PREFACE.



NO apology is necessary for the issue of those heretofore inedited sources of English and Colonial history of that absorbingly interesting and pregnant period, the reign of William III. The Rolls have been transcribed *verb. et lit.* and with the Introduction, will form an indispensable guide to a fuller understanding of the political problems of that day, so fruitful of historical suggestion shedding further light on the problems of to-day.

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The Association Oath Rolls for the British Plantations.

A.D. 1696.



THE reigns of William and Mary, and of William III. alone represent a period of the greatest importance to the student of the development of political machinery. It was essentially the epoch marked by the introduction of a stringent parliamentary control of finance, of party government, the appointment of Ministers, and consequent introduction of the Cabinet, leading in the next reign to the establishment of a cabinet under a Prime Minister definitely charged with the task of governing. With the exception of George III. William was the last British sovereign who sought to rule as well as to occupy the throne.

His reign was greatly troubled, as was natural, by plots in favour of the exiled monarch, James II., the effect, however, being to enhance the security of William's seat. In spite even of the tenacity of Parliament in wresting from the crown every power they could, the popular esteem of the new king continued to increase. It was strikingly manifested early in 1696, immediately after the king made his dramatic announcement in Parliament that a plot against his life had been discovered.

The Whigs had materially assisted his accession to the throne and the Tories, smarting under the attacks upon the Church of England made by James, had taken their part in the successful penetration of England by the Prince of Orange. There was indeed considerable connection between the religious and political movements of the time. The Catholic party in European politics were greatly pleased at two notable events in the year 1685. James, Duke of York, ascended the throne of England an avowed papist, and in France the Edict of Nantes was repealed on October 22nd, in part for political, in part for religious, reasons by Louis XIV. The repeal was followed by such cruelty and bitter persecution that the Protestant conscience was awakened as it had never been before. Their imminent danger evoked general alarm, as they witnessed the hunting down and dispersion of their Huguenot brethren. It made such an appeal to their religious sentiment and the call for self-preservation that its effects are still found, even in these days when all sectarian bitterness is to some extent forgotten.

The year 1689, which saw James II. a fugitive, witnessed the outbreak of the Palatinate war and the beautiful valley of the Rhine was ravaged. In her fear England called William of Orange to the throne to be both the defender of the Protestant cause and joint ruler, with Mary his Queen, of Great Britain. As a man he was neither loveable nor loved, his melancholy nature permitted him few friends. Yet, none the less, he was an able monarch and a commander of ability.

The Revolution was sufficiently remarkable. The Convention Parliament, composed of all surviving members of the Commons under Charles II., augmented by the Lord Mayor, aldermen and fifty common councillors of London, the bishops and peers, declared the throne to be vacant, James having "broken the original contract

between King and people," having violated the fundamental laws and having abdicated the government by withdrawing himself out of the Kingdom.

In other words, the Sovereign people passed judgment, and in their new-found power elected their king, taking care by a cautious settlement to throw aside the burdensome yoke of the ill-fated Stuarts, and form such a contract that arbitrary government could not again endanger the liberty of the subject. Among the earliest Acts of Parliament was one calculated to ensure the Protestant succession, and naturally peace with Louis, as protector of the exiled Catholic king, was out of the question. The liberty, laws and religion of England were at stake. James was not however without support.

Many of the landowners at that time as did their forebears, owned Papal allegiance, and looked with lenient eye on the humbler estrays of the faith in their midst, whether Irish or English, welcoming them none the less if they had chanced to serve under the banner of the late king.

His co-religionists were with James to a man, and outside their pale many still looked with awe on the doctrine of Divine Right of Kings, and were hostile to the Dutchman. Ireland was ready and willing to fight, and it was only after much bloodshed brought to order, with William and Mary securely on the throne. Plots were fomented and means sought to overthrow them. Lancashire was conspicuous in these machinations, but it by no means stood alone.

Charles Talbot, Duke of Shrewsbury, one of those who had escorted the Prince of Orange from Holland in 1688, pointed this out to the justices as early as April, 1690, in a letter written in his official capacity as Secretary of State for the Northern Province, and

referred again to the matter in another letter to William, dated July 10th, 1694.* In the latter, he says:—

Three Lancashire and Cheshire men, who have been engaged enlisting soldiers, and buying arms for the disaffected gentlemen in those parts, have made an ample discovery of the whole matter to the Lord Keeper, Mr. Secretary and myself. Whereupon Mr. Secretary and I have sent out warrants for seizing the persons and arms of about twenty considerable gentlemen thereabouts, and if these witnesses make good at their trial what they have deposed before us, they will be every man both lives and fortunes, in your power. [S.P. Dom. 1694—5.]

