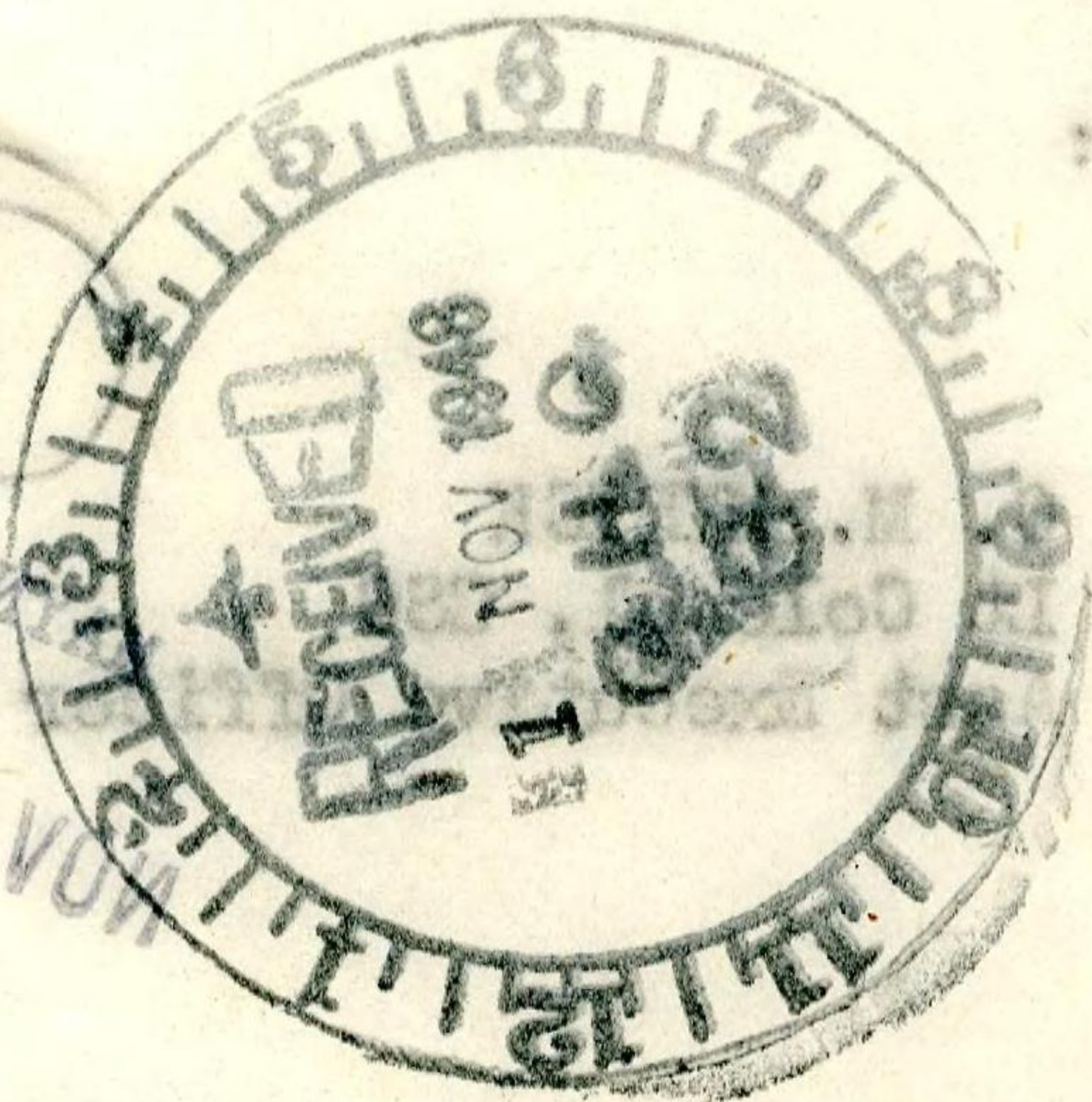

## SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SUBJECT: ARAKAWA Shigeo

1. The following information has been obtained from a usually reliable source concerning background and activities of ARAKAWA Shigeo:

a. Subject's address is Tochigi-ken, Utsunomiya-shi, Shukugocho, #535, c/o Okabe (fnu) (Communist Affiliation Unknown). In April 1948 ARAKAWA was discharged from his duties as second navigator of the Bogota-Maru by Morishita Masakoshi (Anti-Communist), Kagawa-ken, Tadotsushi, former captain. Morishita reported to the Civil Merchant Maritime Committee Office in Sasebo that ARAKAWA was a trouble maker. ARAKAWA spent much of his time trying to promote Communism aboard the Bogota-Maru and other ships.

b. At the time of ARAKAWA's discharge he had returned with the Bogota-Maru from the Oshima Islands, where he met Nakamura Yasutaro (Japanese) (known Member of Japan Communist Party), editor of the Atsumi Times, a newspaper distributed throughout the Oshima Islands. Nakamura requested that ARAKAWA bring back as much Communist literature to the Oshima Islands as was available in Japan. When ARAKAWA was discharged, he requested that Tomioka Tomoo (Japanese) (Known Member of Japan Communist Party), an employee of the Sasebo Branch of the All Japan Seamen's Union, procure this literature and give it to Kodama Tokimi (Japanese) (Sympathizer and Possible Member of Japan Communist Party), purser aboard the Bogota-Maru, who would in turn bring this literature to Nakamura. When the ship arrived at Nase Port, Oshima Islands, on 15 August 1948, Kodama was arrested for smuggling Communist literature into the Islands. Ofuji Kazuhiko (Japanese) (Communist Affiliation Unknown), third navigator, was summoned as a witness. It is believed that Kodama and Ofuji are still interned at Nase. When Tomioka learned of Kodama's arrest, he expressed regret, and stated that this arrest was due to the narrow minded attitude of the Americans towards Communism. Tomioka further stated that Kodama was an ardent sympathizer of the Communist Party, and brought this literature to the Oshima Islands in hope that it might start a "democratic" movement.

2. On 4 October 1948, four separate completely reliable sources stated that present whereabouts of ARAKAWA Shigeo could not be determined.

