ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1850,

Presented 6th January, 1851.

YOUR Committee of Management about to retire from the administration of the affairs of the Society, by the expiration of their term of office, have the honor in accordance with invariable practice, to submit to you, a brief statement of their proceedings during the last twelve months.

The performance of this duty, on the present occasion, is divested of much of the interest experienced by former boards in other times, from the absence of all prominent or salient points, to arrest the attention of Members, or to require any lengthened notice from the Board. The Society during the year has followed the even tenor of its way, healing the sick, relieving the blind, and succouring the destitute, quietly and without ostentation.

It is the peculiar duty of the Board at this season to congratulate the Members of the comparative healthy state of the Society, and the small loss in our members experienced in the past year. Through the blessing of the Almighty we have to regret the death of one only of our members in Quebec, and of but two others abroad, or three in all out of a roll of 205. Mr. John Grainger, the oldest of our departed friends, was known to almost every man in Quebec; in him the Society has lost a useful member. one highly esteemed for his strict integrity, punctuality in business, and sterling good sense, qualities which have long characterised the English merchant. Mr. Wm. B. Poston, a life member, and son of one of our original and most worthy members, died at the early age of 25, urged on by the spirit of enterprise, which has long rendered the sons of St. George insensible to danger, whether of the field, of the ocean, or of climate,-he left his home in 1849, on a visit to California, where he fell an untimely victim to the effects of an unhealthy atmosphere. Mr. W. J. C. Benson, the account of whose premature death came recently upon us with startling suddenness, was a gentleman whom the Society and the community at large will long regret; his active benevolence, liberal disposition, and gentlemanly deportment, so becoming to the high position he had rapidly attained in the commercial world, had gained him many friends; the gap caused by his unexpected death, in his 33rd year, will not soon be filled up.

The attention of the Board was early directed to the necessity of remodelling the By-Laws of the Society, so as to render them conformable to the Act of Incorporation obtained in 1849, but that important matter has not yet been matured by the Sub-Committee appointed to that duty, your Board, therefore, recommend this subject to the consideration of their successors.

The only event connected with the Society, which has occurred during the past year, and which it becomes the duty of the Board to notice, is the celebration of our anniversary on St. George's day, an event of abiding interest with the Society-no part of the duty of the Board has given greater satisfaction to all concerned, than the preparation for, and the triumphant success of the festival of 1850. The Banners of St. George and St. David were early displayed on the morning of St. George's Day; at the usual honr a goodly array of the Members were duly marshalled under them, and marched in procession to the Cathedral, the morning prayers were read by Dr. Mackie, and the lessons by the Rev. Armine Mountain, B. A., the Chaplains to the Society, and a most eloquent and instructive sermon delivered by the Lord Bishop, the Patron of the Society, being the third anniversary sermon which his Lordship has preached in compliance with the solicitations of the Boards of Management within a comparatively short period, thus marking his continued solicitude for the well-being of the Society. The musical service, conducted by S. Codman, Esq., with his usual ability, kindly aided by several ladies and gentlemen amateurs of distinguished talent, was acknowledged to have surpassed in solemn sublimity and imposing grandeur any similar service previously performed

The anniversary was concluded by a brilliant ball and magnificent supper at St. George's Hotel in the evening. The ball was well attended by the members and their families, and numerous subscribers of other origins, thus affording an opportunity, not only to the sons of St. George and St. David, to cultivate feelings of good will, springing from a social and friendly intercourse, but enabling the wives, sisters, and daughters of members to mingle in the merry throng, and participate in the joy which is felt by all true hearted descendants of England on St. George's Day ;---the departure from the old practice, introduced this year by the substitution of a ball instead of a dinner, could not previously have been done, the constitution of the Society from its establishment in 1835, up to the period of the passing of the Act of Incorporation, 30th May. 1849, having rendered it imperative to include a dinner among the observances of the day, the former constitution having been superseded by the Act of Incorporation, which forms as it were the new constitution of the Society, and in which the rule is omitted, enabled the Board, with the consent of the Society at large to vary, and it is hoped to improve upon the mode of celebrating the last anniversary. Although, therefore, the Board cannot fuil to congratulate the Society upon the complete success of the St. George's Ball, they wish not to be understood to lay it down as a

fixed rule, never to be departed from, that a ball should always be given, they freely admit, that on many occasions, and under circumstances impossible to foresee, a dinner might be more appropriate, and better suited to the interests and objects of the Society, and the feelings of the Members. The paramount importance of the proceedings of the Charitable Committee next claim the notice of the Board, it is our pleasing duty to acknowledge that the gentlemen forming that committee have zealously discharged their benevolent task and, in administering the relief which the increased resources of the Society, has enabled them to dispense to a large number of our fellow countrymen, who have been overtaken by misfortune, it is but just to add they have evinced a sound judgment, wise discrimination, and praiseworthy generosity, the number of cases relieved the year amount to 44—and the amount expended to £87 9s. 5d., principally in providing infirm persons with passages to England, or in forwarding poor emigrants to their friends in other parts of the province, in board and lodging and donations of money, &c. The details are given in the report of the Charitable Committee.

