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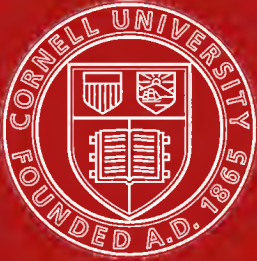

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P R E F A C E .

THE first volume of the Calendars of the Domestic State Papers of Charles I. may be indicated generally as that which relates to the Cadiz Expedition and the Impeachment of the Duke of Buckingham. The second volume has for its main subject the Expedition to the Isle of Rhé. The leading features of the present volume will be found in its relation to the Petition of Right, the Expeditions to Rochelle, the Assassination of Buckingham, the dissolution of the Parliament of 1629, and the subsequent prosecution of Sir John Eliot and other Members of the House of Commons.

Actual contemporary correspondence, in many cases between members of the Government, and relating to such important subjects, cannot be otherwise than of high historical value, more especially if, as in the present instance, it be accompanied by original drafts of important illustrative documents, exhibiting, in the changes which they underwent during the progress of settlement—in what statements were accepted and what rejected—the very mind and intention of those from whom they proceeded. Such are the papers, the contents of which are here laid open to inquirers. This is not the place in which to detail the great story which they contain. Ere long there will probably be set before the world a narrative of the events of this important period, founded on the papers which are here calendared.

But, besides the broad historical uses of these Papers, they throw, every now and then, what may be termed unex-

pected sidelights, occasionally of unusual clearness, on subjects scarcely less interesting or less important. The present volume takes us back into the midst of the heats and struggles of the period of Charles I. The persons whose qualities for good or ill contributed to make up the character of that energetic age surround us; and although the information respecting any particular individual may be comparatively slight—the period of time comprised within the volume being but brief—what we have is so much gain of actual truth, and outweighs in value whole pages of speculation.

A few examples will illustrate our meaning, and stimulate to further inquiry.

In the wide range of our biography and literature few names are more attractive to thoughtful minds than that of Archbishop Leighton. The virtues of his life add emphasis to the calm piety of his writings, and give a kind of authority to the boundless charity and wise moderation of his theological opinions. Leighton belonged as an Archbishop to a period subsequent to that which is here treated of. In 1628 and 1629 he was merely Robert Leighton, a lad receiving education at the University of Edinburgh. The misfortunes of his family threw several of his letters written to his parents at that time into the hands of the future Archbishop Laud, and thus undesignedly preserved them for our use. They exhibit a boyhood of a most delightful kind,—eminently affectionate, deeply imbued with religious sentiments, but not at all devoid of youthful frolic. A noticeable proof of the last-mentioned quality occurs in one of the letters here calendered. Leighton had fallen into trouble at school. His father, naturally anxious for the credit of a son who was so far removed from parental superintendence, had called upon him for an explanation, and the boy gives it in the letter alluded to with ingenuous simplicity. He

narrates, that, in consequence of a contest between his class and "the semies," the Provost had restrained the boys from their accustomed play. The angry magistrate chanced to be conspicuous in his generation for a rubicund nose, and the boys revenged themselves for the loss of their golf or hockey, by making verses on the Provost's distinguishing feature. Leighton, hearing of these verses, "spoke," he says, "a thing in prose" concerning this subject, not out of spite for wanting the play, neither from having taken notice of the Provost's nose, but merely out of the report of his fellow students, for "I never," he remarks, "saw [the Provost] before, but once, neither thought I him to be a man of great state. This I spoke of his name, and presently, upon their request, turned it into a verse, thus:—his name is Oakenhead.

" That which his name imports is falsely said,
That of the oaken wood his head is made ;—
For why ? If it had been composèd so,
His flaming nose had fired it long ago !"

He goes on to mention certain Verses of Apology for these terse and witty lines, which have unfortunately not been found. The college authorities, he tells his father, in all simplicity, considered his production "not so heinous a thing" as he himself did justly think it. "Pray for me," he continues, "as I know you do, that the Lord may keep me from like falls."*

Another example, more nearly historical, may be selected in a paper affecting Ben Jonson. The great poet had been seized with palsy in the year 1625. His past life had been of that kind which makes little provision for the future, and, struck down by disease, and vainly striving

to urge his enfeebled intellect to emulate the productions of his better age, he was living in sickness and almost in poverty, when the world was startled by the assassination of the Duke of Buckingham. The event called forth an all but universal feeling of popular exultation. Felton was regarded as a hero, and, in his punishment, as a martyr. His health was drunk in public-houses and college cellars, and poets, good and bad, were excited to a variety of enthusiastic efforts, principally of congratulation and rejoicing. One poem attracted attention beyond the rest. It was addressed by the writer "To his Confined Friend, Mr. Felton," and contained lines written with a vigour which justified their attribution to a powerful hand. The time was not fertile in writers of the sonorous line. Ben Jonson was at once set down as the author, and even in the house of Sir Robert Cotton, which may be deemed to have been a literary centre of the time, the poem was believed to have been written by the author of "Volpone" and "Every Man in his Humour."* The imputation was a serious one, for Jonson was the Laureate of the day, and a poetical shout of triumph on the violent death of the King's favourite would have been, to say the least of it, an unseemly offering to a royal master, and might have endangered the large portion of Jonson's narrow income which was attached to the laureateship. The incident is new in Jonson's life, and we are not acquainted with all that actually took place; but the State Paper collection contains the following original examination of Jonson by the Attorney General, which, besides effectually exonerating him from the imputed authorship, gives information

which cannot be otherwise than acceptable to every reader of his works :—

“ The examination of Benjamin Jonson, of Westminster, gentleman, taken this 26th day of October, 1628, by me, Sir Robert Heath, his Majesty’s Attorney General.

“ The said examinant being asked whether ever he had seen certain verses beginning thus—‘ Enjoy thy bondage,’ and ending thus—‘ England’s ransom here doth lie,’ and entitled thus—‘ To his Confined Friend,’ &c., and the paper of those verses being showed unto him, he answereth, that he hath seen the like verses to these. And being asked where he saw them, he saith, at Sir Robert Cotton’s house, at Westminster. Being further asked upon what occasion he saw them at that time, he saith that coming in to Sir Robert Cotton’s house, as he often doth, the paper of these verses lying there upon the table after dinner, this examinant was asked concerning those verses, as if himself had been the author thereof; thereupon this examinant read them, and condemned them, and with deep protestations affirmed that they were not made by him, nor did he know who made them, or had ever seen or heard them before : and the like protestations he now maketh upon his Christianity and hope of salvation. He saith he took no copy of them, nor ever had copy of them. He saith he hath heard of them since, but ever with detestation. He being further asked whether he doth know who made, or hath heard who made them, he answereth he doth not know, but he hath heard by common fame that one Mr. Townley should make them, but he confesseth truly that he cannot name any one singular person who hath so reported it. Being asked of what quality that Mr. Townley is, he saith his name is Zouch Townley; he is a scholar, and a divine by profession, and a preacher, but where he liveth or abideth he knoweth not, but he is a student of Christ’s Church in Oxford.

“ Being farther asked whether he gave a dagger to the said Mr. Townley, and upon what occasion, and when; he answereth that on a Sunday after this examinant had heard the said Mr. Townley preach at St. Margaret’s Church in Westminster Mr. Townley taking a liking to a dagger with a white haft which this examinant ordinarily wore at his girdle, and was given to this examinant, this examinant gave it to him two nights after, being invited by Mr. Townley to supper, but without any circum-

stance, and without any relation to those or any other verses, for this examinant is well assured this was so done before he saw these verses, or had heard of them ; and this examinant doth not remember that since he hath seen Mr. Townley.

BEN JONSON."

Little is remembered of Zouch Townley, save that he was of the well-known family of the Townleys of Cheshire, and that he escaped from a threatened prosecution in the Star Chamber, on account of his lines to Felton, by a timely flight to the Hague. ("Court and Times of Charles I.," i. 427.) The rough fervour of his lines, which led to the suspicion that they were Jonson's, was merely imitative, and the result of an attachment to Jonson and his works, which may be gathered from the incident of the knife, as well as from the commendatory lines prefixed by Townley to the collected Edition of Jonson's Works, and from his rushing to the defence of the poet when Alexander Gill took scornful advantage of him upon the failure of "The Magnetic Lady." Gill's indiscretion was continually leading him astray, and gave every opponent an advantage over him. Townley defended his friend kindly, and with a generous feeling which would have carried all hearts with him ; but Jonson himself, entering the dispute with a sledge-hammer rather than with a pen, showed that he needed no defender, and threw Townley's milder performance into the shade.*

Of Gill's other trouble, arising out of his foolish words respecting Felton and the King, the present volume contains a variety of particulars. The discreditable nonsense was uttered in a wild drunken frolic, among young men,

Gill's college friends, some of whom he had come from London to visit. Without seeking to excuse such boyish speeches, one may regret that, in an age in which the consequences of bringing such utterances to the knowledge of the authorities must have been well known, it here appears that the person who gave the information to Bishop Laud was no other than the celebrated Chillingworth. Private treachery was not the only adverse circumstance against which Gill had to contend. The original examination on which Gill's conviction in the Star Chamber proceeded bears evidence of the unfairness with which the proceedings against him were conducted. His admission of the words uttered by him in disparagement of the King ("We have a fine wise King. He has wit enough to be a shopkeeper to ask, 'What do you lack?' and that is all."*) is underscored, and against that passage in the margin is written the direction, "Read this and no more"—thus excluding from the knowledge of all the court, except Bishop Laud, who took the examination, the next sentence, which states the privacy, and the other extenuating circumstances, under which the words were spoken.

Of Gill's illustrious friend, John Milton, no notice has yet been found. The saltpetremans of that name is mentioned in Vol. ci., No. 68 (p. 86), and a petition from "John Milton, gent.," perhaps the saltpetremans, is placed in

Those lines were evidently founded on the song of "Bless the Sovereign and his Senses," which occurs in Ben Jonson's masque of "The Metamorphosed Gipsies," and the indorsement probably means nothing more than that the paper was found in Gill's possession. That finding, and Gill's prosecution, may be a justification of their present place in the Calendar, but the King to whom they allude was James, not Charles, and 1621 or 1622 the date of their composition.

Vol. cxxiv., No. 36 (p. 424), not perhaps in its actual chronological order, but, after consideration, I am unable to assign it to a more satisfactory place.

A momentary glimpse at "the Tuscan artist who, from the top of Fiesole or Val d'Arno," applied to the moon his optic glass, "to descry new lands, rivers, or mountains in her spotty globe," reads almost like a direct illustration of "Paradise Lost." Boswell, afterwards Sir William Boswell, and a well-known diplomatist, had lately accompanied the Earl of Carlisle on a mission to Northern Italy. He thus became acquainted with the fame of Galileo, and is now brought before us as one of the first Englishmen, if not the very first, who scientifically appreciated the studies of the Italian philosopher, and had the honour of being personally known to him. Lord Doncaster, son of the Earl of Carlisle, being at Florence, Boswell inclosed to the young Lord's tutor, Mr. James Traill, a letter addressed to Galileo, containing a request for copies of some of his works. At the same time Boswell wrote to John Spelman, son of Sir Henry Spelman, who was in Lord Doncaster's suite, to procure for him all works of Galileo published after a certain time. Galileo had at this time been released from his first imprisonment at the instance of the Inquisition, and Traill's report is that he remained retired in the country above 30 miles from Florence. The distance was thought too great for Traill personally to deliver the letter, but he undertook to have it conveyed to him inclosed in another, and to make such arrangements that if Galileo had "any of these you desire," Traill should have them sent to him.* Spelman's answer to his commission was, that he had met with one book of Galileo's published since the prescribed

date, and entitled "Il Saggiatore." He had also met with a work written by one that honoured Galileo much, and which had been privately printed and given away by the author; the subject being the "Measurement of Running Water." Spelman had secured both these little works, and purposed to send them by the first messenger.*

Edmund Bolton, immersed to the lips in poverty and distress, will be found, in Vol. cxii., No. 43 (p. 248), still urging upon the Duke of Buckingham the project of an Academy of Honour, in bitter tones of remonstrance and disappointment. He fortifies his application with the following pleasant little poem by Sir John Beaumont, author of "Bosworth Field," and elder brother of the dramatist:—

"TO MY LORD THE DUKE OF BUCKINGHAM, TOUCHING THE
ACADEM OF HONOUR.

My Lord, the heart that loves you must have leave
Some splendour from your glory to receive.
My soul with gladness shines when I behold
Your worthy praise in beauteous works enrolled;
When learned tongues you their Mæcenas name;
By which brave style your office is the same
Which is from parents to their children due;—
You cherish them who shall eternize you.
I much admire the subject which my friend
Hath chose for you, and know you will extend
Your wings upon his work, so fair, so sweet,
Where perfect Learning and true Honour meet,
Whose loving hands in mutual concord gripe,
For you are Learning's Patron, Honour's Type.

No. 59, in Vol. c. (p. 67), is a recommendation, by Bishop Davenant, of his near kinsman, "a young gentleman," Mr. William Davenant, who had been employed in the wars abroad. I am aware that it is not quite consistent

with what has been told us of the early life of the poet to suppose that this was he, but our information on this subject is so uncertain that the reference is worthy of attention.*

Another branch of literary illustration is the favour bestowed on learned foreigners. Gerard Vossius was made a denizen (p. 215), and received a prebend in Canterbury Cathedral (p. 216), whilst John Vossius, one of his sons, was strongly recommended to Jesus College, Cambridge, it might almost be said forced upon the College for a fellowship (p. 548). Entries under the names of Meric Casaubon and Sir Francis Biondi are of the same character.

Papers relating to the proceedings in the Ecclesiastical Commission against Michael Sparke and other London printers and publishers, for printing and circulating pamphlets without licence, bear upon the same subject. The answer in the same court of Henry Burton, the author of "The Baiting of the Pope's Bull," "Israel's Fast," and many other influential works;† and the characteristic letter of Bishop Hall, consenting, for the sake of peace, to omit from his "Reconciler" certain strong anti-Arminian passages, which the licenser deemed objectionable,‡ are papers of importance in connexion with the degree of control exercised over the press, and the question of how far that control was

used in order to promote one particular view of the theological opinions which divided Protestants.

Abraham Darcie, known as the translator of the "Annales of Queen Elizabeth," and the author of other works, some of them poetical, in commendation of various noble persons and families, desired to add the Duke of Buckingham to the list of worthies whom he commemorated, but failed in obtaining a licence on two very curious grounds. They are set forth in a letter of Bishop Laud;* and in the Bishop's own words, were, first, because he "suspected the countenance and other deportments of him that brought the papers"—Abraham himself; and, secondly, because the handwriting of Sec. Conway to a recommendation which he had given to Darcie was "so fairly written."† What may have been the weight of suspicion attaching to the countenance of Darcie does not appear, but all who are acquainted with Conway's hand will feel that, if anything more than his signature was easily legible, the Bishop was clearly justifiable in his suspicions on that head. When Conway was first appointed Secretary, King James is said to have remarked, that Steenie had given him a Secretary who could not write, and even his own clerks were frequently unable to decipher his hieroglyphical scrawling. Several papers exist in the State Paper Office which his clerks contented themselves with simply indorsing as "In my Lord's own hand," without any attempt at stating their contents.

These few examples, drawn from only one class of illustrations, will sufficiently show the character of the elucidation contained in this volume. Many pages could scarcely exhibit its variety, or exemplify the number of

documents applicable to purposes of illustration which it contains. In one place we are thrown back on "Kinmont Willie" and "Johnie Armstrong," on the wild doings and stirring minstrelsy of the Border, by a pardon for all their robberies and thefts to two Edward Armstrongs, one of the Ash and the other of Kinmont, with their dependent fellow *reivers*, Hector Armstrong, known as Stubholme, and John Armstrong, designated John-with-the-one-Hand;—but with an addition that tells distinctly that the era of turbulent but attractive lawlessness had past;—"on condition that they depart the kingdoms of England and Scotland, and do not return without licence" (p. 497). In another place, one of the latest rays of the middle ages gleams upon us as we read the letters of poor Sir Henry Clare, praying for royal patronage to "his endeavour in the philosopher's stone"—an endeavour which had already stripped him so bare that he had nothing left to offer as a token of thankfulness—in these days we should term it a bribe—to propitiate the Secretary of State on presenting his petition to the King. He beseeches him, in pity to Sir Henry's present poverty, to accept a hundred marks out of the first money to be obtained under a grant for which he is a suppliant (pp. 374, 514, 565).

In April, 1629, we have the Lord President Conway, in the height of the London season, feasting the new-made knighthood of Sir Richard Grimes, and a Scottish Lord, some visitor to London, with the still fashionable viands—asparagus and salmon; but the latter was a fish from the Thames, already becoming scarce and costly. The "dish of asparagus" cost 2s. 8d.; the Thames salmon was charged at the exorbitant price of 2l. 6s. (p. 518).

Within a couple of pages is a supplication of Sir Richard Grosvenor which tells forcibly on family history. Sir Richard, through a too foolish kindness to an unfor-

tunate but more dishonest brother-in-law, has become involved in pecuniary difficulties. The case was common, the creditors were inexorable, our fatal facility of raising money was but little understood, and the new-made baronet importunately solicited the shelter of a royal protection. "It were a killing misery for him," he exclaims, "to be the overthrow of so ancient a family, as hath continued in Cheshire ever since the Conquest" (p. 516).

We may couple with this Sir Bowyer Worsley's narrative of how "old Thornton and his son" came into the Isle of Wight, and inveigled Sir Bowyer's daughter into a marriage which threatened ruin to her father, if the Lord President would not help him to a place in ship or castle (p. 565), and consequent protection.

Turn the page, and we are in the midst of old stately formalities set down by Garter, Clarencieux or York, as "provisions to be made" for the first confinement of Henrietta Maria, and the anticipated birth of an heir to Charles's uneasy throne (p. 534). A brief space elapses, and we find that the pomp of heraldry had been fruitless, and that "God had shown them a Prince of Wales, but the flower had been cut down the same instant that it saw the light" (p. 548). The grave closes, and away we fly to other subjects:—Wolfgang Mayer, "nephew to the posthum-martyr Martin Bucer," trusts his son to the Earl of Carlisle, to be educated at the English university in the service of which Bucer died, and finds what is the worth of the promises of a courtier (pp. 411, 447, 490, 520); Archie Armstrong satirises the Court with the boundless liberty of his profession in a description of the christening of his infant son (p. 393); we have a list of the London dealers in old books, full of subjects of most curious comparison (p. 328); a licence for the Lady Elizabeth's players to perform "comedies, histories, tragedies

and interludes” in the City of London or elsewhere. The names of the chief members of the company are given (p. 406), and a mode at once indicated for accounting for some portion of that dramatic intercommunication between England and Germany, which is such a curious incident in the history of our stage, and which was no doubt fertile of results to our dramatic literature.

We turn next to a valuable account of the tonnage of the navy (p. 493); the produce of subsidies (p. 482); a proposal to institute a servants’ registry, as a remedy for the inconveniences arising from dishonest servants, charwomen, and dry nurses (p. 509); a history of the payment of chaplains and surgeons in the navy (pp. 466, 467, 511); letters of the witty Corbet, who finds that he has lost a deanery in gaining a bishopric (pp. 562, 595); notes of the coming of Rubens, an incident fertile of results both in art and politics (pp. 553, 557); valuable lists of recusants in London and its neighbourhood (pp. 409, 414); and a curious account of collections in the London churches for the expatriated ministers of the Palatinate (p. 406); and so on we pass from subject to subject, in every page and almost in every entry, *ad infinitum*.

The biography of the times, the condition of the nation, the voice of popular feeling and the state of public manners—events and incidents foreign to modern tastes and opinions—ways of life which, fortunately for us, can never return, but which led to our present happier state, and must be understood before we can comprehend either the height to which we have ascended or the means of our ascent. Apart from the direct historical application, there is enough in this indirect illustration to make this volume, and the whole series of calendars in which it takes its place, an invaluable mine of materials for all historical inquirers. But, like other mines, it must be worked.

The assistance of William Impey, Esq., and William Douglas Hamilton, Esq., two gentlemen on the staff of the State Paper Office, alluded to in the Prefaces to my former volumes, has been continued throughout the present volume with great advantage to the book and to the general service. Their labours in preliminary arrangement have greatly facilitated the progress of the work.

- [March 1 ?] 1. The King to Lord Treasurer Marlborough and Sir Richard Weston, the Chancellor of the Exchequer. Having resolved to employ the Earl of Carlisle in an embassy of the greatest importance, they are required to assist him in all things necessary for his accommodation and the expedition of his journey. Recommends the despatch of the farm of 20s. a ton upon wines, which may be turned to the assistance of this object. [*Draft, mutilated by damp.*]
- [March 1 ?] 2. The same to ————. Requests him, in these times of necessity and straightness of money, to advance 5,000*l.*, part of 50,000*l.* contracted to be furnished for the King's service, to enable the Earl of Carlisle to lose no time in his departure upon his mission. [*Draft, mutilated by damp.*]
- [March 1 ?] 3. Copy of the same, made before mutilation.
- [March 1 ?] 4. The same to ————. Requests him to hear the Earl of Carlisle, respecting the occasion he may have to make use of the assistance and credit of the person addressed, and to give him the accommodation required. [*Draft, mutilated by damp.*]
- [March 1 ?] 5. Copy of the same, made before mutilation, and endorsed, "Draft of a letter not used."
- March 1. Grant of the dignity of Baronet to Sir Richard Yonge, one of
Westminster. the Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber. [*Coll. Sign Man., Car. I., Vol. vi., No. 12.*]
- March 1. Warrant to discharge Sir Richard Yonge of 1,095*l.*, ordinarily
Westminster. payable in respect of a Baronetcy. [*Ibid., No. 13.*]
- March 1. 6. Minutes of proceedings of the Council of War at their meeting
Whitehall. this day. It is ordered, that as soon as 12 of the 30 ships ordered at the last meeting to be prepared for sea with all convenient speed be made ready, the same should go to sea. Nicholas delivered the Lord Admiral's pleasure that in his absence this Council should proceed as they should think fit. [*Draft.*]

 March 1. 7. Attorney General Heath to Sec. Conway. Sets forth the present state of the new arrangements with reference to the Mint. The proclamation and commission are ready, but the former stays for the insertion of some words on which the King's pleasure is to be taken, and the latter for the King's decision on the arrangement to be made with Sir Robert Harley.
- March 1. 8. Deputy Lieutenants of Dorset to [Theophilus Earl of Suffolk, Blandford. Lord Lieutenant]. The richer sort utterly refusing to receive the soldiers, and the rest being much disabled by the great arrears due for last year, return peremptory answers that they will no longer undergo this burthen. The writers have not omitted any course of persuasion, but the objectors, finding nought else but words to follow, contemn all that is spoken in that kind, and, for ought the writers see, the soldier must either steal or starve, which doubtless will shortly prove most dangerous. Beg the Earl to take these things, and the imminent danger of the county, into his consideration.

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- March 16. 9. Sir Francis Carew to Buckingham. Has attended to see the
Topsham. barks freighted. Money will sooner fall short than the country's provisions. Capt. Quaille has possessed himself of the Dutch ship, and, though with such difficulty as set on work his best discretion and manhood, he has so ordered the matter that, be they friend or foe, he has left no gap for just complaint. Will see him supplied with provisions at the easiest rate. It will be eight days before he can get over the bar, when he may convoy the barks to Plymouth, or, if the fleet be going out, may meet it. Sir Francis has used his best endeavours in this business, and is confident that he shall not find himself undervalued when he comes to Plymouth.
- March 16 10. William Earl of Denbigh to the same. The land soldiers, which
Plymouth. the Duke determined should be disposed into the ships for better manning the fleet, are not so many as five hundred, hardly three. If it be the Duke's pleasure that the officers go with them, then they will hold themselves for land companies, and refuse the command of the sea. Desires a warrant for ordering these things. Understands the soldiers were only put in to supply the want of seamen. If their commanders go with them, it will be the overthrow of the voyage.
- March 16. 11. Sir Henry Mainwaring to the same. Reports the state of the
Plymouth. fleet in preparation. All the ships in the first list will be ready to sail on Wednesday, 19th, and the whole fleet on the 26th. The victualler will have beer by the 22nd to serve the whole fleet, and, by the assistance of Sir James Bagg, *sine quo non*, and whose exertions are very highly praised, he assures himself that the fleet will be sufficiently, if not extraordinarily, well fitted. The high and mighty difficulty is, the want of men, who rather decrease than augment. What supplies the press ordered by the Duke will bring in he knows not, but if there come not 600 seamen at the least the fleet cannot proceed. The soldiers appointed in lieu of 500 seamen will not amount fully to 400. Propriety questioned of appointing French captains and men aboard the fire ships, the miscarriage whereof might make the greatest delinquents meritorious in the eyes of their sovereign. More money needed. Sir James Bagg's person, wife, children, friends, his house at Plymouth, the reversion of the fort, his manor of Saltram, with what else he can furnish, are all at their command for the Duke's sake. Nothing but the Duke's own presence can despatch the fleet faster than Lord Denbigh's care and extraordinary diligence. His example makes them all industrious, and especially Mainwaring's consort, Capt. Weddell.

The

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Citadel and Fort La Pré are in the same state as when the Duke left them. The Spanish fleet is gone, and only 25 French ships remain before Rochelle. Sends draft commission for Capt. Hone. *Inclosed,*

12. I. *Commission of the Duke of Buckingham, whereby Capt. Hone is appointed to the command of the Companies of Foot (being his own company and those of Sir Thomas Pigott, Capt. Thomas Staverton, Capt. Yates, and Capt. Lindsey), made choice of to strengthen the King's army by sea, and to assist the Rochellers by land. Capt. Hone to have the quality and pay of Serjeant Major. March 16. 13. Thomas Earl of Arundel and Surrey to Sec. Conway. Intreats Arundel House. him to let the King know that he is very sorry that he cannot yet have the happiness to kiss his Majesty's hands, but would humbly obey him in not attending his person in this proceeding [to Parliament], though both his public office and particular devotion called him to it, so as now he understands himself only left to attend the service in the higher house on the morrow, and shall never fail to do his Majesty all faithful service.

March 16. 14. William Buxton to Nicholas. Bristol. Began him to let the Duke know that he has pressed 100 men, and will send them to Plymouth with a conduct. The St. James is ready, only the pay for her company wanting. States quantities of victual provided; they only stay for the convoy of the St. James. Began him to move the Duke for the 4,000*l.* lying at Bristol "in dispencc in the Admiralty Court;" that out of it the St. James's company might be paid. Has notified to the merchants who refused to let their ships, to be in London by the 20th instant before the Council, according to the Duke's order. Prays him to send a general stay for Bristol, or else there will be no pressing of mariners. Sends Nicholas a pound of tobacco as a remembrance.

March 16. 15. Sir Francis Carew to Nicholas. Exeter. Incloses to him the before-mentioned letter to Buckingham of this date. The latter end of it savours of his disquiet on hearing that Weddell was preferred before him to the honour of being Rear Admiral for this voyage. No man can put a meaner value on his abilities than himself, but no man living is more sensible of his honour. Suffered enough in the last voyage to give proof of his humility, but by comparison is enforced to vindicate his true value. Has unburdened his mind to a friend, who will make no use of it but to his advantage.

