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b. During Phase II, though EUSAK forces remain prepared for a resumption of hostilities, garrisons are reduced and a program of training and refurbishing is conducted. Line KANSAS will be fully rehabilitated as a defensive position. Approximately 50% of EUSAK forces will occupy line KANSAS on a rotational basis with all troops so positioned as to fully man line KANSAS on short notice. Troops occupying line KANSAS provide suitable outpost and patrol coverage of the area north to the Demilitarized Zone. At the first indication of hostile intentions to violate the armistice agreement, troops are prepared to re-occupy line ICELAND on short notice. Generally the western portion of line KANSAS is manned by US and UN troops and the eastern portion by ROK troops. Four US divisions are withdrawn into reserve positions in support of line KANSAS and concurrently conduct training and prepare for employment anywhere in the Army zone. Initially a ROK division is in training in each Corps zone except that of I US Corps. Upon completion of anti-guerrilla operations, the two ROK divisions so engaged remain in the Army Service Area for further training. The Chief of Staff, ROKA with the assistance of the Korean Military Advisory Group concentrates on the organization of a military establishment which will enable ROK forces to attain and maintain the capability of unsupported defense of the Republic of Korea. The redistribution of forces during this phase is shown in the following paragraph of forces required, and in the map attached as Annex 1.

- (4) I ROK Corps; 2 ROK Divisions and one additional ROK Division available from C/S ROKA on 24 hours notice.
- (5) ROK Army; a total of 5 ROK Divisions: 2 Divisions for anti-guerrilla operations, 1 Division in training in the zone of IX US Corps, 1 in X US Corps zone and another in the zone of I ROK Corps. Divisions training in Corps zones are available to the respective Corps on 24 hours notice.

INTELLIGENCE ANNEX TO OUTLINE PLAN "LAKE PLACID"

1. Concept.

The concept of post hostilities operations is summarized as shown below.

- a. Occupy, organize and defend line KANSAS.
- b. Place the ROKA in the best possible position for eventual unsupported defense of their country.

- (1) Eliminate all internal guerrilla activity (Note 1).
- (2) Train ROKA units.

2. Intelligence support of the above program will be generally as follows:

- a. To support the defense:
 - (1) Maintain an intelligence system which will produce sufficient information of enemy activity to give adequate warning of any attack and which will support combat operations in the event the armistice is ended.
 - (2) Destroy the effectiveness of any hostile intelligence effort against UN Forces.
- b. To assist in placing the ROKA in the best possible position for unsupported defense:
 - (1) Maintain the intelligence and counter-intelligence organization and mission described in 2a (1) and (2) above.
 - (2) Supervise and assist anti-guerrilla intelligence activities (Note 1).
 - (3) Assist in the direction, training and operation of the ROKA Higher Intelligence Division (HID) and Counterintelligence Corps (CIC).

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(4) Assist KMAC in the establishment of proper intelligence courses in schools at all levels for:

- (a) General training of all personnel.
- (b) Specialist training of intelligence personnel.
- (c) Specialist training of HID and CIC agents.

(5) Assist KMAC in planning for special intelligence equipment and for proper handling and use of confidential funds.

(6) Plan for subsequent intelligence operations (through KMAC) to include:

- (a) Integration of all intelligence under a central authority, predominantly army.
- (b) Preparation of specific mission and scope of operations for all intelligence agencies.
- (c) Preparation of specific mission and scope of operations for all counter-intelligence agencies. Proper delineation between CIC and National Police is essential.

Note 1: Except for advice and necessary minimum support, all actions against South Koreans (anti-guerrilla operations, counter-intelligence, counter-espionage) will be South Korean effort. UN troops or agencies are not to be given duties which require military operations against South Koreans in South Korea.

SUBJECT: Outline Plan LAKE PLACID

1. From G-1 view point, the concept of proposed plan Lake Placid is considered to be sound but requires expansion to include the operation of CA/MG between the lines Iceland and Kansas. Current instructions from this headquarters present a peculiar problem to CG 8th Army in that the sovereignty of the ROK Government cannot be extended north of the 38th Parallel. GHQ has received what appears to be conflicting instructions from JCS on this matter (Para. 3b, JCS 95328 and Para. 4b, JCS 95977).

2. It is considered necessary that the concept for civil administration of the zone between line Iceland and line Kansas be submitted to GHQ for approval prior to implementation under Phase 2 of outlined plan Lake Placid, if approved.

1. Reference CAW 2753, subj: "The Secret Intelligence Concerning the Japan Communist Party," (Incl 1), CI Div in response to your query (para 3, cmt 1), "Incidentally, isn't it about time that these titles (Internal Factors) be brought up to date," replied (para 3, cmt 2) that essential parts of this publication were revised and included in T/Intel 1951 Intelligence Estimate Far East. However, (para 4, cmt 2), CI Div would study the problem and then present a plan for a revision of Internal Factors. 1

2. Inclosure 2 explains briefly the context of the 1949 edition, outlines our plan for the 1951 edition and comments on the problems involved in this revision. Further, it recommends (1) that CI Div start the revision of the basic document at once, (2) revise Supplement 1 after completion of the first document, (3) retain Supplement 2 in its present state, (4) add Supplement 3 - List of names of the registered JCP members with pertinent data.

3. a. With the departure of Mr. Johansen, Chief, C and P, for the ZI, we are severely handicapped in that section (Col Ives is endeavoring to find a replacement). I have conferred with Dr. Frange and he states that his workload is such that he cannot undertake extra assignments; however, he has two vacancies for field grade officers and as soon as a qualified officer in the editorial field is secured, he would be able to exercise editorial supervision of this publication. However, even should this not happen, we can undertake this work ourselves.

b. Certain sections of the basic document affect other divisions of G-2 besides CI Div; T/Intel, including PIM, PSD and JSOB are involved in the revision. Therefore, since all concerned have to keep up with current workload, this job will have to be done on a practically "spare time" basis; therefore, I would not like to set an overall deadline for the complete job at this time, but prefer that I be given some leeway in setting up a schedule for the revision of each section. Details in Incl 2. The work, however, would start at once.

- a. Approval of the overall plan as outlined in Incl 2.
- b. Approval of the proposed IOM to T/Intel, PSD, JSOB, TIS, MIS Div (Incl 3).

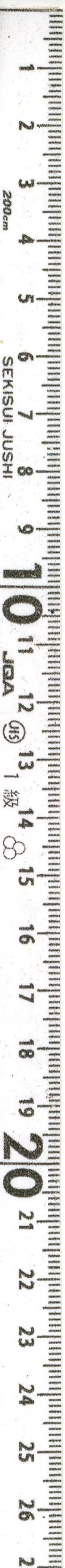

1. The 1949 edition was published in three (3) sections:

a. Revised Edition, 1 Jan 49 - Consisting of 87 pages of text material with 21 plates on factors of potential unrest in the Japanese homeland.

b. Supplement 1, 30 Jun 49 - Containing 4 pages of text and 66 plates, an analysis of the current numerical strength and breakdown of the organizational structure of the JCP.

c. Supplement 2, 1 Nov 49 - Published in two volumes with total of 142 pages containing an alphabetical roster of approximately 10,000 prominent officials, members and sympathizers of JCP.

2. a. The revision of the "Internal Factors" of 1a supra, and as outlined below, will involve Japan Section, T/Intel; PSD; JSO and CI Div for the factual data and PDM, T/Intel; Production Section, TIS, MIS Div and the 64th Engineers in the revision of the charts and final reproduction.

3. Reference the revision of Supplement 1 (par 1b supra). A good portion of the information is found in CI Div files and necessary instructions have been issued to CIC to secure data to bring this up-to-date. It is believed that it would be wise not to start the revision of Supplement 1 until we have finished the project under 2a. Since we will follow

the format set up in 30 Jun 49 edition, CI Div believes that a new plan is not required. Because practically all the information contained in this supplement is statistical in the form of schematic charts of JCP organizations, do you desire it presented for prior approval? If not (copy of '49 Supplement 1 attached as Incl 4), we can start the finalization of this document when we have finished the first section. Sixty to ninety days will be required to complete the revision of Supplement 1.

4. Supplement 2. This document is an extremely valuable list of about 10,000 specially selected JCP members and sympathizers. It is estimated that it is at least 80% and probably 90% correct now. Any discrepancies at present are a result of deaths, changes in either position or address or sympathy towards JCP plus the fact that a few other new names have cropped in the past two years. Supplement 2 is to be retained in its present form.

