progenitor of the majority of those who have borne our surname, however spelled, throughout the country.* Though the name is variously written in the old records as Shed, Shode, Shad, Sheed or Shead, yet in him all the tangled threads of *our* relationships unite, and whatever may have been the proper cognomen of *his* parents, of whom no record has come to us, "we whose names are underwrit" may well join to do him honor.

Our researches have not yet been sufficiently extended to fix his connection with the parent English family, and interesting as this question in itself would prove, its solution must be left to some future time. That the true line of descent could eventually be traced there is little doubt, for from time to time numerous items have been found in published records of the various parishes in England relating to persons bearing similar surnames, both prior to and since the settlement of our branch in America, and a close study of the subject would probably reveal much interesting information.

In this connection may be mentioned what has been claimed as the family's "Coat of Arms," and that all may understand the whole matter a summary of what has been gleaned is presented. Probably most of the Shedds in this country never imagined that such a mark of distinction belonged to any portion of the family, and for such, as will appear, there is no reason for anxiety.


Early in the progress of this work Rev. Henry Shedd of Mount Gilead, O., who had made some study of the family history wrote (11 Feb. 1884) that he believed on what seemed good authority that there was a coat of arms belonging to some family of Shedds and gave the following as the description of it as he had learned, viz.: "He beareth Gules on a Bend engrailed Or three Escutcheons Sable, by the name of Shed of Scotland." (Granted in 15th century.) More recent inquiries for the source of this information traced it to no more authoritative an origin than a manuscript book containing copies of arms in early use among the colonists in America as prepared by Horatio G. Somerby, and is really no

*All the Shedds of New England and New York State down to at least 1790 descended from Daniel Shed; but there were then other Shed, Shad, Shade and Shead families in Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and South Carolina, variously of English, Scotch, Irish and German origin. During the last half century a few Shed emigrants from Ireland and Germany have also settled in New England. voucher whatever that the arms were correctly borne. The following outline will explain the arms thus claimed.

The same description will almost exactly apply to the painting of arms possessed by Mr. Edmund E. Shead of Eastport, Me., a copy of which he has kindly permitted to be taken. This had been handed down in his family and was believed to be reliable and quite old, but on the reverse of the painting, on taking it from its frame, was found a memorandum to the effect that it was copied from the original in Boston about 1840. However it seemed probable that there must be some foundation for the conspiring claims advanced by these two representative but distinct and widely separated branches of the family, and every means for establishing their accuracy was employed. It is to be regretted as a result that no proof has anywhere been found that a coat of arms was ever granted to any one of our name.

To a student of heraldry, the coat of arms herewith portraved bears evidence in every stroke as being the work of either John Coles Sr. or his son John Coles Jr., heraldic painters in Boston from about 1795 to about 1825, and this fact alone casts a doubt upon its authenticity, since it was their well-known custom never to let an applicant for such honors go away unsatisfied whenever a moderate recompense for the clerical work was forthcoming. If the books on heraldry which they possessed did not show that there were arms belonging to some one by the same surname as the customer, which they could copy, then they appropriated that ascribed to some name of a similar sound and the eager aspirant was made happy. So in this case it is found that the arms taken for the Shedds belong according to the rules of heraldry only to some line of the Shiel family and with a slight variation have been borne by Shiells and Shields. To prove that the Shedds are descended from the Shields is not impossible but very improbable, and if accomplished would none the more authorize the bearing of the arms as claimed, for it should be strictly understood that no arms belong to any particular surname, as such, but are granted to one individual and may be borne by him alone and his heirs in lineal descent, and moreover, to Americans the sole value of even genuine coats of arms exists as heirlooms to denote a former honorable ancestry in England.

It is far more probable that the right derivation of the surname will be found from Shade or Shad or Shard or Sherd or Chad instead of Shields,— to all of whom coats of arms were granted, but for reasons already expressed speculation on such points is of little value. Far better to be assured that since the first Shedd settled in America both he and all his descendants have lived honest lives and sought to uphold their own and the country's honor.



DANIEL SHED GENEALOGY

THE ENGLISH ANCESTRY OF DANIEL SHED

[It has been a pleasure for Mr. John G. Shedd of Chicago to supplement or rather anticipate the genealogy of the Shedd family in America. In several conversations with the late Mr. Frank E. Shedd, it became apparent that the family was of English ancestry. After considerable research through various agencies and record searchers in England, it is evident that the English ancestry of the family has now been positively identified. Mr. John G. Shedd finally secured from Mr. J. Gardner Bartlett, a specialist on the English ancestry of the founders of New England, a compiled account of the results of the latter's independent researches on our English ancestry, which compilation Mr. Shedd has pleasure in herewith transmitting as a gift to the Association for publication along with the original manuscript of the American genealogy bequeathed to the Association under the will of Mr. Frank E. Shedd. The facts disclosed as to the English ancestry of the family having been discovered since the death of Mr. Frank E. Shedd, obviously throw new light on the introductory chapter of his research, disclosing that which he very much desired to know, but to the time of his death had not been able to obtain.]

JOHN¹ DE SCHEDDE, born towards the close of the thirteenth century, is the earliest person who has been found bearing the Shedd family name in England. He appears at Edwardstone, County Suffolk, in 1327, as assessed two shillings on a subsidy roll or tax list of a grant made by Parliament to the King in the first year of the reign of King Edward III. (Lay Subsidy for Suffolk, 180 -6, Public Record Office, London.)


Edwardstone is a small rural parish in Suffolk about sixty miles north-east of London and its church is about five miles east of the center of Sudbury, the nearest important town; the population of Edwardstone is now about five hundred and of Sudbury about ten thousand. The church of Edwardstone is an ancient flint structure built in the fifteenth century. The Shedd family name is thus first found in the very heart of the region of England (Suffolk and Essex) from which was derived three centuries later over half of the twenty-five thousand Puritan founders of New England before 1650, the principal percentage of whose blood was of AngloSaxon origin, with small amounts of Norman, Danish and Briton strains. Adjoining Edwardstone on the east is Groton, the home of Gov. John Winthrop the leader in the founding of the Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1630.

The "de" before the surname Schedde indicates it to be a place or locality surname, this first John being "of" or "at" Schedde. That the spelling of the name should begin with "Sch" and not "Sh" is to be expected at that period and in fact so continues until about 1500; any one familiar with the fourteenth century writings of Chaucer and the mystery, morality and miracle dramas of the fifteenth century in Middle English, will recall the general use of "sch" instead of the modern "sh" which dates only from about the beginning of Henry VIII. (1509). The most plausible explanation for use of the word as a name seems to be residence at a ridge, in the sense of the word still preserved in "water-shed."

This John¹ de Schedde is the sole person of the name in Suffolk and Essex in this subsidy roll of 1327 with over twenty-five thousand heads of families representing for the two counties probably a population of nearly one hundred and fifty thousand souls.

It therefore seems reasonable to believe that he was the direct ancestor of Scheddes who appear in the immediate vicinity of Edwardstone on records about a century later, from one of whom, John⁴ Schedde (born about 1390) of Sudbury, only five miles west of Edwardstone, an unbroken line can be traced in Essex down to Daniel¹² Shed, who emigrated to New England before 1642 and established the family in the New World. But the lives and even the names of the two (or possibly three) generations between John¹ de Schedde of Edwardstone in 1327 and his undoubted descendant John⁴ Schedde of Sudbury remain for the present shrouded in oblivion. During this period of English history only scant records now remain concerning the mass of the population. But in the fifteenth century the mists clear away and reveal,

JOHN⁴ SCHEDDE of Sudbury, County Suffolk, born about 1390. This ancient town in Babergh Hundred in Suffolk is situated on the river Stour which separates the counties of Suffolk and Essex, and as early as the Norman Conquest (1066) was a markettown of importance. About 1350 a small colony of Flemings introduced here the manufacture of wollen cloth which rapidly increased in importance, flourished over four centuries as the main industry of the place, and then fell into decay. But during the last century it has been replaced by divers manufactures on a small scale, and the town has become a prosperous place of about ten thousand



population. Since 1554 Sudbury has been an incorporated borough, and it comprises three parishes, All Saints, St. Gregory, and St. Peter, the last-named being in ancient times a chapelry of St. Gregory. The three churches are fine structures of flint and rubble, built principally in the fifteenth century, of which St. Gregory is the most ancient and imposing. The head of Simon de Sudbury, Archbishop of Canterbury, who was seized and beheaded by a mob during Wat Tyler's Bolshevik rebellion in 1381, is still to be seen in a grated niche in the walls of St. Gregory's Church.

Our knowledge concerning John⁴ Schedde is obtained from some ancient manor court rolls of Sudbury which state that he was a fuller (or wollen cloth refiner). The mentions of John⁴ Schedde extend from 1420 to 1437, and among them are the following items: Court held 22 Apr. 8 Henry V. [1420]; John Schedde applies for licence to settle with John Martyn in a plea of trespass. Court held 22 Sept. 11 Henry VI. [1432]; John Schedde, fuller, paid 2s. to the lord of the manor, part of a fine of 8s. to excuse the burgesses of the town from attendance. Court held on Monday after St. Hilary, 12 Henry VI. [18 Jan. 1433/4]; John Schedde sued Agnes Hurry in a plea of trespass; found in mercy on a false claim and fined 2d. Court held 12 Dec. 14 Henry VI. [1435]; John Kendall, John Bocher and John Martyn fined 2d. each for not coming to serve on a jury in a suit between John Schedde, plaintiff, and John Goday, defendant, in a plea of trespass. Court held Hoke Monday 15 Henry VI. [8 Apr. 1437]; the executors of John Schedde paid fine of 2d. for a false claim against John Bocher in a plea of trespass. The will of John⁴ Schedde is not preserved, and the name of his wife is unknown.

JOHN⁵ SCHEDDE, born about 1415, begins to appear on the manor court rolls of Sudbury in 1445, or about eight years after the death of his father, and is mentioned on them frequently for over a score of years until his death early in the year 1467. Among the numerous entries about him are the following: Court held on Hoke Monday, 23 Henry VI. [5 Apr. 1445]; John Schedde fined 3d. for allowing his eaves to drip on the land of John Herde. Court held Hoke Monday, 25 Henry VI. [17 Apr. 1447]; John Schedde and John Herde each fined 2d. for not prosecuting their suits against each other for trespass. Court held 16 Oct. 31 Henry VI. [1452]; John Schedde and William Randolf elected constables. Court held 26 Mar. 31 Henry VI. [1453]; John Eyres sued John Schedde in a plea of trespass, and John Schedde sued John Eyres in a plea of debt, and the goods of Eyres were attached to the value of 3d. Court held 13 May 31 Henry VI. [1453]; John Schedde paid 6d. for licence to settle by arbitration with John Eyres in two pleas of trespass, and paid fine of 6d. for not prosecuting his suits. Court held on Monday before the Feast of St. Luke, 33 Henry VI. [14 Oct. 1454]; John Ficches attached to answer John Schedde in a plea of debt. Court held 11 Feb. 33 Henry VI. [1454/5]; John Ficches paid 3d. for licence to settle with John Schedde in a plea of debt. Court held on Monday after the Feast of St. Leonard, 34 Henry VI. [10 Nov. 1455]; John Schedde complained against John Stowre in a plea of trespass, and against Seykyn Borle in a plea of debt.

Court held on Hoke Monday, 34 Henry VI. [5 Apr. 1456]; the jury presented the wife of John Schedde for assaulting the maidservant of George Prentys and drawing blood; therefore she was adjudged in mercy 6d. Court held on Monday before Penticost, 34 Henry VI. [10 May 1456]; George Prentys complained against John Schedde in a plea of trespass. Court held on the Monday after the Feast of St. John the Baptist, 35 Henry VI. [27 June 1452]; John Schedde sued Laurence Martyn in two pleas of debt. Court held on Monday after the Feast of St. Matthew the Apostle, 36 Henry VI. [26 Sept. 1457]; John Schedde appeared against John Kendale, in a plea of debt of 16d. Court held on Hoke Monday, 36 Henry VI. [10 Apr. 1458]; John Schedde served as one of the jurors. Court held on Monday after the Feast of St. Lucy, 1 Edward IV. [14 Dec. 1461]; John Schedde brought suits against John Coteler and Walter Dolich in pleas of debt. Court held on Monday after the Feast of St. Hilary, 1 Edward IV. [18 Jan. 1461/2]; Walter Dolych and John Coteler appeared to answer John Schedde in pleas of debt. Court held on Monday after the Feast of the Purification of the Virgin, 1 Edward IV. [8 Feb. 1461/2]; John Schedde paid fines of 3d. each for not prosecuting these suits against Coteler and Dolich. Court held 24 May, 2 Edward IV. [1462]; John Coteler and Walter Dolych proceeded against John Schedde in pleas of debt; both adjudged in mercy 3d. John Schedde for unjust complaints against Coteler and Dolych, in mercy 3d. in each case. Court held 7 May, 4 Edward IV. [1464]; Henry Sethenge complained against John Schedde in a plea of debt. Court held 4 June 4 Edward IV. [1464]; John Schedde applied for licence to agree with Henry Sethenge in the latter's plea of debt. Court held Hoke Monday, 7 Edward IV. [6 Apr. 1467]; the executors of the will of John Schedde presented by the jury for his dumping manure on the King's highway, under the wall of the Friary, to the damage of the neighbors; adjudged in mercy and fined 3d.

Further information about John⁵ Schedde is derived from his will which shows that he was a fuller (as his father had been), that he was a man of good substance for his times, and that he left a widow and three adult children at his death early in 1467. His will was written by the priest in Latin (testamentary documents before 1500 being always in that language) and was filed in the Consistory Court of the Bishop of Norwich but later proved in the Prerogative Court of the Archbishop of Canterbury, the probate courts of England all being ecclesiastical, and not civil jurisdictions, until 1858. This John⁵ Schedde was of course a Roman Catholic in religion, as were his ancestors and his children and grandchildren, the Reformation and establishment of the Church of England not being effected until the lifetimes of his greatgrandchildren. Appended is a translated full abstract of his will. At that time money had at least thirty times its present purchasing value.

In the name of God, Amen, the 16 day of March, A.D. 1466/7, I John Schedde of Sudbury, in the Diocese of Norwich, fuller, weak in body but sound of mind, make my testament as follows, I commend my soul to God, St. Mary the Virgin, and all the saints of Heaven; and I will my body to be buried in consecrated cemetery in said Sudbury. I give to the high altar of St. Peter's Chapel in Sudbury, 3s. 4d. I give to the reparation of St. Gregory's Church in Sudbury, 3s. 4d. I give to the Friars of Sudbury, for the reparation of their house, 5 marks $[\pounds 3:6:8]$. I give to the Friars of Clare 3s. 4d. I will that masses be celebrated in St. Peter's Chapel for a year after my decease, for my soul and for the souls of my parents, my executors paying to the priest 8 marks 6s. 8d. sterling $[\pounds 5:13:4]$. I give for the reparations of the Chapel of St. Peter in Sudbury, 6s. 8d. I give to the reparations of the church of Lamarsh [County Essex], 6s. 8d. I bequeath to my wife Alice a house with appurtenances in the Parish of All Saints in Sudbury. I bequeath to my said wife Alice all my household utensils and £20 in money. I bequeath to my son William 10 marks $[\pounds 6:13:4]$ in money. I bequeath to my son John when of age a house with all appurtenances lying in Cherwyth. I give to my daughter Lettice and to her sons 7 marks [£4:13:4] in money. I will that the mansion I live in and the two adjoining houses be sold by my executors to pay my debts and legacies. I bequeath to Emme Goldyng 6s. 8d. I will that if William my son desires, he may purchase the house in which he lives in preference to any other person. All residue of goods to Simon Sparrow and William Gebelon of said Sudbury, whom I ordain and constitute my executors; and I give to them for their pains 20s. Proved 24 Apr. 1467. (P. C. C. 17 Godyn.)

John⁵ Schedde married about 1440, ALICE — who survived him.

Children, probably born in Sudbury:

i. WILLIAM⁶, b. about 1440; according to the will in 1466 of his father, was then living in one of the latter's houses in Sudbury, so evidently was then a married man. The Sudbury Court Rolls show that on 4 June 1464 he was sued by Henry Sethenge for trespass; on 12 Sept. 1474 he was sued by John Tolour for trespass; on 12 Dec. 1485 he was sued by William Frost for a debt; and on 13 Sept. 1487 he complained against Robert Wyderby for trespass.

In June 1476, John Fen brought suit against Thomas Bateman of Hadleigh, weaver, John Colman of same, loader, John Neel of same, weaver, William Schedde of Sudbury, fuller, and Robert Bocher of Little Waldingfield, bocher, for debts totalling $\pounds 4$; the sheriff directed to bring them to court at Michaelmas Term. (Common Plea Rolls, Suffolk, Trinity, 16 Edward IV., roll 859, m. 177d.)

After 1487 William⁶ Schedde disappears from Sudbury records and evidently soon moved to Lavenham, co. Suffolk, about seven miles north-east of Sudbury, and another important town in the cloth trade, as a William Schedde, fuller, was one of the executors of the will of William Baxter of Lavenham, dated 10 Sept. 1492. (Consistory of Norwich.)

He m. about 1465, but his wife's name is unknown. Probable children:

- WILLIAM⁷, b. about 1467; resided in Lavenham; executor of will of his brother John⁷ Shedd in 1517; is mentioned on a Muster Roll of Babergh Hundred, County Suffolk, in 1522, as William Shedde, shoe-maker, of Lavenham, listed to furnish a harness and rated at £3 on goods (Mss. of Earl of Ancaster, fol. 73 d.); also taxed at Lavenham 1s. on goods rated at £2 on the Subsidy of 1524 (Lay Subsidies, Suffolk 180-134, Record Office, London); later history untraced.
- 2. JOHN, b. abt. 1470; was a clothmaker in Lavenham and d. about 1521. The will of John Shedde of Lavenham, county Suffolk, clothmaker, dated 12 Nov. 1517. To be buried in churchyard there. My wife Joane to have my dwelling until my son John be twenty-one, and 40 marks in money. All household goods to be divided between my wife and my children when twenty-one. To sons John and Thomas [blank] in money when twenty-one. To daughter Joane 20 marks when twentyone. Son John to have my dwellinghouse at twenty-one. Son Thomas when twenty-one to have a house I bought of Thomas Egorant. All residue to my executors, viz., my brother William Sheed and Thomas Barton, they to



have 10s. each for their pains. Proved by the executors 10 Oct. 1521. (P. C. C., 16 Maynwaryng.) He m. JOANE———; she appears on a Muster Roll of Babergh Hundred, County Suffolk, in 1522, as Joan Shedde, widow, of Lavenham, listed to furnish a harness and rated at 20s. on lands (Mss. of Earl of Ancaster, fol. 73); she also appears at Lavenham on the Subsidy of 1524 as Johane Shedde, widow, assessed 5s. 8d. on estate rated at £13:6:8. (Lay Subsidies, Suffolk, 180-134.) Children (Shedd): 1. John⁸, b. about 1500. 2. Thomas. 3. Joane.

ii. LETTICE⁶, b. about 1446; was married before 1467, according to her father's will, but the name of her husband is not given.
iii. JOHN, b. about 1450. (See below.)

JOHN⁶ SCHEDDE or SHEDD (John⁵), born about 1450, was under age at the time of the death in 1467 of his father, by whose will he was left a house in the parish of Cherwyth. No records concerning him have been found at Sudbury later than 1483, and evidently about 1485, he settled on the place left to him by his father where he later appears. Cherwyth, Charwryth, Chauryth or Chawreth is in the Hundred of Dunmow in the County of Essex, about twenty miles south-west of Sudbury, and in recent centuries has been generally known as Broxted; the parish consists of two very ancient manors, Chawreth which lies north of the church and Broxted which lies south of it; the parish was generally known by the name of the northern manor until about 1550, but since then has been called Broxted. It is an elevated and hilly rural parish of about three thousand acres with fertile and well cultivated land, and the present population is about six hundred. The ancient church, located on the brow of a hill in the center of the parish, is a stone structure built mostly in the latter part of the thirteenth century. The registers begin in 1654.

John⁶ Schedde (or Shedd) has been found mentioned in numerous entries in the court rolls of the manor of Sudbury between 1471 and 1483, but does not appear in those of Henry VII. (1485-1509). Among these mentions in Sudbury are the following: Court held 14 Oct. 11 Edward IV. [1471]; John Schedde paid a fine of 2d. for licence to agree with William Skeldere in a plea of debt. Court held 20 Jan. 11 Edward IV. [1471/2]; the sureties of John Schedde paid 2d. for him to answer John Baker in a plea of debt. Court held 17 Feb. 11 Edward IV. [1471/2]; the sureties of John Schedde paid 3d. for him to answer John Baker in a plea of debt. Court held 9 March 12 Edward IV. [1471/2]; the sureties of John Schedde paid 2d. for him to answer John Baker in a plea of debt. Court held 9 March 12 Edward IV. [1472]; John Schedde paid a fine of 2d. for licence to agree with John Baker in a plea of debt. Court held 1 June 12 Edward IV. [1472]; John Schedde in mercy 2d. for unjustly suing John Overe in a plea of debt. Court held on Monday after Hilary, 12 Edward IV. [18 Jan. 1472/3]; the sureties of John Schedde paid 2d. for him to answer Richard Grey in a plea of debt. Court held 23 Aug. 13 Edward IV. [1473]; John Schedde paid 2d. for a licence to agree with Richard Grey in a plea of trespass.

Court held 28 March 14 Edward IV. [1474]: John Schedde paid 3d. for a licence to agree with Peter Robert in a plea of debt. Court held 7 Aug. 15 Edward IV. [1475]; John Schedde paid a fine of 3d. for not prosecuting his suit against Simon Potyer in a plea of debt. Court held on Monday on the Feast of St. Hilary, 22 Edward IV. [13 Jan. 1482/3]; John Tolour sued John Schedde in a plea of debt. Court held 3 March 22 Edward IV. [1482/3]; Thomas Grymston brought suit against John Schedde in a plea of 'debt; also the sureties of John Schedde paid 3d. for him to answer John Tolour in a plea of debt. Court held 24 Mar. 23 Edward IV. [1482/3]; John Schedde paid 3d. for licence to agree with Thomas Grymston in a plea of debt. At this court the jurors reported that Robert Heynes assaulted John Schedde, and therefore he was adjudged in mercy 6d. Court held 12 May 1 Edward V. [1483]; John Schedde paid 3d. for a licence to agree with John Tolour in a plea of trespass. This is the last record of John⁶ Schedde in Sudbury.

About 1485 John⁶ Schedde removed from Sudbury to his place in Chawreth (now Broxted) in Essex, where he is mentioned as a witness on a deed of land there conveyed on the morrow of the Feast of St. Matthew, 6 Henry VII. [22 Sept. 1490], by John Saville to Thomas Barnard. Over thirty years elapse before John⁶ Schedde is again found mentioned. In 14 Henry VIII. a subsidy was granted to that monarch by Parliament, which was practically as inclusive as a male poll-tax, as even farm laborers and servants were taxed for their mere wages. The subsidy was paid in two installments, in 1523 and 1524. For the first payment in 1523 the roll for Chawreth in Dunmow Hundred, co. Essex, shows John⁶ Shedd, Sen. taxed 4d. for goods rated at 20s. and John⁷ Shedd [Jun.] taxed 20s. on goods rated at £20. For the second payment in 1524, John⁷ Shead continues on the list as taxed 20s. on £20; but John⁶ Shedd, Sen., disappears from the list, so it is to be concluded that he died in 1523, at the age of over seventy years. (Lay Subsidies, Essex, 108-161 and 108-202, Record Office, London.) An examination of these subsidy rolls of 1523-24 for the two hundred parishes of the western half of County Essex shows no other Shedd; so it seems evident that these two John Shedds in Chawreth (now Broxted) in 1523 were father and son, and ancestors of all the Shedds in that vicinity during the following century. Among the parishes adjoining Broxted are Debden on the north and Thaxted and Great Easton on the east where the next four generations of the family resided.

John⁶ Schedd (or Shedd) was married about 1480, but the name of his wife is unknown and evidences have been found of only one

i. JOHN⁷, born about 1480, probably Sudbury, Co. Suffolk. (See below.)

JOHN⁷ SHEDD (John⁶, John⁵), born about 1480, probably in Sudbury, County Suffolk, is first found of record, as previously mentioned, on the subsidy rolls of 1523 and 1524, as assessed at Chawreth in Essex 20s. on goods rated at £20. (Lay Subsidies, Essex, 108-161 and 108-202.) He paid much the largest tax in the parish of which he was the wealthiest inhabitant (except the lords of the two manors) and he was also one of the two collectors of the subsidy for that parish which amounted to £5:11:0, so John⁷ Shedd paid nearly a fifth of the whole tax of the place. The fact that he had so large an amount in goods, rather than in lands, would indicate that he was in some kind of business rather than engaged in farming. A few years later he moved into the adjoining parish of Debden in Uttlesford Hundred of County Essex, where he appears as "John Shede, able man," on a Muster Roll of 27 Henry VIII. [1535]. (Exchequer Accounts), Kings Remembrancer, 549-8, Record Office, London.) He died in Debden in 1542, at the age of about sixty years.

The will of John Shedde of Debden, County Essex, dated "the daie of Saint Roke [Rochus] the Confessor, that is the morn next after the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary 1541," [16 Aug. 1541]. To be buried in the churchyard of Debden. To the high alter there for tithes forgotten, 12d. To the reparation of St. Pauls [Cathedral, London], 12d. To the reparation of the church of Debden 6s. 8d. To the reparation of the King's highway between Debden and Walden against Peryton Field otherwise called Palmer's Field, 40s. To the poor of Debden, Thaxted and Newport, 6s. 8d. each, and to the poor of Henham, 3s. 4d. The residue of all my goods, movable and immovable, household effects, corn, cattle, jewelry and money, after my debts are paid, will fulfilled and funeral done, I give to my wife Joane as long as she remain my widow, and at her marriage or death, reversion to my sons and daughters then living. I appoint as executors my sons Thomas Shedde and John Shedde, to each of whom I bequeath 6s. 8d. Witnesses, Henry Hamond of Thaxted and Sir Thomas Pyrry, vicar of Broxted. Proved by the executors 18 Decr. 1542. (Archdeaconry of Colchester, Somerset House, London, Register "Sargeant," fol. 212.)

He married about 1507, JOANE ———; she appears at Debden in Uttlesford Hundred, County Essex, in the subsidy of 35 Henry VIII. [1543], as Joane Shedd widow, taxed 8d. (Lay Subsidy, Essex, 109-281, Record Office, London.)

Children, born probably in Broxted, County Essex:

On the fortnight after Easter, 4 and 5 Philip and Mary [25 Apr. 1558], John Mede, querant, bought of John Shedde and Joane his wife, deforciants, ten acres of land etc. in Berden, County Essex; consideration £40. On the octave of Michaelmas 15 Elizabeth [7 Oct. 1573], Richard Hamond, querant, bought of John Shedd and Joane his wife, deforciants, a dwellinghouse, garden, apple orchard, twenty acres of arable land, two acres of meadow, ten acres of pasture and one acre of woodland in Debden, County Essex; consideration £80. (Feet of Fines, Essex, Easter 4 & 5 Philip and Mary, and Michaelmas 15 Elizabeth, Record Office, London.) He was bur. at Debden 22 Oct. 1575.

Will of John Shedd of Debden, co. Essex, husbandman, dated 18 Oct. 1575. To be buried in churchyard there. All my goods and chattels, moveable and immoveable, to my wife Joane, she to bring my body to the earth, pay all my debts, take all residue, and be sole executrix. Witnesses, Thomas Shedd and Richard Baynes. (Archdeaconry of Colchester, Register "Roote," fol. 7.)

He m. about 1541, JOANE who survived him. Although his will names no issue he was probably the father of the following



THOMAS⁸ SHEDD ($John^7$, $John^6$, $John^5$), was born in Chawreth (now Broxted), County Essex, in 1508, but when a young man settled in the adjoining rural parish of Debden in Uttlesford Hundred where he passed the rest of his life. This hilly parish covers about forty-five hundred acres, has a population of about eight hundred, and contains six manors, viz: Debden Hall, Deanes,

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Tendring, Weldbarnes, Molehall, and Amberden Hall, the latter located on rising ground in a grove two miles south-east of the church. This church as originally built in the fourteenth century had the form of a cathedral, with nave, aisles, chancel and transepts, and a central tower over the junction of these members; but the tower fell about 1750, demolishing the transepts and chancel, and only the latter was rebuilt, and a small bell turret added to the western end of the nave. The structure is partly of stone and partly of brick. The register dates from 1557.

Thomas⁸ Shedd was one of the executors of the will of his father in 1541 as previously related. His name appears at Debden on two subsidy rolls; first in 35 Henry VIII, [1543] when he was taxed 6d., and secondly in 14 Elizabeth [1572] when he paid 6s. on goods rated at £6. (Lay Subsidies, Essex, 109-281 and 111-441, Record Office, London.)

The next mentions found of Thomas⁸ Shedd are in connection with some litigation in Debden, which shows that he held lands of the manor of Amberden Hall. In 1582, Thomas Harrison sued Edmund West, Esq., then lord of Amberden Hall, in regard to a dwellinghouse and thirty acres of land known as "Cross Tenement," parcel of said manor. Thomas⁸ Shedd was called as a witness by the plaintiff, and on 10 Oct. 1582, at Saffron Walden, gave his evidence. "Thomas Shede of Depden, in the County of Essex, aged seventie fower years or thereabouts, being sworn, deposes: He knows the plaintiff and the defendant and knows the dwelling and land in question which are holden by copy of court roll of the manor of Amberden Hall, and he hath heard by the report of his father, now deceased, that it was a tenement granted by copy of court roll over sixty years now past." (Chancery Depositions, Elizabeth - Charles I, H-53-11.) In 1587, two years after the death of Thomas⁸ Shedd, Oliver Buckenham and Katherine his wife sued the above Edmund West in regard to the same "Cross Tenement," and in the bill of complaint they state: "At a court of the manor held in September 10 Elizabeth [1568], Thomas Harrison surrendered the premises into the hands of the lord of the manor, according to custom, by the hands of Thomas Shedd and William Woode, then copyholders of said manor, to the use of John Morris and his heirs." (Chancery Proceedings, Elizabeth, B-b-19-14.)

During the lifetime of Thomas⁸ Shedd the Reformation, or revolt from the Church of Rome, was permanently accomplished on the accession of Elizabeth in 1558; and he and his children conformed to the Protestant Established Church of England. He died in Debden at the age of seventy-seven years and was buried there 8 Feb. 1584/5, leaving the following will:

In the name of God Amen, I Thomas Shedd of Depden in the County of Essex, Yeoman, being in good and perfect minde, thanks be to Allmighty God, make and ordayne this my Last Will and testament, Revokinge all other heretofore made, inn manner and form following. First and principally I commend my soule to Allmyghty God and my body to be buried at the discretion of my executor. And as concerning my landes and goods, I will them all as followeth: First, I will and bequeath fower acres of land by estimation, called "The Lees" otherwise [blank] and Mayse pightell, lately bought of Henry Collin, to Thomas my son for term of his life; the remainder thereof to William, son of the said Thomas, and his heirs forever. I will to Francis my son 20 nobles [£6:13:4] to be paid by John my son or his heirs within three years after my decease. I will to Thomas my son £20 of money, to be paid by my said son John within one year after my decease. I will to Thomas Shedd, son of said Francis, £3:6:8 to be paid within four years after my decease. To my daughter Alice Kinge 20s. within six years after my decease. All residue to my son John whom I make sole executor of this my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have sealed and subscribed this my last will and testament the 13th day of January in the 27th year of our Sovereign Lady Elizabeth, Queen of England, etc., [1584/5]. Witnesses: Symon Spatchure, Richard Baynes, John Marchant. Proved 20 Mar. 1584/5 by the executor John Shedd. (Commissary Court of Bishop of London for Essex and Herts, Original Will, Bundle for 1584, No. 54.)

Thomas⁸ Shedd was married about 1538; but the name of his wife, who evidently predeceased him, has not been found.

THOMAS⁹ SHEDD (*Thomas*⁸, John⁷, John⁶, John⁵), was born in Debden, County Essex, in 1545, and was living there at the time of his marriage in 1572. During the next four years he resided in the adjoining parish of Great Easton, and in 1576 moved into the adjacent larger town of Thaxted where he continued about a score of years. While living here he inherited by the will of his father in 1584/5 four acres of land called "The Lees," an enclosed field called "Mays" and a legacy of £20 in money. He later returned to Great Easton, where he died in 1612, aged about sixtyseven years. In various records he is termed a husbandman [farmer].

Great Easton is a rural village and parish comprising about twenty-five hundred acres, mostly well cultivated, and with a population of about one thousand. There are two ancient manors, viz., the small Manor of Blamsted Hall, and the principal Manor of Great Easton. The church of Great Easton is an ancient stone structure of mixed styles of architecture from the twelfth to the fourteenth centuries, and its parish registers are preserved from 1558. Thaxted has always been a more populous and important place, and existed as a town even at the Roman period; about 1555 it was created a borough and market town, and was in ancient times an important center of the iron trade; but the corporate charter was annulled in 1687. Thaxted covers over six thousand acres, has a population of about two thousand, and has quite a village near the ancient church which is a large and fine flint and stone structure with buttressed and embattled walls, and a western tower surmounted by a lofty croketed spire. The registers date from 1538. The ancient village Guild hall and the castellated manor house of Horham Hall, two miles south-west of the church, are picturesque edifices. The socialist Countess of Warwick is now the principal landowner and the patron of the vicarage in which she has placed a socialist clergyman who flies a red flag in the church to the perturbation of the community.

A Thaxted litigation furnishes some interesting information about Thomas⁹ Shedd. From the bills of complaint, answers, replications, and voluminous interrogatories and depositions in the matter, the following facts are gleaned in the case of Cutts vs. Armiger and Sparrow. In 1570, Sir John Cutts, Knt., lord of the Manor of Horham Hall in Thaxted, removed for some years from Thaxted and leased for forty-one years a large farm in the manor, with farm houses, to one Edward Armiger who settled there. On 29 Sept. 1579 the latter privately sub-leased part of his farm for nine years to Thomas⁹ Shedd, a few years later privately mortgaged the farm to a nephew, one Robert Sparrow, and afterwards publicly conveyed a part of the residue of his term to one Richard Clark. In 1584 Sir John Cutts resumed residence at Horham Hall, and desiring the use of Armiger's farm he bought back the term of Armiger and the interest of Clark, both of whom doubtless exacted a high price from the knight. After completing this transaction, the latter was confronted with the to him undisclosed encumbrances to Shedd and Sparrow. Sir John then brought suits in equity against Armiger and Sparrow in June 1584, both in the Court of Chancery and the Court of Star Chamber, alleging the purported conveyances to Shedd and Sparrow were fraudulent. Among the interrogatories by Cutts to Armiger the eighth dealt with Shedd, viz: "What is Thomas Shedde named in your answer, where does he dwell, what part of the premises does he hold, by what assurance, for what period, at what date and at what rent? When, where and by whom was the alleged deed made and who were the witnesses?". In reply Armiger deposes: "Thomas Shedd named in interrogatory is a husbandman dwelling in Thaxted, and deponent granted to him the greatest part of the premises by indenture of lease to said Shead for nine years for a certain yearly rent therein specified, and previous to the mortgage to Sparrow.

But defendant received no fine [or cash payment] for this lease on which there were no agreements other than as specified in said indenture which was written by one Barnard of Stortford [Bishop's Stortford, co. Herts], a scrivener; and one Richardson and another Barnard were witnesses." "Thomas Shedde of Thaxted, County Essex, husbandman, of the age of forty years, deposes 30 Jan. 1585/6. He knoweth the complainant and hath seen the defendant Sparrow, and knoweth the farm and lands in Thaxted which Edward Armiger had by lease of Sir John Cutts. The deponent states that he is the same Thomas Shedd referred to in the interrogatory, and further states that said Armiger did lease the greatest part of said farm to him this deponent for the term of nine years, which lease is yet in being and in force, and of said term there are yet enduring and to come two years and as much more as unto the Feast of St. Michael the Archangel next ensuing [29 Sept. 1586]. And deponent sayeth that he has occupied said leased part of said farm in his own tenure and occupation, and dwelt upon the same by virtue of said lease." (Star Chamber Proceedings, Elizabeth, C-6-39 and C-77-5; also Town Depositions in Chancery, Bundle 182.) The above farm became known as "Armigers," still bears that name, and the mansion is on the north-westerly side of the highway from Broxted to Thaxted, half-way between the churches of these parishes and at the junction of a driveway to Horham Hall which is a quarter of a mile behind "Armigers." In the suit in 1584 between John Cutts and Edward Armiger the latter states the lease was made in 12 Elizabeth [1570] through a fine; and a fine is recorded, made in Easter, 12 Elizabeth, between Arthur Armiger and William Frevell, querants, and John Cutts and wife Anne, deforciants, of two dwellinghouses, two gardens, one hundred and forty acres of arable land, twenty acres of meadow, sixty acres of pasture and six acres of woodland, in Thaxted, County Essex; consideration £372. (Feet of Fines, Essex, Easter, 12 Elizabeth, Record Office, London.) This fine must be the one referred to by Edward Armiger, and the querants mentioned were evidently feoffees acting for him, Arthur Armiger being his son. Fines made through feoffees were a common practice, the exact nature and details of the transaction appearing only in the indentures.

The mansion still called "Armigers" was always occupied during his tenure from 1570 to 1584 by Edward Armiger himself, according to his own statements in the suit; and as Thomas⁹ Shedd states that after he subleased from Armiger in 1579 the "greatest part" of said farm that he "dwelt upon same," he must have lived in the other dwellinghouse (with garden) mentioned in the fine. About two hundred yards beyond the mansion of "Armigers," towards Thaxted and on the same side of the highway, is a very ancient cottage, still included in Armiger's Farm and tenanted, and now called "Common Cottage" from its location near some commons land. From its construction and appearance this old house seems to have been built before the reign of Elizabeth (1558) and there is no other old house on Armigers Farm (except the mansion). It is therefore apparent that this "Common Cottage" was the very house occupied several years after 1579 by Thomas⁹ Shed, great-grandfather of Daniel¹² Shed the emigrant to America about 1640. This house is about forty feet long and fifteen feet deep, with stucco exterior walls and thatched roof. The ground floor is paved and the main room has a huge fireplace. The main story is less than seven feet high, and there being no plastered ceiling, all the curious handhewn timberwork of the second floor is clearly visible.

The will of Thomas Shedd of Great Eystane [Easton], County Essex, husbandman, sick in body but in perfect memory, dated 8 June, 10 James I. [1612]. To be buried in the parish churchyard of Great Eystane. To my son Thomas Shedd 3s. 4d. to be paid within three months after my decease by my executors. To my son William Sheed 3s. 4d. to be paid within three months after my decease by my executors. To my son Daniel Shed 3s. 4d. to be paid within three months after my decease by my executors. To my daughter Mary Shed a flock bed, a pillow, a blanket, a covering, and a pewter platter, to be delivered by my executors. All the rest of my goods that were mine before I married Elizabeth my now wife, I give to my said wife Elizabeth and to John Shedd my son, to be equally divided between them. All the goods that I had by my said wife Elizabeth, I give to her again. I appoint my wife Elizabeth and my son John Shedd executors, and the charges of the court to be borne by all my children named in my will. [Signed] Thomas + Shed [mark]. Witnesses: Samuel Enever, John Wright. Proved 1 Oct. 1612. (Commissary Court of the Bishop of London for Essex and Herts, Original Will, Bundle for 1612.)

Thomas⁹ Shedd married first, at Debden, 23 Nov. 1572, URSULA RICHARDSON; she had seven children and was buried in Great Easton Churchyard 4 May 1603.

He married secondly, at Great Easton, 16 Apr. 1604, ELIZABETH ROWLEY who was buried there 9 Feb. 1635/6; no children by this marriage.

THOMAS¹⁰ SHED (*Thomas*⁹, *Thomas*⁸, *John*⁷, *John*⁶, *John*⁵), was baptized at Great Easton, County Essex, 13 Mar. 1574/5, but when an infant was taken by his parents in their removal into the adjoining town of Thaxted where he was brought up, and like his father and grandfather he became a husbandman or yeoman or farmer. Soon after he became of age he married and settled in Finchingfield in Hinckford Hundred, County Essex, a rural parish of which the church lies five miles east of Thaxted Church, the two parishes being separated only by the parishes of Little Sampford and Little Bardfield. Unfortunately the parish registers of Finchingfield before 1617 are lost, although completely preserved from the latter year, so that the record of the marriage of Thomas¹⁰ Shed and the baptisms of his children are not found, but their names are supplied by his will.