This so-called “ Lancashire Plot ” was probably made to look as black as possible. It cannot have been very serious. Nevertheless, the principal organisers, Lord Molyneux of Croxteth, Sir William Gerard, Sir Rowland Stanley, Sir Thomas Clifton, Bartholomew Walmsley, William Dicconson, Philip Langton, Esqs., and Mr. William Blundell—all but Stanley being men of the County—were duly brought to trial for high treason.

The Duke’s informers, however, hardly fulfilled his expectations, and in the upshot all those charged were acquitted with a severe censure.

According to the Court scribe, Richard Kingston, Lancashire was not only the parent but the companion, of all other conspiracies contrived by the exiled King and his adherents. This Lancashire plot was therefore one of many.

A more serious conspiracy was formed in 1695, but its execution was postponed owing to the king’s departure for the Continent; but after his return it revived, and came to a head in February, 1696, when it was disclosed to William Bentinck, Earl of Portland, by Captain Fisher (February 11, 1696). Portland undoubtedly handled the conspiracy with consummate skill in

William's interests. This new venture was more or less indirectly and somewhat vaguely supported by general sanction from the Court of St. Germain. Sir George Barclay, a Scottish Catholic, acted as agent for the exiled James, and was commissioned to rally his adherents. James, Duke of Berwick, a son of James II., had already secretly arrived in London, as agent for Louis, who on his part, prepared a French fleet at Calais and Dunkirk. James II. waited at Calais to take command. Sir John Fenwick led the conspiracy, in which about forty plotters were involved.

William was in the habit of hunting in Richmond Park on Saturdays, and it was decided to make an attempt on his life in the lane leading from Brentford to Turnham Green. In spite of warning, William persisted in his intention up to the evening of Friday, February 14th, when Prendergast, an Irish Catholic, called upon Portland, who saw the King, with the result that the hunt was postponed. On the following day, Prendergast and another witness, De la Rue, were questioned by the King, and they revealed the names of the conspirators.

Several of the plotters were arrested that night, and rewards of £1,000 were proclaimed for the capture of the others. One such Proclamation is reprinted, the text being quoted from the authorised report of Rookwood's trial, printed for Samuel Heyrick and Isaac Cleave, 1696. As was pointed out during that trial the lists of names varied slightly.

THE PROCLAMATION.

By the King a Proclamation.

WILLIAM R.

WHEREAS His Majesty has received information upon Oath, that the Persons herein after named, have with divers other wicked and traiterous Persons entered into a horrid and detestable Conspiracy to assassinate and murder His Majesty's sacred Person, for which cause several

Warrants for High Treason hath been issued out against them, but they have withdrawn themselves from their usual places of abode, and are fled from Justice: His Majesty has therefore thought fit by the advice of his Privy Council to issue his Royal Proclamation, and His Majesty does hereby command and require all His loving Subjects to discover, take, and apprehend JAMES, DUKE OF BERWICK, SIR GEORGE BARCLAY, MAJOR LOWICK, GEORGE PORTER, CAPT. STOW, CAPT. WALBANK, CAPT. JAMES COURTNEY, LIEUTEN. SHERBORNE, BRICE, BLAIR, DINANT, CHAMBERS, BOISE, GEORGE HIGGINS, and his two brothers, Sons to Sir Thomas Higgins, DAVIS CORDELL, GOODMAN, CRAMBURNE, KEYES, PENDERGROSS, *alias* PENDERGRASS, BRYERLY, TREVOR, SIR GEORGE MAXWELL, DARANCE a Fleming, CHRISTOPHER KNIGHTLEY, LIEUT. KING, HOLMES, SIR WILLIAM PARKYNS, ROOKWOOD, wherever they may be found, and to carry them before the next Justice of Peace or chief Magistrate, who is hereby required to commit them to the next Gaol, there to remain until they be thence delivered by due course of Law. And His Majesty doth hereby require the said Justice, or other Magistrate, immediately to give notice thereof to Him or His Privy Council. And for the prevention of the going of the said Persons, or of any other, into Ireland, or other parts beyond the Seas, His Majesty does require and command all His Officers of the Customs, and other His Officers and Subjects of and in the respective Courts and Maritime Towns and Places within His Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, and Towns of Berwick upon Tweed, that they and every of them in their respective Stations and Places, be careful and diligent in the Examination of all Persons who shall pass or endeavour to pass beyond the Seas, and that they do not permit any Person whatsoever to go into Ireland, or other places beyond the Seas, without a Pass under His Majesty's Royal Sign Manual until further Order. And if they shall discover the said Persons above-named or either of them, then to cause them to be apprehended and secured, and to give notice as aforesaid. And His Majesty does hereby Publish and Declare to all Persons who shall Conceal the Persons above-named, or any of them, or be aiding or assisting in the Concealing of them, or furthering their Escape, That they shall be proceeded against, for such their Offence, with the utmost severity, according to Law. And for the Encouragement of all Persons to be Diligent and Careful in endeavouring to Discover and Apprehend the said Persons, We do hereby further Declare, That whosoever shall Discover and Apprehend the Persons above-named, or any of them, and shall bring them before some Justice of Peace or Chief Magistrate, as aforesaid, shall have and receive as a Reward, the Summ of One thousand Pound; which said Summ of One thousand

