PLEASE USE ORDER SHEET found in the catalog in making out your order and retain a copy of the order. If you have occasion later on to write us about the order give post-office address under which it was mailed. Orders are filed by post offices, so if you give a different post-office address in writing it is difficult for us to find the order.

WE ACKNOWLEDGE ORDERS when received unless the order, or some part of it, is to be sent at once or within a day or so. If any part is mailed right out that answers as an acknowledgment or if goods can be sent at once or very soon by freight or express we send acknowledgment and notice of shipment at the same time, enclosing Bill of Lading.

WE SEND LARGE SHIPMENTS BY FREIGHT unless otherwise instructed. See table of freight rates below. We have three railroads here at Madison, Chicago and Northwestern, Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul and Illinois Central.

CUSTOMERS PAY TRANSPORTATION CHARGES on all goods unless offered postpaid. Small shipments will be sent by express. There are special express rates on seeds, in the main, 25 per cent less than the merchandise rates.

NO CHARGE FOR PACKING OR CAETAGE. Everything will be securely packed and labeled and delivered free at the Freight, Express or Post Office. All express rates have been reduced since the Parcel Post law went into effect.

ORDER EARLY. Do this for two reasons. We can give your order more careful and prompt attention if received before we get into the rush, and then we will not have to write for permission to substitute for varieties sold out.

OUR THREEFOLD GUARANTEE.

1. QUALITY. We guarantee the quality of the seeds, plants, bulbs and potatoes we send out to the extent that should they not prove as represented we will refill the order or return the money; but we give no further warranty, express or implied, as to description, purity, quality, productiveness or any other matter of any seeds, potatoes, bulbs or plants we send out and will not be responsible for the crop. Goods may be returned if not satisfactory.

2. SAFE ARRIVAL. We guarantee everything we send out to arrive in good order. If potatoes freeze on the road we will refill the order if the time of shipping is left to our discretion. If any goods arrive in bad order, however, bags torn or anything else wrong, have this noted on the freight expense bill which must be sent us so that we can make proper claim. The bill of lading must be returned also. Therefore do not lose the bill of lading.

3. RECEIPT OF MONEY. We will be responsible for all money sent us through the mails, if remittance is made by P. O. or Express Order, Draft or Registered Letter. We will accept personal checks at face value. They look good to us. Small amounts, less than \$1.00, may usually be sent safely in postage stamps or coin.







OLDS' CLOVER SEED.

Wisconsin Is Again a Leader in Clover Seed of All the States.

Red Clover is the most important single item in all the list of field seeds. High grade, recleaned Clover seed is perhaps our greatest specialty. There is no better clover seed than Wisconsin seed and Wisconsin is usually a head of all other states in amount of clover seed produced. Wisconsin's total clover crop the past season according to the Government report was 229,000 bushels and only two states surpassed us, Illinois with 315,000 bushels and Michigan with 240,000 bushels.

We have a little more clover seed in this country than last year according to the Government estimate, which is probably high, but there was no carry over of old seed and there is no prospect this year of any more seed being imported from Europe. It looks, therefore, as if there would not be enough seed to meet the demand. Our advice is buy early. Do not wait. Prices now are reasonable. They are pretty sure to be higher.

We use the utmost care in buying to keep clear of seed containing buckhorn and dodder. These two noxious weeds are very common in clover. We never handle European seed. It is pretty sure to contain buckhorn and dodder and much of it is not adapted to our conditions anyway. Right here we want to warn our customers against buying clover seed that has not been tested. Fortunately for the farmers we have a very stringent seed law here in Wisconsin.

Do not buy cheap untested clover seed. It is the worst kind of folly. You can do untold damage to your farm in a single season. Buy Olds' tested re-cleaned northern grown seed.

GRIMM ALFALFA. (The Alfalfa for Northern Latitudes.)