Finchingfield is about forty-five miles north-east from London by charming motor road through Chigwell, Ongar and Great Dunmow, the last-named place, nine miles distant, being the nearest railroad station. The parish is rather flat and low, covers over eight thousand acres, has a population of about fifteen hundred, and near the centre and church is a large village built about Finchingfield Green. The church, located on a slight hill, is a large and ancient structure of flint, consisting of chancel with sidechapels, long nave with aisles, north and south porches, and a square western tower with embattled parapet, formerly surmounted by a lofty spire which was blown down in 1702. In the tower there is a chime of eight bells requiring restoration. In the chapels are several fine altar tombs of families who were lords of the manors in ancient times. There are several manors in the parish, of which Spains Hall and Cornish Hall are the most important. Finchingfield was the birthplace of the emigrant Daniel¹² Shed and the home of his father and grandfather.

Thomas ¹⁰ Shed was the first of the family to locate in Finchingfield, and all the Sheds there in the seventeenth century were descended from him. As "Old Thomas Shed" he was buried there 9 Sept. 1637, leaving the following will, literally copied:

In the name of God, Amen, the fowertene daye of August 1637, I Thomas Sheade of Fynchingfield in the Countie of Essex, Husbandman, beinge of good & perfect remembrance, thankes be to Almightie God therfor, Do make and ordayne this my Laste will and testement in maner and forme followinge. First, I give and bequeath my soule into the hands of God who gave it me, hopinge and trustinge throw the merittes of Jesus Christe my onlye Saviour to have forgiveness of my synnes and Lyffe everlastinge in Hevene. Secondly, concerninge my goodes, I dispose them as hereafter: First, I give and bequeath unto Kathren my wyff xx s. of good and lawfull money of England to be payed by my Executor within one yeare after my Decesse. Itm. I give unto Thomas Shede my sonne and unto Suzan my Daughter and Elizabeth my Daughter xijd. apece within one weeke next after my Decese. All the rest of my goods and chattels and moveables, goods within howsse and without howsse whatsoever, I give and bequeath unto Danyell Sheed my sonne, to be ordered and Dispossed at the Discrission of my executor. And I Doe ordayne and apoynt my sonne Danyell Shead my sole Executor of this my Last will and testement, prayinge and desieringe hime to Deale truly as I hoope he will. Memaru'. I doe give unto Suzan Kent my grayndchilde the Beed and beddinge she lye on, and a whele and rele. Sealed, delivered, acknowledged, and published this to be the Last will of me the said Thomas in the presence of us, Robert Cracknell, Francis Mascall, William Mascall, John Mascall. [Signed] The mark of H Thomas Shead. Proved 15 Oct. 1640. (Archdeaconry Court of Middlesex, Essex and Herts, Bundle "Brown," No. 52.) The spelling in this will seems strange, but spelling was not standardized before 1700, even among the educated; witness the History of Plymouth by Gov. Bradford, of college education.

Thomas¹⁰ Shed married about 1596, KATHARINE ——— who survived him.

(Commissary Court of Bishop of London for Essex and Herts, Bundle for 1639/40, No. 148.)

DANIEL¹¹ SHED (Thomas¹⁰, Thomas⁹, Thomas⁸, John⁷, John⁶, John⁵), was born about 1596, doubtless in Finchingfield, where the registers before 1617 are missing, so the record of his baptism is lost. He was evidently named for his uncle Daniel¹⁰ Shed. He became a yeoman in Finchingfield and resided, at least at one period, in the manor of Cornish Hall (which is located about three miles north of the church), as at a manor court with view of frankpledge held there 19 May 1627, the court rolls show that Daniel Shedd and James Chaplyn were assessors of fines of the manor. (Court Rolls of Cornish Hall in Honour of Clare, Duchy of Lancaster, Bundle 120, No. 1843, Public Record Office, London.) That Daniel¹¹ Shed was held in good esteem in his parish is apparent from the fact that he held in the church from 1631 to 1635 the office of questman (now termed sidesman). As the eldest son, he was made the residuary legatee and executor of his father's will in 1637, as previously related.

In Feb. 1641/2, Parliament sent a manifesto throughout


England, to test public opinion, protesting against any influence in the Government by the Church of Rome. Copies were sent to the constables of every parish in the country, who were ordered to show or read it to every male inhabitant over eighteen years of age, to list the names of all those persons who signed it or assented, and also to list the names of all who refused to sign. These lists were soon returned to Parliament, and many of them are still preserved. giving the names of all males in a parish over eighteen years of age. Among these so-called Protestation Rolls of 1642, which are preserved at the Houses of Parliament, are those for all the parishes in Hinckford Hundred, County Essex, including Finchingfield for which over two hundred names appear, among them that of "Danyell Shead." He evidently continued in Finchingfield until his death where he was buried 8 Feb. 1656/7, leaving no will, nor was any administration taken out on his estate. He was about sixty years of age at the time of his decease.

He married about 1617, SARAH ————. "The wife of Daniel Shed buried 29 May 1638." (Finchingfield Registers.)



SHED (Daniel¹¹, Thomas¹⁰, Thomas⁹, Thomas⁸, DANIEL¹² John⁷, John⁶, John⁵), was bapt. 25 June 1620 in the ancient parish church of Finchingfield, County Essex, as appears from its old parchment register still perfectly preserved from 1617. The venerable church (except for loss of its spire) still presents the same appearance as it did just three centuries ago when the infant eyes of Daniel¹² Shed first beheld it; even the very font, which held the sacred water with which he was christened, still remains in regular use. This baptismal record is the sole mention of him in these registers which have been carefully examined down to 1710; if he had died there his burial would have been recorded. His father, Daniel¹¹ Shed, in no record in Finchingfield is ever termed "senior," nor is there anything to infer that there were ever two Daniel Sheds of adult age living there at the same time. In the Protestation Roll of Feb. 1641/2, only one Shed appears in Finchingfield, Daniel¹¹ Shed; at that time the son Daniel¹² Shed was nearly twenty-two years of age; as all males over eighteen years old are

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
listed, and as Daniel¹² Shed does not appear on this roll either in Finchingfield or in any of the other surrounding forty-five parishes of the Hundred, it is evident that he had removed from the neighborhood before February 1641/2.

During the period of 1630-1642, about twenty-five thousand English Puritans emigrated to New England, either to escape religious restrictions or with the hope of bettering their material condition. Over half of these emigrants were from the counties of Essex and Suffolk, and among them was Daniel¹² Shed who first appears on records in New England in 1643, in Braintree, Mass. This town was named for Braintree in Essex, only eight miles south-east of Finchingfield, and a large majority of the early settlers of Braintree, Mass., are known to have come from various parishes in Essex and Suffolk in England within a fifteen-mile radius of the mother town of Braintree. Neither the date of sailing, the port of departure, nor the name of the vessel which brought Daniel¹² Shed to New England has been discovered; but his emigration must have taken place before 1642, so probably about 1640, or about the time he became of age.

So here may be framed a very real mental picture of the emigrant Daniel¹² Shed, raised as a farmer's boy in rural Essex in eastern England, amid strong Puritan influences, and while yet a youth so imbued with their fervid religious faith and desire for liberty as to join the memorable throng that left their beloved ancestral homes and braved the perils of the deep and the hardships of pioneer life in a savage wilderness to found a nation in the New World.

> "What sought they thus afar?— Bright jewels of the mine? The wealth of seas, the spoils of war?— They sought a Faith's pure shrine!"

The substantial worth of this epochal emigration, extolled for two centuries by many writers, was aptly set forth by William Stoughton in his sermon at the Massachusetts general election of 1668: "God sifted a whole nation that he might send choice grain into this wilderness." In the three centuries that have elapsed since the birth in 1620 of Daniel¹² Shed, he has become the progenitor of nearly four thousand descendants born of the name Shedd, and of scores of thousands of descendants born of thousands of other family names, now dispersed all over the United States. This old New England stock, derived from the Puritan founders like Daniel¹² Shed, has been the predominant element in influence in American institutions among the population of our northern and western states.




CHURCH IN FINCHINGFIELD, ENGLAND Where several generations of the Daniel Shed family lived in the 16th and 17th centuries

In the preceding pages has been set forth for the first time the history of the ancestry of Daniel¹² Shed during a period of over three centuries prior to his emigration to New England about 1640. His career in the New World and the records of his descendants in America, compiled during many years by the late Frank E. Shedd, form the remainder and main part of this volume.

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DESCENDANTS OF DANIEL SHED

1. DANIEL¹ SHED, born in England, probably about 1620, was the progenitor of our family in America. It is a matter of sincere regret that the exact date of or the circumstances attending his arrival on these shores have not been learned, although every available avenue in America has been searched for the information. The name of Daniel Shed appears among those of the earliest settlers in ancient "Brantrey" as early as 1643, and, along with it, among the founders of this town seated on the southern shores of Massachusetts Bay, may be found the family names of Adams, Quincy, Barrett and Spaulding, with others well known in later American history.

Before entering upon the full story of his life and the record of his descendants, it will be well to divest the mind of all knowledge of material things as now existing in New England and go back in imagination to the conditions and circumstances that this group of settlers found when they made their first appearance here nearly three centuries ago, in order to judge more correctly of their careers. Banish then from mind our contiguous towns and cities. Banish not alone the mills and marts, the railways and telegraphs of which the ceaseless throbbing measures like a pulse the nation's health through all the arteries of its vast business life; banish everything that over two centuries of increasing civilization has wrought; find a land without a name, a land almost without homes save here and there a few rude ones or such habitations as fortune hunters raise; a land untraversed, untrapped and of unknown extent. Such was the country to which the Puritans came. Then an almost unbroken wilderness met an equally unknown ocean with scarce a score of little settlements along the entire eastern coast intervening at the most accessible points to offer their puny resistance to the supremacy of nature. These were but the germs of our present development, yet like leaven was their mighty influence.

Single handed each little band began its struggle; they sought full freedom of action and trusted not each other lest one should seek to override another's rights; against the denizens of the forests and fields alone were they united as against a common foe. How vast the country, how broad the problem that met these first settlers they themselves little realized, else one well might fear lest their strength be not sufficient to overcome the difficulties; yet upheld by a sublime faith they sought no backward path but with noble persistence broke down all obstacles that rose before them.

To the south some thirty or forty miles was Plymouth Colony where the Pilgrims came first, quite a score of years before, there to establish their homes and enjoy "freedom to worship God" as to their minds seemed best; there still they dwelt, with added friends and strength, exemplifying the beauty of their faith,— a pilgrim band. Northward, little more than half as far, was Naumkeag (Salem) and a little beyond was Agawam (Ipswich), where at each a little church band had settled seeking under its favorite preacher to secure social and religious freedom, and already both were bearing evidence of a sturdy growth.

And here again where the Charles River spreads out into a broad harbor were clustered several little settlements under the general name of Massachusetts Bay Colony. Though of later establishment, yet already they evinced more rapid development by reason of the fewer restrictions imposed upon immigration, by which greater influence was lent toward settlement than at the sister settlements. Boston, on its then narrow neck of land, was thus early the chief town, and, strange as it seems, with less than a hundred houses within its bounds, its citizens felt severely hampered for room. For their relief the General Court was persuaded in 1634 to grant for an extension of territory a tract of land near Mount Wollaston, a few miles south but bordering on the same harbor. Within a few years the ministers and other leading men received grants of land there, ranging from a hundred to over a thousand acres each, in return for which they were to establish industries and induce settlement thereon, both for personal profit and public welfare.*

BRAINTREE

In the broad plantation that was thus established, settlement had not progressed very far when early in 1640 the General Court set off the territory as a separate town under the name of Braintree. There also our first ancestor Daniel¹ Shed fixed his home about this same time.


*Chronological Order of Settlements in New England. The Pilgrims came to Plymouth in 1620. Endecott with the first Puritan company founded Salem in 1628. The charter of the Massachusetts Bay Colony was granted in 1629, and in 1630 a fleet of fourteen ships brought 1500 colonists under Gov. Winthrop, who founded that year the towns of Boston, Dorchester, Charlestown, Hull, Medford, Roxbury and Watertown. Cambridge and Lynn were settled in 1632, Ipswich, Andover and Hingham in 1634, and Braintree, Concord and Newbury in 1635. Over twenty other towns were also established in the Massachusetts Bay Colony before Billerica was settled in 1653 and incorporated as a town in 1655. To show the relation of the early towns or colonies we append an outline map, and as interesting matter upon the subject we make a few extracts from the valuable history of the old town as compiled by Dr. W. S. Pattee.

As early as 1622, only two years after the landing of the Pilgrims, one Thomas Morton visited Mt. Wollaston, as it was later known, and was much pleased with its appearance and with the abundance of fish found off the shore. In Sept. 1625 Capt. Wollaston with about thirty adventurers came from England and began a settlement there, but the next spring he sailed to Virginia and the company was broken up. Thomas Morton (a lawyer from Cliffords Inn, London) again turned up in the settlement and securing the leadership set up a free and easy manner of life; shrewdly treating the Indians kindly to secure their friendship, the company indulged freely in drinking and sport. The name "Merry Mount" was given the place and they set up the first and only "May Pole" ever raised in Puritan New England.

This free mode of life was a great offence to the religion of the staid Puritans and Separatists comprising the other colonies upon the coast, who soon took stringent measures to remove the source' of evil; after many futile attempts Morton was finally taken and in Sept. 1631 was sent back to England while his house was burned and his property confiscated and the party scattered by order of the General Court of Massachusetts.

The first permanent settlement of the place may be traced from 1634 when the territory was assigned to Boston for an extension of its territory. All who came previously were mere adventurers having no interest or sympathy with the sentiments held by the majority of the colonists; but the stigma resting upon the place by reason of the unpuritancial reputation of these first occupants hindered its development in a large degree. The tide of immigration was now setting in strong, and most of the land upon the peninsula of Boston being taken up grants were more readily taken for settlement in this new territory. The settlers there came largely from the counties of Lincoln, Suffolk and Essex in England.

By the records of the General Court the first grant was to Rev. John Wilson in 1635. Mr. Wm. Hutchinson had in 1636, two years after his arrival, "a sufficient farm laid out for him at Mount Wollastone" and in 1637 "our brother [Rev.] John Wheelwright" received "an allottment of 250 acres," but he was afterwards expelled from the colony because of his religious views. Among others we find that "4th Jan'y 1636 — it is agreed by genéral consent that Mr. Atherton Houghes shall have 600 acres laid him out beyond Mount Wollaston from between Monatiquot river to bounds of Weymouth &c.," and later 4 Dec. 1637 — "Mr. A.

Houlgh shall have all that neck of land (as yet not laid out) joining to Mr. Coddington, &c."; this was in exchange for some part of his previous grant, relinquished, and through all these years since has always borne the name of Hough's Neck, being to-day a fashionable resort for summer homes.

On 27 Jan. 1639/40, "there is granted to Mr. William Tompson, Pastor of the Church at the Mount, 120 acres of Land there." (Town Records of Boston, vol. 1, p. 47.) By subsequent transfers, to be quoted later, it is established that this grant comprised the neck which became a few years later the home of our ancestor until 1658, and which for a century even after his removal from the town bore the name of "Shed's Neck."

All these grants near Mount Wollaston were by order of the General Court on 13 May 1640 incorporated as the town of Braintree* which comprised the present towns of Braintree, Quincy, Randolph and Holbrook, and from then its progress was assured. For over a century and a half Braintree maintained its original area; then on 22 Feb. 1792 the northerly third of the town was set off to form the town [now city] of Quincy, and on 9 Mar. 1793 the south-westerly third became the town of Randolph a part of which on 29 Feb. 1872 was established as Holbrook. The 120-acre grant to Rev. William Tompson in 1639/40, which was occupied to 1658 by Daniel¹ Shed and so for a century was known as "Shed's Neck," was located in that part of Braintree which since 1792 has been Quincy.

Extending from the main land of old Braintree into the waters of Massachusetts Bay were five necks of land: Squantum was the most northerly one; next was Hough's Neck; the next or middle one was Shed's Neck which after 1750 was known as Germantown; then came Quincy Point and still farther south was Knight's Neck. This portion of old Braintree near the coast was the seat of the principal settlement during the first half century. Between Shed's Neck and Quincy Point flows Weymouth Fore River affording a convenient harbor for ship building which was long carried on there and in recent times has become the location of a great modern plant for ship construction.

It seems evident that Daniel¹ Shed came to Braintree a youth or young bachelor of small means, arrived there or became of age too late to become an original proprietor and grantee of lands, and did not have means to purchase an estate. So about the time of his marriage in 1646 he doubtless leased for a term of years from Rev. William Tompson the 120-acre neck granted to the latter in

*Braintree was so called from a place of the same name in County Essex, England, which in the Domesday Survey of 1086 appears as Branchetreu, signifying in Anglo-Saxon "a town on a hill." 1639/40, and on account of Daniel¹ Shed being the first resident on the tract it came to be generally known as "Shed's Neck." Here he evidently continued about twelve years until 1658, when perhaps the expiration of his lease or the destruction of his house by fire together with the opening up of cheap lands in the new town of Billerica on the then frontiers induced a removal to the latter place.

The later history of Shed's Neck is readily traced by recorded deeds. On 18 June 1661, Samuel Tompson of Braintree, with power and order from his honored father Mr. William Tompson, for £8 conveyed to Edmund Quincy, John Hull and William Penn, the 120-acre tract given by the Town of Boston to his father, as shown on a plot surveyed in November 1658, with all the timber, wood, appurtenances and privileges belonging thereunto. (Suffolk County Deeds, vol. 13, p. 49.) The small amount of the consideration and the fact that no buildings are mentioned, suggest that there were none then on the property; so perhaps the log cabin occupied by Shed may have been destroyed by fire shortly before the survey was made. Mr. Quincy soon secured the shares of his associates in the purchase, and we next find that on 26 Nov. 1680, Edmund Quincy of Braintree conveyed to John Hull of Boston, in trust for the grantor's five children, "All that my Neck or parcel of land, scituate, lying and being in Brantery afores'd comonly called and known by the name of SHED'S NECK, containing about One hundred Acres of upland and twenty Acres of Salt Marish, bounded by Rocky Island [part of Hough's Neck] Easterly, by Weymouth and Brantery River [now Fore River] Southerly and Westerly, and by Brantery Schoole Land Westerly and Northerly." (Suffolk County Deeds, vol. 11, p. 387.) On 17 Feb. 1680/1, John Hull of Boston, as trustee, for £460 conveyed to Samuel Torrey, Ephraim Hunt and John Hunt, all of Weymouth, the upland and meadow "comonly called Shed's Neck," containing 120 acres. (Ibid., vol. 12, p. 22.) The property continued nearly half a century in possession of various members of the Torrey and Hunt families until 11 Dec. 1727, when Enoch Hunt sold 42 acres "on Shed's Neck so called" to Nicholas Phillips who on 29 Jan. 1734/5 conveyed it to Col. John Quincy of Braintree, grandson of Edmund Quincy previously mentioned; and on 1 May 1730 Col. Quincy also bought of John Hunt 72 acres "in that part of Braintree commonly called Shed's Neck." (Ibid., vol. 41, p. 225; vol. 68, pp. 236-7.) These two purchases vested nearly the whole Neck in Col. Quincy who on 8 Aug. 1750 leased the property, at an annual rental of 10 shillings per acre, to a syndicate consisting of John Franklin [brother of the illustrious Benjamin Franklin], Norton Quincy, Peter Etter and Joseph Crellius. (Ibid., vol. 80, p. 169.) The

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syndicate intended to develop the Neck for a colony of Germans, but the scheme failed, and on 24 Aug. 1752 the associates subleased to Gen. Joseph Palmer and Richard Cranch seventeen of the lots "as laid off at Shed's Neck called Germantown." (*Ibid.*, vol. 81, p. 109.) Since that time the Neck has continued to be known by the latter name, Germantown, and after passing through various hands most of it was secured by "The Sailors Snug Harbor," a corporation chartered 20 May 1852 to maintain a home for old and retired seamen. This beneficent institution still owns the property and has smoothed the last years of over five hundred old and disabled sailors.

In 1916 the Shedd Family Association secured a small plot of land on the crest of the Neck and erected thereon a memorial to Daniel¹ Shed in the form of a lighthouse, consisting of a column of Quincy granite about twenty feet high surmounted by a substantial glass and copper lantern enclosing a powerful incandescent electric light. A bronze tablet on the base of the column bears the following inscription:

> A Memorial to DANIEL SHED An original settler and resident here in old Braintree 1642 - 1658.His descendants to the tenth generation erect this shaft to commemorate his life. They dedicate it to the City of Quincy and as a beacon to the Sailors Snug Harbor which for over 60 years has occupied the land once tilled by their ancestor for whom it was for the first century called Shedds Neck a name that it is hoped may now be restored. Erected August 1916 by The Shedd Family Association

Here then upon the central one of five necks of land in old Braintree (now Quincy) extending from the mainland eastward into Massachusetts Bay was the original "ffarme" of our ancestor. A visitor to this place to-day cannot fail of pleasure with the prospect offered by the smooth, rolling, open fields, washed on either side by the waters of the bay, beyond which westward rise dark hills rugged with granite quarries that have yielded many a noble monument to more noble dead; eastward are spread bright enchanting sea views over the harbor with its many islands and the ships that ply between at the call of trade or pleasure. We may well wonder if our forefather too was attracted thither by these prospects, then seen in promise only or did he have ambitious notions of the vantage this very point of land should afford in a commercial view, as soon as increasing trade improved the privileges offered by Weymouth River which flowed past it into the harbor. Who then could say but here should be built a leading port of the country? Certainly later history has shown how sound was this judgment by the amount of trade and ship building carried on at this very point.

We can at least rejoice with him in his promising outlook in settling there while we turn to search closely the old books of records for some account of his doings. Daniel Shed was first mentioned as a resident of "Brantrey" under date of 1642, says Pattee's History of Braintree. Daniel Shode was with others granted new lands by the General Court, 1 Oct. 1645 as recorded in Massachusetts Colonial Records. (Vol. 2, p. 128.) This same year Daniel Shed was one of the thirty-two residents, including twenty freemen representing as many families of Braintree, who besought the General Court for liberty to remove and begin a new plantation where the noted preacher Samuel Gorton had obtained a grant of a thousand acres at Shawamet or Warwick, but which the Court had confiscated by reason of Gorton's averred heresy. Though this petition was granted, yet before any settlement was effected disputes as to jurisdiction arose with the Plymouth Colony, and shortly afterwards the authorities in England overruled the whole matter and restored the lands to the original grantees, while our petitioners all continued their residence at Braintree for many years.

Here again in "Brantrey's book of records" of births, marriages and deaths "beginninge in ye year 1643" we find a page of especial interest. for it records the births there of seven children to our ancestor and his wife Mary between 1 Oct. 1647 and 30 Oct. 1658, records of which we give further on at the proper place. What a story these few simple lines from the old records reveal to us and vet what a broad field for conjecture they leave open! They state only the bare fact, name and date of birth, and not one more word do they give to allay our curiosity. Who was "Mary his wiffe" and when were they married? Were they acquainted in Merrie England or did they first meet here where each had sought a home in this new land of promise? Neither record nor tradition gives an answer. Of their toils, their joys or their sorrows for these dozen years that they lived there together no word is said, and yet all these things came to them as to others as they struggled for a livelihood for themselves and the children that gathered about their hearthstone.

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These years brought also great development in the whole country, considering the means at hand, and new settlements were springing up farther inland; sturdy yeomen and men ambitious for wealth all roamed the fields and forests seeking new and more favored locations, and frequent changes were made in the older settlements to avail of whatever promised a better situation, though always limited by certain strong ties of family or church that bound them close together and served to make each little community self-contained. This feeling of unrest and desire for change was felt as well in the little settlement at Braintree, and frequent changes were there made among the neighbors and associates of Daniel¹ Shed. Peter and Joseph Adams, sons of Henry Adams (the ancestor of the Presidents Adams), continued to reside in Braintree as has also an honorable posterity, while two other sons, Thomas and Samuel, were among the first settlers of Chelmsford far northward in the valley of the Merrimack. Thither also went Edward Spaulding and Thomas Barrett whose descendants' names we shall later find closely allied by intermarriage with our own family.

From the same circle also there went out Christopher Webb, Thomas Foster and several of Dea. Richard Brackett's children, all to find new homes in the town of Billerica lying well north upon the Concord and Shawshine rivers near where they join the Merrimack. Thither also in 1659 went our own ancestor Daniel¹ Shed, with his family, and there established their permanent home from which a numerous posterity has gone forth. What his reasons were or what the inducements for this move has not been discovered, and it seems all the more peculiar because most of the grantees of this new township were chiefly from Cambridge, to which it had been assigned for an extension of its territory.

BILLERICA

Reared in a country where landed possessions were largely the basis of wealth and rank, all the early colonists in New England were eager to secure as ample territory for their plantations as possible and improved every opportunity for obtaining new grants as the settlements pushed inland.

Such was the case with Cambridge, which "Newetowne" had become with the establishment of Harvard College there; to increase the revenue of the college and give a wider influence to the town its rulers sought control of a tract of land called Shawshine lying northwest of Cambridge and east of the Concord River. After much parleying this was finally granted by the General Court on 7 March 1643/4, "prvided the church & prsent elders continue at Cambridge," an order to guard against further disruptions since Rev. Mr. Hooker and most of his followers had previously left to settle at Hartford, Conn. Several large grants had previously been made "about six miles northward from Concord" among which Gov. Winthrop and Deputy-Gov. Dudley received each twelve hundred to fifteen hundred acres. The exact location of any of these grants had not been determined, but having established their claims little haste was made to improve them by settlements.

In June, 1652, an allotment was made there of over twelve thousand acres among one hundred and thirteen people in Cambridge, and the most important of these divisions was one of four hundred acres for "a township"; this tract lay just north of "Mr. Dudley's farm" and east of Concord River, occupying the crest of a large hill on which is now situated the beautiful village of Billerica, and upon it "house lots" of from twenty to thirty acres were granted to the first settlers. The development of the section now began in earnest, and in this the "Dudley Farm" exerted a vital influence in giving shape to the new town. Its fifteen hundred acres extended from Gov. Winthrop's farm northward down the Concord River about two and a half miles; this when sold was divided into twelve equal lots or shares of one hundred and twentyfive acres each, and each share or "right" was for convenience called "a tenne acre lot" though really consisting of one hundred and thirteen acres of upland and twelve acres of meadow. This became the unit of measure throughout the whole town so that each man's share was computed at a certain proportional part of "a tenne acre lot" in all the divisions of the common lands.

As settlements began the need for a separate existence as a town became the primary question. After long deliberation of the step, the "Genall Cort" combined all the grants it had made in that section with all unclaimed lands, and on 30 May 1655 incorporated it as the town of Billerica. At that time not more than nine or ten families were located there, but others soon followed and the maintenance of the town was assured. Naturally the largest portion of settlers came from the parent town of Cambridge and the next largest as naturally from the adjoining town of Woburn. Braintree also gave an important circle of eight families including Daniel¹ Shed, Thomas Foster, the Webbs and the Bracketts. John Rogers came with John Stearns from Watertown, John Kittredge, whose descendants have been many and honorable, came as a young man in the employ of John Parker who was called his "master." John Leviston, a Scotchman, also a few years later brought good blood to Billerica. In 1658 when Rev. Samuel Whiting came to minister to their wants he found only twenty-five families, of whom eleven were "on the township," seven on the Dudley farm and seven


elsewhere, but only one was located north of the township; in 1660 the number of families had increased to forty. With the incorporation of the town came the first suggestion of the new name that was to supplant the euphonious Indian Shawshine.

When a company of earnest English families had gathered there they naturally sought to cultivate the home feeling by the transfer of familiar names to their homes in the wilderness. Their choice fell upon a name unique and peculiar, to unfamiliar ears perhaps a little awkward and unattractive; yet while most other names have been repeated over and over again in newer states, this name has remained in the sole possession of this town. There is but one Billericay in England and but one Billerica in the United States.

Leaving his old home in Braintree our Daniel¹ Shed came to Billerica and in 1659 bought from George Willice a certain tract of land which had been the original "right" of Joseph Parker to lands in this town; this consisted of "an eight acre lot" as styled in the divisions but really representing a right to about a hundred acres.

Of the land he thus acquired his house-lot is especially mentioned in the records as "twenty and three acres of land be it more or lesse lying upon the township and is bounded by Jacob Browne on the north; by [the Rev.] Mr. Whiting on the south; by Concord river West, and by the highway by ye brooke on ye East; also he is bounded on the south partly by Jona. Stearns his land upon ye township. Also it is divided neare ye East end by Concord road lying crosse it four poles wide." Where the balance of the one hundred acres of his right lay we have not learned. His house was located on the easterly side of the Concord or Bedford road on land which in 1869 was bought by Samuel Sage and where his widow, Mrs. Martha (Hill) Sage resided as late as 1913.

By reference to a map of those grants their relative location can be easily seen, while for fixing them most definitely within modern bounds we are aided by one of the most prominent features of the early town's topography and one that still lingers in all its quaintness of title, *viz*: Charnstaffe Lane, extending from the Boston road westerly to the river. Then it separated the large and earlier "Dudley Farm" on the south of it from the township grant proper on the north as set off to the Cambridge Church. Immediately north of Charnstaffe Lane and bounding upon it was the lot of Rev. Samuel Whiting, the first minister of Billerica, who came there in 1658. Adjoining him upon the north v.as the land of Daniel¹ Shed extending westward to the Concord river, while upon his arrival there in 1659 he established his dwelling upon the eastern portion near "ye brooke" in the valley between the present Boston and Concord roads. The records of the early grants show



that a highway was reserved along this brook, but given up later on.

We can learn very little from the records as to his coming or the details of his early abode there though many things can be gathered by inference. The year 1659 must have been the time of his arrival, for in October of the preceding year he had a daughter Sarah born by "wiffe Mary" in Braintree, while in the ancient records of Billerica we find a "sone," Samuel, born to "Daniel and Elizabeth Shed" on Aug. 13, 1660.

Few indeed were the accommodations afforded by the new settlement to which our ancestor brought his family of seven children whose ages ranged from one to twelve years. The houses were small and rude; there were no fences or enclosures. The minister's house was built but not yet finished, and "the meeting house," that one rallying point in all early towns, was not begun. The force and peculiarity of their seclusion comes to us more fully as we read of the meagre opportunities for travel to neighboring towns; a road by which to reach their forest home from Cambridge and Woburn; another to Concord on the south, while only a path led northward to Andover and another to Chelmsford farther west. And what roads were these,— without form, little more than tracks marked by blazed trees!

The early settlers had no time for more improvements than necessity demanded,— all their energies were given to clearing up the heavy forests, not for profit in the lumber, but that the virgin soil might be exposed to the sunlight and induced to yield them the necessaries of food and shelter. It needed men with strong arms and strong hearts imbued with mutual sympathies for their work, and such they proved. If their circumstances afforded but scant returns for their toil they made their wants few in proportion. They were laying foundations then and looking to the future with high hopes and large faith. In England landed possessions were largely the basis of wealth and rank, so here it was natural for them to secure as many broad acres as they were able, hoping thus to build a rich and prosperous future.

Withal they were pious folks and believed the Scriptures literally without question; they toiled six days of the week and kept the Sabbath with rigid exactness. They found little use for pen and paper, for writing was little practised because little needed; printing was not common at that time and book stores and post offices were unknown. Reports travelled but slowly, but great time for consideration was allowed.

Just then as they struggled on their Puritan sympathies were deeply awakened by accounts of Cromwell's deeds for greater freedom in the mother country; and thus here, too, upon fertile ground were sown ideas that, growing up with that knowledge and independence which self-reliance brings, developed a spirit that a century later made the American revolution not only possible but successful.

In addition to the purchase of land already mentioned our ancestor received numerous later grants from the town of Billerica besides other private purchases, so that his estate finally embraced quite a large territory.

"BILLERICA THEIR TOWN BOOKE OF RECORDS TRANSCRIBED ANNO DOMINI 1665."

"Daniel Sheed purchassing & possessing all the premises — Hence all the remaining grants wch are properly to this alotment by town order are granted and recorded to him: —

(1) Granted to him one parcell of land conteining eighteen acres of land be it more or lesse lying in the great Comon field which lyeth on ye east side of Concord river below ye falls, it is the ninteen lot in that order being tenne poles wide at the east end wr it is bounded by ye Comons and seventene pole wide upon a perpendicula at ye west end wr it is bounded by ye river, bounded by willm Tay on ye south and John poulter north. Also there is a highway crosse this lot laid out according to ye record of it in page 164.

(2) Grant of a small skirt of land joyneing to ye east end of his house lot, to extend two poles nearer the brook from his bound stump at his southeast corner and to come straight along to take in his old dwelling house the whole grant standing within his fences.

Granted more to him — forty & six acres of land be it more (3)or lesse lying on ye south side of the highway by fox Hill among ye second divisions being ye second lot in that order and bounded by Thomas Hubbard on ye west whose northeast angle is a twisted maple marked with H on ye west side and S on ye east side - from thence runing eastward about thirty and eight poles unto a stake marked with S & P (which stake stands by ye old highway as you go to ye willow spangs) bounded on ye east by willm pattin, on ye south golden more thirty and two poles and by willm firench Seaven poles all at ye end — his S:W: angle is a white oake marked with H on ye west side & S on ye east side — his east angle is a stake: bounded north by ye highwaye. Also there is a burden of a highway lies upon part of it as appears from ye record of it. Moreover there is allowance given into ye Measure of this lot in reference to many swamp and Crambery holes within it, all which is conteined with in ye bounds specified before"

There are three other grants of meadow land, in all about 23

acres, fully described and bounded. Also on 7:-4 m: 68 there was granted more to him — eight acres of land be it more or lesse lying . (on ye right hand of the way) on the pine plaine, on this side ye great comon field lying thirty pole wide at each end and is bounded on ye east by Roger toothaker, on ye west by ye Highway, on ye south by Mr. Whiting & on ye north by John bracket, the four corners are all stakes, this is granted on account of ye gratuity division. Other small grants followed at various times and as late as the general distribution on 9th 1685 we find one of three acres to Corpll Daniel Shed Senr.

As early as 1663, or only four years after his settlement there, we find that Daniel Shead paid $\pounds 1$ -4-10 in "the ministers rate" for the Rev. Mr. Whiting's maintenance out of a total levy of $\pounds 71$ -1-8; the fifty assessments ran from 3s. to $\pounds 3$ -17-6, showing that he was not accounted poor. When the meeting house was built Daniel Shed was assigned "to ye 2d seat in ye fore gallery of ye meeting house." For various reasons we judge that he was a strong supporter of the church and a close friend of Minister Whiting. Certain it is that their homes were but a few rods apart, and aside from any personal reasons that may have existed for this friendship there were plenty of external causes to bring them into close relationship.

Aside from their struggles with natural obstacles which required all the ingenuity of the settlers to overcome there was another burden that rested upon all alike and with which they were less able to cope because it was less tangible; this came from their fear of the Indians round about them. Friendly as seemed those whose dusky forms were often seen at their own firesides and who had in a measure embraced Christianity and civilization through the labors of Eliot among them at Wamesit, still the settlers watched them closely to guard against any treachery and to gain some hint of impending attack from the less friendly tribes farther back. For more than fifty years this danger hung over the pioneers, sometimes almost forgotten, then with one burst bending them low in its fury and destruction. So imminent seemed this danger in 1667 that the settlers in Billerica determined to build a stone and brick fortification house; and again eight years later during King Philip's War several of the larger houses were appointed garrisons and protected as well as they could be. Among these was Rev. Samuel Whiting's house, and thirty men and several yoke of oxen were over two days putting it in proper condition for defense; to this place as garrison was assigned Daniel Shed Sen. and his son John, Thomas Dutton Sen. and his son John, John Rogers Sen. and his three sons John, Thomas and Nathaniel, also John Durant and two other soldiers, making eleven soldiers in all and six families

under this roof, which was ordered "to be ye maine garrison & ye last refuge in case of extremity." What anxious times were these with little news from the outside, and yet amid their dangers Cupid stole into the garrisons with his arrows, past the sentinels, and wounded several youthful hearts as the sequel shows. The Indian attack however did not come nor for several years afterward, so that the families returned to their homes and the preacher performed his services without guns being stacked in church ready for instant use.

It was probably at this time that our ancestor Daniel¹ Shed Sen. acquired his military title of "Corpll," and for other similar service his son John² Shed probably acquired his various appellations of Sergeant, Ensign, etc. It may be well to note here that all the descendants of Daniel¹ Shed, though by no means fighting men, have always been ready to answer every call for protecting the country's rights, and many have laid down their lives for the public good during the various wars in which our country has been engaged.

As the years came and went, some prosperous, some less successful, his children married, one by one, with the children of his neighbors, and all settled not far away from the old homestead, and in turn reared around them many children according to the custom of those days. If amid their many cares they became incautious and forgetful of their danger they were rudely recalled to their exposure by the Indian attacks in 1689 upon Dover, N. H., and three years later on 1 Aug. 1692, the deadly blow so much feared fell upon this little settlement, blasting the homes of Zachariah Shed and Benjamin Dutton who lived near "the falls." With the fears aroused by this alarm mingled with the witchcraft excitements and trials at Salem three years more passed, and a second massacre fell upon them on Monday 5 Aug. 1695 when fifteen persons in four families suffered the fury of the Indians. We have but a slight conception of the alarm and agitation these bloody deeds spread over the entire section. No one knew what day might bring a similar fate; as they went about their fields at work every nook, tree and bush was watched for a concealed foe, but their vigilance was its own reward, for the enemy came not again to this community.

Thus, leading a life such as we have pictured, now aroused by reports of some savage outbreak, then settling back again into the routine of daily toil in their fields that alone provided the necessities of life, dwelt our forefather and his family. And as the shadows of increasing years came upon him it must have proved a source of great satisfaction that all his children should grow to maturity and settle near him. Of his eleven children we know the full history save of one daughter Susan who doubtless died young; five sons and five daughters grew up to maturity and made homes of their own, into all of which, except of two daughters, children came to cheer the grandparents' lives. Hannah, the second daughter, died in 1672, a young bride of but a few months; then Mary and Daniel, the first born and the first son, were a few years later cut off in the prime of life, but each leaving several children from whom have descended honorable posterity.

It was quite natural that the youngest son of the family should succeed to the father's homestead, and while he doubtless provided as well for all his children as his means allowed when they went out for themselves, yet Nathan was the one chosen "to provide for them in their old age" and received the homestead.

Here is a copy of the agreement of which the original is on file at the Registry of Deeds for Middlesex County at Cambridge; the spelling and use of letters has been followed.

"This Indenture made March the Twenty and Seventh In the year of our Lord God one thousand Six hundred ninty and four -Between Daniel Shed Senr of Billerrica in the County of Middlesex in theire Majesties Province of the Massachusetts Bay in New England on the one party and his Sun Nathan Shed on the other partex,- Wittnesseth That the said Daniel Shed For and in Consideration of the Love and affection he beareth to his Son Nathan Shed and for a settlement of his Sd Son Nathan As also ve Sd Daniel Considering the age both of himself and wife and inability to manage and Carry on husbandry as formerly and to the end that ye sd Daniel and his wife may be Comfortably taken Care of and provided for in their old age according to what is after Expressed Covenanted and Agreed upon as appears by this Instrument. As also that ye Sd Nathan hath with his own money purchased all the right, Title or Interest that his Brethren Zechariah and Samuel ever had or might now or hereafter be considered to have in theire Said ffathers Inheritance* which in and by this Instrument is granted and made over to the said Nathan, upon the account of the premises The Said Daniel Shed Hath given, granted, bargained and Sold, aliened, Enfeoffed and Confirmed And by these these presents Doth freely fully Clearly and absolutely Grant bargaine and Sell alien Enfeoffe and Confirm to his said Son Nathan Shed and to his heirs and assigns forever All his house and Lands in the aforesaid Town of Billerica, that is his Dwelling house and Barn, orchards, home lott Called about twenty three acres, with all the Cultures, Monurements, Husbandry, ffences upon or around about Sd Houses & Lands; Also all his medow Land & upland lying

elsewhere in Billerrica Towne. The meadow Called Broad Medow on the West side of Concord River by Estimation one acre & three Quarters more or less, And ShawShin River Meadow Called three acres and a halfe, And his two springs of medow lying on the north heath Brooke, and his meadow at Strong water Brooke Called four acres and a halfe and his upland lying by it Called Twenty acres & joining to it, And his meadow at Prospect Hill and his allotment of medow at Mill Swamp, be they all or any of them more or less, with all his Town rights and priviledges upon ye Town Comons to all or to any part of them. Also his Two oxen Cart and wheels, plow and Chaine horse Traise wth all the utenssills of husbandry thereunto belonging that are now to be found of his own either in house or ffield. To Have and to Hold ve above granted & bargained prmsses and Every part and parcell thereof wth all the priviledges & appurtenances to the Same appertaining or in any wise belonging according to the Towne Record of the bounds of each of them to him ye Sd Nathan Shed and to his heires and Assigns forever to his and their own propper use and behoof. And all this upon the Condition and proposition following and no other. That is that ye Sd Nathan Shed his heires or Assignes Shall finde and provide for his Sd ffather Shed and his said Mother during ve whole time of theire naturall life and the longest liver of them both Convenient and Comfortable houseroom with a Competent & Suitable maintenance and apparill Physick and atendance in Sickness and a decent buriall and in all and every respect Suitable to proons of their age and quality. And in Case at any time Sd Daniel or his wife shall think their maintenance is too little and shall desire more than Sd Nathan is willing to provide, In all such cases it shall be determined by prsons Indifferently Chosen by each party one; and in case after Such determination Sd Nathan his heirs or Assigns Shall neglect or Refuse to perform what is determined by them as meet and equall for Said Nathan further to do toward the Comfortable maintenance of his said Parents or parent according to this agreement, then Said Parents or parent and the longest liver of either of them shall have power to sell any part of Said Lands for theire comfortable Subsistence and no further, as if no covenant had been made with said Nathan. Allwaies provided that what is left of Sd estate and not spent as aforesaid Shall remain a good and Indefeassable estate in fee simple to Sd Nathan and to his heires and assigns forever. But in Case Sd Nathan Shall duly perform his above said Covenent according to all the particular articles thereof, Then sd whole Estate of Inheritance as above Sd now put in the Sd Nathans hands Then the Sd Danl Shed binds himselfe his heires and Administrators to Sd Nathan his heirs and Assigns to warrant and to secure the whole and every

part thereof to him the Sd Nathan Shed & to his heires and assignes forever.

