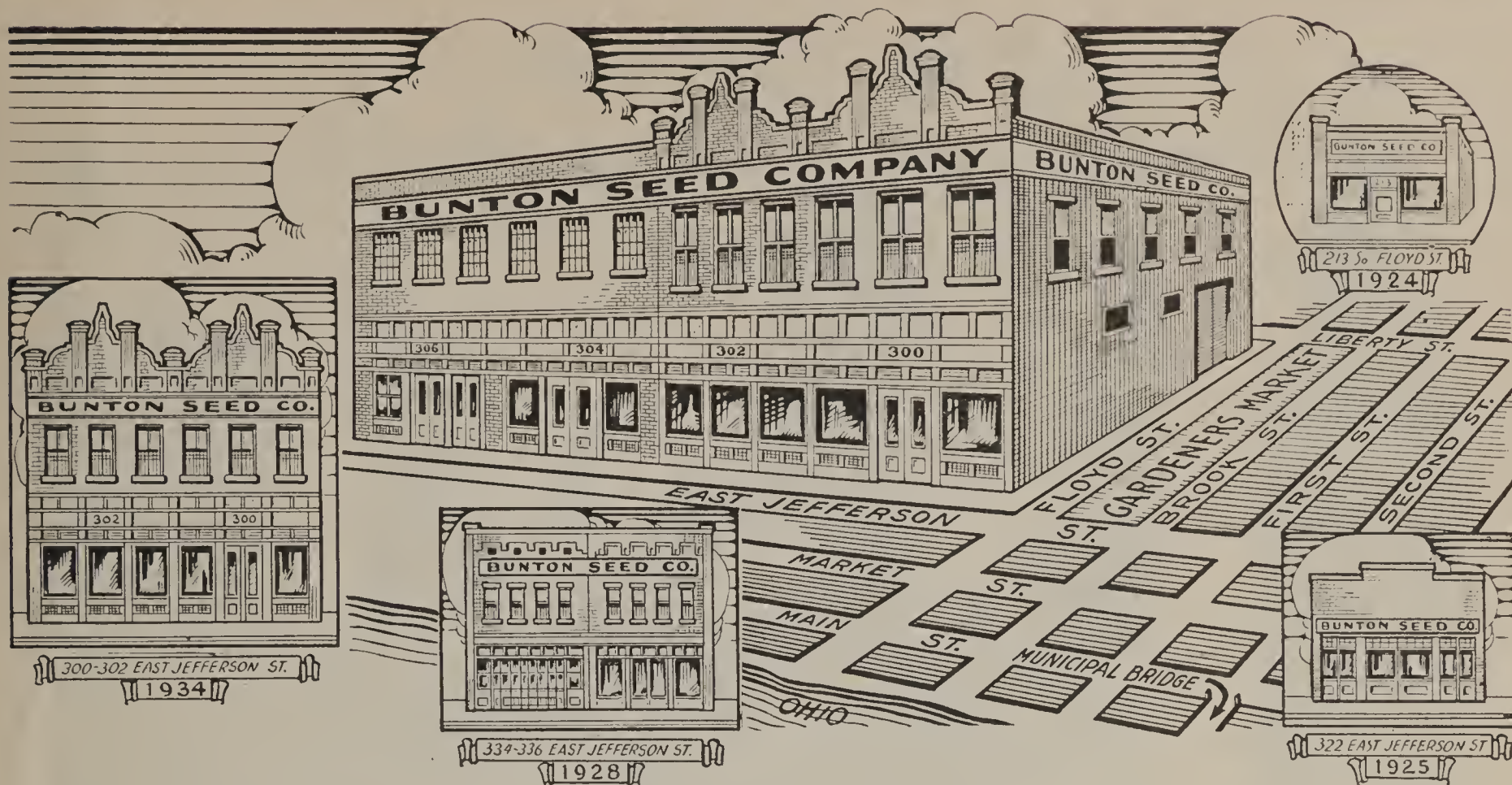

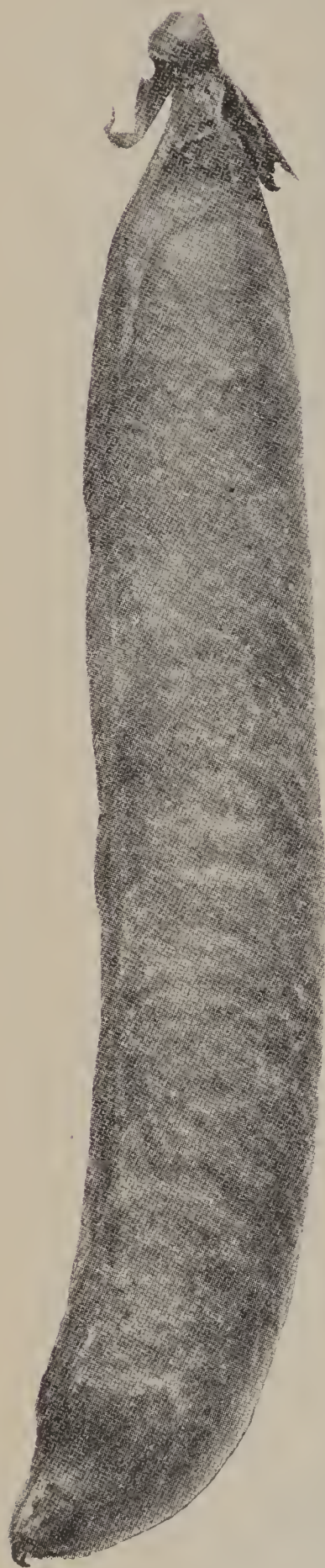

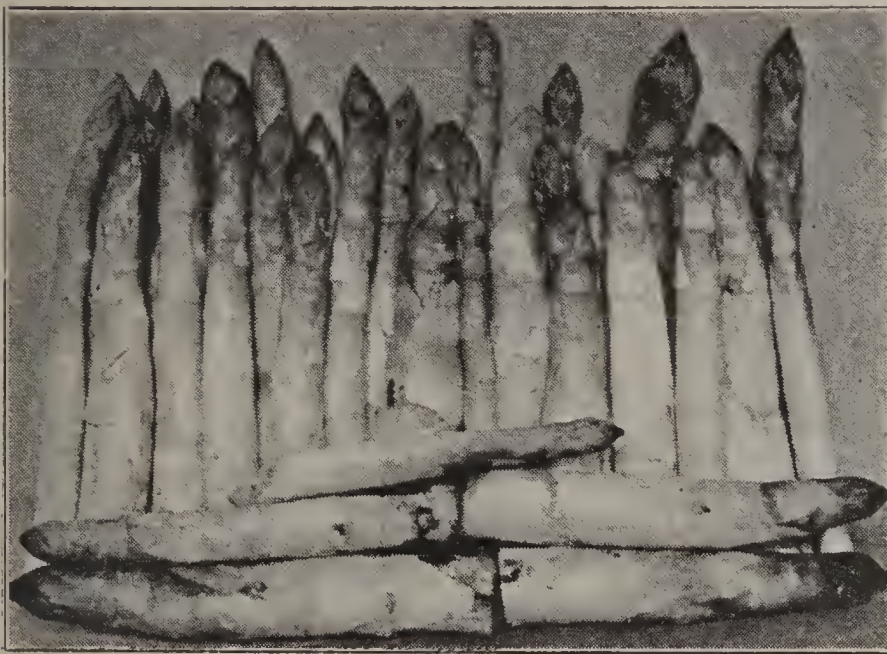

VEGETABLE SEEDS

ASPARAGUS

CULTURE—After soaking seed in warm water 1 to 2 hours, sow in drills about 18 inches apart during Spring or Fall. Thin plants out to 3 inches apart and give frequent thorough cultivation, keeping them free from weeds. The roots should be transplanted when 1 or 2 years old into a permanent bed of the richest soil you have. Open a trench 15 inches deep and put in 8 or 9 inches of well rotted manure; cover with 2 inches of soil; then place the roots 12 inches apart, with the crowns

facing one way; cover with 4 inches of soil. The rows should be 5 feet apart. The growth should be cut in the Fall after which a top dressing of stable manure should be applied, this to be worked into the soil very early the next Spring. It is also advisable to sprinkle a little salt over the bed. Only light cuttings should be made the second year. After the cutting season is over, spray with a combination of Bordeaux and Arsenate of Lead to prevent rust and kill the Asparagus Beetle.