5. Supplement 3 (new). To add to this invaluable series, CI Div proposes to compile a Supplement 3. CI Div is in the process of compiling a list of officially registered JCP members from information furnished by the Attorney General, Japanese Government, through Government Section, SCAP. This list is arranged by prefectures and districts within prefectures, under which are listed all registered cells of the JCP with cell numbers, date of establishment, registered address of cell, meeting place and names, addresses and occupation of all cell members. Names of persons (English and Kanji) are arranged in Japanese order (syllabary, not alphabetical) and the overall arrangement is geographical (sample is attached as Incl 1). As a reference document, this list containing about 109,000 names, based on the peak membership of the JCP in February 1950, is extremely valuable since it provides proof of membership (or past membership as of early 1950) in the JCP. For local CIC and CI Div purposes, it is of great importance because it contains thousands of names of which there is no other record in CI Div files. CI Div is well aware of the fact that Supplement 3 is subject to revision, since the Attorney General's office is deleting names and adding others every month to its master list; but our basic list containing over 100,000 names would really be a complete list compiled in about nine (9) volumes. The present arrangement with the Attorney General for the receipt of deletions, additions and other changes will make it relatively simple to issue supplementary information periodically showing these changes. Approximately 60 days will be required to complete the basic document for Supplement 3.

6. Recommend:

- a. Approval of plan for revision of "Internal Factors as Security Problems for the Occupation, 1 January 1949" and that we start this job at once.
- b. The revision of Supplement 1 to be finished after completion of the basic document.
- c. Retain Supplement 2 in its present form.

1. Reference: Paragraph 3, Annex Number 3 to Operation Order No. 1, Japan Logistical Command, 30 October 1950.

2. Numerous United States Occupation personnel are employed throughout Japan in various activities which require a duty location remote from established posts, camps and stations. The following are examples:

- a. Civil Affairs detachments engaged in supervision of the NPR-J program.
- b. Radar and radio relay stations.
- c. CIC and Military Police detachments.
- d. Air Force weather stations.
- e. Naval detachments on special activities.

3. The type organization, missions and locations of these various detachments render full logistical support by parent headquarters impractical. Accordingly, routine logistical support must be provided through established post, camp or station installations of the Japan Logistical Command. Logistical support to be provided in this regard may include:

- a. Supply. All classes except for controlled items and technical supplies and equipment required in the performance of basic mission. Provisions of TM 10-215 pertaining to percentage increase of rations for small messes apply.
- b. Evacuation and hospitalization.
- c. Maintenance.
- d. Transportation. Assistance in effecting required moves of detachments beyond the normal capability of organic vehicles assigned.
- e. Accommodations. To include housing and/or assistance in the procurement of housing, furnishings (quarters and office), messing facilities, office supplies and equipment and signal service. Monetary obligations in this regard will be charged to TOW funds.

f. Miscellaneous services, such as Special Service, Red Cross contacts, Packing and Crating, Graves Registration and other normal Service Command responsibilities.

4. Addressees are responsible for arranging to provide necessary logistical support as outlined herein. Wide dissemination of these instructions will be essential throughout your commands in order that commanders of posts, camps and stations will be prepared to receive requests for support from outlying detachments. In all cases cooperation should be given by Japan Logistical Command installations in providing necessary support in accordance with the specific requirements of the type detachment concerned.

5. Copies of this communication are being furnished to the various headquarters that may have occasion to locate detachments in outlying areas to advise them of current procedures for securing required logistical support.