That the son Nathan fulfilled his part of the agreement there is no doubt without the directions of "prsons Indifferently chosen" and we may believe that the parents passed a happy old age.

To summarize in brief our knowledge of the life of our first ancestor as conveyed by records and by inference we may say that he was born probably between 1620 and 1625 in England whence he came as a youth or a young man perhaps just of age to make a home for himself in America. He landed about 1643, probably at Boston, being then unmarried, but about 1646 acquired a wife at Braintree where they had seven children. She died in 1658-9, and a few months later he married a second wife and settled in Billerica, Mass., where he had four more children and died 27 July 1708, probably aged about eighty-eight years.

*According to Hazen's "History of Billerica" Daniel¹ Shed terms John Gurney "father." John Gurney was born in England about 1603, as he deposed in 1653, giving his age as about fifty years. He was in Braintree, Mass., before 1645, and died there about 1663; his wife died there 20 Sept. 1661. His history is very obscure and the list of his children is uncertain, but he probably had four sons; *Richard*, b. about 1630, 2. *John*, b. about 1633, 3. *Peter*, b. about 1636, and 4. *Isaac*, b. about 1640. He very likely also had daughters, and may have had a daughter *Mary*, b. about 1628, who became the wife of Daniel¹ Shed. This seems the most probable explanation for Daniel¹ Shed terming John Gurney "father," although it is barely possible that the latter was his step-father. He married secondly, in 1659, ELIZABETH ——, whose parentage is unknown; she had four children and died in Billerica. 17 Jan. 1699/1700.

His house was located on the plain in North Billerica, an exposed situation; and in the massacre of 5 Aug. 1695 by the Indians, his mother-in-law Mrs. Ross and five of his children were killed and another was taken captive by the Indians; of his seven children then living, only the eldest child John, a boy of thirteen years, escaped unharmed.)

2. DANIEL² SHED (*Daniel*¹), was born in Braintree, Mass., 30 Aug. 1649, the eldest son of his father's family. He was only ten years old when his father removed to Billerica, and thus, from his youth, accustomed to all the restrictive yet highly stimulating circumstances of a pioneer life, he was well trained in all the expedients that tended to make *that* life a success. After his marriage in 1670 to Ruth Moore, he lived on the "Great Plain" south of the falls at North Billerica, and hence not far from the family of his brother-in-law, John Rogers, and near where his brother Zechariah² Shed settled later. We know little of his possessions, but he must have had considerable property then, obtained perhaps from his father and from his father-in-law, for from the old "Book of Land Grants" we find that he was entitled to a "half right" in the later distribution of the "common lands" of the town. Thus:

"29-10m-1673 Granted to Daniel Shed, Junr . . . all town rights and privileges according to ye meet proportion for a five-acre lot, to share in all future division of lands in commonage the sd Daniel paying to ye towns use twenty shillings in money within eight months next ensuing."... Later he received "two acres of swamp next adjoining his own house lot".... and again we find him granted in Nov. 1685 "five acres and one quarter of swamp and meadow lying at the head of ye great pond called ye mill pond."...

Previous to these grants he had sold on 28 Apr. 1673 a portion of the land he then held to Jonathan Danforth, and the deed of conveyance is the earliest one bearing the name of Shedd recorded at Cambridge for Middlesex County.

He took "the oath of fidelity" 23 Apr. 1666 before Capt. Gookin. His name occurs in a tax list for 1679 with a tax of 4 shillings and later in 1688 with a tax for 5 shillings; this was above the average and twice as much as any of his brothers paid. With these evidences of his prosperity we can but regret his death in early manhood. He died from an attack of small-pox on 24 Dec. 1690, aged 41 years, leaving a wife and three children living of a family of seven, one daughter, the youngest, having died from the same disease as the father on the previous day.

We glean but little from the town records relative to the later condition of his family; once it appears that "Widow Ruth Shed was paid £1 for care and sweepings of ye meeting House," and again she received £1-5-0 for the same services. This family alone of all in the fated neighborhood where they lived escaped the fury of the Indians in the dreadful massacres of 1692 and 1695; but who can picture the deep anxiety in which they dwelt through these periods of peril extending through years.

Daniel² Shed married at Billerica, 5 July 1670, RUTH MOORE, born in Cambridge, Mass., about 1652, daughter of Golden and Joan (Champney) Moore; she married secondly, as his fourth wife, about 1711, JACOB FRENCH of Billerica, born in Cambridge, Mass., 16 Jan. 1639/40, son of Lieut. William and Elizabeth (------) French; he died in Billerica 20 May 1713 and she died there 6 Nov. 1730.

We have not been able to fix the location of his dwelling, but from the various land grants that he received we are led to think that his farm was situated in the southerly part of the town south of Nutting's Pond and perhaps near to the Bedford line. He took the oath of fidelity 4 Feb. 1677/8 and thus early evinced his interest in all that affected the public weal; as early as 1679 he paid a tax of 2 shillings and in 1688 one of 3s. 9d., sums that were quite the average share in the full amount of the tax list.

From the old record of land grants we copy,- "11-3m-1680, The towne of Billerica hath granted to John Shed all towne privileges upon our towne comons for ye future acording to ye proportion for a fice acre lott for which he has paid to ye towne use ye just sum of twenty shill. before ye entering hereof." Again in "9m-1685, granted more to him two acres and 13 poles of meadow lands lying in flag meadow which is on ye south of nutten pond and on ye north of Thomas Oakes farme bounded by George ffarley on the West it lyeth 19 poles long on ye north side bounded by a red oake S:F ye line on ye south side is (28) pole to a little white oake S:F, a red oake standing behind it, - on ye east it is bounded at ye narrow place of ye brooke where it is most feasable to make a dam." When such indefinite descriptions of bounds as the above were used we can but wonder that misunderstandings and disputes were not more frequent. In May 1707 the records show that "Sergt. John Shed" was granted "thirtyone acres and 100 pole on the south of Nuttens pond" . . . and another grant of "six and one half acres" . . . "at the weste end of flaggie meadow." The next year, 1708, there was "granted and laid out forty and six acres" . . . "it lyeth in two parcels," about 17 acres "lies on South east of Shawshin River bounded on S. E. by Woburn line"- and about 29 acres was "between the ponds." Again in April of 1709 he received "forty-eight acres" . . . on the west of Concord River "in the second Rainge of lotts." (Billerica Land Grants, pp. 247 and 111.) These numerous grants of land with several others of smaller territory show that he possessed a large amount of real estate and we may conclude that he held considerable other property and was no doubt an active citizen in the town.

John² Shed was a young, unmarried man when King Philip's War broke out in 1675, and he speedily entered the military forces raised to protect the colonies from destruction. The records show that on 19 Oct. 1675 he was paid £2-2-4 for military service under Maj. Simon Willard. He is mentioned as living on 24 June 1735 when his son Benjamin³ Shed drew for him lot No. 74 in Narragansett No. 6 [Templeton, Mass.], one of the township grants made by the Province of Massachusetts to the soldiers who had served in King Philip's War, or their heirs. (Bodge's "Soldiers in King Philip's War," pp. 122 and 436.) At a later period John² Shed was successively appointed sergeant and ensign of one of the Billerica militia companies, and in 1700, 1701 and 1705 he was elected to the office of selectman.

He had a large family of children who married well, but only one son, Benjamin³ Shed, handed down the surname, as the other son John³ Shed died a young bachelor while in the military service. Ens. John² Shed evidently divided his property among his children during his lifetime, giving to his only son Benjamin the homestead, as there are no probate records of his estate. He died in Billerica 31 Jan. 1736/7, in his eighty-third year. His gravestone stands in the South Burial Ground, alone of all his own family, although clustering mounds near it bespeak their resting places.

He married at Billerica, 9 Jan. 1676/7, SARAH CHAMBERLAIN, born there 20 May 1655, daughter of William and Rebecca (------) Chamberlain; she died in Billerica 17 Jan. 1735/6, in her eighty-first year.

4. ZECHARIAH² SHED (*Daniel*¹), was born in Braintree, Mass., 17 June 1656, being a twin with his sister Elizabeth. His father removed to Billerica when he was about three years old and thus from his childhood he was inured to all the hardships that fell to the lot of the early pioneer frontier settlers. On 4 Feb. 1677/8, he took the oath of fidelity in company with his brothers, John and Samuel, and others of his fellow townsmen. On 30 Nov. 1675 he was paid £3-0-0 for service in the garrison house at Chelmsford in King Philip's War. (Bodge's "Soldiers in King Philip's War," p. 357.) About the time of his marriage in 1678, he settled on "the Great Plain" just north of where his brother Daniel lived in North Billerica, while still farther north and nearer to the falls dwelt the family of his sister who had married John Rogers, and a few other families that had settled near.

In common with many others, the "towne of Billerica" granted him in 1680 the privilege to share in the proportion of "a five acre lot" (or a "half right") in all future divisions of town lands. Subsequently, in a general division made in Nov. 1685, "Zachary Shed" received "five acres of swamp and upland, (instead of two acres in the Mill swamp) it lyeth at the east end of his house lot." Again in April 1696 there was granted to Zacharia Shed "betwene two and three acres of swamp and upland."

Let us imagine for a moment the life this young family led in their peculiar surroundings and commend as we must the ambitious spirit in which they toiled to build up a home and rear their large family in those times of scant means and few opportunities, while harassed by a constant fear of the savage foe that might at any moment spring upon them from grove or thicket. Nor were they alone in these troubles. Besides their relatives whom we have already mentioned, among the nearest of their neighbors dwelt the family of Benjamin Dutton in similar circumstances to their own. Fully apprehensive of their danger, they were as entirely ignorant of any specially impending evil as well as ignorant of any particular cause therefor. These two families were the first and only ones to feel the vengeful wrath of the Indians in their first attack upon Billerica on 1 Aug. 1692, and severely indeed did they suffer. Nothing is known of the details of this attack as no account of the event has come down to us; in the town books Capt. Danforth merely recorded the deaths of the different persons with the simple appended remark "all slain by ye Indians," as if who did not know and understand all that this meant of torture and sorrow. In each family they killed the wife (aged about 36) and the eldest and youngest child; none were taken captive. Zechariah² Shed's family then consisted of five children, of whom Hannah aged thirteen and Agnes a child of two years were slain.

To illustrate how men are ruled by their opinions more than reason, let us note among this little group of families living at these "cross roads" that of Roger Toothaker Sen. In these dark and trying times when frequent massacres and constant rumors sent a chill to the heart of the bravest man, this Toothaker was away at Salem wasting both his time and substance over the silly delusions of witchcraft; yet all this while his family, alone, unprotected, perhaps unfed, allayed their fears as best they might with the sympathies of those as defenceless almost as themselves. Preposterous as it seems, yet the annals of that period recount many instances of the blunting of every feeling of affection by these superstitions that to-day can scarce be believed. It is a satisfaction that none of our name or race were among those thus deluded and deceived, but rather they made their hearth stones the altar of their worship and common sense their guide.

Zechariah² Shed lived during his last twenty years in Chelmsford, Mass., where he died about June 1735, aged about seventy-nine years. His will dated 2 May 1735 was lodged 24 July of the same year. He bequeathed maintenance to his well beloved wife Hannah, to his son Zechariah the homestead, also to son Benjamin £12 and daughters Hannah and Prudence £5 each. His reason for not devising to daughters Sarah, wife of Hugh Scott, and Rachel, wife of Ephraim Barrett, was that he had already given them what was suitable, and he did not give anything to either of his sons James, Joseph or Ebenezer, because they would not accept his property and care for him in his old age. [They had long been settled respectively in Roxbury, Boston and Charlestown.] He desired his son Zechariah to abide with his mother during his minority. After the death of his wife the balance of his estate was to be for use of his daughter Hannah, if she continue sickly, otherwise to be at his wife's disposal.

From the guardians' bond of Zechariah Shed Jr., dated 12 Apr. 1736, we learn he was in his sixteenth year.

Following is abstract of "Inventory of Zachariah Shedd," filed 29 Mar. 1736. To money Due to the Decesd Thirty five pounds. Two Cows, Two Beds & furniture. Four pewter platters. Three Basons. Two Chests, eight Chairs, one Table. Two poudering tubs, one half Barrell, one quart pott, one half bushell Iron pott, Iron Kettle, Tramell, Fire slice Gridiron, warming pan, Frying pan, Two old swords, Four Glass bottles, Two spinning wheels, 1 Candlestick one pr. of Srapes & Wheple tree chain, 1 pr beetle rings, five wedges, one broad hough, hors furniture. One yoak of oxen with yoak and Irons given to son Zachariah Shedd by the will aprised at £19, plough Irons and a broad hough aprised at 12s. [Signed] James Shed, Executor.

5. SAMUEL² SHED (Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 13 Aug. 1660, being the eldest child of Daniel¹ Shed by his second wife. But little can be learned of his career though it probably did not differ much from that of his brothers. He took the oath of fidelity in 1677 and was thus admitted early to the rights of a freeman. His name is found in a tax rate for Billerica in 1688 in the sum of 2s-2d. His first two children were born in Chelmsford, Mass., but it is presumable that the Indian massacres in the summer of 1690 and again two years later caused him to give up his settlement on the frontier and seek the greater protection afforded in Billerica, little as that was, for the next child's birth is on the records of Billerica. He appears to have resided later for about eight years in Chelmsford and then after 1702 in Groton, Mass., where all his later years were spent. He was a man of good standing and possessed of considerable property in that part of Groton since 1753 Pepperell, and he died in Groton about Oct. 1723.

His will dated 5 Oct. 1723, just after the death of his son Daniel, and lodged 13 Nov. 1723, has an opening part showing a very religious spirit controlling him. He devises to his beloved wife Elizabeth, then to his son Samuel he gives "Upland and meadow near Baddecook and burnt meadow also a meadow at Cow-pond Brook &c all in Groton." To the heirs of his son "Daniel Shead" 40 shillings, and the same to his son Jonathan in full of his share. To his daughters, Elizabeth Robins 5 shillings, Mary Gilson 40 shillings, Hannah Green 40 shillings, Sarah Hutchins £5, and Esther Pearce 50 shillings, all of them having previously received something. To his youngest daughter Abigail Shead £18, to be paid at her marriage or when twenty-one years of age. His youngest son John was residuary legatee of all his buildings and land, his oxen and other cattle, etc., and said son and his mother were appointed executors of the will.

6. NATHAN² SHED (*Daniel*¹), the youngest child of Daniel¹ and Elizabeth Shed, was born in Billerica, Mass., 5 Feb. 1668/9, and became a freeman 18 May 1685. Of his brothers, Daniel the eldest had died and the others were established in homes of their own, so it was quite natural that his father should look upon him, the last at the fireside, with especial favor and as the one to receive the remainder of his property, and from whom he should ask care and support due to advancing age. About the time of Nathan's marriage in 1694 he agreed with his parents for their future maintenance, the written covenant thereto was recorded at Cambridge, and a full copy of it has been previously given in the account of the father Daniel¹ Shed. (See *ante*, page 43.)

Thus we see that Nathan² Shed was possessed at the start of his married life of a large and valuable estate, which he increased by later acquisitions and grants. In the general distribution of the common lands of the town in 1707 his share was in the proportion of a "four acre lot" (i. e. 4/10 of the unit right of 125 acres). The next year (1708) his apportionment was 39 acres from the commons west of the Concord River; his land was near Chelmsford line and within the later limits of that town. His house was doubtless the same that his father occupied and was situated near the centre of what is now Billerica village on the easterly side of the Concord or Bedford road, on the estate in recent years owned by Mrs. Martha (Hill) Sage.

He died 18 June 1736 at the age of sixty-seven years, having given over his property, for the maintenance of himself and his wife, to his son William³ Shed on 25 May 1732, following the same course adopted by his own father about forty years previously.

He married about 1694, MARY FRENCH, born in Billerica 4 Mar. 1669/70, daughter of John and Mary (Rogers) French; she died in Billerica 21 Aug. 1740.

7. DANIEL³ SHED (2. $Daniel^2$, $Daniel^1$), was born in Billerica, Mass., 27 Feb. 1672/3. He was the only surviving son of his parents, and at the time of his father's death was only seventeen years old.

He lived near the Falls at North Billerica and probably upon his father's farm, but we have little information concerning him otherwise, except that he received one-third of his father's estate amounting to ± 32 -13-4 in 1711, as appears on the records of the Probate Court at Cambridge. He died in Billerica, 29 Dec. 1715, aged forty-two years, and left but one child.

He married at Billerica, 17 Dec. 1708, REBECCA DUTTON, born there 13 Nov. 1679, daughter of Thomas and Rebecca (Brabrook) Dutton; she married secondly, at Billerica, as his second wife, 1 June 1724, NICHOLAS SPRAKE [or SPRAGUE].

Thomas Dutton, father of Mrs. Shed, was one of a company of fifty English soldiers and two hundred friendly Indians from Natick, under command of Capt. Benjamin Swett, which went on an expedition in June 1677 against the Indians along the Kennebec River in Maine. The expedition was ambushed by the Indians, Capt. Swett and several of his officers and men were killed and many others were wounded, among the latter being Thomas Dutton. Later he petitioned for assistance from the General Court, stating that he was "shot through the side of the belt and through the left knee and fell down, not able to help myself." (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 69, p. 209.)

9. JAMES³ SHED (4. Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 13 Mar. 1680/81. His father's family was one of those that suffered so severely from the Indian massacre in 1692, and among the victims were included his mother and his youngest and eldest sisters. Being the elder son in a large family of small means, he was obliged to go out early from the home circle and provide for himself, though little is known of how or where his youth was passed.

In the tax lists of Boston for 1701 we find "James Sheed" among "those of Muddy River," being one of five young single men there who having no estate paid a poll tax only. He was then barely of legal age. His name spelled "James Shead" again appears there in the list for 1704. The town records of Brookline, or "Muddy River" as it had generally been called, show that in 1710 he was chosen a field driver for the town in company with John Winchester.

At the age of thirty he "owned the covenant" thus connecting himself with the Church of the First Parish of Roxbury, in which town he settled soon after his marriage in 1712.

There are numerous records of land purchases by him to be found in Suffolk County Registry of Deeds, showing that from humble beginnings he had prospered well and secured a large

estate. He was also prominent in the work of building a new church at Roxbury in 1741, and was owner of pew No. 3; he frequently presided at the Parish meetings of the Church, and seems to have been forward in all town affairs. By the Will of Edward Devotion (one of the leading citizens of the community) he was appointed its executor in connection with the latter's wife, being mentioned therein with much respect and esteem and charged with the distribution of a large estate. He died in Roxbury 29 Dec. 1749, and his gravestone remains in the Eustis Street Burying Ground.

James Shed's will, dated 29 Mar. 1748, was lodged 4 Jan. 1749/ 50. He bequeathed to his "beloved wife Allice" the "100 pounds which she brought at time of marriage" also "50 pounds old tenor," and gives her 10 pounds per annum and one-third of all personal estate not otherwise disposed of. He reserves two silver cups, one of which he gives to Mary Weld and the other to his daughter Mary Winchester. Bequeathes to his daughter Mary Winchester "300 pounds and the balance of his household property together with one-half of his books." To his only son James he gives all his lands and buildings, describing various lots in Roxbury and Newton, also his half part of "the Corn Mill in said Roxbury"; also one-half of his books, including his "Great Bible." He also gave him his "negro man Moses" and his "boy Titus, until he shall arrive at the age of thirty, then and thenceforth to be free." He appoints his son James as executor of his will and estate. (Suffolk County Probate Records, File 9437.)

Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 14 March 1695/6, a son by his father's second wife and born but a few years after the terrible Indian massacre that so devastated the paternal home. He seems to have left his native town just before or soon after becoming of age and like his older brother James to have sought a trade and his fortune in the vicinity of Boston.

He settled in Charlestown, Mass., and was a housewright by trade, but he probably also followed farming since the records show that he owned considerable land on or near the base of Prospect Hill in what is now Somerville. His name appears on the tax lists of Charlestown from 1727 to 1766, except in 1738–9 and 1762. His inventory after his demise shows he was then possessed of over forty acres of land valued at £680, and a house and barn valued at £45. He died 17 April 1770 in Charlestown, aged seventy-five years, according to his gravestone in the old Cambridge Cemetery near Harvard Square.

He married at Boston, 17 Jan. 1722/3, ABIGAIL IRELAND, born in Charlestown, 14 Feb. 1702/3, daughter of Abraham and Abigail (Greenland) Ireland; the ceremony was performed by the famous Chief-Justice Samuel Sewall. She survived her husband, died in Charlestown 8 Oct. 1783, and was buried in the old cemetery in Medford, Mass. Her property was damaged during the battle of Bunker Hill in 1775, and she was among the inhabitants of Charlestown claiming indemnity for losses at that time.

SHED (4. Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in 11. JOSEPH³ Billerica, Mass., 26 Oct. 1698. Of his boyhood little is known, but he seems to have left his father's home at an early age and followed his elder brothers, James and Ebenezer, to seek his fortune near Boston. From about 1719 to 1722 he lived in Cambridge and Charlestown, Mass., and then moved to Roxbury, Mass., where he was admitted to full communion in the West Roxbury Church on 7 Apr. 1723. About three years later he moved into Boston where he resided the remainder of his life. From 1726 to 1731 he attended the First Church in Boston, but in the latter year affiliated with the New South Church in Boston with which he joined in full communion 7 Dec. 1735, by dismission from the West Roxbury Church; and he and his children long continued connection with the New South Church. The records of Boston show that he was chosen constable in 1732; the duties of this office at that time were of the nature of a tax collector, and the office was so unpopular it was difficult to get men to take it, so in some towns men were fined for declining to serve, if elected. In 1732 Joseph Shed contrived to get excused from the honor thrust upon him, but in 1755 and later years he served his turn in this office.

Of his personal career little is known; he lived to see families gather around each of his children, to see the end of the bloody French and Indian Wars of the colonies, and to hear the everincreasing voice of complaints from these same colonies against the mother country whose domains they had extended and enriched and whose honor they had defended against every enemy, — but in spite of which she was laying a heavy hand of taxation and restriction upon them. He did not live to see his country independent, though his children helped to that end. His death is

recorded as occurring on 17 Oct. 1771, aged seventy-three years, and in the record he is styled "a carter."

He married first, at Cambridge, 16 Dec. 1720, SUSANNA RICE, born in Concord, Mass., 14 June 1691 daughter of Timothy and Abigail (Marrett) Rice; she died in Charlestown 2 Jan. 1721/2, and her only child died there two days later.

He married secondly, at Roxbury, 3 Jan. 1722/3, MARY WIL-LIAMS, born in Boston 8 June 1703, daughter of Dea. Jonathan and Mary (Hunlock) Williams; she had three children and died in Boston 25 Apr. 1727.

12. ZECHARIAH³ SHED (4. Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Chelmsford, Mass., 27 Aug. 1720, the youngest but one of his father's seventeen children by three wives. His much older halfbrothers, James, Ebenezer and Joseph, had left home and established themselves near Boston before he was born; but he was living with his parents, a youth of fifteen years, when his father died in 1735, so succeeded by the latter's will to the homestead in Chelmsford. By trade he was a carpenter and some of his tools are still (1920) in the possession of his great-great-grandson, Charles Gale⁷ Shedd of Keene, N. H.

Although between thirty-five and forty years of age and a married man with five children during the period of the French and Indian Wars (1755–1760), Zechariah³ Shed was in active service a total of over twenty months in two of the campaigns. From 25 Mar. 1757 to 2 Dec. 1757 he served as private in a company commanded to 8 August by Capt. Ralph G. Waldo and thereafter by Capt. Abel Keene. On 27 Mar. 1759, "Zechariah Shead of Chelmsford, aged 39" enlisted in Gen. Amherst's army raised for the invasion of Canada, and served as private from 27 Mar. 1759 to 16 Mar. 1760 in Capt. Moses Parker's company, Col. Frye's regiment, in operations at St. Johns, Nova Scotia. (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 96, p. 88, vol. 97, p. 160 and vol. 98, pp. 161 and 451.) He died in Chelmsford 2 Feb. 1784, aged sixty-three years. At the request of his widow, their son Ebenezer was appointed administrator of his estate. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20240.)

He married at Chelmsford, 24 Nov. 1743, HANNAH BARRETT, born there 8 Jan. 1724/5, daughter of Jonathan and Lydia (------) Barrett; she survived her husband and appears on the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of no males and one female [herself]. She was probably the "Widow Shed" who died from burns in Chelmsford between 18 and 28 Oct. 1807, aged seventy-five years according to the Church Records; but if this death record applies to the widow of Zechariah³ Shed, the correct age was eighty-two years.

13. BENJAMIN³ SHED (4. Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Chelmsford, Mass., 25 Aug. 1724, the seventeenth and youngest child of his father, by whose will in 1735 he received a legacy of £5. We next hear of him in 1746 when he enlisted in Capt. Eleazer Melvin's company for an expedition against Canada which, however, was given up. (Massachusetts Archives.) A few years later he settled in Lunenburg, Mass., where he married; and thence he removed in 1762 to Lancaster, Mass., but the next year returned to Lunenburg. Late in life he went to Norway, Me., to live with his son Lemuel⁴ Shed, and he died at the latter's home about 1808, aged about eighty-five years.

14. SAMUEL³ SHED (5. Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Chelmsford, Mass., 30 June 1690, when twelve years of age was taken by his parents in their removal to Groton, Mass., where he continued until 1719. In this year he removed to Windham County, Conn., settling in an unincorporated region south of Pomfret and north of Canterbury which in 1731 became the parish of Mortlake and in 1786 the town of Brooklyn. His name appears on petitions from inhabitants of that region to the Connecticut Assembly, dated 11 May 1721 and 12 Oct. 1732. The Land Records of Pomfret show that Samuel³ Shed of Groton, Mass., bought land in Pomfret of John Green of Plainfield 8 Oct. 1719, and that later he bought more land in Pomfret of Joseph Holland on 3 Nov. 1729 and of Daniel Bemis on 23 Nov. 1731.

In 1736 Samuel³ Shed sent his eldest son Ephraim⁴ Shed, then a youth of seventeen years, to Beekman's Patent, Dutchess County, N. Y., where the latter appears on the annual February tax lists of 1736/7, 1737/8, and 1738/9. In 1738 Samuel³ Shed and the rest of his family joined Ephraim⁴ Shed, as in Feb. 1739/40 the latter is displaced on the Dutchess County tax lists by his father Samuel³ Shed who continues on the annual February lists of 1740/1, 1741/2, 1742/3, 1743/4 and for the last time in 1744/5. (Supervisors' Records, Dutchess County, Book C, Poughkeepsie, N. Y.) In 1745 Samuel Shed visited his relatives in Groton, Mass. after an absence of twenty-five years, and while there enlisted in the successful expedition under Sir William Pepperell against Louisburg, Cape Breton. Rev. Dudley Bradstreet of Groton, a chaplain in this army, kept a diary of the expedition, in which, under date of 6 Dec. 1745, he states that "Samuel Shead a Groton soldier told him that he had recently been at Groton and had seen his [Bradstreet's] wife who was well," etc. (Massachusetts Historical Society Proceedings, Series 2, vol. 11, p. 419.) At this time Samuel³ Shed was fifty-five years of age, and he soon died from the hardships of military service in the severe winter climate of Cape Breton. On 29 Oct. 1746, administration on the estate of

Samuel Shead late of Bateman's [sic, should be Beekman's] Patent, N. Y., but last a soldier in the late expedition against Cape Breton, was granted to his son Ephraim Shead of said Patent, the widow Martha Shead renouncing her right. (Suffolk County, Mass., Probate Records.)

Samuel³ Shed married about 1717, MARTHA — who survived him.

15. DANIEL³ SHED (5. Samuel², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 11 Jan. 1692/3, and when a child was taken by his parents in their successive removals to Chelmsford in 1694 and Groton in 1702. He became a farmer in Groton and though his life was cut short in early manhood yet he had acquired considerable property. He died 2 Oct. 1723, a few weeks prior to his father's death. His widow was administratrix of his estate with Jonathan Hubbard; the papers relating to its settlement show he had four children of whom one was born five months after his death; the inventory of his estate was about £392, a good sum for a young man in those days. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20198.)

He married about 1714, ABIGAIL ———; she married again, 20 Oct. 1725, DANIEL FARNSWORTH, born 11 May, 1692, son of John and Hannah (Aldis) Farnsworth of Groton. He was chosen deacon of the church in Groton 14 May 1729, was an estimable citizen, and died there 27 Jan. 1775. They had no children.

On 9 Apr. 1756, William Lawrence was appointed administrator of the estate of "Jonathan Sheed" late of Pepperell. The inventory of the personal estate totalled £44-5-8, from which the widow's dower and probate expenses of £25-16-7 being deducted left a balance of £18-9-1; but as the deceased left debts of £289-1-4, the estate was insolvent. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20220.)

SHED (5. Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Groton, 17. JOHN³ Mass., 21 Dec. 1706, was the youngest son among the ten children of his father. Although but seventeen years old at the time of the latter's death in 1723, he was made residuary legatee of the estate and given the paternal homestead located in that part of Groton which in 1753 was set off as Pepperell. About the time of his marriage (1732) he built a new house on this farm in Pepperell which is still standing in excellent preservation and was the birthplace of four generations of his descendants who owned and occupied the house about one hundred and thirty-five years and it then passed out of the family about 1870. This house is the oldest one known to be standing and originally owned by a member of the Shed family; it was constructed in the thorough manner of the Colonial period and has ten good rooms besides the attic and a well finished cellar. About a century ago over a hundred maple trees were set out on the estate, furnishing a pleasant shade for the house and grounds.

John³ Shed was a thrifty and prosperous farmer, and he and his descendants in Pepperell were always well esteemed in the community. He died in Pepperell 21 Oct. (or 21 Nov. according to his gravestone) 1764. Shortly before his death he deeded his homestead in Pepperell to his eldest son John⁴ Shed who also administered the estate. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20214.) He married at Groton, 14 Nov. 1732, ELIZABETH SHATTUCK, born there 22 July 1705, daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth (Blood) Shattuck; she died in Pepperell, 11 July 1784.

During the Revolution he was an ardent patriot and served in the military forces in the field. From 25 Apr. 1775 to 2 Jan. 1776 he served as corporal in Capt. Asa Lawrence's company, Col. William Prescott's regiment, and was in the battle of Bunker Hill and the siege of Boston. From 30 July 1778 to 12 Sept. 1778 he served as sergeant in Capt. John Nutting's company, Col. William McIntosh's regiment, in Gen. Sullivan's army in the expedition against Newport, R. I. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 92-3.) At a later period he was commissioned lieutenant in the militia. In the United States census of 1790 he is listed as head of a family in Groton consisting of two males over sixteen years. no male under sixteen years, and two females. He d. in Groton His will proved 17 Apr. 1804 left nearly all his 6 Mar. 1804. estate to his wife, with remainder at her death to his heirs-atlaw. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20221.) He m. SUSANNA BLOOD, b. in Groton about 1754, daughter of James and Mary (Gilson) Blood; she survived him nearly forty years and thus expended most of his estate and also drew a pension for his services in the Revolution. She d. in Mason, N. H., in the spring of 1843. They had no children.

18. DEA. NATHAN³ SHED (6. Nathan², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 23 May 1695. Being the eldest son of a large family, on becoming of age he left the paternal roof, soon married, and was probably assisted by his father in establishing a new home of his own. It appears that he settled in the northern portion of the old town of Billerica, for a few years later he was among the prominent settlers in that section who sought to be separated from the parent town, that they might avoid the trouble of attending church several miles away "upon the hill." When they were finally successful and had been set off as the separate town of Tewksbury in 1734, he took a prominent part in public matters. Rev. Sampson Spalding of Chelmsford was chosen the pastor of the new church at Tewksbury 10 Jan. 1736/7, at the first regular church meeting held; and Nathan Shed and his brother-in-law Daniel Kittredge were chosen deacons, and their signatures stand first in the list of members recorded in the old church records of Tewksbury still preserved by its clerk.

The first general town meeting held in Tewksbury 14 Jan. 1734/5 resulted in the choice of Lieut. Daniel Kittredge, James Hunt, Jr., Joseph Kittredge, John French, and Nathaniel Patten as selectmen; Nathaniel Patten as town clerk; Edward Frost as constable; and Nathan Shed as town treasurer, in which office he continued until 1740/1, when he was succeeded by Lieut. William Brown. The town records also show that Daniel Kittredge was moderator till 1741 and frequently one of the selectmen, and that Dea. Nathan Shed was chosen a selectman in 1741. The latter received 10 shillings for perambulating the town lines in June 1745; the same year his minister's rate was $\pounds 1-2-7$ and town tax 12s. 6d. Dea. Shed received $\pounds 3$ for "Boarding ye School master Bradstreet two weeks," Sept. 12, 1749.

Dea. Nathan³ Shed died in Tewksbury 31 Dec. 1773, aged seventy-eight years. He left no will and no administration was taken out on his estate; he had apparently settled his homestead on his eldest surviving son John Shed under condition of life maintenance for himself and wife, as appears from the probate papers on the estate of the son John⁴ Shed who died about a year after his father.

Dea. Nathan³ Shed married at Billerica in Nov. 1717, his cousin HANNAH³ SHED, born there 23 Mar. 1693/4, daughter of Ens. John² and Sarah (Chamberlain) Shed (see *ante*, p. 53); she d. in Tewksbury 6 Sept. 1775, aged eighty-one years.

19. LIEUT. JOHN³ SHED (6. Nathan², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 6 Sept. 1699. His name occurs frequently in the town records, and from his title of lieutenant we can judge of his prominence in the old militia companies; he was a large land owner and though cut off suddenly in the prime of life he had acquired such standing as to be called "gentleman" in the probate papers on his estate. His death occurred 3 Jan. 1754, suddenly, we judge, as there is a nuncupative will on record made on the day of his death devising all his estate to his wife Elizabeth. This will was sworn to by William Shed, John Dutton and Thomas Kidder. The court however did not allow this will, but ordered an appraisal and assigned one-third to the use of the widow and two-thirds to the eldest son John, who is designated as an "inn-holder," conditional upon his paying certain sums to his brothers and sisters. The inventory of his estate shows he had a large amount of personal property; and of his real estate mentions a homestead of 31 acres valued at £2200, 10 acres on the east side of Concord River valued at £450, 97 acres on the west side of the river valued at

49. 50. £550, some 11 acres of upland near Mill Swamp worth £44; also 65 acres lying in Dunstable, apprised at £550, besides 197 acres situated in Hollis, N. H., making a total of upwards of £4000 valuation on real estate. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20211.) These valuations were of course in the depreciated "old tenor" currency of the Province, and worth in "hard" money only about $\frac{1}{8}$ of the amounts stated.

He married at Billerica, 6 Sept. 1724, his second cousin, ELIZA-BETH FARLEY, born there 28 Mar. 1704, daughter of Ebenezer and Elizabeth (Shed) Farley; she survived him and married secondly at Stow, Mass., 16 July 1767, as his second wife, ABRAHAM WHIT-NEY, born in Stow 29 May 1692, son of Moses and Sarah (Knight) Whitney; he died in Stow 15 Sept. 1778.

20. WILLIAM³ SHED (6. Nathan², Daniel¹), born in Billerica, Mass., 28 Aug. 1707, evidently learned the shoemaker's trade as in several deeds executed by him he is termed a "cordwainer." On 25 May 1732 he made an agreement to maintain his parents for life, receiving in consideration the old homestead in Billerica of his father and formerly of his grandfather. The house was located on the easterly side of the Concord or Bedford road on land owned since 1869 by the Sage family. The agreement describes the lands and lists the stock, and also provides that Elizabeth³ and Abigail³ Shed, sisters of William³, should have rooms in the house until they married. These sisters found husbands in 1735, his father died in 1736 and his mother in 1740, so in the latter year William³ Shed entered into unrestricted possession of the old homestead. On 20 Mar. 1745/6 he conveyed to Josiah Brown a small parcel of it, containing the house and about three and onehalf acres of land, being a part of the present Sage estate. Probably he built a new house on some other part of his ancestral property in which he resided until his death on 27 Feb. 1782.

He married at Billerica, 26 Dec. 1733, MARY FARMER, born there 27 Dec. 1706, daughter of Edward and Mary (Richardson) Farmer; the time of her death is not known.

21. DANIEL³ SHED (6. Nathan², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 20 Oct. 1710. Soon after he became of age, he followed his eldest brother, Dea. Nathan³ Shed, to Tewksbury, Mass., where he established his home and on 10 Jan. 1736/7 became one of the thirty-four original members of the church there. He died in Tewksbury 24 Oct. 1743, at the early age of thirty-three years, leaving no will and no administration was taken on his estate.

He married at Billerica, 8 Jan. 1733/4, REBECCA FARLEY, b. about 1710, probably daughter of George and Rebecca (Chamberlain) Farley; she married secondly, (published at Dracut 20 May 1748), as his third wife, ABRAHAM VARNUM of Dracut, born there 10 May 1710, son of John and Dorothy (Prescott) Varnum; there were three children by this marriage, and he died in Dracut in 1760.

22. DANIEL⁴ SHED (7. Daniel³, Daniel² (2), Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 7 Jan. 1713/14, and was the only descendant in this generation of the eldest son of the emigrant Daniel¹ Shed. His father died when this son was only two years old and he was reared by his mother for eight years until her marriage in 1724 to Nicholas Sprake [Sprague].

We have learned very little about his life except that he dwelt in Billerica where eight children were born to him; two of his sons served in the Revolutionary army, and one of them died in 1781 from sickness incurred in that service, leaving a widow and two sons.

The will of Daniel⁴ Shed, dated 23 May 1783, was signed with a cross, he being nearly seventy years old and probably feeble. He bequeathes to his wife, after all debts and just charges are paid,

"all my indoor moveables except my Bonds & notes, my Cyder cask, my horse furniture & wearing aparail, to dispose of as she pleases." "To Daughter Rebekah Osgood and to her heirs two pounds ten shillings lawful money to be paid to her in two years after my Decease, which with what she has already had and what I expect her mother will leave her shall be her full share. To my daughter Allis Twiss & to her heirs forever 2 pounds ten shillings." "Item 4. To my Grandson George⁶ Shed [his father Reuben⁵, son of Daniel⁴ the testator, died in 1781] and to his Heirs five pounds of lawful money to be paid in one year after my decease, and this shall be his full share out of my estate. Item 5. I give to my grandson Reuben Shed and to his heirs 5 pounds lawful money to be paid in one year after my decease. To my son Joseph Shed and to his heirs all my estate, real, personal or mixed, that shall remain after all just debts are paid." He named his son Joseph Shed and Joseph Pollard as executors of his will. Witnesses were Joshua Abbott, Isaac Stearns and Joseph Ruggles. He probably died late in 1786 or early in 1787, since the will was lodged probably early in 1787, as his son Joseph refused the trust of executor as shown by papers on file dated 11 April 1787. The amount of his estate was £65-8-11, of which £30 valuation was for land in Tewksbury. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20199.)

He married about 1738, ABIGAIL PATTEN, born in Billerica 7 May 1716, daughter of Kendall and Abigail (Kittredge) Patten; she was living in 1783, but the date of her decease is unknown.