Pounds, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are hereby Required and Directed to pay accordingly. And if any of the Persons abovenamed shall Discover and Apprehend any of their Accomplices, so as they may be brought to Justice, His Majesty does hereby declare, That every Person making such Discovery, shall have His Majesty's Gracious Pardon for his Offence, and shall receive the Reward of One thousand Pounds, to be paid in such manner as aforesaid.

Given at our Court at Kensington, the 23rd Day of February, 1695. 6. in the Eighth Year of our Reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

The principal persons implicated were the Earl of Aylesbury, Lord Montgomery, Sir George Barclay, Sir John Fenwick, Sir John Friend, Sir William Perkins, Major Lowick, Capt. Charnock, Capt. Knightley, Capt. Porter, Messrs. Cooke, Cranbourne, Goodman and Rookwood. Of these, Friend, Perkins, Charnock, Lowick, Cranbourne, and Rookwood were executed: Cook was banished. Sir John Fenwick was arrested later (June 11). Proceedings against him were begun, in the course of which there was much intrigue. A bill of attainder was introduced, and after lengthy and acrimonious debate, Fenwick was condemned to death and was beheaded on Tower Hill (January 28th, 1697).

Politically the plot was of great service to William, and, like the statesman he was, he made the most of the situation. On Monday, the 24th February, William, in person, appeared in Parliament, and made the following speech, duly reported in the *London Gazette* that day:—

I am come hither this day upon an Extraordinary occasion, which might have proved Fatal, if it had not been Disappointed by the singular mercy and Goodness of God, and may now, by the Continuance of the same Providence, and our own Prudent Endeavours, be so improved as to become a sufficient Warning to us to provide for our Security against the pernicious Practices and Attempts of our Enemies. I have received several concurring

Informations of a Design to assassinate me, and that our Enemies at the same time are very forward in their Preparations for a sudden Invasion of this Kingdom, and have therefore thought it necessary to lose no time in acquainting my Parliament with these things, in which the safety of the Kingdom and the Publick Welfare are so nearly concerned, That I assure myself nothing will be omitted on Your Part which may be thought proper for Our present or future Security. [After setting out the steps taken to bring the Navy to home waters, and a large number of soldiers home, the King concludes.] Having now acquainted you with the Danger that hath Threatened us, I cannot doubt of your Readiness and Zeal to do everything which you shall Judge Proper for Our Common Safety, and I Persuade myself we must be all Sensible how Necessary it is in our Present circumstances that all possible Dispatch should be given in the Business before you.

The Lords and Commons replied with an address declaring “detestation and abhorrence of so vilanous and barbarous a design,” urging his Majesty to take more than usual care of his Royal Person, and promising not only support, but to take revenge upon his enemies should the King meet with a violent death. They empowered the King to suspend the Habeas Corpus Act. In the House of Commons Sir Rowland Gwyn proposed an Oath of Association which was drawn up and immediately signed by an overwhelming majority: 400 to 113.

The authorities of the City of London signed on February 25th, and while the Houses proceeded to pass an Act to legalise it, the oath was taken in town and country, and the South coast put in a position of defence. This Act is quoted as 7 & 8 Will. III., c. 27, and entitled “An Act for the better security of His Maties Royal Person and Government.”