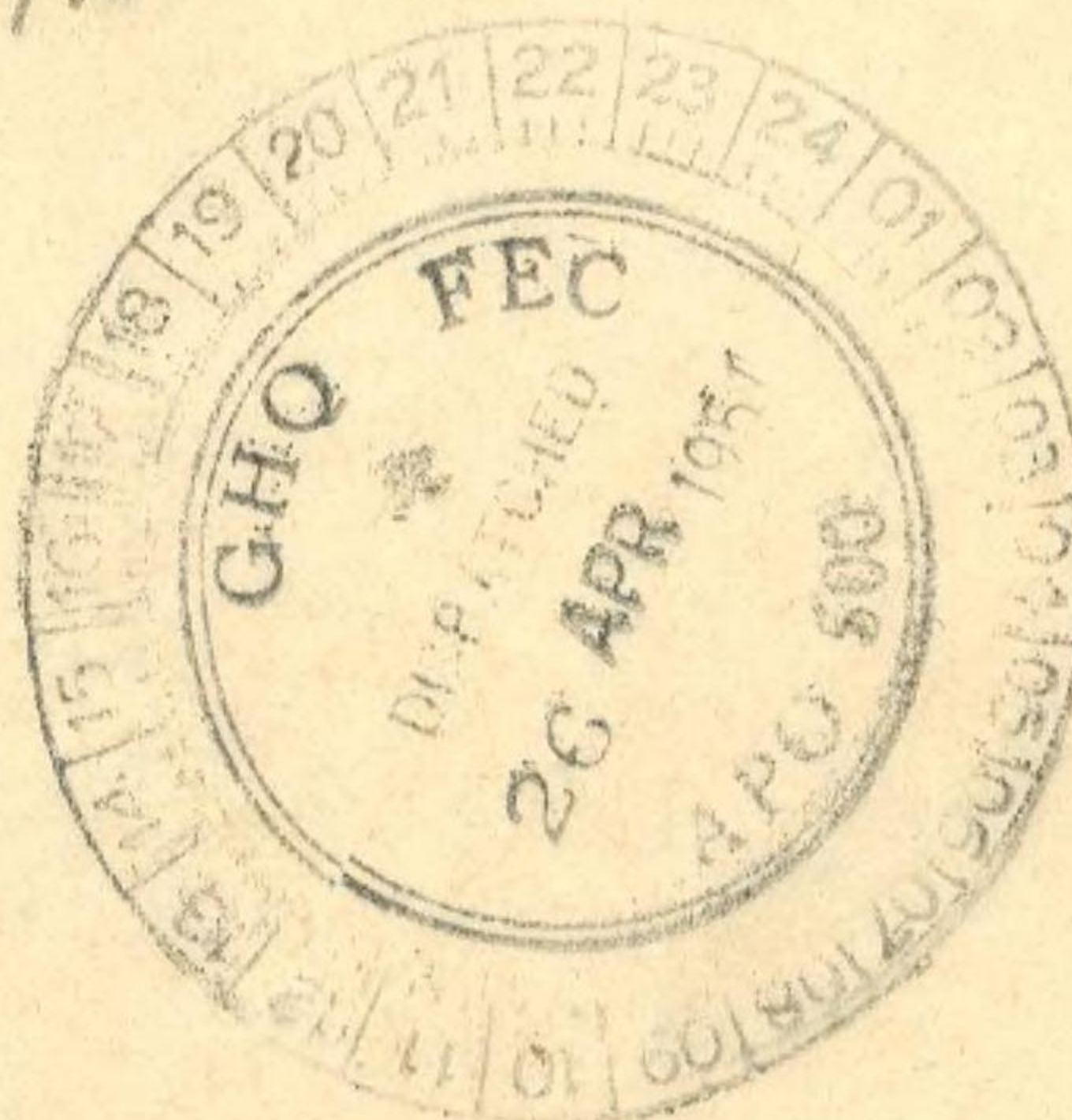

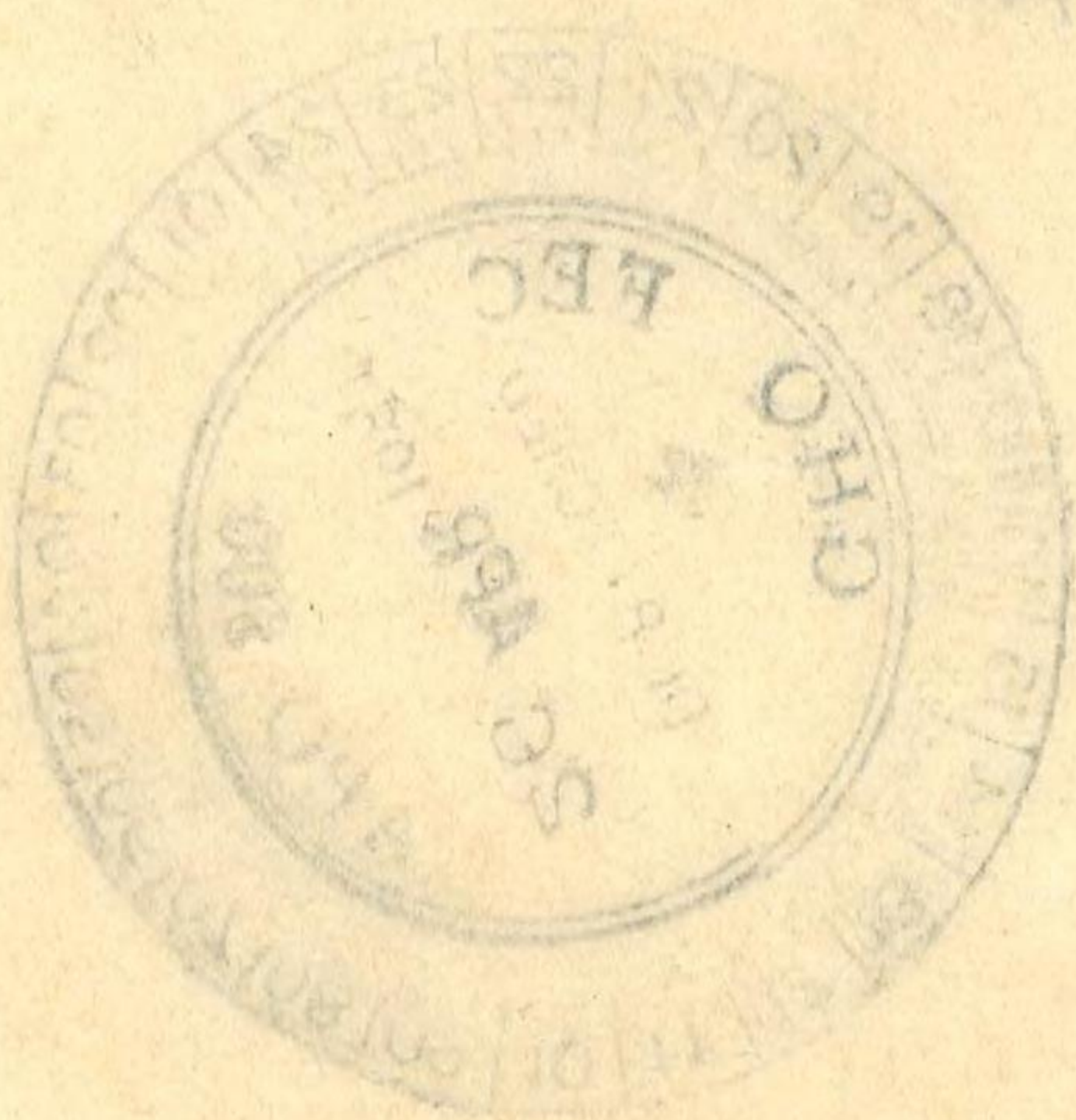

EMERGENCY ALERT PLAN**I. REFERENCE:**

a. Operation Order No. 1 (Emergency Alert Plan) Hq & Svc Comd, dated 1 March 1951.

II. PURPOSE:

a. The purpose of this plan is to prescribe the responsibilities, govern the actions, and coordinate the activities of all military and civilian personnel concerned in the event of an emergency such as civil disturbances, disorders accompanied by violence, and subversive element activities.

III. GENERAL:

a. Emergencies are classified as "Major", "Minor", or "Limited". This plan applies particularly to Minor Emergencies.

b. Minor Emergency:

(1) In this type of emergency, Japanese governmental agencies are able to continue to function. Disorders are characterized by isolated acts of violence, strikes, and/or riots of a local character.

c. Limited Emergency:

(1) In this type of emergency Japanese law enforcement agencies in a given area are destroyed or so weakened that they can no longer function effectively and direct U.S. Military Government must be imposed to avoid jeopardy to occupation objectives.

d. Major Emergency:

(1) In this type of emergency a condition of rebellion against constituted authority exists of such magnitude that public order and safety cannot be factually maintained or SCAP directives enforced by either Japanese civil government or SCAP military government agencies.

e. Civilian disturbances and infractions of Japanese Law will normally be handled by the civil police. However, any element of the occupation forces when confronted or threatened with violence will act promptly upon its own initiative to prevent or quell such violence. Offensive action will be resorted to only as justified by the commission of hostile acts against the lives and property of the occupation forces personnel attached thereto or installations protected by the occupation forces.

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f. In the event of a limited or major emergency, the Commanding General, General Headquarters Reserve Corps, assumes responsibility for conduct of tactical operations, supported by the Commanding General, Headquarters & Service Command, in the Tokyo area.

IV. TASKS:

a. In the event of a civil disturbance immediately affecting that portion of the 2nd Tokyo Arsenal occupied by TID, it is realized that limited defensive action will be taken because of the limited number of military personnel assigned.

b. Supply Officer will immediately issue arms and ammunition to all military personnel available.

c. Commanding Officer or Executive Officer will post half of the armed personnel at the front entrance to the Arsenal and the other half will be posted at the rear gate and adjacent area where primary defensive positions will be set up.

d. Commanding Officer or his representative will immediately notify G-3, Hq & Svc Comd, Room 242 Finance Building, telephone 26-6829, 26-6764, 57-8020 and apprise him of the situation. If a telephone call cannot be put through, dispatch a messenger to Hqs, ASA Pacific, where a direct line to G-3 is available.

e. All classified material being used by personnel will be immediately filed and secured.

f. Secondary defensive positions will be set up at the front and rear entrances to the Administration Building.

g. Location of TID Command Post will be office of the Commanding Officer.

h. First Aid medical facilities will be available in the TID Supply Room. Additional medical assistance will be furnished by ASA Dispensary.

i. The defense of the TID Warehouses located at the 1st Tokyo Arsenal is included in the ASA Pacific Emergency Alert Plan. (Coordinated with and approved by Chief, ASA Pacific dated 23 April 1951).

OPERATION ORDER NO. 1 - EMERGENCY ALERT PLAN

Map: City Map of Tokyo 1:25,000

1. GENERAL -- Emergencies are classified as "Major," "Minor," or "Limited" and include civil disturbances, disorders accompanied by violence, ground enemy action, enemy airborne forces and subversive element activities. This plan applies particularly to minor emergencies requiring troop action by this command. In the event of a limited or major emergency, the Commanding General, Headquarters and Service Command, will give support to the Commanding General, Japan Logistical Command, who will have operational control over Metropolitan Tokyo Area.

a. Unfriendly Forces

- (1) Japan Communist Party.
- (2) Korean Communists.
- (3) Chinese Communists.
- (4) Other communist forces.
- (5) Dissident political and social groups.

b. Friendly Forces

- (1) Japan Logistical Command.
- (2) JLCOM units and installations in MTA.
- (3) FEAF (coordinate plans and establish liaison).
- (4) COMNAVFE (coordinate plans and establish liaison).
- (5) Yokohama Command.
- (6) British Sub Area Comd (Camp Ebisu).
- (7) National Reserve Police Force.
- (8) ~~National~~ Rural Police.
- (9) Tokyo Metropolitan Police.

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c. Assumptions

- (1) Recent action concerning a peace treaty with Japan has aroused communists, who do not wish to see a revitalized and stabilized Japan. Mass protests, insidious propaganda, strikes, or open conflict may be expected.
- (2) Outlawed political and social groups may join and/or assist subversive elements in creating civil disturbances and disorders accompanied by violence, which may grow beyond control of local police forces.
- (3) Harassing airborne forces and/or ground forces having limited objectives may be used in connection with an air action against MTA. If airborne forces are used, they would attack adjacent airfields, seize critical terrain features, seize and/or destroy bridges, railroads, locks, reservoirs, public utilities, and vital installations to disrupt command communications and supply.
- (4) Instructions from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will be adequate to control any emergency situation by utilizing the Metropolitan Tokyo Police, the National Rural Police and the National Reserve Police, assisted by occupation forces if needed.

d. Emergencies are classified according to the ability of governmental institutions to continue their functions, which in turn is dictated by the character and severity of the disturbance in the area affected. Classes of emergency and action taken thereunder may be summarized as follows:

(1) Minor Emergency

- (a) In this type of emergency, Japanese governmental agencies are able to continue to function. Disorders are characterized by isolated acts of violence, strikes, and/or riots of a local character and overt acts against constituted authority by groups comprising a minor proportion of the population.
- (b) Overt acts against the occupation forces or their installations are checked at once. Commanders take active defensive and security measures and initiate aggressive action to seek out, disorganize, and apprehend the principals of such activities with minimum involvement of peaceful elements of the civil population. Legal action against individuals involved in disturbances within this sub-category is a responsibility of the occupation forces.

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- (c) In incidents characterized by violence between elements of the civil population or against the Japanese Government, the civil police are the responsible law-enforcement agency. Surveillance over such disturbances is maintained by occupation forces commanders. Facts in the case are reported without delay to SCAP. Occupation Forces prepare to intervene, on order, to prevent conditions which jeopardize the attainment of occupation objectives, and if directed to protect the lives and property of innocent civilians. Legal action against individuals involved in disturbances within this sub-category is a responsibility of Japanese authorities.

(2) Limited Emergency

- (a) In this type of emergency Japanese law enforcement agencies in a given area are destroyed or so weakened that they can no longer function effectively and direct US Military Government must be imposed to avoid jeopardy to occupation objectives.
- (b) In this type of emergency a proclamation by SCAP defines the area of "limited emergency," directs establishment of military government, and prescribes the action to be taken by occupation forces. The provisions of FM 27-5, "Military Government and Civil Affairs" and FM 27-10, "Rules of Land Warfare," govern operations. Control of all disturbances within the defined area, becomes a responsibility of occupation forces. Available Japanese agencies are employed to the limit of their capabilities.