23. JOHN⁴ SHED (8. Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 1 June 1722. He learned the trade of housewright, and in 1744 married Hannah Ross, daughter of Thomas Ross of Billerica. Soon afterwards he became one of the pioneer settlers of "Salem Canada, N. H.," a township granted in 1735 by the government of Massachusetts to a company of soldiers of Salem, Mass., and vicinity (or their descendants), who had served in the disastrous expedition in 1690 under Sir William Phips against Quebec. This township embraced the present town of Lyndeborough, N. H., and the northerly part of the adjoining town of Wilton. Mr. Shed became a proprietor by purchase of rights from some grantee, as he had no ancestor in this expedition. On account of conflicting claims to the region, the proprietors of "Salem Canada" were also obliged to secure later a patent from the Masonian Proprietors, those of Wilton obtaining their grant on 1 Oct. 1749 and those of Lyndeborough on 5 Dec. 1753. Among the Wilton grantees John Shed drew lots 14 and 15 in range 6 (located a little to the west of the old North Cemetery), and in Lyndeborough he drew lot 50 (located at the base of a little tongue of land projecting westward from Lyndeborough between the present towns of Greenfield and Temple, N. H.) (History of Wilton, N. H., p. 33, and History of Lyndeborough, N. H., p. 49.) On 17 Apr. 1752, "John Shed of Salem Canada, N. H., housewright," for £50 bought of [his brother-in-law] Thomas Ross of Billerica, yeoman, thirteen acres of land in Billerica to the west of the country road to Shawshin, bounded north by land of grantor and land of heirs of Nathan Crosby, west by land of said heirs, south by land of Seth Ross, and east by land of grantor. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 49, page 476.)

While John⁴ Shed was living in "Salem Canada" [Wilton], N. H., his father-in-law Thomas Ross of Billerica died, whereupon in right of his wife he succeeded to part of the estate of Ross as appears by the following document among the probate papers of the estate of Thomas Ross: "2 July 1753. I, Benjamin Shed of Billerica, gent., attorney to my son John Shed, have received two bonds for £539 old tenor for my said son's interest by his wife Hannah in the estate of her father Mr. Thomas Ross, deceased." (Middlesex County Probate Records, File No. 19522.)

On 9 Apr. 1755, "John Shead of No. 2 [Wilton], N. H., housewright," conveyed his two lots there, nos. 14 and 15 in range 6, of one hundred and sixty acres, to Ephraim Butterfield, yeoman, receiving in exchange one hundred and fifty acres in Dunstable [now Nashua], N. H., and paying £200 to boot. (New Hampshire Deeds, vol. 84, p. 356 and vol. 51, p. 502.) John⁴ Shed at once removed from No. 2 [Wilton] to this tract in Dunstable [now Nashual where he died 30 May 1756 according to the town records. Administration on his estate was given to his widow Hannah Shed on 30 Mar. 1757, and the inventory filed 2 June 1757 totalled £2784-10-0 in old tenor. On 2 Nov. 1759 the widow Hannah Shed presented a first account, mentioning maintenance of the "children" of the deceased; and on 31 Oct. 1765 she and her [second] husband Samuel Roby filed a final account in which her son John⁵ Shed is mentioned. (New Hampshire Probate Records, vol. 20, p. 195, vol. 21, p. 381, and vol. 5, p. 221.)

John⁴ Shed married at Billerica, Mass., 26 Dec. 1744, HANNAH Ross, born there 14 Mar. 1723/4, daughter of Thomas and Hannah (——) Ross. On 11 Aug. 1764, Seth Ross [her uncle] conveyed to Samuel Danforth land in Billerica bounded on the north by land of Widow Hannah Shed. (Middlesex County Deeds, vol. 62, p. 359.) Between this date and 31 Oct. 1765 she married secondly, SAMUEL ROBY of Dunstable [now Nashua], N. H., as above shown. The births of the three children of John⁴ Shed were recorded in Dunstable [now Nashua], N. H., but the two daughters were evidently born in "No. 2" [now Wilton], N. H.

24. BENJAMIN⁴ SHED (8. Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 17 Dec. 1727. He became a housewright and as "Benja. Shed, Jun." was taxed 3s. 8d. on the minister's rate for 1755. In 1760 an epidemic of small-pox spread through New England, and among its victims was Benjamin Shed

who died in Billerica 19 Dec. 1760, aged thirty-three years, leaving a widow and three young children. His gravestone still remains in the old Billerica burial ground. Administration was granted to his widow, and their three children were put under the guardianship of Nathaniel Davidson, a merchant of Billerica, until 1768, when their step-father succeeded him as guardian. (Middlesex County Probate Records, Files 20161-20163.)

He married about 1755, KEZIAH BUTTERFIELD, born in Chelmsford, Mass., 25 Feb. 1733/4, daughter of David and Keziah (Shuttleworth) Butterfield, by whom he had three children. She married secondly, at Billerica, 3 Jan. 1765, DAVID STICKNEY, born there 5 Jan. 1732/3, son of Daniel and Mary (Hill) Stickney.* About 1781 they removed to Grafton, Vt., taking her Shed children with them; she died in Grafton in Mar. 1805, and her husband, after another marriage, died there 17 Oct. 1807.

25. SAMUEL⁴ SHED (8. Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel1), was born in Billerica, Mass., 5 Mar. 1731/2, and became a farmer in his native town where he was assessed 2s. 3d. on the ministerial rate of 1755. We next find him a soldier in the French and Indian War, serving in Lieut. William Manning's detachment of Capt. Thomas Flint's company, Col. Eleazer Tyng's regiment, which detachment marched from Billerica in August 1757 to join an army to be sent to the relief of Fort William Henry, N. Y., besieged by a vastly superior force of French and Indians. After reaching Shrewsbury, thirty-four miles distant, word was received that the fort had surrendered, so the relief forces were dismissed and sent home. Samuel⁴ Shed was credited with five and a half days service on this expedition. (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 95, p. 501.) He died in Billerica 11 Sept. 1768, at the early age of thirtysix years. A common field stone with lettering barely legible marks his grave "S. Shed. 1768," near the grave-stone of his father

in the old South Burial Ground in Billerica. Administration on his estate was granted the same year. (Middlesex County Probate Records File 20230.)

He married at Billerica, 8 June 1758, HANNAH JAQUITH, born there 22 Dec. 1730, daughter of Abraham and Hannah (Farley) Jaquith. In the United States census of 1790 she is listed as head of a family in Billerica of two females. Later she lived with her son Samuel⁵ Shed in Burlington, Mass., where she died 28 Dec. 1804.

26. JOSEPH⁴ SHED (8. Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), born in Billerica, Mass., 9 Feb. 1740/1, was a housewright and farmer in Billerica where he is enrolled in the United States census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years and four females. A few years later he removed to Tyngsboro, Mass., and thence to Merrimack, N. H., where he lived for several years. Later he went to Bethel, Vt., where he purchased and sold several lots of land between 1805 and 1809. The time and place of his death have not been found.

He married at Concord, Mass., 7 Jan. 1773, REBECCA NEED-HAM, born in Billerica 7 Jan. 1754, daughter of Benjamin and Rebecca (Jaquith) Needham.

27. JONATHAN⁴ SHED (8. Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), born in Billerica, Mass., 26 Aug. 1743, when a young man removed to southwestern Massachusetts and settled in the town of Monson prior to the Revolution. The military archives contain several mentions of him during that struggle. At some time in 1776 he served in Capt. Abial Pease's company stationed at New London, Conn., for the defence of that port. (Connecticut Historical Society Collections, vol. 12, p. 18.) The Massachusetts Archives also have several records of his service. Jonathan Shed of Monson appears on a return of Capt. Joshua Shaw's company in Col. John Bliss' regiment, for eight months' service ending in Apr. 1778. Jonathan Shed of Monson, aged thirty-three years, height six feet, with brown hair, appears on a descriptive list of Hampshire County men enlisted for nine months in Capt. Munn's company, Col. Bliss' regiment; arrived at Fishkill, N. Y. 5 July 1778. Also Jonathan Shed of Monson appears on a list of men returned by Capt. Jonathan Warner, dated at Fort Arnold, N. Y., 10 July 1778; raised by resolve of 20 Apr. 1778. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 92.)

Jonathan⁴ Shed does not appear in the United States census of 1790, as Monson is one of the very few towns in New England the scheduled returns of which are lost. He died in Monson 22 Sept. 1792, aged fifty years, according to his grave-stone in the old cemetery in Monson, and administration was granted on his estate that year. (Hampshire County Probate Records.)

28. LIEUT. ASA⁴ SHED (8. Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², $Daniel^1$), born in Billerica, Mass., 11 Sept. 1745, when a young man settled in Ashby, Mass., where he became a prosperous farmer.

He was an ardent patriot in the Revolution and served several enlistments in the American army, rising to the rank of firstlieutenant. He was private in Capt. John Jones' company, Col. James Prescott's regiment, which marched 20 Apr. 1775 on the Lexington alarm, serving seven days; on 26 Apr. 1775 he enlisted as private for eight months in Capt. Abijah Wyman's company, Col. William Prescott's regiment, took part in the battle of Bunker Hill 17 June 1775, and is mentioned on a company return at Cambridge dated 3 Oct. 1775. On 26 Sept. 1777 he enlisted as sergeant in Capt. James Hosley's company of volunteers, Col. Jonathan Reed's regiment, which marched to reenforce Gen. Gates' army at Saratoga and was present at the surrender of Burgoyne; discharged 9 Nov. 1777. On 11 May 1779 he was commissioned second-lieutenant of Capt. Jonathan Locke's company, Col. Jonathan Reed's sixth Middlesex regiment of Massachusetts militia. In 1780 he served four months and eight days at Rhode Island as lieutenant of Capt. John Porter's company, Col. Cyprian How's regiment; discharged 30 Oct. 1780; one hundred miles travel home allowed. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 79 and 89.)

Lieut. Asa⁴ Shed appears in the United States census of 1790 as head of a family in Ashby, Mass., of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years and three females. He died at Ashby 19 Sept. 1798, aged fifty-three years. His will made just prior to his decease mentions only his wife and two daughters; his estate totalled the goodly amount of \$6395. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20189.)

He married (intention recorded at Westford 6 Feb. 1779), ELIZABETH CUMMINGS, born there 27 Feb. 1743, daughter of Thomas and Sarah (Fassett) Cummings.

29. JAMES⁴ SHED (9. James³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Roxbury, Mass., 9 July 1713, the only son of his parents. We can now glean little information in regard to his life. He lived upon his father's homestead evidently located in that portion of Roxbury which joined Brookline, as he was allowed to send his children to school in the latter town by special vote of 2 Mar. 1746/7. He was chief and residuary legatee of his father's large property by his will in 1749; although he had quite a large family, we may rightly conclude he did not squander the estate he received. His own will dated 26 May 1767, and proved 12 Aug. 1768, devised an estate apprised at £1103, from which his "beloved wife Mary" received the "income of one-third part" and other considerations, and his son James "as he had not had the advantage of learning any trade" received in money £133, and his oxen, horses, cows, etc. together with his farming tools. All the balance of his estate was to be divided equally among his children, Mary, Elizabeth, Thomas, Nathan, James, Oliver and Martha, the son Thomas to have what land he had improved for his share, if he chose; each of the seven shares amounted to £33-10-0. Son James was appointed executor. [Signed] James Shed. (Suffolk County Probate Records, File 14302.) His death took place in the summer of 1768, but the record of it and his gravestone have not been found.

He married at Roxbury, 29 May 1740, MARY WELD, born there 15 Sept. 1719, daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth (Chamberlain) Weld. (The will of her father, Joseph Weld, dated 10 Sept. 1762, mentions his daughter "Mary Shed.") James⁴ Shed and his wife Mary Shed both owned the covenant of the Roxbury Church 30 Aug. 1741. She long survived her husband residing with her third son James⁵ Shed, and she died in Roxbury, 10 Dec. 1799, in her eighty-first year.

(10. Ebenezer³, Zechariah², Dan-30. EBENEZER⁴ SHED iel¹), was born in Charlestown, Mass., 8 Apr. 1726. We next find him in military service in the French and Indian War, appearing as corporal in Capt. John Cutting's troop of horse stationed on guard at Boston 24 to 26 Sept. 1746, on account of a false alarm of the approach of a French fleet. (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 92, p. 38.) He resided in Charlestown where he is enrolled in the United States census of 1790 as head of a family containing two males over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years and three females. During the retreat of the British from Lexington on 19 Apr. 1775, the buildings of Ebenezer Shed were damaged to an extent of £140 and his crops, fences and farm goods to an extent of £279. In the burning of Charlestown during the battle of Bunker Hill, 17 June 1775, Ebenezer⁴ Shed suffered losses amounting to £183-7-4, and the dower of his mother in the estate of his father was damaged to an extent of £97-0-0.

The will of Ebenezer⁴ Shed dated 11 Mar. 1807 left the use of all his property to his daughter Elizabeth (who was non compos mentis) for life, with remainder at her death to be divided equally among his children John Shed, Anne (or Nancy) wife of Nathan Heard, Susanna wife of Curtis Fowle, and Mary, wife of Winslow Dalrymple. Three days later his son John petitioned the Probate Court to appoint a guardian for his father, alleging the latter was over eighty years old, had become feeble in mind and body, was wasting his property, and having buried two wives was proposing to marry his housekeeper; the court later granted the petition and on 12 May 1809 appointed Joseph Miller to be guardian of Ebenezer Shed.

Mr. Shed died in Charlestown 13 Dec. 1811, aged eighty-five years. His will was disallowed and the court ordered his estate to be divided among his children, Mary Dalrymple, Susanna Fowle and John Shed, and his grandchildren, Nathan and Nancy Heard of Worcester. The inventory of his estate shows a homestead with fourteen acres worth \$4200, six acres of land worth \$1562, six acres of woodland in West Cambridge worth \$351, and personal property of about \$1200, making a total of over \$7300. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20203.)

He married first, at Watertown, Mass., 1 Nov. 1750, JOANNA TAINTOR, born there 10 Dec. 1730, daughter of Capt. John and Joanna (Harrington) Taintor; she had three children, died 4 Dec. 1759, and was buried in Cambridge.

He married secondly, at Cambridge, 24 Mar. 1760, RUTH WINSHIP, bapt. there 24 Oct. 1731, daughter of John and Elizabeth (Wyeth) Winship; she had three children and died about 1777.

He married thirdly (published 20 Mar. 1779), MRS. EUNICE (COOLIDGE) MILLER, born in Watertown, Mass., 10 Mar. 1739/ 40, daughter of Simon and Abiah (Sanderson) Coolidge and widow of Joseph Miller of Charlestown; she probably d. in 1806.

SOLOMON⁴ SHED (10. *Ebenezer*³, *Zechariah*², *Daniel*¹), born in Charlestown, Mass., 29 Jan. 1729/30, when a young man settled in Lunenburg, Mass., where he resided many years, engaged in farming. About 1786 he removed to Springfield, Vt., where he was listed in the United States census of 1790 as head of a family of five males over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years and four females. Here he developed and improved a new homestead on which he resided until his death 25 Apr. 1810, aged eighty years.

He married at Lancaster, Mass., 24 May 1763, ELIZABETH BOYNTON, born in Rowley, Mass., 1 Mar. 1740/1, daughter of Jonathan and Elizabeth (Wood) Boynton, later of Lunenburg, Mass.; she died in Springfield, Vt., in Jan. 1823.

32. SAMUEL⁴ SHED (10. Ebenezer³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Charlestown, Mass., in May 1736. He passed his life in his native town where he possessed considerable real estate as appears by the numerous deeds in his name at the registry and by the inventory of his estate. (A homestead of about nine acres was valued at \$2200 and three other lots outside increased the apprisal to over \$4500.) His property was in that part of Charlestown now forming Somerville and near to many of the stirring scenes of the revolutionary engagements.

"When the British forces were retreating from their ever memorable expedition to Concord in 1775 they passed through what is now Somerville and Lord Percy's troops there received the hottest fire from the aroused colonists as they passed along the base of Prospect Hill so that their field pieces were again unlimbered. A British soldier while stopping to ransack a chest of drawers in Samuel Shed's house which they passed was shot in the act and fell over the open drawer. This interesting relic of those times with the marks of blood and bullets still upon it is preserved at the house of Mr. Tufts on Medford Street." His property was damaged to the extent of $\pounds72-8-0$.

These exciting scenes passed, peace and freedom came, and prosperity followed for many years, but he lived to see hostilities again opened with the mother country. His name appears in the United States census of 1790 as head of a family in Charlestown of one male over sixteen years and two females. He died 15 June 1812, aged seventy-six years, leaving a widow Elizabeth, a son Samuel, and a daughter Elizabeth who was *non compos mentis*. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20232.)

He married at Cambridge, 8 Mar. 1759, ELIZABETH IRELAND, bapt. there 8 Mar. 1741, daughter of John and Sarah (Shepherd) Ireland; she died in Charlestown 29 Sept. 1826, aged eighty-five years.

Her will dated 20 July 1825, proved 5 Dec. 1826, left \$5.00 to her son Samuel⁵ Shed, and all the rest of her estate to her friend Mrs. Martha Austin of Cambridge, as trustee, for the benefit of her "afflicted daughter" then in the care of Eleanor Welsh, wife of Samuel Welsh of Watertown, Mass. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20209.)

33. ZECHARIAH⁴ SHED (10. *Ebenezer*³, *Zechariah*², *Daniel*¹), was born in Charlestown (now Somerville), Mass., 7 Feb. 1744/5. He married as soon as he became of age, lived a few years in Charlestown, and then settled on a large farm in Cambridge near Mount Auburn Cemetery. In the United States Census of 1790 he is enrolled as head of a family in Cambridge comprising three males over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years and six females.

His grandson William B.⁶ Shedd of Malden, Mass., (1813-1892) gave the following account of the activities of Zechariah⁴ Shed in the Revolution. "He was a staunch supporter of the Colonists' rights prior to the Revolution and was one of the 'Minute Men' in the famous battle at Lexington, 19 Apr. 1775. During the retreat of the British back to Boston his property was damaged to the extent of £23-0-0. He was not in the battle of Bunker Hill

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which came on suddenly on Saturday afternoon, 17 June 1775; but when Gen. Washington took possession of Dorchester Heights on 4 Mar. 1776, he teamed over to the fortifications there a large wagon load of bundled hay, wood, facines, barrels, etc., drawn by a yoke of oxen and a pair of horses. When Gen. Burgoyne's soldiers came down as prisoners of war from Saratoga, they were marched past his house and he took part a short time in guarding them as a substitute for a lieutenant while they were encamped on Prospect Hill, Somerville. He had great faith in the promises of the Continental Congress to pay the currency that passed for money and took it freely in payment for the provisions he furnished the forces guarding the prisoners of Burgovne, and consequently suffered an almost entire loss when this money became valueless." The Massachusetts Archives have only the following record of his military service: Zechariah Sheed appears as private in Capt. Samuel Barnard's company of militia, Col. Thomas Gardner's regiment, which marched on the Lexington alarm 19 Apr. 1775; service six days. Roll endorsed "Watertown." (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 95.) This company took part in the harassing of the British forces during their retreat from Lexington to Charlestown.

Zechariah⁴ Shed was noted for his careful, strong and independent opinions, and for earnest temperance principles almost unknown at his period. He never used ardent spirits as a drink, and when at the age of sixty his physician, Dr. Marshall Spring, advised a mild use to relieve his infirmities, he refused to take any, saying he had always lived a sober man and so would continue.

After a strenuous life in rearing a family of thirteen children, he died in Waltham, Mass., 15 Jan. 1813, in his sixty-eighth year, leaving a good landed and personal estate. The inventory taken 1 Apr. 1813 totalled \$4325, and on the petition of the heirs, Nathan Adams of Medford was appointed administrator. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20241.)

He married at Charlestown, 17 Apr. 1766, LYDIA SPRING, born in Watertown 11 Jan. 1748, daughter of Henry and Sarah (Swan) Spring; she survived her husband a few years, dying 7 Oct. 1821, at the age of seventy-three years.

34. JOSEPH⁴ SHED (11. Joseph³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Boston 17 June 1732, and passed his long extended life in his native place. He learned the carpenter's trade and engaged in it until the period of the Revolution; while following this avocation he was employed upon the rebuilding of Faneuil Hall in 1765, for which service it was voted in town meeting that he should be allowed, along with claims of others, $\pounds 42-4-0^{3}4$. In his later years he spoke with much pride of his labor on this building noted as "The Cradle of Liberty." In 1762 and later years he was chosen constable of Boston. Just how long he continued as a carpenter and builder has not been learned; but eventually he relinquished that trade and established himself in business as a grocer. He secured a building on Milk Street for his home and also his store, later acquired adjoining property, and continued there over thirty years until his death.

About 1770 the unjust taxation imposed by the British ministry upon the American Colonists aroused the latter's resentment and indignation beyond further endurance, so that all former feelings of loyalty of most of the New England people were crushed out, and in its place sprang a wish for independence. Thus came about that memorable town meeting within the walls of the Old South Church on 16 Dec. 1773 to protest against the landing of those shiploads of taxed tea, when the solemn deliberations of the sturdy objectors were prolonged until the shades of evening fell, before they learned the final refusal of the British Governor to return the ships and the futility of their arguments. Then came that first grand outburst of resistance, ever famous in history as the "Boston Tea Party," when a band of determined citizens disguised as Indians sought to obtain by force what petition and better arguments could not secure, the non-acceptance of the tea cargoes, by throwing them overboard into the harbor the same evening. Of the small band that actually shared in this service it was later disclosed that Joseph⁴ Shed was a prominent participant, and it is said that several of the so-called "Indians" donned their masks and "war paint" in a room at his house almost within ear shot of the speeches before the town meeting. Probably one at least of the number was his brother-in-law John Gammel who also was numbered as "a warrior."

Then followed soon after the exciting events of the Revolution, and through the long struggle there is no doubt that Joseph⁴ Shed was closely associated with those other patriots of Boston whose strength and substance were so freely given to the cause they espoused, and strong in his faith of the righteousness of their cause he was ever ready for any action though making little display and claiming no public recognition of his acts.

He was always a friend and admirer of Samuel Adams, the noted patriot leader and finally governor of the Commonwealth, who was also a frequent visitor at his house, and in whose honor a son and a grandson were successively named. One of his grandsons (the late Joseph Grafton Shed) treasured as an heirloom a china punch bowl, formerly his ancestor's, from which Adams drank to American Independence at the first celebration held in Boston after it was finally secured; he also owned an old-fashioned desk that his grandfather used at his business. In his later years the latter, ever alive to what he believed to be true American principles, became an ardent Jeffersonian Democrat, hating even the name of Federalist as if it betokened a return of British supremacy.

In his business as a grocer, or West India merchant as it was then called, he was quite successful. His store was situated at the corner of Milk Street and Theatre Alley, now called Devonshire Street, and the site is now occupied by the elegant large building of the Equitable Life Insurance Company. The site was an admirable one, being but a few hundred feet from the Old South Meeting House, while at its rear was the then famous Federal Street Theatre; the location has ever continued as the heart of the business section of the city in all its wonderful growth, being directly opposite the end of the massive Post Office and Federal Court Building.

The first published directory of Boston in 1789 gives Joseph Shed as a retailer on Milk St. while the next volume in 1796 calls him a grocer and gives his son Joseph Shed Junr. as a victualler on Theatre Alley; these listings continued until 1803 when Joseph Shed & Son (Samuel Adams Shed) were called retailers at the old stand, while the elder son Joseph retained his place on Theatre Alley.

When a direct tax was levied in 1798 by the United States Government, we find Joseph Shed Sen. taxed for a lot of 7000 square feet located as described above, on which was his dwelling house (occupying 2120 square feet) which was three stories in height and had thirty-seven windows. The value was placed at \$4000.00. There were three other lots adjoining aggregating nearly 2500 square feet more, each covered with buildings, or in all no less than 9500 square feet of land upon which the entire value was set down as only \$8000. The growth of our country and its resources needs no stronger comment than the simple comparison of those estimates with the worth of the same land to-day which is now assessed at about \$100. per square foot.

On 3 Aug. 1796 he purchased from Samuel Barrett, his brotherin-law, the latter's interest, or one-third part, of Tomb No. 69 in the Granary Burying Ground which was formerly the property of Jonathan Williams, deceased. This tomb was the second on the right side as one entered the ground, and was the final resting place of several members of the family.

The first United States Census of Boston, made in Aug. (2-21) 1790 by Samuel Bradford, lists Joseph Shed, Sen., as head of a family consisting of one male over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years and five females. In his later years he took his second son, Samuel Adams⁵ Shed, into his business in which he continued successfully until his death in Boston on 18 Oct. 1812, at the age of eighty years. He was buried in Tomb 69 in the Old Granary Burial Ground where are garnered the remains of so many of Boston's early citizens.

The will of Joseph Shed, dated 2 Jan. 1811, devised his dwelling house on Milk Street to his son Samuel A. Shed; gave \$10 to his great-grand-daughter How; directed the fulfillment of a marriage contract with his wife Elizabeth and also gave her a suit of silk mourning; provided for the life support of his sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Sumner and Mrs. Lydia Gair; and left the remainder of his estate equally between his sons Samuel and William Shed, grocers. Proved 26 Oct. 1812. (Suffolk County Probate Records, File 24047.)

He married first (intention recorded at Boston 29 Nov. 1753), LYDIA YOUNG; she had four children and died in Boston 11 Aug. 1762, according to her gravestone in the Granary Burial Ground.

He married secondly, at Boston, 2 June 1766, MARY PAGE, bapt. in Medford, Mass., 29 Oct. 1732, daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth (——) Page; she had kept a small store on Middle (now Hanover) Street and had in her household her orphan niece Hannah Gammell, born about 1753, daughter of William and Anna (Page) Gammell; this second wife of Joseph Shed died in Boston 10 Sept. 1769, leaving no issue and bequeathing "both her property and her husband" to her said niece.

Whereupon Joseph Shed married for his third wife, 10 Oct. 1770, the said HANNAH GAMMELL, niece of his second wife, she being then about seventeen years of age and he thirty-eight; she had four children and after a married life of thirty years died "suddenly" in Boston 14 Apr. 1801.

He ventured a fourth time into matrimony, 16 Aug. 1801, with MRS. ELIZABETH (FLAGG) (ROBINSON) MARTIN, born in 1754, who died in Cambridge 13 Dec. 1830 but was buried beside her last husband in the Granary Burial Ground in Boston; no children by this marriage.

35. CAPT. EBENEZER⁴ SHED (12. Zechariah³, Zechariah², Daniel1), born in Chelmsford, Mass., 10 July 1753, like his father became a carpenter and housewright by trade and also a farmer, and succeeded in 1784 to the old homestead in Chelmsford acquired nearly seventy years previously by his paternal grandfather. According to a letter written in 1884 by his youngest daughter, Mrs. Sophronia Hinkley (1805-1890), he was a soldier in the American army in the Revolution, was in the battle of Bunker Hill on 17 June 1775, and while in close encounter single-handed with several of the enemy managed to clear himself and escape from them, though from his exertions he sustained a rupture from which he suffered the rest of his life. The Massachusetts State Archives record his service as follows: Ebenezer Shed of Chelmsford, age twenty-five years, stature six feet, complexion dark, occupation housewright, enlisted 25 Apr. 1775 [for eight months] in Capt. John Ford's company, Col. Ebenezer Bridge's regiment; on rolls dated 15 June, 1 Aug., and 25 Sept. 1775. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 90.) This company was in the thick of the fight at the rail fence at the battle of Bunker Hill, and assisted in the siege of Boston the rest of the year.

After the Revolution, Ebenezer⁴ Shed was commissioned a captain in the militia, by which title he was thereafter known. In the United States Census of 1790 he is enrolled as head of a family in Chelmsford, consisting of two males over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years and two females. He died suddenly at Westford, Mass., 1 Mar. 1829, and was buried at Chelmsford where his gravestone records his age as seventy-five years and nine months.

He married first (intention recorded at Carlisle, 1 June 1780),

MARY BLOOD, born there 6 Apr. 1757, daughter of Stephen and Mary (Spaulding) Blood; she had three children and died in Chelmsford 3 Aug. 1785.

He married secondly, at Carlisle, 16 May 1793, LUCY HART-WELL, born in Concord, Mass., 20 Oct. 1763, daughter of David and Rachel (Woolley) Hartwell. 36. JONATHAN⁴ SHED (12. Zechariah³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was baptized in Chelmsford, Mass., 27 June 1756. At the outbreak of the Revolution on 19 Apr. 1775 he was in his nineteenth year, and the next year he entered into the American army and rendered service in several campaigns as disclosed by the archives of Massachusetts. As "Jonathan Shad" he appears on a company receipt dated at Chelmsford 19 Apr. 1776 for wages for service from 5 Feb. to 1 Apr. 1776, in Capt. John Ford's company, Col. Robinson's regiment. As "Jonathan Shed of Chelmsford" he is enrolled on a company return as private in Capt. Zaccheus Wright's company, Col. Brook's regiment, dated White Plains, N. Y., 31 Oct. 1776; reported in camp there, fit for duty. Jonathan Shed also enlisted 28 Sept. 1777 in Capt. John Ford's company of volunteers, Col. Jonathan Reed's regiment, which marched 30 Sept. 1777 to reinforce the Northern army [under Gen. Gates at Saratogal; discharged 8 Nov. 1777; service forty days. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 3, 91 and 92.) In this last service he took part in the capture of Gen. Burgoyne's army, the decisive conflict of the Revolution.

On 19 Oct. 1781 the war virtually closed with the surrender of the army of Gen. Cornwallis at Yorktown, Va.; and two months later Jonathan Shed married and at once settled in Stoddard, N. H., where he appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years and three females. He resided in Stoddard the rest of his life, engaged in farming, and died there about 1825.

He married first, at Carlisle, Mass., 13 Dec. 1781, ESTHER BLOOD, born in Chelmsford, 16 Feb. 1761, daughter of Jonathan and Lydia (——) Blood; she had five children and died in Stoddard about 1797.

He married secondly, about 1800, LOIS FARNSWORTH, born 13 May 1782, perhaps daughter of Harbour and Lucy (Hale) Farnsworth of Stoddard; she died there 19 Feb. 1861.

37. LEMUEL⁴ SHED (13. Benjamin³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Lunenburg, Mass., 2 Feb. 1762. Like many other boys of his time his young heart was fired with the patriotic spirit of the revolutionists, and when scarcely sixteen he enlisted in the Army under Gen. Washington and served throughout the War for Independence. He was one of Washington's Life Guards in that memorable winter spent at Valley Forge when the footprints of the barefooted soldiers on the round of camp duties might be traced by the marks of blood upon the frozen ground. At another time he was one of a scouting party of thirty men sent out into the woods. The Indians stole all their provisions, so that the party had only the flesh and entrails of one sheep for subsistence for three days. Just before the capture of Burgoyne he was sent as messenger with dispatches for Gen. Gates, and in doing this mission had to pass through Tory country; on his return he was so closely followed that he was forced to abandon his horse and secrete himself under and behind a sheet of water falling over a precipice until the enemy gave up the chase, and he then came forth and safely delivered up his papers to Gen. Washington. At one time he paid \$100 from his hard-earned but depreciated service money for a glass of whisky, while a breakfast would have cost him \$500 had he had money enough to buy it. The foregoing account of his Revolutionary experiences was furnished in 1883 by his granddaughter, Mrs. William M. Rolfe, from traditions in the family.

The official State Archives have the following records of his Revolutionary service: Lemuel Shead of Lancaster, aged sixteen years, stature five feet and three inches, complexion and hair light, engaged for town of Lancaster 3 May 1777; deserted by never reporting for service. Lemuel Shad, private in Capt. John Drury's company, Col. Ezra Wood's regiment, was in service from 6 June 1778 to 10 Feb. 1779; regiment stationed on the North River. N. Y. Lemuel Shed of Lancaster, private, aged seventeen years, stature five feet and three inches, complexion light, was mustered for the Continental Army 8 July 1779, for nine months service; also appears on pay accounts as private in Col. Thomas Marshall's company from 1 Jan. 1780 to 31 Dec. 1780; also is on a descriptive list dated at West Point, 11 Jan. 1781, as private in Capt. William Parks' company, Col. Benjamin Tupper's regiment, described as of Lancaster, aged nineteen years, stature five feet and five inches, with light complexion and hair; also appears on pay rolls of Col. Tupper's regiment for twenty-four months service from 1 Jan. 1781; also is enrolled on a list of men entitled to \$20 or two hundred acres of land by resolve of 5 Mar. 1801; residence Norway, Me. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 80, 3, 93 and 80.) In 1835 his widow Ruth Shed of Norway, Me., applied for a land bounty for her husband's services, stating he enlisted at Leominster, Mass.

About 1788 he settled in the District of Maine, taking up two lots of wild land in what was then the town of Waterford, now Norway, Me. With only one other man, Jonathan Stickney, he camped there in the dense forest, clearing up land and building a log house. Having established a homestead, in 1792 he took a wife. Who shall say their new life was not a happy one, though they settled down in the log house his own hands had reared, and though he was obliged to carry a bag of rye of his own raising on his shoulders to Bridgton sixteen miles (guided much of the way by spotted trees) to be ground at the nearest mill? Like all others in similar new surroundings they were forced to live within themselves, so to speak, eating only such foods as they could raise or find at hand and wearing clothes made at home from wool and flax of their own raising. Sometimes in the autumn they would be obliged to go out and thump on empty boxes to frighten the bears away and prevent their eating up the corn before it could be harvested.

His wife brought a young apple tree home at one time from Bridgton and planted it with her own hands; it lived and bore the first apples raised in town. From the first fruits a pint of apple seeds were saved and planted, whence have sprung all the fruit trees in that vicinity; the original tree is still thrifty and in 1883 produced three barrels of fruit after its long growth.

• Four children were born to Lemuel Shed and his wife while they lived in the log house; when successful toil had brought prosperity they built a frame house and an increasing number of neighbors made life less irksome and monotonous than in the early years of their settlement in Norway. Lemuel Shed was instantly killed by having his head crushed by a falling timber while assisting in raising the frame of the house of his son Nathaniel P.⁵ Shed, 23 June 1818.

He married at Bridgton, Me., about 1792, RUTH SYMONDS, baptized at Danvers, Mass., 11 May 1760, daughter of John and Ruth (Metcalf) Symonds; she was a capable and energetic woman and had taught school nine summer terms at Bridgton before her marriage. She long survived her husband and died at Norway 5 Oct. 1846, aged eighty-six years.

38. JOHN⁴ SHED (13. *Benjamin*³, *Zechariah*², *Daniel*¹), born in Lunenburg, Mass., 9 June 1764, seems to have passed his life in his native town. Although only a lad of eleven years when the Revolution broke out, before its eight weary years were over he saw some service in it. On 16 July 1780 he enlisted as private in Capt. Timothy Boutell's company, Col. John Rand's regiment, which was raised to reinforce the Continental army for three months; discharged 10 Oct. 1780; service three months and five days, including allowance of ten days for two hundred miles travel home. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 79.)

He was a farmer and cooper in Lunenburg where he is listed in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years and one female. In his later years he fell into hard times, and he had but little means left at the time of his death, 4 Aug. 1829.

He married first, 1 July 1789, BETSEY DARLING, born in Groton, Mass., about 1770; she had one child and died in Lunenburg 3 or 11 Oct. 1825. He married secondly, at Shirley, Mass., 25 May 1829, ELIZA-BETH PATCH; she died in Shirley in 1830, leaving no issue.

39. EPHRAIM⁴ SHEAD (14. Samuel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born in what is now Brooklyn, Conn., and was baptized in the then nearest church at Canterbury, Conn., 9 Nov. 1719. When about seventeen years of age he was sent prospecting by his father to Beekman's Patent in Dutchess County, N. Y., where he appears on the tax list of Feb. 1736/7 and also on the February lists of 1737/8 and 1738/9. In the latter year he was joined by his father Samuel³ Shed who replaces him on the annual tax lists from 1739/ 40 through 1744/5. The father Samuel³ Shed dying in the military service at Louisburg in 1745, in Feb. 1745/6 Ephraim⁴ Shead reappears on the tax-list of Beekman's Patent and he continues on the annual tax lists of Dutchess County through Feb. 1760, after which date he disappears from the County. (Supervisors' Records, Dutchess County, Books C, E and F, Poughkeepsie, N. Y.) About 1761 he removed to Sheffield, Mass., and he probably died there during the Revolution.

40. OLIVER⁴ SHEAD (14. Samuel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born in what is now Brooklyn, Conn., and was baptized there 25 July 1736. When two years of age he was taken by his parents in their removal to Beekman's Patent, Dutchess County, N. Y., where he first appears on the tax list of Feb. 1756, and he continues annually on these tax lists through Feb. 1761. In this year he followed his elder brother Ephraim⁴ Shead to Sheffield, Mass., where he resided over a quarter of a century. About 1788 he removed to Cambridge, Washington County, N. Y., where he is enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of three males over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years and one female. His homestead was located in that part of Cambridge which in 1815 became the town of White Creek, N. Y. He died there about 1805, according to descendants.

He married first, about 1758; according to the Sheffield records his wife's name was BRIDGET, but some of his descendants call her BETSEY CHANDLER. 41. DANIEL⁴ SHED (15. Daniel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Groton, Mass., 13 June 1715, lived in his native town until about 1769 when he removed to Raby (since 1798 called Brookline), N. H., where in that year he was one of the petitioners for incorporation of a township. Daniel⁴ Shed and his sons Daniel⁵ and Jonas⁵ appear on the tax lists of Raby or Brookline from 1771 to 1786. In the latter year the family disappear from Raby and scatter to various places in New Hampshire, Vermont and Massachusetts where the sons appear as heads of families in the United States Census of 1790. Where Daniel⁴ Shed resided after 1786 and where and when he died have not been learned.

SHED (16. Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), 42. WILLIAM⁴ was born in that part of Groton now Pepperell, Mass., 15 Apr. 1735. He was a soldier in the French and Indian Wars, serving in 1755 in Capt. Ephraim Jones' company in Col. John Winslow's expedition against Nova Scotia, and later in Capt. Thomas Farrington's company from 10 Mar. to 1 Dec. 1760; ninety miles travel home also allowed. (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 98, p. 351.) He resided in Groton until after the Revolution and probably continued there until his death on 18 Mar. 1806, although he is not found in the United States Census of 1790. From 27 Sept. to 9 Nov. 1777 he served in Capt. Asa Lawrence's company, Col. Jonathan Reed's regiment, which joined Gen. Gates' army at Saratoga. 43. OLIVER⁴ SHED (16. Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Groton, Mass., 11 Feb. 1738/9, was a soldier in the French and Indian Wars and also in the Revolution. In the former he served from 10 Mar. to 1 Dec. 1760 as private in Capt. Thomas Farrington's company; ninety miles travel home allowed. (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 98, p. 351.) In the Revolution he marched on the Lexington alarm, 19 Apr. 1775, as private in Capt. John Sawtell's company, Col. James Prescott's regiment, serving twelve days; also served from 27 Sept to 9 Nov. 1777 as private in Capt. Asa Lawrence's company of volunteers, Col. Jonathan Reed's regiment, which assisted Gen. Gates' army in the capture of Gen. Burgoyne's forces at Saratoga, N. Y., 17 Oct. 1777. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 94.) In the civil disturbance of 1786 known as Shays' Rebellion, Oliver⁴ Shed and his son Oliver⁵ Shed joined the insurgents, and were among about fifty Groton men who surrendered their arms and took the oath of allegiance to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts on 21 Mar. 1787. ("Groton During the Revolution," p. 183.)

In his youth, Oliver⁴ Shed lived a while in Pepperell, but from the time of his marriage in 1763 until after 1787 he lived in Groton. In the United States Census of 1790 he appears in Ashby, Mass., as head of a family consisting of two males over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years and two females. He died about 1791 as his widow married the next year.

44. ABEL⁴ SHED (16. Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born in Groton, Mass., 9 Mar. 1742/3.

Soon after his marriage in 1768 he settled in Mason, N. H., remaining there quite a number of years, and his wife was admitted to the church there in 1773. He took an active part in the stirring events preceding and during the Revolution; was one of the town committee of inspection in 1776 to see that no Tories were harbored in town, and in many ways evinced his patriotism. He also served as one of the selectmen of Mason in 1776 and 1777.

Sometime before or in 1780 he removed to Rindge, N. H., and took up a farm upon which he passed the remainder of his life; like many others of that period he combined the trade of a shoemaker (or cordwainer) with his farming, and by diligence became well-to-do. He is listed at Rindge in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of four males over sixteen years, five males under sixteen years and two females. Of his eight children, all sons, seven grew up to manhood becoming active and respected citizens; they were noted for their large stature and athletic superiority, and it has been facetiously said of them "that there was forty-two feet of shed in the family." Many are the anecdotes related of their strength. This characteristic may in part have been inherited from their mother who is reported to have been large and somewhat masculine in appearance and late in life to have had a beard upon her face quite as heavy as some men. As he was blessed with no daughter by birth in his family, he adopted one,--a Miss Susanna White of Leominster; she later became the wife of his son John Haskell⁵ Shedd. Abel⁴ Shed died in Rindge, N. H., 21 Sept. 1819.