CULTURE—Same as Cauliflower or Cabbage.

BRUSSEL SPROUTS

CULTURE—Sow seeds in cold frames or open ground. Transplant the same as cabbage in the early Spring and up to July. Make rows 3 feet apart, having the plants standing 18 to 24 inches apart in the row. Cultivate the same as cabbage. An ounce will produce about 2,500 plants. Matures in about 125 days.

PERFECTION—Stems grow about two feet in height and are thickly set with sprouts forming small cabbage-like heads. Pkt. 5c; oz. 20c; ¼ lb. 60c.

BEANS

DWARF OR BUSH GREEN POD

1 Lb. Will Plant 200 Feet of Drill. 1 Bu. to the Acre.

CULTURE—As bean foliage is very tender, it is best to wait until danger of frost is past before planting the seed. (Usually May 1st.) Most soils will bear a good crop. A rich sandy loam will give better returns. Sow seeds in rows 24 to 36 inches apart, dropping the beans 3 inches apart in the row, cover 2 inches deep. Hoe as soon as seedlings appear. When the second or third pair of leaves begin to form, hill the rows slightly toward the plant. Repeat the hilling process as the plants grow larger. Never cultivate while the bushes are wet with dew or rain. For succession of young tender pods, sow every two weeks up to August 15th. A frequent picking of pods will keep the plants bearing. If the soil is not fertile, drill B-B Grower in the rows before seeds are dropped.