(3) Major Emergency

- (a) In this type of emergency a condition of rebellion against constituted authority exists of such magnitude that public order and safety cannot be factually maintained or SCAP directives enforced by either Japanese civil government or SCAP military government agencies.
- (b) Under these conditions SCAP declares that neither civil or military government is able to exercise its functions in a given area due to armed action by an organized or quasi-organized enemy or general uprising among the inhabitants. He directs full-scale military operations to restore normal processes of government and insure accomplishment of the objectives of the occupation. FM 27-10 "Rules of Land Warfare" apply.

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2. MISSIONS

a. The Commanding General, Headquarters and Service Command, is responsible in the event of minor emergencies for the protection of military installations and personnel (military, DAC's and dependents) of GHQ, FEC and SCAP, Hq & Sv Comd and for initial protection and support of JLCOM installations and personnel located within MTA. (By mutual agreement with CG, Yokohama Comd, letter dated 8 Nov 50, subject: "Responsibility for JLCOM Installations in MTA for Emergencies.")

b. Operations under this plan are based upon:

- (1) Basic outline plan for "TOLLBOOTH" Operations (SECRET), GHQ, FEC and SCAP, dated 31 Jul 47, as amended.
- (2) Pertinent portions of letter (SECRET), GHQ, FEC, AG 323.361 (29 Aug 48) (GC-), subject: "Expansion of Responsibilities of CG, Hq & Sv Gp," dtd 29 Aug 48, as amended 10 Jun 49.
- (3) Occupation Instructions No. 5 (RESTRICTED), GHQ, SCAP, dated 1 Oct 49.
- (4) FM 27-5 "Military Government and Civil Affairs;" FM 27-10 "Rules of Land Warfare;" FM 100-5 "Field Service Regulations - Operations;" FM 71-30 "Employment of Airborne Forces;" and FM 31-30 "Tactics and Technique of Airborne Troops."

3. TASKS

a. The following units will prepare, equip, and train mobile teams as required below. These teams must be available immediately upon notification from G3, this headquarters, at any time after receipt of this directive.

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b. Upon notification from G3, this Hq:

- (1) Motor Bn will send fourteen (14) 2½ ton trucks (with full gas tanks), driven by soldiers, to the OIC from G3 Section in Finance Bldg. Courtyard. Motor Bn drivers will return to their organization when released by OIC.
- (2) Special Services Section will assemble in Finance Bldg. Courtyard fourteen (14) truck drivers, with arms, ammunition and equipment to report to the OIC. These men will drive vehicles described in preceding sub-paragraph.
- (3) Honor Guard Co will secure, and if necessary, defend the Dai Ichi Bldg; American Embassy; and the Forestry Bldg, in addition to its normal mission of providing personal security to the Commander-in-Chief, Far East Command.
- (4) Guard Co sentries on duty at Finance Bldg. and Motor Bn (PVP and CVP) will be relieved by personnel of Staff Bn (overhead) and Motor Bn respectively. All remaining posts will be maintained.
- (5) The Provost Marshal will:
 - (a) Send eight (8) radio equipped 1/4-ton trucks to G3, Hq & Sv Comd, Finance Bldg. Courtyard.
 - (b) Establish and maintain liaison with Japanese Police for constant information regarding enemy and subversive activities.
 - (c) Enforce execution (in conjunction with Japanese Police) of any curfew and/or civilian movement restrictions as directed by CG, Hq & Sv Comd.
 - (d) Supervise traffic control in MTA.
 - (e) Maintain constant liaison with G3, this Hq, by direct line. In event of phone failure establish communication by radio and send one (1) courier with 1/4-ton truck.
 - (f) Render reports, as required by SOP No. 1, Hq & Sv Gp, 3 Jun 49. (CONFIDENTIAL)

- x. (1) Civilian disturbances and infractions of Japanese law will normally be handled by the civil police, however any element of the occupation forces when confronted or threatened with violence will act promptly upon its own initiative to prevent or quell such violence. (See sub-paragraph x (4) below as to required action.) Offensive action will be resorted to only as justified by the commission of hostile acts against the lives and property of the occupation forces personnel attached thereto or installations protected by the occupation forces. The force employed in quelling these disorders will be the minimum required to attain the objective. This policy pertaining to offensive action must be clearly understood by all elements concerned.

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- (2) Commanding Officers of units and/or responsible officers of installations and buildings, will prepare detailed plans for the defense of their respective installations and/or buildings and submit one (1) copy of plans to G3, this Hq, within twenty (20) days after receipt of this directive. Plan will include the following provisions within the capabilities of assigned personnel and available arms and equipment:
- (a) Duties of each individual or group.
 - (b) Establishment of primary and secondary defensive positions within and without the installation or building, using all means and weapons available.
 - (c) Establishment of first aid station within building or area.
 - (d) Road blocks or check points adjacent to installations and/or building, if deemed necessary for security and to control vehicular and pedestrian traffic. Coordination with PM is required.
 - (e) Communication and/or liaison with lower and higher echelons, and with G3, this Hq, keeping G3 informed of situation and requirements.
 - (f) Such other provisions which may be peculiar to the individual installation or building.
- (3) When directed by Commanding General, Headquarters and Service Command, all personnel will carry individual weapons and ammunition to and from places of duty.
- (4) In the event of a civil disturbance or threatened violence to occupation personnel or installations, and/or airborne attack prior to declaration of an emergency by this Hq, local commanders will take necessary action to:
- (a) Notify this headquarters immediately and include information relative to reinforcement requirements.
 - (b) Keep this headquarters informed of the situation thru G3, room 242, Finance Bldg., telephone 26-6829, 26-6764, 57-8020, or thru direct line, if available.
 - (c) Invoke provisions of Alert Plans, if deemed necessary.
 - (d) Maintain surveillance at the scene of the disturbance or action.

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- (5) Tear gas will not be used without specific authorization from CinC, FEC. Requests for use of tear gas will be submitted to the Commanding General, Headquarters and Service Command.
- (6) All allied armed forces personnel stationed in MTA will be subject to control of the Commanding General, Headquarters and Service Command, in the initial stage of any emergency.
- (7) Allied nationals will secure assistance from the occupation forces through the appropriate missions or representative.
- (8) Immediate and vigorous action on the part of all concerned will be taken to prevent looting, pilfering and other disorders.

4. ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

a. Personnel - When directed by the Commanding General, Hq & Sv Comd, all assigned and attached units will cancel all passes and leaves not already in effect. All occupation forces personnel on pass or leave within MTA will return immediately to quarters.

b. Rescissions - Operation Order No. 1 (Revised Emergency Alert Plan), Hq & Sv Gp, 15 Feb 50, with annexes 1, 2 and 3 thereto (SECRET). Destroy by burning and forward certificates of destruction to this headquarters.

c. Intelligence - See Annex No. 1 attached.

d. Logistics

- (1) The Surgeon, Medical Section, Hq & Sv Comd, is charged with the responsibility for the preparation of plans to provide medical support for all units and installations in the MTA.
- (2) The Engineer Section, Hq & Sv Comd, will be prepared to implement provisions of current Engineer Section SOP and carry out such other additional instructions as may be directed by the CG, Hq & Sv Comd.
- (3) The Ordnance Section, Hq & Sv Comd, will establish an ammunition control point at Ordnance Section Office, Finance Bldg. Class V supply point will be located at AP-1, Hq Motor Bn area. The ammunition supply point will contain one (1) reserve unit of fire for all units in the MTA, including JLCOM units.
- (4) All units will requisition, properly store and safeguard authorized quantities of grenades, hand and rifle.

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5. COMMAND AND SIGNAL

a. Command

- (1) Command Post of the CG, Hq & Sv Comd, will be located in Finance Building.
- (2) All plans submitted will indicate location of Command Post. Immediate notification will be made to G3, this headquarters, in event location is changed.

b. Signal

- (1) Dissemination of information concerning all emergencies except airborne attack will be made according to Annex No. 1 to Operation Order No. 3, this headquarters, dated 20 Dec 50 (DISASTER PLAN).
- (2) Dissemination of impending or actual airborne attack message will be made (audible warning devices) according to Annex No. 1 to Operation Order No. 2, this Hq, dated 10 Feb 51 (PAD PLAN).
- (3) Communication procedures will be in accordance with current signal operations instructions, Hq, Hq & Sv Comd.
- (4) In the event of emergency or attack, units and sections operating within the Hq & Sv Comd radio nets will immediately open radio sets and stand by for call from net control station. (See Annex No. 2, Hq, Hq & Sv Comd Radio and Direct Line Nets.)

