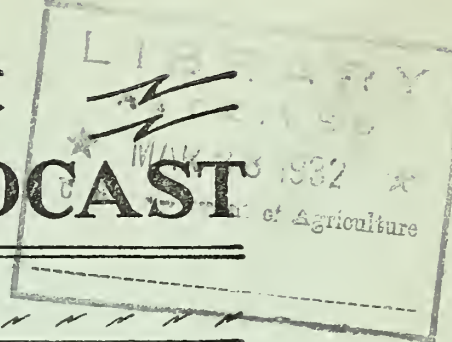

Vocational Guidance, Handicraft, and Purebred Pigs
to be Covered in May 7 4-H Radio Program
Marine Band to Feature America's Favorite Songs

"Many club members have been enabled to interpret their own abilities in the light of 4-H training and experience received and to choose their life work more wisely," says Mrs. Esther Brucklacher, county club agent at Martinsburg, W. Va. "Furthermore, 4-H activities have in many instances provided club members with an impetus that has carried them over obstacles in the road to the desired career." Mrs. Brucklacher, who was formerly an Iowa club girl, will tell on the May 7 4-H radio program how 4-H club work influenced her career. . . W. A. Lloyd, who is in charge of extension work in the West for the U. S. Department of Agriculture, will outline his views on how club work has helped farm boys and girls to crystallize their ambitions and, while still young, to focus their thoughts and actions on pursuits that fit into their life plans. . . Last year Walter Todd, who has been an Indiana club boy for 7 years, raised a litter of 9 purebred pigs that weighed 1,941 pounds at 6 months of age, just 59 pounds short of making the ton litter in the adult project. Last December he won a \$300 scholarship offered to exhibitors at the International Livestock Exposition. Walter will tell how good methods in raising pigs make for economical production and larger profit. . . Since she entered club work six years ago Gladys Snyder, a member of the Cheerful Workers' Club of Berkeley County, W. Va., has never failed to complete a 4-H project. Among the activities in which she has been successful is 4-H handicraft work. Many useful and beautiful articles are made by club members from leather, rubber, feathers, and other inexpensive material or from discarded articles. Gladys will emphasize the economic importance of this work to the club member. . . The music achievement test has for its subject on this program America's Favorite Songs, which will be played by the U. S. Marine Band and explained by Ray Turner. . . The National 4-H club radio program is broadcast on the first Saturday of each month over 60 radio stations associated with the National Broadcasting Co. The programs are arranged by the U. S.