Witham. they caused Capt. Cary's company from Maldon to be billeted at Witham. On the 17th, which the Irish celebrate in memory of

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St. Patrick, by reason of red crosses having been tied to the whipping-post and to a dog's tail, there fell out a dangerous quarrel, Capt. Cary was shot in the forehead dangerously, but, it is hoped, not mortally, and many, both tradesmen and soldiers, were dangerously wounded. names, to the King. Petitioners are miserably afflicted
by the carriage of soldiers, differing from the petitioners
in nation, religion, language, and affection, who abuse
the persons with whom they are appointed to billet by
many assaults and threats, for that their unreasonable
appetites and demands are not satisfied with such diet,
lodging, and attendance as the pay of the soldier, and*

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ability and employment of the petitioners in their calling of husbandry, afford. Being armed with swords and skeins, they terrify the petitioners by wounds and threats, whereof no redress can be administered, the Commissioners for reformation being far remote, whereby petitioners shall be forced to take arms for their defence, or abandon their dwellings. In consideration of their former miseries from Count Mansfeldt's soldiers, and the heavy burthens of watching, warding, and other things which rest upon them, they pray to be freed from the miserable and unaccustomed servitude of "entertaining soldiers into their houses and families, which are the foundation and nurseries of all kingdoms and commonwealths, and the only places of comfort and repose of all well-affected people, their wives, and children."

March. 103. Certificate of the Master and Warden of the Company of Clothworkers of London to the Council. On February 29 last the Lords ordered trial to be made of the nature of certain earth, whether it were of the quality of fullers' earth or not. By the advice of the artizan fullers of the Company, certificate was made that it was clay noways fitting for dressing woollen cloth. Since which time a horse-load of it has been sent to the Worcester clothiers, who certify the same to be as good as any earth used by them for scouring and thicking of cloth. Thereupon the writers have given notice to Sir John Worsenam, one of the Farmers of the Customs of the Port of London, that no manner of earth be suffered hereafter to be transported into foreign parts.

[March.] 104. Petition of Lucas Jacobs to the Council. On information, by John Sutton, that petitioner was about to export 10,000 quarters of grain of all sorts from Chichester and Arundel, he was committed to the fleet, but shortly afterwards released, on giving bond to attend the Solicitor General, and in the meantime to stay the corn. Petitioner has attended the Solicitor General several times, but Sutton has not done so; he also attended at the Sussex Assizes on the 18th inst., to answer an indictment preferred by Sutton, but he never put in any record. Petitioner prays that he may be at liberty to sell his corn, being bound to answer for the value thereof.

The late King entrusted the writer in the Commission of the Fees of Courts, and in the last Parliament-pardon of his reign excepted "all corruption, extortions, and exactions," for by that he kept the Judge's officers in fear, so that he might raise, as he resolved, great sums of money from them when his occasions urged. Suggests this precedent to be followed if there be a pardon this Session. The Lower House desires an act for the confirmation of their privileges; it is suggested that there may be "fairly and covertly" inserted in that "An Act of Absolution and Forgetfulness," which would be an inviolable guard for the Duke if the house should fall upon him, as formerly they have done.
- [March ?] 106. Petition of Joseph Bryan, master's mate of the Amity, to the same. Having been pressed for this Iceland voyage, one Anthony Whalley, Bailiff of St. Katherine's, has arrested him for a trivial debt, which he is not able to pay until he has money for his past service to the King. The Jesuits that were apprehended were the same as were before named, except Knott and Floyd, who are thought to have been none of the company. They

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were all in number eight, at the least. This accident has given the Parliament colour of matter to work upon. The book of the Benedictines, called *Mandatum*, is by them reported to have been long ago sent to the Holy Office. He is to learn if that is true, and, in that case, to petition to have it viewed and censured, as containing many things worthy of censure, besides slanders and false imputations laid upon the Bishop of Chalcedon. Hopes he has received the Bishop's treatise, *Pro Jure suo*, sent with a copy for the Inquisition by means of the nuns of France. The *Catalogue* will be ready this week, if God spare him liberty who is employed in the writing of it out. Of Mr. Price's apprehension by Cross, supposes he heard long ago. He was the first stirrer of the business against the Bishop.

The amount may be discounted out of moneys which Mr. Harbott is to pay his Grace. If Mr. Harbott had not proffered the money he must have taken it up from some other person, although very unwilling to be beholden to any of that town for the smallest courtesy. Has paid for everything but the beer, for which he had been prevented paying by being obliged to furnish the ships of these stiff-necked people with all kinds of stores. Although the Parliament not yet quite past danger, in the opinion of wise men,

Upon petition exhibited in two former Parliaments concerning a charge set upon wine "without common consent in Parliament," for which the merchants were forced to enter into bond, the King promised them a satisfactory answer, yet in December last the said imposition was again demanded, and five merchants, refusing to pay the same, were, by the Council, committed to the Fleet. Pray that the bonds may be delivered up to be cancelled, the merchants be enlarged, and the imposition be absolutely taken off.
- [April 11?] 83. Speech addressed to the House of Commons. The Speaker argues against any consideration of past misfortunes, which are impossible to be helped, but desires the House to settle some speedy course to uphold the ancient honour of the country.
- April 11. On board the St. Andrew. 84. William Earl of Denbigh to Buckingham. The soldiers of the seven companies there have been disposed into the ships, but not without much murmuring and grudging, which was appeased by Sergeant Major Hone and the rest of the captains, who persuaded them, with fair and ill language together, to proceed cheerfully in an action so much concerning the honour of their King and country. Prays the Duke to be mindful of these gentlemen on the first occasion. Having their clothes and best things at pawn, he had impressed to them 100*l.* out of money sent down by Sir Sackville Crow for the fleet.
- April 11. Whitecross Street. 85. Capt. Joshua Downing to Nicholas. The porter of the yard at Chatham was appointed by the Commissioners to execute the office until the Duke's return from Rhé. Does not conceive him to be very fitting for the place.
- April 11. Lothbury. 86. Sir Robert Killigrew to the same. To remind the Duke of a promise he made to Capt. Pendue to put him in a better ship.
- April 11. Easton Neston. 87. Deputy Lieutenants of co. Northampton to William Earl of Exeter. Pray for some speedy order, either for paying or removing the soldiers billeted in their county, or for both. The billeters, having no pay, begin to thrust out the soldiers, who commit some outrages and threaten more. [Indorsed are particulars of cases of refusal to billet. "If speedy order be not taken, the country and soldiers will fall by the ears together, for all the country refuseth to pay." Signed, "Henry Frodsham, Lieutenant to Serjeant Major Fowler."]

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- April 12. 88. Message from the King to the House of Commons, urging them to proceed in his business "without any more unnecessary delays." It concludes, "bidding you take heed that you do not force him by your tedious or needless delays to make an displeasing end of these fair beginnings." [*Copy, in the handwriting of Sec. Coke.*]
- April 12. 89. Draft of the above message, also in the handwriting of Sec. Coke, but corrected in many places by the King. The words quoted in the preceding article are among those inserted by the King.
- April 12. 90. The Council to Sir William Uvedale, Treasurer of the Chamber. To pay to John Wynn, servant to the Keeper of the Council Chest and Records, 10*l.*, for his attendance and making pens for the use of the Council Board. [*Copy, attested by Thomas Meautys.*]
- April 12. Buckingham to Sir John Drake. A prize ship, the Mary, of Dantzic, laden with masts, having been lately brought into Bronson, near Poole, he is to permit her to come about to the port of London. [*Copy. See Vol. cxv., p. 40*.*]
- April 12. 91. Sec. Conway to Attorney General Heath. To prepare a grant to Patrick Maule, of the King's Bedchamber, for his life, of the keeping of the Great Park at Eltham, in the same manner as the same was granted in the fifth year of the late King to John Levingston, in reversion after Sir Thomas Walsingham. [*Draft. Probably this letter was superseded by the following.*]
- April 12. 92. The same to the Clerk of the Signet. To prepare the grant mentioned in the preceding letter, but in the same form as it was formerly granted to Sir Thomas Walsingham the elder, lately deceased.

If he carry himself humbly and faithfully in his duty and service to her Majesty he shall take pleasure in him.

The King's Speech on receiving the petition, as printed in the Parliamentary History, II., 286, concludes with a promise to make an answer in a convenient time. This passage does not appear in the speech as printed in the Ephemeris Parliamentaria, p. 53. If any answer was ever given it was probably that contained in the present paper, although it does not appear on the Journals.]

3. Sir Francis Nethersole to Elizabeth Queen of Bohemia. The Parliament's giving the King five subsidies astonished the Duke, yet when he recovered himself he spake something in Council to that purpose which her Majesty has seen, and a part whereof was delivered in the Lower House, whereupon Sir John Eliot took a handsome occasion to complain of the Duke's name being mingled with the King's upon all occasions. Afterwards, on printing the same speeches, Sir John renewed the same complaint, as others did some other, by dark intimations which belong to that story which, in his last, he told the Queen was not to be written, but which he has intrusted to a gentleman who will soon be with her. The Duke, finding he can neither subdue the Parliament by fear nor favour, is almost out of his wits to find withal that it gaineth credit with the King. If he have power to break it, it is thought he will do it quickly. The party is great against us, and that of the Papists not the least, who are said to have offered large sums still to enjoy the benefit they have by the leases made to them. It is hoped that the House will escape blowing up as miraculously as it did heretofore.

4. The same to the same. All men have been in much apprehension that the issue of this Parliament would be like the two last, but, being now in better hope, he resumes the narrative of its proceedings. The conference with the Lords concerning the liberty of the subject was very well performed, and by Sir Edward Coke, with some mixture of mirth, according to his manner, which was reported by Bishop Williams to the Lords with imitation of his gestures, &c. The King's Attorney argued for the King's power on Saturday last all day, and it is famed abroad that the King's Council will wash away all our precedents, answer our reasons, and expound the Statutes otherwise than we have done. Our men are confident they are not mistaken, but Sir Edward Coke has been forced to confess that he was of another opinion when he was Lord Chief Justice and a Privy Councillor. Answer of the Judges who gave sentence in the King's Bench against the gentlemen who demanded their Habeas Corpus. There is hope that the matter will not be determined against the subject in the Upper House. If it be, there is no hope of getting the subsidies to pass in ours. The King's answer to the petition concerning religion referred to a committee to advise of penning some law for the execution of what is granted. Petition presented against billeting soldiers, and a debate has arisen concerning the power of using martial law in time of peace. The King required the Houses to make no recess at Easter. His denial to the Commons was expressed in some anger, though

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that was suppressed. Sir Edward Coke moved to name the times of payment of the subsidies, which occasioned a debate of many hours. It had been rejected, but Sir Thomas Wentworth, who has the greatest sway in this Parliament, professed his desire to have something done; whereupon Sir Nathaniel Rich limited the time within one year, which passed with an addition that there should be no further motion on that subject until the matters relating to the liberty of the subject were determined. The next morning the King sent a message of sharp words, which was deemed a forerunner of dissolution, but the House turned it to advantage by appointing the Speaker to make an explanatory introduction to the petition against billeting. - April 15. 14. Deputy Lieutenants of Dorset to Theophilus Earl of Suffolk,
Blandford. Lord Lieutenant. Received his order for impressing 100 men, to
be sent to Plymouth, and also for sending away Colonel Fryer's
regiment, billeted with them. Colonel Fryer removed out of the
county on the 12th inst. They could not obtain above 70 men
any way, except they should have sent away shepherds from their
flocks, husbandmen from their ploughs, or poor labouring men from
their wives and many children. Of those sent, they fear divers
will run away from their conductor, or be refused when they come

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there. The country are so exasperated against the Deputy Lieutenants for non-payment of the money due for billeting that they have complained against them to Parliament. Beg that the 4,000*l.* now due may be paid, or, if not, that the Earl will not take it offensive if they join in petition with their countrymen to the King, being well assured that it is not his intention that other counties should be in some sort paid, and they be altogether neglected.

April 16. 15. Petition of Weymouth and Melcombe Regis to "the illustrious Prince, the Lord Duke of Buckingham." These towns are so seated that 200 ships of any burthen may ride there and land at all times, without tide. They are much decayed for want of trade, and in great danger of invasion. For many years together they and the town of Dorchester yielded the King 5,000*l.* per annum in customs. Pray that a convenient number of ordnance may be allowed them for their defence. *Annexed,*

15. i. *Certificate of two Deputy Lieutenants of co. Dorset, that a fort erected on a hill called the North would be a great safety to the whole adjacent country. [Copy. Indorsed, in Nicholas's hand, "20 culverins and demy-culverins."]*

April 16. 16. Petition of Mary, the wife of Richard Samburne, to "the illustrious Prince, George Duke of Buckingham." Petitioner's husband, having his whole estate at Caen in Normandy, crossed the seas in June last, purposing to ship his goods for England. The coming of the English fleet prevented his doing so. Prays for permission that he may now accomplish his intention.

April 16. 17. Sir William Meux to Sec. Conway. Excuses himself for not accepting a Commission of Deputy Lieutenancy offered to him, in conjunction with Sir William Lisle.

April 16. 18. Sir William Russell to Nicholas. Recommends the bearer (unnamed) for appointment as a Purser.

April 16. 19. Dr. William Smyth to Bishop Laud, of Bath and Wells. Wadham College. Mr. Harrington has made the submission to Dr. Smyth enjoined by the college, but refused to make that formerly required by the Bishop on the ground of his having acquitted himself by oath in Chancery, but in proof thereof produced nothing but a blotted interlined paper. He says he has not the money awarded to the college. He promised security, but a week has elapsed, and nothing done. His carriage is somewhat calmer, which they conceive proceeds of mere fear. He excuses his unbecoming speeches from passion. That his fault was frequent will appear by the inclosed. *Inclosed,*

19. i. *Statement of John Goodridge, Subwarden of Wadham College, Daniel Escott, and others, of words uttered by Mr. Harrington. Besides a threat of going to Parliament, he asserted that all who had been proctors were knaves, the Visitor amongst them, though he be a Privy Councillor. [Indorsed by Bishop Laud, "Mr. Harrington's lavish speeches witnessed."]*

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April 16. 20. Certificate of David Sinnot, formerly Captain of the English Guard attendant upon the late Count Mansfeldt, that Francis Startut, and his late brother John Startut, were in the service of the Count.
- April 16. 21. Capt. John Duffell to Richard King, servant to Nicholas. Queenborough. Sends to his master and him, to each of them, two lobsters and two crabs, all alive. Solicits an appointment for William Pichor, and the Pursership of the Triumph for his son George Robinson.
- April 16. 22. Names of Seamen in the Souche [Zouch ?] *alias* the Costly, of London.
- April 17. 23. Sir James Bagg to Buckingham. The wind has been for some Plymouth. days the only stay of the Earl of Denbigh. Part of the provisions prove unserviceable, and a bark from Exeter has been sunk. Should not Burlamachi have directions to insure the barks and provisions? Is now about the soldiers' business. The malicious ignorance of the Duke's enemies makes the errors of others his works. Bagg endeavours to give them light, that it is the Duke's only care to do his Master's service with the least grievance to the people. Out of the new-levied men they take 220 to man the ships for the Downs; for the rest, they return them to their countries, not, as some would have it, only dismissing them, but Bagg has raised money to pay for their return at 8*l.* per man per day. Sir Thomas Fryer came yesterday, and is to march back again to-morrow. The Council should give warrants to Lieutenants of Counties to rebillet Sir Thomas Fryer's and the other returned soldiers.
- April 17. 24. William Earl of Denbigh to the same. There is now only Plymouth. wanting a fair wind. News from France brought by fishermen, that the French King has four score sail of ships now before Rochelle. After conference with the Rochellers they brought them to half that number. Incloses list of his ships. Has been enforced for want of seamen to leave the Peter and John and the Loyalty behind. Has given command for the victualling of the ships for the Narrow Seas, which he leaves to Sir James Bagg. The great want is powder, which cannot be supplied there. It should be sent from the Tower by carrier.
- April 17. 25. Dr. John Hassall to Sec. Conway. Solicits his mediation by the Duke to his Majesty for a preferment. His success will produce him special thanks from the Queen of Bohemia and Lord and Lady Vere, and will oblige that regiment wherein his Lordship was once the commander and the writer the preacher for eight years.
- April 17. 26. John Ellzey to Nicholas. There is arrived the Dolphin, Capt. Southampton. William Scras, with two Granville boats as prizes; a third was cast away on the coast of France. There remain three of the Dutch ships to unlade. The Black Dog's goods he has sent up.

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April 17. Plymouth. 27. Sir James Bagg to Nicholas. All things for the eleven ships shall be making ready for their despatch. Urges speedy orders to the counties to rebillet the soldiers returned to them. Doubts not to fit him with a pleasing nag, and against Strode and all his accusers to justify himself a loyal subject to his sovereign, and a faithful and affectionate servant to their master. Tell Grimes [Graham] that the Duke's horse is on the way for him.
- April 17. Canterbury. 28. Mayor and Aldermen of Canterbury to the Council. They have received so many of the regiment of Sir Pierce Crosby as they were appointed to receive, and endeavour to billet them with their officers in the most convenient and equal manner. The seven persons under named refuse to billet the soldiers and officers appointed to them. The Council have appointed 3s. 6d. per week to be borne for every soldier, not naming the officers. Beg to know at what rates their charges are to be borne.
- April 17. Canterbury. 29. The same to Philip Earl of Montgomery, Lord Lieutenant of Kent. Report the contents of the preceding letter. The soldiers are very unruly and discontented, disliking both their lodging and diet, and there is a general rumour that some of them have given out that our fasting day, being next Monday, shall be a black day among us, which is the more feared because they refuse to go to our church, and, being armed, may take occasion the more easily to do mischief on that day, when the people are assembled in humiliation and prayer. Beg him to take such order that they may perform that holy exercise in safety. Send an examination of Peter Goring, now remaining in their prison, who had escaped unexamined from Margate, where he landed; also a letter which he endeavoured to send to Mr. Philip Roper. *Inclose,*
29. I. *Examination of Peter Goring. Came across the seas with prisoners from Dunkirk. Refuses to take the Oath of Allegiance and Supremacy. 1628, April 16.*
29. II. *Peter Goring to Philip Roper. Had promised to kiss his hands from some Walloon friends when his brother Sir William lived at Cambray. Informs him of his imprisonment, and begs him to visit him. 1628, April 16.*
- April 17. Newcastle. 30. John Goodwyn, Edmund Morgan, and William Smith, captains of the ships appointed to convoy the Newcastle ships, to Sir John Savile. On Easter Day two of them chased a Dunkirk man-of-war, but were outsailed by him. On standing in to the shore, they met five more of them, great ships, and of too much force for them to deal withal. French men-of-war are also said for certain to lie upon the coast. Pray that more ships may be set forth, otherwise they are like to find the coasts too hot.
- April 17. 31. Anthony Tutchen to [Nicholas]. Is willing to resign his place of one of the Four Masters of Attendance to Peter White.

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April 18. Buckingham to Richard Streater. Appointment to be collector of the Duke's tenths for Sussex, on the recommendation of Mr. Alford. [*Minute. See Vol. cxv., p. 41*.*]
- April 18. 32. Petition of Francis Boudewin and others, owners of the St. Nicholas *alias* the King David, to "the high and mighty Prince," George Duke of Buckingham. The St. Nicholas sailed from the Texel to Venice, and thence for Victoria, in the Gulf of Venice, thence for Naples and other places, and ultimately, being laden with salt in Sicily, was returning to Amsterdam, when she was taken by Capt. Syell, and claimed as prize on the ground that she has carried corn from one part to another of the dominions of Spain, which is not contrary to the treaty of Southampton or the King's proclamation. Pray for the ship's release. [*Underwritten is a reference to Sir Henry Marten, to do justice with expedition.*]
- April 18. 33. Petition of Robert Adamson, Henry Davison, and John Curtis, captains and masters of the Diana and the Mary, of Portsmouth, to the same. Their ships, having been taken up to transport Sir Philip Carteret to Jersey, were captured by the Dunkirkers, amongst whom they have suffered imprisonment, and been constrained to engage themselves for money to bring them and their servants home. - April 18. 34. Petition of Capt. Thomas Dixon to the same. Prays for the Duke's letter to the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of London, to appoint him Muster-master of the train bands.
- April 18. Nicholas to Mr. Streatton [Richard Streater]. Sends him the Duke's warrant for collecting his tenths in co. Sussex. Mr. Alford recommended him. He is to send up inventories of all that comes to his hand. The Duke allows five in the hundred to the collector besides necessary expenses. [*Copy. Nicholas's Letter Book, p. 73.*]
- April 18. 35. Thomas Grove to Sir Richard Grenville. Has sent away the
Wells. 200 soldiers to Plymouth, under the command of Capt. Long. Insolent carriage of Lieut. Locke. Great distraction in the country. Every man refuses to pay any longer, and the billeters threaten to turn the soldiers out of doors. They have begun there already, and what the issue will be the Lord knows. In many places the people threaten to beat the soldiers out of the country. Suggests application to the Council. Capt. Gates's lieutenant hurt a soldier that mutinied and would not march without shoes and stockings, for which he is in durance. The writer has done his best to get him set at liberty, but cannot prevail. They do not understand martial law, neither will allow of it.

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- April 19. Westminister. 36. The King to Buckingham, Lieutenant and Warden of the Cinque Ports. Has understood with what diligence and care he has provided for the billeting of soldiers sent into his country, which the King graciously accepts. It was not the King's purpose to lay upon any of his subjects the charge which has fallen out by occasion of this billeting. He hoped before this time to have been enabled to give them due contentment, and to have eased them by drawing away the soldiers into action, as he still intends to do. He will not fail to press expedition herein, and in the meantime he requires the Duke to continue his diligence in providing for the soldiers only for a short time. The King has already given order for their removal, and in the meantime "let not this small delay seem grievous to the country, but take care, as becometh lovers of their prince and country, to keep things in peace and due order."
- April 19. 37. William Earl of Denbigh to the same. According to an Order of Council received late last night, but dated the 12th inst., he purposes with first opportunity to put to sea, which he has attended these six or seven days. Begs the Duke to assure their Lordships that he will not omit the least opportunity to perform their commands. Has sent an examination of two Englishmen, landed near Foy, by Capt. Chappernoune [Champernown] to the Lords.
- April 19. 38. Stephen Alcock to Nicholas. Recommends Mr. Hawthorn for a purser's place.
- April 19. Bristol. 39. Capt. William Buxton to [Nicholas?]. Incloses a letter, from which it appears that a certain Flemish ship taken by Capt. Ellis and Capt. Cooke [Locke] had been forced by stress of weather into Ireland, and had there been assailed in harbour by Capt. Jones and Capt. Hill, where they all together spoiled and wasted the goods of the said prize. Suggests a warrant from the Lord Admiral to the Lord President of Munster to bring her into Bristol. Has overcome all his business, and the ships have been ready these ten days waiting for a wind. Is forced to watch them, for the men run away so fast. *Inclodes,*
39. 1. *Cpts. Walter Ellis and John Locke to Nicholas. Solicit him to procure the warrant above mentioned for John Walter to bring the ship from Kinsale to Bristol.*
- April 19. 40. Accompt of money paid to Sir George Goring, now Lord Goring, up to this day, by John Harrison, out of the impost of sugars for the year ended at Christmas, 1627. Total payments, 5,297*l.* 8*s.* 1*d.*, which exceed the receipts by 19*l.* 4*s.*
- April 20. Whitehall. 41. The King to Thomas Lord Coventry, Lord Keeper. Warrant to issue a writ for summoning Sir Edward Conway to the present Parliament. [*Draft, partially mutilated. It was prepared in blank, and forwarded to Mr. Weld, Lord Conway's Secretary, by some person whose signature is worn away by damp.*]

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- April 20. 42. John Jacop Janson [Jacob Johnson, the diver] to Nicholas. Reports, that by the agreement my Lord [the Duke] was to have one fourth of the iron pieces and one third of the brass. Begs him to communicate this to Sir John Hippisley.
- April 20. 43. John Hope to ----- The Earl of Carlisle not yet gone, though this and the next days, as they run, are still named for his journey. Some think he will not go suddenly, because Walter Montagu is set free from France, and arrived in our Court. The King says he has done him exceeding good service, but it can be nothing worth that such a messenger can bring home. Nor can it be expected that the Earl of Carlisle should do wonders, especially if we say true that he is sent away only to be put out of the way, and to be ruined for doing the Duke ill offices when he was at Rhé. For putting him off for the better access to his lady, it needed not, for he was quiet enough with all was done by her. To content them both the better, she hath lately [had] given [to] her 2,000*l.* pension, which perhaps will never be paid her, for, in the writer's opinion, he will not be half his journey before she be turned out of the Court, for the Duke's mother, wife, and sister hate her, not only for the Duke's intimacy with her, but also that she has the Queen's heart above them. She has already brought her to paint, and in time will lead her into more debaucheries. The great Parliament still sits, and, that they may sit, they name the Duke with reverence. They have voted a consent to give five subsidies within a year, and if the King will yield the liberty of the subject he may have a new piecing with us at this present, and the Duke never be named in complaint; but these things are in doing, not done. The Duke has wrought the Earls of Arundel, Bristol, Essex, and Hertford, and the Bishop of Lincoln, to be still; but if he should attempt a legal purgation, to free him from after questions, the Lower House would begin again. No word of any great action this summer. The Earl of Denbigh's fleet cannot go out for want of men. [*Indorsed by Sec. Coke as having been intended for "some at Brussels," and it is added, "Intercepted with the Spanish letter to Nicholas Colle."*]
- April 21. 44. Order of the King in Council, that money be forthwith issued for satisfaction of the train of artillery and the horse troops employed in the expedition to Rhé, and that the Duke, general of the army, should discharge the said train and troopers as soon as money may possibly be had.
- April 21. 45. Buckingham to the Treasurer, Comptroller, Surveyor, and Clerk, principal Officers of the Navy. In the expedition to Rhé, the Earl of Lindsey furnished the seamen of the Rainbow with wine, stockings, shoes, and shirts. They are to cause speedy payment to be made for the same.
- April 21. 46. Henry Earl of Danby to Buckingham. The saltpetre-men having grievously oppressed the people of those parts, even exceeding the limits of the large patent granted to the Duke and

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the Earl of Totness, were convented at the Quarter Sessions ; but the Earl, to prevent delay of supplies of saltpetre, and to withhold complaint which might distract the parliamentary proceedings, advised the suspense of punishment, presuming the Duke will take care to reform their lewd courses ; and the rather because Stevens, the principal master of this rabble, privately confessed that he pays the Duke 1,700*l.* yearly rent for this exorbitant commission, which made the Earl much the more willing to interpose, as not forgetful of the promises passed between him and the Duke.