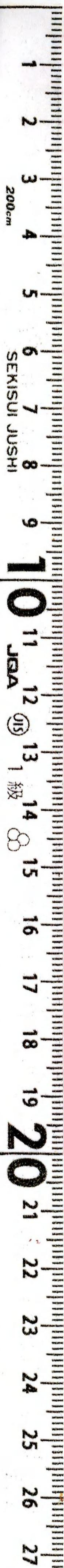

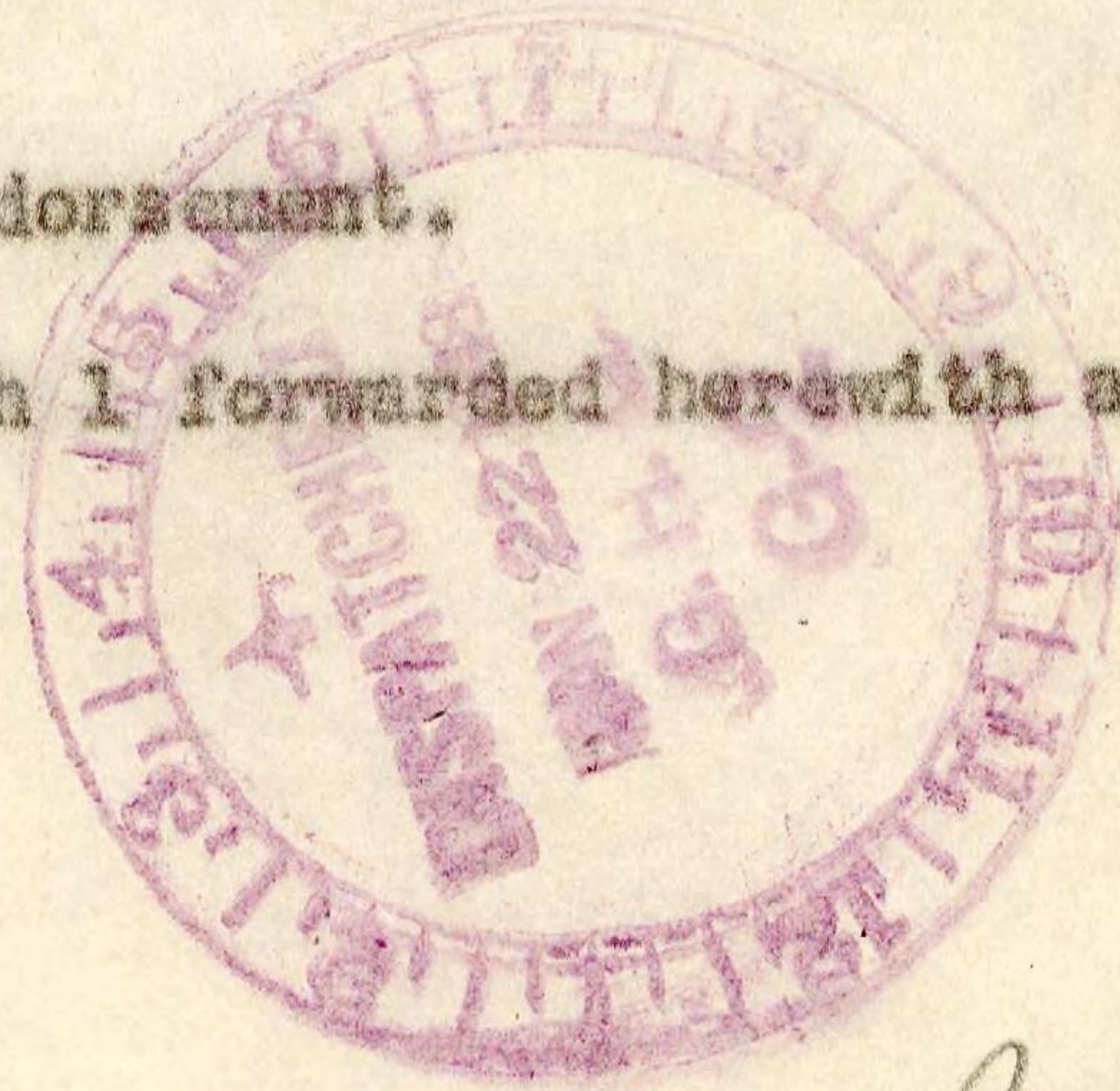

An American radio engineer aboard the ship Steel King confided to a confidential informant of this detachment that he is a member of the Communist Party in the United States, and that in the past he had aided in the publication of a communist newspaper in America. Through his affiliation with this paper he met an American who was very active in the party and who at the present time is residing in Manila, Philippine Islands.

b. The agent for the Steel King was the International Harvester Company. The only radio operator aboard according to the crew list was Richard BISHOP, age 43, born in California, his U. S. Certificate Number is Z-369487. BISHOP claims that he contacts the American communists now residing in Manila whenever the Steel King is in the Manila port.

SUMMARY OF INFORMATION:

1. Investigation was initiated by Civil Intelligence Section, G-2, Far East Command, upon receipt of information that Subject had stated he desired to renounce his American citizenship and return to Russia.

a. On 21 August 1947, a check of the files of Crews and Manning Section, Operations, Second Major Port, revealed the following information:

BELIAEFF, Andrew

Born: 29 July 1896 at Moscow, Russia.  
Citizenship: United States (Russia).  
Entered United States: 1 August 1921.  
Naturalized: New York in January 1939.  
Naturalization Certificate: No. 4323669.  
Married: 26 February 1936 to Henrietta Annie BELIAEFF, American citizen.  
Served in Russian Army: 1915 to 1918.  
Served in American Army: 1922 to 1925 at Chanute Field, Illinois.  
Discharged "Without Specification".  
Present address of wife: 72 East 118th Street, New York, N.Y.  
Signed contract and Loyalty Affidavit at New York, 29 March 1947.  
Shipped to Japan as Third Assistant Engineer, serving as temporary Second Assistant Engineer.  
Served as full time Second Assistant Engineer.  
Served aboard USAT "Wall and Crown" from 6 May 1947 to 21 July 1947.  
From duty to sick leave on 22 July 1947.  
To duty, 1 August 1947; assigned to TY 481 as Second Assistant Engineer.

b. An affidavit (Exhibit I) by HARRIS, Andrew D., Chief Engineer, USAT "Wall and Crown", dated 26 April 1948, to the effect that BELIAEFF had related his intentions of renouncing United States citizenship and returning to Russia, was obtained. An interview with HARRIS also revealed that Subject was mentally incompetent and was given to violent fits of temper.

c. An interview with SCULLEY, Michael A., Chief Mate, USAT "Wall and Crown", 24 April 1948, revealed that Subject did not get along with some members of the Engine Department for unknown reasons. SCULLEY had always called Subject the "Mad Russian" because he gave the impression of hating the Russians.

d. On 26 April 1948, PODOBNIK, Tony V., Chief Mate aboard the TY 485, and REMOY Johan A., Captain, USAT "Reneon", were interviewed and affidavits (Exhibits II and III) obtained from them related Subject's intentions to renounce United States citizenship and return to Russia.

e. On 3 May 1948, COLLINGS, J., ATS Crews and Manning Section, Operations, Second Major Port, Yokohama, was interviewed, and he stated in substance that BELIAEFF's contract had expired as of March 1948, and COLLINGS intended to send Subject back to the United States just as soon as a replacement could be found. This would probably take 30 days or less. COLLINGS further stated that a Mr. COX, who claimed to be a liaison man between Korea and Military Government, had offered Subject a job at a CAF-12 rating. However, COLLINGS informed COX that this was impossible inasmuch as BELIAEFF would not be released from his contract until after he had been returned to the United States. Cox was also told by COLLINGS that Subject was not a dependable man, being loud and having an overbearing manner. In an earlier interview COLLINGS had stated that Subject had told him of a proposed trip to Russia on an official mission, but COLLINGS would not sign an affidavit because he could not remember enough of the earlier conversation. COLLINGS reiterated that as far as he was concerned BELIAEFF would be returned to the United States just as soon as possible.

f. A check of the Yokohama Directory revealed that the above mentioned "Cox" was COX, Frank J., Eighth Army, Engineer, L-4, XXIV Corps, Liaison Officer.

g. In an interview with COX on 4 May 1948, the following information was obtained: COX travels between Yokohama and Korea recruiting personnel for the Engineers. In a search for an engineer with Diesel experience to work on one of the Electric Barges installed by the United States Army in Korea, BELIAEFF was approached and offered the job. The original purpose of these barges was to supply Southern Korea with electric power in the event the power was cut off from the North. After receiving two telegrams acknowledging acceptance from BELIAEFF, COX made a routine investigation on the background of Subject. During the course of this investigation COX called COLLINGS and was informed by the latter that Subject was a White Russian and frequently associated with Russians when he took trips to Korea. Because of this information, and the sensitivity of the job in question, BELIAEFF was informed that the job had been filled.