1. GENERAL SITUATION

a. With the end of occupation controls and a peace treaty within sight, the communists are devoting a heavy proportion of their propaganda to protests over the proposed Japanese Peace Treaty, which they call a new "American plot." The communists have experienced severe set-backs since the beginning of the Korean conflict. Known communist membership has decreased within labor unions due to the purgings directed by the Japanese Government, at the suggestion of SCAP, and the general improvement of the overall Japanese standards of attainment and living. Imports surpassed \$100,000,000 during January while the foreign exchange accounts showed a \$24,000,000 surplus. Improvement in the Japanese economic structure is of primary concern to the communists since it tends to discredit the usual communist propaganda line that "Yoshida" is selling Japan short.

b. Many Japanese who might possibly have been swayed by communist propaganda one year ago, are now firmly opposed to the Japanese communist party. The government's strong stand in purging labor unions, the JCP Central Committee, and principal newspapers of the party has weakened the communist influence amongst the "middle roaders." Creation of the National Police Reserve has caused further deterioration of communist influence as has the threatened outlawing of the JCP.

- (1) There remains, however, a strong dissident cell amongst Koreans residing in Japan and within the ranks of "old line" party members. Much effort and energy is placed on infiltrating the ranks of student bodies at practically all universities, but every level of Japanese life receives attention in varying degrees.
- (2) It is well established that both Red China and Red Korea look upon a revitalized and resurgent Japan with dread. Talk of peace terms and the rearming of Japan, judging from red propaganda, indicates that both Chinese and Korean Reds, despite their armies, their ties with Russia and their expansionist threats are as much afraid of Japan as ever. They can be expected to do everything they can do to strengthen communism in Japan by smuggling in red workers, subversive agents, terrorists, and giving them all possible financing.

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c. The Japanese communists, and the Koreans, in the Kanto area, particularly the Metropolitan Tokyo Area, are capable of expanding civil disturbances beyond the capability of local Japanese police control.

2. ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF INFORMATION

a. Subversive element capabilities which can interfere with our occupation mission.

b. Strength composition and disposition of potential subversive elements.

c. Attempts by any elements, groups or individuals to resist the authority and intent of SCAP. Indications:

- (1) Formation of secret or non-secret societies or groups for activities in resistance or opposition to directives and/or orders of SCAP, or subversive to his authority.
- (2) The use of pronouncements or publications, either public or private, tending to incite resistance, opposition, or non-compliance with directives and/or orders of SCAP.
- (3) Demolition and/or destruction of public or private property. Acts of sabotage and lawlessness against the occupation.
- (4) Formulation, membership, and activities of social, cultural, secret or non-secret societies, groups, or political parties whose basic principles are not democratic.
- (5) Introduction or attempts at introduction into Japan of leaders, organizers, foreign or national agents or means or non-democratic political elements.

d. Development of political, economic and social forces capable of subverting the democratization of Japan. Effect of foreign ideologies tending to create social unrest and ultimate chaos. Indications:

- (1) Operations of foreign agents in fomenting social unrest and political sabotage.
- (2) Subversion of the national press toward anti-American and anti-occupation publications.
- (3) Introduction into Japan of organizers and agents, foreign or national, with a view toward agitating the populace and discrediting the occupation forces.

3. RECONNAISSANCE AND OBSERVATION MISSIONS

a. No specific reconnaissance missions other than those normally operating under direction of G2, GHQ FEC.

x. Any unusual activities threatening or endangering occupation personnel or installations will be reported to the Provost Marshal, Metropolitan area.

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4. MEASURES FOR HANDLING PRISONERS AND CAPTURED DOCUMENTS

a. Control of Japanese populace will be the responsibility of the civil police. Surveillance over such disturbances is maintained by occupation force commanders.

b. All captured documents, maps, etc., will be forwarded to Intelligence Division, G2 Section, Hq & Sv Comd.

5. COUNTER INTELLIGENCE -- Liaison will be maintained by this headquarters with counter intelligence agencies of GHQ.

6. REPORTS

a. Provost Marshal, Metropolitan Tokyo Area, will render reports as required by SOP No. 1 (CONFIDENTIAL), Hq & Sv Gp, 3 Jun 49.

b. Special reports from subordinate units will be rendered immediately to the Provost Marshal, Metropolitan Tokyo Area, who will in turn notify the CG, Hq & Sv Comd, thru the G2, when any unusual activity on the part of the civil populace, unusual gatherings, marches, strikes or disorders threaten to endanger occupation personnel or installations. Verbal reports by the Provost Marshal will be confirmed in writing.

c. Reports will be made by the most expeditious means of communication with due regard for security measures.

1. Executive Order 10173 charges the United States Coast Guard with implementing a limited port security program. One phase of such program is directed at preventing, to the extent practicable, the importation by sea of radiological, biological, chemical and other weapons for inimical use against the United States. The responsibility of the United States Coast Guard in this matter covers "vessels, harbors, ports and waterfront facilities in the United States, and all territories and water, continental or insular, subject to the jurisdiction of the United States, exclusive of the Canal Zone."

a. The Secretary of the Treasury has made a request for certain intelligence data of the Department of the Army, Department of the Navy, Department of the Air Force and other government agencies to implement Executive Order 10173.

2. All commanders will take the necessary action to insure compliance with the following paragraphs which implement Department of the Army measures to assist the United States Coast Guard in accordance with Executive Order 10173.

a. Oversea commanders and Army Attaches will cable Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, GSUSA, on the receipt of information detailed below. This information will be passed by the Assistant of Staff, G-2, GSUSA, to the Commandant, United States Coast Guard on a priority basis:

*Secret**Incl 1*

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- (1) Warning as to the actual or suspected departure for the United States or approach to the United States, of any vessel known or suspected to be carrying radiological, biological, chemical or other weapons for inimical use against the United States. All pertinent details, such as the vessel's name and description, time and port of departure for United States, probable time and place of arrival, nature of inimical weapons or materials carried.
- (2) Warning as to the actual or suspected departure for the United States, or approach to the United States, of every vessel owned, controlled or in the service of USSR, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Albania, Romania, Bulgaria, Communist China, Outer Mongolia, North Korea, Eastern Germany or Eastern Austria. Pertinent details such as those indicated in subparagraph 2a(1) will be given.

b. Continental Army commanders will report, as it comes to their attention, the information listed in paragraphs 2a (1) and (2) above direct to United States Coast Guard District Commanders in their respective areas with the least practicable delay. Copies of such reports will be made available to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, GSUSA.

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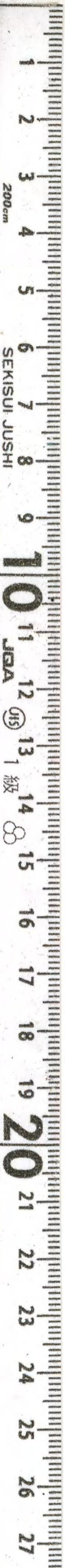

2. In order that necessary agreements may be effected between the Department of the Army and the Department of the Air Force, relative to the close-out of the Army garrison on Guam and the discontinuance of logistical support of Air Force units on Guam by the Marianas-Bonins Command, there is inclosed a detailed breakdown of the Marianas-Bonins Command Revised Fiscal Year 1952 Budget Estimate showing personnel space and fund requirements separately for the Department of the Army and the Department of the Air Force. Recapitulation of Inclosure No. 1 follows:

3. For planning purposes T-Day is assumed to be 1 October 1951 and was used as the basis for the detailed breakdown, in order that the close-out of Army activities on Guam may be completed by 31 December 1951.

4. Specific comments relative to Inclosure No. 1 follow:

a. TAB A (Funds Not Immediately Required). The Marianas-Bonins Command Revised Fiscal Year 1952 Budget Estimate is for a full fiscal year operation. Reference paragraph 3 above, assuming that T-Day is 1 October 1951, the total of \$508,290 represents funds not immediately required, principally due to the fact that the 1769 positions would not be required for the full fiscal year operation. These funds are not excess and are not reported as available for withdrawal at this time, however, if T-Day is firmly established as of 1 October 1951, it is conceivable that these funds or a portion thereof, will be available for withdrawal by Department of the Army upon notification from this headquarters. It is anticipated that a portion of these funds will be required subsequent to T-90 to support the program of disposal of foreign excess property. It is expected that this program will be completed by T-180.

b. TAB B (Finance Service, Army, Project 481 - Comptroller and Finance Activities). It is estimated that all comptroller and finance activities pertaining to fiscal and audit functions will be completed by 31 January 1952.

c. TAB C (Quartermaster Service, Army, Project 434 - Laundry Personnel). Funds are not required for Department of the Air Force personnel requirements, since the Air Force locally (at Marianas-Bonins Command) makes necessary funds available to the Army for laundry services, utilizing Department of the Army personnel spaces allotted Marianas-Bonins Command by this headquarters.

5. Upon the establishment of a firm T-Day, concurred in by Commanding General, Marianas-Bonins Command, and Commanding General, 19th Bomb Wing, the Commanding General, Marianas-Bonins Command, will furnish this headquarters a schedule of activities to be transferred, to include space and total fund requirements, based on the breakdown between Army and Air Force performance of the functions to be transferred to the Air Force. Subsequent to concurrence of the Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, this information will be furnished Department of the Army for departmental transfer.