PREAMBLE OF THE ACT.

Rot. Parl. 7 & 8 Gul. III. p 6. n 1. 7 & 8 Will. iii c 27. An Act for the Security of His Maties Royal Person and Government.

Whereas the Welfare and safety of this Kingdom and the Reformed Religion do next under God entirely depend upon the Preservation of Your Majesties

Royal Person and Government which by the Merciful Providence of God of late have been delivered from the bloody and barbarous attempts of Traytors and other Your Majesties Enemies who there is just Reason to believe have been in great measure encouraged to undertake and prosecute such their wicked designs partly by Your Majesties great and undeserved Clemency towards them and partly by the want of a sufficient Provision in the Law for the securing offices and Places of Trust to such as are well affected to Your Majesties' Government and for the repressing and punishing such as are knowne to be disaffected to the same. For Remedy whereof may it please your Majesty that it may be enacted That from and after the First day of May, One Thousand Six Hundred and Ninety-six all and every such Person and Persons who shall refuse to take the oaths mentioned and appointed to be taken in an Act of Parliament (1 Wm. & M. c. 8) intituled An Act for the abrogating of the oaths of Supremacy and Allegiance and appointing other oaths or either of them when tendred to him or them by Persons lawfully authorized to administer or tender the same or shall refuse or neglect to appeare when lawfully summoned in order to have the said oaths tendred to him or them shall until he or they have duly taken the said oaths be liable to incur forfeit pay or suffer all and every the Penalties Forfeitures Sums of money disabilities and incapacities which by the Laws and Statutes of this Realme now in Force or any of them are inflicted upon Popish Recusants duely convict of Recusancy and that for the better and more orderly levying and answering the said Penalties and Forfeitures to his majesty His Heirs and successors the Persons so tendring the said oaths shall upon every such Refusal or Default of appearance as aforesaid record and enter in Parchment the Christian and Sirnames and the Place of abode of the Person or Persons so refusing or not appearing as aforesaid to take the said oaths or either of them together with the time of such Tender and Refusal or Default of appearance and shall deliver and certifie the said Record or Entry to the Justices of Assize, Justices of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery att their next session within the same county who shall forthwith estreate and certifie the same into His Majesties' Court of Exchequer to be there entered of Record to the end that the said Court of Exchequer may thereupon award and issue such processe against the lands and goods of the said Person or Persons mentioned in such Estreat or Certificate as may by the Laws and Statutes of the realme be awarded and issued against the lands and goods of a Popish Recusant convict. [§ I.]

The preamble is immediately followed by a section forbidding that any by writing, printing, preaching, teaching, or advised speaking, shall publish or declare that His present Majesty is other than lawful

and rightfull King of these Realms, or that the late King James, or the pretended Prince of Wales or any other, have right and title to the crown, otherwise they incur the danger and Penalty of Premunire (16 Ric. II., c. 5). [§ II.]

The oath which follows below is introduced as for “the better Preservation of His Majesties Royal Person and Government,” and to it was added the text of the association which had already been subscribed by “great numbers of His Majesties good subjects.”

THE OATH.

Whereas there has been a horrid and detestable Conspiracy formed and carried on by Papists and other wicked and traiterous Persons for assassinating His Majesties Royal Person in order to encourage an Invasion from France to subvert our Religion Laws and Liberty. Wee whose names are hereunder subscribed doe heartily sincerely and solemnly professe testifie and declare That His present Majesty King William is rightfull and lawful King of these Realmes and wee doe mutually promise and engage to stand by and assist each other to the utmost of our Power in the support and defence of His Majesties most sacred Person and government against the late King James and all his adherents and in case His Majesty come to any violent or untimely death (which God forbid) wee do hereby further freely and unanimously oblige ourselves to unite associate and stand by each other in revenging the same upon His Enemies and their adherents and in supporting and defending the succession of the Crown according to an act made in the first yeare of the Reigne of King William and Queen Mary entituled an Act declaring the Rights and Liberties of the subject and settling the succession of the Crowne. [§ III.]

It may be noted that Gwyn’s suggestion was not a novel one.* Among the State Papers Domestic is preserved a 4-page quarto, viz., “A true copy of the instrument of association, that the Protestants of England entered into in the 27th year of Queen Elizabeth, against a Popish conspiracy.” In this occur several passages, the spirit of which seems to be analagous to, and even identical with that of the later oath.

