

Set out roses early in a well pre-pared bed. The soil must be well drained and well fertilized. Apply fertilizer to the top of the soil. Plant early for the best results.

- ETOILE DE HOLLANDE—(H. T.) Bright crimson, fiery-red center cup-shaped. Free in bloom.
 E. G. HILL—(H. T.) A new Red Rose, originated by Mr. E. G. Hill. Color is dazzling scarlet shading to deeper red. Originator claims it never turns purple. Undoubtedly a fine new red rose.

GREEN STRIPED CASHAW

Culture — Southern States, planting time: Spring, March to July. Usually planted in confields; when grown as separate crop, plant in hills (10 seeds to the hill) 8 to 10 feet apart each way. When started, thin to 3 or 4 plants. When leaves die, cut pumpkins from vines, leaving 3 to 4 inches of stem and store in dry place; avoid bruising. One pound to 300 hills, 4 pounds to an acre. Ap-proximate number of days to edible condi-tion is given after each variety. This varies with climatic and soil conditions.