6. In the event a firm T-Day is established, other than 1 October 1951, it will be necessary to revise the inclosed breakdown accordingly, which will undoubtedly cause an adjustment in the amount of funds not immediately required (TAB A).

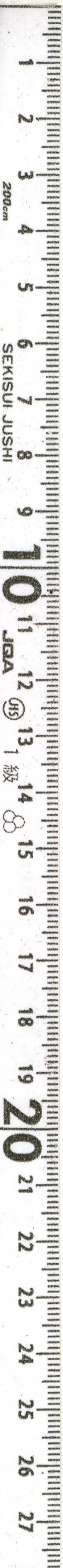
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SECURITY INSTRUCTIONS AND PROCEDURES

ENIWETOK ATOLL

I GENERAL

1. To expedite clearances for entrance to Eniwetok and at the same time insure adequate security, the following instructions are issued for guidance and compliance. These instructions have been approved in principle by the security representatives of the Atomic Energy Commission.
2. Clearance for Access to (AEC) Restricted Data. All personnel entering Eniwetok Atoll whose duties require access to Restricted Data must have a clearance from the Atomic Energy Commission based on a full background investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Such clearance should be obtained through regular command channels.
3. All orders transferring personnel to Eniwetok will contain a statement that the provisions of these Security Instructions have been complied with.
4. The service providing the transportation to be utilized for entry will require evidence that all personnel have been cleared before embarkation permission is granted. The message referred to in paragraph 12 will be considered evidence of proper clearance for air transportation. For surface movement the responsible service shall check the list referred to in subparagraphs 17b and 17c against the passenger list of those passengers scheduled for debarkation at Eniwetok.
5. The messages referred to in paragraph 12, subparagraphs 14b, 16c and 17a will, in themselves, constitute clearance for ships, aircraft and/or personnel concerned.
6. All messages referred to in these instructions will be classified at least "restricted" unless otherwise specified or the subject matter justifies a higher classification.
7. The commanding officer of a naval vessel or the Master of a chartered commercial ship will impound or otherwise secure all cameras and any binoculars unnecessary to the navigation of the ship for the period from 24 hours prior to arrival at Eniwetok to 24 hours after departure.

II CLEARING AUTHORITY

8. Personnel are to be cleared by competent military authority. The authority to grant clearance to the Eniwetok Atoll lies with the administrative military organization of the following class of personnel:
 - a. Military personnel assigned or attached to an organization competent to issue orders transferring personnel to Eniwetok Atoll.
 - b. Civilian personnel assigned or attached to an organization competent to issue orders transferring personnel to Eniwetok Atoll.
9. Clearance for Non-Military Personnel. All personnel not included in paragraph 8 must obtain clearance for entry into Eniwetok Atoll from one of the following sources:
 - a. Direct from the Atomic Energy Commission.
 - b. Through the executive department of the government sponsoring their visit to Eniwetok.
10. The Commanding Officer Issuing Transfer Orders is Responsible for Security Clearance. It is his responsibility to assure himself that units or individuals ordered by him to enter Eniwetok Atoll meet the requirements of these Security Instructions.

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ENCLOSURE (1)

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11. Authority to Issue Orders for Entry, and Entrance Requirements to be Met. The commanding officers referred to in paragraph 8 are hereby authorized to clear and order to Eniwetok Atoll personnel who fall within the categories of paragraph 8 if the following requirements are met:

a. No disclosure of Restricted Data is involved. (This currently means that the individual will have access to Eniwetok Island only; except in special cases or emergencies, in which case special supervision will be required.)

b. The commanding officer estimates that the individual involved is a good security risk. In arriving at such an estimate the procedure should not be casual but should be based on:

- (1) Check of individual's official record.
- (2) Check of individual's reputation with his associates.
- (3) Commanding officer's or qualified subordinate's personal interview with the individual.

III AIR TRANSPORTATION

12. In all cases of entry to Eniwetok Atoll via military aircraft, the command concerned will originate a message to CINCPAC, information to Atoll Commander Eniwetok (ATCOM Eniwetok), Commander Naval Air Station Kwajalein (NAS Kwajalein) and Commander Pacific Division Military Air Transport Service (COMFACDIVMATS) or other service providing transportation. This message will contain the following:

- a. Full name
- b. Rank or rate
- c. Organization
- d. Whether permanent change of station or, if temporary duty, duration of such duty.
- e. A statement that it is the originator's estimate that the individual(s) is(are) a good security risk in accordance with these Security Instructions. (Note: Individuals holding an "M", "P" or "Q" clearance may be automatically assumed to be good risks.)

13. Except in Case of an Emergency, aircraft in flight will not request permission to change their flight plan to over-fly Kwajalein and land at Eniwetok unless all personnel aboard have been properly cleared or the provisions of paragraph 12 can be accomplished prior to larding at Eniwetok.

IV NAVAL VESSELS

14. Vessels sailing to Eniwetok shall be governed by the following instructions:

a. Immediately upon receipt of information that their vessel is scheduled to sail for Eniwetok, commanding officers of naval vessels will forward direct to CINCPAC (attn J-2) by air mail special muster lists of all personnel attached to their vessel. Muster lists shall contain the following information:

- (1) Full name
- (2) Rank or rate
- (3) File, service, or serial number
- (4) A statement that all individuals listed are good security risks in accordance with subparagraph 11b. (Any member of a naval vessel's crew who cannot be cleared in accordance with the provisions of subparagraph 11b will be handled as outlined in subparagraphs 14c or 15c.)

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b. Immediately prior to sailing for Eniwetok, commanding officers of naval vessels shall forward direct to CINCPAC (attn J-2) by air mail any changes to this special muster list due to transfers or receipt of personnel, and will append a passenger list if applicable. Prior to sailing, a message will be originated to CINCPAC, information to Atoll Commander Eniwetok (ATCOM Eniwetok), Commander Naval Operating Base Kwajalein (COMNOB Kwajalein), and such other commands as may be pertinent, stating "SECURITY PROVISIONS YOUR 0116 COMPLIED ALL PERSONNEL ABOARD." This message shall not list crew members and passengers.

c. If any individual attached to a naval vessel ordered to Eniwetok Atoll fails to meet the requirements of these Security Instructions, he shall be transferred immediately to the nearest naval activity for reassignment. A classified message report of all such instances shall be made to the type commander or the administrative command of the vessel concerned who shall take any further required action and to CINCPAC as an information addressee.

15. In the event a vessel not destined for a scheduled stop at Eniwetok should be diverted from its normal schedule and be ordered to Eniwetok for the debarkation or embarkation of personnel or cargo, the following instructions will apply:

a. The command originating the order diverting the vessel's movement will do so by action message to the vessel so diverted and with the following information addressees: CINCPAC, Commander Naval Operating Base Kwajalein (COMNOB Kwajalein), Atoll Commander Eniwetok (ATCOM Eniwetok), and such other commands or vessels as may be pertinent.

b. The commanding officer of the vessel so diverted shall forward by air mail direct to CINCPAC (attn J-2) a muster list of all members of the vessel's crew as outlined in subparagraph 14a. A passenger list will also be forwarded but need not contain security risk statement.

c. If any individual attached to a vessel diverted to Eniwetok fails to meet the requirements of these Security Instructions, he shall be transferred as outlined in subparagraph 14c. If the diversion order is received after the last scheduled port of call prior to arrival at Eniwetok, the commanding officer shall impose such restrictions as are necessary to insure positive security of Eniwetok. In either case, the commanding officer will initiate the classified message provided for in subparagraph 14c.

d. The commanding officer of the vessel shall take such measures as he deems necessary to insure security insofar as concerns passengers not debarking at Eniwetok.

V CHARTERED COMMERCIAL VESSELS

16. Chartered commercial vessels shall be governed by the following instructions:

a. Upon determination that a chartered commercial vessel is to depart for Eniwetok, the Commander Military Sea Transportation Service shall request of the United States Coast Guard Marine Inspection Office nearest the port of departure a security check of all crew members of the chartered vessel.

b. Any crew members of the chartered vessel revealed to be a poor security risk by the above-mentioned check shall not be employed on the voyage of any vessel calling at Eniwetok.

c. Upon completion of the above-mentioned security check, MSTS will notify CINCPAC by message, with ATCOM Eniwetok and COMNOB Kwajalein as information addressees, that the provisions of these Security Instructions have been complied with. This message should not list the crew members. MSTS will forward to CINCPAC (attn J-2) via air mail, not later than the scheduled departure date, a list containing the following information on each crew member and the statement that all crew members listed are considered good security risks:

- (1) Full name
- (2) "Z" number

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d. MSTS will also forward to CINCPAC a complete list of all through passengers who will not debark at Eniwetok. The security risk statement will not be necessary for these passengers.

e. Normally, the Master of the vessel concerned will be the only person allowed ashore at Eniwetok during the stay at that port. However, the Atoll Commander Eniwetok may permit licensed officers of the vessel concerned ashore on Eniwetok Island when considered necessary.

f. MSTS chartered commercial vessels, east or west bound, will be routed to approach Eniwetok Atoll south of Latitude 11°-15' North and will enter Eniwetok Lagoon only via Wide Passage unless otherwise instructed by local authorities at Eniwetok.