46. DAVID⁴ SHEDD (17. John³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born 1 Mar. 1742/3, in Pepperell, Mass., in the house built there about 1735 by his father and which is still (1920) standing. Although too old for the hardships of protracted field service in the Continental Army in the Revolution, nevertheless he was among the first patriots to take part in that conflict, marching on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775 in Capt. Josiah Sartell's (Sawtelle's] company which helped chase the British troops back to Boston, and serving at Cambridge for two weeks. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 79.) He always resided in Pepperell where he was listed in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of three males over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and one female; and he died there in 1814.

Abstract of the will of David Shed of Pepperell, yeoman, dated 4 May 1812. To my wife Lucy the use of half my real estate for life. To my son David Shed my pew in the Meeting House and the use of half my real estate until the death of my wife, and thereafter the use of the whole of it for the rest of his life. To my grandsons John and George Shed, sons of said David Shed, the reversion of all my real estate after the deaths of my wife, my said son and the wife of my said son. Proved in 1814. 49. DEA. JACOB⁴ SHED (18. Dea. Nathan³, Nathan², Daniel1), was born 2 Aug. 1726 in that part of Billerica which eight years later was set off as Tewksbury. On 29 Mar. 1752, about five months after his marriage, he joined the Tewksbury Church of which he later became a deacon, as his father had been before him. He was a thrifty and prosperous farmer, took an active part in town affairs and lived to a ripe old age, highly respected. When a young man he was enrolled as corporal in one of the town trainbands (or militia companies) commanded by Capt. Thomas Flint; and served in a detachment commanded by Ens. Abraham Stickney called out on 16 Aug. 1757 to join an army dispatched to the relief of Fort William Henry, N. Y., then besieged by a greatly superior force of French and Indians from Canada. The Tewksbury force marched as far as Worcester, Mass., and was then dismissed, as intelligence arrived that the fort had surrendered. Jacob Shed is credited with seven and a half days service in this French and Indian War expedition. (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 95, pp. 501 and 503.) In the United States Census of 1790, Jacob Shed appears as head of a family in Tewksbury, Mass., comprising one male over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years and three females.

Dea. Jacob Shed died in Tewksbury 28 Feb. 1810, in his eightyfourth year. In the oldest cemetery near Tewksbury village may still be seen the inscribed tombstones marking the last resting place of Dea. Shed and Rebecca his wife; these are the only stones there to the memory of any of the Shedds of his generation, but on either side are several mounds of graves of others of his kindred.

In the public affairs of the town he took an active part and also was prominent in the militia, being commissioned second-lieutenant of Capt. Joseph Kidder's company of Col. John Tyng's regiment on 10 Mar. 1762. (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 99, p. 36.) He retired from this office at the age of forty-five years, shortly before the Revolution; but his patriotic ardor led him to volunteer as a private in Capt. Jonathan Brown's Tewksbury company which marched on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775 and helped to pursue the British troops from Lexington back to Boston. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 80.) According to tradition Jonathan⁴ Shed was wounded during this running fight which lasted for several hours until the British found refuge in Charlestown under the protection of the

guns of their fleet in the Charles River. In the United States Census of 1790, Jonathan⁴ Shed is listed at Tewksbury, Mass., as head of a family of two males over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and two females. In 1786 he deeded part of his lands to his elder son Jonathan⁵ Shed, Jun., and later he settled his homestead on his younger son Josiah⁵ Shed, who unfortunately lacked his father's ability so in course of time lost the paternal estate. Lieut. Jonathan⁴ Shed died in Tewksbury 26 Mar. 1801.

He married at Tewksbury, 27 Mar. 1753, LYDIA KITTREDGE, born there 28 July 1734, daughter of Francis and Lydia (------) Kittredge; she died there 21 Mar. 1822, aged eighty-seven years according to the records.

51. LIEUT. JOHN⁴ SHED (19. Lieut. John³, Nathan², Daniel1), born in Billerica, Mass., 27 Jan. 1731/2, passed his life in his native town. In 1754 he is termed an inn-keeper in the will of his father, and by agreement in the family he received two-thirds of the paternal real estate conditional on his paying certain sums to his brothers and sisters. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20211.) In the tax list of 1776 he was assessed £3-15-11, and in the United States Census of 1790 he was enrolled at Billerica as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and two females. At the outbreak of the Revolution he was second-lieutenant of one of the Billerica companies of Minute Men, commanded by Capt. Solomon Pollard, which marched on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775 and took part in the pursuit of the British from Lexington back to Boston. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 91.) After his death his youngest child, Zaccheus⁵ Shed, secured the homestead by purchasing the interests of the other children. Lieut. John⁴ Shed died in Billerica 2 Dec. 1797 and was buried in the old cemetery where his gravestone still remains. A Revolutionary Soldier's marker also stands over his grave.

He married at Billerica, 22 Oct. 1755, MARTHA HOSLEY, born there 7 July 1733, daughter of Thomas and Martha (Richardson) Hosley; she died in Billerica, 28 Nov. 1797, four days prior to the death of her husband. Children born in Billerica, Mass.:

52. EBENEZER⁴ SHED (19. Lieut. John³, Nathan², Daniel¹), born in Billerica, Mass., 3 Jan. 1735/6, soon after his marriage in 1758 removed to Hollis, N. H., where he took as his share of the paternal estate a tract of 197 acres which his father Lieut. John³ Shed had bought of James Prescott on 25 Nov. 1748. (New Hampshire Deeds, vol. 53, p. 426.) He settled upon this tract, portions of which he sold to Amos Eastman on 30 Sept. 1761, Jonas Flagg on 3 Jan. 1761, William Brooks on 30 Oct. 1764, and Nathaniel Blood on 6 Mar. 1765. (*Ibid.*, vol. 81, p. 172 and vol. 84, pp. 34, 36 and 46.) He seems to have continued in Hollis until his death in 1788. His gravestone in the old cemetery behind the Hollis Church states he was born 13 Jan. 1736 and died [illegible] 1788, aged fifty-two years; the variation in the birth-date is due to the difference between the Old and New Style of dating.

He married at Chelmsford, Mass., 30 Mar. 1758, THANKFUL FLETCHER, born there 25 Sept. 1731, daughter of William and Tabitha (Pierce) Fletcher; she died 16 Oct. 1806, aged seventy-five years according to her gravestone beside her husband's in the old Hollis Cemetery. No evidence has been found to indicate that they had any children.

53. WILLIAM⁴ SHED (20. William³, Nathan², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 19 Sept. 1734, and resided there until after the death of his first wife in 1772. During the French and Indian Wars he took part in two campaigns, serving as sentinel in Capt. Eleazer Melvin's company, Col. John Winslow's regiment from 31 May to 13 Sept. 1754, and also in Col. Benjamin Goldthwaite's forces which marched to Albany in 1756 to reinforce the army at Lake George . (Massachusetts Archives, vol. 93, pp. 136 and 139a, and vol. 94, p. 125.) About 1773 he moved to Windham, N. H., locating near Butler's Mills in the western part of the town. In 1776 he was one of the Windham signers of the "Association Test," the subscribers thereof binding themselves to resist to the utmost, with their fortunes and their lives, against the aggressions of the British government. Although in middle life he also rendered service in the field to the patriot cause, enlisting on 3 Oct. 1781 in Lieut. Jonathan Adams' company, Col. John Bell's regiment, which joined the Continental Army for three months. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 3, pp. 263 and 890.) He continued in Windham, N. H., as late as 1790, appearing there in the United States Census of that year as head of a family of two males over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and two females. His later history has not been traced.

He married secondly, about 1775, ELIZABETH ———, by whom he had three children.

under Capt. Ebenezer Frye"; received no bounty for him, so he is allowed to stand as of Windham's quota. "Nathan Shedd" appears on a list of recruits raised in 1780. "Nathan Shade" was enrolled in the sixth company of Col. Joseph Cilley's regiment of the Continental Army in 1781. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 2, p. 631, vol. 3, pp. 890, 102 and 201.) The later history of Nathan⁵ Shed has not been traced.

In 1769 he went to Dunstable (now Nashua), N.H., from which town he and his wife Hannah and children Sarah and Hannah were warned out that year, and his daughter Prudence was born there; but the next year he returned to Billerica where he afterwards resided, probably succeeding in 1782 to some of his father's lands which were originally possessed by his great-grandfather Daniel¹ Shed. He was assessed $\pounds 2-3-8$ on the Billerica tax list of 1776, and was enrolled in that town in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and three females. According to tradition he took part in the battle of Bunker Hill, 17 June 1775, and in the siege of Boston; and the records show that he was a private in Capt. Solomon Pollard's (Billerica) company which marched on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775, and that he was also in this company in camp at Cambridge on 1 May 1775. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 94.)

He must have died during the summer of 1804, as his will dated 29 June 1804 was filed on 7 Aug. of that year. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File 20234.)

He married at Billerica, 13 Dec. 1764, HANNAH WILSON, born there 26 Dec. 1742, daughter of Jacob and Hannah (------) Wilson; she survived him. Children:

55. DANIEL⁴ SHED (21. Daniel³, Nathan², Daniel¹), was born in Tewksbury, Mass., 30 Mar. 1735/6. He was only seven years old when his father died, and five years later his mother married Abraham Varnum of Dracut by whom her Shed children were brought up. He learned the carpenter's trade and soon after he became of age in 1757 he married and settled in Pepperell, Mass., where he resided about half a century. Here he was enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of four males over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and five females. He was an ardent patriot in the Revolution and served in the field although a man then over forty years of age with a dependent family of seven children. The records show that he served a week in March 1776 as private in Capt. Job Shattuck's company, Col. John Robinson's regiment, in camp at Cambridge, at the time of the expulsion of the British forces from Boston. He also served from 1 Apr. to 3 July 1778 as private in Capt. Isaac Woods' company, Col. Jonathan Reed's regiment, on guard duty at Cambridge, Mass., and he was also in service there from 15 Aug. to 16 Dec. 1778 as private in Capt. Simon Hunt's company, Col. Jacob Gerrish's regiment of guards. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 90 and 79.) About a year later his eldest son Daniel⁵ Shed Jun. became old enough for military service and took his father's place in the army.

Daniel⁴ Shed was an industrious and thrifty mechanic and

farmer, was highly respected as a citizen, and reared a large family whose descendants have well maintained a good standing in the community. In his old age he and his wife went to reside with their eldest son in Brewer, Me., where they celebrated their golden wedding on 23 Nov. 1807; and he died there 30 Aug. 1810 and his wife survived him but a few months.

He married at Pepperell, 23 Nov. 1757, HANNAH LAKIN, born in Groton, Mass., about 1738, daughter of Simon Lakin; she died in Brewer, Me., 28 Jan. 1811.

56. REUBEN⁵ SHED (22. Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Daniel², Daniel1), was born in Billerica, Mass., 27 July 1748. He came into manhood at the time when the people of New England were chafing most under the continued taxation imposed by the British government and were preparing to free themselves from these burdens. During the Revolution he entered the Continental Army and served over three years as a private. He was in Capt. Solomon Kidder's company, Col. John Brooks' regiment, in the battle of White Plains on 28 Oct. 1776; also enlisted 10 Apr. 1777 in the Continental Army for three years and served until discharged on 9 Apr. 1780. At first he was in Capt. Elijah Danforth's company, Col. Thomas Nixon's regiment; but having suffered from small-pox he was transferred on 30 Apr. 1778 to Capt. Moses McFarland's company in Col. Nicholas' regiment of the Invalid Corps, and in this organization he performed guard duty in and around Boston in 1779. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 94.) Broken down by disease, exposure and hardships in the army, consumption caused his death a year after his discharge, on 30 Apr. 1781, at the early age of thirty-three years. For this service which cost him his life, the State granted three notes, dated 1 Jan. 1782, due in from two to four years, and valued at £30-8-0, which let us hope were of some aid to the struggling widow and her two surviving babes.

On 11 Sept. 1782, his widow Sybil was appointed administratrix of his estate. The inventory comprised chiefly wearing apparell and household goods of a total value of £14-14-8. The three State notes dated 1 Jan. 1782 were valued at £30-8-0. The indebtedness was £28-3-2, so only a small balance of £9-7-8 remained for final division on 13 Nov. 1783. (Middlesex County Probate Records, File No. 20225.)

Shortly before he became of age, Reuben⁵ Shed became involved with BETTY or ELIZABETH FROST, as a result of which a son was born in Billerica 24 Sept. 1769 who was later known as Reuben Shad. She was born in Tewksbury, Mass., 16 Aug. 1747, daughter of Joseph and Abigail (Kittredge) Frost, and died there 22 Nov. 1793.

Reuben⁵ Shed married at Weston, Mass., 12 Feb.1771, SYBIL BULLARD, born 2 Nov. 1750; she married secondly, as his second wife, at Billerica, 17 Oct. 1782, MOSES CARLETON, born in Bradford, Mass., 13 Sept. 1749, son of John and Hannah (Platts) Carleton. They soon moved to New Ipswich, N. H., and later to Sharon, N. H., where Moses Carleton died 17 July 1798. His widow remained upon the farm in Sharon, N. H., with her two youngest daughters, Ann and Hannah Carleton, and with her youngest son by her first marriage, Reuben⁶ Shed, Jun., who was then in his eighteenth year and with whom she made a contract for her future support in return for which he was to receive the farm they lived on. Her older son George and her four Carleton stepsons had gone forth to make their own way in life. This condition of affairs lasted a number of years, during all which time Reuben labored hard in clearing up and improving the farm; but difficulties arose between them so that the agreement was broken off, and the son left, losing all his hard work on the farm, and purchased another farm about a mile away and began again for himself; his mother then lived with her youngest daughter Hannah Carleton who had married David Wilson, and to their hands was given the farm for her future maintenance. She remained with them until her death in Sharon at the advanced age of eighty-eight years, 28 Dec. 1838, and she was buried in the old cemetery in Sharon as also was her second husband.

57. JOSEPH⁵ SHED (22. Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Daniel², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 13 Oct. 1751, and like his elder brother Reuben⁵ Shed was a soldier in the Revolution. As "Joseph Shead" he appears on a list of privates serving on picket guard under Maj. Loammi Baldwin, dated 11 May 1775; and as "Joseph Shed" he enlisted 30 Nov. 1775 as corporal in Capt. Daniel Whiting's company, Col. Asa Whitcomb's regiment; muster roll dated at Ticonderoga, N. Y., 27 Nov. 1776. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 80 and 93.) In 1787 he succeeded to his father's property in Billerica where he resided until after 1790 as he was enrolled there in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years, and six females. Possibly he may have later lived in Boston where two of his daughters were married; but the time and place of his decease have not been learned.

58. JOHN⁵ SHED (23. John⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), was born in Dunstable (now Nashua), N. H., 13 Aug. 1756 according to the town records, but 7 Aug. 1756 according to a family record held by descendants.^{*} He was an only son and a posthumous child, being born about ten weeks after the death of his father. When he was about nine years old his mother took a second husband in the person of Samuel Roby of Dunstable (now Nashua), N. H., by whom he was probably brought up for a while. It may be that he did not get along well with his step-father; at any rate before he was nineteen years old he was living among his mother's relatives in Billerica, Mass., when the War of the Revolution broke out. Soon after the battle of Bunker Hill (17 June 1775), he joined the American Continental Army, enlisting at Cambridge in Capt. Joseph Pettingill's company of Col. Loammi Baldwin's regiment, which took part in the siege of Boston until

*The parentage of this John⁵ Shed, progenitor of the Hillsboro, N. H. branch of the family, was one of the several problems that baffled Mr. Frank E. Shedd during his thirty years work on the family. (Note by Editor.)

the British were driven out on 17 Mar. 1776. On 29 Mar. 1776 the company was sent to New York, arriving there on 10 April; he was in the battle of White Plains on 28 Oct. 1776 and he continued in service about New York until June 1777. On 13 July 1819, John Shed of Hillsboro, N. H., applied for a pension for his services in Capt. Joseph Pettingill's company, Col. Loammi Baldwin's regiment; the regiment was discharged at Fishkill, N. Y., but he and others served as volunteers two months longer. Job Brocklebank of Rowley, Mass., and Abraham Foster of Amherst, N. H., deposed that they served with Shed at Cambridge and New York and vicinity. Calvin Stevens of Hillsboro deposed he had known Shed for forty years and that he was a very industrious, prudent and careful man, but now far advanced in life and out of health for the past ten years. A pension of \$96 per year was granted on 27 June 1820, at the age of sixty-three years, to date from 13 July 1819; but it was suspended under an act of Congress of 1 May following. John Shed died at Hillsboro, 8 Dec. 1830, and in 1838 his widow Sarah Shed applied for a pension for his services. On 28 Dec. 1838, Benjamin Sprague of Bedford, N. H., aged eightysix years, deposed that he and John Shed, a neighbor in Billerica, joined the army soon after the battle of Bunker Hill, enlisting in Capt. Pettingill's company, etc., and was in the battle of White Plains; Shed returned to Billerica in the autumn of 1777 and the next year married deponent's sister Sarah Sprague or Sprake. On 13 Nov. 1838, Levi Shed of Hillsboro, N. H., deposed he had in his possession a manuscript diary kept by his grandfather John Shed, during his military service, extending from 10 Oct. 1775 to 12 June 1777.

It states he left Cambridge for New York on 29 Mar. and arrived there 10 Apr. 1776, and that he was in the battle of White Plains. Deponent's grandfather John Shed died 8 Dec. 1830 and his widow Sarah Shed has since resided with deponent. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 95 and 91; also original documents in the Pension Bureau, Washington, D. C.)

In the spring of 1779, a few months after his marriage, John⁵ Shed removed from Billerica, Mass., to Hillsboro, N. H., where he resided the rest of his life. He was a genial, witty man, a thrifty, prosperous farmer, and lived to an advanced age, honored and respected. His death took place at his home in Hillsboro on 8 Dec. 1830.

59. DAVID⁵ SHEDD (24. Benjamin⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 19 Mar. 1759. His father died the next year and in 1765 his mother took as second husband David Stickney of Billerica who brought up her two young Shedd children. Although David⁵ Shedd was but a boy of sixteen years at the outbreak of the Revolution, according to tradition he took part in the battles of Lexington, Bunker Hill in 1775, Long Island and New York in 1776, the Saratoga operations ending in the capture of Gen. Burgoyne's army in 1777, and the Yorktown campaign closing with the surrender of Gen. Cornwallis' army in 1781. The military rolls show the following details of his service: David Shed of Billerica was private in Capt. Solomon Kidder's company, Col. Brooks' regiment, at White Plains, N. Y. in 1776; also enlisted as private for three years in the Continental Army 25 Apr. 1777; promoted to corporal 30 Apr. 1779; served as private in Capt. Elijah Danforth's company, and as corporal in Lieut.-Col. Calvin Smith's company, and Lieut.-Col. Daniel Whiting's company, all in Col. Thomas Nixon's regiment; mentioned in camp at Peekskill, N.Y., on 15 Aug. 1777, at Highlands, N.Y., in May 1779, and at Soldier's Fortune, N. Y., in Nov. 1779; also appears on various pay accounts from 25 Apr. 1777 until discharged at expiration of enlistment 25 Apr. 1780. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 90, 2, and 95.) The above records would cover the battles of Long Island and White Plains, the Saratoga campaign, and the subsequent guarding of the Hudson River.

After the close of the Revolution in 1781, David⁵ Shedd removed with his mother and step-father to Grafton, Vt., then a wild and sparsely settled region, where he married three years later. In 1790 he moved to Ballston, N. Y., and so failed to be included in the Census of 1790, and a little later took up a farm in Milton, N. Y. After a few years he returned in 1797 to Grafton, Vt., where he bought a small farm on which he reared a family of ten children, adding to his means of support by carrying on his trade of shoemaking. In Sept. 1833 he and his wife went to live with their children at Sardinia, N. Y., where he died 11 Apr. 1841, aged eightytwo years.

He married at Grafton, Vt., 11 July 1784, SARAH PUTNAM, born in Harvard, Mass., 20 Apr. 1765, daughter of Miles and Rachel (Wilkins) Putnam; she died at the home of her son Benjamin in

60. SAMUEL⁵ SHEDD (25. Samuel⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. $John^2$, $Daniel^1$), was born in Billerica, Mass., 1 Nov. 1768, about two months after the decease of his father. He was probably brought up in his native town, but in youth may have been apprenticed to some one in Reading, Mass., as he is called of Reading when he married and he is not included in his mother's family in Billerica in the Census of 1790. Upon his marriage in 1798 he settled in Burlington, Mass., where he passed the rest of his life, engaged in farming, and he died there 18 Feb. 1861, at the advanced age of ninety-two years.

62. DENNIS⁵ SHEDD (26. Joseph⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), was born in Billerica, Mass., 6 July 1783, and accompanied his parents in their successive removals to Tyngsboro, Mass., Merrimack, N. H., and Bethel, Vt., in which latter town he resided from about 1806 to about 1814. He then returned to Merrimack, N. H. and about three years later settled in the neighboring town of Bedford, N. H. He was a blacksmith by occupation and died in Bedford 10 Apr. 1821 from effects of a sun-stroke the previous summer. His widow and children returned to Merrimack, N. H., where she afterwards resided.

64. THOMAS⁵ SHED (29. James⁴, Jomes³, Zechariah², Daniel1), born in Roxbury, Mass., 6 Nov. 1745, learned the trade of tanner, was married first when only a youth, and was allowed by his father to improve and settle upon a part of the paternal homestead in Roxbury which was later willed to him. During the Revolution he served from 13 May to 12 Aug. 1779 as private in Capt. Lemuel Clap's company, Maj. Nathaniel Heath's detachment, on garrison duty in the fortifications at Dorchester Heights. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 95.) About 1783 he became hopelessly involved in debt, his property in Roxbury was attached, and as debtors could be kept indefinitely in jail under the laws at that period, he found it desirable to flee from the State. (Suffolk Co. Deeds, vol. 145, p. 71, and vol. 153, p. 148.) His residence for the next few years has not been learned; but about 1793 he rejoined his family and they settled in Portland, Me., where he died in Feb. 1806.

He married first, at Dorchester, Mass., 29 July 1765, ELEANOR SPURR, born in Stoughton, Mass., 18 July 1747, daughter of Michael and Jane (Shippey) Spurr; she died within a few years, apparently without issue.

66. SERGT. JAMES⁵ SHED (29. James⁴, James³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), born in Roxbury, Mass., 2 Jan. 1749, seems to have been regarded by his father as his most capable son as he was made executor of his father's will in 1767, to the exclusion of his two older brothers, and although he was then under age. As he had not learned any trade, his father gave him £133 (old tenor) and his

farm stock and implements in addition to an equal share with the other children in the residue of the estate. (Suffolk County Probate Records, File 14302). He lived as a yeoman upon the homestead in Roxbury, taking care of his mother and his sisters Mary and Elizabeth, and he is enrolled in Roxbury in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and three females. He was a soldier in the Revolution, serving from 3 Nov. 1777 to 3 Apr. 1778 as sergeant in Capt. Thomas Mayo's company, Col. Eleazer Brooks' regiment, on guard duty at Cambridge. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 91 and 79.) Between 1773 and 1790 he gradually sold off his interest in the homestead, and during the last year of his life he was broken in health and under medical care, so was insolvent at the time of his death, 7 Oct. 1796; in his forty-eighth year. His affairs were involved with his mother's dower interest in his father's estate, so administration on his estate was not taken out until 4 Nov. 1800, about a year after her decease. (Norfolk County Probate Records, File 16506.) He was never married.

67. OLIVER⁵ SHED (29. James⁴, James³, Zechariah², Dan*iel*¹), was born in Roxbury, Mass., and was baptized there 6 Jan. 1751. He learned the trade of blacksmith and carried on this occupation in his native town the rest of his life. During the Revolution he performed two short enlistments, the first as corporal in Capt. Lemuel May's company, Col. McIntosh's regiment, from 23 Mar. to 5 Apr. 1778 on service at the Roxbury Lines; and the second as private in Sergt. Joshua Gore's detachment from 6 Jan. to 16 Feb. 1779, on guard duty over Continental Army stores in Roxbury. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 94.) In the United States Census of 1790 he is listed as head of a family in Roxbury consisting of two males over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and three females; and in the United States Direct Tax of 1798 he was assessed for a house and forty acres of land valued at \$750 (probably equivalent to \$4,000 at the present time). He died in Roxbury 26 Jan. 1799, at the age of fortyeight years. On 4 Nov. 1800, administration on his estate was given to his widow Grace Shed. (Norfolk County Probate Records, File 16508.) At the same time the court appointed a guardian for his only children, sons Oliver⁶ and Henry⁶ Shed, in the person of their "uncle" [aunt's husband] John Ward. (Ibid., Files 16509 and 16504.)

About 1777 he became involved with CHLOE JONES, born in Stoughton, Mass., about 1757, daughter of Ephraim and Eleanor (Andrews) Jones, who had a son born 29 Oct. 1777 known as Oliver Shead. On 19 June 1784, Ephraim Jones of Stoughton, yeoman, bought of Stephen Hawes of same, thirteen acres there, which on 20 Jan. 1785 he conveyed to [his daughter] Chloe Jones; on 3 Dec. 1793 she sold it to Calvin Crane. (Suffolk County Deeds, vol. 147, pp. 7 and 8, and Norfolk County Deeds, vol. 35, p. 7.) Ebenezer⁴, Ebenezer³, Zechariah², Daniel1), born in Charlestown, Mass., 9 Dec. 1763, upon his marriage settled in Cambridge, Mass., where he had a very good farm, While not a drunkard, he used New England rum too freely, a habit which probably shortened his life and also very likely may have been a cause of the consumption which afflicted his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. In the United States Census of 1790 he was listed as head of a family in Cambridge, Mass., of one male over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years and two females. He died in Mar. 1815, and at the request of his widow and of his eldest son, Peter Tufts was appointed administrator of his estate. Of his six children five died of consumption when less than twenty-five years of age, unmarried; his three grandchildren died at the ages of only forty-six, twenty-one and probably thirty-six years; and of his eight great-grandchildren, six died under the age of six years and only two grew to maturity.

Nathaniel Heath's company of guards in and around Boston; and from 6 Oct. 1780 to 16 Mar. 1781 in Capt. Caleb Champney's company of guards in and around Boston, guarding Continental stores. Samuel⁵ Shedd was a painter by trade and lived in Charlestown (now Somerville) where he succeeded to his father's homestead. In the United States Census of 1790 he is listed in Charlestown as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and two females. He probably died in 1827, as administration on his estate was granted on 21 Aug. 1827 to J. K. Frothingham.

77. REV. MARSHALL SPRING⁵ SHEDD (33. Zechariah⁴, *Ebenezer*³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Cambridge, Mass., 9 Aug. 1786. Endowed naturally with talents as a scholar and an ambition for a higher course of study, he fitted himself in this direction and entered Dartmouth College at the age of twenty-seven; was a beneficiary of Kimball Union Academy while in college though never a student at the Academy. Completing the full course of study he graduated in 1817, and among his classmates were numbered Joshua Coffin, the eminent historian of Newbury, Rev. Dr. William Goodell, Prof. Nathan W. Fiske and Hon. Leonard Wilcox.

He studied theology with Rev. Dr. Jonathan Homer of Newton, Rev. Dr. Joshua Bates of Dedham and Rev. William Greenough of Newton and on 10 May 1820 he was ordained pastor of the First Congregational Church at Acton, Mass. His call to this field had been unanimous by both town and congregation, and for several years his ministry was very useful and acceptable. A contemporary writing of him just after his departure from this church states that Mr. Shedd was a pious, peaceable and exemplary minister, possessed of more than ordinary talents, and was always industrious in the discharge of his duty. The parochial difficulties, due to the controversy between Trinitarianism and Unitarianism, common in many towns at that period, found their way into this parish, and the man who so lately had preached to the acceptance of all became now too liberal for some and too rigid for others, so that in May 1831 they concurred in granting his request that his connection as a pastor be dissolved. There can be no doubt but that he was strictly Trinitarian in his views, and as one of the members of his church has in later years said, his teachings would be perfectly satisfactory in our Trinitarian pulpits now, if indeed they were not thought too rigid by the majority. It has been said that his father-in-law Mr. Thayer, who lived with him and was an extreme Trinitarian for even those days, opposed his ministry bitterly. The latter's influence can be seen in the strong views maintained by his grandson Rev. William G. T.6 Shedd, the noted

professor and divine. Rev. Marshall S.⁵ Shedd was the first to start a temperance movement in Acton into which he put good and valiant work, and it produced results remembered long after his eleven years of service there had ended.

Upon his dismissal in 1831 he removed to Willsboro, N. Y., where he preached for the Presbyterian Church and where, with the exception of preaching at Clintonville, N. Y., in 1837 and four years spent at Burlington, Vt., 1835-1839, he continued his residence until his decease, preaching almost continuously. During his forty years residence in northern New York his influence was effective in all good causes for improvement of society. He died at Willsboro, N. Y., 24 Mar. 1872, aged eighty-five years.

78. CAPT. JOSEPH⁵, SHED (34. Joseph⁴, Joseph³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Boston, Mass., and baptized at the New South Church on 21 Dec. 1755. His father was an ardent patriot of the Revolution and the son also quickly became one, and although but nineteen years old when the war broke out he soon entered the American army. The first service recorded of him was from 7 Oct. to 1 Dec. 1775 as drummer in Capt. Benjamin Smith's company stationed at Martha's Vineyard. From 24 Nov. 1778 to 20 Apr. 1779 he was sergeant of Marines and from 24 Apr. 1779 to 6 Sept. 1779 was lieutenant of Marines, serving on the brig "Hazard" commanded by Capt. John Foster Williams. On 20 Oct. 1779 he was commissioned captain in Col. Joseph Gerrish's regiment sent to reinforce the Continental Army near Claverack, N. Y.; discharged 2 Dec. 1779. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 93.) Later he seems to have joined the naval service again, as "Joseph Shed of Boston" appears on a list of prisoners on the American ship Lyon, taken captive 29 June 1781, and committed to the Old Mill Prison at Plymouth, England, 3 Aug. 1781. (New England Historical and Genealogical Register, vol. 19, p. 211.)

Joseph⁵ Shed, Jun., appears as a victualler on Theatre Alley (now Devonshire Street) near Milk Street in Boston Directories between 1789 and 1803. He occupied part of his father's real estate there, the site of which is now covered by the massive building of the Equitable Life Insurance Company. In the United States Census of 1790, Joseph Shed, Jun., is listed in Boston as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years and four females. He died in Boston 18 Feb. 1803, aged fortyseven years, according to a death notice in the Columbian Centinel.

Joseph⁴, Joseph³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), born in Boston, Mass., 28 June 1779, was brought up by his father in the grocery importing and West India trade, became a partner with his father in 1802, and continued in this firm of Joseph Shed and Son until his father's death in 1812. Thereafter he continued the business at the old location on Milk Street for many years on his own account and under his own name, and was very successful. During the War of 1812 he served on guard duty at Boston from 11 Sept. to 10 Oct. 1814 in Capt. Asa Richardson's company, Lieut.-Col. Peter Osgood's regiment. (Massachusetts Militia in War of 1812, p. 83.) About 1835 he removed to Roxbury, Mass., where he died 7 Apr. 1859, in his eightieth year. His first three wives died early in life of consumption; but his fourth wife became a nonagenarian.

He married first, in Boston, 13 May 1802, LUCRETIA WHEELER, born about 1783, daughter of Thomas and Susan (------) Wheeler; she had three children and died 2 Aug. 1808.

He was a handsome man of large frame and fine physique, but lacked the energetic character and business ability possessed by his brother Samuel Adams⁵ Shed and their father Joseph⁴ Shed. During most of his married life he lived on Newbury (now Washington) Street and on Carver Street. He died in Boston, 4 Nov. 1827, at the early age of forty-five years, and was buried in the Central Burial Ground on Boston Common where also others of his family were interred.

He married in Boston, 29 Nov. 1804, SUSAN WHEELER, born there 1 Mar. 1785, daughter of Thomas and Susan (------) Wheeler; she survived her husband nearly twenty years and died in Boston 7 Dec. 1846.

81. EBENEZER⁵ SHEDD (35. Capt. Ebenezer⁴, Zechariah³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), born in Chelmsford, Mass., 19 Feb. 1781, seems to have resided in his native town until his marriage and then to have settled in Carlisle, Mass. He evidently secured more of an education than that of the average yeoman of his times, as he taught school several terms in Chelmsford and was also much employed in surveying; a book on this subject published in London and owned by him descended to his granddaughter Mrs. Lathrop. He died in Carlisle 21 Feb. 1815, aged thirty-four years, according to his gravestone in Chelmsford still extant for over a century.

83. FRANKLIN⁵ SHEDD (35. Capt. Ebenezer⁴, Zechariah³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Chelmsford, Mass., 25 May 1800. When a young man he went to Nelson, N. H., to work out and there met and married his wife in 1830. Soon afterward they went to Plymouth, Vt., and engaged in farming; he also began making hay rakes by hand. About 1840 he removed to Mount Holly, Vt., and that has since been the home of the family; he was quite successful, and the manufacture of rakes, which he greatly increased and improved, is still continued by his son-in-law.

In his prime he was a very muscular man and sometimes exercised his strength in separating quarreling neighbors. His son Charles Wesley⁶ Shedd related that when quite advanced in years he was one day watching his sons who with others were testing each other's strength by lifting from the floor an anvil loaded with extra bars of iron; after so many pieces had been added that they all failed to lift it, he praised them for lifting as well as they did, then

as he started to leave them he picked up the anvil, load and all, by its horn, and placing it upon the bench, left them without a word.

He was a firm Christian, a zealous Methodist in belief, and in his life strove to practice his professions; he preferred to be a peacemaker rather than repeat slanders against his neighbors. He was always a temperate man, and even on his death bed when paralysis had sealed his lips, leaving only his hands and mind free, he refused a stimulant prescribed by his physicians, writing on a paper these words,— "For fifty-two years I have lived without liquor, and now would you have me die under its influence?" His death took place at Weston, Vt., 30 Mar. 1875, in his seventy-fifth year.

Lemuel⁴, Benjamin³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), born in Norway, Me., 11 Nov. 1798, was in his twentieth year when his father was accidently killed, and he continued on the farm taking care of his mother, and on her death in 1846 succeeded to this homestead taken up by his father nearly sixty years previously. Throughout his extended life he was known as a kind and hospitable neighbor and was always highly respected as a citizen; and for many years he was a prominent member of the Methodist Church in the northern part of Norway. In their old age he and his second wife were cared for at their old home by their daughter Mrs. Rolfe; for several years he was nearly blind although active in mind to the last, and his wife suffered from mental decay, so they required constant attention for many years. He died 30 Oct. 1885, aged nearly eighty-seven years.

During the Revolution he performed two short periods of service in the militia; first from 6 July to 27 July 1777 as private in Lieut. Jeremiah Hickok's company, Col. John Ashley's regiment, which marched from Sheffield to Kingsbury, N. Y., and secondly, four days service from 15 Oct. 1780 in Capt. Enoch Noble's company, Col. John Ashley's regiment, which marched from Sheffield to the north for the relief of Fort George and Fort Ann but failed in the object of the expedition.

(Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 80 and 81.) In 1785 he had a suit with Francis Hare about a note, in which [his uncle] Oliver Shead and [his brother] Daniel Shed were witnesses. In 1794 he had a fracas with his brother-in-law John Ryan in which the latter was severely mauled and as a result recovered £60 damages for assault. (Suffolk County Court Files, 160619 and 161091.) "Samuel Shead" appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Sheffield, Mass., consisting of one male over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years and two females. In 1795 he removed with his whole family to Vernon, Oneida County, N. Y., where he took up and developed a large farm in a then almost unbroken wilderness. Here he continued over thirty years until after the death of his wife and in his old age he went to live with his children in Camillus, Onandaga County, N. Y., where he died 20 Jan. 1830, aged eighty-one years.

95. SAMUEL⁵ SHEAD (40. Oliver⁴, Samuel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Sheffield, Mass., 26 Dec. 1764, was only ten years old when the Revolution broke out, but before he was sixteen years old he entered the service. On 18 July 1780 he enlisted in Capt. Samuel Warner's company, Col. John Brown's (Berkshire County) regiment and was discharged 23 Oct. 1780; service three months and thirteen days, including one hundred and thirty miles travel home. This regiment was raised for three months to reinforce the Continental Army. On 28 Aug. 1780 Samuel Shead signed a receipt for a bounty paid by Capt. Roswell Downing for his enlistment for the town of Sheffield. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 94 and 80.) His military equipment, including saddle, bridle, holsters, pistols, sword and musket with bayonet, descended to his son Orson⁶ Shead of Richville, N. Y., and was a source of wonder to the latter's children when they were young; but after the death of Orson⁶ Shead in 1839 and the sale of his shop, these heirlooms were lost to the family. The Gouveneur Morris Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, has placed a Revolutionary marker over the grave of Samuel⁵ Shead in Richville, N. Y.

About the time of his marriage (1788), Samuel⁵ Shead settled in New Marlborough, Mass., where he is listed in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years and two females. Here he had a farm, a wheelwright shop, a saw mill and a wool carding machine. In 1822 he and his wife and six of their children removed to Richville, St. Lawrence County, N. Y., where he died 12 Apr. 1829.

99. JARED⁵ SHEDD (40. Oliver⁴, Samuel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Sheffield, Mass., 6 Aug. 1777, went in 1788 with his parents to Cambridge (now White Creek), N. Y. He became a farmer in that part of Cambridge which in 1815 was set off as White Creek, and he died there 21 June 1843.

He married first, 29 May 1803, PHEBE CENTER born at White Creek, N. Y., 18 May 1779, daughter of John S. Center; she had eight children and died at White Creek 13 May 1821.

He married secondly, 28 Feb. 1822, MERCY FOWLER, born

100. ASA⁵ SHEDD (40. Oliver⁴, Samuel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Sheffield, Mass., 2 July 1779, when a boy accompanied his parents in their removal to Cambridge, N. Y., where he is included in the enumeration of his father's family in the United States Census of 1790. His father settled in that part of Cambridge which in 1815 became the town of White Creek, N. Y. He was the youngest son and child of the family, and on his father's death about 1805 succeeded to the latter's homestead in Cambridge (now White Creek). About 1808 he disposed of this place and removed to Hoosick, N. Y., and about ten years later he settled in Pittstown, Rensselaer County, N. Y.; here he purchased a farm of one hundred and eighty acres upon which he resided until his death 20 Apr. 1834.

He married about 1803, HANNAH JOSLIN, born in Cambridge, N. Y., 27 June 1783, daughter of Patten [Reuben?] and Ruth (Vaugh) Joslin; she died 30 May 1862. (Her father was born 3 Aug. 1753 and died 29 Jan. 1830; her mother was born 31 Jan. 1757 and died 14 Oct. 1786.)

101. DANIEL⁵ SHED (41. Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Groton, Mass., 15 Apr. 1746, removed with the rest of his father's family in 1769 to Raby (now Brookline), N. H. As Daniel Shed, Jun., he appears on the tax lists of Raby from 1771 to 1786.

During the Revolution Daniel⁵ Shed performed protracted service in the American army. As soon as news of the battle of Lexington reached Raby, he hastened to Cambridge, Mass., and on 25 Apr. 1775 enlisted [for eight months] in Capt. Asa Lawrence's company, Col. William Prescott's regiment, fought in the battle of Bunker Hill, 17 June 1775, and continued in service the rest of the year in the siege of Boston. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 90.) The remainder of his service was in the New Hampshire forces. On 9 July 1777 he was in a force of men who marched to join a company of militia, under Capt. Joseph Barrett, which had left Mason, N. H., to reinforce Gen. St. Clair's army at Ticonderoga; but the force was recalled four days later. From 20 July to 28 Sept. 1777 he served in Capt. John Goss' company, Col. Nichols' regiment, Gen. Stark's brigade, sent to reinforce the Northern Continental Army, and fought in the brilliant American victory at Bennington, Vt., 16 Aug. 1777. On 27 June 1779 he enlisted from Col. Moses Nichols' regiment of militia into the Continental Army for three years, and on 1 July 1779 joined Capt. Isaac Frye's company, Col. Alexander Scammell's Third New Hampshire Regiment. On 29 July 1779, he received £60 bounty for enlisting for the town of Raby. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 2, pp. 82, 211, 632 and 636; also vol. 3, pp. 18 and 584.)

About 1786 he removed from Raby and next appears in Shelburne, Vt., where he was enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of two males over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years and one female. We have found no further trace of his history for nearly thirty years until 2 Oct. 1819 when as a resident of Dearborn County, Ind., he applied for a pension, stating he was "aged 70 last April" [sic., should be 73]; he claimed to have been in the battles of Bunker Hill and Bennington and to have enlisted at Brookline, formerly Raby, N. H., in Capt. Fry's company, Col. Baldwin's later Col. Scammel's regiment. (United States Pension Records, Washington, D. C.)

