EXPLANATORY NOTE.

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport)

1. The Schedule to this Order sets out the statutory minimum remuneration payable as from 23rd September, 1946, to the workers in relation to whom the Linen and Cotton Embroidery Wages Council (Northern Ireland) operates.

2. The provisions of Order N.I.E. (24) as amended by Order N.I.E. (26) cease to have effect when the new provisions under this Order come into force.

WHEREAS the Ministry of Labour (hereinafter referred to as "the Ministry") has received from the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Wages Council (Northern Ireland) wages regulation proposals for fixing the minimum remuneration to be paid to the workers in relation to whom the Council operates in substitution of the minimum remuneration now payable to the said workers and for the amendment of the Order of the Ministry N.I.H.H.G. (82), dated the 27th day of February, 1945, confirming holidays provided for by a direction given, and holiday remuneration fixed, under the Holidays with Pay Act (Northern Ireland), 1938; in 2 Geo. 6 relation to the said workers (hereinafter referred to as "Order Ch. 24. N.I.H.H.G. (82)");

NOW, THEREFORE, the Ministry by virtue of section 10 of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945, and of every other power in that behalf hereby makes the following Order :—

1.—(1) Subject to the provisions of paragraph (2) of this Article the provisions relating to statutory minimum remuneration set out in the First Schedule hereto shall become effective as from the 8th day of April, 1946 (hereinafter referred to as “the specified date”) and accordingly the Orders of the Ministry N.I.H.H.G. (68) dated the 1st day of May, 1940, and N.I.H.H.G. (80) dated the 16th day of June, 1944, shall thereupon cease to have effect.

(2) Where as respects any worker who is paid wages at intervals not exceeding seven days the specified date does not correspond with the beginning of the period for which the wages are paid, the provisions relating to statutory minimum remuneration set out in the First Schedule hereto shall, as respects that worker, become effective as from the beginning of the next such period following the specified date and Orders N.I.H.H.G. (68) and N.I.H.H.G. (80) shall cease to have effect in relation to that worker accordingly.

2. As from the specified date Order N.I.H.H.G. (82) shall have effect subject to the amendments set out in the Second Schedule to this Order.

The minimum rates set out under (a) in paragraph 6 above shall apply to male workers who, within the preceding five years, shall have had not less than two years' employment in the trade and the minimum rates set out under (b) therein shall apply to all other male workers included in that paragraph.

PROVIDED THAT—

(1) If a worker be transferred from one of such operations to another during the second six months of employment she may be paid during such second six months a general minimum time-rate of 7d. per hour and, thereafter, at the full general minimum time-rate of 10½d. per hour.

(2) A worker of the classes specified in paragraphs 10 or 14 who is subsequently employed on Stitching Machines (other than Swiss Embroidery Machines), Vice-Folding, or Hand Smoothing, shall not during the first six months on those operations be paid at a lower general minimum time-rate than that which she would have been entitled to receive if she had continued to be employed on the operations to which the general minimum time-rates set out in paragraphs 10 or 14 are applicable.

The rates set out in this paragraph shall apply only to workers remunerated at time-rates of wages. Learners or other juvenile workers may be employed alternatively on piece-work in which case they shall be paid the appropriate general minimum piece-rate or, where no such general minimum piece-rate has been fixed, a piece-rate calculated to yield to an ordinary worker not less than the piece-work basis time-rate set out in paragraph 17.

Certificates of Learnership are not applicable to workers employed on the operations specified in this paragraph.

APPLICABILITY OF PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES

PARAGRAPH 19.

In the case of workers employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as will yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, at least the same amount of money as the appropriate piece-work basis time-rate. In determining whether any piece-rate satisfies this condition, regard shall be had only to the earnings of ordinary workers, *i.e.*, workers of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question and not to the earnings of workers of less than ordinary skill and experience, *e.g.*, juvenile and infirm workers.

Provided that in determining any piece-rate to be paid to out-workers, the rate payable shall be at least the same amount of money as the appropriate piece-rate applicable to that class of work in the factory from which the goods were given out.

(ii) FANCY DESIGNS

Fancy Designs of Spoking are to be calculated at the rate of 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per 10 yards of spoking. In addition, 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per 10 dozen handkerchiefs shall be payable for each point in spoking, where threads have to be clipped on both sides or at edge of handkerchief, and 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ d. per 10 dozen handkerchiefs for each stop and turn where design is not broken.

For Wet Smoothing N.D. Cases and Pyjama Cases with Gussets, 1½d. extra per dozen articles shall be payable.