VI SURFACE MOVEMENT

17. Clearance of personnel entering Eniwetok Atoll by either naval or chartered commercial vessels shall be accomplished in the following manner:

a. The clearing authority responsible for the security clearance of troop movements to Eniwetok shall originate a message to CINCPAC, information to ATCOM Eniwetok, COMNOB Kwajalein, and MSTS (or other surface transportation carrier), stating that all personnel of designated shipments aboard the named vessel have been cleared in accordance with these instructions. This message will not list such personnel, and is to be filed not later than the scheduled sailing time.

b. Upon the filing of the message referred to above, the clearing authority shall forward to CINCPAC, via air mail, not later than the scheduled departure time of the vessels, a list containing the shipment number, the name, rank, serial or file number and organization of all personnel, and a statement that all personnel are considered good security risks.

c. Paragraph 4 having placed the responsibility of ascertaining that proper clearances exist prior to embarking passengers bound for Eniwetok on the service providing the transportation, a duplicate of the list referred to in subparagraph 17b shall be delivered to MSTS, COMSERVPAC, or the U. S. Coast Guard (or other pertinent command, as the case may be) prior to passenger embarkation.

d. Passengers not properly cleared in accordance with these instructions shall not be embarked but shall instead be returned to their command if clearance cannot be accomplished prior to sailing of the vessel.

e. Exception to subparagraphs 17a and 17b may be made when the embarking passengers do not exceed 20, in which case they may be listed in the message and the list referred to in subparagraph 17b need not then be forwarded.

VII CLASSIFICATION GUIDE

18. The following classification criteria, promulgated by Joint Task Force THREE, shall govern:

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- (4) Code word "GREENHOUSE" and its meaning (Conduct of future atomic weapons tests at Eniwetok Atoll by JTF-3) Unclassified
- (5) General statements that plans and preparations are being made for tests at Eniwetok not indicating time or extent Unclassified
 - A. Proposed exact time of the test, i.e., month or day of the year SECRET
 - B. General statements that test will be held in 1951 Confidential
 - C. Information indicating strength, exact mission, or composition of subordinate Task Groups or detailed composition of JTF-3 Confidential or higher

b. Matters not included in the above criteria will continue to be assigned an appropriate classification.

c. To clarify the term "Restricted Data" the following definition from the Atomic Energy Commission is quoted: "The term 'restricted data' means all data concerning the manufacture or utilization of atomic weapons, the production of fissionable material, or the use of fissionable material in the production of power, but does not include any data which the Atomic Energy Commission from time to time determines may be published without adversely affecting the common defense and security." It should be noted that the military classification "Restricted" and the AEC term "Restricted Data" are dissimilar.

E. To clarify the term "restricted data" the following definitions from the Atomic
 Energy Commission are quoted: "The term 'restricted data' means all data concerning the
 production or utilization of atomic weapons, the production of fissionable material, or
 the use of fissionable material in the production of power, and does not include any data
 which the Atomic Energy Commission has not to the extent that it is necessary
 to disclose to the public for the common defense and security." It should be noted that the military
 classification "Restricted" and the AEC term "restricted data" are identical.

1. Subject document is solely a memorandum to the Senior U. S. Military Representatives responsible for implementation, in accordance with existing directives, of material aid delivery orders as approved by the Secretary of State under the MDA Program. The document is a consolidation of instructions heretofore issued concerning the disclosure of information relating to material aid programs under subject act and is disseminated to responsible departments for information and guidance.

2. MDAP is a high level program carried on through logistical supply channels. Staff action pertaining to any delivery of defense aid to a foreign government is accomplished on DA level and approved by the JCS who directs either ZI agencies or overseas theaters to effect deliveries.

3. AG, GHQ, received three copies of subject publication from DA and forwarded them to G-4 for recommended distribution and any action deemed necessary. G-4 recommended that the publication be reproduced and disseminated to all SCAP and FEC Sections (2 copies each) of GHQ for information. G-2, FEC, received six copies, the following G-2 internal distribution is suggested:

- 1 - CI Div

- 1 - MIS Div
- 3 - T/Intel

4. All JCSs received to date pertaining to this program have been briefed for Gen Willoughby. G-3 and G-4 have briefed these documents for the Chief of Staff. Since Gen Willoughby is familiar with this program which is not applicable to G-2, FEC, it is recommended that no further action other than mentioned in para 3 above be taken at this time.

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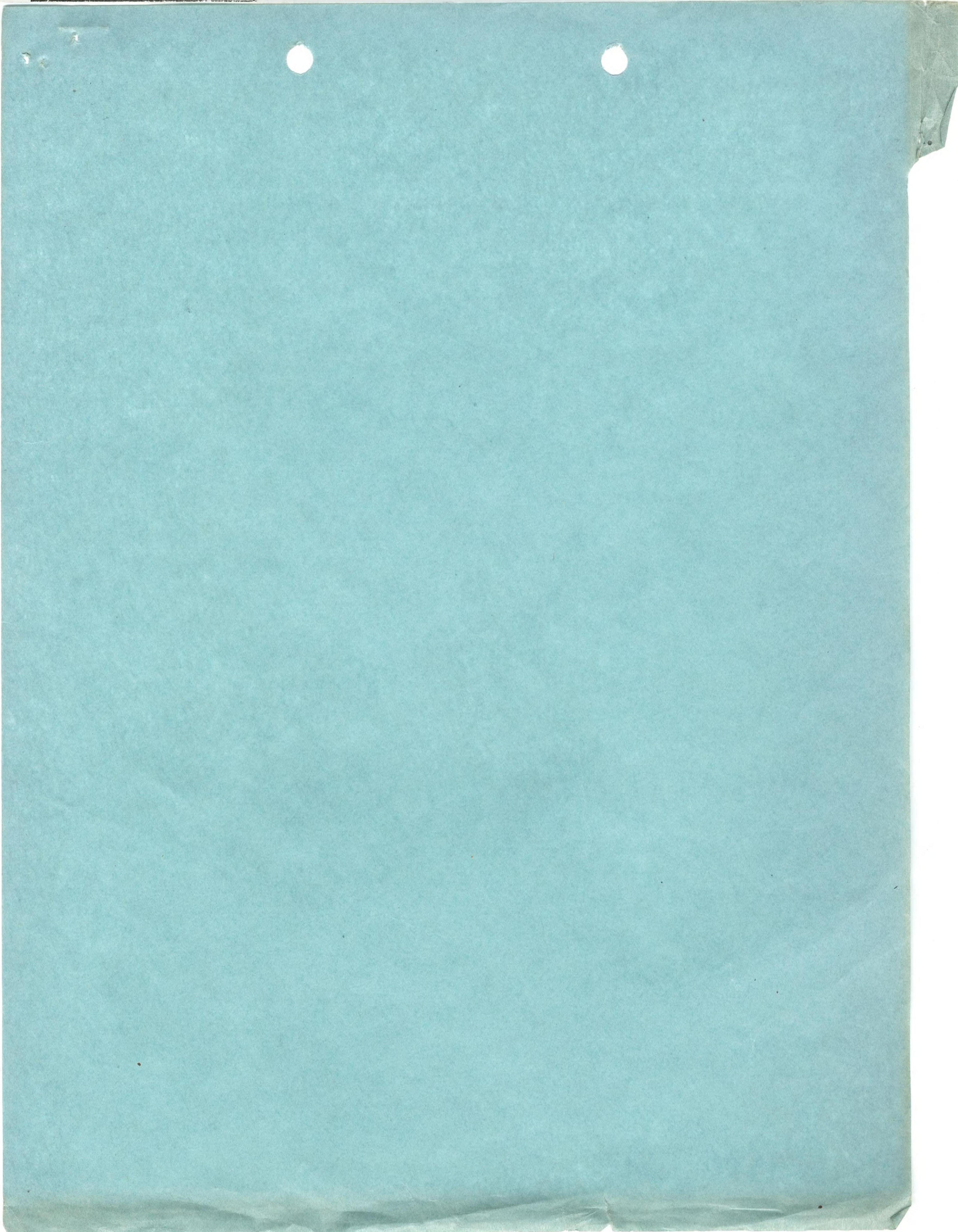
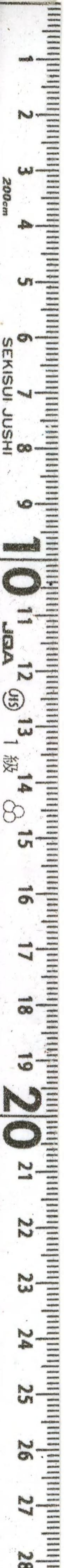

SUBJECT: Disclosure of Information under the "Mutual Defense
Assistance Act of 1949, as Amended."