Daniel⁵ Shed presumably married and had several children; but no records of his family have been found and no descendants have been located.

102. WILLIAM⁵ SHEDD (41. Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Groton, Mass., 16 June 1748, lived there until 1769 and then went to Raby, N. H., with his parents. About 1772 he returned to Groton, but in 1776 removed to Mason, N. H. He was a soldier in the Revolution, marching on the Lexington alarm 19 Apr. 1775, in the Groton company of Capt. Henry Farwell, Col. William Prescott's regiment; service, fourteen days. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 95.) He was a shoemaker by trade, but was engaged principally in farming during most of his life. His name appears in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family in Mason, N. H., of one male over sixteen years, four males under sixteen years and three females. About 1795 he removed from Mason to Alstead, N. H., where he died 18 July 1815.

He married first, at Groton, as "William Shed, Jr.,"* 7 Jan. 1773, ELIZABETH PARKER, born in Groton 9 Jan. 1745, daughter of Obadiah and Hannah (-----) Parker; she had eight children and died in Mason, N. H., 2 June 1791.

*He is termed "Junior" on the Groton records to distinguish him from his father's cousin, 42. William⁴ Shed, who was thirteen years his senior.

He married secondly, at Mason, 19 Dec. 1791, MARTHA (or PATTY) JEFTS, born in Groton 11 Oct. 1744, daughter of Ebenezer and Elizabeth (Farnsworth) Jefts; she had no children and died in Alstead 30 Mar. 1819.

H., where he appears on the tax lists from 1771 to 1786. He was a soldier in the Revolution, serving from 19 July to 28 Sept. 1777 in Capt. John Goss' company, Col. Nichols' regiment, Gen. Stark's brigade, sent to reinforce the Northern Continental Army, and fought in the American victory at Bennington, Vt., 16 Aug. 1777. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 2, p. 210.) In 1786 he left Raby and next appears in Hancock, Berkshire County, Mass., where he was enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of two males over sixteen years, five males under sixteen years, and one female. Later he went to Herkimer County, N. Y., and finally to Williamstown, Oswego County, N. Y., where he died. He married about 1770, HANNAH ------.

104. AMOS⁵ SHED (41. Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Groton, Mass., 29 June 1758, probably was taken by his parents in their removal in 1769 to Raby (now Brookline), N. H.; but if so he returned a few years afterwards to Groton and a little later went to Littleton, Mass., in which towns he resided during the Revolution. From 27 July to 29 Aug. 1777 he served in Capt. Aaron Jewett's company, Col. Job Cushing's regiment, and took part in the battle of Bennington; and he continued in Capt. Jewett's company, transferred to Col. Samuel Bullard's regiment until 29 Nov. 1777, participating in the Saratoga campaign ending in the capture of Gen. Burgovne's British army. From 27 Sept. to 31 Dec. 1778 he was private in Capt. Edmund Longley's company, Col. Cogswell's regiment, stationed on garrison duty about Boston; and from 25 July to 30 Oct. 1780 he served in Capt. John Porter's company, Col. Cyprian How's regiment, in the expedition to Rhode Island. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 89 and 79.) Soon after this service he married and apparently continued in Littleton, Mass., over ten years, as he must have been the Amos Shed of that town listed in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, although his wife, boy and two girls are not enumerated in the census as printed. About 1796 he removed to Vermont, finally settling in Mount Holly, Vt., where he died 17 Mar. 1822.

H.; but if so, he returned to Massachusetts after he had grown to manhood. After his marriage he lived about five years in Ashby, Mass., and then for another five years in New Ipswich, N. H., where as Samuel Shea [sic. in the printed list] he was enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, two males under sixteen years and two females. He died a few years later, being probably the Samuel Shed who died, at Westminster, Vt., 28 Apr. 1796.

106. AMOS⁵ SHEDD (42. William⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Groton, Mass., 17 Apr. 1766, was actually under

fifteen years of age when he enlisted in the Continental Army in the Revolution. According to the records he enlisted for three years on 21 Mar. 1781 in Capt. Luke Day's company, Lieut.-Col. John Brooks' regiment; described as born in Groton, engaged for that town, aged seventeen [sic.] years, stature five feet and six inches. complexion and hair dark, and eyes light; on various rolls in 1781 and 1782 reported on duty at West Point, Camp Continental Village and York Hutts; also he appears on a similar descriptive list on 20 Feb. 1782, still called seventeen years old but he had grown two inches, and on 21 Oct. 1783 he received an order for wages for May of that year, so evidently served until the end of the war. It also appears that on 31 Mar. 1782 he was tried and convicted at a regimental court martial of stealing a pig, received a sentence of a hundred lashes, but was pardoned. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 89, 4 and 78.) The severity of the sentence, the pardon, the youth (only fifteen years) of the culprit, and his continuance in service appear to indicate his poaching was regarded more as a joke than as a serious offence.

His mother died when he was eight years old and his uncle Amos Farnsworth Jr. was appointed his guardian for his share in the estate of his grandfather Amos Farnsworth Sr. After his discharge from the army he continued in Groton until 1789 and then settled in Norridgewock, Me., where he was listed as "Amos Shade" in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and two females. Here he died from sunstroke while working on a new clearing on his farm in the summer of 1799.

He married at Groton 11 Apr. 1789, LUCY TARBELL, born there 2 June 1771, daughter of Oliver and Lucy (———) Tarbell; she married secondly, as his second wife, about 1800, JONAH CROSBY Esq., of Albion, Me., who died about 1810; she died in Norridge-wock 9 Apr. 1839.

Apparently he did not find Norridgewock to his liking, as he soon removed to Rutland, Vt., where he engaged in farming for a period of several years. Later he lived in Mendon, Vt., and finally in Sherburne, Vt., where he died about 1841.

Oliver⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Groton, Mass., 10 Mar. 1766, in the spring of 1790 went to Reading, Vt., where he secured a hundred acre farm and spent the summer in clearing part of it and building a log house. In the United States Census of 1790 he was listed at Reading as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and one female.^{*} Late in the autumn of 1790 he

went back to Groton for the winter, was married the next February, and at once started for Reading, taking his wife and all their goods on an ox-sled, and on arrival establishing their abode in the log cabin. Here their children were born, and having attained prosperity, in 1815 he built a commodious frame house in which he afterwards resided and to which his youngest son Joseph⁶ Shedd succeeded.

Jonathan⁵ Shedd was a man of powerful and large physique, having a stature of six feet and six inches, as a citizen enjoyed the confidence of his fellow townsmen, and during a quarter of a century was elected to numerous offices. Between 1799 and 1821 he was chosen selectman thirteen years, in 1801 was constable, in 1812 and 1816 was elected town clerk, and in 1811, 1812, 1815, 1821, 1822 and 1823 he served as representative to the Vermont Legislature. He died in Reading 10 Jan. 1831, in his sixty-fifth year.

113. JOHN HASKELL⁵ SHED (44. Abel⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born in Mason, N. H., 1 Mar. 1771, but went to

Rindge when 9 years old. He learned the trade of a blacksmith and in after years carried on this business together with farming. When a young man he went to Vermont in company with his brothers Samuel C.⁵ and Ebenezer⁵ (we cannot say they went there together, but they were there about the same time) and took up some land in 1794 near Windsor; his two brothers permanently settled in the vicinity, but John H.⁵ being unmarried, soon gave it up, returned to his former home in Rindge and married his father's adopted daughter. His brothers used to hector him by relating the great joke he had played on them in getting them away up in Vermont and then marrying their adopted sister.

He exchanged his farm in Rindge (probably his father's homestead which he had or was to receive) for his brother Abel's farm in Jaffrey, and he settled there in December 1800; this farm has since been known as the "Witt" place and in recent times was owned by Benj. Pierce, Esq. He was a thrifty and successful farmer; it is said that when clearing his land he could chop and log, ready for burning, an acre in four days, or twice as much as was ordinarily done. His neighbors used to relate as other evidence of his great strength that he could alone lift a barrel of cider by the ends of the cask staves. Having in his boyhood received but a limited education, he improved it in later years by attending the short winter terms of the district school. After an industrious life he was cut off by death 17 July 1819, at the early age of forty-eight years.

father's farm until he became of age. In 1794 he went with his brothers John H.⁵ and Ebenezer⁵ to Windsor, Vt., where he bought land of Jacob Staples. Here he built a frame house, cleared and improved his land to which he added by later purchases, and he also conducted a tannery and kept a general store. 115. DEA. EBENEZER⁵ SHEDD (44. Abel⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born in Mason, N. H., 6 Nov. 1776, but was soon taken by his parents to Rindge, N. H., where all his youth was spent. About 1797 he went to West Windsor, Vt., in company with his brother, and taking up some land made ready for a home in a new country where he became a successful farmer and a much respected townsman. In 1828 he removed from West Windsor to Weathersfield, Vt., and there made his home for the remainder of his life. He held many public offices including selectman and town clerk, and was also a Free Mason. In 1810 he and his wife made a public profession of religion and ever afterward they were foremost in every Christian work. For many years he was a deacon of the Congregational Church.

For nearly forty years he held the office of justice of the peace and enjoyed the confidence and respect of his fellow-citizens in a rare degree. He was almost always the chosen arbiter in all the petty difficulties that arose in the community and this was because of his great and consistent piety as well as his sound judgment. One of his townsmen has said that "he was the most perfect specimen of God's handiwork in the human form" he had ever known. His religion was a vital principle which he constantly displayed in private and in public, and expounding it with precept upon precept quietly to all with whom he came in contact, and, what was far better, alluring them to accept his teachings by his own shining example. Thus was his long life a blessing upon the community and the memory of it a pleasure to all who knew him. He died in Weathersfield 11 Mar. 1866 in his ninetieth year.

He married 12 Nov. 1801, FANNY BANNISTER, born in Windsor 25 Jan. 1780, daughter of Silas and Thankful (Ely) Bannister. She was in all respects a fitting helpmeet to her worthy husband and survived him over ten years, dying 17 Aug. 1876 at the advanced age of ninety-six years.

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117. JOSIAH⁵ SHEDD, M. D. (44. Abel⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Rindge, N. H., 1 Nov. 1781, on becoming of age settled in Peacham, Vt. Several years later he took up the study of medicine with Dr. Luther Jewett of St. Johnsbury, Vt., and later at Dartmouth College where he received his medical degree in 1823. He practiced his profession for many years in Peacham and the surrounding towns, was regarded as a skilful physician, took a prominent part in local public affairs and by his energy and good judgment in investments accumulated a fortune of nearly \$75,000, of which he gave \$20,000 to various benevolent societies. A stroke of apoplexy suddenly ended his life on 4 Sept. 1851.

He married in Peacham, 1 Mar. 1812, LYDIA CHAMBERLAIN, born there 18 Apr. 1790, daughter of Gen. William and Jane (Eastman) Chamberlain; she died in Peacham 15 Dec. 1862. Her father was the most prominent man of his generation in Caledonia County, serving twelve years in the Vermont Legislature, seventeen years as chief-justice of Caledonia County, seven years as a councillor, two terms as a member of Congress, and lieutenantgovernor of Vermont 1813 to 1815.

118. TIMOTHY⁵ SHEDD (44. Abel⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born in Rindge, N. H., 9 Apr. 1784. He was a youth when his father died, and during the rest of his minority he worked for his eldest brother Abel⁵ Shedd. On becoming of age he indentured himself for three years to Capt. Cutter of Jaffrey to learn the tanner's trade, and at the expiration of his apprenticeship in 1808 he located at Wells River Village in Newbury, Vt., where he bought a tract of land and established a tannery. By strict attention to his affairs and energetic work he rapidly developed a successful business and during the War of 1812 made a large amount of money for those times with which he embarked on other enterprises, buying and conducting several farms, engaging in the lumber business and also establishing a general store. Although endowed with a robust

physique, by excessive overwork and neglect of his health he broke down when about fifty years of age and for the remaining twenty years of his life he was a great sufferer, especially from tic-douloureux, which seriously affected him both in body and mind during his closing years.

Mr. Shedd was a moving spirit in establishing a bank at Wells River Village of which he was a director for nearly twenty years; was public spirited and liberal in promoting the civil and religious affairs of Newbury; and although disinclined to hold public office he served two years as a selectman and in 1827 and 1828 as representative to the Vermont Legislature. He died in Newbury 7 Dec. 1855, in his seventy-second year.

He married first at Newbury, Vt., 6 Dec. 1809, SUSAN REED, born at St. Andrews, New Brunswick, 14 Apr. 1784, daughter of Stephen and Jane (Cochrane) Reed; she was a valuable helpmeet to her husband, active in religious work in the community, and died in Newbury 19 Mar. 1833, having had seven children.

119. CAPT. JOSHUA⁵ SHEDD (45. John⁴, John³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born in Pepperell, Mass., 13 Jan. 1778 in the house built there by his grandfather over forty years previously, and still (1920) extant. On the death of his father in 1798 he succeeded to this old homestead where he resided all his life. This old house is located on high ground about half a mile south of the New Hampshire line and in 1915 was owned by Luke B. Nickerson of Watertown, Mass.

Mr. Shedd was a prosperous farmer and prominent in town affairs. On 17 Jan. 1818 he joined the St. Paul's Lodge of Masons in Groton, Mass., and at about that period of his life was commissioned a captain in the Second Regiment of the Second Brigade of the Massachusetts Militia, which office he resigned on 26 Dec. 1820. In 1823 he became one of the early members of the Bunker Hill Monument Association. About 1820 he set out over a hundred maple trees along the roads by his farm; the shade trees directly about the house had been set out at an earlier period. In March 1854 he deeded the ancestral homestead to his elder son, John Dickson⁶ Shedd, on condition of maintenance for himself for life. He died in Pepperell 21 Nov. 1863, at the advanced age of eightyfive years.

120. CAPT. ABIJAH⁵ SHEDD (45. John⁴, John³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Pepperell, Mass., 22 Nov. 1779, in 1806 went to Barre, Vt., and the next year settled permanently in Hardwick, Vt. For a few years he lived in a log house, but prospering in farming and coopering he was later enabled to build a substantial frame dwelling in which he afterwards resided. He held no offices of note except that of captain in the militia, by which title he was afterwards known. Both he and his wife were highly esteemed as exemplary members of the community. It is remembered of him that in a year of great scarcity of wheat when speculators travelled through the country offering high prices for the small crops, Capt. Shedd refused tempting offers for his three hundred bushels which he kept and sold only in small amounts at usual low prices to those of his townsmen who were poor and needy of it. He died in Hardwick 4 Oct. 1864 in his eighty-fifth year.

121. CAPT. DAVID⁵ SHEDD (46. David⁴, John³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Pepperell, Mass., 5 Jan. 1774, passed his life in his native town where he had a life interest in the homestead of his father created by an entail in the will of the latter. He was a tall and erect man, even in his old age, preserving the military bearing of his earlier years when he was a captain in the old Massachusetts Militia. He probably died in 1847. Nathan³, Nathan², Daniel¹), born in Tewksbury, Mass., 10 Aug. 1762, was but twelve years old when the battle of Lexington opened the Revolution, but before its six weary years were finished he had become old enough to serve in the army. On 28 July 1780 he enlisted as private in Capt. Amos Foster's company, Col. Cyprian How's regiment and served until 30 Oct. 1780; company marched to Rhode Island to reinforce the Continental Army there for three months. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 79.) On 24 July 1833, aged seventy-one years and residing in Kennebec Courty, Me., he was granted a pension for his services in the Massachusetts Continental Line, at the rate of \$40 per year dating from 6 May 1818. (United States Pension Rolls.)

About 1787 he removed from Tewksbury, Mass., to Readfield, Me., settling in that part of the town which in 1854 became part of the town of Manchester, Me. In this wilderness he cleared and developed a large farm and built a house near a pond known as Shedd's Pond. He secured a good education for his times and environment and taught school and practiced surveying in addition to his farming pursuits. A Bible presented to him by his wife during their engagement was treasured by one of their grandchildren Mrs. Mary Cole of Belpre, Ohio. He and his wife joined the Tewksbury Church together on 29 Mar. 1778. He was a patriot of the Revolution, serving as corporal in Lieut. Thomas Clark's company, Col. Green's regiment, which marched on the Lexington alarm of 19 Apr. 1775; service five days. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 91.) In the United States Census of 1790, taken just about the time of his death, he is named as head of a family of no [sic] male over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years and three females. He died in Tewksbury in the prime of life, 29 June 1790, his untimely end being caused by measles.

His first recorded service was from 29 Sept. to 21 Oct. 1777 in Capt. Edward Farmer's company, Col. Jonathan Reed's regiment which

marched to Saratoga to assist the Continental Army under Gen. Gates in capturing Gen. Burgoyne's army. He also enlisted 24 June 1778 in Capt. Joseph Boynton's company, Col. Nathaniel Wade's regiment, and served until 1 Jan. 1779 at East Greenwich, R. I., as appears by various rolls during that period, in one of which dated 17 Sept. 1778 he was reported sick in hospital. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 91.) 127. BENJAMIN⁵ SHEDD (49. Dea. Jacob⁴, Dea. Nathan³, Nathan², Daniel¹), born in Tewksbury, Mass., 7 Jan. 1767, upon his marriage settled in Milford, N. H., where he engaged in farming the rest of his life. He was an active man of large and robust physique and acquired a comfortable estate. His homestead was about three miles from the village, on the road to Mason, and the place in recent times was owned by John T. Parker. Mr. Shedd died in Milford 6 Nov. 1843.

He married in Andover, Mass., 23 Feb. 1796, LYDIA BLANCHARD, born there 3 Aug. 1766, daughter of Josiah and Lydia (Jenkins) Blanchard; she died in Milford 28 Sept. 1843.

128. ENS. JONATHAN⁵ SHED (50. Lieut. Jonathan⁴, Dea. Nathan³, Nathan², Daniel¹), born in Tewksbury, Mass. 10 Aug. 1759, performed considerable military service in the Revolution. From 7 May to 9 July 1777 he was in Capt. John Minott's company, Col. Josiah Whitney's regiment, on duty in Rhode Island. Next he is found from 20 Feb. to 20 May 1778 in Capt. Edward Farmer's company, Col. Jacob Gerrish's reigment, on guard duty in Charlestown, Mass. From 23 Oct. to 4 Dec. 1779 he was in Capt. Solomon Pollard's company, Col. Samuel Denny's regiment, which marched from Billerica to reinforce the Continental Army at Claverack, N. Y. He also served from 28 July to 30 Oct. 1780 as corporal in Capt. Amos Foster's company, Col. Cyprian How's regiment, stationed in Rhode Island. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 29.) The United States Pension Rolls show that on 23 July 1833, Jonathan Shed of Oxford County, Me., aged seventy-five years, was granted a pension of \$78.32 per year, retroactive from 4 Mar. 1818, for service in the Massachusetts Militia. After the Revolution he was commissioned an ensign in the militia of Tewksbury.

His father was a man of substantial estate and deeded some property to him a few years after his marriage. In the United States Census of 1790 he appears as head of a family in Tewksbury of one male over sixteen years, three males under sixteen years and three females. He continued in Tewksbury until the spring of 1806 and then removed with his whole family to Norway, Me., where he took up land in a then wild country and developed a new home. In his old age he lived with his sons in Albany, Me., where he died 3 Oct. 1837.

He married in Tewksbury 18 Mar. 1778, ABIGAIL FISKE, born there 23 June 1758, daughter of Ebenezer and Abigail (Frost) Fiske; she died in Norway, Me., 11 Mar. 1824.

129. JOSIAH⁵ SHED (50. Lieut. Jonathan⁴, Dea. Nathan³, Nathan², Daniel¹), was born in Tewksbury, Mass., 28 Sept. 1769, and succeeded to the homestead there of his father who was a man of large means for his time and environment. But Josiah lacked the energy, industry and good judgment of his father, so about 1810 he was obliged to sell his paternal estate and to buy a smaller and less desirable place to which he removed and which was continued among his descendants for over a century. He died in Tewksbury 13 Feb. 1835.

He married in Tewksbury, 1 Mar. 1796, LUCY FRENCH, born there 15 Nov. 1775, daughter of John and Beulah (------) French; she died in Tewksbury 17 Sept. 1861, in her eighty-sixth year.

130. JOHN⁵ SHED (51. Lieut. John⁴, Lieut. John³, Nathan², $Daniel^1$), born in Billerica, Mass., 7 Mar. 1760, served about three years in the American Army in the Revolution before he became of

age. From Apr. to Oct. 1776 he served in Capt. Joshua Parker's company; from 1 May to 7 July 1777 he was in Capt. John Minott's company, Col. Josiah Whitney's regiment, and from 7 July 1777 to 4 Jan. 1778 in Capt. Abishai Brown's company, Col. John Robinson's regiment on service in Rhode Island. On 1 Apr. 1778 he enlisted in Capt. John Moore's company, Col. Jonathan Reed's regiment, and served to 3 July 1778 guarding at Cambridge the prisoners captured in Gen. Burgoyne's army at Saratoga; from 29 July to 11 Sept. 1778 he served in Capt. Joseph B. Varnum's company, Col. McIntosh's regiment, on an expedition to Rhode Island; and from 6 July to 22 Dec. 1779 he served in Capt. Thomas Hovey's company, Col. Nathan Tyler's regiment on another expedition to Rhode Island. In Jan. 1780 he enlisted as private for six months in Capt. James Osgood's company, Col. Cyprian Howe's regiment and on 28 July 1780 was promoted to corporal and enlisted for three months in Capt. Amos Foster's company of the same regiment, marched to Rhode Island, and served until discharged 30 Oct. 1780. During his service under Capt. Varnum he fought in the battle of Rhode Island 29 Aug. 1778. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 91 and 79; also statement of his service in his application for a pension.) On 27 Aug. 1832, residing in Hollis, N. H., and stating he was born in Billerica, Mass., 7 Mar. 1759 [sic], he applied for a pension for his services, and on 10 Oct. 1833 he was granted \$81.00 per year, retroactive from 4 Mar. 1831. (United States Pension Records.)

He resided in Billerica until the spring of 1790 and then settled in Hollis, N. H., probably succeeding to part of the landed estate there of his childless uncle, 52. Ebenezer⁴ Shed, who had died there late in 1788 and had secured this property as his share in the estate of his father Lieut. John³ Shed who had purchased it of James Prescott in 1748. John Shed was quite successful as a farmer in Hollis and reared a large family of children. He appears there in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years and one female. In his old age he was partially disabled by a stroke of paralysis and was cared for in the home of his son Luther⁶ Shed in Alexandria, N. H., where he died 18 Nov. 1838, aged seventy-eight years.

John⁵ Shed was probably the builder about 1790 of the "old Shed house" still standing on his farm. It is two stories in height, with an ell, and the front door in the center faces the east. It is located on the side of a hill, about two and a half miles from Hollis Village, on the road to Amherst. Across the road the land is open and slopes down to a marsh and brook, and behind the house the land rises and is dotted with many shade trees. In recent years a piazza has been built across the front and the house is painted white. From John⁵ Shed the house passed to his son John⁶ and grandson Ezra⁷ Shedd. Nearly opposite the house there are traces of an old road leading off to the east a short distance to the cellar hole of a house supposed to have been built and occupied by Ebenezer⁴ Shed, uncle of John⁵ Shed.

He married first, at Billerica, Mass., 24 Nov. 1784, RACHEL DANFORTH, born there 15 Dec. 1761, daughter of David and Joanna^{*} (Shed) Danforth; she had six children and died in Hollis, N. H., 24 July 1797.

131. ZACCHEUS⁵ SHED (51. Lieut. John⁴, Lieut. John³, Nathan², Daniel¹), born in Billerica, Mass., 4 Feb. 1766, was named for his bachelor uncle, Zaccheus⁴ Shed, who died in 1758 during the French and Indian War. He inherited his father's homestead in Billerica where he was enrolled in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, one male under sixteen years and three females. He was active in the movement for building a new and commodious church, which is still in use, and an ardent supporter of the noted minister, Rev. Henry Cummings.

For many years he held the office of deputy-sheriff of Middlesex County and was noted for his boldness in dealing with trouble. In his day several minor offences were punishable with the lash which punishment it was one of the duties of his office to perform. He inclined to be much on horse-back and would even ride into a tap-room and up to the bar to get his drink, without dismounting. He died in Billerica 27 Sept. 1822.

He married about 1785, MIRIAM WRIGHT of Bucksport, Me., born about 1768, died in Billerica 21 Apr. 1843, aged seventy-four years.

133. NATHANIEL HILL⁵ SHED (53. William⁴, William³, Nathan², Daniel¹), born in Billerica, Mass., 6 July 1764, when about ten years of age was taken by his parents in their removal to Windham, N. H., where he grew to manhood. He was a soldier for Windham in the Revolution, enlisting for three months 9 July 1780 in Capt. James Aikin's company, Col. Thomas Bartlett's regiment and serving at West Point, N. Y., until discharged on 24 Oct. 1780. He also enlisted 19 Sept. 1781 in Capt. William Boyer's company, Col. Reynolds' regiment, but the length of this service is not stated. (New Hampshire Revolutionary War Rolls, vol. 3, p. 113, and vol. 4, p. 427.) Soon after his marriage in 1794 he located in that part of Amherst, N. H., which about 1800 was set off as the town of Mount Vernon, N. H. About 1802 he removed from Mount Vernon to Salem, Mass., where he lived a few years, and his four children were baptized 31 Aug. 1806. During the War of 1812 he was a private in Capt. Fuller's company of the Fourth Regiment of Infantry, in the United States Regular Army; while in service at Burlington, Vt., he was injured by a bale of hay falling on him and on 24 Nov. 1814 was granted a pension. He died 17 Oct. 1830. (United States Pension Rolls.)

He married first, in New Boston, N. H., 24 June 1794, EUNICE FAIRFIELD; apparently they were divorced, since she is mentioned as "Mrs. Eunice Fairfield" in Boston directories from 1816 to 1829 as keeping a boarding house at various places in the West End of the city.

He married secondly (intention recorded at Chelmsford, Mass., 5 Aug. 1821), NAOMI MILLER; she was born about 1775 and died in Charlestown, Mass., 10 June 1842, aged sixty-seven years.

136. LIEUT. DANIEL⁵ SHED (55. Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Nathan², Daniel¹), was born in Pepperell, Mass., 8 Feb. 1763. Although a lad of only twelve years when the Revolution broke out, he saw considerable service before the war was over. In 1889 his youngest son, William M.6 Shed, stated that when Daniel⁵ Shed was seventeen years old he volunteered to take the place of his father who had been drafted, and served a term of six months; that later he shipped as a cooper on the frigate *Haque*, commanded by Capt. John Manley of Marblehead; the vessel carried sixteen guns and engaged successfully in privateering. Capt. Manley was a stern old sea dog and freely used his heavy fist on any delinquent member of his crew. On one occasion the Haque was chased for three days and nights by two British war-ships of seventy-four guns each; in order to escape Capt. Manley lightened his vessel by throwing overboard much of his cargo, including thirty barrels of pork which Daniel⁵ Shed rolled out, and even all his guns except two small masked ones in the stern. They finally escaped into a harbor on the island of Guadaloupe, their light vessel crossing in shallow water over a bar which the large and heavy British vessels could not pass. After bombarding the *Haque* from a distance, the British commander dispatched several boat-loads of armed men to take possession of the vessel, but when they came within close range Capt. Manley opened fire with his two masked cannon with such terrible effect that nearly all of the attacking crew were destroyed: seventy-two of them were killed by the gun fire or by drowning, and only a few managed to return to their frigates. The British did not venture another attack and soon sailed away, and after Capt. Manley had plugged the holes in his vessel made by the British cannon balls, he continued his cruise. The Massachusetts Archives confirm the above service as follows: Daniel Shed of Pepperell, aged seventeen years, stature five feet and eight inches, with light complexion, appears in a list of men raised to reinforce the Continenta Army for six months; marched to camp 4 July 1780; at Camp Totoway 25 Oct. 1780; discharged 8 Dec. 1780; service five months and fifteen days, including time for two hundred and twenty miles

travel home. Also Daniel Shed appears on a receipt dated 4 June 1783 for wages for service to 10 May 1783 on board the frigate *Hague*, commanded by Capt. John Manley. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, p. 90.) On 7 Apr. 1818, Daniel Shed of Brewer, Me., applied for a pension for service in the Revolution, stating that in July 1780 he enlisted for six months in Capt. Fernald's company, Col. Jackson's Massachusetts regiment. In August 1782 he shipped on board the frigate *Dane*, commanded by Capt. Nickerson, which was soon renamed the *Hague* and put in command of Capt. Manley; served until 11 May 1783. He was granted a pension of \$8.00 per month. (United States Pension Records.) Some time between 1800 and 1807 he was commissioned by Gov. Caleb Strong a lieutenant in the Second Brigade of the Massachusetts Militia.

After the close of the Revolution, Daniel⁵ Shed returned to Pepperell, Mass., where he worked at his trade of coopering and engaged in farming until 1798 when he moved to Solon, Me. In this then wilderness he built a log house and barn and cleared up a forty acre farm, but after ten years of hard work found out that his title to the land was worthless and his labor was lost. Thereupon he sought a new location, settling in 1808 in Brewer, Me., where he continued as a farmer and cooper until about 1840. He then removed to Cambridge, Mass., and died there 16 Feb. 1847, aged eighty-four years.

137. SIMON⁵ SHEDD (55. Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Nathan², Daniel⁴), was born in Pepperell, Mass., 14 Apr. 1765, and at the age of fourteen years and one month became a soldier in the Revolution. He first enlisted 17 May 1779 as private in Capt. Moses Barnes' company, Lieut.-Col. Samuel Pierce's regiment, and served in Rhode Island until 1 July 1779. The boy's appetite for war whetted by this six weeks service, he next appears on a list of men raised to reinforce the Continental Army for six months, dated 18 Aug. 1779, describing him as Simon Shed (or Shade) of Pepperell, aged sixteen [sic] years, five feet in stature and of light complexion; assigned to Capt. Nathaniel Lakin's company of Col. Jonathan Reed's regiment. [His age was overstated by two years.] Apparently the company was sent to Rhode Island. (Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution, vol. 14, pp. 81, 4 and 94.)

About the time of his marriage (1786) he settled in what is now Milford, N. H., appearing there in the so-called "Duxbury Mill Slip" in the United States Census of 1790 as head of a family of one male over sixteen years, no male under sixteen years and four females. 141. REUBEN⁶ SHEDD (56. Keuben⁵, Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Daniel², Daniel¹) born in Billerica, Mass., 24 Nov. 1780, was taken in early childhood by his mother and step-father to Sharon, N. H., where he spent his life. His step-father died in 1798 and shortly after, although the voungest son in the family, Reuben agreed with his mother for her maintenance until her decease, in consideration for which he was then to receive "a good warrantee deed" of all her lands and buildings. He toiled on under this agreement until about thirty years old, when by reason of some differences with his half-sisters he was dispossessed of his rights and compelled to start anew in life. With a determined purpose to bring good out of bad but with nothing except the strength of his own muscles to bring it about, ill supplied with many of the necessaries of life, little by little he acquired some property and in the spring of 1818 he purchased a farm of about one hundred acres, the homestead of one of the first settlers in Sharon, running in debt for nearly the whole of it. Both he and his wife had been long trained to toil and adversity and were lacking in all but the commonest forms of education, such alone as their times and surroundings permitted, but together they applied themselves to secure a home by honest living.

With years of industry and hard labor he greatly improved his farm, securing it free of all claims and adding greatly to its extent by other purchases until he possessed over 250 acres. He and his wife passed the whole of their married life upon this same farm and under the same roof, contented and happy; blessed with good health and strong constitutions they lived to very advanced age, their last years being spent with their youngset son who received part of their farm for caring for them in the infirmities of age. He died in Sharon 12 Jan. 1868 aged over eighty-seven years.

143. ANDREW WILKINS⁶ SHEDD (59. David⁵, Benjamin⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), was born in Ballston, N. Y., 23 Dec. 1791, but his father soon returning to Grafton, Vt., that place became his early home. Like nearly all boys of that day it can be said he had no boyhood but went from childhood with a single step to meet the duties of manhood. Bound out at the age of ten he was to stay with Robert Parke of Grafton until he became twenty-one when he was to receive \$100 and two suits of clothes. Between many "chores" and "going to mill" his opportunities for attending school were very limited, yet these improved and added to by study in the chimney corner at night, by the aid of a pine knot or sometimes a candle, furnished him the rudiments of an education; when his apprenticeship ended he spent one or more terms at a school in Chester, Vt., to add to his qualifications. Having no trade but farming he "worked out" for various men on their farms in Vermont until 1818 when with two companions he planned to "go west" and settle. All three spent the last night before their departure at the house of Andrew's father. Despite their high hopes it was a sorrowful household which seemingly was taking its last leave of those three young men going into the far west, yet this same wild, far and unknown west became a home to them all, and the gardens of their posterity.

An outline of this journey and its results cannot fail of interest as illustrating the times, and we give extracts from his own sketch of it made in 1882 for the town history. "In the spring of 1818 I started in company with Warren Fay and Joseph Gilson from Vermont for some part of what was termed 'the West' each with a pack on his back and all on foot. After we had travelled as far as western New York we stopped one day at a log hotel kept by David Calkins in Sardinia. There some of the settlers persuaded us to inspect some of the land and we concluded to take up lot #38 of 400 acres, of which Fay took the southern part of 120 acres and Gilson the northern of 140 acres while the balance in the middle fell to my share. Here we built us a log house ten by twelve feet, covering it with bark; there was no chimney, only a hole through the roof over the 'Dutch back' or fire place for the smoke to escape. The floor was of bass wood planks which we split out and hewed and our bedstead was the floor covered with a straw bed. Our cabin finished we sought for a stock of provisions. Borrowing a voke of oxen of one man and a cart from another I went to Aurora, fifteen miles, in search of provisions, but finding none I

went on to Buffalo, fifteen miles farther. Could find but a small amount of provisions there but finally secured some beef and pork, and placing them in a barrel I bound this to the axle of the cart as there was no box upon it. Then I set out for home by way of the beach of the Lake, thence through Hamburg and Aurora, and after being absent six days finally reached our cabin tired and discouraged. However we continued work on our lot until the autumn when Fay and myself went to Middlebury (now Warsaw) and engaged in teaching school. After teaching three terms we rejoined Gilson who had remained in our shanty. I was soon stricken with typhus fever and did not recover until late in the fall when I again taught for the winter at Middlebury; the next spring I returned to our farm, which has since been my home. Gilson afterwards went to Adrian, Michigan, and Fay settled in Genesee County to practice medicine, becoming wealthy."

In the spring of 1820 Andrew returned to his old Vermont home, travelling with a horse and wagon, and a few weeks later, on his return to Sardinia he induced his brother Ira and sister Eunice to accompany him to this new country, and which became the future home of both. On his marriage Andrew took his young wife home to live in the little log shanty which was to them a castle as well. The next year he built a larger log house adjoining the old one and two years later he built a frame house of two rooms and a pantry with one large chamber. This house held the entire family, and many were the additions to it. One relic of that early home yet remains cherished by those who love the memory of those gathered in that humble home. It is the table from which they ate; made of cherry, with two drawers for the knives and spoons, it measured only $20 \ge 22$ inches and so was quite in keeping with the size of their house. They secured a quantity of apple seeds from which they raised an orchard, which was the origin of many of the present orchards in that vicinity.

He taught school eight or ten winters after he was married and his daughter Sarah remembers going to school taught by him when she was old enough to study grammar and geography. In 1830 with his wife and eldest child he visited his relatives at his old home in Grafton, Vt., making the entire trip of over four hundred miles with a horse and buggy. It was his last visit to the home of his childhood though he lived to see this long distance spanned with all the conveniences of modern travel. His home was always in Sardinia where he was much respected and chosen to various offices of trust. In 1820 he was appointed an ensign in the Niagara County Militia, but resigned the next year. By many years of toil they acquired a good property and reared a large family so that, though not rich, they spent the later years of their long lives in very comfortable circumstances. He died 29 Jan. 1883, at the advanced age of over ninety-one years.

He married 11 Dec. 1820 LYDIA EMILY HARRIS, born in Trenton, N. Y., 14 June 1797, daughter of John and Phebe (Hemmingway) Harris of Camden, N. Y. She had come to Sardinia with a married sister and her husband. She died 27 Apr. 1880, aged nearly eightythree years.

144. DR. IRA⁶ SHEDD (59. David⁵, Benjamin⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), was born in Grafton, Vt., 24 May 1802. His elder brother Andrew W.⁶ Shedd and friends from Vermont had settled in western New York, and in the spring of 1820 Ira and his sister Eunice returned with Andrew to his western home after his first visit to his native town. The then tedious journey of four hundred miles was made with a horse and wagon and many peculiar incidents occurred in strange contrast with the present. After many days they reached Middlebury where a number of old Vermont acquaintances were living and there he stopped, boarding with his Uncle David Stickney and attending school, being then not eighteen.

After his school term he visited his brother at Sardinia, or Concord as it was then called, where he lived in a cabin near a brook in a small clearing with dense woods all around; such a life was against his nature and he returned to his school at Middlebury Academy. After another term there his brother had secured an opportunity for him to teach school at the only frame schoolhouse in the region between the towns of China and Yorkshire. The tedious journey through the woods, his quizzing by the inspectors, and the accounts of the large boys and girls he was to have for scholars, nearly caused him to relinquish the attempt at teaching, but he persevered, kept a good school through the winter and acquired the reputation of being a successful teacher, which he maintained on many subsequent occasions. At this time he conceived a fancy for studying medicine and bent his energies as usual to accomplish his ends under the instruction of Doctors Colegrove, Emmons and Patterson. Completing his studies, he succeeded Dr. Patterson as a physician at Arcade, N. Y., in Dec. 1829, and entered upon a successful career in the practice of his profession which he followed during a long and useful life. His home for over forty years was in Arcade where he was one of the founders and a prominent member of the Baptist Church. He continued in the practice of his profession there until 1872 when he and his wife removed to Grand Rapids, Mich., to live with their only son, and though often yearning for the home of his earlier years, this city remained their residence during the remainder of their lives. He died 10 Jan. 1884, aged nearly eighty-two years.

154. THOMAS⁶ SHED (64. Thomas⁵, James⁴, James³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Roxbury, Mass., 1 Aug. 1773. He was a tanner and currier by trade and resided in Roxbury until about 1798 when he removed to Portland, Me., being one of the first tanners to establish themselves there. About 1809 he removed to a farm in East Otisfield, Me., where he spent the remainder of his life. His house was burned in 1815, whereby he lost all his household effects, together with many records and accounts, books. valuable dishes and articles of silver. Through perseverance and his neighbors' kindness he recovered himself and prospered; contrary to the usual custom of those days when children were put out to work or to learn a trade, he kept his family together until they married and set up for themselves. He was a man of deep thought, careful judgment and fixity of opinion. A noticeable fact in his life was that from the age of twenty-one to sixty-two he always voted with the Democratic party and at one election he was the only one to vote that party ballot. But he maintained his faith, and a few years later public opinion having changed, bringing his party again into favor, he was elected a democratic representative from Otisfield to the State Legislature. He died 1 May 1836.

He returned to New Hampshire for a bride and they began life on his farm in Bethany. He cleared his land and did carpenter work in that vicinity, but was cut down by the Grim Reaper in early manhood and died in Bethany 4 Jan. 1817, in his thirty-second year.

He married in Stoddard, N. H., 9 Feb. 1808, SARAH WRIGHT, whose family soon followed her to New York State. By her husband's early death she was left to bring up five children, but with a brave heart she kept them all with her and reared them to a manhood and womanhood that would bring honor to any parent. He graduated A.B. in 1838 and was assistant professor of mathematics and English literature at the University until 1839 when he went to the Virginia Literary, Scientific and Military Academy in Portsmouth, Va., as superintendent. He remained there until his death 3 Feb. 1842, unmarried. He was a fine scholar, a successful teacher, and gave promise of a brilliant career in his chosen profession. His journal and letters show depth of thought and literary ability.

He was a thorough scholar excelling in mathematics, an excellent engineer and an absolutely reliable man. He d. in Preemption, 17 Aug. 1860, unmarried.

163. COL. OLIVER⁶ SHEAD (67. Oliver⁵, James⁴, James³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Brookline, Mass., 29 Oct. 1777, and became a clerk in the store of Nathaniel Goddard in Boston, Mass. About 1798 Mr. Goddard sent him to Eastport, Me., to take charge of his interests in this new and rapidly developing section. He was nearly but not quite of age when this place was incorporated on 24 Feb. 1798, as the one hundred and sixteenth town in the district of Maine, by act of the General Court of Massachusetts then sitting for the first time in the new State House just completed on Beacon Hill in Boston. There is little doubt but that though young he took special interest in this matter

so strongly urged by his employer, and he also displayed much zeal in the local military matters of the period for in his twentythird year he was chosen as the second captain of the Eastport Militia Company; by his order dated 16 Aug. 1800 the training band of the town comprising fifty-six men was directed to appear at a general muster upon the main land on the 30th day of the same month "equipped as the law directs." Later on he was chosen major and afterwards colonel of the regiment of county militia, holding all positions with respect and esteem. Upon the withdrawal of Mr. Goddard to Boston (where he became very wealthy) he associated himself with Aaron Havden, and under the firm name of Hayden and Shead they succeeded to Mr. Goddard's large business at Eastport, which they continued very successfully. His natural ability, force of character and power of quick discernment and action enabled him to advance beyond men of riper years among his fellow citizens.

