# THE TREATY MUST BE SIGNED, ALLIES SAY IN REPLY TO GERMANY

Justice Demands Conditions Finally Stated in Communication From Victorious Powers; Allies Will Try Hohenzollern and Other Teutons

Paris, June 17:- The detailed reply of the Peace Conference to the counter-proposals of the Germans which was handed to the German delegation at Versailles yesterday takes up in its order each of the objections made by the enemy delegation to the provisions of the original peace treaty.

Among the modifications which are acceded to by the Conference are frontier rectifications for West Prussia; a plebiscite in upper Silesia, with a guarantee to Germany that she will receive fair treatment in securing mineral products from that region; modifications in the clause relating to finance, economic and waterways phases of the treaty; permission for Germany to retain 200,000 men in her army temporarily, and a promise to furnish Germany within a month with

The tribunals established for the trial of those under charges will represent the deliberate judgment of the greater part of the civilized world, and there can be no question of admitting the right of jurisdiction of representatives of countries which took no part in the war. The accused will be insured full rights of defence. The Allied and Associated Powers are prepared to submit a final list of those with must be handed over to justice within one month of the signing of the treaty.



# NINE MEN TAKEN INTO **CUSTODY EARLY TO-DAY** IN CITY OF WINNIPEG

Men Who Have Been Prominent in Strike Movement Seized by Police and Removed to Penitentiary; Charged With Seditious Conspiracy

Winnipeg, June 17. Acting on authority from the Dominion Government, and armed with warrants issued by the Dominion Government officials, police here at an early hour this morning arrested nine men whom secret service authorities had marked down as leaders of Bolshevist propaganda, according to an official statement issued by Acting Chief of Police C. H. Newton at 10 o'clock this forenoon. It was declared that all of those taken into custody had played a prominent part in the sympathetic strike, now in its fifth week. They were taken to Stony Mountain Penitentiary.

Alcock Says He Nursed Motor of Vickers Vimy Machine

London, June 17.—Hall and snow were encountered at an altitude of 11,000 feet by the Vickers Vimy aeroplane piloted across the Atlantic Ocean from Newfoundland to Ireland by Capt. John Alcock and Lieut. Arthur Brown. The machine became covered with ice by six o'clock in the morning and remained so until an hour before it landed, according to Capt. Alcock. The radiator shutter and water temperature indicator were covered with ice to four or five hours. Lieut. Brown continually had to climp up in the fuselage to chip off the ice with a knife.

The air speed indicator also gave trouble, being full of frozen particles, which came out when the plane descended to a lower altifude an hour before landing.

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#### GERMAN MAJORITY SOCIALISTS VOTE FOR A UNITED GERMANY

Berlin, June 16.—Via London, June 11.—The Majority Socialist Earty conference to-day voted in favor of a united German republic. Other action taken by the conference was:

It voted down the Government project to create a fund of 1,000,000,000 marks, to be obtained by adding an extra hour to the working day, the pay for which would go to the Government. It condemned the recent execution by the Bavarian Government of the Communist legders Levine and Nissen. It voted in favor of the withdrawal of the German troops from Esthonia and Lithuania.

It based a resolution demanding the abolition of the death-penalty.

It rejected a proposal for a soviet constitution for Germany. The proposal received only one vote.

The congress adopted a resolution declining to give pensions to members of former royal families.



#### THEIR LAST WORD.

The terrific indictment with which the Allied and Associated Powers accompanied their last word on the peace terms is a brand which will mark the face of Germany for many generations and which only long years of decent behavior springing from a chastened and penitent spirit will obscure, if not finally erase.

Germany is reminded that she is receiving justice as a criminal at the bar, not as the negotiator. of a compromise or the participant in a council of equals. The arch-conspirator of the awful tragedy of the last five years, the author of the most hideous infamies that ever marked the record of my nation or people, she is told in terms which no glib Casuist in Berlin can becloud and which would wercome with sense of shame any country in which the vestige of a soul or conscience survived, just what her status is in this trial.

Her Government has been trying desperately to stablish a position as an equal negotiator; as one who shares only part responsibility for a war which should be borne by all. Not once has it admitted Germany's guilt as the author of the conflict or expressed regret for the numerous specific instances in which during the war she violated every canon of honor and decency and outraged every law of humanity. It had the impudence to imply that the Allies were as inhumane as Germany and to make counter demands for damages. It even proposed that Germany should act as a nandatory for the former German colonies in the League of Nations.

