OHIO STATE

CHRYSANTHEMUMS for 1933

SINCE we grow Chrysanthemums on quite a large scale for the wholesale markets, we are always on the lookout for meritorious varieties. The Chrysanthemum Show of the Chrysanthemum Society of America held in Columbus, Ohio, last fall, gave us an excellent opportunity to look over the new sorts and check on those that will give results under average conditions. In this process a number of varieties were eliminated. A few newcomers have been added and our list is now as up-to-date as we can possibly make it. It contains no varieties that need special treatment and this is important under existing business conditions.

The new varieties include the Baur-Steinkamp novelties for 1933, a collection of unusual varieties introduced by V. R. DePetris of Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan, a pot

A New Pot 'Mum

OHIO STATE

The list of Chrysanthemum varieties suitable for pot plant culture has been rather limited in recent years. Nearly all the varieties available lack the dwarf characters so necessary for this type of culture.

For a number of years Walter Engel of Columbus, Ohio, the newly elected President of the Chrysanthemum Society of America, has been experimenting with a dwarf yellow anemone variety and his results have been so satisfactory that he decided to introduce it into the trade. At the Columbus Show he christened it "Ohio State" in honor of Ohio State University. The group he displayed was one of the outstanding features of the Show. Ohio State scored 89 points and was given the First Class Certificate of the Chrysanthemum Society of America.

The color of Ohio State is a clear yellow and the individual flowers develop perfectly. It is ideal in form as the illustration on page 8 demonstrates. The foliage is rich dark green and extends from the flowers clear to the rim of the pot. Can be grown either disbudded or naturally. Ohio State will be appreciated by the pot plant grower as it will give him a new plant for the Thanksgiving market. As for the retail grower, the value of this plant cannot be over-estimated.

A new bronzy anemone three to three and onehalf inches across. Not a large flower but very prolific; can be grown in nicely arranged sprays without disbudding. A wonderful pot plant variety of medium height. Matures November 25 to December 1. A variety that every florist needs. Being a beautiful shade of bright bronze-orange.

THE TITAN (New)

A new large flowering anemone with rich crimson-scarlet petals, cushion bronzy red with golden tips averaging five inches, ray petals in double rows unevenly arranged. Grows about 42 to 48 inches high, with wiry stems, beautiful dark green foliage. A good keeper. Matures November 5 to 10.

BETTY ROSE

A large flowered anemone suitable for disbudding, maturing October 25. Color an even shade of deep lavender-pink throughout with full rounded cushion.

CREMONA

Midseason white anemone with straw-yellow cushion; medium size. Sturdy dwarf grower making good pot plants.

CRIMSON GLOW

Late crimson maroon anemone which should be disbudded for best results. Easy growing variety with excellent stem and foliage, making an ideal pot plant attaining a height of from 24 to 28 inches. Matures November 25 and later.

MELBA

In color it is an intense red, the reverse petals being gold. This is perhaps the brightest color ever produced in a Chrysanthemum maturing November 1 and later, and should be disbudded for best results.

NORMA

Norma is a large flowering orchid-pink anemone with golden-pink cushion, making a very striking combination. Individual flowers average 4 inches to 5 inches across. Matures November 25 to December 1.