The French King's army engaged in the siege of that city consisted of eight or ten thousand horse and foot, and the fleet of from 20 to 25 ships. [Whitehall.] of the King's letter, in which he graciously accepts their care in billeting the soldiers, and states his intention to repay what has been disbursed, and to remove the troops as soon as may be. The season of the year and the King's designs will shortly call them into action. If they will send an account of the billet money the Secretary will make the best use he can of it to procure payment. [*It appears from an indorsement that a similar letter was written to the Deputy Lieutenants of the Isle of Wight.*] [Copy.]
- April 21. 50. Sir John Drake to Nicholas. Understands a messenger is
Ash. sent for Cuttance, for his contempt. Justly deserves to be punished, for the business, through his obstinacy, has received a great hindrance. The corn is ready to go for Plymouth, but men cannot be got. Thinks Nicholas has heard of the Brazil prize, brought into Bristol, with 300 chests of sugar and some Brazil wood.
- April 21. 51. William Willett to the same. This tide there is a prize
Bristol. brought in there by the Comfort, a Brazilman, with 540 chests of sugar. It is the best prize that has come thither since letters of marque were granted.
- April 21. 52. James Harrington to Bishop Laud, of Bath and Wells. Re-
quests that he may not be mulcted 4*l.* of his allowance as a fellow, over and above the 20 marks assessed upon him by the Bishop, the former sum having accrued during his suspension by the Bishop, until he answered such things as were objected against him.
- April 21. 53. Robert Hopton to John Thoroughgood. Begs him to acquaint
Witham[Friary].the Lord Lieutenant in what desperate case they stand with the billeted soldiers. It is held by Parliament-men so dangerous to billet any, as that they refuse to join in doing anything therein; and yesterday the captain who has a company billeted in Wells sent word that the billeters would presently turn their soldiers out of their houses, which if they do, all other towns will do the like, and the country will now generally refuse payment of money.
- April 22. 54. Sir Francis Nethersole to the Queen of Bohemia. If he could
The Strand. stay his writing till to-morrow noon he should be able to tell the issue of the Parliament, which he will not now take on him to foretell. A few days after his last, Sec. Coke made a motion wherein he showed that all the King's affairs were hindered by the stop in the matter of supply, and let us know that the King could not give an answer to our petition concerning billeting soldiers until we made some further progress in the business of the subsidies. He was seconded by the rest of the Privy Council, and yet his motion fell to the ground without opposition, the House expressing their resolution, by their silence, not to move in the matter of supply until they were satisfied on the points of liberty of persons and goods preferred to the Lords. Touching these points, there have been conferences, and the King's Attorney has argued for the King. Yesterday the Lords began to give sentence, but spent the

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day in resolving that the King and his Council have power to commit, and that they ought not to commit without cause. The question whether the cause ought to be expressed in the warrant of commitment was put off till this day. It having appeared by yesterday's debate that the plurality of voices in the Upper House would be for the King, the Commons sent that day a message for a conference. After long and hot disputation, it was obtained that we shall have conference to-morrow, to propound, as they say, ways of accommodation. If Capt. Coke, as James I. was wont to call him, may have the leading of their House, they will not yield to any terms, for at the conference, he said, the live child is ours. Prays that God may make them more wise and moderate than they have been, else they are all lost, and the Queen of Bohemia in the first place. Debate as to the lawfulness of granting commissions of martial law in time of peace. The demand of justice against Lord Suffolk for words spoken against Selden is delayed till a time of more leisure. Serjeant Ashley having said that the resolutions of the Commons would turn monarchy into anarchy, was committed, and has been enjoined to make submission at the bar.

[April 22.] 55. [Thomas Locke ?] to the Queen of Bohemia. Reports the proceedings in House of Lords, which form a subject of the preceding letter, with some later additions. The words said to have been spoken by the Earl of Suffolk were, "What! will not the Lower House hang Selden?" and being asked "Why?" he answered, "For raising records, to the end to sow sedition between the King and his people." Submission of Serjeant Ashley. Forces under command of the Earl of Denbigh. Has taken with him 2,200 land soldiers, to serve as mariners. Sir Thomas Coventry, Sir Richard Weston, Sir Edward Howard, and Sir George Goring, who, they say, shall be Lord Chamberlain to the Queen, are made barons.

April 22. 56. Sir James Bagg to Buckingham. Has made ready the bodies of the eleven ships. They want only men and victuals. The victuals are left to Mr. Lieutenant's man. As soon as Bagg can settle an order for the manning of them he will speed to the Duke. Requests the Duke to forward Bagg's desire that his son, Slanning, may accompany Lord Carlisle. Has sent his servant Biggs to receive such money as the times and the Duke can spare for the preservation of Bagg's credit. Prays for a blessed end to this Parliament, which he wishes may be the garden of the King's delights, but still so as in it the roses of his prerogative be preserved, for what his Majesty now consents unto binds him, and hardly will his recall what he gives from himself. Wishes he were with the Duke.

They of Sandwich have chosen Henry Foster to go to London to their burghesses, to make way to the Lords of the Council for their relief from this burthen. April 24. Buckingham to John Ellzey. Warrant to sell tenths of three prizes. [*Minute. See Vol. cxv., p. 41*.*]

Stafford, a letter of reasons to induce the Duke to be the means of dissolving the decree of the Council for sale of the powder made by Mr. Evelyn. Beseches him to take it into his serious consideration, that its continuance may not evermore keep the King's store weak. Is glad there is a committee of the Lords appointed to debate the business, and that he is not one of them. Should be sorry to appear contrary to the Duke. Had no other object, next to the common safety, than the preservation of the Duke and himself from blame.

April 24. 3. Petition of the Train of Artillery in the late Expedition to the Isle of Rhé to the same. Tehidie. Trimwith, a Cornishman, to have a ship restored to him, which was sold more than four years since by Order of the High Court of Admiralty.
- April 25. 22. Attested copy of the record of the conviction of Grace Jones,
tried at the Justice Hall, in the Old Bailey, for stealing six pounds in money, the property of Robert Stanton.
- April 25. 23. The like of Edwin Scroope, tried at the same place, for

French bark, with sixty chests of sugar, and now rides with his prize at St. Helen's, intending to send the prize to Shoreham or Chichester, and to compound for the tenths with Lord Nottingham, being so induced by Mr. Marlott, of Shoreham, Burgess in Parliament for that place, who persuades them that Lord Nottingham has a patent for the same. Is assured that a patent for pirates' goods, wrecks, and such like cannot deprive the Duke of his tenths.

Blandford. Lord Lieutenant. The regiment of Sir Thomas Fryer, of whose departure they lately certified the Earl, is again returned from Plymouth. 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- May 5. 33. William Calley to Endymion Porter. Thanks him for having Burdtop. procured the forbearance of certain money. Was at Stow Fair, and met Porter's brother Cannynge, and Sir Richard Browne. Rode with Cannynge to his house at Foscat on May Day. Thinks not to come to London this term, by reason of the foggy air not being very agreeable to his health, but hopes to see Porter and his wife in the long vacation.
- May 5. 34. Certificate of Miles Troughton, for Richard Miles to be his deputy purser in the Rainbow.
- May 5. 35. Extract from the Journals of the House of Lords, of a reference to a committee of privileges, touching the privilege of Lords of Parliament in answering upon their honour, in the performance of homage, and in the seizure of their goods in execution; with the resolutions of the Committee of Privileges, also derived from the Journals, subjoined.
- May 6. 36. Endymion Porter to Sec. Conway. Sends a business to From his receive despatch from the King, by the hands of Lord Conway, Lodging. which are always so full of courtesy to Porter, that he finds this day's is but a leading favour to the next; nor does Lord Conway grow weary with doing favours, but still apparels them with cheerful looks.
- May 6. 37. Sir Allen Apsley to Nicholas. Recommends Edward Nuttall, The Tower. who had been commended to him by Sec. Conway, for a purser's place. He is a clerk, has been at sea, and hath foreign languages.
- May 6. 38. John Ellzey to the same. Capt. Scras's prize is discharged at Southampton. Chichester. Recounts all his proceedings respecting the sugars purchased by Pescod out of Tiball's [Theobald's] prize. Has now taken Mr. Mayor's word to be answerable for the Duke's tenths. Sends a bill of exchange for 100*l.*, and will hasten more. The tenths of the salt will exceed his calculation. Must send up the coarse sugars to Mr. Dike, for they have no refining-house there.
- May 6. 39. Robert Leighton to his "kind and loving father, Mr. Alexander Leighton, doctor of medicine, at his house on the top of Edinburgh. Puddle Hill, beside the Blackfriars gate, near the King's Wardrobe." Previous letters written to the writer's father, brother, and mother. Sorry for his aunt's sickness. Prays him to remember the writer's duty to her, desiring her to pray for him, which is also his request to all his friends. The business that fell out with him arose out of a fight between his class and the "semies," which occasioned the provost to restrain them from play. The boys upon that made some verses, mocking the provost's red nose. Leighton, hearing of these verses, made a remark in

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prose, and presently, on the request of his schoolfellows, turned it into a verse, thus—(the provost's name is Okenhead):—

“ That which his name imports is falsely said,
That of the oaken wood his head is made ;—
For why ? If it had been composed so,
His flaming nose had fired it long ago.”

He had already sent his father the Verses of Apology. Begg his father to pray for him, that he may be kept from like falls. The desire of his heart is to be as little chargeable as may be. [*On the back of this letter are written two sentences in other hands ; one respecting the nature of the sin of backsliding, and the other, “ If this Parliament have not a happy conclusion, the sin is yours ; I am free of it.”*]

May 7. Aboard the St. Esprit, in the Downs. 47. Capt. Richard Paramour to Nicholas. The wind being like to come fair, he hurriedly announces that he has made stay of a ship belonging to "Milton in Norway," bound for Nantes, laden with deal boards, hides, and tar. The master in a manner acknowledges her to be prize. Refers to the bearer for further information.

May 8. 48. Copy of the Petition of Right, as finally agreed upon in the House of Commons, and delivered to the House of Lords, at a conference between the Houses. [*See Commons' Journals, I., 894. Lords' Journals, III., 785, 786.*]

May 8. Buckingham to John Ellzey. Coarse sugars, received for the Duke's tenths, not being so vendible in those parts as in London, by reason there are no houses to refine the same, he is to consign the same to Richard Dike, if he thinks it will be for the Duke's profit, if not, to make sale thereof. [*Copy. See Vol. cxv., p. 41*.*]

May 8. 49. Petition of Sir Francis Willoughby to Buckingham. Prays the Duke to vouchsafe him the making of an Irish Viscount, in recompence of his lost company in the Low Countries, and 500*l.*, due to him for arrears on account of the expedition to Cadiz.

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May 8. 50. Sir Henry Palmer to Nicholas. Wishes he could send better news than they have returned with. What was here given out to be assuredly feasible they find directly impossible. On the approach of the English fleet, the French fleet retreated under their ordnance. The palisadoes, by which the passage up the river was prevented, described. They came on the 1st, and till the best of the springs were past waited for an opportunity to give an attempt, though with no hope of success, but the wind not favouring, and it being dangerous to ride there embayed, subject to fire-ships and in shoal water, the council of war determined that they should put out to sea, and spend their victual abroad, Lord Denbigh cruising between Ushant and Scilly, the writer between Portsmouth and Cape La Hogue. Capt. Allen [Alleyn?], by one of the engines taking fire, was blown up, and several seamen with him. No man but looked back upon the poor town with eyes of pity, though not able to help them.

May 8. 51. Sir Richard Harrison to Francis Windebank. The offender against the fishermen has been before Parliament, who have taken away his commission, and enjoined restitution of the nets. Great hope that the King and Parliament will part fair. Many interruptions by messages from the King, and great danger of breaking. They have spent all their time in framing a bill for reviving the old laws touching the liberty of the subject, but perceiving, by the King's answer to their petition, that they were not likely to have such a bill, they have framed a petition of right, with which they resolve to content themselves for this session. The King has sent word that Tuesday next they shall break up, but the writer supposes his Majesty will grant longer time. This day they had agreed on the days of payment of the five subsidies.

May 8. 52. Promise of Capt. John Pennington. Henry Clifford, having given bond to Capt. Pennington for payment of a moiety of all profits, by means of Capt. Pennington discovered to have been embezzled, in victualling or paying the Zouch Phoenix in the expedition against the pirates of Algiers, Capt. Pennington hereby undertakes to use his best care for discovery of all embezzlements in reference to the whole fleet in the same expedition for the benefit of Henry Clifford.

May 8. 53. List of the crew of Capt. Hawkeridge's ship.

May 9. 54. The Council to Buckingham. To give order for setting forth the Spy pinnace, victualled for five months, to ply up and down on the coasts of France, Jersey, and Guernsey, to discover what men-of-war were to be found near the English coasts.

May 9. 55. Officers of the Navy to the same. The allowance of 10*l.* per annum was taken from David Ducke, master caulker at Chatham, by the late Commissioners for the ease of the King's charge. Recommend that it be continued.

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May 9. 56. Officers of the Navy to Buckingham. Have received certificate from Henry Goddard, one of his Majesty's master shipwrights, that the Assurance is the fittest ship in the navy to be sent into the Narrow Seas.

At sea. 57. William Earl of Denbigh to the same. Men have ever been the censure of the world who have returned unsuccessful from public employments. Hopes he shall so satisfy the King as will not only clear him in his Majesty's opinion, but justify him before a Parliament. Misinformation has been the cause of this misfortune. They found Rochelle so blocked up, that in eight days' stay they never heard from thence. The palisado is so strengthened with two floats of ships, both within and without, moored and fastened together, from their ports to half-mast high, that, lying in shoal water, it is impossible to be forced. Kept the road, expecting intelligence from the town. Some of the French captains concluded the passage not feasible, others propounded ways rather of loss and dishonour to the English than of good to themselves. By a council of war have resolved to send the victuallers well guarded home, and to divide the men-of-war into two squadrons, to ply between Ushant and Scilly and the Isle of Wight and Guernsey.

Tehidic. 58. Francis Bassett to Nicholas. On the 6th inst. a small bark of Ireland, which had been taken by a French man-of-war, came into the pier of St. Ives, in distress. Desires instructions how to deal with it, and the French persons who were on board. The French men-of-war, which had committed so much spoil between Bristol and the Land's End, had been beaten thence by a ship or two of Bristol, but there are one or two small vessels again on the English coast which chased in all the fishing boats.
- May 10. Warrant to Sir Richard Tracy, that, in removing his Majesty's fallow deer out of the chase of Corselane, co. Gloucester, care be taken to preserve the King's game. [*Docquet.*]

- May 10. Grant to Richard Williams, his Majesty's servant, of the forfeiture of a bond of 250*l.*, entered into by George Acton and Thomas Hailes, for transportation of divers cloths from Ipswich to Rochelle, which they have not performed. [*Docquet.*]
- May 10. Dispensation to William Alablaster, Doctor of Divinity, for not residing upon his parsonage of Tharfield, in the diocese of Lincoln. [*Docquet.*]
- May 10. 59. Officers of the Navy to Buckingham. Not having received certificate of the burden or value of John Brigges's ship, or of the nature of his contract with Sir Ralph Bingley, they cannot judge what allowance is fit to be made to him.

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May 10. Nicholas to Mr. Oliver. Has spoken to Sir Henry Marten concerning the Duke's tenths of about 100 negroes, taken in a Spanish vessel by the Good Fortune, of London, set forth by Sir Thomas Love, John Hanger, and others. The Judge wished the Duke to accept of half his tenths for the proceeds of the negroes and such other goods and merchandises as were taken by that man-of-war, the adventurers to pay the Duke's tenths in kind. [*Copy. Nicholas's Letter Book, p. 75.*]

House. 60. William Bold to Nicholas. Thanks for his mediation, and desires the continuance of his good offices betwixt Mr. Lieutenant of the Tower and himself. Does not doubt his right, and, to give the Lieutenant satisfaction, would be willing to show the clearness of it to his counsel or any friend. Desires only his favour not to countenance Bold's adversaries in their obstinacy.

May 10
At sea. 61. Capt. Thomas Ketelby to the same. The impossibility of effecting the enterprise was such as would have shown in them madness rather than valour to attempt it. The representations of its easiness made by the French Deputies have wronged both the State and the Duke. The palisadoes cannot be forced but by those who are masters of the forts and castles on the shore. Nor are the French sea forces so much to be contemned as those of Rochelle make them. During eight days they received no intelligence or word from Rochelle, either by sea or land. The Earl intends to visit several places on the French coast before Sir Henry Palmer's departure. Division of the King's ships between the Earl and Sir Henry. The Earl has sent Nicholas his journal, to be shown the Duke if he thinks fit. The writer sends also a relation written by a French gentleman.

Whitehall. 63. The Council to Buckingham. For the defence of the Isle of Wight, ammunition is to be sent thither in the New Year's Gift, of Hull. It is requisite she should go under convoy. Pray him to give order to Robert Seety, of the Plain Joan, of London, to do that service.

May 11. 64. Sec. Conway to the Commissioners for Soldiers in co. Hants. His Majesty and the Council had taken notice of some refusal among the inhabitants of Odiham to provide any longer for the soldiers billeted there. The Council direct them to give strict order for the soldiers continuing there without any innovation or disturbance. [*Copy.*]

May 11. 65. Capt. Henry Huncks to Sec. Conway. Excuses his conduct in relation to a ring. Desires his help concerning Eastman, all whose goods he had delivered to the officers. He has in hand 20*l.* of Eastman's, which he is advised not to give up lest the creditors should demand it.

Newport. Among the numerous companies of soldiers billeted in the small circuit of the Isle of Wight, there have been committed many foul disorders, even unto murder, and the officers will not join with the writers in punishing offences committed by the soldiers. In these companies there are 200 Highlanders, a ruder kind of people. The inhabitants complain of the amount due for billeting money, which amounts now to about 4,000*l.*, the number of soldiers being about 1,500. The officers receive into their companies some of that island, which the writers conceive may be prejudicial to the country.

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- upon the inhabitants (being fallen into great poverty, by reason of their goods stayed in France, and the general want of trade, and being behind of their billet money for Lord Conway's son's company, and Sir James Scott's, for 15 weeks) did protest they must forsake their dwellings. Seeing the impossibility of billeting these soldiers, the Mayor and Justices had petitioned the King and Council for relief. Intreat him to take their case into consideration, and, if they have done anything which has distasted him, they are heartily sorry for it.

At Sherborne he met the Rochelle Admiral, and near Honiton Mr. Clarke, who said they had found all things just to his expectation, and as he thought it, so he now thinks it, not possible to be mastered by any power from hence. Learning the Squirrel was at Dartmouth, Bagg sent his servant with the King's letters to the Earl of Denbigh, and a warrant to the Captain presently to set sail in search of the Earl. On Wednesday he came to Plymouth, and sent off other letters for the Earl in a French bark returned from the Fleet, the captain whereof, named St. Martin, intends to land and use disguises to come into Rochelle, to give them heart and spirit to stand out. Bagg has also sent copies of the King's letters to the Earl to the Land's End, to be despatched to Scilly. Progress made in victualling ships. Wishes land soldiers, being good musketeers, were sent to the Earl, for mariners only are not to be depended on. "Every day calleth them more coward than the other." Common fame lays all the fault on his Lordship, but the French report that he was forward to go on. Wishes this Parliament a happy end, which will conduce more to the honour of the Duke than if it break, for he is the object of all envy; yet it should not be the Duke's act to prize five subsidies worth one Rose of his Majesty's prerogative, which is that which must put difference between the King and his judges, by whom popularity would have all to be governed.

The Secretary Portsmouth. has sent to a deputy lieutenant in the further part of the Isle of Wight, to use all means to discover Sir Henry Palmer, and deliver a letter to him, charging him to return to the Earl of Denbigh at Scilly, and with him to Rochelle. The Rocheller, with Sir Henry Hungate, has put to sea this afternoon. Preparations making at Portsmouth. The St. Esprit and her pinnace will have two months' victuals aboard by Monday. Agreement made with six men-of-war to go with Lord Denbigh, and doubts not to set out at least 10 or 12 sail. The Triumph, Warspite, and the Esperance may be set to sea as soon as men and victuals can be ready, but the gunners, boatswains, carpenters, and pursers should be commanded to repair aboard. They are all in London, to the prejudice of the service.

- [May 24.] 3. Officers of the Navy to the same. Do not find that the ship mentioned in the inclosed petition is upon any estimate. Sir Philip Carteret may have undertaken the service by some agreement made by him or some person employed by him, in which case his Majesty might pay twice for the same service. In a second postscript, Bagg remarks that his tears tell him that the Duke intends to go this journey, and could give many reasons to dissuade him. If he cannot prevail, begs to share his fortunes of adventure.
- May 24. 5. Sir James Bagg to Buckingham. Can call himself friend to
Plymouth. none but such as love the Duke. The Duke has had his opinion of Sir Ferdinando Gorges, both concerning his affection to the Duke and his abilities. Gorges vows that he now honours the Duke, and pretends that he will undertake, in the place of second to any which shall command in chief, to open the passage into Rochelle. Desired Bagg to inclose his letter, which he has undertaken to do, but as the Duke likes the affection and abilities of the man, let him take knowledge of the receipt of it, or let the ill conveyance light upon Bagg, whose heart is the Duke's, and who will live and die the Duke's "most humble servant and slave." 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May 27. 34. John Foyle to Nicholas. Recommends Captain Thomas Dirdo for some employment in one of the King's ships, and prays that his (Foyle's) son Richard may be purser in the same ship.
- May 27. 35. John Ellzey to the same. Further information respecting Southampton. the imported tobacco, being the produce of certain negroes sold in Virginia, and the disorderly proceedings of Capt. Barnaby Burley and Capt. Hippisley, in relation to the Duke's tenths. Congratulations on the good hopes of the Parliament.
- May 27. 36. Abstract of so much of the preceding letter as relates to the misconduct of Capt. Hippisley.
- May 27. 37. The same to the same. In his letter of that morning omitted Southampton. to write that Capt. Scras had arrived in that port with a prize of French wines, some 50 tons or thereabouts.
- May 28. 38. Sir Thomas Trenchard, John Browne, and John Whetcombe Dorchester. to the Council. In obedience to their order, they had examined the matters by Colonel Fryer laid to the charge of one Bushroad, a magistrate of the town of Dorchester. Bushroad refused to billet any of the soldiers which came lately back from Plymouth, and said that the warrants were not sufficient authority for the town to receive them, but they cannot find that he committed any personal misdemeanor towards the said Colonel.
- May 28. 39. Buckingham to the Officers of the Navy. On the 15th inst. he referred the petition of Robert Davis to them to examine, and to give warrant for payment of what is due, which, as he is informed, they not only neglected to do, but returned the same without any answer, which tends so much to the disheartening of seamen, and the scandal and prejudice of the service, that he once more requires them speedily to do what he before directed.
- May 28. 40. Sir James Bagg to Buckingham. It being thought that the Plymouth. Earl of Bedford's instructions are at an end, the fleet not putting into any port in his Lieutenancy, he intends to speed to the Court. Bagg's care gave his Majesty's letter to the Earl of Denbigh about Scilly. Will make ready eight fire-ships. Since the Duke commands Bagg to be troubled with the Rochellers, they shall not want. Reports fully his preparation of victuals. Capt. Fogg has returned with "General Buxton, my friend's," Bristol provisions, and by his coming off has shown himself a man-of-war. If the Duke will countenance him he will prove a useful servant. Purposes to send him to Portsmouth. The nine ships shall be ready for the Duke's first commands.

A master that came in one of the victuallers from Plymouth brings word that most of the ships with victuals for Rochelle are taken or spoiled by the Dunkirkers, whilst Sir Henry Palmer, to whose convoy the Admiral had commended them, followed a chase of certain Hamburgers or Hollanders. Sir Henry has not yet returned from his chase, although he has sent in eight Hollanders or Hamburgers which he has made prize of, on what ground the writer does not know.

- May 28. 46. Francis Earl of Bedford to the same. Although in poor Plymouth. health, reached Plymouth the day after the fleet passed without touching there, which by his instructions cleared him of all that he had to do. On his arrival he called upon Sir James Bagg and the rest of the Deputy Lieutenants, and they put the affairs concerning the fleet into that way that Sir James Bagg approved. It was conceived by the gentlemen that were with him, that his longer stay in those parts could no way conduce to the King's service.
- May 28. 47. Capt. William Towerson, jun., to the same. This day the Portsmouth. Earl of Denbigh and the whole fleet anchored at St. Helen's. After ending with Burlamachi, being ready to depart on his intended journey, the Savoyan Ambassador's chaplain and Lady Willoughby sent for him, and told him that it was the common report with the Roman clergy that he was bound over beyond seas as an intelligencer from the state here. Popham, Savage, Davies, and others had verified the report to them. An Irish friar, William McAulive, who went over with Lord Carlisle, had told them thereof, and that he kept company with Daniel MacCarthy, a mere Protestant. His intent being thus frustrated, he appeals to the Secretary to commiserate his case by obtaining the King's letters to the Lord Deputy of Ireland to prefer him in that country.

55. Rowland Woodward to Francis Windebank. Both Houses of Parliament have presented the Petition to his Majesty, by whom it was graciously accepted, desiring he might have some days to answer that which they had been so many weeks a doing. On

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Monday it was agreed to by the Lords, who presently after came to the King, and had the favour, every one in order, to kiss his hand, except the Earl of Arundel, who was not there. Some say he had done it privately before. The Speaker, calling on the Bishop of Lincoln at Lady Villiers's house, the Bishop desired to be excused till some other time. The Countess of Buckingham's coach, with four horses, was at the door at the same time. You need no expositor on this text. Ned Clarke protests that he only served as interpreter, but is mightily dejected, apprehending the cloud will fall upon him, whom none of the Bedchamber, nor followers of the Duke, have visited. He is accused by some ladies in court, and creatures of the Duke, to have said before his going, that the action was unjust. Lord Carlisle is at Antwerp. The States have protested against detaining their ships at Portsmouth, which business Lord Carleton could not accommodate. The King's journey to Portsmouth is put off. This afternoon Sir Henry Hungate came from Plymouth. Capt. Pennington is presently to go to Rochelle with some addition of ships, but so long as the other captains are not recalled the world has no opinion of his success. The writer's brother, Grymesdych, took leave on Sunday, but on Monday he and the heirs utterly broke off.

May 29. 57. Sec. Coke to Buckingham. Last night, about three o'clock, the Earl of Denbigh came to St. Helen's, with the St. Andrew and other ships, to the number of 15 or 16. The Secretary waited on Lord Fielding, to see his father on board, and whilst they were there Capt. Parker, in the Vanguard, brought in eight Hamburgers or Hollanders, which Sir Henry Palmer had taken off Scilly. Sir Henry is not come in from a chase of seven Hamburgers more. Whilst he thus pursues friends, the victuallers he was appointed to convoy are all scattered and divers of them taken by the Dunkirkers, and they understood in the Admiral's fleet, that the Dunkirkers, even in sight of the fleet, took three of their victuallers. They have carried away one, and took the masters and seven mariners, and the corn, out of the other,

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and then turned them off. Thinks, allowing interest, present money might be had. To do the King service, Sir Allen has sold and mortgaged his lands, and engaged his friends and himself near to 100,000*l.* The King assigned 20,000*l.*, part of 41,216*l.* of the said debt, to be paid in lands, upon the same conditions as the contract with the City. By opposition of the Treasurer, the order on the subject was made conditionally, and is therefore ineffectual. Sets forth his claim to interest on debts long due to him for victualling. States the circumstances of each. Has reported to the Earl that the taking of eleven might be justly complained of, as a disturbance of trade. Allen and the writer approached the works with six floaters, which, finding their time, they put into the water, but Capt. Allen putting one of them over the boat's side, blew himself and seven more in the air. Those which Williams had, arrived either on the ships or the palisadoes, and did execution; how much they could not know, by reason the Earl set sail the next day towards the sea. The writer has sent his engineer up for such things as they shall want, with which he will acquaint the Duke.