The Board refer with extreme satisfaction to the report of the Treasurer, which for the 15th time shows a constant steady yearly increase in the funds, this happy result is not to be attributed to fortuitous causes, it is due chiefly to the benevolent feeling and love of their kindred which dwells in every English breast, stimulated it must be admitted by the untiring perseverance and zealous care of Mr. Symes our respected treasurer, they further beg to direct attention to the report of the Committee of Accounts showing the actual state of the funds, and proving in a manner which defies all doubt, that the prosperity of the Society is permanent and increasing.

The happy exemption of the Society from any serious diminution of its numbers by death, and the addition of five new members during the year, has slightly increased the total number on the roll, it is much to be desired, that the efforts of members during the ensuing year may be directed towards augmenting our numbers by enlisting such of our countrymen who have not joined our ranks, to enroll themselves under our banners, the adoption of a proposal to reduce the fee for life membership to £5 would materially contribute to this object. `

In concluding the report, the Board cannot fail to congratulate the Society on the prosperous condition we have attained, an existence of fifteen years, attended by a constant increase of numbers, of strength and of resources has gained for the Society a corporate character, and ensures it an enduring stability.

All which is nevertheless respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE CHARITABLE COMMITTEE

THE Churitable Committee have much satisfaction in laying a statement of their proceedings before the Society, for the information of the Members, and which will be found to have been more extensive than last year. The number of cases being 44, comprising about 120 persons, who have received assistance to the amount of \pounds 87 9s. 5d.

The Committee has been frequently called together for the purpose of taking into consideration applications for relief; upon such occasions they have invariably carefully enquired into the cases, with a view of affording such relief as would most effectually accomplish the desired object of the applicant.

The following details will shew the diversity of the cases which the Committee have had to dispose of: six cases were provided with passages to England, in most of which the applicants were in a state of bad health ;—in thirteen cases the applicants prayed to be forwarded to Upper Canada, and to different places in the United States, where they had friends, but could not reach them for want of means; two cases were forwarded to Gaspé; two individuals who were afflicted in their eyes, and requested to be sent home in hopes of gaining their sight; five cases had been disabled by severe accidents, some were furnished with clothing, others being sick were temporarily relieved, by a weekly allowance, one whose passage had been provided by the Committee, was shipwrecked at sea and returned to Quebec, and was forwarded at his own request to his friends in Canada West.

The Committee have also to state that amongst the emigrants who arrived during last summer, there were a large number of the poorer class of English, many of whom were brought under the notice of your Committee, and there were two families in particular, who landed in a very destitute condition; after enquiring into their cases, the Committee were induced to make application to H. M. Chief Agent for Emigrants, A. C. Buchanan, Esq., who most kindly granted them a free passage to Toronto, and the Committee deemed it their duty to tender to Mr. Buchanan, on behalf of the St. George's Society, their grateful thanks.

The greater portion of the applicants were strangers in this country, and but for the timely assistance thus afforded to them, they might have lingered in distress and sickness in the midst of a large city, unknown and uncared for; there were others again, who had evidently seen better days, and whose delicate feelings would have prevented their asking a stranger's charity, but who could come with freedom to seck the bounty of their fellow-countrymen.

The Charitable Committee have thus detailed some of the most prominent features of their proceedings, in order that the individual members may equally partake of the pleasure in having provided the means which the Committee have experienced, in the distribution of their bounty.

The Charitable Committee have to thank A. Hawkins, Esq., the Shipping Master of this Port, for having procured a passage home for some of the persons relieved by the Society.

TREASURER'S REPORT

TO THE ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY,

FOR 1850.

The Treasurer, in submitting his Annual Report, has much gratification at being enabled to state, that the pecuniary transactions of the Society during the past year have been highly satisfactory, both as respects the receipts from subscriptions, and the disbursements towards the chief object of the institution, viz.: the relief of their less fortunate brethren of English origin—no less than forty-four cases have received effectual relief, and four of these have been relieved twice during the present year—the total amount given in charity being £87 9s. 5d., exceeding that of the previous year by £14 2s.; the receipts for subscriptions amounts to £40, exceeding the previous year by £10 10s., being in subscriptions for the current year £4, and for arrears £6 10s.

The amount of the Permanent Fund is \pounds 1171 17s. 9d., bearing interest, and \pounds 9 11s. 3d. to the credit of the Charitable Fund.

Since the formation of the St. George's Society, 350 members have been elected, of these 73 have become Life Members, of whom 17 have died, 56 being the present number on the list.

Although statements of the great advantage of Life Memberships to the Society, have been often repeated in the Treasurer's Annual Reports, he begs again to impress the subject upon the minds of the members, and that even at the reduced rate of $\pounds 5$, in lieu of all further subscriptions, it will be equally advantageous to the Society and to those who may in future be disposed to become Life Members. During the 15 years that the Society has been in existence, of the whole number who have become members, not more than 30 have continued to pay the annual subscription for a period of ten years, a large number of the annual subscribers having ceased to be paying members, by death, removal from Quebec, and being erased from the list of members for non-payment of their subscription, and out of 145 subscribing members, only about 44 per cent. have paid this year, which statement the Treasurer feels satisfied must convince the mind of every unprejudiced member who may be disposed to give the subject of Life Members a fair and impartial consideration.
