

London, March 4.--Not a single line of news is added to the scanty dispatches received yesterday, and it is evident that received yesterday, and it is evident that a strict consorship is being exercised over the messages from the seat of war. The war office intimated at midnight that there was no prospect of news until something definite shall have been done. This is quite in keeping with the com-plete silence which Lord Roberts has hitherto observed while his plans were in progress of accomplishment, and un-til he is in actual grip with the Boers if is probable that the public will hear little or nothing of his doings.