2. Investigation was requested of the Commanding Officer, 971st Counter Intelligence Corps Detachment, to record the activities of

Subject while in Korea. The following information was furnished:

a. Subject arrived at Inchon Harbor on 4 October 1947, aboard the USAT "Bowline Reefer" which had departed from the Second Major Port, Yokohama, Japan.

b. Subject visited the offices of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, XXIV Corps, on 4 October 1947, and was shown to a Lt Colonel CHOINSKI, Assistant G-2. BELIAEFF then stated that he had come to see about getting a job for which he was interviewed in July with the Criminal Investigation Division. Subsequently, Subject was heard to brag, "I'm getting into something bigger than CID--CIS, Counter Intelligence Service!"

c. Subject spent much of his time with a SAELTZER, Mary, DAC, employed in the Department of Public Health and Welfare, Military Government, Seoul, Korea. BELIAEFF stated that he had known SAELTZER for approximately 11 years and that she knew him backwards and forwards.

d. A search of Subject's quarters on the "Bowline Reefer" revealed a number of names and addresses, listed as follows:

- (1) J. E. Courtney, 262 Woodline Street, Brooklyn, New York.
- (2) Several letters addressed to Subject from Mary SAELTZER in which the latter spoke of "marriage" to Subject and the possibility of a job with the Counter Intelligence Corps or Criminal Investigation Division in Korea, with emphasis that the Counter Intelligence Corps was the best possible place of employment.
- (3) A letter addressed to Lillian Stepka, 442 East 77th Street, New York City, New York, (with whom Subject corresponds regularly) in which Subject tells "Lil" to tell P.F. Zimmerman to take Subject's papers and books and store them in a school at 237 East 37th Street, New York City, New York.
- (4) Also found in Subject's quarters was an employment card issued by the Port authorities in Seattle, Washington, bearing title: Seamen's Employment Card - Serial No. PAN 905, and stating Subject was entitled to work on ships of Panamanian registry. This card bore a notation on the top right-hand corner: "Examine for Security, DC, GO, 12th ND, 9 Jan. 1945" (possibly Office of Naval Intelligence, 12th Naval District.

BELIAEFF showed me a letter that he claimed contained the details of the trip to Vladivostok, but did not allow me to read the contents. All that I remember, concerning the letter,, was an address, which was on the paper that BELIAEFF removed from the envelope. The address is as follows: Room 419, Banton Hotel, Vladivostok Russia.

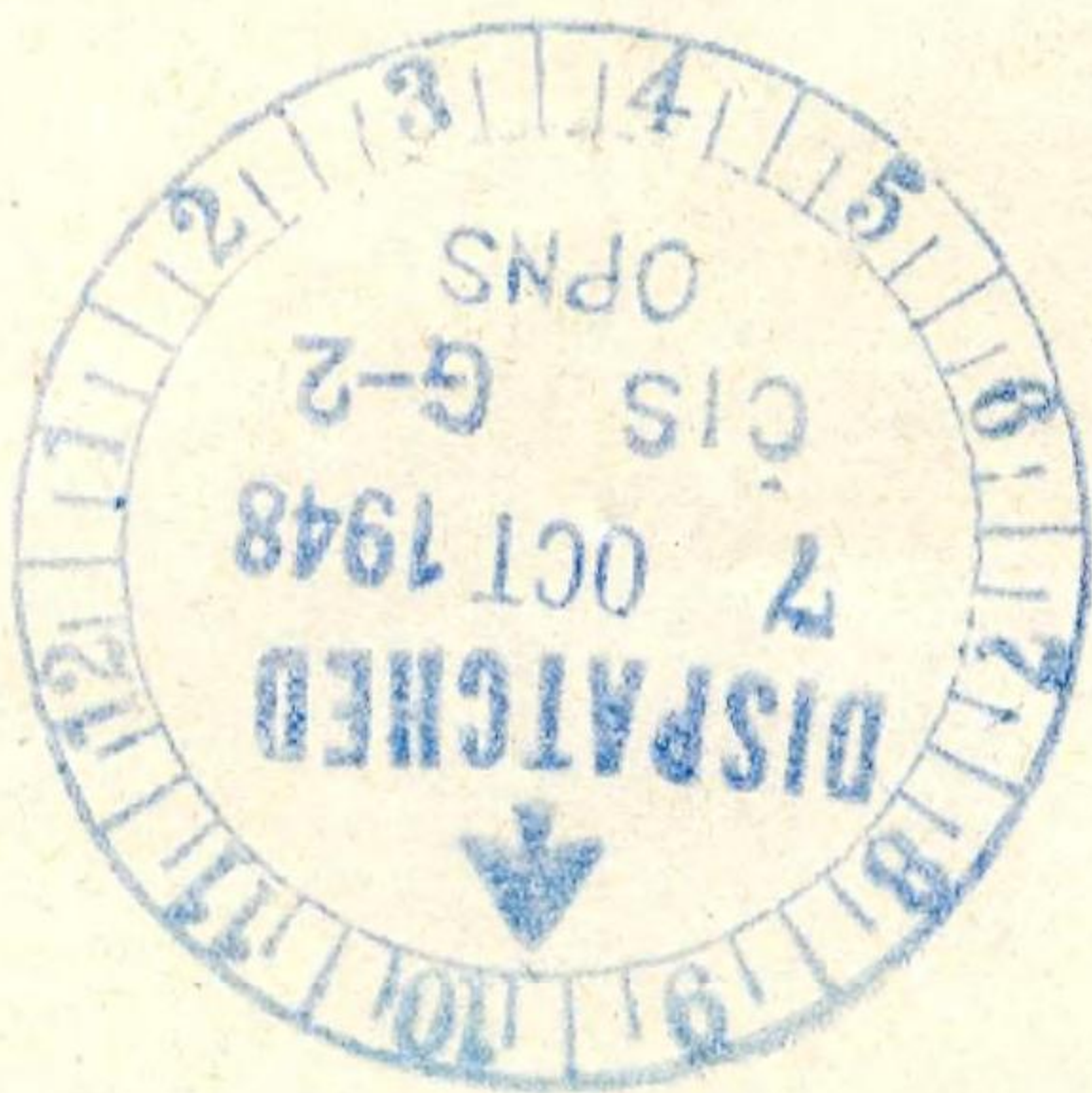

**SUMMARY OF INFORMATION****SUBJECT: COUNG-De, Prince**

1. This is the second Summary of Information concerning subject and his activities on behalf of the independence of Viet Nam, French Indo-China. The first Summary, subject as above, was dated 8 September 1948.