Prices for Damp Smoothing shall include Damping by Worker.

The general minimum piece-rates for INTERMEDIATE SIZES to those specified in paragraph 22 shall apply as follows :—

The rate payable for an article which is intermediate in size in relation to similar articles for which general minimum piece-rates are fixed as shown in the relevant lists shall be the general minimum piece-rate for that article which is the nearer in size to the actual size of the article for which no general minimum piece-rate has been fixed.

In the case of an article the size of which is exactly half-way between the sizes of any two such articles (of consecutive sizes) the rate payable shall be half the aggregate general minimum piece-rates payable as shown in the relevant list for those two sizes.

OVERTIME FOR ALL MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS

PARAGRAPH 23.

Overtime rates shall be payable as follows :—

(A) WORKERS EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK :—

- (1) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 47, the overtime rate shall be one-and-a-half times the general minimum time-rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF, except in so far as a higher rate is payable under the provisions of sub-paragraph (3) below.
- (2) For overtime on any day other than Sundays and public holidays customarily observed in the establishment, the overtime rate shall be one-and-a-half times the general minimum time-rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, TIME-AND-A-HALF.
- (3) For all time worked on Sundays and on public holidays customarily observed in the establishment, the overtime rate shall be twice the general minimum time-rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, DOUBLE TIME.

(B) WORKERS EMPLOYED ON PIECE-WORK :—

- (1) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 47, the overtime rates for workers employed on piece-work shall be the rates as set out in sub-paragraph (2) below, except in so far as a higher rate is payable under the provisions of sub-paragraph (3) below.
- (2) Each worker employed on piece-work shall receive, in respect of each hour of overtime worked on any day, other than Sundays and public holidays customarily observed in the establishment, in addition to piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, at least the same amount of money as the piece-work basis time-rate applicable, AN AMOUNT EQUAL TO ONE-QUARTER OF THE APPROPRIATE PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATE.
- (3) Each worker employed on piece-work shall receive, in respect of each hour of overtime worked on Sundays and on public holidays customarily observed in the establishment, in addition to piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, at least the same amount of money as the piece-work basis time-rate applicable, AN AMOUNT EQUAL TO THE APPROPRIATE PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATE.

In the case of female workers employed on operations for which the Wages Council has fixed general minimum piece-rates, piece-rates calculated to yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, not less than the piece-work basis time-rate applicable, shall be held to include all such general minimum piece-rates as fixed by the Wages Council.

PARAGRAPH 24.

Overtime rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or a public holiday customarily observed in the establishment), the number of hours worked exceeds $8\frac{1}{2}$, or in the case of Saturday exceeds $4\frac{1}{2}$ notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.

Provided that where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance on five days a week only, overtime rates shall be payable only where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds $9\frac{1}{4}$.

The provisions of paragraphs 23 and 24 are without prejudice to the payment of overtime rates after a lesser number of hours of work than therein mentioned where such lesser number of hours constitutes the number customarily worked in the establishment.

THE HOURS OF WORK OF WOMEN AND YOUNG PERSONS ARE SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THE FACTORIES ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1938. (a)

EMPLOYMENT OF JUVENILE WORKERS ON PIECE-WORK.

PARAGRAPH 25.

An employer shall, in any case where a learner or other juvenile worker is employed on piece-work during the first six months of his employment in the trade, be deemed to pay remuneration at less than the statutory minimum remuneration unless he shows that such worker has received, in respect of his employment on piece-work in each week during that period, at least the same amount of money as such worker would have been entitled to receive if employed on time-work.

An employer shall, in any case where any such worker is so employed at any time subsequent to the first six months of his employment in the trade, be deemed to pay remuneration at less than the statutory minimum remuneration unless he shows that such worker has, in respect of his employment on piece-work, been paid at piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker (not being a juvenile worker) at least the same amount of money as the appropriate piece-work basis time-rate.

DEFINITIONS

FEMALE LEARNER

PARAGRAPH 26.

For the purpose of the application of the minimum rates set out in paragraph 10 the following definition shall apply :—

A Female Learner is a worker who :—

- (a) is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade (excluding work on Stitching Machines (other than Swiss Embroidery Machines), Vice-Folding, or Hand Smoothing) by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and
- (b) has received a certificate, or has been registered in accordance with the rules from time to time laid down by the Wages Council, or has made an application for such certificate or registration which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration.

Provided that the certification or registration of a learner shall become invalid if at any time during learnership the provisions set out in this Schedule relating thereto are not complied with.