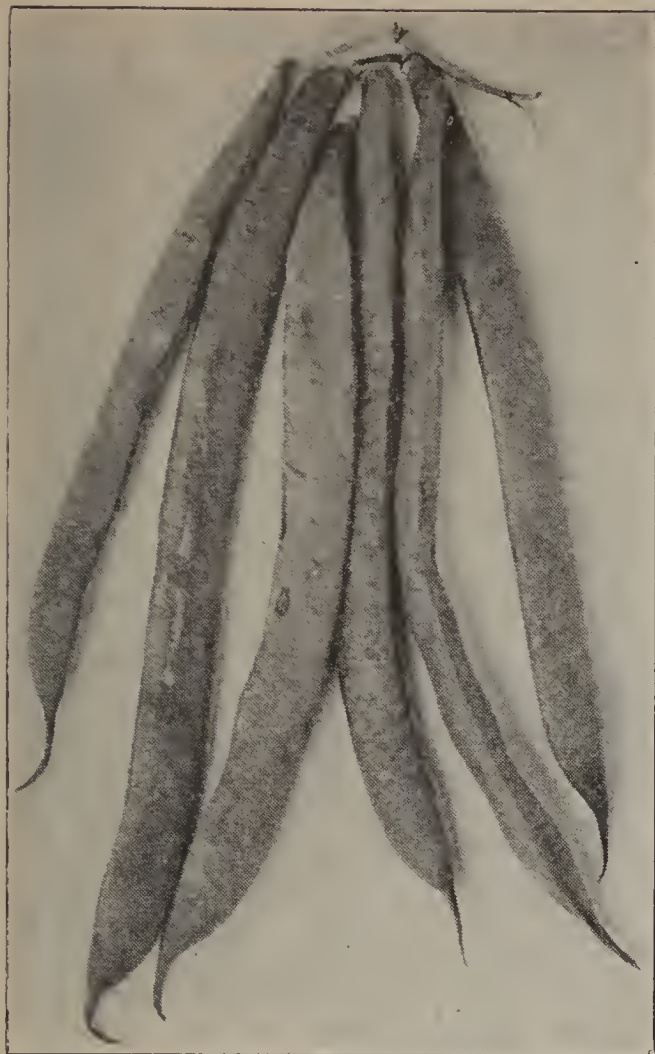

POLE or CORNFIELD BEANS

1 Lb. Will Plant 150 Hills

CULTURE—Pole beans should be planted in hills 4 feet each way and about the same time as the dwarf varieties. If not convenient to secure poles, a trellis can be made by placing a good strong wire 6 feet high between two rows. As runners begin tie small twine to the wire and run down to the bean stalk and tie loosely just above the ground. If well rotted manure is not convenient, enrich the hill with a liberal supply of B-B Lawn & Garden Grower. If planted in corn, wait until the corn is 4 or 5 inches high before planting the beans as the bean is the faster grower of the two. Plant 2 beans to each hill of corn; thin out to one.

IMPROVED KENTUCKY WONDER, OR OLD HOME-STEAD—Without question the best flavored of all beans in cultivation. Kentucky Wonder combines size, quality, and productiveness. The long pods are generally borne in clusters of two or four individual pods averaging 8 to 9 inches long. They are deeply saddleback, very fleshy and perfectly stringless at all stages of development. It is the custom of a great many growers to plant this variety in corn, however the yield will be much heavier if planted alone and vines supported by poles or some other trellis. 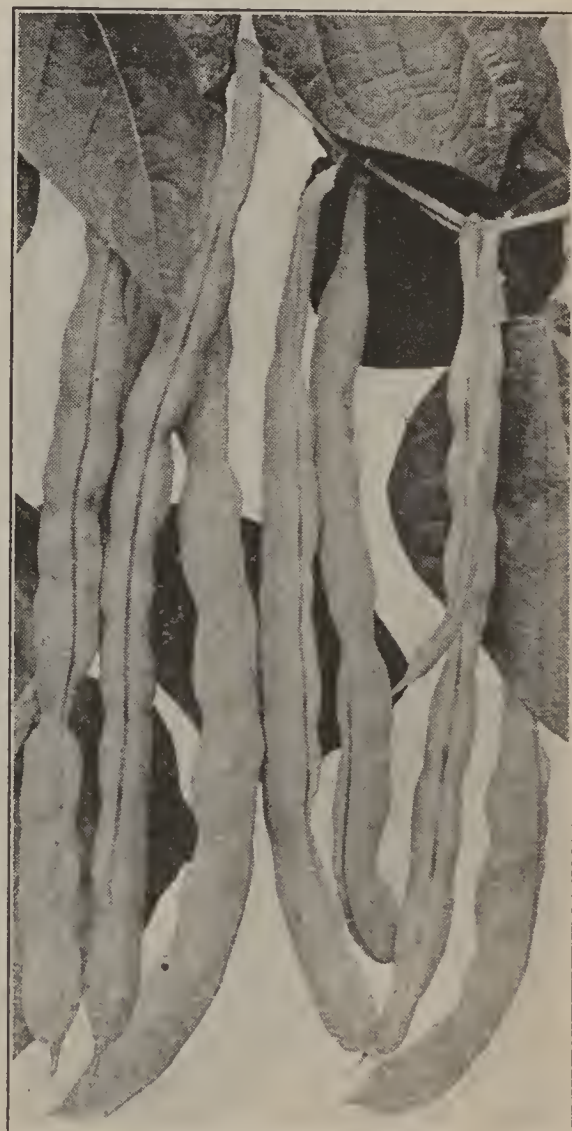