The indictment of the Allied and Associated Powers given out for publication yesterday puts Germany unmistakably where she belongs-in the prisoner's dock-and the terms she must sign must be signed by her there. More imperative than indemnities or territorial readjustments is the necessity of demonstrating that the days when nations can provoke wars for imperialistic purposes and escape just consequences have gone forever; that when nations become criminal and commit crimes against mankind they must be judged and punished as criminals.

The Allied and Associated Powers have made certain modifications in the terms, but not in any vital particulars. There are to be a plebiscite in Upper Silesia, instead of an immediate cession of this district to Poland, readjustments in the frontier of West Prussia, and the omission of certain sections in the Schleswig plebiscite. Permission is given Germany to have a volunteer army of 200,000, for a time, instead of 100,000 as originally determined. The Reparation Commission to be appointed by the Allies will co-operate with a German commission from whom it will receive suggestions. Germany is promised membership in the League of Nations in the early future, if she fulfills her treaty obligations.

Just what these modifications involve it is impossible to say until a detailed account of their has been studied, but it may be taken for granted that they represent no vital concession from the principles originally set forth in their relation to the future peace of the world and the full measure of justice that Germany must satisfy.

Boys Make Baseball Bats, Wedding Presents, and Are Anxious For Work

#### **EXHIBITION OF WORK** AT ESQUIMALT SCHOOL

ing the manual training classes, an exhibition of work opened yesterday at the Esquiment Public School. Lampson Street. The first day of the exhibition drew a large number of visitors, most of whom were greatly impressed and surprised at some of the skilful work the students had been able to produce. The drawing, relief maps, and tile patterns aroused great admiration among the visitors, but the interest of all mainly centred in he great variety of woodwork done at he benches in the spacious workshop. The articles on exhibition when a representative visited were the products of pupils inter plainly the products of pupils inter-seted in their tasks and fully corrob-orated the statement of the manual trainling and drawing master at the school, F. Waddington, that manual trainling is a pleasure to both the boys and girls who take the course. Speak-ing on the objects of an exhibition he declared "the exhibition tends to em-ulate" compet ion, for if it were not for the exhibitions the children would never see, one another's work. The for the exhibitions the children would never see one another's work. The invitation, extended to the parents, also gives those who take advantage of it an opportunity to judge the work done by their own children by that of other children, and eliminates any false impression they may have of their own children's work.

Selecting a Career.

"It also helps them, if the student has shown any particular talent, to select a career for the boy or girl. It also gives any who care to make the comparison as opportunity of judging the working of the Esquimait School in comparison with the work of other schools in the district.

Regarding the aesthetic taste, manual training teaches them an appreciation of the beautiful in form and color, and develops their inventive faculty, he pointed out.

The girls, Mr. Waddington said, only take the manual training course as far as drawing, and do no bench work. "I think it advisable the girls should be allowed to do bench work," he said, "and know they would appreciate the opportunity."

Formal lettering is included in the course. Some scholars, the instructor stated, found they had a gift for this kind of work which they would never otherwise have discovered. One student, he mentioned, who had first found his ability for this work during the manual training course, was now a successful show card writer in Seattle earning \$400 per month.

"It took more wood than we are allowed," he said, "We are allowed the material for smaller articles, but not for a big one of this, nature. Some days after I had told the boy that he would have to bring his own lumber for an article as large as he wished to make, he attended class with an old six-inch by six-foot fence pole, and he is immensely proud of the result of his work."

Wood Turning.

A wood turning lathe has been necessary to make many of the samples of work on view, and Mr. Waddington, himself has supplied the foot-power lathe on which the work has been done, one enterprising student having made himself a serviceable baseball bat. The lathe is in great demand and taking advantage of the students sagasress; the master uses it as an incentive to neat work. A boy has to make ninety-five per cent. marks before he is allowed to use the lathe, and everyone in the class strives to reach the percentage so that they can make some of the attractive pieces of work that a lathe makes possible. "It is no trouble getting the students interested in manual training. They come to me howling for work and asking for something to do at home," Mr. Waddington remarked.

Some of the parents give their children tools for presents, and most of them prefer them to toys. One of the boys to-day brought a mitre cutter to class which his parents had bought him to be shown how to use it.

The berich work is done in a well-lighted workshop removed from the school a sufficient distance for the noise not to reach the other class rooms. There are twenty-four solid benches, each with two vises, and equipped with a brass rule, square, marking guage, chisel, tennon saw, and Jack plane. Other tools not so generally used are provided for general use, but not provided to each benche A grindstone is also included in the equipment of the workshop, and the boys are taught, how to sharpen tools and see and file a saw.