Provided also that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but, in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided further that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this paragraph, a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

A R E A S .

PARAGRAPH 27.

The minimum rates set out under the respective Areas A. and B. shall apply as follows :—

Area A—To workers employed in the County Borough of the City of Belfast and in districts situate not more than 30 miles by rail from Belfast.

Area B—To workers employed in all areas other than A.

G E N E R A L

WAITING TIME.

PARAGRAPH 28.

- (i) A worker shall be entitled to payment of statutory minimum remuneration as set out in this Schedule during all the time during which he is present on the premises of his employer unless he is so present either without his employer's consent express or implied, or for some purpose unconnected with his work and other than that of waiting for work to be given to him to perform.
- (ii) A piece-worker shall during any time during which he is present as aforesaid and is not doing piece-work be entitled to payment of the general minimum time-rate applicable to the workers of the class to which he belongs.
- (iii) Provisions (i) and (ii) above do not apply when—
 - (a) a worker is present on his employer's premises by reason only of the fact that he is resident thereon, or
 - (b) a worker is present on his employer's premises during normal meal times in a room or place in which no work is being done and is not waiting for work to be given to him to perform.

APPLICABILITY OF STATUTORY MINIMUM REMUNERATION.

PARAGRAPH 29.

The statutory minimum remuneration aforesaid applies, subject to the provisions of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945, to workers in relation to whom the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Wages Council (Northern Ireland) operates that is to say workers employed in Northern Ireland in the trade specified in the Schedule to the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Trade, Northern Ireland) (Constitution, Proceedings and Meetings) Regulations, 1924 (a), made by the Ministry of Labour and dated 17th November, 1924, that is to say :—

(1) The making of such articles as are specified in (a) and (b) below, from linen or cotton or mixed linen and cotton fabrics (excepting knitted fabrics) or from other textile fabrics when the work is carried on in establishments mainly engaged in the making of such articles from the before-mentioned fabrics, viz. :—

- (a) Handkerchiefs (including mufflers or flags when made in association or conjunction with handkerchiefs).
- (b) Bed linen, towels, dusters, table napery, bed-spreads, tea-cloths, table-centres, sideboard-covers, cushion-covers or similar household articles.

INCLUDING all or any of the following operations :—

- (i) Hooking, cutting or tearing the material.
- (ii) Vice-folding.
- (iii) Machine hemming, hem-stitching, spoking, over-locking, tambouring, button-holing, and other plain or fancy machine stitching.
- (iv) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework done by machine whether before or after the making of the articles of the description specified above.
- (v) The following processes if done by machine :—Thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring.
- (vi) All processes of laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, finishing, warehousing, packing and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles of the description specified above.

(2) The making up in linen warehouses, or in establishments mainly engaged in linen lapping, of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile fabrics in the piece, or of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile articles cut from the piece, including :—

Measuring, cutting, lapping, ornamenting, boxing, warehousing, packing and similar operations.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

HOLIDAYS AND HOLIDAY REMUNERATION

The Schedule to Order N.I.H.H.G. (82) dated 27th February, 1945, is amended as follows :—

- (a) Any reference to a minimum rate of wages fixed by the Trade Board shall be read as including a reference to statutory minimum remuneration fixed by a wages regulation order pursuant to proposals of the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Wages Council (Northern Ireland), and the reference in paragraph 9 to the Holidays with Pay Act (Northern Ireland), 1938, shall be construed as including a reference to the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945 ; and
- (b) The amount of any holiday remuneration due to any worker under Order N.I.H.H.G. (82) shall be calculated in accordance with the provisions of Part II of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945.

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

1. The First Schedule to this Order sets out the statutory minimum remuneration payable as from 8th April, 1946, to the workers in relation to whom the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Wages Council (Northern Ireland) operates.

2. The Second Schedule amends the Direction for Holidays with Pay confirmed by the Ministry's Order N.I.H.H.G. (82) dated 27th February, 1945, by a number of formal amendments necessitated by the enactment of the Wages Councils Act (Northern Ireland), 1945.

3. The provisions of Orders N.I.H.H.G. (68) and N.I.H.H.G. (80) cease to have effect when the new provisions under this Order come into force.

WHEREAS the Ministry of Labour and National Insurance (hereinafter referred to as " the Ministry ") has received from the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Wages Council (Northern Ireland) wages regulation proposals for the amendment of the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Wages Council (Northern Ireland) Wages Regulation Order, 1946, dated the 2nd day of April, 1946 (a), which said Order fixes the minimum remuneration to be paid to the workers in relation to whom the Council operates ;