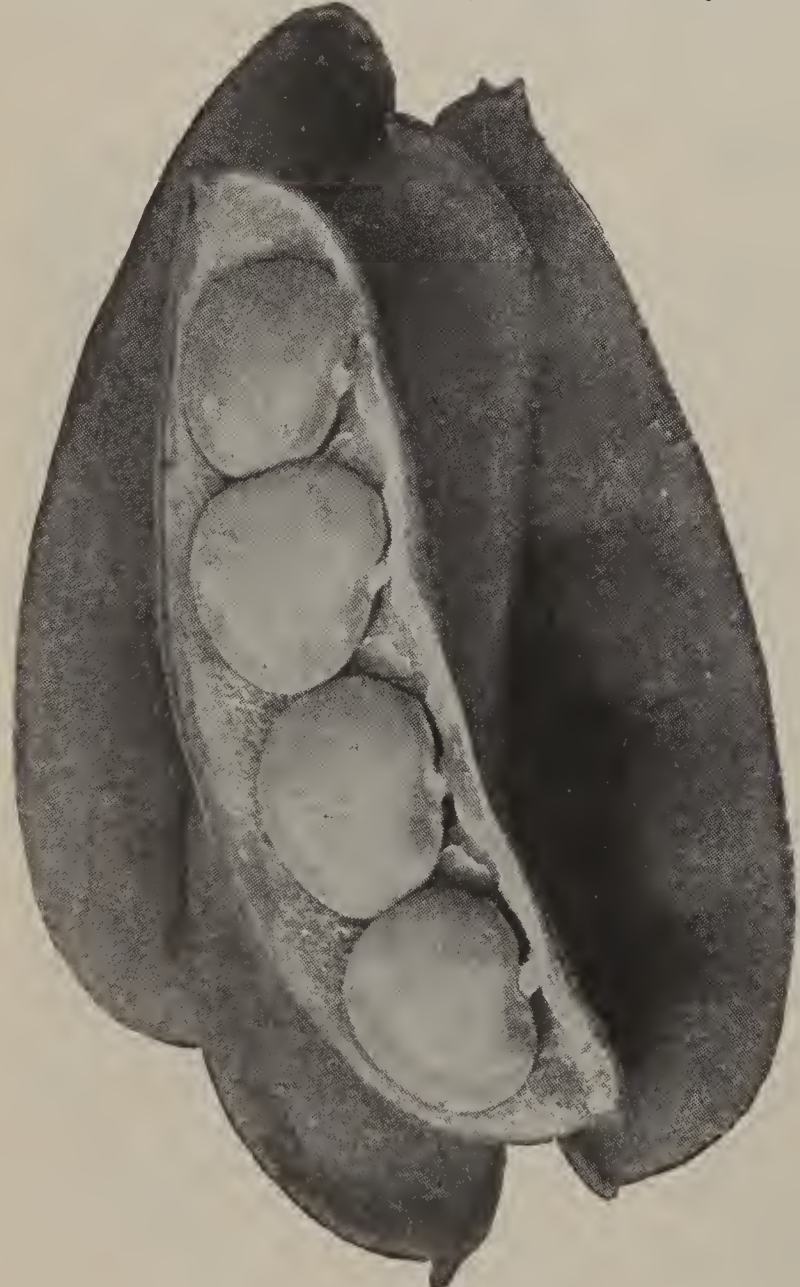

CULTURE—These should not be planted until the ground is thoroughly warm, then sown in well enriched soil, with the rows 36 to 42 inches apart, dropping the beans 10 inches apart in the row, eyes down. The beans should be well hilled to hold the pods off the ground. B-B Lawn and Garden Grower applied at the rate of 10 lbs. to every 100 feet of row will materially increase the yield. This can be done before or after planting.