The soldiers threaten to take the meat from the butchers' shops, and others take away men's wares, and break open the doors of the billeters; yea, some of the officers would have killed their billeters in their own houses. The inhabitants daily take their oaths that they stand in fear of their lives, and there is continual fear of rapine, robbery, and bloodshed.

The next day he sent a message to the Lower House, which required them not to make any adjournment at Whitsuntide. This gave some discontentment, and it was resolved that no entry should be made thereof, and that, although the House would not adjourn, no business of importance should be done till after the holidays. On Whitmonday, the King came to the House, and gave them the answer to the petition, which is inclosed. Being something oraculous, and having no reference to the petition, it gave little satisfaction to many men, who fell the next day on making a Remonstrance to the King on the dangers of the kingdom. Speech of Sir John Eliot. Message on Wednesday from the King, that he would not yield to any alteration in his answer, but would close the Session on the 11th inst. The House proceeded with the Remonstrance, until another message, which absolutely forbade them to do so. Scene which ensued. Most part of the House fell a weeping. Sir Robert Phillips could not speak for weeping. Others blamed those that wept, and said they had swords to cut the throats of the King's enemies. Remonstrance prepared against the breach made on the liberty of Parliament, and voted all save the last resolution touching the Duke, when the Speaker delivered a message requiring the House to adjourn until the next morning. That afternoon the King and the Lords were in Council from two till eight on the question whether the Parliament should be dissolved. The negative was resolved on. On the following morning the Speaker explained away his message, and the House proceeded with the Remonstrance. That day the Lords desired them to join in a petition to the King for a better answer to the former petition. The King agreed thereto, and came that afternoon, gave the customary royal assent, adding other observations which are repeated. It is not possible to express with what joy this was heard, nor what joy it causes in all the city, where they are making bonfires at every door, such as were never seen but upon his Majesty's return from Spain. *Incloses,*

This would have required time to settle, wherefore they desired to pass a temporary Act; this the King would not accept, whereupon the Commons prayed the King to adjourn and not prorogue the Parliament, so that any bill hereafter to be passed might have relation to the first day of the Session. The King not consenting, the Commons prepared a Remonstrance. On Thursday morning the Speaker was kept at Court till nine o'clock, and it was given out in Westminster Hall and at Court that there was to be an adjournment. As the House of Commons was reading the engrossed Remonstrance they were sent for by the King, who made the speech inclosed, and put an end to the Session. The Parliament-men have gone away much discontented, the rather that the persons put into the Tower by the Commons were delivered the same day. It is said, also, that Dr. Mainwaring is absolved from his suspension, which Sir Francis hardly believes. Mr. Long, one of the hottest men against the Duke, is sued in the Star Chamber for having been absent from his county in Parliament whilst sheriff. Strange animosity in the House of Commons against the Duke, shown by Dalbier having been ill-handled there, and by a Bill for the naturalization of Gerbier having been in danger to have been cast out before it ever had reading. Customary parliamentary pardon refused to be passed lest his Grace could not have been

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questioned thereafter for the offences laid to his charge last Parliament. Libellous letter found in the House of Commons taken to the King, and by him burnt. Believed to have related to the Queen of Bohemia, and to have proceeded from the Jesuits. The Petition of Right is printing, with the two former answers, and the speech of his Majesty the last day of the Session, which will give further discontentment. *Inclofes,*

[June 30.] 53. Petition of all the Posts of England, being in number 99 poor men, to the Council. Divers of them lie in prison, and many are daily threatened to be arrested for their great debts, which they are in for want of their entertainment being unpaid ever since November 1621, which now ariseth to 22,626*l.* 19*s.* 3*d.* Pray for present supply, and a certain course of payment hereafter.

June 30. Aboard the St. Andrew. 54. William Earl of Denbigh to Buckingham. Received his directions to send ships for guarding the parts about the Isle of Wight. Finds the ships so weakly manned that he should hardly adventure them to sea, but the seamen will not go to sea until they have monies. He has endeavoured to draw them to obedience, but his labour is to no purpose. Has appointed two private men-of-war for transporting Sir Philip Carteret. The King's ketch went thence on the 22nd for landing Mons. Le Goslirre, and is not yet returned. Fears she has miscarried by some accident.

June 30. 55. Officers of the Navy to the same. Have examined the information given against Capt. Prynne by the Master and Purser of the St. Anthony, and find his carriage both negligent and full of abuses. He has sold beer and other victuals, and few of his company lodge aboard, but come at their pleasures and take their victuals. Is insensible that what he has done is amiss, and makes sport of it. The Master and Purser both very inefficient, and had the Captain been subtle, and kept good quarter with them, would have left the discovery to time, and shared the profit. The ship is one of those laden with provisions to be convoyed to Portsmouth and Plymouth.

June 30. Portsmouth. 56. Sec. Coke to the Owners of the Sarah, of Jersey. Certificat^o, setting forth the employment of their ship to enable them to receive their pay.

June 30. Woodbridge. 57. Edward Jones to Capt. John Parkinson. His Lieutenant and Ensign were right nobly brought to the ground, and had a sermon, and his company to go before them, with some of the train band, and most of the chiefest men of the town with their wives to follow, but they are not yet covered with mould, for the coroner has not yet sat on them. Neither country nor town will do more for his soldiers. Sir Harry Glemham says he cannot nor will not. If not relieved, they must sell their arms as the Beecles soldiers did not long since.

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- June 30. 58. Information of John Taylor, touching the refusal of Mr. Delabarre to deliver up his ship till a course were taken for satisfying his old debts from his Majesty.
- June 30. 59. Statement of Richard Whyte, master of the Harry, of Gosport, of the employment of his ship in the expedition to Rochelle, and the money and provisions received.
- [June 30.] 60. Information of James Master, that Matthew Burley told him that Thomas Scott, one of the burgesses for Canterbury, said the people were simple to let the soldiers be so long there, and denied to billet any himself.
- June 30. 61. ——— Paine to Doctor Medouce [James Meddus]. Wishes Highgate. him not to speak with Lord or Lady Conway about the matter of Newfoundland until he has spoken to him again. Will write to the Governor, and communicate his answer to Lord Conway. [*Under-written is a note respecting a silver mine discovered in Newfoundland by one Phillips, "a Scotch and mineral man," residing with Sir William or Mr. William Alexander.*]
- June 30. 62. Dr. Thomas Rives to his cousin Nicholas. Has perused the depositions concerning the St. Anthony, and finds nothing whereupon to ground an appeal.
- [June ?] 63. The King to the Vice Chancellor, Regents, and Non-regents Whitehall. of the University of Cambridge. To admit Thomas Taylor [of Aldermanbury, chaplain to Sec. Conway], to the degree of Doctor of Divinity. [*Perhaps copy of a suggested letter.*]
- [June ?] 64. The same to the same. [*Copy of a letter, perhaps proposed to be sent for the same purposes as the preceding.*]
- [June ?] 65. Spencer Lord Compton to the King. Statement of things which he prays his Majesty to do for him on his resigning his place [of Master of the Robes]:—I. That the bills due to tradesmen may be paid. II. That he may have a *quietus* for jewels delivered, according to the King's command, both in Spain and elsewhere. III. That 5,500*l.* due from Buckingham, but the payment of which the King took upon himself, may be paid, part being for land by Burley, which the Duke has, and is to have assured upon his son. IV. 71. Sir John Maynard to Buckingham. Vindicates himself from Buckingham's suspicions that he had been unfaithful to him during the last Session of Parliament. Justifies his conduct with respect to the Jesuit's letter found at Clerkenwell and the treatment of Dalbier. There are 60 Parliament-men can witness that he lay at them perpetually to waive the Remonstrance. He took off many lawyers from naming the Duke, and pawned his reputation that the Duke would be a good instrument of the Commonwealth. Before the Parliament the Duke gave him commission to converse with the Duke's enemies, and write what he pleased. Published a discourse to show that the Duke was not an Arminian, and annexed reasons why the Parliament should not meddle with him. Left his discourse in several preachers' hands, and noticed that the preciser sort inclined to moderation till the King first answered the Petition of Right.

June.

72. William Viscount Mansfield to the same. Reports the result of a treaty with Viscount Newark for the purchase of an honour. He was willing to part with a reasonable sum of money, but could not be induced to sell land to Dr. Moore, having made a solemn vow to the contrary. With reference to a dispute between Sir John Savile and the writer, respecting a keepership which Sir John would not part with except in exchange for certain land belonging to the writer or his mother, the writer begs that things may stand between them as at first. He would do anything in the world rather than that, and his mother will not part with the land, being the only testimony left her by her sister Jane Countess of Shrewsbury. He is a northern man, and if there be a deadly feud between him and Sir John Savile he hopes the Duke will pardon it,

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- [June ?] 73. Eliza Lady Falkland to Sec. Conway. On behalf of a servant of Sir Philip Carteret, who, bringing over some tobacco for his master's use, had it stopped in the Custom House. His master not yet come to solicit for himself.
- [June ?] 74. D. Portius and Nicholas Geerelo to the same. In December last they came hither from Holland, and were sent to Scilly, to strengthen the same. Have returned for six weeks. Pray for the recompence of 500 guilders, the same that has been given to their fellow engineers.
- [June.]
Brancepeth. 75. John Cosin to Bishop Laud of Bath and Wells. Licentious libels, lately printed without licence, have made him the subject of every man's censure. Has resolved to make no other answer but "*Dixi custodiam.*" Do what he can he shall be censured still. Beseeches the King to continue his gracious protection over him, and the Bishop to be a means of the same. Replies to accusations of altering the Common Prayer Book, arising out of some marginal directions, written at the request of Bill and Norton, to be a help in amending faults for which they had been a little before schooled by the Bishop, and also to a complaint of his having advised the adding of the Ordination Book to the Prayer Book, which was grounded upon the Stat. 8 Elizabeth, cap. 1., which revives the Stat. of Edward VI., whereby that book was annexed to the Book of Common Prayer. Calls these things to the Bishop's remembrance that he may make use thereof for satisfying great persons, who, for want of knowing these things, may peradventure take exception at what is done. Is now resident upon his parsonage of Brancepeth, which he cannot name without thanks to the Duke and the Bishop, by whose goodness he enjoys it.
- [June.] 76. Hannibal Potter to Lady Walter. Wishes her to acquaint Lord Conway with the grounds of his defence in the suit between Mr. Stephens and himself. Hopes at her request Lord Conway will let cause contend with cause, and reason with reason.
- [June ?] 77. Lieutenant and other Officers of the Ordnance to the Council. Report the quantity of powder (49 lasts and 12 lbs.) remaining in the hands of the merchants and the East India Company. Have drawn them to be content to sell at the rate of 5*l.* 5*s.* per barrel or hundred weight for ready money.
- [June ?] 78. Petition of Dirick Petersen and others, owners of the Black Dog, of Rotterdam, to the same. In a voyage from London to the coast of Barbary, their ship was intercepted by Capts. John Steevens and John Nutt, and brought into Southampton. The Admiralty has adjudged only one sixteenth to the captors as lawful prize, but they have appealed to the Court of Delegates, and have caused the ship to be pressed for the King's service. Petitioners having given security, pray for letters of assistance in discharge of the imprisonment.

They are from Lord Caulfield's servant, for a supply of powder for Ireland ; from Tristram Flower, for a grant to be Surveyor of castles and forts in several counties ; from Sir Miles Fleetwood, for allowance of 20s. in the 100*l.* on payments made out of the Court of Wards ; from Hugh Terrell, Henry Bold, John Reading, Thomas Bushell, Lady Molyneux, John Bolles, for a baronetage ; Mr. Hardaret, Peter Delauney, preacher to the French congregation in Norwich, that he may be presented to the rectory of Stanford Rivers, granted to him by the late King, in recompence for his translating the English Liturgy into French ; Henry Campian and Isaac Campian, Sir Robert Vernon, Humphrey Rogers, his Majesty's servant, and John Merideth, for the benefit of lands concealed on the deaths of Sir Thomas Middlecoats and Miles Garthwaite, both of co. Lincoln.

Lord Percy has retired to the country; who shall be [the Queen's] Vice Chamberlain is not known; Sir Thomas Jermyn the only man named. Lord Carleton made Viscount Dorchester. Lord Denbigh is reconciled to the Duke, and has been with the King. On Monday next the King goes to Portsmouth; the Duke will go himself to this exploit. Parliament and Coronation in Scotland appointed about September 20. Ecclesiastical preferments. Queen intends to

He knows that the Earl has the Lieutenancy of Essex and the forts of Harwich, which Lord Holland keeps from him, as he hears, under the Great Seal. The Earl moved the King, who said he would consider of it. His desire is, that Conway will end the business. If Lord Holland will help the Earl to the keeping of the Castle of "Wyngor" in exchange for the forts, he would be ready to yield up the Lieutenancy to the King. Intreats him to move it betimes, and to make as good a bargain as he can.

On Saturday last, in the forenoon, the Duke was stabbed, in his chamber at Portsmouth, by one Lieutenant Felton, and died presently of that wound, which he received under the left pap. The circumstances are related with much difference. That which most agree in is, that the Duke, lying that morning somewhat long abed, was called up by Walter Montagu to hear some good news of the relief of Rochelle. Mons. de Soubise coming to him to hear of this news, Felton came into his Grace's chamber. In the tumult, some imputing the deed to the French, Felton boldly took it on him, and said he had done it for the good of his King and country. He had some private discontentment for being put by the company when his captain was slain in the Isle of Rhé, but he alleges his desire of the public good for the cause of his fact, and offered not to escape. Various circumstances antecedent to the fact, which are very considerable; a sailor killed in a mutiny, and rumours prevalent in London, Cornwall, and Huntingdonshire. The King took the Duke's death very heavily, keeping his chamber all that day, as is well to be believed; but the base multitude in this town drink healths to Felton, and there are infinitely more cheerful than sad faces of better degree. The stone of offence being now removed by the hand of God, it is to be hoped that the King and his people will come to a perfect unity, and that the Earl will return to be a principal instrument in that good work. The Secretary of Mons. Joachimi has promised to convey this to Paris.

This testimony Dorchester owes him after his death. Dorchester can see that it is the King's purpose not to discharge himself so much of affairs upon anyone. Lord Lindsey has the command of the forces for the present service, but the Admiralty will be governed by commission, and the King has declared that he will hold up the Duke's places for a good while, and that the first suitors shall be most sure to fail. There was never greater demonstration of affection than his Majesty shows to the deceased Duke in all which concerns his honour, estate, friends, and enemies, whom he cannot well look upon if any come in his way; and for this murderer, he is sure to escape no punishment which either the martial law or the common law can inflict upon him. A Frenchman!" his guilty conscience making him believe it was "Felton! Felton!" he came out of the kitchen ; said, "I am the man ;" and rendered himself to the company. Jointly with Sec. Coke, the writer examined the man, and found he had no particular offence against the Duke, but grounded his practice on the Parliament Remonstrance, so as to make himself a martyr for his country. He came from London expressly the Wednesday, arriving at Portsmouth the very morning, not above half an hour before he committed it. We could not discover any complices. His Majesty has ordained Commissioners to proceed with him as the nature of the fact requires. The murderer gloried in his act the first day, but when I told him he was the first assassin of an Englishman, a gentlemen, a soldier, and a Protestant, he shrank at it, and is now grown penitent.  told her that the news was the Duke of Buckingham was killed,

Fourteen sail of Hollanders in the pier of Dover stayed upon the general restraint. Finds that most part of their lading is prohibited goods, as pitch, tar, &c., and of a very great value. Desires to know what shall be done with them. In France, prohibited goods shipped in that country for England by any Hollander stand forfeited.

Aug. 31. 56. Sir Robert Karr to James Earl of Carlisle. On so strange an occasion as is now fallen out among them, has not forgotten to wish the Earl at the helm as earnestly as those of his friends in whom he puts greater confidence.

Was at the Court, and From his House, saw the King; but it fell out so unfortunate that he did not kiss his at Yateley. hands, because he saw his Majesty something discontented. Fell sick, being lodged in an ill place. Prays the Secretary to remember his business to the King on a fit opportunity. When the King comes into those parts the Earl will wait upon him, hoping that he will freely give the Earl leave in a dutiful manner to impart his mind wholly. If he had but the keeping of Wingor Castle, would yield up all.

The King will stay here [Southwick] until the fleet be gone. The Countess of Carlisle has had a touch of the small-pox, but is very well, and without any blemish. Mrs. Bubb stayed with her all the time. They had much ado to keep the Queen from her. The King sent off to visit her. Hopes the Earl's ship is near St. Christopher's before this. Particulars of business affairs of the Earl.
- Sept. 1. 5. John Gibbon to the same. Thanks for favours shown to the writer's brother, as well as to himself. The removing time with the ill solicitation is the cause why the Earl's business goes not on.
- Sept. 1. 6. Francis Earl of Rutland, Thomas Lord Savage, Sir Robert The Savoy. Pye, Richard Oliver, and Thomas Fotherley, executors of the late Duke of Buckingham, to Capt. John Pennington. The Duchess of Buckingham's affections being such as she is not able

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to look into the Duke's estate, she has desired the writers to do it. They are to give an account presently to his Majesty, and intreat the Captain therefore to send a brief account of what monies he has received from the Duke, and for what service it was intended and has been issued.

The words were spoken privately, and in a cellar, and at the same time he drank a health to Felton, which is a common thing in London and other places. He said also, that he had oftentimes had a mind to do the same thing upon the Duke, but for fear of hanging; that he had said that if there were a hell, or a devil in hell, the Duke was with him; and that his Majesty called the Duke sometimes "Steeny," but does not remember that he said there was some profound wisdom in it that cannot be fathomed. Things concerning St. Christopher's are in the same state, save a letter come to the hands of Tom Davis speaks of a desire a Governor of the West Indies has to supplant the Earl. Hopes to propound a way to make those islands past fear of the King of Spain. The Hol-

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landers have lately taken 2,000,000*l.* from him at the Havannas, and have 60 ships there which will not stir till they have the Plate fleet.

Order by the Committee of Officers appointed by the Lord General and Council of War, setting forth the order in which the ships of the English fleet were to proceed to attack the French fleet which hindered the approach to Rochelle. In spite of the interference of the writer, they carried away two cables, one worth 40*l.* There were 100 people aboard rifling. Requests instructions, and a commission to examine those that have the goods, or they will never be had again, for St. Kevern men do not use to deliver back but by law or upon oath.

It imports more than anything else that the next meeting should be without the late disorders. No more had out of Felton than his first confession, and no torture has been used to him. Savage proves an impostor. Denmark Ambassador with demand of succours, and the States Extraordinaries, awaiting opportunity of doing good offices, as their colleagues do in France, for a reconciliation of the two Crowns. The succour of Rochelle holds the Court in hourly expectation. Since the above was written, the King, without putting the business in deliberation, has declared his

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pleasure to put off the Parliament until January 20. *Laudatur ab his, culpatur ab illis*; but surely it is the wisest, for the *ægritudo* in men's minds requires time to take it away, and the medicine of a constant and settled government is like to be applied. Lady Carlisle, being well recovered, is with her sister in Kent. Lord Brooke is dead of his wounds, given him by his man, who slew himself.

Would not stay anything that Conway thought fit, but is anxious that nothing but what is honourable should pass over the dead, and suspects the countenance and other deportments of him that brought the papers.

As commanded by the King, he has prepared a pardon for the Bishop, but not having the customary warrant in writing, has not yet caused the bill to be engrossed. Haply this pardon may set him free in *foro civili*, but the Parliament may call things past in question, notwithstanding his pardon, nay perhaps, by the pardon, they will rather be stirred to question him. He is now a father of our church, and as a father will tender its peace and quiet. Alas! a little spot is seen upon that white garment, and a little fire, nay a spark, may inflame a great mass. We are bound in conscience to prevent occasions of strife. Suggests, therefore, that he should review his book, and take away the acrimony of the style, and explain things left doubtful, so that his own pen may remove all scandal, and a stop be given to this unhappy difference and jealousy, which otherwise may trouble the quiet of our church, and occasion the disquiet of the commonwealth. Wishes that a clearing of these clouds may proceed from the Bishop, and then the pardon would seasonably follow.

- Oct. 8. 35. Justices of Cornwall to the King. The inclosed were brought Cornwall. to them by Sir Richard Buller. John Trevelyan is a recusant-convict, and the greatest of that faction in the west. He is a close, reserved man, and weighs his words before he lets them fall, so they conjecture there is much more in his heart than on his tongue. He

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is a bold and active spirit. They shall by warrant-special command the high sheriff to attach him, and, after examination, continue him in durance till the King's pleasure be known. They will also convent John Prideaux and his wife. *Inclose,*

Fair copy, but, having been altered by the King, converted into a draft.*]

Oct. 23. 22. Paper, indorsed by Bishop Laud as being "The Note of such things as were found about John Haydon, clerk, at Norwich." They were notes of sermons; articles against Mr. Cotton, Archdeacon of Totness; certificate of Ignatius Jourdain, of Exeter, Thomas Taylor, William Gouge, and various other persons, dated June 13, 1627, and recommending John Haydon for contributions, on account of his great zeal against the vices of the times, and his sufferings in the Star Chamber.

Oct. 23. 23. Separate examinations of Martin Nansog, clerk, and Ann Pri-
Bodmin. deaux, taken before John Lord Mohun, Charles Lord Lambert, Sir Reginald Mohun, and Sir John Trelawney, respecting the before-mentioned speeches of John Trevelyan against the Protestant religion, Queen Elizabeth, and the Protestant translation of the Bible.

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[Oct. 24.] 24. Attorney General Heath and others to the King. Send copy of the examination of Robert Savage. Is an incorrigible rogue. Has no knowledge of Felton. All he said to the Earl of Newcastle and to them at first "was fictions and untruths." It is fit that he should be proceeded against with all severity, that the world may see that the King hateth and will severely punish false and unjust accusations of any. - Oct. 25. 29. Capt. Richard Quaille to Nicholas. Begs he may not be put out of the St. Mary unpaid for what he has done. Begins to have a sense in his senseless but painful knee.

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 Oct. 25. 30. Examination of Lawrence Naylor, servant to John Fort, baker, taken by Attorney General Heath. Has carried bread to Hampstead for these three years. Has heard the verses,—
 “Let Charles and George do what they can,
 Yet George shall die like Doctor Lambe :”
 but whether before the death of the Duke, or after, remembers not. Repeated them to David Watkins, pantler, at Hampstead. Does not know Willoughby, the scrivener.
- Oct. 25. 31. Account of number of shipwrights employed at Chatham (total, 224), with the ships they are employed upon. The daily charge, 15*l.* 6*s.* 1*d.*
- Oct. 26. Similar account of ropemakers ; total 30, and daily charge 2*l.* [*Written on the same paper as the preceding.*]
- [Oct. 26 ?] Warrant to pay to Capt. John Mason, Paymaster of the Army, 1,500*l.*, for payment of the landsmen on their first arrival from Rochelle, so that they may be forthwith discharged. [*Coll. Sign Man., Car. I., Vol. ix., No. 60.*]
- Oct. 26. 32. Submission and acknowledgment of Thomas Miller, of Workingham, co. Berks, mercer, sent for on the complaint of Mr. Tyrwhitt for disobeying a post-warrant.
- Oct. 26. 33. Examination of Benjamin Jonson, of Westminster, gent., taken by Attorney General Heath. Saw certain verses beginning, “Enjoy thy bondage,” and ending “England’s ransom here doth lie,” and entitled, “To his confined Friend, &c.,” at Sir Robert Cotton’s house at Westminster. Coming there, as he often does, these verses lying on the table after dinner, he was asked concerning them as if he had been their author. Protests the contrary, on his Christianity and hope of salvation. Heard of them with detestation. Heard by common fame that one Zouch Townley made them, a scholar and a divine, and a student of Christ Church, Oxford. Dutch men-of-war and East Indiamen outward bound come into the Downs with many Englishmen in them, desires to know whether he may take those men or no. There are now in the Downs six Dutch East Indiamen. Four English East Indiamen had just arrived, wafted by a man-of-war, Capt. Berkeley, who had fought three sail of Frenchmen and put them to the worst, and had taken one of their ships, which is at Falmouth.

Affidavit of Thomas King, of Durham, Notary Public, that John Cosin, B.D., and Prebendary of Durham, in the house of Ann Tyler, at a great Court dinner, said, King Charles is not supreme head of the Church of England next under Christ, nor has he any more power of excommunication than my man that rubs my horse's heels.
- Oct. 27. 43. Acquittance of William Caldwell, of Battersea, for 10*l.* received of Edward Nicholas, being a quarter's rent of a house in King Street, Westminster; 15*s.* due for the stable was not paid.
- Oct. 27. 44. Examination of Richard Chambers, of London, merchant, taken before Attorney General Heath, concerning words spoken by him at the Council Board on September 28 last:—"They [the merchants] are in no part of the world so screwed and wrung as in England. In Turkey they have more encouragement." Confesses he spoke the first part of the words in the Custom House. The latter part, "In Turkey, &c.," he denies.
- Oct. 27. 45. Order of the proceeding to the funeral of Fulke Lord Brooke from Warwick Castle to the Great Church.
- Oct. 28. 46. William Earl of Newcastle to the Council. On September 21 Welbeck. last the King commanded him to muster the forces of his lieutenancy, wherein there has been heretofore, as his Majesty conceives, too much partiality and connivancy. To give the King satisfaction, he intimates that the certificates of the last musters which the Council lately received truly and really represent the state of the trained forces.
- Oct. 28. 47. Sec. Conway to Lord Treasurer Weston. Conway's son-in-law, Sir William Smith, requests a licence to fell certain wood which, among other things, he holds by lease from his Majesty at Ankerwick, near Staines. [*Copy.*]
- Oct. 28. Minute of the same. [*Conway's Letter Book, p. 317.*]

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Oct. 28. 48. Sec. Conway to Sir Thomas Richardson, Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas. Complaint is made to his Majesty of a prohibition granted in the Common Pleas in the cause of Mr. Thorold. The King was giving directions for Sir Thomas's attendance upon him, but afterwards commanded the Secretary to speak to him and give his Majesty an accompt. Requests Sir Thomas to call at his chamber that afternoon or the morrow morning. - Oct. 28. 52. A Paper Book, containing :—I. Eight passages from sermons and prayers of John Vicars, parson of St. Mary's, Stamford, tending to the disgrace of the temporal magistrate; II. Three similar passages tending to the disgrace of the clergy; III. Seven similar passages containing errors of opinion and practice touching the divine service; IV. Nineteen similar passages containing strange points of doctrine; V. Order of acknowledgment of his errors enjoined upon John Vicars by Bishop Williams, of Lincoln. (1628, October 28.)
- Oct. 28. 53. Examination of Owen Hughes, of London, haberdasher, taken by Attorney General Heath. Knows Lieutenant John Felton, because his mother lodges in the examinant's house in Fleet-street, and he has come to and fro to his mother there. Was not in his company last Bartholomew tide, and had no speeches with him concerning the Duke of Buckingham.
- [Oct. 28 ?] 54. Robert Bankworth, D.D., to Sir Nicholas Coote. Information that Mrs. Prince, daughter to Dr. Grant, at St. James's tide, uttered the following words at the informant's table :—“ That a Scotchman coming to London affirmed that the last King was poisoned by the Duke, with the consent of our sovereign,” and that she had it at home in writing.