He was elected moderator of the town meeting in 1801 and was elected as the third treasurer of the town in 1800; he continued in the latter office for ten years, and then declining a re-election, received a vote of thanks from the town for his eminent services. By the law of the Commonwealth each town of over two hundred and fifty ratable polls was entitled to send one delegate to the General Court, and Eastport first availed itself of this privilege 4 May 1807 by electing Col. Oliver Shead as its first representative. In attending upon his duties he was allowed pay for four hundred and fifty miles travel, that being the distance then reckoned by the post roads to reach the Court at Boston. At this time there was only one other representative, Mr. Dickenson from Machias, from the whole of this easternmost county of the Commonwealth. No delegate was sent the next year, but Col. Shead was re-elected in 1809-10-11, having in this latter year a colleague by reason of the increased population. Even at a later date the journey from Eastport to the State capitol was by no means a desirable one to take, for the roads ran mostly through the forests, especially east of the Penobscot, and were bad almost beyond description; there was no regular means of conveyance except for small portions of the way, and much of the distance was travelled on foot or on horseback. The water route had such accommodations only as were afforded by small packets and other like sailing craft, but was the preferable means of travel.

Mr. Shead was appointed the first postmaster in the town when the office was established in 1802. The mail then arrived only weekly and it was 1813 before two mails were received and still twenty years later that a daily mail was established. He was also the first coroner and justice of the peace in the town. His business prospered and in 1802 he built the first two-story house in the town, which, though much modified, is still standing. He owned the first cow and the first horse upon the island and so, as his grandson has tersely and jokingly said, he might always be classed among the "first families" in town. This horse of his was a lively and somewhat vicious black animal which the older children there who had never before seen such a creature described as an ox without horns, while to the younger children it was a veritable goblin.

In 1811 came the division of the town, Eastport being limited to what was known as Moose Island, while all the mainland was established as Lubec. The summer of 1812 brought the declaration of war by Congress against Great Britain, and in these extreme border settlements great uneasiness and confusion ensued, many removing to less exposed places; after two years of this confusion came the capture of the town by the British forces on 11 July 1814, and the establishment of martial rule on land and in the harbor. For four years this foreign rule continued until the departure of the British troops in June 1818, when the people again resumed allegiance to the United States. Col. Shead commanded a garrison at Eastport during the War of 1812, from 1 July to 12 Sept. 1812. (Records of the Massachusetts Militia in the War of 1812-14, p. 159.)

He died in Eastport 18 Nov. 1813, aged thirty-six years.

In 1818 he was living in Groton, Mass., as his marriage record states, but after marriage he settled in Framingham and kept a grocery store near the north end of Cochituate Pond. He may have been living in Boston in 1822, as the directory for that year contains the name of Oliver Shed who kept a grocery store on Cambridge St. He removed to Weston, Mass., about 1823, where in 1823 and 1825 he was elected surveyor



182. REV. WILLIAM GREENOUGH THAYER⁶ SHEDD, D.D., LL.D. (77. Rev. Marshall Spring⁵, Zechariah⁴, Ebenezer³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), born in Acton, Mass., 21 June 1820, graduated from the University of Vermont, A.B. 1839, A.M. 1843, and from the Andover Theological Seminary, S.T.B. in 1843. From 1843 to 1845 he was pastor of the Congregational Church in Brandon, Vt., and from 1862 to 1863 was associate pastor of the Brick (Presbyterian) Church in New York City; but except for these three years of pastoral work, the rest of his career of half a century after graduation from the Andover Theological Seminary was devoted to theological writing and to the duties of a professor in various institutions. From 1845 to 1852 he was professor of English literature in the University of Vermont; from 1852 to 1854 was professor of sacred rhetoric in the Auburn Theological Seminary; and from 1854 to 1862 was professor of ecclesiastical history in the Andover Theological Seminary. In 1862 he was called to the chair of sacred literature in the Union Theological Seminary of New York City and in 1874 was advanced to the professorship of systematic theology, which chair he held until 1890 when he retired with the honorary title of professor emeritus.

Among the publications of Dr. Shedd were: 1. "Eloquence a Virtue, or Outlines of Systematic Rhetoric," a translation from the German of Theremin (New York 1850 and Andover 1859); 2. An Edition of Coleridge's Works, with an Introductory Essay (seven volumes, New York 1853); 3. "Lectures on the Philosophy of History" (Andover 1856); 4. "Discourses and Essays" (Andover 1856); 5. "A Manual of Church History" from the German of Guericke (two volumes, Andover 1857); 6. "The Confession of Augustine," with an Introductory Essay (Andover 1860); 7. "A History of Christian Doctrine" (two volumes, New York and Edinburgh 1863); 8. "Homilitics and Pastoral Theology" (New York and Edinburgh 1867); 9. "Sermons to the Natural Man" (New York and Edinburgh 1871); 10. "Theological Essays" (New York 1877); 11. "Literary Essays" (New York 1888); 12. "A Commentary on St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans" (New York 1879); 13. "Sermons to the Spiritual Man" (New York and London 1884); 14. "The Doctrine of Endless Punishment" (New York 1885); 15. "Dogmatic Theology" (three volumes, New York and London 1888-1894).

Dr. Shedd was beyond question the most accomplished scholar and greatest intellectual genius that the Shedd family has produced, was one of the most eminent Presbyterian theologians of his generation, and is the only Shedd of sufficient international distinction to be given a biography in the Encyclopaedia Britannica. He was the last really great American theologian to cling tenaciously and remorselessly to the doctrine of a literal hell with endless future punishment, of which Augustine, Calvin and Edwards were celebrated exponents in earlier times, and which modern Protestant religious thought almost completely discarded towards the close of the nineteenth century. In recognition of his abilities and achievements Dr. Shedd received the honorary degrees of D.D. from the University of Vermont in 1857 and LL.D. from New York University in 1876. He died in New York City 17 Nov. 1894.

After the expiration of his apprenticeship, he in company with Francis Ingraham started a paper called the "Spectator" which they carried on together for some years. Then disposing of his interest in this sheet he joined with Messrs. Badger and Porter, publishers of the "American Traveller." In 1839 he became associated with John Putnam in the book and job printing business, locating on Cornhill and continuing at the same place for over forty years.

Born of patriotic ancestors, his mind was early trained in the principles of freedom and he was always strong in opposition to all wrong and oppression and was ever a zealous advocate of the antislavery movements, rejoicing to see the fall of that institution. In 1840 he and his wife joined the Dudley Street Baptist Church and they continued this connection (except from 1851 to 1868, while united with Tremont Church in Roxbury) during the remainder of their lives. She died in Roxbury, Mass., 27 Oct. 1883, in her eightieth year, having had ten children; and her husband soon followed her, dying there 17 Nov. 1883, in his eightyfirst year.

He was an employee of the firm of Denny, Rice & Co., wool merchants, from a boy until about 1870, then a member of the firm of Morse, Denny & Co., wool merchants, for ten or more years, and later in business for himself as a trustee of real and personal estates. As heirlooms from his grandfather he treasured an old fashioned desk, also a punch bowl from which the great patriot Samuel Adams, who was an intimate friend of his grandfather, drank in honor of Independence when the tidings of its declaration were first received and celebrated in Boston.

The following appreciation was written by his former pastor, who knew him intimately from 1879 until his death.

"Mr. Shed was a strong personality. He was so unselfish that all he had and all he was seemed to belong to his family, his friends and the unfortunate. One who was fortunate enough to call Mr. Shed his friend knew what that rare thing is called 'friendship.' But he could not be on terms of intimacy with many. He was modest in estimating himself - too much so. He was benevolent and a helper of many people, but he forgot his deeds. He was devoted to his family; in all business scrupulously honest. He was too noble to stoop to meanness. He was an intelligent citizen, but never an aspirant for public office. He was an anti-slavery man; a lover of national history; proud of Massachusetts. In his prime (and much earlier, too) he was a reader of solid books. His Christian character was broad and spotless, a liberal in theology. He never lost sight of the Christian ideals. He was a member of the Baptist denomination for sixty years or more, yet cordially regarded all Christian people. He was interested in world-wide Christian service. He served in important offices in the church of his choice throughout his life from early manhood."

He lived in Roxbury, Mass., where he died 8 Mar. 1911, in his eighty-second year.

253. REV. CHARLES⁶ SHEDD (112. Capt. Abel⁵, Abel⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born 21 Oct. 1802 in Rindge, N. H. He prepared for college at New Ipswich and Hanover, N. H., from 1819 to 1822. At the age of twenty he entered Dartmouth College, where he maintained an excellent standing in his studies and graduated four years later in the class of 1826, among his classmates being his cousin Rev. Henry⁶ Shedd. After his graduation he taught for eight years at Kimball Union Academy at Meriden, N. H., and in 1834 became principal of Appleton Academy in New Ipswich, N. H., one of the leading preparatory schools of its day. This relation continued until 1841, during which time he met with marked successs as an instructor; he then resigned his position to study divinity and on 24 Mar. 1842 was ordained pastor of the Congregational Church at Campton, N. H. His abilities as a scholar and his rich fund of information acquired by much reading helped to make him equally successful in this new field as a preacher. His social nature made many friends and the long period of his stay over this charge gave evidence of the high esteem in which he was held. He remained in this position for nearly fifteen years and in 1856 removed to Minnesota and settled in Mantorville for about two years. After 1858 his services were chiefly given to home missionary work in various places in Minnesota, including organizing a church in Zumbrota in 1857, and preaching in Claremont 1858-1873, Wasioja and Mantorville 1858 to 1864, and Watseca 1873 to 1880. He gave up the regular ministry in 1873. He organized in part or wholly several churches in that section and continued his labors until enfeebled health compelled him to retire. In 1880 he removed to Zumbrota, Minn., to live near his son Henry, and he died there on 7 May 1885, in his eighty-third year.

254. JAMES ADAMS⁶ SHEDD (112. *Capt. Abel⁵*, *Abel⁴*, *Jonathan³*, *Samuel²*, *Daniel¹*), was born in Rindge, N. H., 25 Feb. 1804. He fitted himself for college, studying by the blaze of an open fire, but did not enter college. He was a thorough Latin and Greek scholar, and very proficient in both French and German, so much so that he was often asked by Germans what part of Germany he came from. For a time he taught school and later went west, where in Champaign Co., Ohio, in 1831, he was admitted to the bar. Later he settled in Dayton, Ohio, where he practiced law until 1847, when he removed to a small farm near the village of Denmark, Iowa, where he passed the rest of his life. He was an earnest anti-slavery advocate, associating with many of the early leaders of abolition, even as early as 1836. He gave three sons to help preserve the Union, and when urged to apply for a pension which he might have had on account of the death of his youngest son killed at Vicksburg, he replied, "I gave my sons as a free will offering to my country and all the money in the world could not compensate the sacrifice." He died in Denmark, 24 Sept. 1876.

16 May 1803. As a boy he was a good scholar and was ambitious for a better education than could be obtained in the common schools. He spent two years under the instruction of Amasa Edes at Appleton Academy at New Ipswich, N. H. and in 1826 entered Dartmouth College in company with his cousin Charles Shedd. While an undergraduate he taught school frequently in the winters at New Ipswich, N. H., Westminster and Springfield, Mass., and Hanover, N. H. He graduated well, in 1826, and then spent three years in the study of divinity at Andover Theological Seminary; receiving his license to preach by the presbytery at Newburyport early in 1829, he assisted Rev. N. Bouton of Concord during May and June of that year. On 24 Sept. 1829 he was ordained in the Park Street Church, Boston, as a home missionary in the West, and he settled in Mount Gilead, Ohio, the same autumn. For several years he was a missionary preacher in Ohio, achieving great success and reputation in his work. In 1833 he was installed as pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Mount Gilead, Ohio, and two adjacent towns. His succeeding pastorates were all in Ohio; in Pisgah 1836-1838, Mount Gilead again 1838-1842, Lower Liberty 1842-1850, Delhi 1850-1852, Lexington 1852-1854, and finally again in Mount Gilead where he remained in charge of the church until 1862. He then withdrew from active work, except for the period from 1870 to 1875 when he was pastor of the church in York though he continued to live in Mount Gilead until his death on 17 June 1886, in his eighty-fourth year. Possessed of more than average ability as a scholar, he entered into his work with great zeal and by many years of hard service and great usefulness among the pioneers of Ohio he has built up a lasting reputation as a noble, upright man. Ever zealous for the Master's cause he brought together, organized and served as pastor or stated supply a great number of churches, and besides had a large experience in the different phases of the temperance movements. He was an enthusiastic laborer, in season and out of season, for the removal of slavery, and lived to see the triumph of these great principles of freedom for which he pleaded.



One day he ran away leaving a cartload of wood on the road, and though only a boy of nine it is said he made his way to Provincetown on Cape Cod. Here he remained a number of years or until over twenty-one, following the sea, studying navigation the while, as a science as well as practically, and in other ways acquiring an education. After his marriage he settled in Truro where he was at one time a teacher in the public schools and also in his spare hours had classes in navigation. Possessing much aptitude and good judgment he soon became a prominent and respected citizen in his town and vicinity. In 1818 he joined the Methodist Church of South Truro, and later was for many years its steward. He was often chosen by his townsmen to fill positions of trust, being assessor from 1837 to 1845, and town clerk in 1843 and for many years following. He was three times elected a representative to the General Court between 1836 and 1855, and one year was honored by an appointment by the Governor as a member of his staff. He was a man quiet in manner but with a strong mind and sound judgment, firmly adhering to his principles though not to a degree beyond conviction. To the tact and counsels of his wife, as well, he owed much of his success; faithfully together they journeyed down to advanced years enjoying the esteem of all to whom their lives were known. He died in Truro, 10 Jan. 1862.

The following account dictated by him to his daughter in January 1884, at the age of eighty-nine years well illustrates the usual life of men of his time who were obliged to make their own way in life:

"I lived at home until nine years old when I went to live with a family in Amherst, N. H. When I had been there about two years my father came for me and we with the other members of the family removed to the new town of Norway, Me., in the spring of 1806. According to the custom of those days I was 'bound out' until I became of age, with a Mr. Benjamin Flint of Norway. At the age of fourteen I went to New Gloucester, Me., for three years to learn the cooper's trade. While there I was a private in the company raised in 1814 to repel an expected English invasion.* I then returned to Mr. Flint's and remained until I was twentyone when I finished my term of service and received from Mr. Flint \$100 in money. With this money I bought some land and set to work clearing it up for a farm. After several years of hard work I had added a set of buildings and some cattle. At the age of thirty I married and after four years spent on the old place we removed to a new farm in Norway upon which my father lived, exchanging places with my brother, and this has since been our home. Our four children have all lived to grow up, respected men and women,- the best wealth man can ask."

In addition to the four children born to them, they adopted four homeless children, who under their teaching and example became useful and prosperous members of the community. Their eldest son Calvin came to live with and care for them in their advancing age. He was always a true friend of the poor and needy and blessed with ample means lived to a ripe old age in the enjoyment of his richly earned happiness. He died in Norway, 30 Apr. 1885 in his ninety-first year.

Compare such toil, its limitations and results, with the opportunities under which young men of today may make their way. A good story is told of this man, a good representative of the men of his generation, by H. G. Smith, an old resident of Hollis, in an historical account of a few years ago. "A vision rises before me of the old brown horse of Stephen Lund ploughing through the snow with the long sleigh, carrying all Mr. Lund's children to school, so determined was he to have them have an education. He had his reward, as his daughters were always chosen first at the spelling matches and all his children were good scholars. Though somewhat odd Mr. Lund was an upright and worthy man with an especial scorn for anything approaching deceit. There came a time when he wanted to secure a wife and mother for his children. Having chosen a suitable woman, he made his proposal as follows: 'I am a widower and have nine children. There is not a poorer house in town than mine; I am several hundred dollars in debt; my children are as ugly and unruly as children in general. My wife will be obliged to work hard and will enjoy few luxuries. Now will you marry me?' Nothing daunted the good lady said, 'Yes' and she made an excellent wife." 305. WILLIAM GARDNER⁶ SHED (131. Zaccheus⁵, Lieut. John⁴, Lieut. John³, Nathan², Daniel¹), born in Billerica, Mass., 10 July 1808, followed farming in Franklin, N. H., for a few years and in 1835 with his wife, child and brother Rufus moved to Troy Grove, Ill., which was then regarded as the "far West." An interesting letter was written to his elder brother Daniel; it is dated Troy Grove, Ill., 18 Nov. 1835 and a portion of it is here quoted:

"We arrived here on 29 Sept., all in good health and spirits. . . . Will give you a little history of our journey. We started from Brockport, N.Y., on 12 Sept. and went to Buffalo ninety-two miles by canal, took a steamboat there for Detroit, Mich., and had a very good passage, being forty hours going over three hundred miles and not any of us were sick. We stayed there three days. I bought a pair of horses and a wagon and then we started across the Territory of Michigan; found the travelling very good most of the way. A long storm hindered us three days but we met with no other accidents or mishaps. The first thing was to fix my house to live in. I got [brother] Rufus and a joiner at work upon it and then I started for Chicago for my goods. . . . Had to go three times for them and for some others that we bought; everything came safely. . . . We have been housekeeping now three weeks and feel quite at home. The land is as good here as a man ever could wish for; there is nothing but what flourishes as well or better than in any place I ever saw. Produce brings a good price here. Wheat is worth a dollar per bushel, corn 50c, oats 50c, potatoes 25c at your own door,- a quick sale and cash in hand. Butter is selling at 16 to 25 cents and can hardly be had at that; cheese sells for 12 and 15c a pound, so a dairy would be a moneymaking business. I think it will be profitable to put up a saw mill on my place if there should prove to be as good a fall of water as the people say there is; the quantity is enough. . . . Timber I have enough of that which is good. Provisions are reasonable; beef may be had at three dollars per hundred and pork at from

three to four dollars. Help is scarce, both men and women. If you come out, the best time would be, if you could get started, by the middle of May; or if not then, some time about middle of August. . . I should come all the way by water, as it would be cheaper and less fatiguing. There is a regular line of packets that runs from Buffalo to Chicago which would bring you within eighty miles of me by water. Cows may be bought by going say forty miles for from \$10 to \$20; working oxen from \$30 to \$50 per yoke. Coffee sells for 18 to 20c per pound, Y. H. tea from $62\frac{1}{2}$ to $87\frac{1}{2}$ cents per pound, good brown sugar at 12c.

As to the amount it would cost to come out, I cannot say correctly as it depends on how you come. Most people board themselves and this makes it considerably less. I think you could get landed in Chicago for \$30 or \$35 apiece, as a rough guess. . . To move your goods from your place to Chicago I think would be 2 cents a pound if not too bulky.

You enquire about thunder and lightning; we have that here as well as in other places but not more frequent than in the eastern states. Earthquakes I have never heard of being here nor house adders.

Lucy is much pleased with the country. We have one cow and shall churn to-night for the first time. I have never seen any Indians but once since I returned. They have all gone west of the Mississippi River as they have no lands on this side. We have a school in the summer three months and three months in the winter. Tuition is \$2 per quarter, there being no school tax. Lucy, Rufus, Charles and Harriet send their regards.

The postage on this letter was \$0.25. Though it was written but about fifty years ago, yet compared with things of today in that section it well illustrates the conditions that the early settlers in the then far West found and overcame; and it shows how shrewdly they studied all the details before surrendering their old eastern homes for new ones fortune might find them there. And it is to the keenness of such men, who could perceive and analyze quickly, as our kinsman did, all these new conditions and details in proving all the good points, that that section today owes its high standing. Strange as it may seem, his brother Daniel did not heed his advice, as his wife died a year or so later, but remained at home in New Hampshire where his sons have also stayed and prospered. William G. Shedd engaged successfully in farming and stockraising and died in Troy Grove, Ill., 26 Sept. 1852. He married in Franklin, N. H., 10 July 1831, LUCY R. NOYES, born there 9 Oct. 1811, daughter of Joseph Noyes. She survived him for many years and died about 1886 or 1887.

319. JOHN BROOKS⁷ SHEDD (141. Reuben⁶, Reuben⁵, Daniel4, Daniel3, Daniel2, Daniel1), born in Sharon, N. H., 28 Oct. 1825, was employed on his father's farm until after he became of age and then learned the trade of blacksmithing from John Fife at Peterboro, N. H. In 1853 he married and settled on his father's homestead in Sharon, having made an agreement with his parents, as was a frequent custom then and in earlier times, for the care and maintenance of his parents during the remainder of their lives. and for paying such legacies and charges as were agreed upon to the two other sons of his parents, amounting to \$700. In return for this he was to receive the farm and all the personal property. They resided there upon this farm for about eighteen years, or until both his father and mother had passed away in 1868 and 1869. By great energy, economy and good management he improved his farm, increased it by other purchases and acquired a competency as a result of hard work by himself and his wife. He took an active interest in the welfare of his native town and was honored with the confidence of his neighbors, so that he was frequently chosen to positions of trust. For a number of years he was one of the selectmen and for two sessions a member (in 1866-1867) of the State Legislature, although in politics not a member of the party having the largest numbers. This was during the trying and exciting times of the Civil War and the succeeding reconstruction years, but he was a supporter of the Union and although unable to go himself sent an able substitute.

In 1871 he removed to East Jaffrey, N. H., where the preceding year he had erected for himself a comfortable dwelling house and stable, and that place continued to be his home thereafter, although he retained the old homestead in Sharon. For over nine years he was engaged in a retail milk business, keeping his own dairy; he prospered well, became connected with the Savings Bank as trustee, held other official positions, and also enjoyed the esteem of a large circle of friends. While living quietly in retirement from active work, his home was entirely destroyed by fire on 6 Mar. 1899, with nearly all its contents, a very severe blow to both himself and wife in their advanced years. He however rebuilt his buildings the following year on the same site and reoccupied them. After the death of his wife in 1900 he continued in his home in East Jaffrey, assisted by a housekeeper, until his death at 11.30 P.M. on 26 Sept. 1905, aged almost eighty years.

He married in Ashburnham, Mass., 12 Apr. 1853, SARAH JANE VERDER, born in New Ipswich, N. H., 20 Aug. 1825, eldest daughter of John Francis and Sally Jones (Smith) Verder, later of East Jaffrey, N. H. Having acquired a good education at Townsend Female Seminary and at Appleton Academy in New Ipswich, she was a successful school teacher for several years prior to her marriage. She became an efficient helpmeet to her husband and contributed much to their mutual prosperity. She died very suddenly while at New Ipswich, N. H., 9 Aug. 1900, aged seventy-five years; her decease occurred only a few months after she and her husband had occupied their new house, and her end was doubtless hastened by the excitement and exertions incident to the destruction and rebuilding of their home.

321. JOHN SULLIVAN⁷ SHEDD (142. John⁶, John⁵, John⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), born in Hillsboro, N. H., 15 Oct. 1819, was less than two years old when his father died. In youth and early manhood he lived some years in New Bedford, Mass.; but in 1849 he settled in Antrim, N. H. For a few months he went into trade in a country store there with Almus Fairfield; he then sold out his interest and bought the southerly portion of the farm formerly owned by his father-in-law, Hon. Jacob Tuttle where he erected buildings for his own occupancy. Here he resided, engaged in farming, until 1868, and then moved into a house in the south village of Antrim which continued his home for a score of years until his death in Antrim on 17 Apr. 1889.

He married in Antrim, 20 May 1846, MARY ELIZA TUTTLE, born there 15 May 1823, fourteenth and youngest child of Hon. Jacob and Elizabeth (Cummings) Tuttle. 322. WARREN FAY⁷ SHEDD (143. Andrew Wilkins⁶, David⁵, Benjamin⁴, Capt. Benjamin³, Ens. John², Daniel¹), born in Sardinia, N. Y., 6 (or 26) Nov. 1821, in early life was a school teacher and farmer in Sardinia and Wales, N. Y., and Erie, Pa., and from 1852 to 1861 lived in Winnebago and Malta, Ill. In the spring of 1861 he left his family, and journeying west via St. Joseph, Mo., and Denver and Leadville, Colo., he went to New Mexico where he settled in San Augustine. His wife and three children continued in Belvidere, Ill., and for nearly twenty-five years had no knowledge of the whereabouts of the husband and father until Mr. Frank G.⁸ Shedd, the compiler of this genealogy, accidentally learned his address about 1885 from some travelers to New Mexico. In 1897 his younger daughter, Mrs. Carrie (Shedd) Detrick, went to San Augustine, New Mexico, found her father and induced him to return with her to her home in Arkansas City, Ark., where he and his wife were reconciled and reunited after a separation of thirty-six years. 

350. SARAH⁷ SHEDD (160. John Briant⁶, Nathan⁵, James⁴, James³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Washington, N. H.,

29 Apr. 1813. She never married but always made her home in her native town, except for short periods while engaged in work away, and she died there 5 Apr. 1867 after a very useful and honorable life. The death of her father when she was only fifteen, leaving no great amount of property for his family, was an additional reason, beyond what was generally urged upon children of that period, for her early entrance upon a life of toil to assist her mother in supporting the family. Having had just a taste of the advantages of a course of study by attending for a short time Mount Holyoke Seminary at South Hadley, Mass., she gave up her own pleasure in the further pursuit of study and spent many years at hard labor in the cotton mills at Lowell and other places because it brought to her larger and much needed returns; she also in early life interspersed with her factory work frequent terms of school teaching for which her natural high mental endowments so well qualified her. While at her work she also composed numerous poems which have since been collected in a small volume and the sentiments therein contained well illustrate her elevated character and generous nature.

The earnings she acquired by many years of toil were carefully preserved for her mother's and her own needs during life, and as this drew to an end she provided in her will that a large share, \$2500, of what was left should be used for founding a public library in her native town. The will was dated 15 Mar. 1867, a few weeks before her demise, and in November of the same year the town of Washington voted to accept her bequest with its provisions and to adopt for its name "The Shedd Free Library." In 1881 Mr. Luman T. Jefts of Hudson, Mass., but a native of Washington, presented the town with a handsome and endurable edifice of brick and stone for a library building. It was completed and dedicated 21 Dec. 1881 and bears in honor of the founder of the library the title of "The Shedd Free Library."

351. JOSEPH WENTWORTH⁷ SHEDD (160. John Briant⁶, Nathan⁵, James⁴, James³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), born in Washington, N. H., 4 Aug. 1817, prepared for college at John O. He was esteemed for his character, abilities and scholarly attainments, and was a man of generous public spirit, bequeathing from a moderate estate the sum of \$1000 to the school in his township of Pleasant Ridge and also \$2500 to the State Industrial University at Champaign, Ill.

352. DR. THOMAS WRIGHT⁷ SHEDD (161. Joseph Weld⁶, Nathan⁵, James⁴, James³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), was born in Bethany, N. Y., 12 Jan. 1812. Deprived of his father at the age of five he thus lost in his youth the training due to a father's watchful care and guiding hand, yet he was blessed with a judicious and enlightened mother by whose toil and guardianship he was reared in those principles of honor and virtue that so influenced and illustrated his later life. He acquired his education at the common school in his native town and at the academy at LeRoy, N. Y., at which place he also studied the theory and practice of medicine under Dr. Abney; and in Jan. 1834 he graduated as a physician and surgeon from the Medical College in Fairfield, N. Y., being then only twenty-two years of age.

For two years he practiced his profession in LeRoy and vicinity and by his success was building a high reputation when his work was arrested by the development of pulmonary disease and he was forced to seek relief in a warmer climate. He left his New York home in 1836 and stopped for a time at Elizabethtown, in Kentucky, where finding his health rapidly improving, he settled himself and resumed the practice of his profession. But his constitution proving too feeble to endure the exposure due to an extensive practice as a physician, he relinquished it and began the study of law. With his inherent energy he devoted to his new profession all the powers of his body and mind and mastered its intricacies with great facility; one of the most distinguishing characteristics of his mind was the quickness and clearness of his perceptions and the grasping at once of the true point at issue. He had a peculiar gift of language,— not copiousness of words but fitness and propriety of expression, so that with few and apt words he presented to others every idea as clearly as it was pictured to his own mind. His associates classed him as an able lawyer and with careful steps he advanced daily and rapidly in his professional honors until his malady, baffled for a time, again asserted itself and so strongly that his system could not throw off the burden but fell under it.

In 1846 he removed to Henderson, Texas, with his family, where they remained two years, and in 1848 they settled permanently in Marshall, Harrison Co., Texas. He continued in his legal profession there and being chosen a judge was obliged to ride from one circuit to another, often on horseback. Upon one occasion of this kind, being forced to ford a river, he acquired a chill from the wetting he received and the seeds of consumption lurking in his system sprang into rapid growth and a few weeks later, 24 May 1850, he died, mourned by a large circle of friends. He was always active in the cause of temperance and in his later years was a prominent leader and debater for the cause under the Grand Division of Sons of Temperance in Texas, by whom and by many other friends his demise was deeply mourned.

353. GEN. WARREN⁷ SHEDD (162. William⁶, Nathan⁵, James⁴, James³, Zechariah², Daniel¹), born in Stoddard, N. H., 22 Feb. 1821, prepared for college in the schools of that place and entered the preparatory department of the University of Norwich in Norwich, Vt., in 1835, and the regular work of the scientific department in 1836, remaining until 1839. His parents removing to Illinois at this time, he left college without taking his degree and joined them, settling in Rock Island, Ill., where he was principal of the high school for some time. Later he removed to Aledo, Ill., where he made his home until 1850, when he went to Clear Creek, Cal., to engage in mining. In 1856 he went to Iowa, where for two years he and his brother Solon were assistant engineers with Gen. Preston on surveys of land. About 1858 he returned to Illinois and was treasurer of Mercer Co. until the outbreak of the Civil War when he offered his services to the State of Illinois and was appointed a drill and recruiting officer. He was commissioned captain of Co. A, 30th Illinois Infantry, 29 Aug. 1861, was promoted major, 22 Apr. 1862, lieutenant-colonel, 24 Jan. 1863, colonel, 13 June 1863, and was under Grant until after the capture of Vicksburg. He was also with Sherman on his march to the sea and was made prisoner at Atlanta and held for eight months. He was brevetted brigadier general of United States Volunteers 13 Mar. 1865 for "meritorious service during the war," and was honorably discharged with his regiment 17 July 1865. He served as brigade commander during 1864 and 1865. In 1866 he removed to Warrensburg, Mo., where he was deputy clerk of the United States Court from 1870 to 1877 and for several years United States land agent. In 1878 he settled in Black Hills, So. Dak., removing the next year to engage in mining in State Creek near Tigerville, So. Dak. He died in Tigerville, 29 Aug. 1881, being buried in Rapid City, So. Dak. He was a Republican in politics, a thirty-second degree Mason, and a prominent member of the G. A. R., the posts of the latter organization in Aledo, Ill., and Hill City, So. 

H., 19 May 1825, when fourteen years old went with his parents to Preemption, Ill., where he lived nearly twenty-five years, caring for his parents in their later years. During the Civil War he volunteered in the Union Cause and was commissioned captain of Co. C, One Hundred and Second Illinois Volunteers, and was mustered in 2 Sept. 1862; but being a very heavy man he was unable to stand the physical strain of service, so was obliged to resign on 9 Apr. 1863, his health being seriously impaired. In 1864 he removed from Preemption, Ill., to Linn County, Ore., the journey over the plains and mountains taking nearly five months in a prairie schooner. Here he settled on some rich farming land which he industriously cultivated, and he became one of the most prosperous farmers in the county. In 1871 he gave some of his land to the railroad, on which a town was established which was named "Shedd" in his honor. He well educated his children, in 1874 was elected to the Oregon Legislature, and died at his homestead near Shedd, Ore., 15 Apr. 1892.

430. CAPT. OLIVER⁷ SHEAD (215. Orson⁶, Samuel⁵, Oliver⁴, Samuel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Richville, N. Y., 4 Apr. 1823, learned the trade of wagon maker in which occupation his father had engaged. He also had a taste for music, became a violinist, and when a young man joined a travelling musical company. In 1845 he arrived in Defiance, Ohio, where he remained two years, in 1847 married, and for the next five years lived in Detroit, Mich., and Milwaukee and East Troy, Wis. On 15 Apr. 1852 he left his wife and child and went overland to Portland, Ore., and the next spring established himself in Olympia, Wash. He then sent money for his wife and child to join him; but his wife declined to go to the Pacific Coast and in 1857 they were divorced. He died at Ashland Springs, Ore., 20 Apr. 1889, but was buried in Olympia, Wash. His estate was valued at about \$100,000, the income of

which he left to his third wife for life, and at her death the principal was to be equally divided among his son, his two brothers, and the heirs of his sister.

The young couple continued to live at Truxton for over six years and then removed in 1848 to Momence, Kankakee County, Ill. There he took up a quarter section of land from the government and remained three years, in each of which he was rewarded with good crops. He then went to Chariton, Lucas County, Iowa, which was at that time an entirely new country with very poor means for transportation, chiefly by wagons for two hundred and fifty miles. While there he purchased in company with another man a drove of three hundred and eighty-two working oxen with which they started for St. Paul, Minn. They travelled entirely by map and compass across the prairie, and with them went his eldest child Kendrick William⁸ Shedd, then but nine years old, who was captured by the Indians but soon ransomed for a \$20 gold piece. A ready sale for the cattle was found at St. Paul, and they returned home to Chariton, Ia., by way of the Mississippi River and the stage, after an absence of nearly five months. They soon afterwards returned to New York State and settled about 1854 at Elmira which remained their home until the opening of the Civil War.

After settling in Elmira he began the study of medicine, and soon giving up farming devoted his energies to the practice of medicine. About 1861 he removed to Washington, D. C., and there for several years enjoyed a very large and lucrative practice. 



in Providence. When nineteen years of age he joined the Third Baptist Church there and several years later transferred his membership to the First Baptist Church. His zeal and earnestness in church work attracted the attention of Dr. Wayland, president of Brown University, who encouraged Mr. Shedd to study for the Baptist ministry, although then over thirty years of age and having a wife and two children to maintain. After taking a partial course at Brown University, in 1865, he moved with his family to Newton Center, Mass., where he took the course at the Newton Theological Institution and graduated in 1867. On 28 Aug. 1867 he was ordained pastor of the Baptist Church at North Oxford, Mass., and had a successful ministry there for three years. 
543. REV. JOHN HASKELL⁷ SHEDD, D.D. (257. Rev. Henry⁶, D.D., John Haskell⁵, Abel⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Mount Gilead, Ohio, 9 July 1833, studied at Ohio Wesleyan

University 1852-3, graduated from Marietta College in 1856, and studied theology at Lane Theological Seminary 1856-8 and Andover Theological Seminary 1858-9, receiving a degree of S.T.B. from the latter institution in 1859. On 3 Aug. 1859 he was ordained to the ministry at Mount Gilead, Ohio, and a few months later he and his wife sailed as missionaries to Persia where they remained eleven years in the service of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. Returning in 1870 to the United States he was soon appointed a professor at Biddle University in Charlotte, N. C., and continued in this chair until 1878. In this year he received the honorary degree of D.D. from Marietta College, and soon after again went out as a missionary to Persia, taking his wife and children with him, this time in the service of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions. Their station was Urumia in Persia where he was president of Urumia College and Theological Seminary, established for training native Persians for the Christian ministry. In this position Dr. Shedd labored the remainder of his life, a period of nearly seventeen years; and he died in Urumia 12 Apr. 1895.

Colman Smith⁶, Samuel C.⁵, Abel⁴, Jonathan³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in West Windsor, Vt., 22 Mar. 1835, attended the district schools and also Perkins Institute in South Woodstock, so secured a better education than most farmer boys had at his time. He taught school for several terms and commenced to study law, but finding sedentary life to be detrimental to his health he abandoned it and turned his attention to the ancestral occupation of farming. After his second marriage in 1865 he lived nine years in Cornish, N. H., but in 1874 returned to his native town of West Windsor, Vt. Here he engaged in farming on a large scale, cultivating three hundred acres, having a sugar orchard of two hundred trees and maintaining a flock of three hundred merino sheep. He was a man of great energy and good business judgment and made a considerable fortune. He enjoyed the esteem and respect of the community, was well fitted for public business, and for several years served as a selectman and in other local offices; but being always a staunch Democrat in a state overwhelmingly Republican, he could not secure election to offices commensurate with his abilities. In 1881 he was the Democratic candidate from Windsor County for the State Senate. He died in West Windsor 23 Mar. 1883, in the prime of life.



551. CHARLES BANKS' SHEDD (266. Dea. Joshua Rundle⁶, Capt. Joshua⁵, John⁴, John³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Michigan City, Ind., 18 June 1846, the next year was taken by his mother in a prairie schooner to Chicago, Ill., whither his father had gone in a sail boat across Lake Michigan. When Mr. Shedd was only eight years of age his father died suddenly of cholera in Chicago, and two years later his mother removed with her three young boys to Oberlin, Ohio, to secure better educational advantages for them. After due preparatory study Mr. Shedd entered Oberlin College and graduated A.B. in 1868. His talents being commercial and financial rather than academic, he decided to enter business and at once settled permanently in Chicago. For a year he was employed by Cobb, Pritchard and Company in the book and stationery trade; but in 1869 he went into the banking business. His first position was with the banking house of Jacob R. Shipherd and Company and in 1870 he became manager of a branch office on Twenty-Second Street, in the south end of the city, of the Mechanics Savings Bank, which enjoyed the good fortune and distinction of being the only bank in Chicago that was not burned out in the disastrous great fire starting on 8 Oct. 1871, and that was able to carry on its usual business and meet all its obligations

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on the day after the holocaust. A little later he became manager of a branch office on Wabash Avenue, near Twenty-Second Street, of the State Savings Institution, then the largest savings bank in Chicago. This concern failed in 1876; and Mr. Shedd joined his brother Edward Avery⁷ Shedd, who two years previously had established an ice business in Chicago, as the firm of E. A. Shedd and Company. Their business grew rapidly to be the largest in that line in Chicago and in 1885 was incorporated with others into the Knickerbocker Ice Company. Mr. Charles Banks Shedd was secretary and treasurer of this corporation until 1898 when he and his brother sold out their interests to eastern capitalists, who merged the concern into the Consumers Company, and the Shedd brothers retired from the ice business with large fortunes. Since then the brothers, under the firm name of E. A. Shedd and Company, have been interested as capitalists in many large enterprises, including the Alaska Central Railroad, (later the Alaska Northern Railroad), the Chicago and Milwaukee Electric Railroad, coal and iron developments in Birmingham, Ala., coffee plantations in Central America, real estate operations, etc., etc. When Mr. Shedd returned to Chicago in 1868 the city was of mushroom construction with a population of 250,000; during his half century residence there he has seen it grow to the second metropolis of America and the greatest food distributing center in the world, with a tenfold increase in population to over 2,500,000.

Mr. Shedd and his brother are two of the very few financial geniuses produced by the Shedd family, and for the past twenty years they have been among the prominent financiers of Chicago. Since 1903 Mr. Charles B. Shedd has been a member of the Board of Trustees of his alma mater, Oberlin College, to which he and his brother jointly donated two funds, one in 1902 of \$10,000 and another in 1906 of \$5,000. He has been much interested in the history of his ancestors, is one of the original members of the Shedd Family Association, was its president from 30 Aug. 1915 to 2 Sept. 1916 when the Shedd memorial monument was dedicated at Quincy, Mass., and has been its historian and genealogist since the death in 1916 of the association's founder, Mr. Frank Edson⁸ Shedd. He is also a member of the Union League Club of Chicago. Among Mr. Shedd's ancestors was Rev. Henry Dunster, first president of Harvard College (1640-1654) his descent being through Jonathan² Dunster, Henry³ Dunster, Martha⁴ Dunster, wife of Edward Dickson, Gilbert⁵ Dickson, and Sally⁶ Dickson, wife of Joshua Shedd the grandfather of Mr. Charles Banks Shedd.

He married in La Grange, Ill., 11 Oct. 1888, MARGARET BOOTH Cossitt, born in La Grange, Tenn., 10 Mar. 1852, daughter of Franklin Dwight and Lucretia Frances James (Malone) Cossitt; her father had a large plantation in La Grange, Tenn., and several years before the Civil War went into the wholesale grocery trade in Chicago, Ill., and founded the suburb of La Grange, Ill., where he settled. The founder of the Cossitt family in America was René Cossitt who came from France in 1710 and settled in Granby, Conn., where his descendants flourished for several generations.