Throughout England the terms of the Act were far exceeded. In most places every male adult, and occasionally certain women, signed the roll either in person or by deputy. Particularly thorough supervision was exercised in obtaining the signatures of all connected with government offices and works. Nor did the movement end with the old country. The English merchants of Dort, Rotterdam, The Hague, and Geneva, contributed their rolls; so, too, the Factory at Malaga. And across the ocean the West Indies, New York and Virginia also took the oath.

Conditions in these distant plantations require some short notice in order the better to understand what the Association meant to the settlers.

The plantations on the Mainland of North America owed some gratitude to the Stuarts. James I. had been interested in Virginia, as had Charles I. Maryland began officially to exist in 1634; Rhode Island two years later; Pennsylvania as late as 1664. James II. touched a sore spot, though his purpose was a wise one. To set aside their charters and unite the Northern Colonies under one government was far from approved of by their liberty-loving people; but since the natural jealousies of New York and New Jersey were at the time in full play, the need of some centralizing movement is apparent. All the while the French of Louisiana and Canada were aggressive. Dougan, Governor of New York, sagaciously opposed their machinations and tactfully kept the great Indian confederacy on the borders known as the Five Nations loyal to the English Crown. The West Indies were none the less harried by French privateers, who sank the Islanders' ships and interfered grievously with their food supply. It was vital that the lines of communication should be kept open. As on the Mainland so in the Islands each acted independently in terms of its own entity, and all were swayed by

jealousy and local disputes.* The Mother Country was herself too burdened with the wars of William to send much assistance. In their divided state it is strange there was no great catastrophe.

In 1693 an attempt was made to strike a serious blow at France. A fleet under Sir Francis Wheler reached Barbadoes, but with that fatal procrastination that even in those days marked official transactions, it sailed too late, and through disease and gross mismanagement proved an entire failure. The ignominious end of the expedition threw Barbadoes, Jamaica, and the Leeward islands into a panic, and severely tested the fidelity of the Indians of New York. Advices from home sensibly enough recommended the isolated units to band together in self-defence. The only result was yet further quarrels.

The means of land defence were feeble. The Islands had, or were supposed to have a White Militia, composed of servants imported from the Old Country and bound to the planters for a term of years. Various causes, William's wars, low wages and bad seasons, rendered it impossible to keep up the defences; on the other hand the Islands could not be left totally unguarded. Governor Codrington (who signed the roll for Antigua) appealed for aid. Four ships and four hundred men were sent. Barbadoes, after much shuffling among the politicians, likewise received a little help. The inhabitants of Antigua expressed their gratitude in the roll: "Having to our great comfort received from Your Majtes gracious clemency and regard a peculiar protection from our intraged enemyes, etc." and in a fuller manner, the Burgesses of James City in Virginia speak of the

“signall tokens and marks of yor maties grace and favour lately received in a fresh supply of ammunition and stores of war for great guns.” From Jamaica, always in fear of invasion, there is no roll extant so far as the Public Record Office goes. Barbadoes certainly had no reason to be ungrateful, since the force under Francis Russell, which had commenced to clear the seas of privateers, was called off from that useful work to bring them assistance.

On the mainland matters were little if any better. In 1689 the English in North America exceeded the French in number, so much so, that Louis endeavoured to persuade William that the Oversea Plantations should remain neutral. The English King was too sagacious and refused. In reality both sides hoped much from war; the English to take Quebec, the French to conquer the Iroquois and thus obtain an open trade route from the Erie to the Mississippi. They further hoped to drive the English out of Hudson’s Bay and secure the fur trade for France. Both sides fanned the ferocity of the Indians and their warriors raided each other’s settlements with sickening cruelty.

At last some sense of responsibility and duty came to the Authority at home. The management of the American Colonies was then removed out of the hands of the Privy Council and entrusted to a Commission for the Administration of Trade and Plantations, *viz.*, the Board of Trade, the Council, of course, retaining the supreme control.

Possibly hope of the new regime had some effect, but the ever present fear of France was the motive power that led to the signing of these Rolls in one of which, that of Bermuda, are enrolled tribe by tribe, the signatures of all its inhabitants.