Borlase's proceedings are vindictive, Lord Lambert having joined in taking examinations against Borlase, who is a recusant and a dangerous fellow.

- Oct. 65. The King to Attorney General Heath. To prepare a grant of the Government of Berwick to Sir Andrew Gray, for life, with the fee of 366*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.* per annum. [*Unsigned, and place and day of date left blank.*]
- [Oct. ?] 66. Petition of Andrew Murray to the King. Having been employed to procure deer for the King in Brandenburg, he had reported the answer of the Duke of that country, and the great pains he had bestowed therein. Understanding by Lord Conway that the King is not willing to bestow so much present money as the charges of transporting the deer will amount to, Murray prays that money may be advanced to him to go to the Duke to return an answer.
- Oct. 67. Sec. Conway to [Attorney General Heath]. To prepare a pardon for James Glanville, of Plymouth, for killing John Johnson, the fact having been found to be only manslaughter.
- Oct. 68. Richard Cotton to Sec. Conway. Being decayed in his estate prays that he may no longer be charged with furnishing two light horses for the King's service.
- [Oct. ?] 69. Orders and instructions to be established for the better government of the Navy. [*This little volume contains an enumeration of all the Officers of the Navy, both principal and subordinate, with an account of their several duties.*]
- Oct. 70. Note of charges disbursed by Humphry Cross, messenger, in searching for Muskett and Price for a twelvemonth, and also in apprehending seven Jesuits, with their letters and papers, at Clerkenwell.

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Oct. 71. Certificate, returned to Sec. Conway, Lord Lieutenant of Hants, of defaulters to the musters in that county.
- [Oct. ?] 72. Estimate of the charge of impressment of three ships, and three pinnaces, of certain stated tonnage, and the freights thereof, for 16 months. Total, 11,000*l*.

Was to have gone captain of the Antelope to Rochelle, but at the last put off by the new general and left to the King. Is behind of his pay for his services 400*l*. Prays for a gift of the prize ship, the Hunter, lying at Blackwall. [*Underwritten is a reference to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, to certify the value of the desired gift.*]
- Nov. 1. 2. Petition of the same to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. To certify on his behalf so that he may obtain the ship mentioned in the preceding article.
- Nov. [1 ?] 3. Petition of Anthony Finch, late captain of the Seahorse, to the same. Being in a small ship of 10 pieces of ordnance with 32 men, he was set upon by 10 Dunkirk men-of-war, with whom he fought 10 hours, and after sinking one of them, with loss of five men, he came safe to shore. Begs him not to let slight misunderstandings divide him from Lord Dorchester, and on his arrival to make an embargo on his promises of engagements, whereby he shall be able to trade on his own, and make better return than by a joint stock. Great esteem of Lady Carlisle throughout the Court. Advises the Earl to let her know how heartily he takes her watchful and truly loving respects. The Queen cannot believe the Earl Don Diego, of all men living. Thanks for his favours to Lord Goring's poor boy, George.

Derby, and to call into court and examine *vivâ voce* John Milward and Henry Bridges, witnesses to a deed which is in question. [*Copy.*]

2. Draft of the preceding.

5. The King to ————. John Grey having received from the late King James a grant of the Long Mountain *alias* Taven Digoth, cos. Salop and Montgomery, the same had ever since been detained from him and his heirs, by such as had no claim thereto. Directs the persons intended to be addressed to make a fair accommodation between the heirs of John Grey and the pretenders to the use of common in the premises. [*Signed, but not directed.*]

7. The King to [the Council?]. Having been moved by the late Extraordinary Ambassador from Venice for discharging certain priests out of prison, but being informed that the grace shown in that way in no way disburthened the kingdom of these men, his Majesty desires that the Council should consider by what means the King's purpose not to touch the lives of any of them without further cause than yet appears may be continued, and yet the kingdom as far as possible be eased of that kind of people, whether by banishment, or adoption of any other course of restraint in other prisons less open to the resort of people.

8. Sec. Conway to the same. Letter to the same effect as the preceding, but purporting to be written, not by the King, but by the Secretary under the King's direction. [*Fair copy, unsigned.*]

Proclamation of the effect of certain branches of the Statute made in anno 33, Henrici VIII., touching the maintenance of artillery, and the punishment of such as use unlawful games. [*Coll. Procs., Car., I., No. 98A.*]

9. Letters Patent whereby the King releases to John Evelyn the younger, of Godstone, co. Surrey, 2000*l.*, paid to him by way of imprest under an indenture dated July 1, 22nd James I., 1624, and made between the late Duke of Buckingham, then Lord High Admiral, George Lord Carew, then Master of the Ordnance, and Sir Richard Weston, then Chancellor of the Exchequer, on the King's behalf, and the said John Evelyn, being a contract for the supply of gunpowder for the King's stores. [*Copy.*]

10. Suggestion of fourteen several Acts to be sent by the King to the Lower House, to be drawn against the next Session.

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11. Note of various suggested inquiries, indorsed "The King's Paper of Inquiries touching divers Abuses of Pressing Men, &c." They principally relate to the conduct of high constables in pressing and releasing whom they would, and the misconduct of saltpetre men.

12. James Martin, a clergyman, to the King. Gives information of a knight of great estate who had accused the late King and the Duke of having falsely dealt with him respecting a promise of the Comptrollership of the Household; and of a Doctor of Divinity, chaplain to a bishop, who had declared that the Duke's death was undoubtedly God's work.

13. [Sec. Conway] to the same. Statement, termed a Remonstrance, of the inconveniences of passing away from the King the lands in the Isle of Wight which were in mortgage to the city; the trees would be immediately cut down, and the strength of the island, and its capability of defence, be thereby much impaired. [Copy.]

14. Draft of the preceding.

15. Dr. Roger Mainwaring to the same. The Church of St. Giles has not one foot of land, nor tithes more than 6*l.* yearly; nevertheless he is selected out of all, and an information filed against him in the Star Chamber. Sure he is that he is the unfittest to be tossed and torn in that high court, that in a higher has been so lately bruised only for his devotion to the King. If not redeemed by the King from this great trouble he can but perish.

16. Minute of petition of Doctor Theodore Diodati, for a grant of the office of Physician of the Tower, for which he has the consent of the Governor, and "Mons. de Mayerne" will satisfy his Majesty of the petitioner's personal fitness. Fr.

17. Petition of Thomas Trussell to the King. In the seventeenth year of the late King he granted a patent to Sir John Key, then Surveyor of the Ordnance, and others, for reformation of abuses in wine casks. That patent was afterwards stayed by proclamation. Petitioner prays that the patent may be referred for examination to some of the Lords of the Council. Underwritten is an unsigned reference, probably merely suggested, to the Earls of Arundel and Holland, calling to them some of the Judges.

18. Petition of Joseph Harrison and Henry Goodwyn to the same. The late King granted to Richard Hooper and William Randes a pension of 30*l.* per annum in consideration that they undertook to clear the Narrow Seas from the Isle of Wight to Yarmouth of all slipt anchors and cables. The grantees being both deceased, petitioners pray for a similar grant to themselves.

19. Petition of the Company of the West India Merchants in the United Provinces to the same. In September 1627 the King gave the petitioners free ingress and egress to and from all his Majesty's

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ports and havens. The Golden Wolf, of Medenblick, a ship of the petitioner's, was lately set upon by certain ships of Henley, Phillips, and Polehill, and taken into Plymouth. Prays for its release.

20. Petition of William Belou to the King. The King gave petitioner a warrant for payment of his arrearages, on which he obtained an assignment to be paid out of the sale of woods, but there were so many assignments that petitioner could not obtain anything. The Lord Treasurer that now is commanded the petitioner to surrender his assignment, and he would give a new order; yet he cannot obtain payment nor order. Having fallen into sickness and want, prays for an effectual order for payment of 200*l.* on account to Charles Boussine, to whom petitioner is indebted.

21. Petition of Henry, Dorothy, and Katherine Erskine, the orphan children of the late Earl of Buchan, to the same. Their father on his death-bed being demanded concerning the livelihood of petitioners, replied that he had nothing to leave them save moneys due to him from the King for the Shrievalty of Bamff, which he besought the King to bestow on them. Had not their grandmother, Lady Knyvett, relieved them they must have perished for want, but her estate is small, and her own charge of children and debts great. Pray for relief.

22. Petition of Endymion Porter to the same. Prays for a lease of Marsly Park, parcel of the lordship of Bromfield and Yale, co. Denbigh, and Raby Park, with the spring there, parcel of the lordship of Raby, in Durham, for 30 years after the expiration of estates in being.

23. Petition of Michael Prescott to the same. On Wednesday last, before dinner, in the Queen's presence chamber, petitioner presented the King with a book setting forth abuses in the customs on the river. Prays the King to give speedy consideration thereof. The convoy for Dutch traders is come into the river, and if the King will give warrant, petitioner will fetch out of that ship 10,000*l.* or 20,000*l.* worth of goods not entered at the Custom House.

24. Minute of petition to the King from Sir Thomas Longfield [Longueville?], Sir Thomas Cony, and Capt. Gunter, that they may have the training of the horse in various counties, with such allowances as had been granted to Sir Richard Grenfield [Grenville] and Mons. Demin.

25. Reference by the King to the Lords Keeper and Privy Seal, and to the Master of the Rolls, of a petition addressed to his Majesty. [*Copy unsigned.*]

26. Minutes of businesses to be submitted to the King. They comprise, applications from Lord Mohun for purchase of a manor of

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the King's; from William Cradock, chaplain to the late Duke of Buckingham, for dispensation to hold Stonegrave with Nuneaton; from the Earl of Ormond, for confirmation of an award of the late King respecting the co. Tipperary; from Sir Andrew Gray, as Governor of Berwick, to have his fee extended to 666*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.*; with others from Mr. Hen and Bickerstaff, Mr. Sydenham, William Daynes and Roger Daynes, and Sir Giles Mompesson.

27. Information by Robert Rous and Thomas Hippisley, that William Brookings said the King had eousened the country.

28. Note, by Viscount Conway, of speeches by Hopkins, Bacon, and a third person dwelling in the parish of St Sepulehre. Hopkins said in their presence that the King would not live long.

29. Queen Henrietta Maria to Sir John Finch, her Attorney General, and to the Clerk of her Signet for the time attending. To draw up a grant of the custody of Hyde Park to Sir John Smith and John Cope, after the decease of Henry Earl of Holland, for the lives of the Earl's sons, Robert Lord Kensington and Charles Rich. [*Draft.*]

30. Minute of a warrant to be prepared for the King's signature, to authorize the Earl of Suffolk, Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, to send back all persons coming from any foreign port who shall refuse the Oath of Allegiance; and also to exchange Dunkirk prisoners for English, according to the effect of a within written Order of Council of May 16, 1627.

31. Reasons in favour of an Act of Parliament for re-estating certain lands in co. Somerset, late of William Morgan, of Penrose, co. Monmouth, and discharging the same of certain trusts.

32. Minute of request of the Duke of Buckingham to [Sir Robert Naunton, Master of the Wards], that the wardship of Nicholas Gildredge should be granted to the ward's grandmother.

33. Petition of the Students of Christ Church College, Oxford, to Lord Keeper Coventry, Lord President [Manchester?], the Duke of Buckingham, William Earl of Pembroke, Lord Steward, Bishop Laud, and Lord Chief Justice Hyde. The King having referred to the persons addressed the consideration of certain grievances now in controversy between the petitioners and the Dean and Canons of the College, the petitioners pray that some indifferent persons may be named to inspect the books which concern the revenue of the College, so that the referees may be truly informed of the state thereof.

34. Petition of Robert Bruce to the Council. The Mayor and Aldermen of Canterbury, with reference to annexed petition, allege that the petitioner was pressed for the country and not for the city, and therefore refuse him relief. Prays that he may be placed in

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some hospital, or may have letters to the co. of Kent to relieve him. *Annexed,*

34. I. *Petition of Robert Bruce to the King. Being on his return from the wars, he was pressed in Canterbury to go with Count Mansfeldt. Was afterwards in the King's service in Denmark, in which he lost the use of his limbs, and received many wounds. Prays for a place in some hospital, or an allowance from Canterbury, where he was pressed. [Underwritten is a reference to the Mayor and Aldermen of Canterbury to relieve the petitioner, so that his Majesty be no further troubled therein.]*

35. Petition of the same to the Council. The Quarter Sessions for Kent had given him only a suit of clothes and 10s. Prays for a place in some hospital, or competent relief from the Quarter Sessions at Canterbury.

36. Petition of John Milton, gent., to the Earl of Arundel, Lord High Marshal, and other the Lords of the Council. Petitioner having been committed by the Council to the charge of Robert Smith, one of the messengers in ordinary, was, whilst in his custody, arrested by Thomas Moss, on behalf of Anthony Gifford. The Council thereupon ordered the apprehension of Gifford, but he being privately advertised by Moss, has ever since lurked in co. Devon, giving order to Mr. Dennyson to prosecute the petitioner in his absence, whereupon, by the practice of Moss, a judgment has been obtained, and petitioner been arrested into the Compter, besides which, actions have been laid upon him to the value of 200*l.*, the matter in difference being only a due claim of but 5*s.*, and that upon a supposed breach of covenant about the business depending before his Lordship and the rest of the Commissioners, and petitioner also by the whole Parliament made incapable of performing the said covenant. Petitioner having been detained thirteen weeks, having propounded businesses of great emolument to his Majesty's coffers and the weal public under his charge, and having offered his adversary reasonable composition, prays order for his release.

37. Petition of William Levett to the same. The late King granted to certain patentees, for the use of the Countess of Sussex, a certain toll in Doncaster, the interest whereof for a great consideration came by assignment to petitioner, and a new grant thereof made to him. One Francis Harwood complained of the same in this last sessions of Parliament, whereupon the House ordered a petition to be drawn up to the King for cancelling the same. The toll having been quietly enjoyed for divers years, and petitioner having laid out the greatest part of his estate in purchasing the same, he prays that the patent may be restored to him until its validity be determined in a legal proceeding.

38. Petition of Archibald Nicoll and others, merchants of the north parts of this realm, to the Council. When they made seizure on the

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Scottish ship at Dover, petitioner Nicoll repaired to Sir Jasper Fowler, then searcher for his Majesty at Dover, to get proof of the goods to be lawful prize, and gave Sir Jasper a bond for 60*l.*, for which he has made petitioner spend a great deal of money in the Exchequer. It having pleased the Council to take those goods from them to the King's use, with a slight exception, they pray that Sir Jasper Fowler may be called before the Board, he having been the King's officer, and what pains he took having been for the King, and not for the petitioners.

39. Petition of Sir Thomas Gerrard to the King. States the origin and increase of his great pecuniary difficulties, and prays the renewal of his protection for one year more. He alleges that his estate had been ruined by his father's expenses, he having been a pensioner to Queen Elizabeth for 20 years, and a gentleman of the Privy Chamber to the late King for 18 years, without fee.

40. Petition of the same to the Council. Shorter statement of the same circumstances, with prayer that they would by their consent second his Majesty's clemency for renewing his protection.

41. Petition of John Dike, Thomas Ferrars, Timothy Wade, and others, merchants, to the same. Capt. Neason, about a year ago, took from a Salleeman a ship and goods of the value of 20,000*l.*, which the Salleeman took prize from a Portugal man that came from Brazil, for which ship and goods suit is now made by Capt. Harrison, the King's agent for Barbary. Petitioners have goods in Sallee worth 18,000*l.*, and ever since the peace have had kind usage, and found the place very convenient for trade, having sold there this year goods worth 50,000*l.* They fear that if the Salleeman have not justice, they will take example by Algiers, where goods of petitioners and others to the value of 8,500*l.* were lately taken from them for wrongs done by Capt. Driver, of Bristol, and others. Pray for a speedy despatch of this business.

42. Petition of John Blachford to the Council. Prays that he may have his third part of a prize ship taken by Capt. Hinckley in a vessel belonging to petitioner and John Gardner, and lately sequestered by Order of Council into the hands of Sir John Drake.

43. Petition of Henry Russel to the same. Prays, with reference to the same case as the preceding petition, that the sequestration of the goods in the prize ship above alluded to may be discharged.

44. Petition of Samuel Langham, merchant, to the same, for licence to transport 1,000 quarters of corn to the Low Countries.

45. Petition of John Southwood to the same, for licence to transport 200 last of corn into Holland.

46. Petition of John Tailer, John Locke, and Edward Ballehash, Merchants Adventurers, to the same. For permission to export 700 foders of lead cast or to be cast at Mendip, co. Somerset, to states in amity with his Majesty.

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47. Petition of masters of ships trading to Newcastle for coals to the Council. Have been at great charges in detaining their vessels in the river until they were a competent number to go together. Their ships so congregated are now stayed in the river. Pray for some special order for their relief.

48. Petition of Thomas Locke, Keeper of the Council Chest and Records, to the same. In October last petitioned for money due to him for providing stationery for the Council table and the Clerks of the Council after the usual rate of 40*l.* per annum, and for an increase of that allowance. The Council referred it to Mr. Chancellor of the Duchy to speak to Sir William Uvedale, Treasurer of the Chamber, thereon. Sir William answered that he had no money in his office but such as is allotted for other payments. Prays that course may be taken for petitioner's present satisfaction. He has served "in this chamber" above 20 years.

49. Petition of Richard Archdale, Henry Lee, Martin Bradgate, Edward Browne, George Rouekes, and Benjamin Wright, merchants, to the same. Having procured part of their estates detained in France to be transported to Holland in wines, turpentine, rosin, and other commodities, they pray permission to land the same in this kingdom.

50. The Council to the Officers of the Navy. To give warrant to the Victualler of the Navy to allow George Burrowes, purser of the Recovery, of Ipswich, for goods wasted in his absence, attending to other of his Majesty's service. [*Torn; apparently cancelled; probably because it should have been written to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.*]

51. Certificate that the sums mentioned in the conveyances of the manor of Risborough Principis and the town of Cannoll to Edward Ditchfield and others, to the use of the City of London, were parts of two aggregate sums of 229,897*l.* 2*s.* and 120,000*l.*, already paid into the Exchequer.

52. Petition of Richard Ballard to Sec. Conway. Served upwards of 30 years in the Low Countries, under Lord Conway's command, as a gentleman of his company, and being disabled by hurts, came over into his native country to procure relief and maintenance in his "dewexed" age; not having succeeded, he prays the Secretary so much to commiserate his old soldier's distressed estate as to grace him with a packet into the Low Countries.

53. Minute of a letter by Lord Conway, in his own handwriting. It does not appear to whom it was addressed. It relates to plans for the restoration of the writer's ancient friends, the King and Queen of Bohemia, and certain requests of the person addressed which his Majesty had granted, and which would be communicated by Sec. Conway to an Ambassador. [*Imperfect.*]

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54. Notes, by Lord Conway, of an information of George Bell respecting a crew of young gentlemen who had formed themselves into a society, distinguished by a badge. Many of them were recusants, and they were buying up armour, old and new.

55. Copy of the preceding.

56. Memorandum to move his Majesty from the Lord Steward for a letter to Dr. Love, and the other electors of St. Mary's College, Winchester, to choose, as a scholar, on the first vacancy, Edward Molesworth, one of the many children of Capt. William Molesworth.

57. Minutes, by a Secretary of Lord Conway's, of a letter to the Warden of St. Mary's College, Winchester, in accordance with the preceding memorandum; also for a Privy Seal for payment into the Treasury Chamber of overplus monies in the Court of Wards; and for two Commissions for the business of the Venetian Ambassador and the Earl of Arundel.

58. Minute of request of Sir William Brouncker for a letter from the King to the Prince of Orange and the States, that Sir William may not be prejudiced in his entertainment by his stay in this country, which the King knows was enforced.

59. Walter Montagu to Dudley Viscount Dorchester. To procure a letter from the King to the Bishop of Ely for his confirmation of a promise made to the Duke for conferring the rectory of Feltwell, co. Norfolk, on Mr. [Richard] Dampart, President of Sidney College, Cambridge, and Chaplain to the King.

60. Certificate of the Mayor and others of Westbury to Lord President Marlborough, in behalf of James Aldridge, a poor man, 70 years of age, who had done good service in the wars.

61. Petition of Edward Nicholas and Henry Cusse to Lord Keeper Coventry. Pray for a remedy against Hugh Audley, who, having agreed to purchase the lands of William Hunton, had since obtained possession thereof under an extent granted to Sir Edward Baynton, and now refused to complete his agreement.

62. Pass of Sir John Hippisley for 14 Dutch hoys, long stayed in Dover harbour, but ordered by the Council to be released. [*Copy.*]

63. Thomas Newton to Katherine Viscountess Conway. Being again, by the malice of his old enemies, fallen into troubles, and imprisoned in Newgate, where he has continued eight weeks in contempt of Lord Conway's warrant, prays her to put her Lord in mind of him, and otherwise to give him her assistance.

64. Statement by [Matthew de Quester?] of the days for the departure of the ordinary posts with the several foreign mails.

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65. List of the Post-stages throughout England, with the rates of payment to the same per diem. Up to September 15, 1625, the total payment on this account had been 3,404*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.*; on that day certain new stages were laid, which added 720*l.* 17*s.* 0½*d.* to the yearly expense. The question raised in this paper is, whether the old fixed payments per diem should not be abrogated, and the posts be allowed to charge 2½*d.* per mile for all packets.

66. Two short poems, in the handwriting of Nicholas. One commencing, "Had she a glass and fear'd the fire;" the other, "My dead and buried love is risen again."

67. Lines commencing "If love's true fire be kindled in thy breast." [*Draft.*]

68. Propositions, attributed in the indorsement to Mons. Briot, made to the King concerning what is necessary and profitable to be done for the good of his Majesty and of his subjects, about the ordering of his coins. The writer proposes to coin 66 pieces of silver out of the pound weight, which was an augmentation of four pieces in the pound; also to coin small silver money down to silver pence, and brass or copper money down to half a farthing.

69. Minute of petition of Mr. Andrewes for a new grant of a moiety of the tenement of Rosedale, co. York, in order to rectify a mistake of Francis Swale instead of John Swale in his present grant.

70. Statement by Attorney General Heath of the circumstances under which the King had conveyed to the City of London lands of the yearly value of 12,496*l.* 6*s.* 6*d.*, in discharge of a debt of 349,897*l.* 2*s.* for money lent to the late and present King, and of the unexpressed trust or agreement entered into by those who dealt for the City, under which the King was to receive back again any surplus lands after the City had sold enough to pay their debt.

71. Note of the yearly income formerly derived by the King, and at present by the Queen, from the manor of Holdenby, co. Northampton, purchased by King James, and by him demised to the Lord Treasurer Suffolk.

72. Report of Robert Tanfield on the King's title to the manor of Moulton, co. Northampton, and the course to be taken in order to convey the fee simple of the same to the City patentees.

73. Note of profits arising from various manors in cos. Leicester, Buckingham, Essex, and Northampton.

74. Warrant of Sir Henry Vane, Cofferer to the King and Steward of his Majesty's manors of Raby and Brancepeth, co. Durham, for appointing Thomas Tempest, of Lincoln's Inn, Deputy Steward of those manors.

Lincoln, that they will have special care to see the same duly executed. [*Probably the letter of Sec. 76. Reasons stated by the Officers of the Bishop of London against the Officers of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and in defence of the right of the former to have the proving of the wills of parties that died at sea or in foreign parts, that were inhabitants of the diocese of London, and had no goods in any other diocese.

77. Proposal of Festus Hommius, entitled "*Hypotyposis, seu delineatio novæ editionis Bibliorum Regionum, cum apparatu.*" This contemplated new edition of the Bible was designed to be published in 10 volumes, folio, and was to be termed "*Biblia Regia Britannica, or Biblia Regia Carolina, cum novo atque utilissimo apparatu.*" Besides the original Hebrew, Greek, and Latin texts, it was to contain a great variety of supplementary matter. The proposal is indorsed by Lord Dorchester, "For my Lord Bishop of London;" and by Bishop Laud, "The Project of Festus Hommius."

78. Copy of the same.

79. Articles objected by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners against Edward Lake, Clerk, probably incumbent of some parish in co. Berks. Copy folded as a letter, and directed to Francis Windebank, at the Signet Office. The offences charged are, drunkenness, omission to read divine service, and indecent conduct in the Church.

80. Opinions of Drs. Thomas Rives, Arthur Duck, and Thomas Eden, on a case in ecclesiastical law, as to the consequences of an unavoidable failure by the wardens of a parish chapel, in payment on the day of an annual composition due to a mother church. [*Copy.*]

86. Extracts from Statutes of a monastic body established in connexion with the Roman Catholic mission into England. Latin. [*Imperfect.*]

87. Portion of a paper of advice to the members of some monastic body how to conduct themselves, so as to procure gifts and legacies for their houses; how to make known the severity of their discipline; and how to treat members who are ejected and those who take ejected members into their favour. [*Translation from the Latin? Imperfect.*]

88. Points to be considered by occasion of Books written in the controversy between the Bishop of Chalcedon and the English Catholics; to inquire of Mr. Colleton whether he wrote the Latin letter to Petrus Aurelius, printed at the end of the book called "Petri Aurelii Theologi Anæreticus, &c.;" whether these books should not be burnt by the hands of justice, and Mr. Colleton be informed how quick a sense the King has of these presumptions to usurp jurisdictions and create offices.

Statement of Case in the Exchequer between the King and Sir Robert Binloss, respecting the liability of tithes purchased by the defendant from feoffees to the use of Ury Babington, to the payment of a debt due from Ury Babington to the Crown. With notes, in the handwriting of Attorney General Heath, of the argument thereon of Sergeant Henden.

92. Copies of ancient documents stated in the indorsement to concern "Mr. Bayly's parsonage of Holdgate, co. Salop." 17. Request of co. Devon and city of Exeter, that the amount owing to them for billeting and conduct money may be satisfied out of the present subsidies.

18. Certificate of John Dixon, Surgeon General, in behalf of James Saidler, soldier of Capt. Hamon's Company, who was hurt "in the descent" on the Isle of Rhé.

