# A QUESTION FOR THE LEGISLATURES

Right to Enact Legislation on Eight-hour Day Is Theirs

Ottawa, March 3,— (Canadian Press)—The right to enact legislation on the eight-hour day is in the hands of the Provincial Governments, it is announced by the Minister of Labor in connection with the application of one of the provinces for a ruling on the subject, The position is that the Federal Government has jurisdiction under its treaty-making rights to enact such legislation as may be necessary to give effect to the provisions of any international treaty if the Provincial Legislatures do not see fit to act in the matter.

In connection with the National Industrial Conference of last September, when legislation on the eighthour day appeared to be of purely domestic concern, it was proposed to refer to the Supreme Court of Canada the jurisdiction of the Federal Parliament and the Provincial Legislatures in governing hours of employment. The adoption subsequently in Washington by the International Labor Conference of a draft convention on the subject of the eight-hour day in industrial employment has changed the situation somewhat, it is said in the Minister of Labor's announcement to-day. # PREMIER WILL MEET HANES ON SATURDAY

Will Debate P. G. E. on Platform at North Vancouver As Per Challenge

Ottawa, March 3.—The report as to Sir Robert Borden's condition and his plans brought back to Ottawa from New York yesterday by Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways, and Hon. J. A. Calder, Minister of Immigration and Colonization, is expected to go a long way toward clearing the political atmosphere of a certain tinge of uncertainty which has prevalled for the past few weens. Unionist members who heard the report that Sir Robert was somewhat improved in health but had decided to go on with his plans for a trip to the South, expressed relief, coupled with the hope that the Prime Minister would soon be sufficiently recovered to resume his duties here.

Members of the Opposition, when discussing the report, were of the opinion that it meant another couple of months of practically leaderless drifting. However, they were anxious to learn of the Prime Minister's condition and equally solicitous as to his welfare. Apparently accepting the challenge of George S. Hanes, Liberal member for North Vancouver, to appear on the public platform and discuss Pacific Great Eastern Railway af-fairs, Premier Oliver this morning arranged to speak on the public platarranged to speak on the public plat-form in North Vancouver Saturday night, March 6. The Government Leader received the following tele-gram upon his arrival at his office to-day from W. D. McFarland, President of the North Vancouver Liberal

"As you are quoted in the press as promising to meet George S. Hanes "P.P., in his own constituence" on the public platform, we take this opportunity of inviting you and welcoming you to the city of North Vancouver. Kindly advise the

Berlin, March 2.—Via London, March 3.—The first step to deprive William Hohenzollern former Kalser of Germany of his property and fortune began in earnest to-day when the motion of the Majority Socialists of the Diet to refer the issue to the National Assembly precipitated an acrimonious debate. The Majority Socialists voted with the Independents in denunciation of the former ruler in an effort to defeat the proposed settlement by accomplishing the confiscation of the Hohenzollern possessions. This would be done through constitutional amendment, voting the former Kaiser a fixed sum for his maintenance.

# SIR T. A. STUART DIES IN SYDNEY

Distinguished Physician and Scientist Was on Australian University Staff

Sydney, N.S.W., March 2.—The death was announced to-day of Sir Thomas Anderson Stuart, distinguished physician and scientist and Dean of the Faculty of Medicine in the University of Sydney. He was born in Scotland in 1856.

Sir Thomas achieved wide publicity when he organised the expedition of the Royal Society of London to Funatuti, an island of the Ellice group in the Pacific Ocean. The expedition, by boring to a depth of 1,000 feet in coral rock, obtained confirmation of the Darwinian theory of reef formation.





## ANNUAL REPORT OF POSTMASTER-GENERAL

Ottawa, March 3.—The report of the Postmaster-General, which was tabled in the Commons yesterday afternoon, shows a net revenue for the fiscal year 1918-19 of \$21,602,712, an increase of \$257,318, as against an expenditure of \$19,273,583, an increase of \$1,227,026. The surplus of revenue for the fiscal year over expenditure was \$2,329,128.

There were on March 31, 1919, 12,-290 post offices in operation in the Dominion. New offices opened during the year numbered 130, while 462 were closed, chiefly because of the extension of rural mail delivery routes. Of these, thirty-one new ones were inaugurated during the year, making a total of 3,703 in operation. making a total of 3,702 in operation.

The amount of money withdrawn and savings accounts closed during the year at the post office savings banks were both greater than in the preceding twelve months. Fewer new accounts were content with the preceding twelve months. Fewer new accounts were opened, and this is thought largely to be due to investment being made in Victory loans. The balance at the credit of depositors on March 31, 1919, was \$41,654,360.

