### RECAPTURED TRENCHES HELD BY THE FRENCH

German Counter-Attack South of the Somme Was Costly Failure

London, Feb. 12.—The following official statement was issued last night: "We sprang three mines yesterday north of Carnot, and another south of Crater No. 8. To-day the enemy sprang a mine southwest of the Hohenzollern redoubt, but we suffered no casualties. "The enemy artillery has been active to-day north of Albert, north of Loos, and around Ypres. Artillery and Elveringhe were shelled during the day. This afternoon we sprang a mine northeast of Givenchy."

French Report.  
Paris, Feb. 12.—The following official statement was issued last night: "In Belgium our field artillery has seriously damaged a German blockhouse near the Paaschendaal canal and caused the explosion of a depot of ammunition. "In Artois there has been an intermittent cannonade in the region of the Lille road. "To the south of the Somme, during minor fighting on February 8 and 9, we recaptured from the Germans a notable part of the trenches that were in their hands in the region south of Frise. "Yesterday, towards evening, the enemy attempted through a mine counter-attack to force us from the reconquered positions, but our barrier

### GREAT WORK BEING DONE IN BELGIUM

Correspondent of Associated Press—Describes System of Relief Commission

London, Feb. 12.—During a trip of inspection which covered the London, Rotterdam, Brussels and Belgian provincial offices of the commission for the relief of Belgium, a correspondent of the Associated Press was privileged to witness the work which is being carried on. "During its first year of existence it delivered into Belgium and Northern France enough food to keep nine million people alive, involving an approximate expenditure of eighty million dollars, which provided almost one million tons of provisions, with the result that the population of Belgium is today in better than its normal health after one year on the commission's rations. There has been no one of the diseases which result from under-feeding, and there is ample justification for the recent statement of President Wilson that the lives of millions of people have been saved. "Every day, however, the local resources of the country become more and more depleted, particularly in the national livestock, for which the commission must import fodder if the country is not soon to be entirely denuded of these necessities. This means much heavier importations of food. At the same time the charitable purse of the world is getting leaner. Less and less grow the monetary resources of the Belgians themselves, while the greatest difficulty is due to the scarcity of shipping, and at present there is little indication of any remedy for this situation. Belgium is purely a manufacturing country, importing practically all of her food and raw materials except coal. Eighteen months of blockade have exhausted most of the raw material, hence the growing length of the bread line. Not only does the coal and iron and steel industry suffer, but the spinning mills have run out of material after having run two days weekly, for the past year, so clothing as well as food must be imported. Every bleak winter day with an increase in the bread line brings an even greater proportional increase of the destitute in need of clothing.

### ACTIVITY AT NORTH END OF EAST FRONT

All Enemy's Attacks Repulsed by Russians Near South End

Petrograd, Feb. 12.—The following official communication was issued last night: "In the Riga district, between the Mian road and the Iwica river, there has been an active artillery duel. Our artillery at many places dispersed bands of enemy workmen. About three and a half miles southeast of Ikskul two explosions occurred in an enemy battery. "In the region of Ilouksk we exploded a mine under a German blockhouse and occupied the crater. "As a result of a successful reconnaissance in the region south of Lubtcha we destroyed a bridge which the enemy had started to build across the Nibolva. "In Volhynia, near Tchernine, by the combined action of our infantry and artillery, we again repulsed two successive enemy counter-attacks, which were launched after preparation by bombardments with heavy and light artillery. Further south our scouts made useful explorations. "In the region of Isebroff, the enemy attempted to recapture a height which had been taken from him, launching numerically superior forces, who were supported by artillery fire. We maintained possession of the height. "In the Black Sea, our torpedo boats continue to bombard enemy positions in the south region. "In the Caucasus our progress continues, and our fire prevents all attempts by the enemy to resume the offensive."

Vienna Statement.

### INVALID FOR 50 YEARS; DEAD AT AGE OF 68

Miss Mollie Fancher Died in New York Yesterday. Known to Thousands Through Letters.

New York, Feb. 12.—Miss Mollie Fancher, who celebrated her "golden jubilee" as an invalid eight days ago, died yesterday at her home in Brooklyn.

Miss Fancher was known to thousands through the extraordinary correspondence she built up during the half-century of her invalidism. Although bedridden and only able to move her right arm, she worked unceasingly at knitting and embroidery and is said to have used up 100,000 pounds of worsted.

In 1865, when Miss Fancher was 17 years old and noted for her beauty, she was thrown from her horse and injured. A year later she was the victim of a street car accident which deprived her of the use of all her limbs except her right arm.