History. The seed of this variety was brought to Minnesota from Germany in 1857, by a German farmer named Grimm. Prof. W. M. Hays, while at the Minnesota Experiment Station about 1890 found Mr. Grimm growing this alfalfa and at once began calling attention to its hardiness and adaptability to Minnesota conditions.

This was the beginning of Grimm Alfalfa in the United States.





COLD RESISTANT GOLDEN GLOW.

The Best Silage Corn for Central and Upper Wisconsin.

Also Fine for All Sections to Resist Cold Weather Just After Planting.

A new corn of great value which we offered for the first time last year. It is just what its name indicates, a strain of Golden Glow that will resist the cold unfavorable weather we are so apt to have at corn planting time, and permit of earlier planting. With the idea of producing such a corn and something also that would yield well and mature early they worked on this at the Wisconsin Experiment Station for ten years testing it out in different sections. Last year they were ready to have it offered.

Prof. Moore says it is great for the northern counties as it ripens up so early. He says it holds the same size as the common Golden Glow, can be planted two weeks earlier and will keep right on growing in spite of cold weather. If frost hits it, it will come right along again. Prof. Leith says:

"This corn is selected from the high producing Golden Glow corn bred at the Wisconsin Experiment Station. Selection was made for hardiness so that the corn could be planted a week or 10 days earlier than the usual corn planting time and thus lengthen the corn growing season. This corn produces a large stalk averaging as large as the common Golden Glow. It matures a few days earlier and high yields are reported from growers. It is the best silage corn we know of for central and upper Wisconsin."

This last fall after making an inspection trip through the northern part of the state, Prof. Moore estimated that there were nearly 12,000 acres of Cold Resistant corn in Wisconsin. He said: "This is a great year for the new Cold Resistant corn. The new strain has made fine growth and is in many cases taller than the native varieties. The cold season is proving the worth of Cold Resistant corn. A June frost failed to affect the new corn. A few leaves sloughed off and then the growth continued normal. There should be a great demand for seed this fall, and there should be a great quantity of seed for distribution."

Prof. Moore says further: "In regard to the Cold Resistant corn I wish to state that I have great faith in it. Through several years of breeding work at the Wisconsin Experiment Station, cold resistance has been bred into the famous high yielding Golden Glow corn. This has enabled the Golden Glow area to be pushed further to the north, thereby enabling farmers to grow and mature a larger variety of corn where they were not able to succeed before."

Our stock of Cold Resistant Golden Glow this year was grown by W. W. Suttie and P. V. Becker of Trempealeau County and by Charles Hull of Shawano County. On the front cover of this catalog we show a few ears of Mr. Suttie's corn. He says the corn was dented at fair time, August 22nd, and that he got first prize on the corn. He writes further: "The ears run smaller than last year but are a much better type, as we selected our seed for color and even size, using only the 16 rowed ears." We can furnish Mr. Suttie's corn either on the ear or shelled, the other two stocks shelled only.

Mr. Becker, who sent us 10 ears of his corn for photographing last fall, shown above, thinks this variety is even larger than the original Golden Glow. He says: "The Cold Resistant Golden Glow corn averages a little larger than the common Golden Glow and will mature about the same time. Under favorable conditions will mature by August 25th. It is a heavier yielder, both stalk and grain, making it a very desirable variety for ensilage purposes."

Mr. Hull, who lives further north than our other two growers, in northeastern Wisconsin, has grown some splendid corn for us and he knows how to select and care for it. This corn does not run as large as the Trempealeau County stock but will be better for planting in the extreme north.







In 1909 the pedigreed stock was finally sent out for trial over the state through the members of the Wisconsin Experiment Association. We first introduced it in 1911 and have catalogued it ever since.





Description. Marquis is a hard red spring wheat, grading No. 1 Northern, which brings the top price, but is quite different in appearance from Fife and other hard spring varieties. The grains are short and thick and very plump making it very attractive in appearance. It is a strictly beardless wheat with long heads and it has a very stiff strong straw of good length. It ripens early, a little ahead of other spring varieties.