The form of the rolls follows closely the precedents set up in the home country, but each has a character of its own. New York, by far the largest, has four distinct rolls, one for the Governor and

Council, another for the Civic Authorities, the Mayor and Corporation, a third for the Colonel, Paymasters and Officers of the Garrison and that of the inhabitants. This forms a directory of the adult males of the city and bears witness to its cosmopolitan character, certain Jews writing their names in Hebrew. A facsimile of the eleventh membrane of the New York Roll will be found facing page 44.

The Roll of the Dominion of Virginia adds a long address to the more formal oath and loyal declaration. In their address it expresses, as already noted, the gratitude of the colony for munitions of war, and also for the acceptance of funds raised for the aid of the defence of New York. The Virginia Rolls have been photographed and form the frontispiece to the present volume.

Antigua has a roll for the Governor and Assembly, another for the Military Authorities, and a third which enshrines an Address of Gratitude from the inhabitants.

Nevis has a roll which embraces all sections of the community and an address.

Montserrat has two distinct enrolments, the Governor and Council, and another for the Militia.

St. Christopher's single roll includes the principal inhabitants.

The Bermuda roll is a copy only, the original being retained in the Secretary's office in the island. It includes the signatures of the Governor, Council, Assembly and inhabitants, the latter signing under their tribes.

Inasmuch as many emigrants from England reached the American plantations by way of Holland it is quite appropriate to append the rolls for the City of Dort, Rotterdam, and the Hague. The short Rolls for the English residents in Malaga and Geneva are also added.

Careful study will reveal the value of the documents, not only as a contribution to history, but as an important aid to genealogical research. It will be noted that persons bearing names well-known throughout the civilized world were even in these early days occupying important positions in New York and Virginia, and doubtless standing firm for liberty to their everlasting honour.

As Doctor Murray Butler well said, speaking to an audience at Albany, New York, 15th June, 1915, but with an application equally extending over the whole of the "Plantations":—

The people of the State of New York inherited and brought across the sea the political and social institutions of the seventeenth and eighteenth century England. The Constitution of England was their constitution, and into the rights and benefits of Magna Charta they entered as the lineal descendants of those free men of England to whom those rights and benefits had been assured forever. When New York was still a colony, Chatham, replying in the House of Lords to the Marquis of Rockingham's speech on the State of the Nation (January 22nd, 1770), said: 'The Constitution has its political Bible, by which, if it be fairly consulted, every political question may and ought to be determined. Magna Charta, the Petition of Right, and the Bill of Rights form that code which I call the Bible of the English Constitution.' These three great documents mark the progress of the struggle between the barons and the people of England with the Plantagenet, the Tudor, and the Stuart kings, through which struggles the government of England was gradually transformed from a feudal monarchy into a democracy in fact, with an elective kingship and an aristocratic social system.

In the Association Oath Rolls of 1696 we have the rare spectacle of a nation sadly divided by jealousies of various kinds, but fired to a tremendous enthusiasm for the preservation of their solid hard-won liberties, and in the Rolls herein transcribed we see the reflection of this spirit in the young colonies, despite the well-known fact that they were founded rather as secessions than as expansions of the Empire.

I have thought well to transcribe these Rolls and to indicate a sketch of some political conditions in the English Empire of that period for the help of my fellow students in all centres of Anglo-American historical research.

FORASMUCH as it is notoriously manifest that there hath lately been an horrid and detestable conspiracy of Papists and other barbarous and bloody traitors in ye Kingdome of England, to take away his Maties life by assassinateing his Royall Person, to the end of an intended Invasion from France for the subversion of the Religion Laws and Liberties of that Kingdom and in that of this and all other his Maties Dominions might be thereby the better facilitated

We whose names are hereunto underwritten the Burgesses assembled at James City in his Maties Dominion of Virginia do heartily sincerely and solemnly profess testifie and declare that his present Maty King William is our Rightfull and lawfull King and we do hereby mutually promise and engage to stand by and assist each other to the utmost of our Power in the supporting defending and keeping this Governmt for his Maty against the late King James and his adherents and if it should so happen that his Maty should come to a violent or untimely end (which God forbid) we do hereby protest and declare that we wil be enemies to all persons that have been his Enemies and also that we will unite associate and assist each other in the defending and keeping this Dominion for such Successor of his Maty as the Crowne of England shal belong to according to an Act made in the first year of the Reign of King William and Queen Mary. Entituled an Act declareing the Rights and Liberties of the Subject and setling the Succession of the Crown.