2. COUNG-De was re-interviewed on 10 September 1948 and offered the following chronological history of his efforts to obtain freedom of the Viet Nameese people from French rule. It must be pointed out however, that the following has been accepted on its face value and has not been checked through any other source.

a. In 1906 subject's followers needed arms and ammunition to carry on their fight for the independence of Annam against the French forces. Since he believed the Japanese Government had a large surplus of war material, left over from the then recently concluded Russo-Japanese war, and that he would have little trouble in obtaining the arms and ammunition required, he left Annam for Japan.

b. In Japan, subject's contacts in the obtaining of arms were Prince OSUMI and INUKI Tsuyoshi, both of whom were officials of the Japanese Government. The Japanese were generally agreeable to the proposition of furnishing the needed material. They claimed, however, that their losses of materials during the war had been great and the requested equipment would have to be manufactured. Subject waited from 1906 until 1910 for the Japanese to fulfill their promise, and during that period attended and graduated from the Waseda University.

c. In 1910 the French Government learned of his efforts and the purpose of his being in Japan. The French Government then requested the Japanese Government to arrest subject and turn him over to them for prosecution in the French Courts. The Japanese, not wishing to incur the disfavor of the French, from whom they were negotiating a loan, issued a warrant for his arrest, but subject's Japanese friends notified him of the order for his arrest and he fled from Japan to China. During the period 1910-1912 he visited Hong Kong and Shanghai in an attempt to gain support to his cause. While in Hong Kong, he attended Middle School for one year, studying English.

d. In 1913 subject smuggled himself into Saigon, spending three months there, during which time he obtained some money and men. At the end of the three months, he returned to Hong Kong and established a revolutionary headquarters whose primary task was to secure arms, ammunition and bombs. The police, however, raided the headquarters, confiscated the bombs and arrested one of Coung-De's men. The arrested man told the police the weapons were to be used to assassinate Coung-De, whereupon the man was released with a small fine. Later, subject went to the police and complained that they had treated the plot to assassinate him too lightly and released the confessed would-be assassin with only a small fine. The police, however, knowing the true situation, arrested subject and sentenced him to ten (10) days and a fine of \$2,000. Subject left Hong Kong in May 1913 and went to Amoi and Singapore to further his cause.

e. In September 1913, subject and three of his subordinates left Singapore for London, however, when the ship docked at Naples,

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Italy, they left the ship. One of his subordinates assumed the identity of subject and proceeded to London in an attempt to maintain secrecy of subject's movements. Subject toured Italy, Germany and France and finally arrived in London in November 1913. He intended to stay in London for five years, but after a few months received word through the Chinese Delegates in London that YUAN Shih-kai of China had agreed to aid and assist his cause if subject would return to China immediately. Subject arrived in China in March 1914 only to find that World War I had commenced and that it was therefore impossible for China to take on any added responsibilities, such as lending him aid in his revolutionary plans.

f. Subject returned to Japan in 1915 and again endeavored to purchase arms and ammunition. He was unsuccessful in this attempt, as Japan was making certain demands upon China and as a result thereof was in a state of preparedness and therefore not willing to reduce her strength by the release of war materials. Nevertheless, he continued his efforts until 1918, when every country had refused him aid on the basis that France was considered victorious and a major power. Subject would not give up, and traveled continually between China, Siam and Japan. In all these countries his efforts met with the same refusal--all the nations were too busy with their own internal affairs to offer outside assistance. Subject avers, however, that in 1925 he received a tentative promise of aid from one of SUN Yat-sen's political advisers names KWONG. Unfortunately, however, shortly thereafter, KWONG died and the promise with him.

g. Subject then in 1938 proceeded to Chungking for the purpose of making a personal plea to Chiang Kai-shek. Chiang was sympathetic, but was too busy with the Sino-Japanese problems to lend material or support to a revolution in French-Indo-China.

h. Subject returned to Hong Kong in 1938, where he contacted his friends as a last resort for his seemingly lost cause. While there the Japanese bombed the city and he was reported to the police as a Japanese spy. He immediately fled Hong Kong and returned to Japan.

i. After subject's return to Japan, he abandoned his efforts on behalf of the Viet Nam independence, and from September 1943 to March 1944, taught Annamese to the students of Dr. OKAWA's School, which was part of the Far East Economics Investigation Bureau. Since the occupation of Japan, subject has endeavored to enlist the aid of the United States and has written two letters to General MacArthur requesting his permission to go to Hong Kong for the purpose of assisting the Viet Nam independence movement and the stamping out of Communism, in French Indo-China.

j. Subject has petitioned the Chinese Residents Association in Japan for a permit to enter Hong Kong on or about 2 October 1948. He has used many aliases during his stay in Japan, and at present, is registered with the Chinese Residents Association under the name of LIN Shun-te. The action contemplated by the Chinese Residents Association in the matter of his exit and entry request is not known at the present time.

3. Additional information, when received concerning Subject or the independence movement of the Viet Annamese will be reported in an additional summary of information.

## SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SUBJECT: COUNG-De, Prince

1. Coung-De is reported to be a prince who fled from Viet Nam about 1905 and went into exile in Japan. While in Japan he is alleged to have taken a Japanese wife and lived under various aliases during the period of years. Since his exile, however, he has assiduously worked to gain the independence of Viet Nam and his activities came into light about 1 February 1948 when he wrote a letter to General MacArthur stating that he has been a promoter for the Viet Nam independence for the past forty-five years and now that the independence is about to be granted, he desired a passport to enable him to go to Hong Kong, China, and assist the Ex-Emperor Bao Dai in stamping out Communism in his former country.

2. The above information was brought to the attention of the Department of the Army in radio NR: 62, dated 12 March 1948. The Department of the Army replied by radio NR: WAR SVC 5199 to the effect that information on file indicated that during the war there was evidence that the Japanese contemplated installing Coung-De in place of Bao Dai. The radio further indicated that the details of this arrangement were unclear and requested any further data on the matter be forwarded when available.

3. Based upon the request of Coung-De for a passport, he was interviewed at Tokyo on 20 May 1948 as to his reasons for wanting to leave Japan. He stated that through a friend and co-worker he received word that Bao Dai, now in Hong Kong, had expressed a desire to join forces with Coung-De for a united French Indo-China. Since this was what Coung-De had been working for all these years, he therefore wished to obtain permission to leave Japan and meet Bao Dai in Hong Kong. Coung-De further stated that the present President of Viet Nam at Hanoi, Ho Tsi Ming, (胡志明) was a Communist and that unless this influence was checked the whole of his country would be communized. At the time this statement was taken, Coung De was living under the name LIN Shun-Tei (林順德) and had in his possession a Chinese certificate of registration claiming nativity in Canton Province, China. In view of the Chinese registration of Coung-De under the name of LIN Shun-Tei, he was advised that in order to secure an exit permit from Japan procedure required that he initiate the request through the Chinese Mission in Japan.