19. Suggestions to the Council of War as to the way in which they should proceed in calculating the several amounts due for pay of the officers who had served in the various recent expeditions.

20. Collection of Minutes and Transcripts of Documents principally relating to the management and state of the navy, extending from about 1576 to 1585. [*The whole paper is in the handwriting of Sec. The King ordered that 10,000 corselets, and as many muskets, should be furnished by the artificers here before the last of March, 1628, but the Duke of Buckingham, being persuaded that all the artificers could not make so great a proportion in that time, caused 5,000 of each to be brought out of the Low Countries, but few of the corselets were pistol proof, the pikes were a foot and a half too short, and being made of sawn ash would not abide trial. The defects of the muskets were witnessed by the number which broke upon proof.

41. Lists of various articles of Ordnance and Ammunition, probably prepared for an account of the remains in the Ordnance Office, but not completed by the addition of numbers.

42. Offer to effect the Destruction of the Powder Magazine at Dunkirk. Indorsed, in the handwriting of Sec. Dorchester, "Mr. Davenant, lodging in the Middle Temple with Mr. Hyde, son to my Lord Chief Justice's elder brother."

43. Brief descriptive enumeration of the principal Castles upon various parts of the sea coast of England and Wales.

44. Note of a Speech of [Sir Thomas Edmondes?] addressed to the King in Council on the subject of raising money to meet the urgent necessities of the time. Normandy yields a contribution of 12,000,000 of French crowns yearly, equal to the ordinary revenue of this state. Wishes some moderate way might be found of adding to the revenue of the King, but finds it dangerous to do so without the intervention of Parliament.

45. Note of the Subsidies granted by Parliament to Edward III.

46. Paper indorsed "Mr. Recorder," and having relation to a sum of 86,000*l.* desired by the Council from the City. The assessment is objected to, and it is desired that the required sum might be raised by companies.

69. John Webb to Nicholas. Sends him a letter to be perused and forwarded. Its purport is, to see what Mr. King will do for the writer in this necessity.

70. Susannah Nicholas to her brother, Edward Nicholas. Sends him boot-hose and lace for a band; the best lace is half-a-crown a yard and the other eightpence.

71. S. Newton to Mr. Bland. Respecting a matrimonial contract which the writer is willing to fulfil as soon as he obtains a living. The lady promised to wait five years. If she repents her promise he absolves her.

72. William Jones to Endymion Porter. Submits for his favourable construction, by the advice of Mr. Potts, Master of the Buckhounds, an anagram upon the name Endymion (spelt Endimeon) Porter, which is, "Ripen to more end," and eight lines under-written, commencing,

"The fruit of Man at first like blossoms be,
Which pleasing to the eye hang on the tree."

73. "Demonstration," by Capt. James Wadsworth, "how and in what manner he had served his King and country, and especially the Lord his Grace of Canterbury unto the hazard of his life;" contains an account of his proceedings as a spy from December 1625 to about the middle of 1628.

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74. Pedigree of the descent of Sir William Cavendish, Viscount Mansfield and Earl of Newcastle, and Sir Charles Cavendish, his brother, from Robert first Lord Ogle, temp. Coke wished them to forbear till this day, when both Houses attending the King, he had declared, as for tonnage and poundage he had no thought of taking it by prerogative, or otherwise than as the gift of his people. This speech has given great satisfaction. The House of Commons is also much discontented with the printing of the Petition of Right with the several answers given thereto, and his Majesty's speech the last day of the Session, it having been first printed with the answer—*Droit soit fait comme il est désiré*,—and that impression afterwards suppressed. But that which troubleth them most is the recording that last speech of his Majesty in the Clerk's Book of the Commons' House since the recess. In matter of religion they are quiet as yet, but the greatest business is like to be about that. Mountague's book is called in by proclamation; the King has also pardoned Mountague, Cosin, Mainwaring, and Sibthorpe, but that will hardly save some of them. Lady Montgomery has fallen sick of the smallpox, whereupon the Queen has removed in haste to Somerset House.

19. i. *Sir Nicholas Coote to the Earl of Totness. Reports various cases of highway robberies, men and women carrying off corn intended for export, swearing they would first provide for themselves, with tumults consequent thereon, which are submitted to his consideration. Wyfields, 1629, January 27.*
- Jan. 27. 20. Sir Guilford Slingsby to Nicholas. Recommends Thomas
Norgate for boatswain and Thomas Wilkins for purser of the Saint Anne.
- Jan. 27 [?] 21. Exceptions to letters patent of Grant of the Office of Surveyor of Seacoals made by the King to Roger Langford, with reasons offered by Newcastle-upon-Tyne, York, Ipswich, and other coast towns, that his Majesty is deceived in that grant, and that the office is both unnecessary and unprofitable for the commonwealth, and void in law.
- Jan. 28. 22. The King to the House of Commons. Complains that, notwithstanding his declaration respecting tonnage and poundage, they have set aside that business and preferred to it the matter of religion, wherein the King, if his good directions be rightly understood,

Westminster. Sends copy of the King's speech to both Houses made on the 24th instant. On Monday the bill of tonnage and poundage was brought in by Sec. Coke, but was at last overruled on the ground that being a bill of subsidy, the matter thereof ought to be resolved in the House before the bill was brought in. Some entrance being made into the matter of the growth of Arminianism, it was thought that the Remonstrance of last session should be renewed, by occasion whereof it came to be known that by his Majesty's command it was taken from the clerk and delivered to the Lord Privy Seal. This was conceived to be so great a violation of the privileges of the House that it was resolved to stay all further proceeding till that Remonstrance, being a record, might be had. The next morning it was brought into the House by Sec. Coke, with a message that the King expected the house should proceed with the bill of tonnage and poundage, but that message fell to the ground, because it was ordered before, that the matter of religion should have precedence; and the rest of the morning was spent in speeches on the manner of proceeding, and in agreeing in a petition for a general fast, in speaking whereof Sir Robert Phillips alluded to the death of Elizabeth's son. The petition was yielded by the King, with these two notes,—that the desolation of the foreign churches required rather fighting than fasting, and that the King would not have it grow into a custom that every Session must begin with a fast. Had almost forgotten, and would he could do it altogether, that when the House was about to take in hand the matter of religion, Sec. Coke delivered another message requiring them to go presently in hand with tonnage and poundage, and letting them know that the King had done so much in matters of religion that he expected rather thanks for it, than a Remonstrance. An answer is to be framed by a special committee. God grant it may be of a kind to stop all future messages, than which nothing more retards his Majesty's service. *Inclodes,*

Jan. 28. 25. Affidavit of Richard Andrewes, keeper of the King's storehouse at the Custom House, of the circumstances under which Thomas Symonds, a merchant, procured him to be arrested, for detaining a butt of currants and a bale of silk goods belonging to Thomas Symonds, on which he refused to pay duties.

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Jan. 29. 26. Lord President Conway and William Earl of Pembroke to the King. Report on a complaint addressed to his Majesty by Doctor Allen, of interference with his place of Doctor of the Tower of London by Doctor Diodati. Lords Conway and Pembroke state, that on the decease of Doctor Gwynne, who last held that place, and on suit of his widow, the King appointed Doctor Allen, who was accordingly sworn and admitted to the place by order of the Lord Chamberlain, but the Lieutenant of the Tower being absent, his deputy pretended the disposal of the place belonged to the Lieutenant, and thereupon swore and admitted Doctor Diodati, whom the Lieutenant has since endeavoured to maintain. Was employed Sergeant under Sir Henry Killigrew in Count Mansfeldt's expedition; was Ensign in the Isle of Rhé, and Lieutenant to Capt. Thomas Gates at Rochelle. Prays payment of his arrears.

Whitehall. 28. Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to Capt. John Mennes. Complaints being daily made that English ships were taken about Dungeness by French men-of-war and Dunkirkers, he is to ply up and down with the Adventure between Gore End and the eastern part of the Isle of Wight, to preserve his Majesty's coasts, and capture ships of Spain, of the Archduchess, or of France.
- March 5. 29. Petition of Thomas Arnold and Robert Gyver, Sergeants under Sir Edward Harwood, to the Council and the Council of War. Having left the hopes of their future fortunes in the Low Countries to go upon the expedition to Cadiz, they pray payment of their arrears.
- March 5. 30. Petition of George Ruding, Quartermaster to Colonel Sir James Scott, to the same. Served at Cadiz and Rhé, and on his return from thence quartered the army by command of Lord Conway and Sir William Becher. Prays payment of his arrears.
- March 5. 31. Petition of Capt. Walter Owen to the same. In the expedition to Rhé was lieutenant under Colonel Burgh, from which service he was taken by the Duke, and appointed to the command of a pinnace for the night watch. Prays payment of his arrears.
- March 5. 32. Petition of Francis Grover, lieutenant to Capt. Robert Grey, to the same. Resigned his preferment in the Low Countries, and served in the expedition to Cadiz, and ever since. Prays payment of his arrears.
- March 5. 33. Petition of Capt. Robert Grey to the same. After sixteen or seventeen years' service in the Low Countries and in Bohemia, engaged in the expedition to Cadiz, and had continued in his Majesty's service ever since. Prays payment of his arrears.
- March 5. 34. Petition of Capt. Richard Woodward to the same. Came from the Low Countries to attend his Majesty's service here, and has been employed ever since the beginning thereof. Prays payment of arrears bought with the loss of much blood and hazard of his life.
- March 5. 35. Petition of Thomas Drake, lieutenant to Capt. Walter Fowke, to the Council of War. Served at Cadiz, as sergeant to Capt. Philip Gifford, and in the Isle of Rhé, where in the retreat he was taken prisoner, and was in hold four months. Prays order to Capt. Mason to cast up his accounts and pay his arrears.
- March 5. 36. Petition of Lieut. Edward Frodsham, in Sir James Ramsey's regiment, to the same. Served in the expeditions to Cadiz, Rhé, and Rochelle, and prays payment of monies due to him.

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- March 5. 37. Petition of Capt. Henry Frodsham to the Council of War. Prays for his pay, and also for money laid out for apparel and victuals supplied to his men when driven into Ireland.
- March 5. 38. Petition of Capt. Emanuel Gilpin to the same. Having been in his Majesty's service above three years, and thereby lost the benefit of twenty years' service in the Low Countries, prays payment of his arrears, and some favourable consideration in regard of his losses.
- March 5. 39. Petition of John Knolles, lieutenant to Capt. Thomas Sherley, of the regiment of Colonel Morton, to the same. His right leg broken all to shivers at Cadiz; was shipwrecked at Baltimore, to the loss of all he had, even to his shirt; received two musket wounds in the Isle of Rhé. Prays for his arrears, and some reward.
- March 5. 40. Petition of Capt. John Sandelands to the same. Served lieutenant in Capt. Patrick Wood's company, in Sir Henry Bruce's regiment, at Cadiz, and afterwards at Rhé and Rochelle. Prays for his pay.
- March 5. 41. Petition of Capt. Thomas Rawlins to the same. Served at Cadiz as lieutenant to Capt. Wood, and in Rhé as lieutenant in Sir Ralph Bingley's regiment. Was wounded in the retreat, but served in the voyage to Rochelle. Prays payment.
- March 5. 42. Indorsement of petition of Capt. Robert Dishe, in which he prayed payment for his services. With certificate of Capt. John Mason as to the amount due to him. [*Imperfect.*]
- March 6. 43. Petition of Nicholas Davie, Edward Stone, John Rugg, and Tristram Porter, the Company of the bark Fiddle, of Dartmouth, to the Council. Their ship having been taken up for transport of provisions to Rochelle was captured and carried into Nantes, where they remained prisoners for eight months; and now, being liberated, are like to perish for want. Pray payment of the means due to them.
- March 6. 44. Certificate of James Ingram of a demand made by Garland, The Fleet. the Sergeant, of a return of the writ against Sir John Langworth, who had been ordered by the Lords to be discharged on payment of 55*l.* to Snooke, the original creditor.
- March 7. 45. Attorney General Heath to James Earl of Carlisle. The untoward disposition of a few ill members of the House of Commons has given such just occasion for dissolving the Parliament that the Attorney General and many thousands of others are truly sorrowful for it. But the deserved punishment of the authors thereof may make such an example of better obedience that ages to come may be warned by their folly, and the King will not find the Attorney General faint or remiss in that or any other service. Now is the time to put brave and noble resolutions into acts, that whilst the vulgar part of this our little world are endeavoured to be made

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diffident of his Majesty's religious and just government, they may find how much they have been abused. Offers to the Earl's clearer judgment things which he sees but by twilight, but conceives may be of moment to advance his Majesty's honour. March 9. 48. Relation, by Sir William Courteney, of transactions between Capt. Turney, and his servant, which occurred at the Isle of Rhé. The Captain accusing his servant of robbing him of 80*l.*, the Council of War ordered the Marshal to show the accused the rack, and threaten him with that punishment. Capt. Turney went into the prison, and forced the Marshal's men "to pluck up" the prisoner, and the Captain put burning matches between his fingers, and so burnt them, "as you may behold." The Captain afterwards found his money, and the servant appealed to Sir William Courteney for justice, whereupon the Colonels gave sentence that Capt. Turney should lose his company, and deliver to his servant the 80*l.*, or settle upon him 10*l.* a year during life.

March 10. 49. Wolfgang Mayer to James Earl of Carlisle. Is full of fearful thoughts concerning the health and welfare of his son, not having received any letter from him, but having understood out of Mr. Burlamachi's letter that the poor lad had borrowed from him 13*l.* Prays he may be furnished with needful means for his entrance into the college and all his wants there.

March 10. 50. Order of Council, that the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty should take order for fitting out 16 or 17 ships and pinnaces, for six months' service at sea.

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- March 10. 51. Sir Henry Palmer to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Since the arrival of the Earl of Danby on Friday last at Jersey, has used means to learn intelligence of the enemy's preparations, and reports the result. Begs that victuals may be ready against their return to Portsmouth. In their passage took a small Dutch ship laden with pitch and tar for St. Malo, and recovered a ship taken by the Dunkirkers from the English, and sold to the French. Weather tempestuous, and that place very dangerous.
- [March 10?] 52. Petition of Capt. John Weddell and Capt. Thomas Ketelby to the same. Served as captains in admirals' ships, under the Earls of Denbigh and Lindsey. Pray order for payment after the rate of 20s. a piece *per diem*.
- March 10. 53. Sir Sackville Crow to Nicholas. Sends particulars of pay due to Capt. Weddell. Total, 309*l.* 7*s.*, which he wishes were in his hands to give to so deserving a man.
- March 10. 54. Mayor of Dover to Theophilus Earl of Suffolk. Relates the circumstances of the surprise, by Claude Sandrin, of the packet of letters sent to the Earl, with various particulars of the arrival and conduct of the same Claude, with a description of his personal appearance, in case it should turn out that he had not been apprehended by the justices of the place where the fact was committed.
- March 11. 55. The King to [the Justices of Assize for co. Salop]. Robert Nowell, prisoner in the gaol of Shrewsbury for killing Robert Hawkins, is to be relieved until the next assizes. [*Draft.*]
- March 11. 56. Order of Council, that all accounts of money paid to Officers of the Army be delivered to the Auditors of the Imprest before the last day of June, to be examined, after which days of payment shall be set down. In the meantime officers and their creditors are prohibited troubling his Majesty or the Council with any further petitions. [*Printed copy.*]
- March 11. 57. Another printed copy of the same.
- March 11. 58. Officers of the Navy to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Before the delivery of the *St. Anthony*, prize, they had the promise of Mr. Braems that she should not depart until her account were settled. Hear she is fallen down to Gravesend, laden with trunks of the States' Ambassadors, which they hold it to be their duty to acquaint the Lords.
- March 11. 59. Thomas Bradley to Nicholas. Withdraws his bill from the consideration of the Lords of the Admiralty, but leaves it to be dealt with by Capt. Sydenham.
- March 11. 60. Survey of Ships, with a muster of the seafaring men and fishermen belonging to the port towns in co. Lincoln, taken before Sir Clement Cottrell, Vice Admiral.
- March 11. 61. Another report of the same Survey of Ships, without the muster of mariners.

62. Sir Thomas Walsingham to Nicholas. Finds, by Mr. Austin of Rochester, that Mr. Attorney has satisfied the Lords that their charter is fitting to pass. This new grant will be good against the the Lord Admiral and his officers, which he prays Nicholas to make known to the Lords Commissioners. Begs him to be mindful of Sir Thomas's own business.

The 10*l.* was regularly paid for many years, and ultimately was tendered in court, but neither Kettlewell nor any one for him came to receive it. Thereupon Kettlewell procured himself to be admitted to his land again as for nonpayment of the 10*l.* Lord Savile reports that Roundell is wronged.

March 20. 19. Sir Allen Apsley to Sec. Dorchester. Reports what persons The Tower. had desired to have access to the prisoners in his custody. Lord Holles wished to have spoken to his brother, and his Lordship, the

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Earl of Lincoln, and others would have induced Sir Allen's son to have brought them to Sir John Eliot's lodging, which he refused, whereupon his Lordship went and "did adoration" at Mr. Selden's window. Morton, a minister, came near Sir John Eliot's window, and called aloud to have spoken with him, but he did not answer him. Lord Rochford, and Lord St. John, son of the Earl of Bolingbroke, applied to speak to Sir John Eliot. Pollard and Grenville, Devonshire men, made a similar application. Two of the Plunketts, Irishmen, came to see Mr. Coryton. Mary Kingham, a titulary sister of Mr. Selden, sent him a table book sealed, which Sir Allen retains: nothing written in it. Sir Allen vindicates his son against a complaint made to the King, that he runs the same refractory course as those who opposed his Majesty's designs, and were the enemies of the late Duke; also, that he carries messages to the prisoners. The former arises out of his intimacy with Mr. Harry Percy, which Sir Allen explains; the latter he peremptorily denies.

March 20. 20. Thomas Gurlyn to Bishop Laud, of London. Performed beneficial services to Queen Elizabeth and the late King, and never received recompence. Desires to do service to the present King. Sends an inclosed paper for the Bishop's consideration. [*Indorsed by Bishop Laud, with Gurlyn's address.*]

March 20. 21. Anonymous letter to Sec. Dorchester. Offers service, and comments on the conduct of the imprisoned members of Parliament. By striving for a shadow of liberty they had lost the substance. Not only are their mouths stopped, but the Parliament doors sealed for many years.

March 20. 22. Sir James Bagg to Nicholas. Begs him to remind the Lords to direct warrants to the Victualler of the Navy for the Bonaventure, now ready to come for Chatham, and the Rainbow, which will be ready in three weeks. Press warrants will also be necessary. Has disbursed 350*l.* in victualling, and 690*l.* for repairs of the Rainbow.

March 21. 23. Sir Francis Nethersole to Elizabeth Queen of Bohemia. Sends the Declaration set forth by the King of the causes which moved him to dissolve the late Parliament, together with another of a like nature made by the late King. In the late dissolution one thing was extraordinary, to wit, that the House of Commons (to which their Speaker was forbidden to come that day) was not sent for up to the Higher House, as the manner has always been, although there were above 200 persons there expecting to be called up, which has given much discontent. Some of the Lords excuse it as having happened by a chance, but it is sure enough that it was done of purpose, for the King addressed not his speech to the Lords and Gentlemen, but to the Lords only. Lord Bristol came to Sir Francis in the Court the other day, and remarked that during the time of the King's displeasure against him he had thought it respectful to her Majesty and her husband to forbear to make any address of his duty to her, but that being again right with his

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Majesty, and readmitted to his Court (where he has been very much of late), he should doubt it might otherwise be interpreted, and would therefore take the boldness to do it by his letters. Mr. Simon Digby has also prayed Sir Francis to intreat the Queen to express her good opinion of him in a postscript of some letter to Lord Dorchester. Acknowledges her favour to his wife and himself in remembering them with some relique of him who is now a saint in heaven [Elizabeth's eldest son]. *Inclosed,*

- April 13. 47. John Raymond to ———. Gives account of his disputes with the magistrates of that town, on account of their neglect of the harbour. The bearer has served subpoenas upon them, and attends to deliver in articles against them, in which the assistance of the person addressed is solicited.
- [April 13 ?] 48. Court roll of View of Frankpledge with Court Baron of Diana Countess Dowager of Oxford, held for the manor of Grays, in Heddingham Sible, co. Essex.
- April 13. 49. Copy of the same, with a presentation of the jury and a surrender attached.
- April 13. 50. Minutes of the same, probably those taken by the steward in court.
- April 13. 51. Verdict of the jury for the Leet and Court Baron at the manor of Prayors, in Heddingham Sible, co. Essex, with seven surrenders of tenements in that manor presented at that court attached.
- April 13. 52. Masters of the Navy and others appointed to survey Mr. Harby's cordage to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Certificate that they had surveyed certain enumerated cables, and selected them for the King's service, and certain others which they cannot approve as serviceable.
- April 14. 53. Francis Bassett to [Nicholas]. Further particulars respecting Salleneuve's wine prize at St. Ives. Replies to a slander uttered against him by his brother Bagg. Has not seen the wench since the day he last saw Nicholas. Is backing a Cornish nag to serve Nicholas this summer.
- April 14. 54. Minutes, by Nicholas, of answers to several petitions to the Lords of the Admiralty. Among the petitioners are captains of the forts at Gravesend, Sir Sackville Trevor, Capt. Dowrich, Capt. Jewell, Robert Ramsey, and the pursers of the Whelps.

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- April 14. 55. "A Proclamation for suppressing treasonous evil workers for the Popish infidel church's cause: dogs, as the Apostle calls them. Philipp. ii." The purpose of this paper was to excite the people against the bishops, whom the writer aimed at in the word "Dogs," as favourers of Popery, testified, amongst other things, by their compelling the stationers of London to print books having a Popish tendency, and keeping English Protestants close prisoners in the Tower, Gatehouse, and Fleet for their good services in Parliament. The following indorsement is in the handwriting of Bishop Laud:—"This paper was put up upon the Exchange in the daytime about April 14, 1629. The fellow was taken two days after, and put into Bedlam."
- April 15. 56. Justices of Peace of co. Pembroke to the Council. On their Haverford-west. previous complaints touching the transportation of poor Irish people into those parts in great multitudes, the Council wrote that they would take order for their restraint. Since which they have continually increased, so that within the last month 300 have been landed thereabouts, for whose passage is paid 5s. a piece. Their ingress cannot be prevented by reason that they land them on rocks and in creeks, and presently return to bring as many more. By ingrossing and transportation corn is grown to a great price and scarcity. Wherefore they pray present order for restraint of licences for transportation.
- April 15. 57. Petition of William Lane, ropemaker, to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Prays warrant for his continuance as master ropemaker at Chatham. *Annexed*,
57. I. *Certificate of the Officers of the Navy as to the sufficiency of William Lane.*
- April 15. Nicholas to Sir Henry Palmer. The Lords of the Admiralty commanded Nicholas to send the inclosed to Portsmouth, where they conceived he had been, and are very much offended that he and the captains of the Whelps are so long from their charge. - April 15. 59. Examination of Matthew Wilson, taken by Sir Heneage Finch. He is an Englishman; about 47 years age; born at Catchborne, near Morpeth. Went to Douay in 1599, and has lived subsequently at several foreign seminaries. Refuses to say whether he is a Jesuit, or in orders or not.
- April 15. 60. Minutes of a View of Frankpledge and Court Baron of Diana Countess Dowager of Oxford, held for Heningham Upland, co. Essex; with two presentations of a jury annexed, one dated this day, the other April 17, 1629.

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April 15. 61. Similar minutes for Heningham Burrow, in the same county, with nine presentments, surrenders, and other papers annexed.
- April 16. 62. Order of Council for an absolute end of all controversies between the University of Cambridge and the King's Printers and Company of Stationers. The University shall have liberty to comprint with the King's Printers and the Stationers English Bibles in 4to and median folio, together with the Liturgy in the beginning of the books and the singing Psalms at the end, provided that they shall not print more of the said Liturgies and singing Psalms than will serve to join with the Bibles printed by them, and that they shall not sell the Liturgies or singing Psalms apart; also that the printers of the University may print every year 3,000 Lilly's Grammars. [*Copy.*]
- April 16. 63. Henry Yonger, Sergeant Major, to the Council. The Captain Portsmouth. of the *St. Claude* appointed to convoy troops to Guernsey has departed to Studland Bay, directing the troops to follow, which they are unable to do on account of the Dunkirkers who are daily chasing ships on the coast. The *Tenth Whelp* is ready with three weeks' victuals, if she may be employed in the service.
- April 16. 64. William Towerson to Sec. Dorchester. The inclosed was sent Portsmouth. to him to be hastened away to the Secretary. Leaves the contempt of the *St. Claude* to his censure. The *Tenth Whelp* may be ready in four days. *Inclosed,*
64. I. *David Bandinell to Sec. Dorchester. Relates the circumstance of the departure of the St. Claude. Yarmouth, 1629, April 15.*
64. II. *Certificate of the Mayor and Burgesses of Yarmouth, Isle of Wight, of the departure of the St. Claude, leaving the troops for Guernsey without a convoy. 1629, April 15.*
- April 16. 65. Wolfgang Mayer to James Earl of Carlisle. Abel Socinus, a Basle. merchant of Basle, has reported to the writer that his wretched son still lives in London in expectation of the fulfilment of the Earl's promises, and that the 13*l.* obtained from Burlamachi being for the most part spent, he is in fear of falling into extreme misery. He further reports that the great occupations of the Earl in the Parliament and other public duties render it not at all extraordinary that he is not able to attend to his son. way come to his fingers. Sir William Pole remembers his best
service.

The Downs. a fleet of 52 sail off Beachy Head, and his capture of one of them,

Rouen with a cargo of wool, wax, tin, latten, and divers vats and
barrels full of goods. Requests further orders. *Incloses*,

his cargo. 1629, April 15.*
68. II. *Examination of Christian Christians, pilot of the Falcon.

- April 16. 69. John Boteler to [Nicholas]. Has sent, as he desired, the
[Down]ton. mare. Will willingly retain the colt. Professes submission to his
disposal. His wife's and his acknowledgments to his noble cousin.
- April 16. 70. Report, by Edward Boate, of the state of the several ships
now preparing for a new fleet.
- April 16. 71. Account, by Kenrick Edisbury and others, of what is in
progress at Portsmouth for accomplishment of the Lords Commis-
sioners' instructions for preparation of the four ships returned from
Guernsey and the new fleet for sea.

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- April 17. 1. Justices of Peace of Essex to the Council. On coming to the
Chelmsford. quarter sessions at Chelmsford there repaired to them 200 persons,
who delivered a petition in the names of the weavers of Braintree
and Boeking, complaining of extreme necessity for want of work
by the clothiers, intimating that above 30,000 persons were likely
to partake of that misery, and following the writers about with
outeries, so that they were forced to forbear all the other affairs of
the country. Some of the justices went to treat with the clothiers
of those towns, and persuaded the people to repair to their own
houses in expectation of some speedy provision to be made for them.
But they are of opinion this quiet will not prevail long, as the
clothier pretends a stop of trade, and that he is utterly unable to
employ them as heretofore. Pray the Lords to determine what may

these poor people will not long be quiet unless they have means to
relieve themselves and families.