1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this memorandum is to consolidate instructions heretofore issued concerning the disclosure of information relating to the materiel programs under the "Mutual Defense Assistance Act of 1949, as Amended." (Public Laws 329 and 321, 81st Congress).

2. SCOPE

a. The policy set forth herein shall be used as guidance by all IDA agencies and those other agencies, which by virtue of their relationship to IDA are permitted access to IDAP information.

b. This policy is applicable to all transactions concerning the transfer of materiel, services, and information under the provisions of the Mutual Defense Assistance Act of 1949, as amended, or any program carried out thereunder.

3. POLICY

It shall be the general policy not to disclose any information, classified or unclassified, to any person(s) and/or foreign government(s) which would jeopardize the interests of the U.S. or any of the IDAP recipient countries. This policy shall be inclusive of the subjects covered herein and shall not be interpreted as limited thereto.

4. IDAP SECURITY FOR MAILS, FILES, AND PERSONNEL

a. Within the Continental Limits of the U.S.

Each military department will abide by its own security regulations with respect to mails, files, and personnel while operating within the continental limits of the U.S.

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b. Outside the Continental Limits of the U.S.

Within MDAP missions, the Department of State Foreign Service Regulations will govern, except:

- (1) within the military service sections of the MAAG where the regulation of the service concerned will apply, and
- (2) where other Joint Chiefs of Staff or military procedure has been specifically authorized.

5. DISCLOSURE OF CLASSIFIED MILITARY INFORMATION

a. Disclosure of classified military information to foreign countries will be in accordance with the policy contained in "Policies Governing the Disclosure of Classified Military Information to Foreign Governments" (MIC 206/29, 25 October 1950), as implemented in Army publication DA-DCMI-48, USAF publication AF-DCMI-48 and USN publication ONI-321 dated January 1950 and JAMAG memorandum to MAAG's No. 2 dated 13 March 1950 and latest revisions thereto. Disclosures will be made only through U.S. authorities who have been charged with the responsibility for the disclosure of classified information to foreign governments.

(1) Technical Publications

Classified U.S. technical publications which are required to properly operate and maintain US/MDAP supplied materiel will be furnished to the recipient countries in accordance with the policy contained in paragraph 5a, above. All such publications will be consigned to the respective Service Section (Army-Navy-Air Force) of each applicable Military Assistance Advisory Group (MAAG).

- (2) Classified technical information covering materiel other than that included in the approved MDA program if requested by recipient countries may be furnished through the normal established channels subject to provisions of SAMAC 206/29, Revised.

6. MDA MATERIEL PROGRAM DD FORM 318

a. In order to prevent possible embarrassing or harmful information from reaching foreign countries as to program costs and revelation of U.S. military stock positions, in addition to the classification of "SECRET", each MDA Materiel Country Program (DD Form 318) will have attached to or incorporated therein a special handling notice substantially as contained in paragraph 11a of OSD memorandum dated 12 April 1950, subject: "Definition of Security Classifications," viz.,

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"SPECIAL HANDLING REQUIRED, NOT RELEASABLE
TO FOREIGN NATIONALS"

The information contained in the attached document will not be disclosed to foreign nationals without express approval of the

(Director of Intelligence or command concerned). Approval shall refer specifically to this document or to specific information contained therein."

Information, relating to IDAP, contained on papers so marked will not be disclosed to foreign nationals without prior clearance from the Office of Military Assistance, Office, Secretary of Defense.

b. Each country MAAG will be entitled to receive copies of the approved priced country program (DD Form 318) of its respective country only. If it is appropriate and within existing policy for the recipient country to have information contained in its applicable country program, the following may be provided under the appropriate security classification:

- (1) A listing showing the items, descriptions, and total quantities, provided that such a listing will be completely devoid of any pricing information and source of supply which might reveal U.S. military stock positions.
- (2) Information concerning shipping schedules may be made available to the recipient nations as classified information for planning purposes with the qualification that the dates are tentative and are based on estimated U.S. capabilities.

c. Source of supply of IDA materiel furnished under "GRANT-AID" which would reveal U.S. military stock positions will not be made available to any recipient country or to any of its nationals.

d. Unless otherwise directed, no country shall be entitled to or have access to any country program or an item and quantity listing thereof, other than that of its own country. Military Production Supply Board (including the Permanent Working Staff) may receive a list of items and quantities of each approved IDA Title I country program completely devoid of all costing information. However, the U.S. members of the Permanent Working Staff of the Military Production Supply Board may be authorized to receive approved IDA Title I country programs complete including costs.

RESTRICTED

e. Pricing Catalogs

Classified pricing catalogs, price lists and other media containing cost information covering items in the MDA Materiel Program may be made available to the recipient countries when deemed appropriate and within current policy by JMMG and/or established channels. It must be clearly indicated to recipient nations, however, that the prices appearing in such publications are not necessarily the prices used to compute the programs.

7. NON-GRANT AID UNDER TITLE IV, SECTION 408(e)

Approved country requests or programs furnishing "NON-GRANT AID" will not be stamped with the additional marking as required in paragraph 6a, above. Pricing information (fair value) may be furnished to the recipient country or its authorized representative when necessary for adequate planning and as an aid in making their decisions as to whether or not they can pay for requested items. This action does not eliminate the necessity for appropriate security classification and all documents relating thereto will be classified and declassified in accordance with existing regulations. Disclosure of classified military information under this category will also be in accordance with above paragraph 5a.

8. CLASSIFIED NON-MILITARY INFORMATION

Classified non-military information, such as FIACC documents, Department of State or Economic Cooperation Administration communications, in fact any information having political or economic implications regardless of origin, will not be furnished to other governments through IDA channels. Cables will not be furnished in original text due to need for complete cryptographic security. Where need arises for disclosure of such information, the matter should be taken up with the U.S. Ambassador through the IDAP Special Assistant and coordinated with State Regional Security Office or if the Ambassador deems it necessary, request Department of State's decision in the matter.

9. PRICED IDAP OPERATIONAL DOCUMENTS

a. No program pricing information will be furnished to recipient countries under IDAP Grant-Aid, either through operational documentation or informally. Shipping documents, packing lists, shipping orders, requisitions, replies to specific requests and any other documentation which for any reason may reach the recipient country, covering items shipped under the approved IDA country programs, may be furnished to the recipient country or any of its authorized representatives, provided that such documentation is completely devoid of all program costing information.

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b. Where priced documents have been included in the initial shipments, such shipments will not be repacked for the express purpose of deleting costing information. All future shipments, however, which have not been packed or are in the process of being packed will comply with instructions in above paragraph 9a.

c. Priced documents which have come to the possession of the recipient countries will not be recalled for substitution with unpriced copies. Recipient countries will be allowed to retain such priced documents; however, they should be informed that the costing information appearing thereon is merely for internal accounting procedures and does not reflect the program costs.

d. Those documents which are priced for U.S. accounting purposes will be given the appropriate security classification.

10. MDAP COMPILED DATA

a. All compilation of data containing information with respect to MDAP from either the supply, funding, or statistical nature which would reveal in whole or in part the cost and/or U.S. military stock positions of Grant-Aid transfers will not be made available to the recipient country or any of its nationals, and will be stamped to so indicate (see paragraph 6a, above).

b. The monthly reports, MDAP Supply Operations Report and Status of Available Funds by Country and Category, are prepared, in general, from unclassified data. Consolidations of such unclassified data at echelons such as the headquarters of a technical service, where only a portion of the military department's over-all monthly report is prepared, will normally be transmitted as "RESTRICTED" and stamped with the additional marking contained in paragraph 6a, above. Reports prepared at the headquarters of the military department indicating the total program status for any country within the department will normally be transmitted as "CONFIDENTIAL" and stamped with the additional marking contained in paragraph 6a, above. Other reports prepared, covering the entire Department of Defense for any country will be classified normally as "SECRET" and stamped with the additional marking contained in paragraph 6a, above. Any transmittal of accumulated classified or unclassified documents which represent the entire or major portion of the supporting documentation for the report to be prepared by the next higher echelon will be treated as having the classification of the report which may be prepared from such documents, and the letter of the transmittal will bear the security classification of the report which may be prepared.

c. Report of MDAP ocean shipments will be classified "RESTRICTED".

11. DOWNGRADING OF MDAP COUNTRY PROGRAMS

a. Where it becomes necessary to apportion the priced program into several component parts, such component parts may be downgraded or

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declassified to the extent considered necessary to carry out the planning, implementation and execution of the program. Those component parts containing information regarding program pricing and stock positions will always be stamped with the additional marking contained in paragraph 6a, above.

b. Whenever the several components of the apportioned program are compiled, the compilation must be again classified to the original security classification.

12. PUBLIC RELEASE OF INFORMATION

Release of information concerning MDAP to the press or radio will be in accordance with OSD/OMA memorandum dated 2 March 1950, subject "Release of Information Concerning Mutual Defense Assistance Program."