4. Coung-De was again interviewed on 27 July 1948 as information had been received that the French were interested in getting him to Anam and electing him President. As Coung-De had always been fighting the French for the independence of his country, he believed it would be poor policy for him to accept French sponsorship in a presidential campaign. He stated he would much rather have the backing of the Chinese, as their interests were also in French Indo-China. With this in mind, he had approached the Chinese Mission in Japan with a proposal for their aid. At the time this information was received, Coung-De was using the alias of YUAN Fu-Ming, but presented a namecard with "Prince Coung-De, Chairman of the Viet Nam Restoration League, Indo-China" written in English.

5. Coung-De was very cooperative during the interview and talked quite freely on the present situation in Anam. He stated that the situation was quite complicated as there are three political factions in Anam. This

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is further complicated by the fact that immediately following the war the French agreed to permit Indo-China to form an independent government and to hold elections. When the time came, however, the French failed to keep the agreement and in June of 1948 established, without consulting the other factions, a government under SUN Chun, (Kanji not available) an Annamese. A second faction of the government was under HU Chi-ming (胡志明). HU's faction is outwardly an independence group, but Coung-De avers it is really a Communist sponsored organization. The third faction is that of Bao Dai, the former Emperor. This group is allegedly independent, but is on friendly terms with the French and HU.

6. With regard to SUN Chun, Coung-De stated that he was a former Major General in the French Army of Indo-China, who was born and educated in France and had a French wife. The French placed SUN at the head of the Puppet Government called the Central Government of Indo-China which had only the support of the pro-French factions. It is believed, however, that there have been some negotiations between SUN and HU but Coung-De doubts if they will ever come to any agreement.

7. HU Chi-ming is reported to have been in Russia for about ten years and a member of the Communist Party. In 1945, HU is alleged to have met with Chiang Kai-shek at Essunan and prevailed upon Chiang to allow him to enter French Indo-China as a member of the Chinese Army which was then engaged in fighting the Japanese in that sector. Chiang, not knowing of HU's Communist affiliations, agreed with the understanding that when the Chinese troops withdrew, HU was to set up an independent government and engage in guerrilla warfare against the French. HU, receiving funds from Russia, was able to obtain native backing since he was considered the only strong force engaged in fighting the French for the independence of the country. HU is alleged to have surrounded himself with his friends and to have placed them in the key positions of the HU government. HU is still attempting to conceal his Communist connections as he is heading an independence movement. It is well known in close circles, however, that this group is Communist and is spreading and expanding the Communist doctrines throughout the country.

8. a. BAO Dai, Emperor of Anam prior to the war, abdicated when the Japanese occupied the area. He is reported to be in Switzerland where he is negotiating with the French for the complete independence of Anam. Coung-De stated that the negotiations are being held in Geneva. The first conference was alleged to have been held between February and May 1948. The second conference was alleged to have started 8 June 1948 and to be in session at the present time. Coung-De avers that BAO Dai has asked him to return to Anam if these negotiations are successful and assist him in the formation of a government.

b. BAO Dai's demands on the French are alleged to be as follows:

- (1) An Annamese representative to the League of United Nations.
- (2) Control of the Annamese Army (part of which is French Foreign Legion).
- (3) Diplomatic recognition for Anam.

c. Coung-De further states that, through an intermediary in Hong Kong, he has been advised that the French are favorably reacting to BAO's proposition and want to place BAO back as Emperor with he (Coung De) as advisor and SUN as Prime Minister.

9. The foregoing is reported in the order in which it was related by Coung-De during the interview as information received by him through the medium of friends and communications. With this data at hand, Coung-De went to General SHANG Chen, Chief of the Chinese Mission in Japan, in an

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endeavor to enlist their aid in his behalf and obtain the backing of the Chinese Government. General SHANG is alleged to have forwarded the request of Coung-De to China which CHIANG Kai-shek ignored. Coung-De's analysis of the Chinese action is that CHIANG burned his fingers when he gave HU support during the war and he does not wish to become involved with HU, who is a Communist, and SUN, who is supported by the French.

10. Coung-De further relates that he is on very friendly terms with the French Mission in Japan and that they frequently ask his advise on matters pertaining to French Indo-China. When the interviewer asked who, in the French Mission, had contacted him, he side-stepped the question and changed the subject.

11. Lastly, Coung-De stated that, in order to bring about economic independence for Anam, he is desirous of interesting American capital in the development of Anam through trade and management. This, together with the political independence that they hope to achieve through BAO Dai's negotiations, would enable an independent Anam to have strength to exist.

12. A check of censorship coverage of the correspondence of Coung-De reveals that he is in constant communication with the following:

Envelope postmarked 6 January 1948 enclosed letter written in German which apparently Mrs. Victor was forwarding to Subject for writer who signed as "Heidi" and who is presently living in Germany. (Note: It is known that a former close friend of Subject's, one Adelheid BEYER, was repatriated to Germany from Japan as objectionable on 15 February 1947. Text of letter leaves little doubt that BEYER wrote the letter in question.) Contents of envelope postmarked 19 January 1948 unknown.
- b. Mr. Richard KNORR, 39-83 49th Street, Sunnyside 4, Long Island, N.Y., envelope postmarked 10 June 1947. Contents of envelope unknown.
- c. Lt. Col. W. V. R. FREETS, Army-Navy Hospital, Hot Springs, Arkansas - Letter postmarked 26 February 1948. Contents of envelope unknown.

4. Request that aforementioned persons be interrogated with a view to determining what they know about Subject and his activities, where and when they met Subject, etc. It is probable, since Subject consistently used the alias cited above, that they will know him as SANDERS rather than ECKELMANN.