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April 17. 2. Attorney General Heath to Sec. Dorchester. Yesterday received from the King's own mouth his commandment that Lord Stourton, who in truth goes to church, Lord William Howard, the Lord Viscount Dunbar, and Lord Gray, a Scottish Lord who married the Lady Sydenham, should have their convictions deferred. Begs him to procure the King's hand to short warrants.
- April 17. 3. Account of Sir James Perrott, as Deputy Vice Admiral under the Earl of Pembroke for cos. Pembroke, Carmarthen, and Cardigan, of wrecks and prizes recently brought within his jurisdiction, and what had been received on account thereof.
- April 18. 4. Petition of Seigneur de Lalande to the King. In the expedition to the Isle of Rhé, the Earl of Newport gave the petitioner a place in his cavalry. He was afterwards sent from England into Rochelle, where he remained until the arrival of the Earl of Lindsey, with whom he returned into England, and has since been sent into Languedoc with letters to the Duke of Rohan, whence he returned a few days since. He is now reduced to very great necessity, and without hope of ever being able to return to France, seeing the example of Seigneur de La Grossetiere, who after the surrender of Rochelle was hanged and burned, notwithstanding he had the same orders from the King as the petitioner. - April 18. 5. The Council to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty
Whitehall. It is the King's pleasure that they restore to the Earl of Lindsey the Content, formerly taken from him by the Dunkirkers, and recaptured by the Earl of Danby in his repair to the Isle of Jersey.
- April 18. 6. Petition of Capt. Theophilus Wright, Archibald Nicoll, and their partners, to the King. Set forth the circumstances of their obtaining letters of reprisal and seizure upon a Scottish ship, laden with Dunkirk goods, at Dover, and the further proceedings which terminated in an Order of Council for their satisfaction, to the amount of 4,577*l.* 5*s.* By the interference of Sir John Hippisley, they failed in procuring satisfaction for 3,277*l.* 18*s.*, part of the 4,577*l.* 5*s.*, and thereupon petitioned Parliament for redress. During the inquiry the Parliament was dissolved, and they now pray a reference to the Archbishop of York and other Lords to take final order for their relief. [*Underwritten is a reference to Sir Henry Marten to call the parties before him, and take such course as is consonant with justice and equity.*]
- April 18. 7. Dr. John Bancroft and Dr. William Smyth to Bishop Laud, of London. Report what progress had been made in the late commission for the preservation of the forests of Shotover and Stowe,

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and what frauds of the under-keepers had been discovered, so that each of them made more benefit to himself in one year than his Majesty did in five. Yet now there are some about the undertaking to repair the said forests. His Majesty's profit will be most advanced by keeping them in his own hands, so that the officers are straightly held to the forest laws; wherefore they request him to uphold the late commission.

April 18. 8. Lord President Conway to the Mayor of Guilford. Complaint has been brought to the Council against the Mayor for arresting Capt. Jo. Burley, commander of the Swiftsure, a Vice Admiral in the expedition to Rochelle, and at this time sent for to receive directions respecting the King's service. His entertainment being in arrear, Burley cannot satisfy his creditors, and therefore prays that he may be released. Lord Conway does not doubt that, on knowledge of these circumstances, both the Mayor and the creditor will take order that he may be set at liberty. The Mayor cannot be ignorant of the provision that those whose entertainment is in arrear should not be arrested till the end of July, when his Majesty will be prepared to satisfy them. [*Copy.*]

April 18. 9. Sir James Perrott to Nicholas. Returns the Commission for Haroldstone. the Spanish carvel which came into Milford Haven laden with corn. A small French bark has been brought into Tenby, the right to which does not appear. He has caused her to be stayed. April 18. 10. Anthony Batt to ——. Wrote last week to mention that Exeter. Mr. Alden delivered a letter of the person addressed to the Bishop, who refused to institute him upon the King's presentation on the ground that he had a title of his own to Exminster. His title seems nothing more than to get money from the Corporators. The Bishop would yield to the King's letters mandatory.

April 18. 11. Certificate from the Masters of the Navy and others appointed to survey Mr. Harby's cordage, to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, of a further quantity of the same cordage found serviceable, and another quantity unserviceable.

April 19. 12. Sir Thomas Roe to James Earl of Carlisle. Is prevented waiting upon him by the gout. To-morrow will attend their meeting in St. Martin's Lane. the public service, which can never be separated from his Majesty's service; if he cannot go, he will be carried, and will send the Earl an account by writing. It is not for the King's honour to contract or condition, but there are some graces which they hope to obtain, which will fall like a morning dew upon those that now wither in contumacy, and he will not doubt to promise the Earl's favour and assistance, which will set a crown upon their endeavours, and make them [*i.e.* the persons who wither in contumacy] know, and by them all others, that submission has more power to draw down grace from a good King than obstinacy.

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April 20. 13. Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to Capt. John Mennes. Approve his discreet and stout carriage in the capture of a Ham-
burgher out of a fleet of Hollanders. Calling to his assistance the
Mayor of Sandwich, he is carefully to search the hold of the ship.
If he finds any considerable quantity of prohibited goods he is to
send her up for London, if not to discharge her. A supply of three
months' provisions will be sent for him into the Downs. He is to
waft thence the stores for the ships preparing at Portsmouth, and
whilst waiting for them to ply up and down from the river's mouth
to Beachy Head.

- April 20. 15. Nicholas to the same. Incloses the preceding letter, and com-
ments on its contents.—P.S. Neither of the two ships he sent in
will prove prize, but Nicholas fears no demand for anything they
miss as taken from them.
- April 20. 16. William Lake to Sir Henry Fane [Vane]. Commends Mr.
Wallingford House. Rogers, who, in the Isle of Rhé, proved himself a soldier, a traveller,
and a scholar, but withal ill handled by fortune. Advanced by the
writer to Mr. Hierome's service. Business goes on *de mal en pis*,
few or none paying the duties, and those that pay do so under other
men's names; so much are their tender consciences terrified at Sir
John Eliot's *brutum fulmen*. Though the Custom House is not
shut up, yet they are at such low ebb that the monies that used to
be supplied from thence for the monthly payment are now issued
out of the Exchequer. Hope there is that the Merchant Adventurers
leading the way, the rest of the sheep will follow. The ill spirit of
obstinacy lies not only in the merchants' breasts, but moves in
every small vein through the kingdom. Last week the clothiers of
Essex were up, but were dispersed by the Earl of Warwick and
Lord Maynard. Sir Francis Cottington is now at last Chancellor
[of the Exchequer] in good earnest; Newburgh is Chancellor of the
Duchy; the Chancellor [Sir Humphrey May] is Vice Chamberlain;
William Herbert is Lord Powys; and now the only business of the
Court is to provide a successor for the Gentleman Usher's place, and
to make St. George a good feast. The Earl of Northampton is gone
this day to Windsor to be installed, if the great waters do not stop
his passage by reason of the excessive rain for three days. The
term will bring in the Star Chamber, of which there is great expect-
ation concerning Sir John Eliot and the rest, wherein, if they pro-
ceed not warily and stoutly, *actum est*. Likes well of Sir Henry's
going to the Leaguer, because he may there learn to command and
be of some service to the commonwealth in case the Earl of Warwick
and Lord Maynard miscarry in the Essex affairs. Sir Henry's
return depends upon another's answer, from whence they heard
yesterday, but nothing to the purpose.

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April 20. 17. Articles objected by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners against William Jones and Augustine Matthewes, printers, and Nathaniel Butter and Michael Sparke, stationers, for printing and publishing various books without the same being licensed by the Archbishop of Canterbury or Bishop of London, according to the Deeree in the Star Chamber of the 28th year of Queen Elizabeth. Nathaniel Butter is charged with printing and publishing "The Reconciler," and Michael Sparke, "Babel no Bethel, written by Henry Burton;" William Jones, "Musquil unmasked," by Thomas Spencer; Augustine Matthewes with printing, and Michael Sparke with publishing, "The Antithesis of the Church of England," by William Prynne.
- April 20. 18. Certificate of Robert Earl of Lindsey. In the late expedition to Rochelle, M. de Lalande exposed his life to extreme hazard, and desperately escaped when he issued out of Rochelle to report the state of the town.
- April 21.
Whitehall. 19. The King to Attorney General Heath. Warrant to prepare a pardon for Humphrey Galbraith, William Galbraith, and others, indicted two years ago of high treason in co. Fermanagh, Ireland, for killing Sir John Weymes. Order is taken for a competent allowance to be made to Dame Anne Weymes, widow of Sir John, by "the Mr." of some of the persons so indicted.

he was a ballad singer when he was a mad lad in Oxford, and now
he is the grave Bishop of Oxford he is turned a ballad maker." It
concerns you little *vituperium* of London and the great O'Neale
of Winchester to foment and keep afoot the faction. They have

The King is pleased that the late declaration of the statutes of that cathedral should be newly engrossed, with this alteration.
- April 27. 43. William Towerson to Nicholas. By the inclosed he will Portsmouth. perceive what goods are aboard the Ark, sent to him by Sir Henry Palmer. Has put a man aboard, and waits for further directions. *Inclosed,*
43. I. *Sir Henry Palmer to Towerson. Sends the Ark to him to take care of till he hears from the Lords. 1629, April 26. [Copy.]*
43. II. *Examination of Peter Eversham [Evertson], master of the Ark. Was laden at Amsterdam by Dirick Nysan [Niesen], with butter, hides, and wicks for candles, for Brouage, in France. 1629, April 26. [Copy.]*
- [April 27 ?] 44. Questions respecting the legal character of the offences attributed to Sir John Eliot, and others, propounded to the three Chief Justices by Attorney General Heath by direction of the King, with their answers. In this copy there are two additional questions written in the hand of the King himself: one is, "Can any privilege of the House warrant a tumultuous proceeding?" to which the Judges replied, "We humbly conceive that an earnest, though a disorderly and confused proceeding, in such a multitude, may be called tumultuous, and yet the privilege of the House may warrant it." The other question put by the King arose out of the answer to one of the previous questions. The Judges had been asked, whether if Parliament-men conspired to defame the King's government, and deter his subjects from obeying and assisting him, of what nature would be their offence?" They answered that it would be more or less according to the facts. The King added, "It is true

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that the circumstances of the fact will aggravate or diminish when particular men come to be tried, but I must know what the nature of this offence is, being fully proved?" The Judges replied, "We in all humbleness are willing to satisfy your Majesty's command, but until the particulars of the fact do appear we can give no directer answer than before."

59. III. *Account of copper, lead, and other prohibited goods found aboard the Hamburg Hoy. April 27.*

Wants an honest, careful man, that can speak French, to wait on his son Rolles this journey. Begg the Secretary to spare him one of his, or commend a fit person.
- April 28. 63. Bishop Williams, of Lincoln, to the same. Thanks for favours at his last being in town, and continued since, to Sir Richard Grosvenor. Details the circumstances of Jane Hawkins, of St. Ives, who, having fallen into a rapture or ecstasy, has uttered strange things, in verse, which she will not confess she could ever make before or can do now, in matters of divinity and state. She is a witty, crafty baggage. Feigning herself in a trance, she began to preach in verse, magnifying the ministry of Mr. Tokey, the Vicar. The versifying continued three days and three nights in an auditory of very near 200 people, the Vicar and one Mr. Wise, his Curate, and another scholar sitting at the bed's feet, and copying out the

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verses which the poor woman (she is but a pedlar) did dictate, which, amounting to some thousands, they had transcribed fair, with intent to print them, when, coming suddenly, the Bishop seized on the copy and originals. The Bishop required the Vicar and his Curate to acknowledge their error in making themselves actuaries to the impostures of a frantic woman, which the Vicar refusing to do, the Bishop had suspended him and put the Curate quite away. He also left a warrant with the Justices to look to the woman, and that none of her neighbours come to visit her. Preaching there on the Sunday, he took occasion to speak of the scandal thereby put upon our church, whereupon the people have quite forsaken this rhyming preacheress.

That he printed "Babel no Bethel," but conceives there is nothing contrary to the established doctrine of the Church of England therein, and that he has indured a hard imprisonment already for the same, which he hopes will excuse his further answer. That some part of Mr. Prynne's book was printed by Augustine Matthewes, and other part elsewhere. He conceives the book itself to be a just and necessary defence of the Church of England against the Arminians. Refuses to confess the printer that printed part of the book, and thinks this Court will not desire it, in regard that he [the printer?] has done all to the glory of God, the honour of the King, the good of the Church, and the welfare of the doctrine of the Church of England and the religion established.

23. James Viscount Doncaster to his father, James Earl of Carlisle. Is commanded by the Lord Duke to inclose his letter, which is to procure for a very honest Englishman, Allen Towson, the Consul's place at Leghorn. *Incloses,*

23. I. *Sir Robert Dudley, signing himself "Il Duca di Northumbria," to James Earl of Carlisle. Thanks for his courtesies. Praise of his son, Viscount Doncaster. Regrets that the Earl did not visit Florence where the Grand Duke expected him, with much admiration of his noble carriage elsewhere. Is desired to accompany Lord Doncaster's recommendation of Allen Towson, an English merchant. Florence, 1629, May 15.*

24. Lord President Conway to Lady Villiers. Understands she intends to employ a gentleman who has served the writer some years, to attend her noble son in his travels abroad. She could not have made a better choice. Highly commends his usefulness and diligence. [*Copy.*]

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May 6. Arrow. 25. Elizabeth Amson to the Honourable Mistress Mary Conway, daughter to Viscount Conway, at his house in St. Martin's Lane. Finding the house in the country for the writer and her husband to dwell in not yet unoccupied, begs that she may be received into the ark again, as Noah did the dove, and that Lord Conway would give order for a speedy and peaceable possession of their house.
- May 6. Thisleworth [Isleworth]. 26. Capt John Mason to Nicholas. Jacob, the supposed lost diver, is returned, and comes to Nicholas, with request that the money and wrecked goods at Portsmouth may be speedily adjudged in the Admiral's Court, so that he may have his part. He purposes to go on with his design at the Wight, and then at the Lizard. Desires to have his commission renewed.
- May 6. 27. Giles Grene to the same. The bearer [Mr. Wright] has a petition against Mr. Delabarre, which he recommends to his influence with the Lords. Begs Nicholas to direct the bearer's ignorance in suits of this nature. On the morrow will bring him tidings of some convenient hour of meeting with Mr. Alcock.
- May 6. Star Chamber. 28. Notes, in the handwriting of Bishop Laud, of the proceedings in the Star Chamber in the cases of John Maud, of Wakefield, and Richard Chambers. In the former case the defendant had said that "the King went to mass with the Queen; he would be provided with powder and shot; another gunpowder blow, &c." The note contains fragments of a speech or speeches, and a minute of the several suggested sentences. The notes on Richard Chambers's case are of the same kind. In his case the words were spoken at the Council table, and were, "The merchants are in no part of the world so served and wrung as in England. In Turkey they have more encouragement." There is a full note of one of the speeches spoken on this occasion, perhaps that of Bishop Laud himself. [*These notes are written on the back of a minute of Chambers's case, probably one of those handed to the Judges. The cause seems to have been first appointed for hearing on May 1.*]
- May 6. 29. Answers of Nathaniel Butter, of London, stationer, to the articles objected by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. Acknowledges that he printed some passages of the book mentioned in the fifth article, which were objected to by the Licenser. He asked the Licenser if he had showed them to the Bishop of London, and he answering that he had not, the examinant resolved that the judgment of two bishops in writing the said passages was more to be regarded than the opinion of the Licenser.
- May 6. 30. Inventory, by William Drake, of tenths of several small prizes lately taken by the Little George, and brought into Bristol.
- May 6. 31. Certificate of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and Officers of the Navy of the price of ships bought at Plymouth by Sir James Bagg, and at Portsmouth by Kenrick Edisbury, for fire ships in the late expedition to Rochelle.

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May 6. 32. Petition of John Skinner and various other persons to the Commissioners for saltpetre. Robert More, of Southwark, flax dresser, having obtained a deputation for making saltpetre in Essex, Suffolk, and Norfolk, and having no experience, knowledge, or discretion, wasted and disabled the grounds, vexed and troubled the King's subjects, and kept back the hire of the petitioners, his servants. They pray the Commissioners to commiserate their case. *Annexed,*
32. i. *Particulars of some of the wrongs done by Robert More, ready to be proved by several of the preceding petitioners.*
- May 7. 33. Copy of a writ of Habeas Corpus, addressed to the Marshal of the Marshalsea for bringing the body of William Strode, with the day and cause of his detention, before the Court of King's Bench; with a copy also of the return made by the Marshal, setting forth the Council's warrant for the prisoner's detention, dated April 2 last; with a royal declaration of the cause of his committal, dated this day.
- May 7. 34. Examination of William Strode, taken by the Attorney General. Was in the Parliament House on March 2 last. Does not well remember what was done in the House on that day, neither does he desire to answer anything done in the House of Parliament but in that House.
- May 7. 35. Examination of Walter Long, taken by the Attorney General. Was member for Bath in the last Parliament, and was present on March 2 last. The Speaker delivered to the House some message for adjournment. By the privilege of Parliament he should not be pressed to answer anything out of the House which was said or done there; nevertheless, to testify his innocence, he is contented to answer to those things which shall be demanded of him. Sir John Eliot threw down a paper, and moved it should be read. Examinant had nothing to do with the preparation of that paper. Does not remember the contents, nor what Sir John Eliot said, nor what he himself said. Desires to see the records of his being made sheriff, and of the time of his election for Bath before he answers whether he was sheriff of Wilts at his election.
- May 7. 36. Information in the Court of Star Chamber, filed by the Attorney General on his Majesty's behalf, against Sir John Eliot, Denzill Holles, Benjamin Valentine, Walter Long, William Coryton, William Strode, John [Selden], Sir Miles Hobart, and Sir Peter Heyman, for their conduct in the House of Commons on February 25 last.
- May 7. 37. Another copy of the same.
- [May 7.] 38. Outline of the same, in the handwriting of Attorney General Heath, probably prepared as instructions for the person who actually drew the information.

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May 7. 39. Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to Capt. John Mennes. On consideration that about the time the Hawk, of Hamburg, was taken by him, articles of peace were agreed on with the French King, he is to release that ship, and afterwards he is to waft to Portsmouth such provisions as shall be sent by the Officers of the Navy, and there to grave his ship, and receive a supply of victuals for five months.
- May 7. 40. Answers of Henry Burton to the articles objected against him by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. Believes that about two years ago Dr. Joshua [Joseph] Hall composed the book articulated, but whether it was lawfully printed and published he does not know. Denies that he has perverted Dr. Hall's words in the manner charged. The book he wrote was composed principally against Mr. Chohnely and Mr. Butterfield, who endeavour to prove the Church of Rome to be a true visible church, which he contends to be contrary to the 19th article, the second part of the homily for Whitsunday, and Bishop Jewell's Apology. Delivered the copy of his book, "The Seven Vials," to William James, and that of "Babel no Bethel" to Michael Sparke, to procure them to be licensed, and so printed and published.
- May 7.
St. James's. 41. Henry Earl of Danby to James Earl of Carlisle. Is forced abruptly to take leave of absence for some few days. On precedent experience he found nothing saved his life but the quiet of Cornbury Lodge, and the counsel of his old physician, Dr. Ashworth, who knows every vein amiss in his body. Hopes presently to return, and in the meantime his preparation for France shall go forward.
- May 7. 42. Note of the division of the shires among the petremen, made by the Lord Treasurer, Lord Steward, and Sir John Coke. There were eight saltpetremen, among whom the whole kingdom was divided, and who were bound to a weekly supply of certain quantities here stated.
- May 8. 43. Attorney General Heath to Sec. Dorchester. Has received five warrants signed with the King's own hand for the imprisonment of Sir John Eliot and eight others in the several prisons where they were formerly committed. Will take care of that service.
- May 8.
Hatton House. 44. Eliza Lady Hatton to the same. The business in which she formerly troubled him with the delivery of a petition in the name of her brother, Thomas Cecil, has been debated with the King's counsel, and is cleared from any pretence of the projectors, as appears by an inclosed certificate. Begg him to move the King to grant a new patent to Sir Edward Altham and Mr. Hawtrey.

bon's house. 47. Lionel Sharpe to the same. It grieves every honest man to see these differences between the King and his subjects, who do but mistake the King. To make the King known, there are no fitter instruments than the Lord Lieutenants, and the bishops by themselves and their clergy. They might make known the excellent mind and nature

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of the King to his people. Sets forth the example of Queen Elizabeth, and the way in which she carried out her policy, which was to suppress the Jesuits and sneap the Puritans. What she effected by the cheap virtue of courtesy, and by allowing some great lord to take, as it were, the protection of the party, as Sir Francis Walsingham and Sir Walter Mildmay in the Lower House of the Council, and two lords, the Earls of Leicester and Essex. States his own employment under the Earl of Leicester in mediating for Cartwright, Fenner, and Fenn, Sir Richard Knightly, Mr. Travers, and others of that note; only such as Penry and Udall had the extremity of the law.

May 8. 46. Petition of William Golstone to Sec. Coke. Petitioner was employed in the time of the Secretary's being Commissioner of the Navy to make provision of timber for the navy. In 1625 there was a contract made with Roger Terry, William Love, and John Willett, for 600 loads. In the time of the sickness part of it was left at Kingston and Dorking, where the same still lies on the water-side and in the woods. Prays that he may be furnished with money to bring this timber to the yard at Deptford.

May 8. 47. Petition of William Burrell to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. King James granted the petitioner the office of a Master Shipwright, with a fee of 20*l.* *per diem*, during the life of Andrewes Burrell, his son. Being much engaged in his particular estate in Ireland, and in regard of his years unfit to travel; being also much engaged for many courtesies received from his good friend Peter Pett; petitioner prays that on surrender of his grant the like letters may be renewed to Peter Pett. *Annexed,*

47. I. *Certificate, by John Greaves and various other shipbuilders, that Peter Pett is a skilful and well experienced arts-man in the building of ships, and of honest life and good reputation. 1629, March 30.*

47. II. *Certificate by the Master and Brethren of the Trinity House, in similar recommendation of Peter Pett. 1629, March 31.*

May 8. 48. The University of Oxford to Sir Thomas Roe. Thanks 'for a gift of oriental manuscripts. Latin.
Congregation House.

May 8. 49. James Viscount Doncaster to his father, James Earl of Carlisle. Fulfils his promise of testifying his progress in Italian. Lord Craven being obliged to return to England, the writer is unwilling to be left alone, and therefore in self-defence intends to return also.

May 8. 50. William Lord Craven to some one whom he terms "Sweet Saint Anthony," perhaps William Boswell. Begs him to deliver an inclosed letter to Lord Carlisle (probably the previous letter), and to use means to continue the writer in his lordship's good opinion. Cartropes shall not detain him longer in that place, unless the sun were more temperate or the people less dogmatic.

51. Petition of the Parishioners of St. Botolph without Aldgate, London, to Bishop Laud. Some well-disposed persons, unknown to petitioners, have bestowed a lecture upon them, and commended Mr. Edwardes to be their lecturer for three years, which was allowed of by Mr. Swadlyn, their minister. Since Christmas last Mr. Edwardes has preached with them every Sunday afternoon and Tuesday forenoon, to the great comfort of the petitioners and relief of the poor of the parish, in number 3,000 and upwards, by collections at the church door. On Sunday afternoon last, the church being very full, there was no sermon at all, and requiring to know the occasion, Mr. Swadlyn told them that the Bishop had dismissed the lecturer for a time, for causes unknown. Pray that he may be re-admitted to preach among them, being a man every way conformable to the Church of England, with life and doctrine agreeable. [*The petition is signed by the four churchwardens, vestrymen, and principal persons of the parish.*]

52. Sir Allen Apsley to Sec. Dorchester. Mr. Matthewes, of Dartmouth, John White, minister of Dorchester, and Ferdinando Nicholls, of Sherborne, had applied to see some of his prisoners, and to speak to them at the windows, but had been prevented. On the 8th inst. Sir Oliver Luke and Sir John Littleton, Parliament men, desired to speak with Sir John Eliot, or at least that they might see him, but were refused. They then offered to speak to Mr. Holles, at his window, but the keeper forbade him to speak to them. He showed them "his topp and skurdgstick, his weights of swinginge with." They made antic signs and devoted salutations at their parting. Prays his Majesty's pleasure whether he should not make stay of any that attempt the like; if it be thought meet, they should be questioned what business they had there. Hears the Earl of Clare was informed or conceited that two of Sir Allen's servants were dead of the spotted fever, and that some other sick lodged under his son. He has no servant dead, and, of the two that are sick, one has been in a consumption these two years, and the other has been for half a year so desperately in love that he could neither eat nor sleep, and so fell into a burning fever. Some said he had spots, other fleabites; but his mistress came, and gave him assurance of being his wife, whereupon he mends apace. Has received a Habeas Corpus for Mr. Selden, and another for Mr. Coryton. Desires to know his Majesty's pleasure, whether he shall return both the body with the cause, one or neither.

53. John Griffith to Nicholas. Prays him to inform the Lords of the Admiralty, that on the coast of Anglesea there is an English pirate, which robs and spoils all shipping that passes from Ireland to Wales and Chester. Has taken two barks freighted with goods to the value of 2,000*l.* at the least, besides sundry passengers of quality. The people of that country pray that some course may be taken to free them from this "piratical prejudice."

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[May 9.] 54. Henry Earl of Danby to James Earl of Carlisle. The Venetian Ambassador is of opinion that his Majesty should rather send some man of meaner quality than the writer, or associate Sir Isaac Wake for the present, as less troublesome and more convenient to the French King. The young Duke, Governor of Picardy, may perform the work extraordinarily well, attended from this next neighbour province, when the writer at his years must be constrained to travel into Italy or Languedoc. The Venetian Ambassador makes not his despatch until seven that evening.
- May 9. 55. Christopher Earl of Anglesea to his cousin or nephew, Endymion Porter. Being unwell, sends to him to procure the King's hand to a paper which concerns the Earl's cousin, Browne.
- [May 9?] 56. ——— to Mons. Damville, at Liége. News of the arrival of the Plate fleet in Spain, and of another fleet in Portugal, with the destruction of the Hollanders in the island of "Cabo Verde," is displeasing to our Puritans. It was moved in the late Parliament that since tonnage and poundage were denied, our Narrow Seas should be committed to the Hollanders, whose government many of the falsehearted people prefer to that under which they live, but the King and some few of the Privy Council rejected the treacherous advice, and seven of the King's ships are sent to guard the Narrow Seas. The King is afraid the swelling of the Hollanders, being the chief encouragers of his people against him, may concur to the ruin of him and his monarchy. Believes the King would rather be beholden to Spain to supply his wants than comply with the Puritans.
- May 9. 57. Minute of application of John Giffard for direction to apprehend Thomas Guy, who having made quantities of saltpetre and gunpowder in Devon, to the prejudice of Giffard, the Council granted a warrant for attaching Guy and seizing his goods and chattels. The latter was effected, but Guy himself escaped.
- May 10. Proclamation of the renewal of the ancient amity between the Crowns of England and France, from April 14 last. [*Coll. Procs., Cur. I., No. 108.*]
- May 10. 58. Foulke Reed to Lord President Conway. Has sent my lady Mitton. by the bearer 100*l.* The tenants are become poor, and are not able to perform their payments at any certain day. They pay as they can sell their cattle, which is very uncertain.
- May 10. 59. Petition of Robert Tokely to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. One Robert Mullebeck, a foreigner, having begun a suit in the Court of Admiralty, as is declared in the case adjoined, petitioner paid some fees to Counsel, for which he has been drawn into a most tedious and chargeable suit in the King's Bench, of purpose to deter all men from having resort to the Admiralty Court, or accommodating their friends beyond seas. Prays the

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Commissioners to interpose their authority with the Judges of the King's Bench for his ease and comfort. *Appended,*

59. i. *State of the cause complained of by the Officers of the Admiralty and Robert Tokely.*

60. Sir George Booth and Sir Randolph Mainwaring to the Council. On receipt of their Lordships' letters, they sent forth warrants to all persons complained of by the Feltnakers of Chester, and some of the persons appeared and conformed to their order. James Prestwich agreed to conform, but has since contemptuously neglected. All these persons had used the trade of feltnaking, and taken apprentices, though themselves had never served as apprentices. Certain persons, whose names are given, appeared not.

