RURAL MAIL STATISTICS

Editor Sonoma Expositor: Having occasionally seen accounts in local papers of the amount of mail delivered and collected by rural mail carriers in other parts of the country, I presume a statement of the work done on the route out of Sonoma may be of interest to some readers of your valuable paper, therefore I send you the following report of the exact number of pieces of mail handled from the time the route was started till March 31, 1905. 1st year, delivered, 26,567; collected 4683. 2nd year, delivered, 32,975; collected, 5856. 3rd year, delivered, 35,363; collected, 5353. 4th year, delivered, 43,498; collected 6390. In last 7 months, delivered, 31,241; collected 4256. The largest amount delivered on any one trip, 402 pieces; the largest amount collected, 258 pieces. The least ever taken out numbered only 26 pieces. The quickest time ever made over the entire route is 3 hours and 40 minutes; the longest time required was 5 hours and 55 minutes. To deliver the above mail it was necessary to make 1428 trips of 25 miles in length or nearly 1 1/2 times the distance around the globe. Edward G. Guyot, carrier.

Sonoma Valley Board of Trade

Committees Appointed and Decks Cleared For Action

Rousing Meeting in Union Hall Last Evening

The meeting of the Sonoma Valley Board of Trade held in Union Hall last evening was a very interesting and enthusiastic one. A large number of citizens interested in the progress of old Sonoma attended. F. T. Duhring presided and W. O. Hocker acted as Secretary.

O. P. Palatine, chairman of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, read from a copy of a constitution, and the following provisions will be incorporated into the Constitution and By-Laws of the Sonoma Valley Board of Trade.

There will be an executive committee or Board of Directors to consist of seven members. The other officers shall consist of a President, Secretary and Treasurer.

Nominations for Directors were called for and resulted in the election of the following: H. Dakin, Theodor Richards, F. T. Duhring, H. Francis, G. W. Reed and H. H. Granite. The seventh director is to be chosen by the six selected.

The motion prevailed, providing for the following committees: 1. Auditing and Finance. 2. Advertising and Printing. 3. Exhibit. 4. Promotion. 5. Transportation and Improvements.

Seven new members joined last evening, making the total membership at present twenty-eight. It was decided to fix the membership dues of the Sonoma Valley Board of Trade at 50 cents a month, payable quarterly in advance.

It was decided that the regular meetings of the Board would be held on the last Wednesday of each month. The next meeting, therefore, will be held in Union Hall, on Wednesday evening, April 26. A full attendance is desired as the adoption of the Constitution and By-Laws and other matters of importance will be considered.

Assessor's Notice

Tax-Payers

All taxpayers are required by the Constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement under oath, setting forth specifically ALL THE REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY owned by such person, or in his possession, or under his control, at 12 o'clock meridian, on the

First Monday in March

The Assessor must collect the taxes on all personal property when in his opinion said taxes are not a lien upon real property sufficient to secure the payment of the taxes. The Assessor must collect such taxes at the time of making the assessment.

Poll Tax and Road Tax

are due ON DEMAND from all persons subject to the same. Between the first Monday in March and the first Monday in July the amount is \$2.00 each. From the first Monday in July until the third Monday in December the amount is \$3.00 each. After the third Monday in December the amount is \$4.00 each. Will those having fruit trees kindly enumerate the same, giving number and age of each kind, so as to save time when the Deputy Assessor calls.

THE COOPER ACCIDENT

Following is a clipping from a Seattle paper, giving a complete account of the accident to little Mary Mildred Cooper:

A fatal accident occurred on the Spanaway car line Saturday evening shortly before 7 o'clock. Mary Mildred Cooper, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Cooper of Fern Hill, was struck by a south bound car and so badly injured that she died a few hours later. She was not quite 8 years old.

In company with her brother she had gone with a carrier who was delivering papers. They were gathering flowers and had stopped to play in the sand by the side of the track, about two blocks north of Parker street station. When the car came along the boys ran but the child did not get far enough away, being apparently dazed. The projecting step of the car which was the Fern Hill "tripper" struck her in the side. The car was stopped and the injured child was taken to the residence of Rev. Wilder, where every possible attention was given her.

The parents arrived shortly after the accident. The child knew them but her sight had been affected by the shock and could not see. Dr. Love, who was summoned, administered stimulants but all efforts were unavailing. The examination showed that no bones were broken. Death issued from internal injuries and the shock.

The body was then taken to the home of the parents and the funeral was held on Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, from the Methodist church at Fern Hill. Interment in Lake View Cemetery Seattle, beside her aunt and cousin.