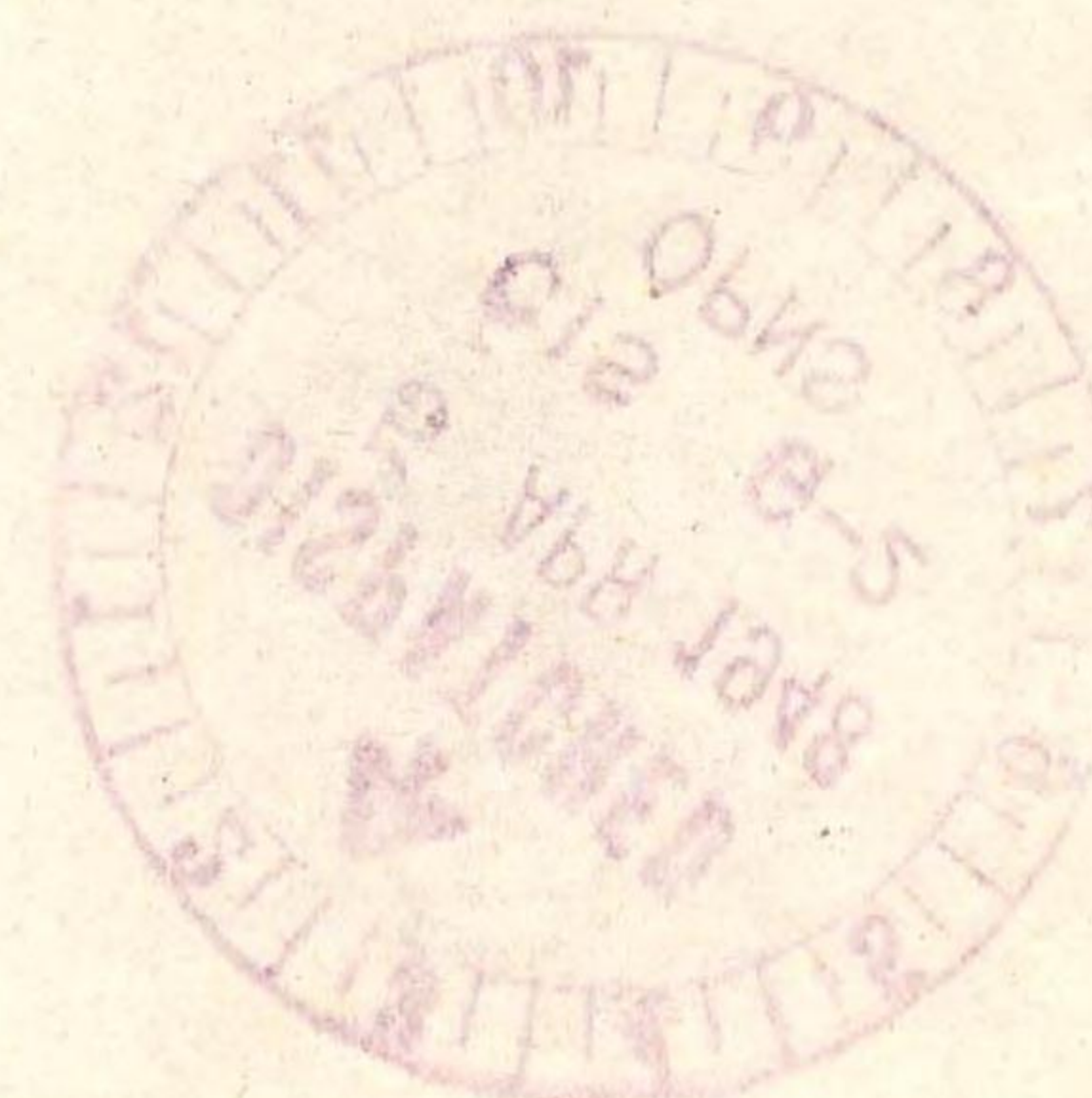

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## Report From Japan

## BEHIND THE SCENES AT KINUTA

Daily People's World  
21 October 1948

By Barbara Stern

The Toho Film Corp., largest movie producer in Japan, is the scene of a months-long struggle by the actors and workers for decent wages and conditions. Barbara Stern, writing from Japan, gives here an eye-witness account of the facts.

\* \* \*

TOKIO—The workers at the Kinuta studio of the Toho Film Corporation still occupy their quarters and are in possession of the keys, after months of refusal by management to renew their union contract.

So far the police have refused to evict the actors without an order from the district court; how long that will last is anybody's guess.

Two things: The appalling tuberculosis rate and the militancy of the workers compelled me to visit Kinuta and cover the story of this strike. Out of 1142 actors and workers at the studio 150 have tuberculosis. Sixty-five are now confined at home or in hospitals.

## NO FANCY DRESS

Many actors were still wearing their former army uniforms. At first I thought the shabbiest ones to be mere extras, but to my amazement amongst them were stars! If this group cannot manage to keep up personal appearances then one can well imagine what the average wage is like.

When the workers and actors learned that I wished to send a story to their fellow workers in the states, their countenances brightened. They talked of their struggle, and the management's intrigue to break the union. Their voices contained a vibrant fire which can only bring them victory.

\* \* \*

Lunch Time: Those who had their lunches with them began to unwrap them—others walked away—everything in me seemed to tie into a knot. But those walking away were asked to stay. Like other similar theatrical groups everywhere in this world, they shared.

\* \* \*

I talked to Kono Akitake\* and Takashi Shimura\*, both veterans of the stage and screen. Takashi Shimura has been on the stage for fifteen years and with the films for about nine years. It was Takashi who lamented the fact that actors are not classed as workers.

Takashi, with exasperation in his voice, looked down on his clothes and said:

"Just look, I have worn this jacket for fourteen years. And after

twenty-two years two other men and I got together and bought . . . a bicycle!"

I looked at Kono Akitake's shoes. They certainly commanded attention. I wondered why he was wearing the shoes and how he managed to keep them on or how he keeps the pebbles from going in and out of the holes . . . Kono's art and fame rings throughout Japan.

SAME OLD STORY

Last March Kono's contract expired. It was to be renewed but the management hurled the Communist bogey and fired the actors. The owners also tried the "overstaffed" excuse, that they were running in the red—but the corporation still has assets amounting to two billion yen.

And management every now and then let the cat out of the bag by offering to reemploy those fired, but on a single contract basis!

I saw a group of budding starlets—average age about 19. I interviewed them in their dressing rooms, and after what I saw I wondered how long before that peculiar round reddish patch would appear on their creamy silken faces.

The floors are covered with tatami (straw mats), since the room also serves as sleeping quarters when the starlets work into the night. In one corner of the room I noticed a great mass of ragged quilts and mattresses piled almost ceiling high. The caretaker informed me that the bedding originally came with a single sheet, but within a year's time with no changes the sheet wore out quickly . . .

\* \* \*

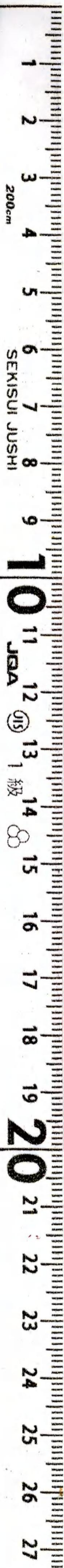
Costume designing has always been my hobby. I expected to find all the tinsel and glamour imaginable . . . The first whiff dispelled all thought of romance.

The costume department is run as a private racket. Rental of the costumes exceeds the cost each time the costume is used. No matter how many times it is used. Under these arrangements the owner of the costume department could easily afford to keep the costumes in a sanitary condition. On the contrary, the foul odor comes from laundering the costumes hardly once a year. After an actor has used the costume on location on a hot sweltering day, it is aired a bit and put aside for the next person.

\* \* \*

VALUABLE PROJECT

Within the same studio is the educational film section, directed by a group of progressive and idealistic people. Toho has seen fit to discontinue this section entirely, even after the group submitted feasible plans to make the project pay. The Toho group had fought degenerate films vigilantly—the children of Japan are sadly neglected. This project had been the one wholesome light in the vast murky sewer of lewd

movies and literature submerging these innocent minds.