61. Mary Countess of Westmoreland to her cousin, Sec. Dorchester. Sends a messenger respecting a business which she commends to his better judgment. If he would inquire after the business of the Lord Keeper, and add that the King asked whether his command therein were obeyed, it would give much life to it.

62. Sir Henry Palmer to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Finds, from Mr. Boate, that the graving-place there is decayed, and that he cannot perform the required careening without money. Having been near touched with scandalous reports, he desired to have waited on their Lordships, but a mischance on one of his legs disables him.

63. Sir Guilford Slingsby to the same. Thomas May, purser of the St. Andrew, being desirous to make over his place to Charles Clarke, he certifies that Clarke is a very able and sufficient man either as purser or master.

64. Petition of Sir Anthony Aucher to the King. Petitioner and Sir Thomas Hardres being indebted 32,000*l.*, of which petitioner's share was 20,000*l.* and Sir Thomas's 12,000*l.*, for the greater part of which petitioner was surety, petitioner has paid his own creditors 15,000*l.*, and Sir Thomas died lately, leaving 6,000*l.* unpaid, but with an estate sufficient to pay all his debts, which his representatives endeavour to convert to their own use, without freeing the petitioner from Sir Thomas's debts. 69. Petition of the Adventurers of the Pelican, of London, to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Cowes Castle. Bevers [Bevis] Marks. Hopes he will reconcile a difference between Capt. Rawden, Rowland Wilson, and Capt. Theobald. Richard Jolliffe, of Newport, is come from London with Lord Conway's hand and seal for the Vice Admiralty of the whole Isle of Wight, except Cowes Castle and harbour, with the seal for setting the price of corn and a grant of all the King's waste and houses, so that he is become a great man of a sudden, and makes great brags. General, that on May 1 inst. he served a subpoena out of the Court of Star Chamber on Benjamin Valentine and Denzil Holles, they being in several chambers in the Tower of London.

Grays' Inn. members of Parliament, imprisoned for their conduct in the House of Commons, entered appearances in the Star Chamber at the suit of the Attorney General. Benjamin Valentine and Denzil Holles had not yet appeared.
- May 13. 75. The King to Archbishop Abbot. Seeing that divers bishops
Greenwich. live in and about London, to the ill example of the inferior clergymen, and the hindrance of God's service and the King's, he is required command all bishops to their sees, those only excepted whose attendance at Court is necessarily required, and that none be suffered to reside upon their lands or commendams but in their episcopal houses, and that they waste not the woods belonging to their sees. Mr. Lieutenant of the Tower has received writs of Habeas Corpus for Mr. Selden and Mr. Valentine, to bring them to the King's Bench bar, of which Mr. Lieutenant makes stay without his Majesty's own knowledge and direction. Requests him to move the King for it, as a thing fit to be done. They are sure to be remanded again.
- May 13. 79. Petition of Jacob Johnson, the diver, to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Since 1620, has, in his own person, by a plain and manifest way of diving deep under water, brought up much goods of good benefit to the Admiralty. Prays for a renewal of his commission, with a special clause for the Lizard, where he has knowledge of some wrecked silver. Solicits a third part of the silver recovered there for his commission.
- May 14. 80. Petition of Thomas Mottershed to the King. The late King, in the 13th year of his reign, granted to petitioner and Robert Christian, deceased, the office of Receivership of fines and forfeitures imposed by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, with a fourth part thereof for their pains. Prays that on surrender of that grant a new patent may be made to petitioner and Edward Mottershed his son. [*Underwritten is a reference to the Attorney General to prepare the grant prayed. Greenwich, 1629, May 14.*]
- May 14. 81. Sec. Dorchester to Bishop Buckeridge, of Ely. The King
The Court, at
Greenwich. promised Gerardus Joannes Vossius to make his son a Fellow of some college in Cambridge, and has sent letters to Jesus College, where the Bishop is Visitor, and absolutely required the Fellows to choose Joannes Vossius the younger on the next vacancy. The Bishop is also

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required, when the next election is brought to him, to take one of two, according to the statute, to nominate the said Joannes Vossius. He is not to fail herein, the rather because the honour of his deceased friend, the late Duke of Buckingham, is engaged in it. [*Draft, corrected by Bishop Laud, and written on the blank side of a letter or cover of a letter addressed to him.*]

May 14. 82. Sir Allen Apsley to Sec. Dorchester. Upon a second writ of Habeas Corpus he has returned the cause without the bodies, for which contempt (as they term it) the Judges have fined the writer twice, and have now sent to him that to-morrow they will send an attachment to the Sheriff of Middlesex and London to arrest the writer's body. For all that concerns himself, farther than it may be advantageous or disadvantageous for the King's service, he esteems not. Received his Majesty's warrant to keep the prisoners close, which he will observe until he receives a like warrant to carry them; nor will he make his own appearance to answer the disobeying of their mandates without his Majesty's approbation. Was yesterday to have waited on him at Greenwich; the Secretary was absent, and the sad time unseasonable to move the King. How is he to carry the prisoners? by water or land, publicly with a guard, or silently without?

May 14. 83. J. B. Figon to [William Boswell]. Thanks for courtesies and professions of gratitude. As he desires to know what in England would be agreeable to the Prince Cardinal, would say that horses are a great delight to him, and that a hackney would be very acceptable.

May 14. 84. L. Hay to her brother, James Earl of Carlisle. Her anxiety to hear from him. Congratulations on his return. If she survives the the Lord her husband, will be content to live in any place in that kingdom where she might sometimes enjoy his company. Since it pleased God to call that hopeful youth her son, never had much pleasure. Her husband and daughter present service. Thanks for favours to her husband's brother's son, Sir James Cuninghame [?], at Venice, and also to her cousin, Arthur Barclay.

May 15. 85. Henry Lucas to Sec. Dorchester. Of a long day's work, which lasted till one of the clock, shall make a short report. On hearing the King's Sergeants, Davenport and Berkeley, whose arguments spent the whole morning, the prisoners were remanded until the first of the next term, when their counsel are to reply, and the next day Mr. Attorney is to have the last word for the King. The Judges have expressed no inclination of their judgment, but seem to be yet unsatisfied; whether the hearers were of the same mind he has not had time to inquire.

May 15. 86. The Council of War to Lord Treasurer Weston. Pray him to pay 24*l.* to Sibell Aley, widow of a lieutenant colonel, who was drowned, with his two sons, in the return of the Earl of Holland after the retreat from the Isle of Rhé. [*Draft.*]

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[May 15.] 87. The Council of War to Lord Treasurer Weston. Similar letter for payment to William Elphinstone, one of the Captains of the Cadiz expedition, of 332*l.* 10*s.*, for his own and his officers' arrears.
- May 15. Margate Road. 88. Capt. John Mennes to Nicholas. The weather has been so extraordinary foul that he has not been able to take aboard his victual, which was forced into Margate pier. Released the Hamburgerh on sight of the order. Wishes the Officers of the Navy would send down materials for careening. These winds make a clear coast. Lord Warwick's ship came in that day, in which it was reported she had done great service in rescuing his Majesty's subjects from the enemies. All that morning Mennes was turning up to the Gore, and Sir Henry Palmer was in the Downs so that between them the Dunkirkers must have passed invisible.
- May 15. 89. Appraisement of the Dolphin, a prize ship, at Southampton. Total, 220*l.* Forwarded by John Ellzey to Nicholas.
- May 16. London. 90. Sec. Coke to Sec. Dorchester. Is forced by a pressing occasion to be absent from Court this Sunday. Hopes to be the more ready for the great business of Ireland at their next meeting. Begg Dorchester, if necessary, to make his excuse. The Merchant Adventurers have agreed to ship their cloths. The resolution was gained by two hands. Coke's brother Gore dealt honestly and effectually, and so did the rest. The Persian Company have begun a new subscription; Sir William Russell 3,000*l.*, and others to the amount of 10,000*l.* at the least.
- May 16. The Temple. 91. Sir Thomas Freke to Endymion Porter. Desires to return into the country, and hopes Porter will supply him with money and directions. The Lord Treasurer promised that all should be paid before the end of the term. Has an uncle and a sick son to go down with him in a coach, and beyond Tuesday next cannot stay.
- May 17. Greenwich. Proclamation commanding the due execution of the laws made for setting the poor on work. This proclamation was founded upon the advice of the Council and Judges; as to the latter of which, see 1629, April [?], Vol. cxli., No. 75. [*Coll. Procs., Car. I., No. 109.*]
- May 17. Greenwich. Proclamation for speedy sending away Irish beggars out of this kingdom into their own country, and for suppressing and ordering English rogues and vagabonds according to the laws. This proclamation also was founded upon the advice of the Judges mentioned above. [*Ibid., No. 110.*]
- May 17. Greenwich. 92, 93. Two Libels, said, in the indorsement by Bishop Laud, to have been found at St. Paul's Cross. "It was the Sunday before Whitsunday." They are papers of expostulation, addressed to the King, the nature of which may be gathered from the commencement of the first of them:—"Oh King, or rather no King, for thou hast lost the hearts of thy subjects, and therefore no king, nor they any longer thy subjects—that relation now ceaseth, violated on thy part. . . The first thing God doth when he determineth to

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dethrone a King from his kingdom (as Carion in his Chronicle observeth) is to take from him the hearts of his subjects." The writer calls upon the King to purge his house and kingdoms of idolatry, otherwise if he persists still in his obstinacy, breaking off one parliament after another, yea, imprisoning and punishing them, then he was to fear the sentence following:—"Because thou hast cast away the word of the Lord, He also has cast away thee from being King: the Lord hath rent away the kingdom of Israel from thee this day, and hath given it to thy neighbour that is better than thou." The second paper enlarges principally on the fate of Rochelle, which is laid to the King's charge; and it is distinctly asserted that God has cast him away from being King. In both papers, the death of the King's first-born is treated as a judgment, and in the former he is called upon to hear the voice of God proclaiming, "Give account of thy stewardship, for thou mayst be no longer Stuart." The King is charged to read these papers privately to himself, and to make use of them, before it be too late.

May 17. 94. Notes out of Mr. Salisbury's sermon, apparently sent to Lord Chief Justice Hyde by Bishop Laud for his advice. The sermon was upon Matthew xxiv. 6. The preacher deplored the changes introduced into the Church, and the unhappy dissensions in Parliament, and urged upon his hearers to suffer all things in a passive fortitude, rather than permit the least impairing of the national liberties. The Secretary procured the writer the liberty of the House, but within very few days after it pleased his Majesty to make him close prisoner again, and the Secretary seconded it with the strictest limitations that treason itself deserves, and so he now continues, his rents being stopped, divers sums of money called in upon him, 300*l.* lands turned into his hands, various other inconveniences thrown upon him; his wife, ten children, and all his family distressed; himself thrust out of the protection of the laws, and Star-Chambered for heinous crimes,

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1629. whilst his counsel protest that they dare not give counsel to the subject in this particular case. Besides this there is the afflicting sense which presses his better part, that is, his soul, of the heavy distaste imputed by his Majesty, and signified under his blessed hand. If he could find himself guilty, he would not suffer his hands to let his heart dwell where it does. The clearness of his conscience makes him protest unto the Secretary, not daring to supplicate the King, until he finds him innocent from fact, though not clear from folly, humbly supplicating the Secretary's benign construction.

He is, by the Lord Chamberlain, remitted to the Secretary, to know whether the Ambassador might not have access to his Majesty at Greenwich this evening.
- May 28. 30. Capt. Richard Plumleigh to Nicholas. Has been earnest with the Earl of Dorset to put him into Capt. Pennington's squadron, but he makes difficulty of it, and says he moved it to the rest of the Lords Commissioners, but they would not agree to alter anything. Therefore begs his commission may be despatched. The Earl of Dorset has forced upon him for lieutenant one Jacob Lovell, with which he must have patience perforce.
- May 28. 31. Robert Earl of Leicester to James Earl of Carlisle. During his abode at Petworth he shall be forced to part with Lady Anne, for he has liberty to bring but one child with him, and a small number of servants. Begs him to consider therefore where she may best be placed. Last night received a letter from his father to hasten his coming to Petworth, and no kindness from him must be slighted.
- May 29. 32. Order of the Council in the Star Chamber, in the information of the Attorney General against Sir John Eliot and others. The Chief Baron being ill, and unable to take the reference directed by the order of the 23d inst., the counsel also of the defendants desiring time to produce records in maintenance of their plea, and the Attorney General, to avoid delay, desiring to make an amendment in his information,—it was ordered, that the Attorney General might amend accordingly; that the defendants might make any further answer consequent on the amendment by Monday next; that the reference should be taken on Tuesday next, with or without the Lord Chief Baron; and that the Court would sit on Saturday se'night to receive the report.

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May 29. 34. Capt. John Mennes to Edward Nicholas. There arrived

injustice from the Earl as to call that unkindness which was but an expression of how much the Earl's unkindness had wounded him. The Earl cannot deny him the name of a near kinsman, and honoured him with the title of a chosen friend; how then could he but take it unkindly that in two months of sickness the Earl never visited him nor sent message by his footmen? If the Earl be ashamed of this, the writer's sharpest censure will be to remain his humble servant.

Having been employed to assist the Officers of the Navy at the pay for the ordinary at Chatham, he had discerned much improvidence, and, having advised with some of the honestest and ablest of the workmen, he finds that the 170 extraordinary workmen now in pay may be reduced to 85, and a variety of other reductions be made, on payment of about 1,000*l.* wages now due, which might be defalked by the Lord Treasurer out of the ordinary monthly payments to the Treasurer of the Navy. *Inclosed,*

- June 1. Cassington. 8. Bishop Richard Corbet, of Oxford, to Sec. Dorchester. Thinks a recent suit of his was unsuccessful on account of the way in which it was commenced. Is confident of success through the Secretary, because it is conceived he has done some tolerable service to his Majesty in his own diocese lately. His lawyers advise him to try his cause in one of their courts, but if ever he tries more courts than that he is in, let a lawyer be his poison. If Gloucester Hall were his in possession (as it is injuriously kept from him), there were no question but he might challenge his immunity by Act of

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Parliament. Hopes that his loss of part of his bishoprick will not draw on a charge on all the rest. Submits himself wholly to the King's mercy. When he was consecrated he took an oath to be very hospitable. If these payments are put upon him must either be forsworn or undone.

The son married Sir Bowyer's daughter, never so much as moving of it to Sir Bowyer. The old man went away in a rage, and Sir Bowyer sent the son after him, and kept his daughter. There were many meetings for an agreement. The demand was for 1,000*l.* portion; Sir Bowyer insisted on 500*l.*; but in conclusion agreed to give 500*l.* down and a bond for 500*l.*, upon an understanding that the bond should be but in show that he had 1,000*l.* with his son. Last term Sir Bowyer was arrested on the bond. Lord Conway's note released him, and he now begs for a place in ship or castle, or a protection, or if Sir Fulke Greville were willing to leave Cowes Castle, he would give him more than any for it.

June 2. 29. Sir John Bingley to Sec. Dorchester. He was confident in Westminster. Dorchester's favour and his own merit in doing the King faithful and profitable services, and now he hears that he is not regarded in the establishment. His Majesty conferred with him when he gave him the place for his life, and the late Duke of Buckingham told him, in presence of his brother Goring, that this was but a beginning of the King's grace. Has lost above 10,000*l.* in losing his place in the Exchequer. To be used in this manner cannot but grieve him; the disgrace is more irksome than the money. If the King's grace and his great seal for the writer's life be not good, he submits it to God.

June 2. 30. H. Wentworth to the same. Peace being likely between the Rysum. King of Denmark and the Emperor, they are fearful that the English troops, being 1,800 men, besides officers, will be broken. They have sent Capt. Ernely to petition in their behalf. Their pay is four months behind, and they have not a penny to help themselves. Unless the captain brings some good news they shall suffer exceedingly.

31. Sir Edward Dering, Lieutenant of Dover Castle, to Theophilus Earl of Suffolk. On complaint of Capt. Jonson forced Capt. Dunning to strike his topsail to the Prince of Orange, but himself refused with base and scornful gesture to strike sail to the King of England.*

June 3. 36. Samuel C[ollins] to Dr. Duck. Mr. Hooker has gone into Leicestershire, and thence to London, to appear before the Bishop of London on the first day of term. The writer cannot be there until Monday night, and has signified as much to Mr. Hooker, with the good hopes conceived of the Bishop's favour if he will quietly depart out of the diocese. All men are taken up with expecting what will be the conclusion of Mr. Hooker's business. Cambridge disputes it *pro et con.* It drowns the noise of the great question of tonnage and poundage. Dares not say half what he hears. Paper walls are easily broken open. If he be once quietly gone my lord has overcome the greatest difficulty in governing that part of his diocese.

June 4. 37. Attorney General Heath to Lord President Conway. Until Saturday morning next, about nine o'clock, there will be no occasion for the Lords to be troubled about the great cause in the Star Chamber, but then it will be very requisite that there should be a good presence. By that time the Judges will be ready with their certificate. Tuesday was spent till after twelve by the counsel of the defendants. Yesterday all the forenoon was spent by the Attorney General for the King, which was upon the point of three hours in continual speech, till he was almost tired, which he hopes he shall never be in the King's service. This morning they meet again, and then leave it to the Judges.

June 4. 38. John Lord Poulett to [Sec. Dorchester]. Sends him a copy Hinton. of a letter received from the King. The Attorney has done him this favour, and it is the second or third of this kind that he has had. In explanation sends him copy of a letter he had written to Sir Francis Cottington. Is an unhappy man, that having no other ambition than to keep himself in his Majesty's favour, yet he must be exposed to such hazards by keeping a forest. Since he finds he

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cannot do it without being continually subject to the like, begs the Secretary to move the King that the Commissioners having the land, woods, and game, and taking up the course as they do, may have the deer committed to their care. They spin out the time till the rest of the money come. The books are ready, and they can despatch all in two days. Intends to persuade the officers to clear all the extraordinary men, to license them to get their living elsewhere, but to continue them at half-wages from his Majesty till money can be had to pay them all their due, yet so as they shall have no tickets whereby to come up to clamour the Lord Treasurer. Desires Nicholas to move Sec. Coke how he tastes that course.
- June 13. 75. John Traske to Bishop Laud, of London. Will not think so vilely of his venerableness as that he should be implacably cruel against a man unseen, unheard, unknown, and never spoken with to this day. What if he once erred? How long was it? How long since relinquished? Has confessed by authority in pulpit and in print. Can bring large testimony for his orthodox teaching. The late King gave charge for his preferment to the then Lord Chancellor. Is loath to be of that number who go railing up and down against bishops for bare maintenance. Knows no law to starve any, and he knows no way to live out of his callings. If the Bishop will not hear, and permit the writer the exercise of his function, or prescribe him some other way to walk in without offence, his very life will melt away in tears. He takes his leave, hearkening what the Lord will say by the Bishop on the writer's behalf.

Thought before Saltash. now to have sent him an ambling stoned nag of three years old, but Sir Ferdinando Gorges has prevented him, by keeping possession of his nephew, Peter Courteney's estate, in spite of his Majesty's pleasure that Sir William should have the care both of his person

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and estate. When the accounts of the army shall be made up, prays that he may not be forgot. Has received from the Fleet, Marshalsea, and King's Bench the bodies of Sir Miles Hobart, Mr. Long, and Mr. Strode. Desires to know whether they shall be close prisoners, as Sir John Eliot and the others, or only safe prisoners. For matter of intelligence they may do the same thing as if they had the liberty of the Tower, and no man to speak to them without the privy of the Lieutenant. Thereby his Majesty should have notice of their adherents, and is it not a greater punishment to them to pay for their diet, than to be close prisoners, during which it will be a charge to his Majesty of 1,200*l.* a year. One Short was committed by warrant of the Lords, and having been examined by direction of Sec. Coke, who is privy to the treasons he is charged withal, remained close prisoner. He sawed a bar of iron asunder, and crept out of a hole where a cat could hardly have followed him. He pretended to be a Frenchman, but was truly an Englishman. It is six months since he escaped, since which the Lieutenant has had continual spies upon his wife, and once made him leave his breeches behind. He has now attached his body, and at the same time the prisoners were sent in this morning Short was brought in pinioned. Apsley has been Lieutenant 13 years, in which time there have been two escaped in this kind. One was condemned and pardoned, the other hanged. He prays that next sessions Short may, for example sake, be tried, and that to save charge he be sent to Newgate.

35. The King to the Lord Chief Justice and the rest of the Judges of the King's Bench. The King having lately removed Sir Miles Hobart, Walter Long, and William Strode from their several prisons to the Tower, and understanding that constructions are made thereof, as if he had done it to decline the course of justice, he has thought fit to let the Judges know the true reason thereof, as also why he commanded that those and the other prisoners should not come before them. Having heard how most of them did carry themselves insolently and unmannerly towards the King and their Lordships, his Majesty could not but resent his honour, and that of so great a court, so far as to let the world know how much he disliked the same; and having understood that they and the other Judges had not yet resolved the main question, he did not think the presence of those prisoners necessary, and until he found their temper and discretions to be such as to deserve it, he was not willing to afford them favour; nevertheless he had now given directions that Selden and Valentine should attend them on the morrow, to whom they may deliver the occasion of the suspension of their opinions in the main point, and the reason why the prisoners were not sent the last day.

Having heard of the lamentable estate of the poor exiled ministers of the Palatinate extending to the number of 600 persons, with their wives and children, the King has given order for a general collection throughout England towards their succour, and he recommends to the persons addressed to give order to every Archbishop and Bishop throughout Scotland, that a course may be taken there for collecting what can be had from the charitably disposed towards the same purpose.
- June 30. 87. Officers of the Navy to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Certify that John Attawell, late Cook and Steward of the George, drumbler, is fit to discharge such place in the pink, the Fortune.
- June 30. Durham House. 88. Lord Keeper Coventry to Sir John Bridgman, Chief Justice of Chester. Is informed that Sir John Ratcliffe, who lost his life in France in his Majesty's service, died seized of lands in co. Chester, whereof Lady Ratcliffe is dowable. Being enforced to a suit for her dower against gentlemen of great allowance in that county, herself being a mere stranger there, the Lord Keeper recommends her for expedition in her cause.
- June 30. Hackwood. 89. John Marquis of Winchester to Sec. Dorchester. After long search has found the Ten Precepts of the Wise Treasurer unto his Son. By the preface he will find them to be the fruits of Lord Burghley's sage observations and last commandments to his son Robert Cecil, so that the Marquis confesses his error in fathering them upon Lord Treasurer Paulett. Howsoever, since Lord Burghley, accounted an oracle of wisdom in his time, was the true father of such counsels to a son who made so good use thereof, he begs leave to present them to the Secretary.
- June 30. 90. Copy record of the Trial before the Court of the Virge of the King's Household of John Payton, for the death of Timoleon Gorge. He was acquitted of murder, but found guilty of manslaughter.
- June. 91. The King to Attorney General Heath. To prepare a pardon for Sir William Withypoll, Francis Withypoll, Henry Withypoll, Edward Withypoll, Francis Prudhomme, Jeffrey Gilbert, William Smith, and John Smith, accused of the murder of Robert Wright and Francis Maddison, of Woodbridge, co. Suffolk. Sir William Withypoll, in whose company all the rest of the said persons then were, had been tried and acquitted of murder, but was found guilty of manslaughter.
- June. 92. Capt. Thomas Jackson to Lord President Conway. His Lordship has laid upon him, being a blunt and illiterate soldier, a very great task to deliver his opinion concerning the union in reli-

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gion, wherein many wise and learned men have been puzzled and gravelled. Two principal errors committed by divines; 1. Fiery wits and over curious inquisitors raise divisions by determining their private conceits by natural reason, leaving no place for God's good will, and making frustrate the doctrine of Christ. 2. They take no pains to instruct their flocks against the opinion laboured by the Jesuits that there is no salvation out of the Church of Rome.

- [June?] 93. Thomas Rice to William Weld, secretary to Viscount Conway. Reports the state of Lord Conway's horses, and suggests a variety of things needful to be attended to in relation to them.
- [June?] 94. Petition of Henry Goddard, one of his Majesty's Shipwrights, to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. He is behind of his entertainment of 20*d.* per diem, by the space of five years, amounting to 152*l.* 1*s.* 8*d.* Unless they help him to obtain the same, he will be much disabled in performance of his Majesty's service.
- June. 95. Philip Burlamachi to Sec. Dorchester. Met the Ambassador of the States, and talked over with him very fully the affair in dispute or treaty. Finds him inclined to expedition, but the States wish to have an engagement for the pay of the regiment of volunteers. Discredit it will be to his Majesty to refuse the States to support these troops in this their great necessity. [French.]
- June. 96. The same to the same. Has spoken to the Ambassador. He desires that his Majesty's answer be of a kind to increase the good feeling on the other side. Told him that he should assist on his part in the redemption of the jewels; and for the rest, the writer deemed the business settled [French.]
- June. 97. Edward Earl of Norwich to James Earl of Carlisle. Thanks for the perusal of a letter from Viscount Doncaster. Longs to have precise word of his face. Is much affected with his manliness, and all the good hopes which may well be entertained of him.
- June. 98. Certificate of Henry Earl of Huntingdon of the precise numbers of his Majesty's Forces in co. Rutland.
- June. 99. Brief of the proofs on behalf of Philip Rodriguez, of Hamburgh, claiming as his goods 120 bags of pepper, taken in the St. Luke, and 110 bags, taken in the St. Peter.
- June. 100. Articles against Mr. Mellow, master of the Prudence, of London, testified by Dawtry Cooper, captain of the Seventh Whelp, and others. Mellow was charged with resisting a party sent on board the Prudence to press two of his men.
- June? 101. Notes in explanation of the comparatively small amount received in the Court of Wards during the last half year.