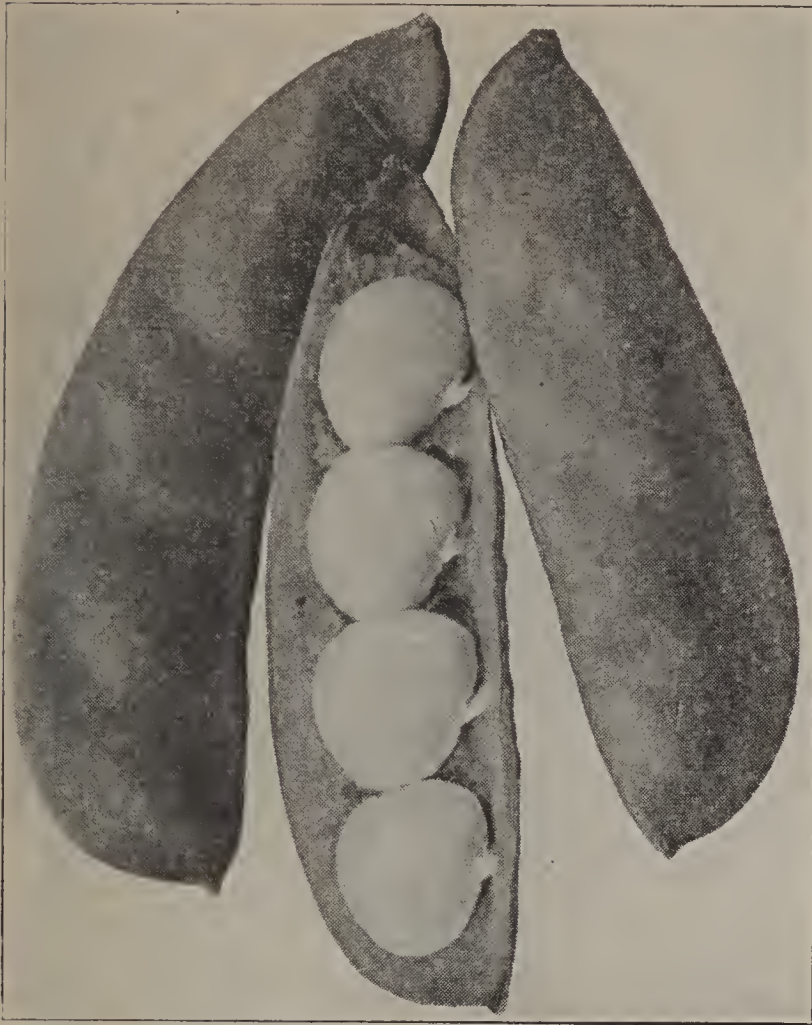

FORDHOOK BUSH LIMA—Generally considered the best of the large seeded bush lima varieties. Bushes of strictly erect habit, branching freely, with all branches held upright. Pods about 5 to 6 inches long, found in clusters of 4 to 8 and well filled with 4 or 5 delicious large beans that are rather thick and of a greenish color. 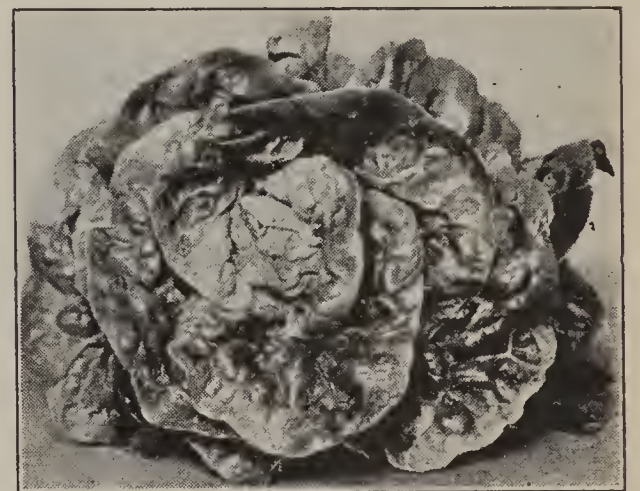