For nine years she remained in a trance-like condition, during which period her friends insisted she was clairvoyant. It was in these years that she built up her correspondence, dictating 6,500 letters. During the fifty years of her imprisonment in a sick room Miss Fancher's chief nourishment was the juice of fruits.

STATES BEING ROBBED.  
Washington, Feb. 12.—The United States is being "robbed" of between \$16,000,000 and \$17,000,000 through a too liberal attitude on the part of the Panama-United States joint land commission, according to a statement here to-day by Major-General Goethals. Extravagant payments, he told the House commerce committee, are being allowed private landowners whose property is needed for canal purposes.

LINCOLN'S BIRTHDAY.  
New York, Feb. 12.—Lincoln's birthday was observed here by the closing of the stock exchange, the consolidated stock market and the produce and cotton exchanges. Most of the banks also closed, the day being a legal holiday.

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—One of these days I expect to see this question on the order paper under the name of one of the fifty-nine honorary—or otherwise—colonels in the house of commons. How many male members of the Hughes family are not general? If not, why not and when? You see the colonels are keen on strategy and they do not like to think that any smallest fraction of the Hughes talent remains undeveloped. It is not every country that has a whole family of Napoleons. The only reason why Major-General Sam is allowed to waste himself on a desk in the militia department is that there is nobody to take his place, nobody to gather up the tangled threads of detail and handle them as he does. If it were not for that Major-General Sam would have been in the field long ago crushing the enemy. Meanwhile his head is full of strategems which need only to be accepted by General Joffre and General Haig to be completely effective. For instance, in his plan of raising an Orange Brigade made of white horses and thus turning the conflict into a battle of July parade, a Protestant nation like Germany would be just naturally forced to join the procession. Another plan of his is to raise a regiment of parsons who would entangle the Germans in theological discussion and thus give the reserves time to come up. The Germans, being a nation of philosophers, always fall for anything in the shape of metaphysics. Of late the major-general has been thinking seriously of forming a regiment of Uregers. This is the quickest way of bringing the army up to the authorized five hundred thousand. It is a matter of statistics that there is one able-bodied Ureger to every five enlisted men and the nearer that Ureger is to the forty-five age limit the harder he shoots advice at the other fellows. Major-General Sam believes that the Uregers should be given a chance at overseas service. If they are as gallant in the field as they are on the parade the war will not last long. 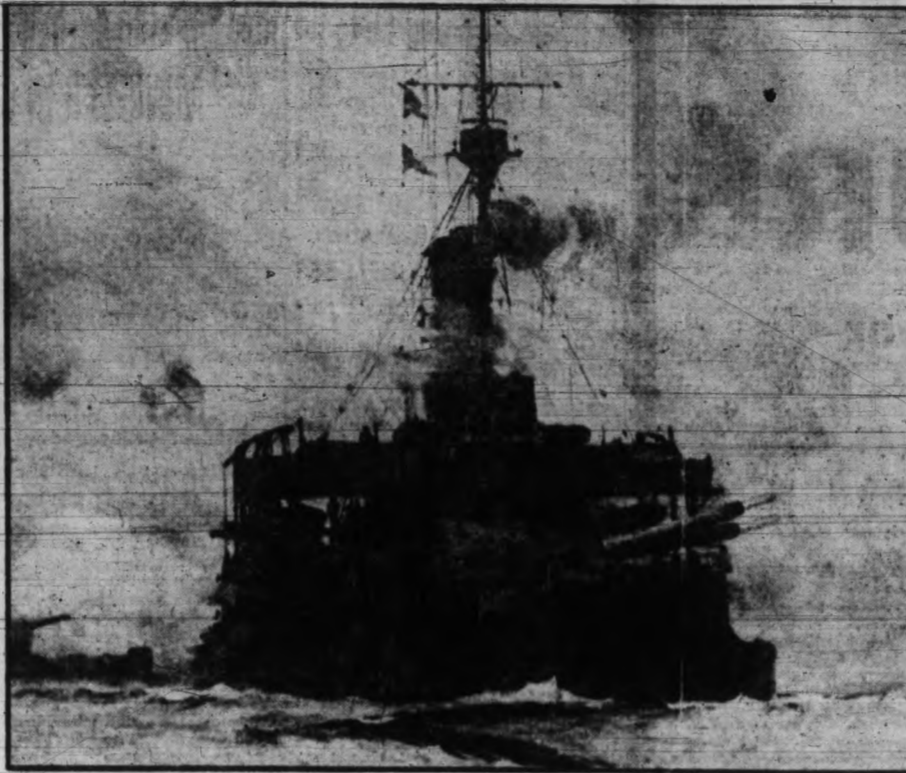