\* \* \*

Just outside of the building I had the pleasure of meeting Fumio Kamei\*, director of "War and Peace." That film can easily compare with Hollywood's best and then some. Yet, management complained that the picture was forced upon it.

This slight man—a great artist—cut my words of praise short.

"No matter how good an artist may be," he said, "one cannot produce such a picture without the period and time . . . "War and Peace" is the fruit of a kind of misery almost beyond man's conception, except for those who have lived through its inferno."

As Kamei spoke, I could see the miserable millions becoming enlightened—marching, marching, step by step toward their awakening!

\*Note: These Japanese individuals are all active members of the Japan Communist Party and of the Communist element of the Toho workers union. Fumio Kamei, one of the instigators of the strike and reported organizer of a youth attack corps which was to be utilized during the strike, has a police record for Communist activity in Japan and is allegedly a graduate of the Communist Moscow Oriental Labor University.

## SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SUBJECT: FUJIKAWA, Mrs. Hannah R. (nee Reichenberg)

1. Subject was born in New York City, 16 May 1907. She married FUJIKAWA, Yoshitaro, Japanese Communist, probable Comintern member and aggressive labor leader, 30 July 1939, and came with him to Japan shortly thereafter. Although legally married, it is believed that the marriage of the two was in reality a cover for their work as members of the Comintern with similar missions. Couple's address is 329 Banchi, Tsurumi-ku, Yokohama. Her legal address is given as Harris Reichenberg, 1923 East 4th Street, Los Angeles, California. The Yokohama American Consulate files show subject's "Applications for Passport" issued by the Swiss Legation, Tokyo, 1 September 1943, with record of subject's visit to Russia, Poland and Germany as a child.

2. Subject, although an American citizen at the time, elected to remain in Japan through the World War II period. On 12 September 1945 she was recovered by an American Recovery Team with a Swiss protective passport. Although her husband was with her in Japan, subject dispatched a "nearest-of-kin" notification to him at a Los Angeles address and sailed for the United States about 1 October 1945 -- ostensibly to join her husband in Los Angeles. FUJIKAWA, Yoshitaro, was living in Tokyo.

3. In June 1946, subject applied through Joint Chiefs of Staff to return to Japan. This time, she "overlooked" the fact that her husband was allegedly in the United States and, moreover, fixed his location as Tokyo, Japan, once again. Although in her application to the Joint Chiefs of Staff she claimed to be without funds, she sailed to Japan as a fare-paying passenger. One of the grounds on which her repatriation to Japan was based was that, according to her affidavit, her husband was employed by General Headquarters, Far East Command. There was no truth in this statement.

4. En route to Japan aboard the S.S. Marine Falcon, subject was outspoken in her anti-American, pro-Soviet views of Communist Party methods and policies, Soviet press, American occupational failures, the successful occupation of Korea by the Soviets, her husband's position as a CIO organizer. She also volunteered the information that she had been an active participant in the San Pedro Waterfront Strike (Communist sponsored) of 1936. During the trip, subject requested permission of the ship's officers to speak at the Crew Members Educational Meeting, but was refused because of suspicions and protests by various members of the crew who considered her communistically inclined.

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5. Subject claims to be an American citizen although Japanese poll records -- as late as 1947 -- show that she registered as a Japanese citizen and voted in the national elections. She declares, however, that her presence at the polls was merely that of an "observing" journalist.

6. In order to obtain certain American privileges, subject has falsely represented herself a correspondent of the Allied Labor News, New York City. A letter, dated 6 December 1946 and signed by Gladys Carter of the Allied Labor News, is addressed "Barbara Stern" and explains that her accreditation as Allied Labor News correspondent is not considered feasible and is denied. This letter further disclosed that articles concerning seamen's strike, the fascistic conduct of American military police in labor disturbances in Japan, and other phases of labor had been submitted by subject for publication. The name of Hugh Deane, an accredited correspondent for Telepress, Ltd., and Allied Labor News, has been used by subject as "cover" for her use of the Army Postal Service.

7. On 7 January 1947, subject was apprehended aboard the S.S. Marine Falcon in Yokohama by agents of the Second Major Port Provost Marshal's Office. She had obtained a pass to board the ship by claiming to be visiting a fictitious member of the crew. Searched, she was found to be carrying U.S. Occupation currency, U.S. currency and a calling card bearing the name of a Soviet correspondent of PRAVDA.

8. A Criminal Investigation Division raid on subject's quarters, 20 January 1947, uncovered a large cache of Soviet-published books and periodicals and a considerable quantity of Army post exchange procured items.

9. A 20 January 1948 report indicates subject was active among a group of American school teachers, all of whom were singularly impressed with subject's consistent indorsement of communistic principles and practices. On her visits, subject availed herself of their billet facilities (meals, showers, telephones) as well as their Army mail and post exchange privileges.

10. As of 7 October 1948, subject is reported to have approached an attorney to represent her in an appeal to regain her American citizenship.

11. At a 7 November 1948 meeting sponsored by the Central Committee of the Japan Communist Party in celebration of the 31st Anniversary of the Russian Revolution, subject was among those honored with a seat on the speakers' stand although she took no active part in the ceremonies.

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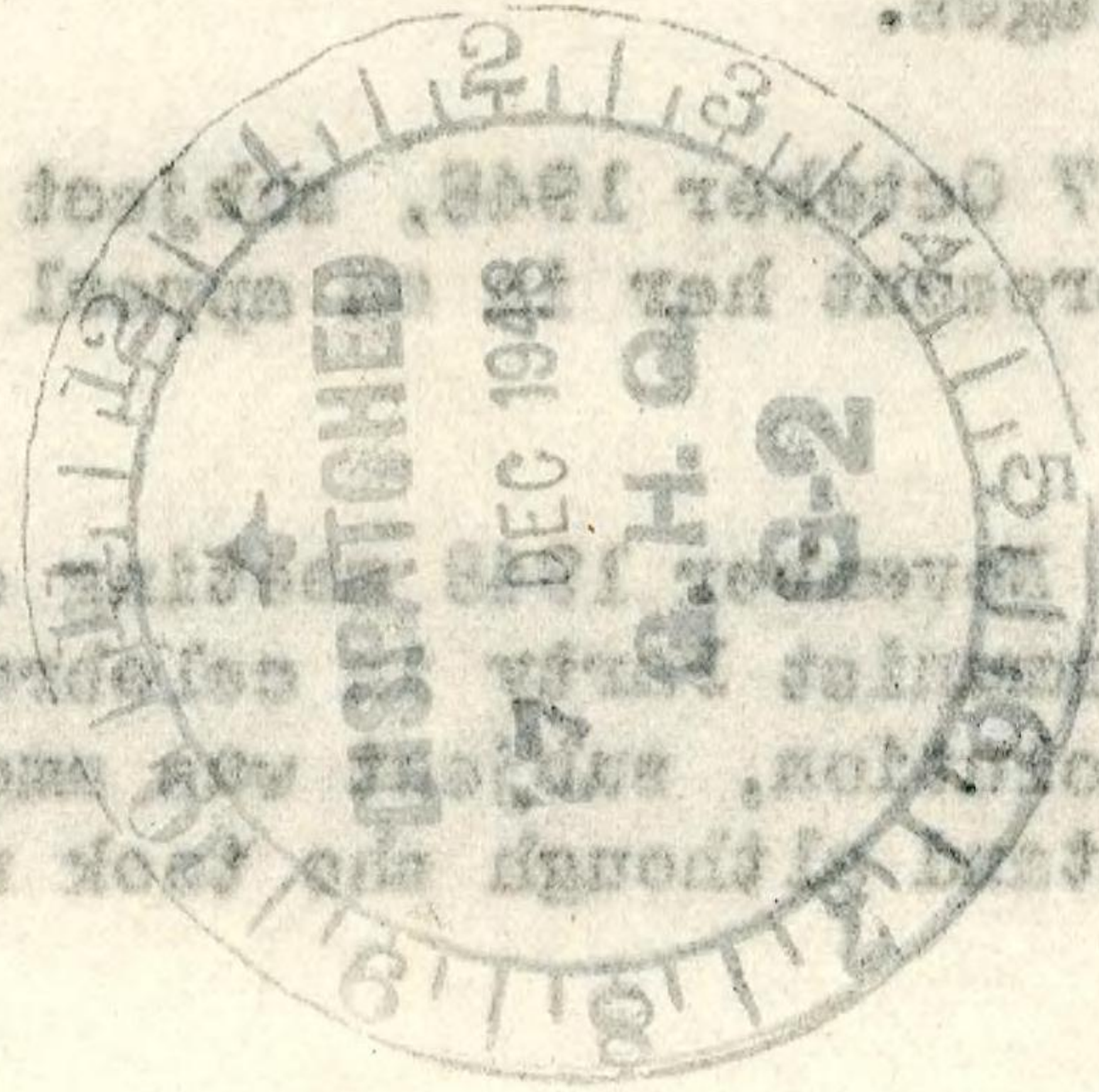

## SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

SUBJECT: GILLESPIE, Natalie Victroyna, Mrs.

1. Subject is the wife of Chief Machinist Mate Gillespie, Allen Virgel Keys, U.S. Navy, who is stationed in Japan.

2. She became the Subject of investigation following a reception held on 26 October 1947 in honor of the marriage of LAFSHAKOVA Nona (stateless Russian) to McCOWN, Clyde E., a Technical Sergeant, Eighth Army, at Yokohama, Japan. At this reception Subject entertained by singing pro-Soviet and Communist songs. It was reported that during the reception Subject was asked not to sing songs as it was indicated that this reception was not the proper place for such songs, whereupon Subject is alleged to have replied that she was an American and could sing any song she pleased, slapping the face of the person who had scolded her. This incident precipitated a fight among the Russian guests and others attending the reception.

3. It has been reported that Subject was a White Russian who escaped from Russia sometime between 1930-1935, fleeing to Shanghai, China, via Manchuria and Harbin. She met and married Chief Machinist Mate Gillespie about 1935 at Shanghai while he was stationed in China with the U.S. Navy.

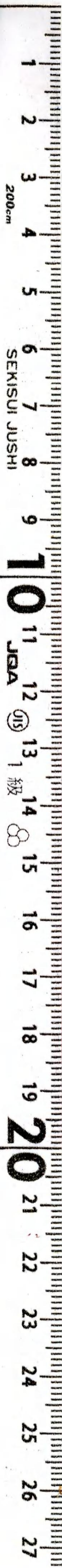
4. About 1939 Subject and her husband are reported to have gone to the United States where it is alleged she became a U.S. citizen.

5. Since 1947, when Subject joined her husband in Japan, Subject and Gillespie are reported to have attended several Soviet sponsored parties, and when under the influence of liquor, Subject continuously sings modern Communist songs in Russian. This has confused her friends, Russian, Japanese and Americans, as to her true status and political leanings. It is rumored that Subject has stated that if she were not an American she would like to return to Russia to live.

6. Subject's close friends and associates are reported to be EBEL Ildya and the KARAEFF Alexander family of Yokohama.

7. Chief Machinist Mate Gillespie is reported to have served twenty (20) years in the U.S. Navy. He now intends to enter reserve status and apply for a civilian job in Yokohama.

3. Subject was separated from the Army on 16 November 1946, at Yokohama, Japan, pursuant to Special Order No. 234, Headquarters, Eighth Army, dated 12 September 1946. After discharge, Subject accepted a position as Junior Procurement Manager with the Army Exchange Service. Subject was dismissed from the Army Exchange Service on 24 December 1946 for inefficiency. He then procured a position with the Pepsi Cola Corporation in Tokyo as warehouse manager.

4. Subject married VOEVODIN Tamara on 13 July 1947 at the Russian Cathedral in Tokyo. Acting as ushers were VOEVODIN Anatrey, MENENKO George and LUIKER George, all prominent members of the Russian community and active for the Soviets. After the wedding, a reception was held at the American Club in Tokyo. Of approximately 200 guests, half were

recognized Soviet citizens and members of the Soviet Embassy, including Consul TEVETKOV and Secretaries BELEV and NIKISHOV, and about fifteen Soviet officers. After the reception, the wedding feast was held at the home of the bride's parents. Subject resided at the home of his wife's parents, VOEVODIN, Efimii, at 529, 3-chome, Shinomeguro, Meguro-ku, Tokyo.

5. Subject and his wife left Japan for the Zone of Interior aboard the USAT ELTINGE on 19 November 1947, leaving a forwarding address of 511 Benson Avenue, Modesto, California.

1. Attention is invited to letter from Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, Far East Command, to Director of Intelligence, General Staff, United States Army, Washington 25, D. C., Attention: Chief, Security Group, dated 16 September 1947, subject: "Transmittal of Intelligence File—GRAJDANZEV, Andrew Jonah, War Department Civilian Employee." The following new development in subject's case is forwarded for your information.

2. On 2 April 1948 subject, now apparently residing at 3119 76th Street, Jackson Heights, New York, New York (who claims that he has legally changed his name from GRAJDANZEV to GRAD), addressed a letter to Lt. Col. Timothy J. RYAN, formerly of the Military Government Team in Saitama-ken, whom subject states he met while making a study of Japanese agriculture in Fukaya village. Subject wrote to Col. RYAN that he was continuing this research project and desired to open correspondence with some of the residents in Fukaya for the purpose of securing additional information on agricultural conditions. Subject stated that he expected such correspondence to go through "censorship," but nevertheless sought Col. RYAN's concurrence in his projected correspondence. As a collateral point, subject could, of course, get the information through Natural Resources Section, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

3. Col. RYAN is no longer with Military Government in Saitama-ken. The present senior Military Government officer, Lt. Col. Charles P. HAYWARD, informed Counter Intelligence Corps that persons unknown to him had placed subject's letter to Col. RYAN on his desk and that on or about 29 April 1948 a Captain BROWN (identified as Captain Richard G. BROWN, 0627149) of Government Section, General Headquarters, had called to ask Col. HAYWARD what he "intended to do about subject's letter."

4. Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, Eighth Army and the Government Section, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, have been advised of this matter and informed that the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, Supreme