552. WILLIAM GOULD⁷ SHEDD (266. Dea. Joshua Rundle⁶, Capt. Joshua⁵, John⁴, John³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born in Chicago, Ill., 18 Sept. 1848, was but six years old at the time of his father's sudden death. Two years later he was taken by his mother to Oberlin, Ohio, where he was brought up, educated in the schools there, and attended Oberlin College but left before graduation. For a short period he was employed in a bank in Wellington, Ohio, and then by the "Advance," a Chicago newspaper; but the confining work affected his health, so about 1871 he joined the Cope Geological Expedition which traversed and examined great tracts of territory lying east of the Rocky Mountain ranges, made many important discoveries and had several exciting experiences and skirmishes with roving bands of Indians.

His health restored by this outdoor life, he again entered journalism and became proprietor and editor of the "Boulder County Courier" at Boulder, Colo. During the exciting political campaign of 1876 his newspaper did much to swing Colorado, an uncertain State, into the Republican column so that its electoral vote was cast for Mr. Hayes, without which he would not have been elected president. Later Mr. Shedd became a mining engineer and was interested in mining properties in Leadville, Colo.; he also lived some years in Denver, Colo. Since retiring from active business, in which he was successful, he has resided in Los Angeles and Santa Barbara, Cal.

553. EDWARD AVERY⁷ SHEDD (266. Dea. Joshua Rundle⁶, Capt. Joshua⁵, John⁴, John³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born on Michigan Avenue in Chicago, Ill., 1 Mar. 1851. Three years later his

father died suddenly, and two years afterwards his mother moved with her three young children to Oberlin, Ohio, where she could secure better opportunities to educate them. After attending the public schools in Oberlin he entered Oberlin College and graduated A.B. in 1873. His natural talents for a financial career were early manifested and after leaving college he at once went to his native city of Chicago and secured a position in the packing house of B. F. Murphy and Company where he worked about six months. In the spring of 1874 he started in the ice business, bringing ice to Chicago from Oshkosh, Wis.; the next winter he built his first ice house on the Calumet River, secured a large stock, and during the winter and summer of 1875 supplied the ice for the first large cold storage warehouse built by Philip D. Armour at the Union Stock Yards in Chicago, with a capacity of 15,000 tons. This experiment of Mr. Armour inaugurated the refrigerating and cold storage system of the Chicago meat packers, which revolutionized the business and later spread over the country. In 1876 Mr. Shedd was joined in the ice business by his eldest brother. Charles Banks⁷ Shedd, in the firm of E. A. Shedd and Company, and by their great abilities and combined energies the business had a very rapid growth and success, and they soon became the largest ice dealers in Chicago. After ten years of profitable success, in 1885 they secured control of some other ice companies and consolidated the business into a corporation as the Knickerbocker Ice Company. Mr. Edward Avery Shedd became the largest stockholder and the president of this corporation and continued at the head of it until 1898 when he and his brother sold out their interests to some eastern capitalists. The business had been very successful and the Shedd brothers retired from it with large fortunes. They then became general capitalists, under the name of E. A. Shedd and Company, and have financed many important enterprises, including steam railroads, electric railroads, coal and iron mines, coffee plantations, real estate developments, etc., etc.

Mr. Edward Avery Shedd is a director of the Corn Exchange National Bank, of the Chicago Title and Trust Company and of the North Shore and Milwaukee Electric Railroad. He and his brother have jointly given to their *alma mater*, Oberlin College, \$15,000 for two funds, known as the E. A. and C. B. Shedd Funds. These two brothers are among the very few members of the Shedd family to be gifted with striking business abilities, and during the past score of years they have been prominent financiers of Chicago, which during their half-century career there has grown from a small, provincial city to the world's greatest food distributor and a metropolis of 2,500,000 population. Mr. Shedd is a member of various organizations, including the Union League Club, Chicago Athletic Club, Mid-Day Club, and Flossmoor Country Club, all of Chicago.

He married first, in Butler, Mo., 13 Oct. 1881, HELEN COWLES WHEELER, daughter of B. G. and Helen (Cowles) Wheeler and niece of Alfred Cowles of the "Chicago Tribune"; she had no children and died in Chicago 26 July 1884.

He married secondly, in Concord, N. H., 1 Feb. 1915, MRS. CHRISTIANA (MACLEAN) MACLENNAN, born in Prince Edward Island, Canada, about 1865, daughter of Alan and Christine (MacKenzie) MacLean; they have no children.

554. WILLIAM JOSHUA⁷ SHEDD (268. William Henry⁶, Capt. Joshua⁵, John⁴, John³, Samuel², Daniel¹), born at Deep River, Lake County, Ind., 17 Dec. 1859, attended Oberlin College but did not complete his course, as he left in 1878 to enter the employ in Chicago of his cousins, Edward Avery⁷ Shedd and Charles Banks⁷ Shedd, in the firm of E. A. Shedd and Company, ice merchants. The business rapidly increased to large proportions and in 1885 was incorporated as the Knickerbocker Ice Company in which Mr. William Joshua⁷ Shedd became a stockholder and also a director, general manager and vice-president. He continued in these offices and also after 1907 as vice-president of the Consumers Company until the two corporations were consolidated in 1913 with the City Fuel Company into the present Consumers Company of which he was made the first vice-president. Later he became president of the W. J. Shedd Company of Chicago and resides (1920) in Midlothian, a suburb of that city.





John³, Nathan², Daniel¹), born in Lowell, Mass., 29 Dec. 1844, was a life-long resident of his native city and in his later years also had a large summer estate in Tilton, N. H. In his fourteenth year he went to work for E. A. Samuels and later for E. W. Hoyt and Company, medicine manufacturers. At the age of seventeen years he enlisted in the Civil War for three years and on 9 Aug. 1862 was mustered in as a private in Co. A, Thirty-Third Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry; on account of his knowledge of drugs, on 24 Apr. 1863, he was promoted to the post of hospital steward of the regiment, in which office he served efficiently until the close of the war, receiving his discharge on 11 June 1865. During his career in the army his regiment took part in the battles of Chancellorsville, Beverly Ford, Gettysburg and Lookout Mountain, the various battles for Atlanta, and Gen. Sherman's campaign through Georgia to Savannah.

Returning from the army to Lowell, he again entered the employ of E. W. Hoyt and Company, soon became a member of the firm, and on the death of Mr. Hoyt in 1887 became the sole proprietor of the business. The company expanded largely into the manufacture of perfumes and toilet artilces and by skilful, extensive advertising developed a very large and profitable business, so that Mr. Shedd who started work as a lad with nothing, in a business career of half a century acquired a fortune estimated at between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 at the time of his decease.

In his later years Mr. Shedd became much interested in yachting and was a member of the Boston Yacht Club, the Eastern Yacht Club and other similar organizations. Among his notable yachts were the schooner *Brenda* and the sloop *Recreation* in which he made several summer cruises along the New England coast. In 1905 he had built for him the ketch *Amber Jack*, a small but easily handled and very seaworthy craft which he used for several winter cruises about the Bahama Islands, where he enjoyed trolling for kingfish, amberjack, dolphin, and other large ocean game fish. After his death the *Amber Jack* was given by his estate to Dr. Grenfell for his mission work on the Labrador Coast. Mr. Shedd was also a member of several Masonic bodies, including Mount Horeb Royal Arch Chapter, Ahasuerus Council of Royal and Select Masters, and Pilgrim Commandery of Knights Templar.

Mr. Shedd gave evidence of strong public spirit in his life time and even more so in the will disposing of his estate. About 1905 he gave fifty acres of land to the city of Lowell to be used for public playgrounds, both for adults and children, with baseball and football fields, tennis courts, running tracts etc.; this donation is known as Shedd Park. In his offer of this gift Mr. Shedd said: "I was born in Lowell, have always lived here and hope to die here. All my success in life has come in Lowell and I feel I wish to leave behind me some sort of monument which will be of use and benefit to the people of the city." During his life time M r Shedd also established a trust fund for the benefit of some of his near relatives. At his death in 1913 he left only a widow and one unmarried daughter in her fortieth year, and by his will left his whole estate in trust, the whole income thereof to be paid to his widow and daughter for life; if the latter dies childless, at her decease \$100,000 is to go to the City of Lowell for improvements in Shedd Park, \$100,000 to the Berry School of Rome, Ga., \$100,000 to the Moody School for Girls at Northfield, Mass., and the residue to the Lowell General Hospital to be used especially for the treatment and care of incurables. In his last years Mr.

His boyhood was spent on a farm in his native town, but he later resided in Jaffrey, N. H., whither his parents removed in 1872, pursuing studies that were preparatory for a higher education, and in 1876 entered Dartmouth College. After a full course of engineering study in the Chandler Scientific Department, he graduated with honors in the summer of 1880, receiving a degree of B.S. During and after his college course some time was employed in teaching schools to provide the necessary funds to continue his studies, but he gave this up to engage more directly in practical engineering work.

The season of 1881 was spent in the Coast and Geodetic Survey Service of the United States Government, under Col. William H. Dennis, in charting a portion of the coast of Eastern Maine. For five years thereafter he was engaged in civil engineering and surveying work and in connection with building contractors in the cities of Lowell, Boston and Lawrence, Mass.

In April 1887 he entered the employ of the firm of Lockwood, Greene & Co., mill architects and engineers of Boston, whose specialty is the designing and equipping of industrial plants in all parts of the country. He was engaged as superintendent of construction work in various places for several years, was later advanced to be chief engineer for the firm in this work, and on the incorporation of the business in 1902 became vice-president and one of the directors of the corporation. After his marriage in 1887 he resided for a few years in various places where the demands of his business required, then from 1890 to 1897 in Roxbury, Mass., and thereafter in Dorchester, Mass.

(Since the above account of himself by Mr. Frank Edson Shedd gives but a modest and much too meagre account of his life, especially of his later years, it is desirable to insert here the following account of Mr. Shedd's life, achievements and characteristics, as prepared for the "Register" of the Shedd Family Association for 1916, shortly after his death in Dorchester, Mass., 22 Sept. 1916.)


FRANK EDSON SHEDD

FRANK EDSON SHEDD passed from mortal view on 22 Sept. 1916. How much is contained in this simple sentence! To his Shedd kindred how deep a regret and how genuine a grief this little sentence awakens! Surely no society has ever suffered a deeper loss than has ours in the death of the founder and the most interested, active and competent of its officers. Nor is it a mere "corporate" loss. No member of the association ever came into personal contact with Frank E. Shedd without a sense not only of his unfailing courtesy, his fine tact, his quiet unpretentiousness and his genuine ability, but also an appreciation of his simple and unaffected friendliness.

> New Hampshire's bosom of granite, By sun and tempest wooed, No weakling gives to the planet, Nurses no puny brood.

Frank Edson Shedd was born in Sharon, New Hampshire on 18 July 1856. His boyhood was passed in the stirring days of that important period in our history which culminated in the Civil War, which ended when he was a lad of nine years. That part of New Hampshire is still a typical New England community. The lad had the training which goes into the life of a community of that sort. His surroundings, unchanged except in degree, were those which were brought to Plymouth in 1620. The independent church, the free town meeting, the common school, the bulwarks of the democracy and restraint of our forefathers, the heritage of us all, were things with which in his youth he was familiar in a way that city-bred lads miss, and his training in this environment came at a time when there was a great resurgence of national patriotism, and when freedom was a very tangible thing and its preservation and highest attainment in genuine dispute. It is no wonder that in after years he felt strongly the desirability of preserving the ideals of the fathers and believed that a banding together in friendship and patriotic purpose of those whose heritage was similar was a consummation devoutly to be wished. From the ungraded country school he went to the Conant High School in Jaffrey, N. H., which town had become his home, and then entered the chief seat of learning of his native State, Dartmouth College.

The college at Hanover was not then the large and magnificent institution it is today. It had not many splendid buildings. It was more famous as the *alma mater* of Daniel Webster than for

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great successes upon the diamond or gridiron. But it was a New England collegiate democracy where the classes of about seventyfive members were too small for divisions into sets or cliques. Young Shedd enjoyed college life heartily. He won no especial fame at sports, but he was no weakling and he participated in them in a minor way. He joined one of the two fraternities which flourished at Dartmouth in those days, the Vitruvian, and in one of his charming letters, written in apology for an enforced absence from a reunion five years ago, he speaks of the initiations which "were a feature long to be remembered by the 'Quarters'" and where "profiting by veiled suggestions many a husky six-footer dressed himself in clothes he kept only for rushes, with perhaps his rubber boots and a heavy sweater, when he made his first entrance along with the goat into the inner chamber of light and beauty." But young Shedd did not enter college to play foot ball, to indulge in pranks or even to experience the enlivening intercourse of fraternity life. He enjoyed these, of course, but they were only incidental to his environment, and his serious purpose was one commoner then, alas, than now,-genuine scholarship. Too human to be a "grind" he was too much in earnest not to be a faithful and painstaking student, and he held his own among a class which contained mostly fellows who were taking college as seriously as he. His mechanical and scientific turn of mind is shown by the circumstance that during this period he constructed a telephone from the material at his command at Hanover, merely from a newspaper description of the then new invention which had come to his attention.

On his graduation in 1880, like so many other men who have attained prominence, he turned his hand to school teaching, accepting an offer to become principal of a country high school and entering upon his duties the following autumn. Doubtless the high school curriculum was less exacting then than it is today, but he must have been a young man of grounded scholarship and varied attainments to have carried it on with only one assistant. It is not easy to teach higher mathematics for an hour and then in turn take up history, English literature and languages. Of course, he had not fixed on school teaching as a career, but had taken it up in a self-respecting way as the first immediate means to a livelihood, just as he had utilized it before as an assistance in paying his collegiate expenses. Therefore as his year ended he must have been delighted at the opportunity to become acting aid in the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey. His work was under the supervision of a seasoned engineer and they charted a short but tremendously irregular bit of the Maine coast, the map lines showing over a hundred miles of detail for five miles

as the crow would fly from point to point. He expected to continue in this line of work the next year, but while waiting for orders from Washington he filled in a few weeks with a civil engineer in Lowell and found the work so attractive that it became his profession, and for four years he was employed in Lowell and Boston with surveying and construction supervision. In the spring of 1886 Mr. Shedd became resident engineer for the construction of the Washington Mills at Lawrence, Mass.— one of the largest pieces of mill-engineering that had been undertaken in this country up to that time.

From that time on his position as a leader in his profession was assured. It was his first connection with the firm of Lockwood, Greene & Co., of which he was destined to become so important a part, and a connection which was never broken during his life. for on the completion of this work he joined their permanent force in Newburyport, where they were then located. He was resident engineer on a power plant in Rhode Island, a linoleum plant in New Jersey, and a hydraulic development and woolen mill in the heart of Maine. In 1889 the business was transferred to Boston and he became first assistant to Mr. Stephen Greene, at that time the sole member of the firm. On the death of the head of the firm, Mr. Greene, in 1901, his intent to incorporate the business was carried out by his estate and with that incorporation in 1902 Mr. Shedd became vice-president of the Company, which office he held until his death, also being one of the Board of Directors. Those who visited Mr. Shedd in his office, whether they knew little or much of engineering, could not but be impressed by the magnitude of a business that required so much office room in the heart of a city where floor space in firstclass buildings is so precious. Originally devoted to the designing and erection of textile mills, the business now serves almost the entire industrial field, specializing in hydro-electric plants, steam and electric stations and modern fireproof construction of shops, factories and warehouses. This business has extended over the entire country and the firm has borne a large part in the development of the industrial South through the many cotton mills it has erected there. It has branch offices in New York City, Atlanta, Chicago and elsewhere. Its most recent development has been the organization of a department for the reorganization, operation and management of textile mills.

Few men of the great business responsibility of Mr. Shedd would have had the disposition to enter so whole-heartedly into historic and genealogical matters as did he. For many years before the organization of the Shedd Family Association he was at work upon data contained in town histories, the town records

of births, marriages and deaths, the deeds of real estate and the probate records concerning the descendants of Daniel Shed. He entered into correspondence with many of the family name in all parts of the country and prepared a huge amount of data on the subject. This work was done thoroughly and unselfishly for the benefit of all. Finally his facts were in such shape that he called together a few members of the family, formed a committee and issued a call to form a family association at Billerica, on August 30, 1911. Thus many of us learned that a genial and kindly gentleman whom we did not know personally, and in some instances had never heard of, knew, in some particulars, more about us than we knew ourselves. What came out of that meeting is known to all who will read this sketch and need not be recounted. All members of our family know that our prosperous association would never have had an existence nor been nursed through a precarious infancy but for Frank Edson Shedd. Up to the time of his death he was the most active and interested of its members. As secretary he did much hard and not always fully appreciated work. As the founder of the association he gathered much genealogical data of permanent value. And the culminating event of the family history to the present date, the erection of the Shedd Monument, is due more to him than to any other man. The conception was his, the design, — of a simple dignity and beauty not surpassed in any similar memorial,- was his, and the activity in making the erection possible was his also. Nor were his interests limited to the association as a body. He was a kind and sympathetic friend to all who claimed his friendship and upon many occasions his charity was found to be both genuine and unobtrusive.

Although the affairs of the association were so close to him that they might be termed an avocation, his interests were not narrow. He was a member of the Second Congregational Church of Dorchester and was active in its affairs. He was a member of St. John's Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons, in Boston, the oldest masonic fraternity in the United States, and also a companion in the Mount Vernon Royal Arch Chapter. He belonged also to the American Society of Civil Engineers. the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, and to the Boston Society of Civil Engineers. A loyal son of his native State, he was a member of the New Hampshire Historical Society. His interest in ancestry led him naturally into the New England Historic Genealogical Society of Boston of which he was a life member and for some years a member of the library committee. He was also a member of the National Geographic Society.

He resided in Dorchester for the last twenty years of his life.

His home on Melville Avenue, one of Dorchester's finest streets, was one of refinement and substantial comfort, typical of himself and the dear lady whom he had married in 1887, and who in his own words "by her care and help" had made his "life most happy." Maurice Parker Shedd, a lad of nearly seventeen, and an enthusiastic life member of the Association, as is his mother also, is the only surviving child.

The Shedd Family began to congratulate itself, about a year ago, on the certainty of the erection of an adequate memorial to our first American ancestor. Soon after, however, those nearest to the secretary began to notice a physical failing which they at first attributed to overwork. It soon became evident that the trouble was of a deeper nature. There was no diminution of activity on his part however in bringing the monument forward. Month by month his plans approached completion; month by month the nameless dread of his family and friends increased until at least we knew that he would not be with us long. The onward march of disease was temporarily stayed by an operation in the early summer, borne with calmness and cheer. At last the monument was ready and the dedication arranged for. Frail and feeble, he attended the ceremonies. All present knew that he would not join again in a celebration by his kinsfolk. At the end of the day, surely "the end of a perfect day," he was carried home and there on the twenty-second day of September, Frank Edson Shedd passed away.

On the following Monday his kinsfolk and friends gathered in the "Old White Church" of Dorchester to pay their final tribute of love and honor. The beautiful floral piece which the Association sent, as nearly adequate as such a tribute could be, was but a feeble expression of our deep sorrow. Our hearts echoed the words of one of our minor poets:

> "Another parting sail we see, Another ship has left the shore, A kinder soul on board has she, Than ever left land before, And as her way she outward bends, Sit closer, friends."

Next day he was taken to East Jaffrey and after a short impressive service in his old home church among his old friends he was laid in the simple country cemetery in sight of his beloved New Hampshire hills.

He filled a large place in the business world. He filled a larger place in the hearts of those who knew him. One of his friends says: "He was a high-minded citizen and represented the highest ideals of human life; he rendered a large service to his fellow-men; he was an honor to his profession and has left behind him a name which ought to be an inspiration and help to us all for higher and better things." A gentleman, in the fullest and most rugged sense, there was a sweetness in his character that will be long remembered by his kin.

> "His life was gentle and the elements So mixed in him that nature might stand up, And say to all the world, 'This Was A Man!'"

At the age of eighteen years he went to work as a bookkeeper in Boston and three years later in 1861 entered the employ, as an accountant, of the firm of Jordan, Marsh and Company, with which notable house he remained connected until his death, a period of nearly half a century. At about the time he started with this firm the Civil War broke out, and temporarily relinquishing his commercial career for the call to national duty, he volunteered for the Union army and on 14 Aug. 1862 was mustered as private into Co. K, Thirteenth Massachusetts Volunteers. At first he was assigned to duty in the office of the Adjutant General in Washington, D. C., but the next summer he went to the front with his company, was captured by the confederates while he was caring for wounded soldiers, and was sent to Libby Prison. Fortunately an exchange of prisoners the next day returned Mr. Shedd to the Union army, so he escaped the hardships of confinement in the confederate prisons. He continued in the service until 1 Dec. 1863, when he was discharged.

Returning to Boston he resumed his place with Jordan, Marsh and Company. The business of this firm continually increased and in course of time was expanded from a purely dry-goods trade into the largest and highest grade department store in the city. Mr. Shedd grew with the business and as time passed was advanced to posts of continually increasing importance and responsibility. Mr. Eben D. Jordan, Sr., the founder of the business, died in 1895, but his even more able son of the same name succeeded him as senior partner and developed the business to still larger proportions. In 1901 the establishment was incorporated as the Jordan Marsh Company of which Mr. Shedd was made treasurer and he continued in this office until his death at his home in Newton Center, Mass., 9 Feb. 1908. Mr. Eben D. Jordan, Jr., the eminent head of the company, said of him: "Nothing too extravagant regarding Mr. Shedd's character and ability can be said. His splendid qualities cannot be exaggerated. His amiability, generosity and shrewdness, his conscientious devotion to his home, his work and his God, made of him an example for any young man, or older man, too, to emulate. He was consistent and competent, and his commendable qualities were continuously displayed."

After his marriage in 1865, Mr. Shedd continued to live in Cambridge until 1870 when he moved to West Somerville, Mass., where he became one of the founders of the Day Street Church. In 1895 he removed to Newton Center and became a prominent member of the First Church, serving as treasurer of their building fund and also as deacon for several years. 

went to work in a store in Boston, Mass., where he remained a short period, and then for another brief time was an attendant at the State Insane Asylum at Taunton, Mass. In October 1859 he went to Oneida in Knox County, Ill. (where his sister, Mrs. John G. Graves and her family also located), and remained there through the winter. On 12 Apr. 1860 he and a friend joined a company of emigrants starting for California and Oregon with ox and horse teams. They crossed the Missouri River on 6 May at Council Bluffs, Iowa, where they laid in their final supplies; there was then not a single house on the opposite side of the river where the large city of Omaha, Neb., now (1920) stands, and before them lay a vast area almost uninhabited by white men. Proceeding with their ox teams across the present states of Nebraska, Wyoming, Utah and Nevada, they arrived on 11 August at Honey Lake Valley in northeastern California; during the three months after leaving Council Bluffs they had seen no white men except the parties travelling the same route westward as themselves. They then continued their journey northwestward and on 2 Sept. 1860 arrived at Jacksonville, Ore., four months and twenty days from the time of leaving Knox County, Ill., having driven their ox teams about 2260 miles in this time, averaging about sixteen miles per day. For over four years he drifted about in what is now the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho without much success, and in March 1865 returned to his father's home in Langdon, N. H., broken down in health. Recovering finally from a long illness, in the autumn of 1866 he went to Weston in McLean County, Ill., where he bought a tract of land and erected a house. Here he resided nearly thirty years, engaged in farming, and held various township offices, like supervisor and assessor. In November 1894 he retired from active work and moved into the nearby town of Fairbury, Ill., where he held the office of justice of the peace and died 30 Jan. 1911, aged seventy-six years.

He married in Unity, N. H., 27 Jan. 1868, RHODA M. GRAVES, born there 13 Jan. 1834, daughter of John and Rhoda (Gilman) Graves; they at once left for the home he had prepared the previous year in Weston, Ill. She died in their later residence in Fairbury, Ill., 21 Feb. 1905.

723. JOHN GRAVES⁸ SHEDD (471. William⁷, Silas⁶, William⁵, Daniel⁴, Daniel³, Samuel², Daniel¹), was born on a farm in Alstead, N. H., 20 July 1850, the youngest of a family of eight children. When five years of age he was taken by his parents in their removal to the adjoining town of Langdon, N. H., where he was brought up on his father's farm and even as a lad performed a man's work about the place. Such a life with its lack of opportunity for advancement, its isolation from social and intellectual activities, its narrow vision, and its small financial prospects, did not appeal to a youth of his talents, energy and ambition, and he resolved to adopt a commercial career. Before he was seventeen




BIRTHPLACE OF JOHN G. SHEDD, ALSTEAD, N. H.

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years of age he therefore left his father's farm to strike out for himself, and on 13 June 1867 secured a position in the small grocery store of Solomon Sanders at Bellows Falls, Vt., with wages of \$1.50 a week and board. He remained there nearly a year and then on 1 June 1868 took a position in the general store of Timothy Tufts in his native town of Alstead, N. H.; a fire in September 1868 suspended this business, but Mr. Shedd at once entered the employ of James H. Porter who had another general store in Alstead. Here he continued until 1 Apr. 1870 when he accepted a position with C. A. Parkhurst and Company who had a dry-goods store, and he remained with them until August 1871, leaving to enter the employ of B. H. Burt of Rutland, Vt., who at that time had the leading dry-goods store in Vermont. Mr. Shedd remained here nearly a year, and then, having by five years of close application learned the rudiments of the dry-goods trade, he decided at the age of twenty-two years to enter a larger field of opportunity than that afforded by small New England towns. In the autumn of 1871 the mushroom city of Chicago, then of about 300,000 population, had been nearly overwhelmed by the great historic fire; but from its commanding location it was destined to rise speedily from its ashes and with phenomenal growth to become the metropolis of the West with a nearly tenfold increase in population in half a century. With the keen, far-sighted judgment he has always displayed, Mr. Shedd chose that city for his permanent career. On 7 Aug. 1872 he became a clerk in the employ of Field, Leiter and Company, even then the largest and most enterprising wholesale and retail dry-goods house in Chicago, which ten years later became the eminent firm of Marshall Field and Company. Mr. Field and his associates were men of extraordinary commercial ability and with the rapid growth of the city the business expanded to great proportions and eventually became the largest dry-goods house and department store in the world. Five months after Mr. Shedd entered the employ of this firm he was gratified to have his pay raised to \$14 per week, instead of to \$12 as had been originally stipulated, Mr. Field explaining that this action was in consideration of his notably good work,-"A tribute which pleased me more," said Mr. Shedd in later years, "than any other subsequent advancement in the whole course of my business career." Mr. Shedd gave his concentrated attention to his duties, grasped every opportunity offered, rapidly progressed in usefulness from a salesman to executive positions of increasing responsibility, and grew in powers with the expansion of the business. In 1893 he was admitted to partnership in the firm and soon became a powerful driving influence in its affairs. In 1901 the company was incorporated with Mr. Field as president and Mr. Shedd as vice-president; from this time Mr. Field was less active in the management and Mr. Shedd became the actual directing head of the affairs of the company. On the death of its founder, Mr. Marshall Field, early in 1906, Mr. Shedd succeeded him as president and still (1920) continues at the head of the vast business. The success of this great enterprise has been one of the romances of American commercial life, and the wonderful growth and scientific development of the business of Marshall Field and Company has been due in large part to the extraordinary foresight, the rare imagination, the exhaustless initiative and the inordinate practical ability of John Graves Shedd. When he first entered the store as a youthful clerk in 1872 its sales totalled less than \$15,000,000 a year: half a century later (1920) the company has a business of over \$170,000,000 a year, carrying over a million articles and making annually over 25,000,000 transactions. Mr. Shedd was the first merchant in Chicago to introduce the Saturday half-holiday and is an earnest advocate of healthful working conditions and recreations for the employees.

At the age of seventy, Mr. Shedd is vigorous, both physically and mentally, his good health being due partly to a fine inherited constitution and partly to his participation in healthful recreations like cycling, golf, horseback riding and motoring. He is a man of quiet manner and retiring disposition, shuns ostentation, and carries his wealth and achievements with dignified modesty. He has been a generous but unobstrusive benefactor to numerous worthy causes in Chicago and has donated and endowed a public library with a granite building in his native town of Alstead, N. H., as a memorial to his parents and the parents of his wife, inspired by his yearning when a boy for good literature of which he has always been fond. In addition to the presidency of Marshall Field and Company, Mr. Shedd is a director of the Commonwealth Edison Company, the Merchants' Loan and Trust Company, the Illinois Trust and Savings Bank and the First State Pawners' Society, all of Chicago, is a trustee of the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York, and a director of the Baltimore and Ohio, the Illinois Central, and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroads. His club memberships include: The Chicago, Union League, Commercial, University, Onwentsia, Saddle and Cycle, Old Elm, Shoreacres, Flossmore, Midlothian Country Club and the South Shore Country Clubs, all of Chicago; the Metropolitan and Recess Clubs of New York City; and the Midwick Country Club of Los Angeles, Cal. He has also been a member of the Shedd Family Association from its organization in 1911, has been its president since 30 Aug. 1916, and has been warmly interested in its objects and work, including the publication of this genealogy

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to which he has been a liberal contributor. Since 1898 Mr. Shedd's residence has been on the beautiful Drexel Boulevard in Chicago, and he also has another home "The Blossoms" in Pasadena, Cal., where in recent years he has spent the winter months.





# GENERAL ORDERS No. 1.-

1. It is with particular pride that the Brigade Commander announces to the command the splendid conduct of the following officers and soldiers in action against the enemy as described after their respective names. These splendid examples of courage and heroism are typical of the finest type of American soldier.

1st Lieut. Clyde E. Shedd, M.C., 327th Infantry (Deceased)

On 7 October 1918 at Pleinchamp Farme near St. Juvin, Ardennes, France, during the Meuse-Argonne Offensive, Lieutenant Shedd opened and conducted a dressing station. He worked at this dressing station night and day for three days, administering to the wounded and dying, although constantly subjected to heavy direct artillery and machine-gun fire from the enemy.

On 11 October 1918 Lieutenant Shedd personally led his detachment over the top, following directly in rear of the advancing troops. He showed an entire disregard of personal safety, exposing himself constantly to enemy fire in order that he might better render medical aid to the wounded. His conduct was an inspiration to everyone, and a comfort to the wounded.



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764. REV. WILLIAM AMBROSE<sup>8</sup> SHEDD, D.D. (543. Rev. John Haskell<sup>7</sup>, D.D., Rev. Henry<sup>6</sup>, D.D., John Haskell<sup>5</sup>, Abel<sup>4</sup>, Jonathan<sup>3</sup>, Samuel<sup>2</sup>, Daniel<sup>1</sup>), was born 24 Jan. 1865 at Mount Seir, Persia, in which country his parents resided as Christian missionaries from 1859 to 1870 and from 1878 to 1895. After graduating with honors from Marietta College, Ohio, in 1887, he spent two years in Persia, assisting his parents at the missionary station, and then entered the Princeton Theological Seminary where he graduated in 1892. A few months later he again went to Persia as a Presbyterian Missionary, and to this work he devoted the remainder of his life, a period of a quarter of a century.

Dr. Shedd made for years a scholarly investigation of Mohammedan problems, political, legal and religious, and he also studied with intense zeal the relations between Christianity and Islamism and the best methods of evangelistic approach to Moslems by Christians. One of his greatest interests and most successful efforts was the theological education of young men, both Persians and others, in the Mission College at Urumia of which he was president; from this institution went out many native ministers who through his inspiration and training became successful in converting Mohammedans to Christianity. In addition to his purely religious and educational work, the post Dr. Shedd occupied as head of a small Christian community surrounded by Moslems, required also unofficial semi-diplomatic activities in dealing with the Persian civil and religious authorities. His knowledge of Mohammedan character from long familiarity with the people enabled him to cope successfully with many petty and even some serious annoyances to which the native Christians were continually liable to be subjected. His wide range of activities as teacher, preacher, press manager, editor, author, translator, financier, legal advisor, diplomat, relief director and general administrator covered every phase of missionary work, except the medical. He even maintained for several years an unofficial daily court of justice, and before him as cadi came Moslem and Christian, Turk, Assyrian and Persian, all feeling certain of a square deal and equitable treatment, and knowing this judge to be incorruptible. His severe and unremitting labors broke down his health in 1910, but after recuperating for two years in America, during which period he received the honorary degree of D.D. from Marietta College, he returned to Persia and vigorously resumed all his activities.

The World War, starting in August 1914, soon brought to the missionaries and the native Christians in Mohammedan countries hardships and horrors inconceivable. In this crisis many men of the cloth became by force of circumstances notable statesmen,

and the exalted heroism of Cardinal Mercier of Belgium found counterpart in many other communities. In January 1915 German intrigue among the Turks instigated a "holy war" against the Christians in Asia Minor and Persia, with inevitable persecutions and massacres. Fleeing from Turks and Kurds, over fifteen thousand native Christians in western Persia suddenly took refuge in the six-acre enclosure of the American Mission Station at Urumia. For five months, in a congestion beyond belief, they endured a state of siege, during which an epidemic of typhus fever caused the death of over four thousand of them, including the wife of Dr. Shedd. No mounted cannon, no armed men defended the place: but at the gate stood an American civilian, Dr. Shedd, and over it fluttered an American flag, the sole protection of the Christians from the blood-thirsty Turks. Cut off from all communication with the outside world, Dr. Shedd assumed the management of this heroic community who maintained their position through five months of horrors until relieved by the arrival of a Russian army in June 1915. Three months later Dr. Shedd left for America to secure a much needed rest and to make known the true state of affairs in Persia. In September 1916 he again returned to Persia to soon face even more terrible conditions than before experienced. The total collapse of Russia in the summer of 1917 soon followed by the departure from Persia of the Russian army, again left the Christians of Persia at the mercy of Moslem Turkish bandits. During the winter of 1917-18 clashes and massacres continually increased, culminating in a pitched battle in Urumia on 22 Feb. 1918, in which the greatly outnumbered Christians were victorious. For another five months Urumia was again besieged; and the Christians, without organized government, proper means of defence or adequate supplies, were surrounded by hostile peoples with racial and religious hatred at supreme pitch. Again the burden of command fell on Dr. Shedd, involving a staggering complexity of duties in supervising defence and relief and maintaining order among the various racial elements in the community. Finally, on 31 July 1918, the near approach of a large and organized Turkish army, bent on wholesale massacre, caused a general stampede of all the Christian population in Urumia who fled south to seek the protection of a British force advancing to their relief. During this retreat Dr. Shedd was seized with cholera from which he quickly expired at Sain Kalla, 7 Aug. 1918, and he was buried on a rocky hillside overlooking the road of retreat by which most of the fugitives soon found safety.

His life was rich in many phases of service; as a scholarly teacher, an earnest preacher, an influential unofficial judge or cadi, an administrator of relief, and a leader of tireless energy in momentous crises of danger. His life was devoted to the welfare of others, and in his death he made the supreme sacrifice while helping to save the lives of his fellow Christians.

He was married three times, each of his wives being missionaries. He married first, 21 June 1894, ADELA MYERS, born in Covington, Ky., 20 Aug. 1870, daughter of Hon. Harvey and Susan (Scott) Myers; she was a graduate of Lake Erie Seminary and during her seven years in Persia labored devotedly with her husband in his missionary work, and with courage and cheerfulness in spite of much suffering from disease. She had two children and died in Urumia in 1900.

He married secondly, 24 Apr. 1903, M. LOUISE WILBUR, born in Boonesboro, Iowa, 26 Oct. 1868, daughter of Dwight L. and Edna (Lyman) Wilbur. She was a graduate of Lake Erie Seminary and in 1900 went from Los Angeles to Urumia to be a teacher there; she maintained for him an ideal missionary home and was a worthy helpmeet in his ever growing service to the people. During the horrors of the first siege of Urumia in the spring of 1915 she labored heroically amid the fever-stricken people until she herself was stricken down and succumbed to the dread disease, 17 May 1915. "She died as truly a martyr as though she had fallen under a Kurdish sword." There were two children by this marriage.

He married thirdly, in Urumia, 5 July 1917, MARY EDNA LEWIS, born in Glen Loch, Pa., 15 Jan. 1873, daughter of Jonathan Morris and Angelissa (Richards) Lewis, and a missionary in Urumia since 1903. She bravely shared with her husband the hardships and labors of his final year, including the terrors and perils of the second siege of Urumia in the spring and summer of 1918, accompanied him in the general stampede of the Christians on 31 July, and was at his side at the time of his death a week later, just before the fugitives reached the protection of a British army. 

Nathan<sup>3</sup>, Nathan<sup>2</sup>, Daniel<sup>1</sup>), was born 31 May 1834 in Pepperell, Mass., where his parents were temporarily located for a few months during that year, but they soon settled in his mother's ancestral town of Bridgewater, Mass., where he was brought up and educated in the public schools, and at Bridgewater Academy where he graduated in 1851. From his father he inherited an inventive, mechanical and practical turn of mind, and this, together with his environment, naturally turned his thoughts to engineering for a career. Furthermore this profession then offered unusual opportunities, as it was an era of important railroad development and of the installation of water supply and drainage systems in the larger cities of the northern states. So at the age of seventeen years he entered the office of a prominent civil engineer in Boston and for the next five years studied the profession there and in railroad work in New England and in the West. In 1856 he established an office of his own in Boston, which he continued for thirteen years. During this period he was actively interested in the founding of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology as a means of training young men for the various engineering professions. He was employed to lay out parts of Mount Auburn Cemetery, and was on the Advisory Committee for Improvements at Harvard University, besides developing a large general practice in sanitary and hydraulic engineering.

In 1866 he was invited to report upon a public water supply for the city of Providence, R. I., and later to design a system of sewers as the first comprehensive step for the entire city in that direction. In 1869 Mr. Shedd removed to Providence for the particular purpose of designing and supervising the construction of the extensive

water works for the city; the system was put into partial service in November 1871, and required six years more to complete at a cost of \$4,500,000. Upon the completion of the main water system in 1877, Mr. Shedd resigned his position as chief engineer, and devoted himself to a large private practice on engineering problems in many cities and towns in New England and the Middle States as well as for the United States Government. He was appointed by the governor of Rhode Island on the State Harbor Commission in 1876 and made its chairman; this position he held continuously for almost forty years until his death. He was also commissioner for Rhode Island to the Paris Exposition in 1878, and at that time traveled considerably in Europe studying engineering works, especially those on irrigation and for sewerage disposal. He was also on the commission to establish the Rhode Island and Connecticut State boundaries and was chosen to various other public positions of great trust and responsibility.

On 1 May 1890 he accepted the office of chief engineer of the City of Providence and continued in this position for seven years, and then was retained by the city as consulting engineer for the completion of the sewer system that he had inaugurated many years earlier. Even as late as 1914 he was consulting engineer on problems arising from the needed enlargement of the water system that he laid out more than forty years earlier, due to the great growth of the city. He was also consulted upon many private hydraulic problems for power development, and although in his later years hindered by a weakness of the heart, he continued in active business up to the time of his last illness, and as late as a month before his death he was appointed engineer of the East Hartford Water Works System, a task he could not complete.

Mr. Shedd became a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers in 1869, and was chairman of its committee on sewerage and sanitary engineering at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in 1876. He was also affiliated with the Boston Society of Engineers and the Worcester County Engineers, with the New England Water Works Association, the Rhode Island Historical Society and many other social and scientific associations. Brown University conferred an honorary degree of A.M. upon Mr. Shedd in 1894.

His private family life was always especially pleasant. For many years his home was at "Highbank" in North Smithfield, on the edge of the city of Woonsocket, where a broad and attractive view of the surrounding country for many miles was afforded. Here, upon a few acres of land, he planted many rare trees and flowers and rejoiced to have his friends visit him. He had a warm interest in the objects and work of the Shedd Family Association, and at its first general meeting, held at Billerica on 30 Aug. 1911, was chosen its first president, and continued in the office over four years until his death. At all the gatherings of the Association he was an earnest, active participant, and his courteous manner, benignant smile and clear, sensible, well-expressed ideas won the affection and esteem of all present. His life is well epitomized by his own modest opinion of the characteristics of the Shedd family as expressed in his address at one of the reunions when he said: "I think we are congenial and sympathetic and wish to do things to help somebody else when the only reward is the comfort of having done a kind act." He died at his home in North Smithfield, R. I., 27 Nov. 1915, aged eighty-one years.

In early life he evinced many traits that to some come only with training. He had strong ideas of justice with a spirit of generosity and of gentleness which the stress of an active business career begun at sixteen years did not diminish. He was always courteous and gentle, simple in his tastes, unostentatious in manner, believing that living through each day according to the best of one's ability lay the secret of a useful life. While to some it is given to perform great deeds in behalf of humanity or the nation, to others is given the privilege to live as great lives in the quiet of their own families and amid the usual circumstances of human life. This latter was his share and nobly performed."



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
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
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