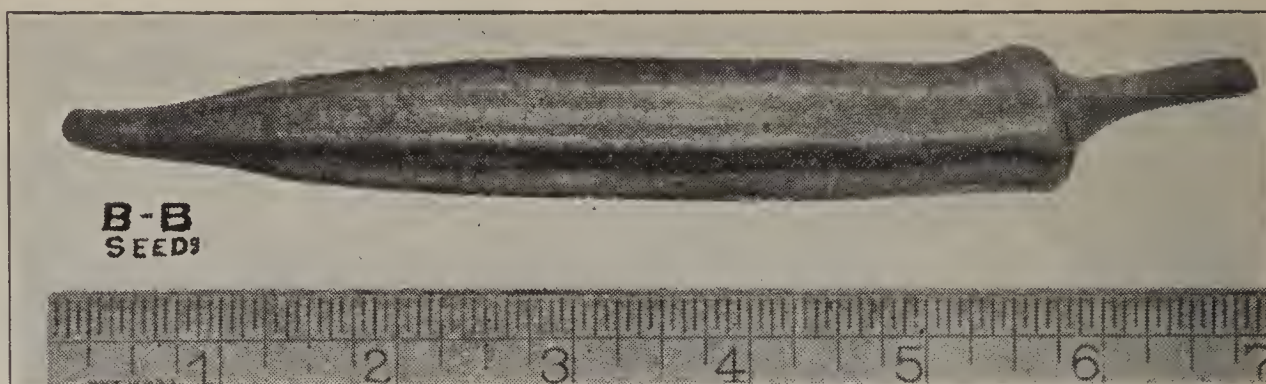

If large onions are wanted from the seed, drop in drill about 1 inch apart and thin out to 2 after plants are about 4 inches high. If onion sets are used to grow large onions, plant in rows 12 to 14 inches apart and 4 inches apart in row.

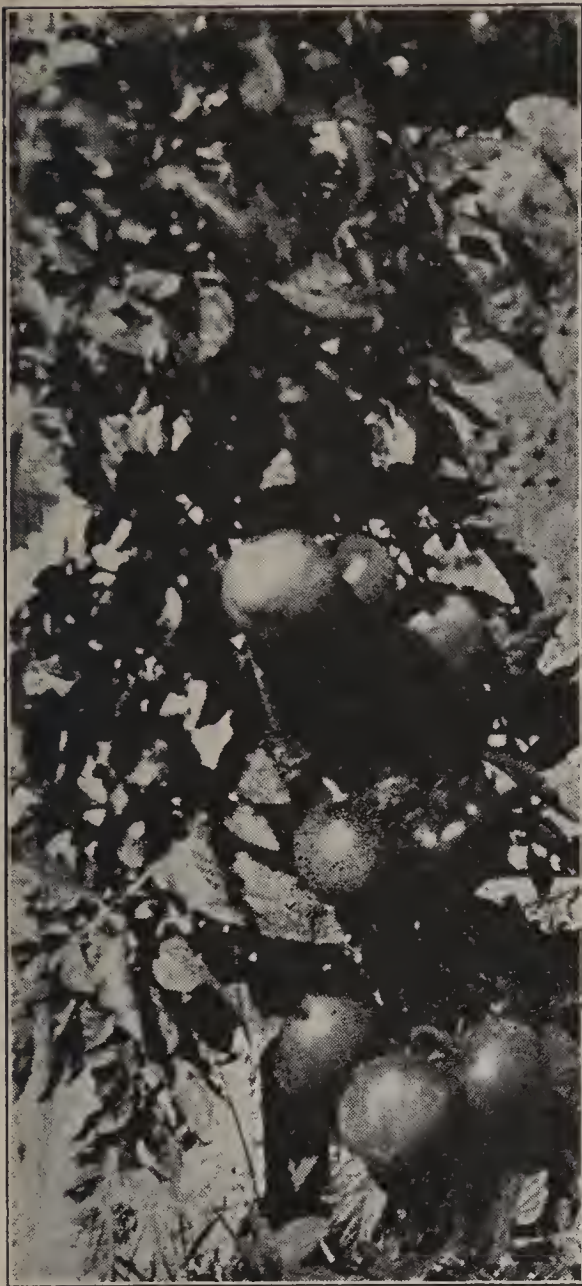

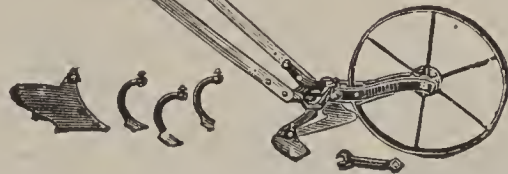