Fair Prices Act Unsound, Says Robson, Who Left Com-

Ottawa, March 2. - (Canadian Press)-When the House adjourned ast night, Sir George Foster tabled

last night, Sir George Foster tabled the correspondence between himself and Judge Robson covering the latter's resignation as chairman of the Board of Commerce. Judge Robson stated simply that he found it impossible to remove his home to Ottawa and that his presence was required in Winnipeg. The Acting Prime Minister, in his acknowledgment, accepted Judge Robson's resignation with regret.

On the same day as he resigned, February 23, Judge Robson wrote a long letter to the Acting Prime Minister giving his views on the operation of the Board of Commerce. He suggested that a Federal machine to inquire into costs and profits of commodities and to act in an advisory capacity to provincial boards would be more useful than the Board as constituted at present, the matter of dealing with profiteers being better left, the judge thought, to the provincial authorities.

"The economic policy of the country," Judge Robson wrote, "should be toward high prices and against low prices. Numerous Governmental agencies, at the expense of the people of Canada, are doing their best to get the highest world price for Canadian products. In view of this, any machinery to reduce the prices of this produce is simply abortive." Higher Prices.

The Combines and Fair Prices Act, Judge Robson added, had been administered by the Board to deal only with the necessaries of life, and profiteers in other commedities were left to do as they picased. The effect appeared to be to deter business, men from dealing in such necessaries of life on which, the judge pointed out, dealers had a right to get the highest prices possible in the export market.

# **NEW PROPOSAL FOR SOLDIER SETTLEMENT**

Men For Sayward District to Receive Bulk Contract, With Advances

repart with regard to soldier co-operative settlement in the Sayward District, which was recently issued to the applicants from the Land Settle-ment Board, J. E. Armishaw, before leaving to-day for his home, has been

leaving to-day for his home, has been able to advance his project in an unexpected way.

He has succeeded in obtaining 320 acres as an experiment in the heart of the Sayward settlement, which will be expropriated by the Land Settlement Board. On this land it is proposed to locate a limited number of men, who will take a contract for the clearing in bulk. This policy thus differs from the Merville scheme, where the men are paid \$4 per day, and are expected to put in a standard eight-hour day.

Mr. Armishaw says the Minister of Agriculture is prepared to extend this proposal if the men who will go up on the next steamer make good, and if the contract system demonstrates an improvement on the daily wage plan. The men who will go into the district this week are practical agriculturists, and Mr. Armishaw declares that the problem of securing the Federal aid which has arisen elsewhere will be solved in this effort by requiring a certificate as to experience as farmers from the ex-soldiers before they commence land clearing operations.

The black upon which the experiment in the Salmon River Valley is to be tried is well located, and contains a typical growth of timber. As a sawmill equipment is now being taken into the valley from Vancouver, the men will be able to secure cut lumber for building at a reasonable figure. It is proposed for the purpose of the scheme to provide a donkey engine, and with the river flowing through the selection, the logs as fallen can be floated down to the sea, and towed to the paper plants at Powell River, and elsewhere. Most of the valuable tumber on the selection being spruce, there is a great demand for logs in the paper plants. As some of the men will not have the available funds to carry on until some land is cleared, and under cultivation, it is proposed by the Minister to allow them to secure advances against their contracts meanwhile. If the experiment succeeds there is a considerable area in the valley which can be secured for settlement under practically similar conditions, and

# Three Passengers Died of Influenza; Others Are Ill

Nippon Liner Suwa Maru Quarantined at William G.T.P. Steamers Switching for Head on Arriving From Yokohama; Two Bodies Buried at Sea; Third Passenger Died This Morning.

With three of her passengers dead and seven others afflicted with influenza, the Nippon Yusen Kaisha liner Suwa Maru, Capt. Shimidzu, is moored at William Head. The vessel will be detained there for three days, provided no further cases are reported. If the epidemic on board cannot be stamped out the Suwa will be further detained. She will have to remain in quarantine three days after the last case is reported.

The Suwa Maru dropped anchor off William Head during the night, completing a very eventful.

night, completing a very eventful passage from Honkkong and Yokohama. Word was sent ashore of the distressing conditions which existed aboard and Dr. Nelson, quarantine officer, took charge and arranged to have the Suwa docked at the station immediately after the C. P. O. S. liner Empress of Japan finished em-barking coolfes at noon.

Two Died at Sea.

Shortly after Jeaving Yokohama the first symptons of the outbreak of the epidemic were discovered. One of the passengers was taken suddenly ill, and after a short struggle against the disease died. 
